Pilot collapses in flight, later dies

McALLEN (AP) — The pilot of a Continental Airlines flight became ill after takeoff and was later pronounced dead after the plane made an emergency landing Saturday, a company spokeswoman said.

The 210 passengers on the flight, which departed from Houston, were never in danger and the co-pilot landed the plane safely, Continental spokeswoman Macky Osorio said.

The airline is not yet releasing details about the pilot or how he died, only saying that he suffered a "serious medical problem." Continental believes the pilot died of natural causes, Osorio said.

L.A. vows gang crackdown after deaths

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A 14-year-old girl was killed by Hispanic gang members who police say were targeting blacks. A 9-year-old girl died after being hit by a stray bullet as gang members exchanged shots near her home. A cop was wounded in a gunbattle with a suspected gangster. The soaring violence is prompting police and politicians to promise one of the toughest crackdowns against gangs in city history.

Chavez to U.S.: 'Go to Hell, Gringos!'

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — President Hugo Chavez told U.S. officials to "Go to hell!" on his weekly radio and TV show Sunday for what he called unacceptable meddling after Washington raised concerns about a measure to grant Venezuela's fiery leftist leader broad lawmaking powers. The National Assembly, which is controlled by the president's political allies, is expected to give final approval this week to what it calls the "enabling law," which would give Chavez the authority to pass a series of laws by decree during an 18-month period.

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Deadliest day in 2 years

Helicopter crash; fighting kill 19 U.S. service members in Iraq, highest day toll in 2 years

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — At least 19 American service members were killed in military operations Saturday in the deadliest day for U.S. forces in two years, including 12 who died in a helicopter crash and five slain in an attack by militia fighters in the holy city of Karbala, military officials said.

Saturday's toll was the third-highest of any single day since the war began in March 2003, eclipsed only by 37 U.S. deaths on Jan. 26, 2005, and 28 on the third day of

the U.S. invasion. U.S. authorities also announced two American combat deaths from Friday.

The heavy toll comes at a critical time of rising congressional opposition to President Bush's decision to dispatch 21,500 additional soldiers to the conflict to try to curb sectarian slaughter.

The military gave little information on the crash of the Army Black Hawk helicopter during good weather in Diyala province, northeast of Baghdad. U.S. and Iraqi forces have been battling Sunni insurgents and Shiite militias for months in the province, around the city of

Baqouba.

Lt. Col. Josslyn Aberle, a U.S. spokeswoman, said the cause of the crash had not been determined. Navy Capt. Frank Pascual, a member of a U.S. media relations team in the United Arab Emirates, told Al-Arabiya television that the helicopter was believed to have suffered technical troubles before going down.

The military initially said 13 people were on board the aircraft but corrected the number on Sunday, saying 12 soldiers died, including eight passengers and four crew members.

Five U.S. soldiers were killed Saturday night when militia fighters

attacked a provincial headquarters in the Shiite Muslim holy city of Karbala, the military said in a statement.

The statement said "an illegally armed militia group" attacked the building with grenades, small arms and "indirect fire," which usually means mortars or rockets. The statement said three other soldiers were wounded repelling the attack.

"A meeting was taking place at the time of the attack to ensure the security of Shiite pilgrims participating in the Ashoura commemorations," said a statement from Brig. Gen. Vincent K. Brooks, deputy

commander of the Multi-National Division-Baghdad.

Karbala is 50 miles south of Baghdad and thousands of Shiite pilgrims are flocking to the city to mark the 10-day Ashoura festival commemorating the death of one of Shiite Islam's most sacred saints, Imam Hussein, grandson of the Prophet Muhammad.

Brooks said Iraqi officials and security forces as well as U.S. troops were present at the meeting, but his statement did not mention other casualties from the attack. It said the headquarters had "been secured by coalition and Iraqi security forces."

Weekend weather not as harsh as expected

Texas Tech students may feel let down after building up hope for a big snowstorm over the weekend.

After predicting between 10 inches and 15 inches of snowfall and as much as 18 inches of snow in isolated areas, the National Weather Service updated its earlier predictions by Saturday morning, downgrading the snowstorm's forecast to between three and five inches of accumulation in the Lubbock area.

A revised weather advisory released Saturday blamed the reduced snow totals on "temperatures too warm to be conducive for heavy snow," resulting in the earlier heavy snow warning and winter storm warning for Lubbock county to be canceled.

Lubbock International Airport reported receiving 4.3 inches of snow while Friona, about 90 miles northwest of Lubbock, received 11 inches, according to the National Weather Service.

Alita Estes, a senior art major from Lubbock, said she had

Lubbockites heed weather warnings

Predictions of severe winter-weather conditions over the weekend did not lead to increased business for JR Lindsey, owner of JR's Towing Storage and Repair, as might have been expected.

Adverse weather affects crime

Icy weather may have kept Lubbock residents from leaving their homes this weekend, but some criminals saw the freezing weather as a window of opportunity.

Lubbock police said at least two aggravated robberies were investigated this weekend; one occurred at the Whataburger restaurant at 19th Street and Avenue Q, and another occurred at the Executive Inn at 44th Street and Avenue Q.

On Friday, Lubbock police were called to the Whataburger in the 1700 block of 19th Street in reference to an aggravated robbery. Police said the suspect left the restaurant after stealing \$61 from the cash register.

Reports state the suspect approached an employee of the restaurant, pointed a deadly weapon at the employee and demanded money from the register.

Witnesses to the robbery said the suspect was seen leaving the restaurant heading west on foot.

Two young men staying at the Executive Inn allege two suspects pushed their way into the men's room during an attempted robbery, manager Erin Dihenia said.

The suspects left the victim's room, stealing one DVD after the suspects searched the victim's wallets and failed to locate any money, Dihenia said.

"I believe the two men knew them (the suspects) and didn't want to tell the police," Dihenia said.

She said she found razor blades and other paraphernalia inside a bag located underneath the bed when the room was cleaned.

Dihenia said the hotel has surveillance cameras and police know the suspects forced their way into the room at 8:58 p.m. and left at 9:04 p.m. She said the surveillance cameras caught the vehicle so

police know what the suspect's car looks like. Police know one suspect was wearing a tan jacket the other was wearing a dark blue jacket with a hood. Dihenia said a third suspect remained in the vehicle during the robbery.

The victims reported during the robbery, the suspects flashed a gun before searching the victims' wallets, Dihenia said.

SGA addresses parking issues

Chris Huff, Student Government Association external vice president, said if the parking problem at Texas Tech is not addressed soon, it will become an even bigger problem when enrollment increases.

Huff said he thinks the most immediate parking problem is getting access to and from the satellite parking lot. He said there are not enough buses running between campus and satellite parking to make parking convenient for students.

"We are trying to find a way," Huff said, "to put more buses out there in a reasonable time."

He said one of his roles as external vice president involves working with University Parking Services to try and come up with the best parking solutions while keeping student tuition fees in mind.

He said one solution being discussed is building more parking lots or garages.

"We have been looking at putting a parking lot or building, depending on how much we can raise, where Thomp-

son/Gaston Hall are," Huff said. "It would accommodate an additional 1000 spaces."

Huff said there has been discussion of constructing parking facilities in various areas on campus and building one next to the new Jerry S. Rawls College of Business Building. He said parking facilities are expensive to build and maintain, and the cost of one parking garage would double parking permit fees.

Another possible parking solution would be to charge an additional fee to general-admission tickets for large events on campus, Huff said.

"The surcharge would go to parking services and then would be allocated to new parking facilities," Huff said.

The extra cost would not affect student event-fees and would not be applied to smaller events such as theater productions, Huff said.

Eric Crouch, managing director for University Parking Services, said the surcharge amount would be between 50 cents and \$1, depending on how much money needed to be raised.

He said until there is a demand for more parking spaces, the additional event fee will not take

effect. "This is something that the university will have to decide on—there are lots of pros and cons," Crouch said.

Brian Kelm, a junior business major from Austin, said he gets frustrated when he cannot find a parking space because people are taking up spots for an on-campus event.

"I live five minutes away from campus, and I have to leave an extra 30 minutes to get to my classes on time," Kelm said. "It's absolutely ridiculous."

Huff said he has talked with a company called Walker Parking Consultants about building some sort of transportation hub.

"It would be a central-parking-and-transportation unit to make things more convenient," Huff said. "All bike routes would have a route to and from the hub and it may include bookstores, a Starbucks and a parking garage."

Huff said there are more than 1,000 spaces available on campus for students to park in that do not get used on a daily basis.

"Parking should be a focus for SGA, and I would like to see it become more of a priority for the university," Huff said.

Lubbock issued several statements offering citizens tips on how to cope with the conditions as well as contact numbers for non-emergencies.

According to a news release from the city, citizens in need of non-emergency health and community services can dial 211, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. 2-1-1 Texas is a help line maintained by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

Other tips from the city included those specifically pertaining to preparing for severe winter conditions.

"Make sure you have adequate

food, water and supplies for several days. Have emergency provisions ready such as a flashlight, food, water and blankets just in case you lose power to your home," according to the statement.

Floyd Price, councilman for District 2, said his advice for citizens in the Hub City and the surrounding area is to stay home if weather conditions are bad.

"If you don't need to be out, don't be out," he said.

Price said while it is good to have fun playing in the parks when there is snow, it is still advisable not to drive there because of the road conditions. He said people sometimes forget to consider what the roads are like, which can lead to an increased

number of accidents.

"If you've got bad weather, just stay home until you have to leave," he said.

The City Council compiles tips to help residents prepare for severe weather conditions, and Price said reactions to the tips that were issued have been positive.

However, he said because the city was caught off guard the first time snow fell earlier this winter, there were some negative comments made at that time.

His main advice is to "be safe and drive accordingly; go slow," he said.

Lubbock Power and Light also had advice for citizens concerning how to cope with winter-weather conditions.

"Solutions to consider include: not using open source flame heat sources, rearranging rooms so that sitting and sleeping areas are near interior walls," according to a statement from LP&L.

LP&L customers who experience a power outage that lasts longer than five minutes should call (806) 775-2555, the 24-hour Operations Center, to report it.

The City of Lubbock issued statements concerning fire safety during periods of cold weather.

Issues addressed in the statement included smoke detectors, space heaters, candles, wood burning appliances and carbon monoxide. The use of other emergency heating options is addressed as well.

According to the statement on fire safety, indicators of possible carbon monoxide poisoning include headaches, light-headedness or dizziness and extreme nausea followed by loss of consciousness.

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Iraq PM stops protecting Shiite militia

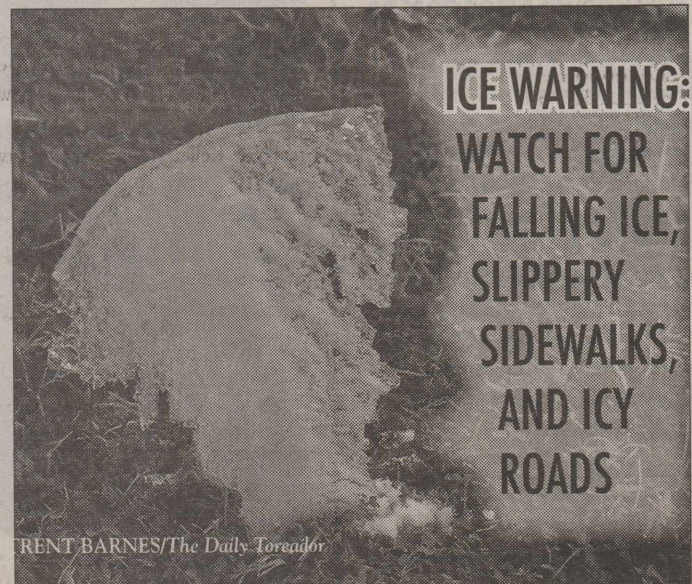
BAGHDAD, Iraq. (AP) — Iraq's prime minister has dropped his protection of an anti-American cleric's Shiite militia after U.S. intelligence convinced him the group was infiltrated by death squads, two officials said Sunday.

In a desperate bid to fend off an all-out American offensive, the radical cleric Muqtada al-Sadr last Friday ordered the 30 lawmakers and six Cabinet ministers under his control to end their nearly two-month boycott of the govern-

ment. They were back at their jobs Sunday.

Al-Sadr had already ordered his militia fighters not to display their weapons. They have not, however, ceded control of the formerly mixed neighborhoods they have captured, killing Sunnis or forcing them to abandon their homes and businesses.

Saturday's U.S. death toll climbed significantly to 25 after the military reported Sunday that six more troops had died in the deadliest day in two years for American forces.

Floydada upgrades, gets citywide Wi-Fi

The citizens of Floydada may become a little more technology-savvy in the coming months.

Reese Technology Center and Blue Moon Solutions, both of Lubbock, have teamed-up to create a Wi-Fi Internet network that will cover everything within the city limits of Floydada.

Todd Reno, director of business development at Reese Technology Center, said bringing Wi-Fi to the citizens of Floydada will be like giving them electricity for the first time by giving them access to a whole new world of information. Floydada is the first city in West Texas, among the first 10 cities in the state of Texas and among the first 300 cities in the United States to get a wireless network covering all land within the city limits.

"We chose to work with them first because they are very progressive," Reno said, "and we want to help them continue take steps to further education."

Floydada ISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn said three years ago Floydada ISD received a grant to give every middle school student a laptop to replace textbooks. The following year, the school district used \$600,000 to provide every student in secondary schools and every teacher in the district with a laptop.

"Since we have gotten these laptops,

attendance is higher, and some of our testing has had double-digit jumps in scores," Vaughn said. "The new Wi-Fi mesh network will make it an even bigger and better situation for our students."

He said most students do not have Internet access at home, so they were forced to find another way to do their homework.

"There was a tremendous number of kids sitting around our schools and the wireless network allows them to be at home," Vaughn said. "It tears down the walls of our school and lets students use their computers on the road, in the car or anywhere for that matter."

Vaughn said Wi-Fi is just another aspect of the current generation of students' lives he believes should be accessible to them.

"These students live in a digital world of text messages, emails and iChat," Vaughn said. "The new Wi-Fi allows them to function in their world."

He said the citywide Wi-Fi system is just another step forward for the school district, a step he hopes will be just one of many to improve the students' situations.

"I don't know what the future holds for Floydada ISD," Vaughn said, "but whatever we do will be in the best interest of the kids."

He said the new network will benefit more than just the students of Floydada;

it will benefit the city's entire population.

"This is going to be very positive for the whole community," Vaughn said. "This will help with the different businesses in the community, and in an emergency, it might help paramedics keep in touch with the hospital and maybe save someone's life."

Reno said Floydada may be the first town in West Texas to get a community-wide Wi-Fi network, but he does expect it to be the last.

"We hope it will stimulate economic growth and eventually help the whole region," Reno said. "Eventually, we want to get every community in West Texas involved so there can be seamless communication between them."

Reno said the network will be available for a nominal cost because it is being installed for the purpose of helping the students.

Marty Hale, CEO of Blue Moon Solutions, said the network should be ready some time in February. Blue Moon Solutions is installing 30 receivers to light posts that will then retransmit the signal to computers all across the city.

Reno said a few years ago, the Reese Technology Center received a grant to distribute an OC-192, which is the strongest bandwidth available in the United States. The bandwidth has an 80-mile radius and will be transmitted from Reese to Floydada.

a feeling the forecast was exaggerated when the snow did not come in Thursday night like she expected.

"They kept predicting more and more snow as time went on," she said. "They went from saying six to 10 to 15 inches by Thursday night, and I didn't think it was going to amount to that much. It wasn't cold enough. It was just kind of rainy and wet and slushy for a while."

Estes said to occupy her time over the weekend she stayed indoors and watched TV.

"I got under the blankets, drank hot tea and watched the fifth season of *Alias*," she said. "That, to me, is the ideal thing to do on snow days, at least on a light snow day when there really isn't enough snow to have fun in."

Derek Hill, a junior physics major from Grapevine, said while the amount of snow forecasted was excessive, weather is a hard thing to predict.

"Yeah, it got pretty hyped," he said. "We got what? Two inches? That's not a snow storm."

Stephanie Kelley, a junior art history major from Fort Worth, said she was let down by the diminished forecast because she was hoping for a lot of snow.

"It's hard for me to trust the Weather Channel when everything they have said so far has been off-base," she said. "But I'm also happy the snowstorm wasn't too bad because that makes driving dangerous and getting around more difficult."

Despite lower snow totals, the weather service cautioned motorists about poor driving conditions and slick roadways Friday and Saturday night because of accumulated

ice. Three-eighths to half an inch of accumulated ice were reported throughout Lubbock by the weather service.

Local supermarkets weathered the storm with ease, with only minor shortages in ice-melting products, ice scrapers and water.

By Saturday afternoon, the United Supermarket on 112 N. University Ave. was running smoothly.

"This isn't bad at all," said a United manager. "We ran out of bags of ice-melting salt, but we had some more come in later. We had to set a limit of only three bags per customer."

Elizabeth Ho-gland, an employee in the grocery section at the Wal-Mart on Fourth Street and Avenue Q, said over the weekend, the store's warehouse ran out of gallon jugs of water, but additional supplies came in fairly fast.

"We were good for supply over the weekend," she said. "People just came in and bought bottled water instead. Everything was orderly."

In preparation for wintry weather Thursday, the Tech Office of Communications and Marketing launched its Emergency Communication Center to relay campus information through online announcements. Updates can be read at <http://www.ttu.edu/emergency>.

Temperatures on Sunday rose to the 40s on the Fahrenheit scale, while the high today is 32 degrees, according to the National Weather Service.

Because of rising temperatures, students should be wary of falling icicles from roof edges.

child of God.

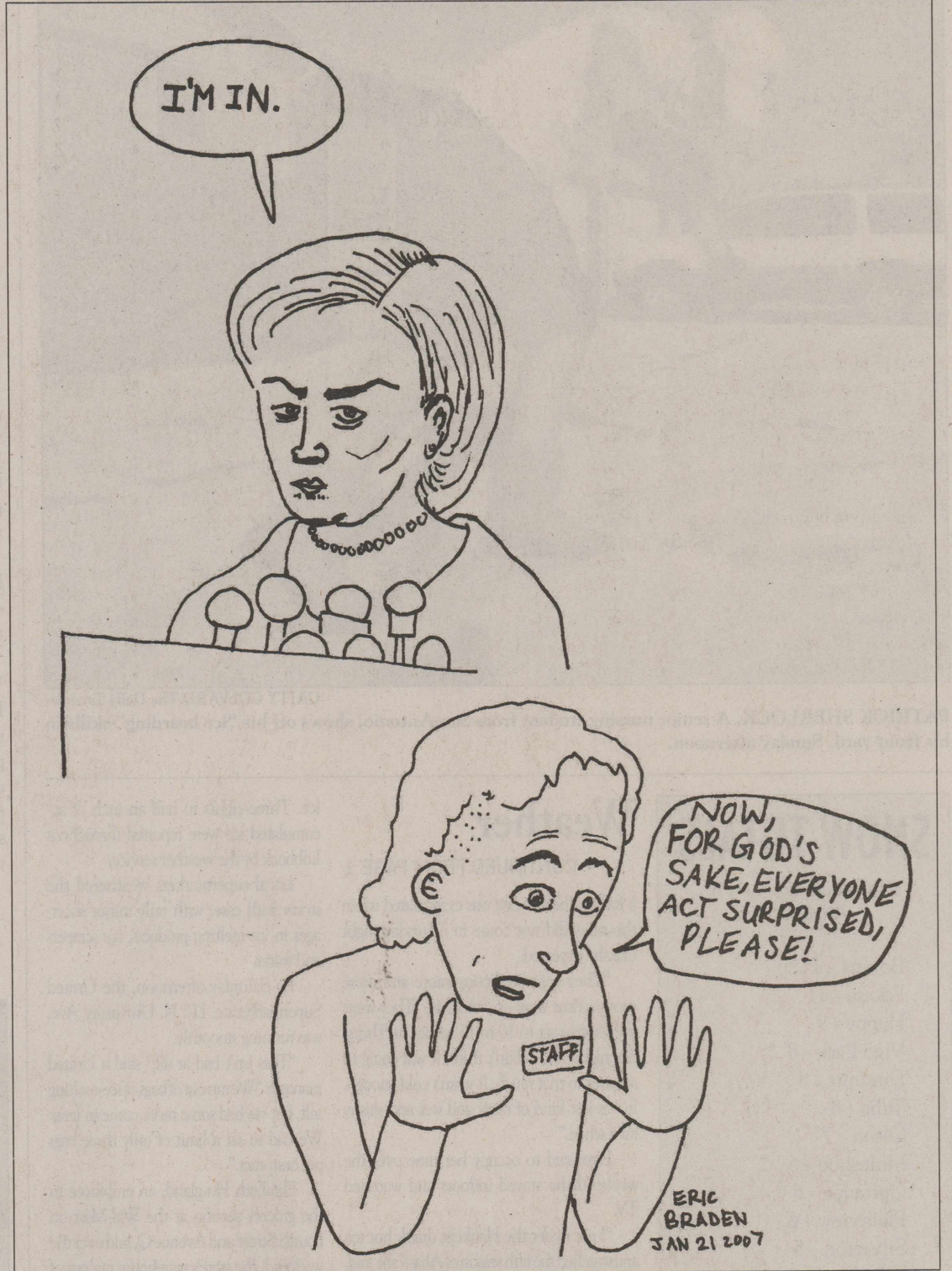

For instance, The democratic "Daddy Warbucks" of the last few years, George Soros, sent Obama a check within a few hours of his announcement to run.

Other supporters voiced opinions as to why they were going to fund Barack Obama over Clinton. According to *The New York Times*, the chairman of Torrey Funds, a global hedge fund, has decided for him and his money to support Obama. James Torrey said "I know it's perceived as an anti-Hillary thing. I think she's marvelous, I

think she's a great senator, but I'd rather see Barack Obama as president. I think the republicans will make it their life's work to bring her down."

Other New York donors voiced displeasure at the aforementioned *Washington Post-ABC* News poll, because even though Clinton's numbers were more than double Obama's, she had almost 100 percent name recognition, which doesn't bode well for Sen. Clinton's reputation amongst fellow democrats.

On Clinton's Los Angeles money front, many possible fundraisers have already signed on to do a fundraiser for Obama instead of Clinton. These cash cows are David Geffen, Jeffrey Katzenberg and Steven Spielberg.

England's *Times* paper billed the race between Obama and Clinton as "the magic v, the machine." Some other challengers are New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson, former Senator John Edwards, for-

mer Iowa Governor Tom Vilsack, possibly John Kerry and maybe Wesley Clark.

Not only are other democratic hopefuls ready to attack Clinton, she's going to encounter opposition from her husband's old political adviser Dick Morris, according to longtime political-insider Robert Novak. Morris is currently fundraising to make a critical film documentary about Hillary Clinton, and it's unlikely that anyone knows the Clintons as well as Morris, who worked with them for years.

McAuliffe was also quoted as saying "George Bush is going to be on the ticket whether they like it or not," which to me is his way of trying to divert the attention from the impending democratic

inter-party primary fighting back to their real enemy, the Republican Party.

While it's a long road ahead until the elections of 2008, I honestly hope we never see Hillary Clinton or Barack Obama in the White House because I don't even want to imagine the bloating of government and tax hikes that would occur afterwards. One question I think would be prudent for people to ask themselves before they begin supporting Clinton or Obama is whether or not they can afford either one of these candidates. I know I can't.

mous person in a chicken suit protesting outside the local KFC. The antics of the People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals are all too familiar to animal rights activists and non-activists alike.

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Latest slasher film 'hitches' solid cinematography with poor plot

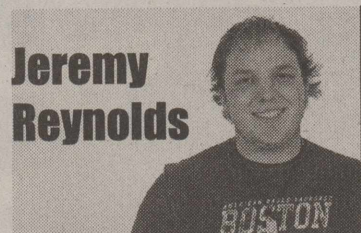
There are few things more frightening than the open road at night. With only headlights and maps the driver hopes are not outdated to guide the car, traveling across the country can be terrifying.

Michael Bay and his production company, Platinum Dunes, attempt to tap into that fear with the film "The Hitcher," and yes, like all horror movies these days, this one's a remake as well.

The movie begins with Zachary Knighton picking up his girlfriend, played by Sophia Bush, from college and embarking on a cross-country trip for Spring Break. Writers really need to come up with a better reason for putting college students on the road than getting wasted during Spring Break. It's been done.

To the sounds of The All-American Rejects, the two breeze down the open road with New Mexico as their next stop. Once in the state, a thunderstorm rolls over the horizon, flooding the streets and forcing Knighton to squint to see through the windshield.

The rain is coming down in steady sheets, and the pair cannot



see the man standing in the middle of the road with his thumb in the air. Their car swerves to avoid him, and after a narrow miss, Bush and Knighton floor-it to the next gas station rather than stopping to make sure he is all right. Luckily for them — and the plotline — a trucker picks up the hitchhiker, delivering him once again into Bush and Knighton's path.

The movie evolves from a cinematic story of the open road in the Southwest countryside into a ridiculous game of cat and mouse that gets more laughable as it progresses.

What worked in the late 1980s will not work on audiences these days. In the 80s, the screenwriter and director could get away with saying a madman is killing simply because he's mad. Nowadays, people need more of a motive than that.

It seemed the only motive the hitchhiker (played by Sean Bean) has for stalking Bush and Knighton is the quick bypass they gave him on that stormy night.

Like with all remakes done these days, instead of pulling the original director out of retirement or at the very least getting an established director to helm the picture, the studio opted to hand the script over to whoever had the most seniority in the music-video world. In this case, that would be Dave Meyers.

Meyers is able to capture a Mona-Lisa type beauty in the landscape that sprawls the film, but the screenplay, penned by Jake Wade Wall ("When a Stranger Calls"), made it impossible for Meyers to showcase what directing skills he might have.

The first ten minutes of the movie are picture-perfect because the dialogue consists merely of customaries. After a quick stop at a convenient store, the movie takes a plunge into the unbelievable. It's hard to understand why this hitchhiker, who was given the name John Ryder, would want to harm two complete strangers.

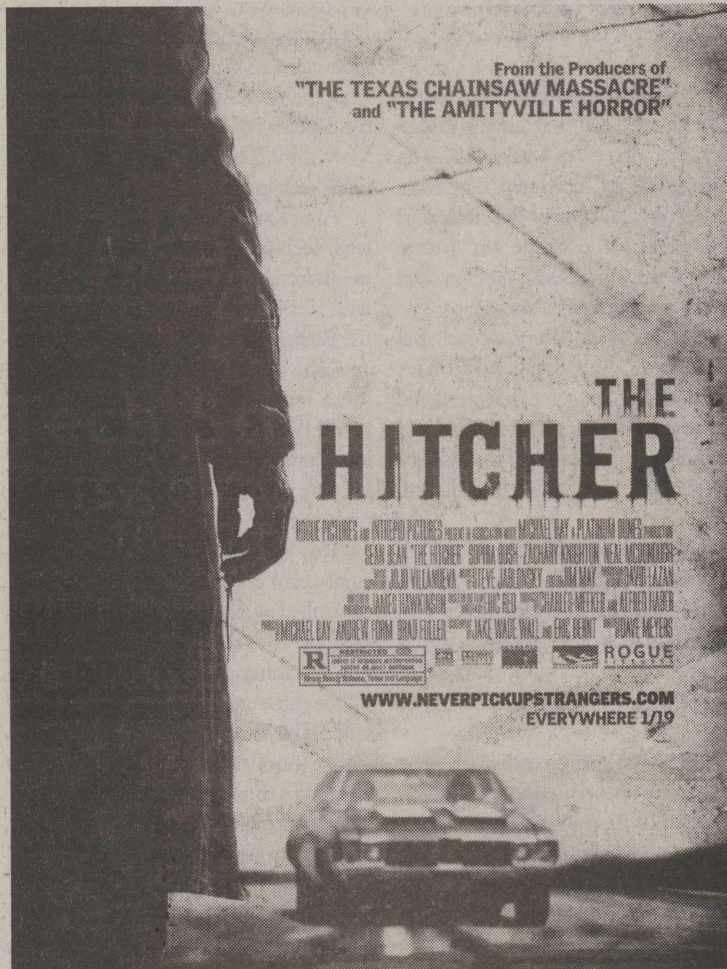
Directors of horror movies these days believe the only way for a movie to be frightening is to cater to the teenage-girl crowd — that crowd of high school teens who go see PG-13 horror movies to get a good leap every 10 minutes that puts them in lap-dance positions with the boys they came with.

Horror movies, or "slashers" as is the case with "The Hitcher," do not need that cheap thrill to give it terror. By the fourth one, the audience is on to the game the director is trying to pull.

Platinum Dunes is a studio that has a reputation of being the "remake" studio. It started in 2003 with the remake of the cult-classic "The Texas Chain Saw Massacre." It continued in 2005 with "The Amityville Horror." The streak is not over after "The Hitcher," as the studio is eyeing a remake of Alfred Hitchcock's "The Birds" as its next movie.

Double T Crew helping students adjust to life on campus

Texas Tech's Double T Crew is a one-of-a-kind organization for students who want to help fellow incoming students become familiar with campus and all that goes along with it.

According to the Web site newsdentorientation.ttu.edu, the Double T Crew is a group composed of 20 students — 10 male and 10 female — who work together to help students and parents during the 12 new student orientations that are held throughout the summer.

A typical day for a Double T Crew member can be hectic. John Mark Bernal, director of New Student Orientation, described what a crewmember does on a

daily basis.

"We always have a staff meeting every morning," he said. "We usually meet about 6:15, 6:30 every morning."

Bernal said at the meeting, crew members go over any recent changes that have been made.

After the students meet and greet with parents, Bernal said the crew members separate themselves into a variety of activities.

"They'll do anything from going and helping an academic college do advisement to helping with student panels (and) helping set up for a student-organization fair that we have every orientation session," he said. "They may be doing check-in of students and parents who are getting here, they may be doing campus tours that day to show people around or they may be

just sitting there at an information table just to be there as a resource if anybody has any questions, just to direct them where they need to go."

Justin Clark, one of the two head Double T Crew members, said although the number of hours crew members work can be frightening, it's well worth the time commitment for the overall experience.

"I think Double T Crew is a really unique experience; the positive experience is two-fold. It's really positive for the university, and it's (a) really great growing experience for students," he said. "There are very few organizations on campus where you get to have such an impact on the future of the university. It's a position that's so unique."

According to the New Student

Orientation Web site, crew members receive perks like free Tech clothing, free use of the Robert H. Ewalt Student Recreation Center during the summer and a free membership with the Student Red Raider Club.

Still, T-shirts are not the only advantage that crew members get out of being a part of the organization.

Matt Tepper, a graduate student who serves as the other head Double T Crew member, said students also make life-long connections both professionally and personally.

"You cannot undervalue the connections that we make," Tepper said. "We've had so many students who have used their experience in Double T Crew and the contacts that they've made to propel their academic career with that."

Tepper specifically mentioned some jobs crew members have gone on to pursue.

"Lots of our students end up getting jobs on campus from the connections they've made, ranging from working in various departments, and we've had some students working in the Chancellor's office," Tepper said. "We actually

have one of our past Double T crew members actually serves as the external vice president for SGA right now."

Although a \$1500 stipend, free memberships and free clothing may sound rewarding, Clark said none of those items are the greatest gift that members of the crew receive.

"It's amazing going into the summer, I was going in with 20 students that I basically never met before in my entire life," he said. "At the end, I consider every one of them one of my closest friends in the entire world."

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Raiders shoot down Jayhawks

In their second-consecutive trip to Lubbock as a Top-five team, the Kansas Jayhawks walked out with a loss to an unranked Texas Tech team. One common denominator between Saturday's 69-64 Tech win over the No. 5 team in the country and 2005's upset of then No. 2 Kansas: Darryl Dora.

"He was great," Kansas coach Bill Self said of Dora. "If you would have told me before the game that we would hold the rest of their team to 50, I would have said we did a good job defensively. But he made big shots. He likes playing Kansas."

In the game two years ago, Dora hit a game-winning 3-pointer in double overtime to give Tech the upset win. Saturday, the senior forward scored a team-high 19 points after totaling just two points in three previous conference games.

"He played on both ends of the floor, not just on the offensive end," Tech guard Jarius Jackson said of Dora. "He played real good defense on their big men, and he got some key rebounds down the stretch. I think we need that from him every game."

With Kansas (16-3, 3-1) jumping

out to an early 8-0 lead and Jackson not having a field goal in the first half, Dora came off the bench and was 4-of-7 from the floor and 2-of-4 from beyond the 3-point arc.

"I think Dora carried us in the first half," Jackson said.

After Kansas jumped out to the early lead, Tech (14-5, 3-1) got a quick eight points from Dora, including a 3-pointer with 10:14 to play in the first half to give the Raiders their first lead at 18-16.

"The game looked like it was going south for us in the beginning," Tech coach Bob Knight said. "But we had a lot of time left. We had a whole game left. We can make up eight points in a whole game."

Nor only did Tech make up the eight-point difference, but the Raiders controlled much of the second half taking a 61-49 lead with 3:42 to play.

"The thing about it is, it wasn't really a close game until the last minute," Self said. "They had control of the game. They controlled the game until the very end, and I think we did kind of a good job of controlling the end."

Kansas used a quick 13-1 run to tie the score at 62 with 1:42 to play.

"The thing that we've had a problem with all year long is losing leads, and we didn't break our string today," Knight

said. "We made the plays at the end that enabled us to win. You just are not going to beat a really good team badly all the time, and they came back."

With 1:03 to play, Jackson used a Dora pick, drove to the rim and converted a three-point play to give Tech the lead for good at 65-62.

"I think (Martin) Zeno got the offensive rebound, and I saw an opening so I just tried to make a play," Jackson said.

For the game, Jackson had 15 points on 4-of-10 shooting.

"We hadn't been cutting real well, and he made a really good cut and got open," Knight said of Jackson's 3-point play. "We had a really good screen for him. So he hit a shot that's a shot we set up for him."

After Kansas' Sherron Collins converted a lay up to cut the lead to one point, Tech's Alan Voskuil tipped in a Jackson miss to give Tech another three-point lead with 31 seconds to play.

"Obviously the huge play in today's game was the Voskuil tip in," Knight said.

With Tech up three points with 26 seconds remaining, Self called a timeout to set up the Jayhawks' final possession.

"We were trying to throw the ball

immediately in to Shady (Sherron Collins) or Brandon (Rush) and then back to Shady," Self said. "We were going to ball-screen for Sherron, just like we did, and have him take it. We didn't anticipate him taking a quick three but we weren't going to get a better look than that. That was a good look."

After Collins missed the shot, Kansas' Rush appeared to secure the offensive rebound but lost the ball into the hands of Tech's Charlie Burgess. Burgess immediately threw the ball up the court to Martin Zeno for a wide-open dunk to secure the Raider victory.

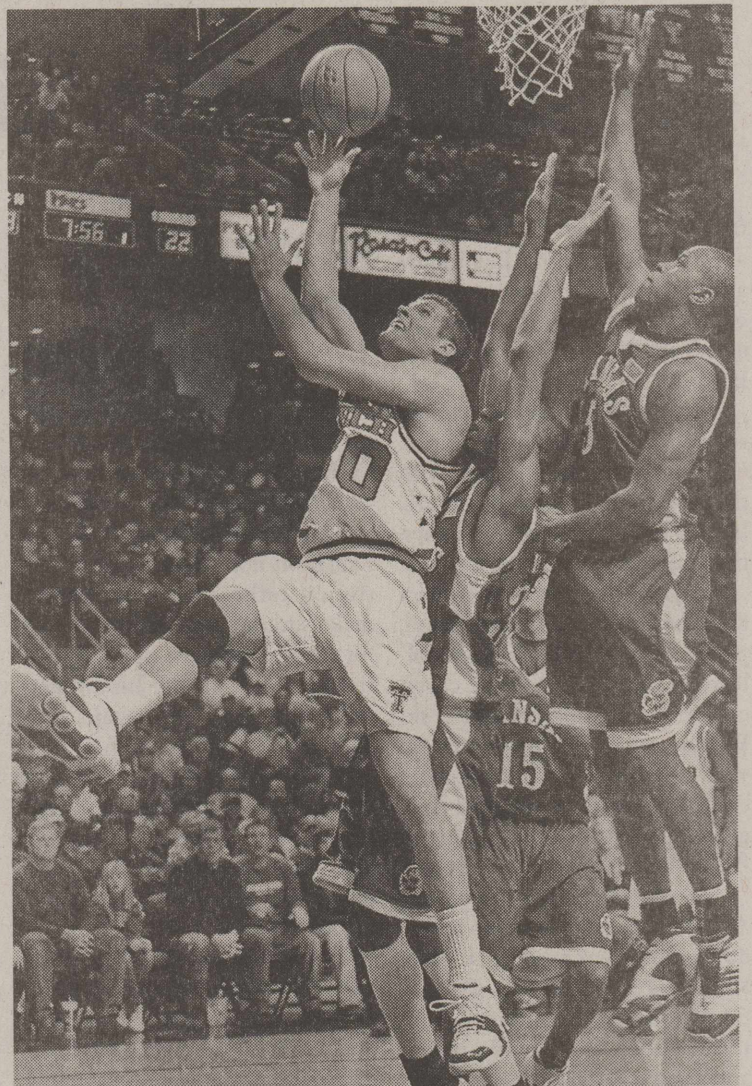
"Honestly, I didn't really see him, I just saw a white jersey," Burgess said. "I just jumped in the air and threw the ball. I'm just happy he caught the ball and laid it up."

Burgess said despite the win over No. 5 Kansas, the team still has a lot to improve on.

"We lost the lead when we were up 12," he said. "Good teams don't lose leads, so that's just something we gotta work on."

Tech next hosts another Top-10 team when eighth-ranked Texas A&M come to Lubbock for a 7 p.m. tip-off Wednesday at the United Spirit Arena.

Knight-ly forecast

'The General' predicts weather but not game

Coach Bob Knight may not have been able to forecast another upset over Kansas before Saturday's game, but he had the snowfall prediction packed tight.

"I told everybody it isn't going to snow," Knight said. "I said 'it isn't going to snow 16 inches in Lubbock in the year 3000 for Christ's sake.'"

With Lubbock receiving an official count of 4.3 inches of snow plus freezing rain and sleet over the weekend, a record 4,150 students still managed to pack the United Spirit Arena to watch Texas Tech upset fifth-ranked Kansas 69-64 Saturday — something Knight said he appreciated.

"The most important thing today was the turnout of the students," Knight said. "I think it was the largest turnout that we've ever had for students. They were great. They made it a great atmosphere for basketball."

Senior guard Jarius Jackson, who was a part of Tech's victory over then second-ranked Kansas in 2005, said he knew where to bolt to after watching the thousands of students take over the court.

"I was thinking, 'I need to get to the locker room,'" Jackson said. "It was a good atmosphere — the students were excited, everybody was excited."

Knight could be seen attempting to prevent students from rushing the floor after the win, but despite his effort, students packed the court, mobbing Tech players like Jackson and Alan Voskuil, who combined for five of Tech's final seven points of the game.

"Playing away to that atmosphere, which we do it a lot, is really great and playing here to it is far better," said Knight, who accrued his 883rd career victory. "We hope that those kids understand how important they were to the game today and the encouragement that they gave us."

Junior point guard Charlie Burgess said the crowd's energy helped Tech sustain momentum and maintain focus down the stretch.

"It got everybody up just to get out there and play," said Burgess, who scored eight points

in Saturday's win. "The energy was very high in the crowd, so I would just like to thank the fans and everybody that came out and supported us today."

While a record number of students showed for the Kansas game, the arena was still not sold out. The result could be attributed to the inclement weather, but that was no excuse in Knight's eyes.

"You know people in Texas got to understand that goddamned snow; you drive through it," he said. "I mean, Jesus, they're selling out grocery stores."

Knight, who has an appreciation for hunting, said the Hub City's below-freezing temperatures were nothing compared to other parts of the world.

"You know guys tell me, 'Coach we're going to go hunting Saturday; it's going to be cold,'" said Knight. "I said, 'cold my ass — you don't know what cold is.' I said 'you people down here have no concept of cold.'"

After the threat of treacherous weather was predicted for Friday and Saturday, many local grocery stores sold out of necessities such as bottled water, and now Knight wants to use weather predictions to his advantage.

"I think I'm going to buy a store and start rumors on snowfall," he said.

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Mavs win in first finals rematch

MIAMI (AP) — Jerry Stackhouse regained his scoring touch at the right time for the Dallas Mavericks, helping them finally stave off a comeback attempt by the Miami Heat.

Stackhouse — slowly working his way back after spraining his left ankle last month — scored 16 of his 23 points in the final quarter as the Mavericks held on to beat Miami 99-93 on Sunday in the first matchup between the teams since last season's NBA finals.

Josh Howard had 25 points and Dirk Nowitzki added 22 points and 11 rebounds for Dallas, which improved its NBA-best record to 34-8 and is 20-1 in its last 21 games. Plus, the Mavs got some tiny measure of revenge over the Heat, who lost the first two games of last year's finals before rallying to win the championship in six games.

"We just had to keep grinding," Stackhouse said. "It was a great game which had some great players making great plays."

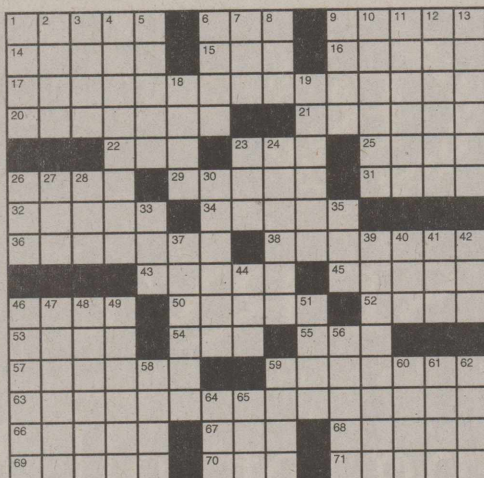
Dwyanne Wade — who suffered a left ankle injury in the first quarter, but returned and played 44 minutes — finished with 31 points, six rebounds and six assists for Miami, but missed a potential tying 3-pointer with 5.8 seconds left.

Jason Williams had 17 points and Udonis Haslem, who missed his first eight shots, had 15 for the Heat.

"We still had an opportunity to win the game," Heat center Alonzo Mourning said. "When you put yourself in a position to win, you don't want to just settle for that. They don't keep stats for moral victories."

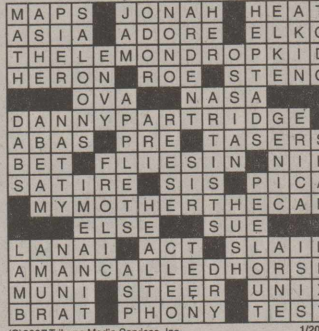

Bears, Colts will compete for NFL title in Miami

Bears force four turnovers in win over New Orleans

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Bears know how to make a Super Bowl memorable. They're making this one historic long before it's played.

Dissed all season long, Rex Grossman and Co. are heading to the big game for the first time since 1985 after rolling over the New Orleans Saints 39-14 Sunday, and Da Coach leading them there makes it all the more special.

Lovie Smith's arrival in Miami will make him the first black head coach to reach the marquee game in its 41 years.

"I'll feel even better to be the first black coach to hold up the world championship trophy," Smith said after the Bears won the NFC championship.

This isn't the wild bunch, led by coach Mike Ditka and quarterbacked by Jim McMahon, that paraded down Bourbon Street, then routed New England for the championship 21 years ago. Its defense isn't overpowering, its quarterback isn't a renegade, its reputation isn't celebrated.

This team, despite its impressive record, was maligned all season and never possessed the overpowering aura of Ditka's gang.

Still, Smith's team did it in true Bears fashion, with big plays on defense and a steady running game in the sleet and snow, ending the Saints' uplifting saga.

The Bears (15-3) will play either the Patriots or the Indianapolis Colts, in Miami in two weeks. A Colts victory would put two black head coaches in the big game for the first time; Indy coach Tony Dungy was Smith's mentor.

"I am really into the great tradition we have with the Chicago Bears," Smith said. "I am just trying to get our football team up to that same standard Mike had his team at, especially that '85 team."

Added All-Pro linebacker Brian Urlacher: "For our franchise, this is

big. They are a big part of this city, and what they did in '85 is huge. We have an opportunity to do that right now. We're excited to have the opportunity to kind of put the ('85) guys in the background for a little while."

All the worries about how genuine the Bears' outstanding season was disappeared thanks to running back Thomas Jones, All-Pro kicker Robbie Gould and a defense that, while not dominant, made enough decisive plays.

"I hate watching TV," defensive end Adewale Ogunleye said, "but when you see everyone picking the Saints, the thing is we won 14 games, now 15, by playing sound defense and we have been doing a good job all season. We know they are coming in as a No. 1 offense and we stepped up to the plate."

For a moment, though, in the third quarter they seemed to be in trouble.

Reggie Bush's electrifying 88-yard touchdown catch and dash to the end zone pulled the Saints within two points, 16-14. But from then on, Urlacher and the Bears' defense took over.

Chicago, which has won nine NFL titles but has been an also-ran for much of the last two decades, later went 85 yards in five plays in the worst of the weather. The oft-criticized Grossman had four completions, including a 33-yarder

to a diving Bernard Berrian that clinched it, sending the bundled-up fans in Soldier Field into foot-stomping hysteria and chants of "Super Bowl, Super Bowl."

"We had a great game today," said Grossman, who was 11-for-26 for 144 yards, but made no mistakes. "This is great and all, but we have one game to go."

Jones had all 69 yards on an eight-play ground drive in the second quarter, scored twice and rushed for 123 yards. Gould nailed three field goals.

The Bears, who led the league with 44 takeaways, forced four turnovers, and when NFC passing leader Drew Brees fumbled less than a minute after Berrian's TD, whatever karma the Saints (11-7) carried this season disappeared.

"We talked a lot about getting back to what we do and that's getting takeaways," Smith said.

Cedric Benson then scored on a 12-yard run, and from there it was a matter of searching for the screens.

Smith and Bears owner Virginia McCaskey, daughter of Bears founder George Halas, accepted the Halas Trophy moments after Grossman

Colts complete largest comeback to win AFC

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A comeback, a drive, a legacy. And yes — finally — Peyton Manning gets his Super Bowl trip, too.

Football's most prolific quarterback put on a show for the ages Sunday, rallying the Indianapolis Colts from 18 points down and driving them 80 yards for the winning score in a wildly entertaining 38-34 victory over the New England Patriots.

In his nine years in the league, Manning has never played in a game like this AFC championship contest. He threw for 349 yards and one touchdown and brought his team back from a 21-3 deficit.

Joseph Addai capped Manning's late drive with the winning score, a 3-yard run with 1 minute left to help the Colts (15-4) complete the rally and send coach Tony Dungy to his first Super Bowl — and a very special one.

Dungy and the Colts will face the Chicago Bears and his good friend Lovie Smith in Miami in two weeks. Together they are the first black coaches to make the Super Bowl in its 41 years.

After Indy's last touchdown, Manning was on the sideline, his head down — he couldn't bear to watch. New England's Tom Brady — he of

the three Super Bowl rings — threw an interception to Marlin Jackson and the RCA Dome crowd went wild. One kneel down later and Manning ripped off his helmet to celebrate.

Not only was it a win for Manning, the All-Pro, All-Everything son of Archie, it was a riveting, back-and-forth showcase of two of the NFL's best teams, best quarterbacks, and yet another example of why football is America's favorite sport.

It was anything but by-the-book, and that started becoming obvious when New England left guard Logan Mankins

opened the scoring by pouncing on a fumbled handoff between Brady and Laurence Maroney that squirmed into the Indy end zone midway through the first quarter.

It got worse from there for Manning, who telegraphed a throw to the sideline that Patriots cornerback Asante Samuel snatched and took 39 yards into the end zone for a 21-3 lead.

From there, the gameplan changed because it had to, and the game morphed from another Manning meltdown into something much more than that.

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Tech track earns NCAA qualifications in first meet of season

Before the weekend's two-day Texas Tech Track Invitational, Tech track coach Wes Kittley said the invitational was going to be a relaxing meet to open the 2007 season. And by "relaxing," Kittley meant breaking two track records and having three athletes reach an NCAA provisional mark in the first meet of the season.

Cross country runner Sally Kipyego kicked off her first indoor track meet with a record time of 4:43:04 in the mile, earn-

ing Tech its first NCAA qualifying time. Kipyego achieved National Champion status last fall when she took the individual title at the NCAA Cross Country Championships.

Kipyego is not the only cross country runner making a smooth transition to indoor track.

Junior Irene Kimaiyo also ran the mile in reaching Tech's first NCAA provisional mark of Saturday.

The women's distance medley finished first in the relay with a time of 11:44.14, also a track record. The relay team consisted of distance runners Kipyego and

Gladys Kipsang, Asia Diaz and Louise Cox.

Kittley said the distance runners had no problem with the weekend's competition.

"I was real pleased in how well the distance people did," Kittley said. "I think they are really pushing each other. And of course, Sally and Irene received automatic qualifying in the provisional for their times in the mile, which is phenomenal."

The men's distance medley was also the first to cross the finish line, breaking the Athletic Training Center record by almost eight seconds with a time of

10:09.42. Distance runners Silas Kemboi, Kevin Chelimo, Zach Glavish and Edwin Sang made up the relay team.

In the 60-meter hurdles, senior All-American Marlon Odom, who competed against four of his teammates in the finals, finished first in the finals race Saturday with a time of 7.97 seconds.

Kittley said it was not the All-Americans who impressed him, but the newcomers who showed up ready to compete.

He said Justin Turner, as well as other freshmen, competed well in their first collegiate competi-

tion. "Freshman Justin Turner went six-nine in the high jump," Kittley said. "We were real pleased with him. Freshman Brandon Washington won the 600-meter last night. Patience Knight went 15.8 meters in the shot-put, a personal best for her."

The Tech track team earned another provisional mark when pole-vaulter Amanda Alley took first place in the event with a height of 12-11 1/2.

Kittley said although his team was impressive, there are still kinks to work out during this week's practice.

He said his team still has a lot of work to do to duplicate the success it had last season.

"We're not in great shape yet," Kittley said. "The good thing about this meet is it's a working meet where we ran both days. I think we're going to see, in about two weeks, that's going to pay off."

The Tech track team will split up on Thursday when some members of the team will travel to Albuquerque, N.M., for the Zia Classic. On Saturday, other members of the team will travel to Seattle for the Husky Invite.

Tech hurdlers looking to jump over competition

Texas Tech track and field assistant coach Steve Silvey is quick to the draw when describing the mentality a hurdler needs to be successful.

"You have to have the aggressiveness of a western gunslinger and toughness of an NFL linebacker," Silvey said.

After a 26-year coaching career that produced 28 national championships, 34 Olympians and 27 qualifying athletes for the World Track and Field Championships, Silvey is ready to create another championship team in 2007.

"I believe this is one of the best collegiate teams in the nation," Silvey said. "We are going to get back at it this year."

Tech coach Wes Kittley could not agree more with Silvey's statement on the year's expectations, especially when discussing the hurdling team.

"They're a tremendous part of our program," Kittley said. "Them being so good has benefited our recruiting program and has helped build this program to what it is today."

The hurdling squad includes four senior All-Americans, a group Silvey likes to call the "Elite" hurdle crew.

There is Daryl Burgess, a senior from Miami, Fla., who holds the school record in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.29 seconds and in the 110-meter hurdles; Burgess was the junior college national champion in 2005.

Marlon Odom will be returning to the track for his senior year after being crowned the

Big 12 champion in 110-meter hurdles in 2005 and in 2006.

Shawon Harris, also a part of the "Elite" crew, holds two Tech records for the 60-meter hurdles and the 110-meter hurdles.

Bryon Scott will also be returning for his senior year. In 2004 and in 2005, Scott was the 400-meter hurdle champion in the Big 12.

Silvey said for an athlete to be among the elite, such as being named an All-American, it requires a combination of aggressiveness and tenacity — mixed with a lot of flexibility.

Three different events comprise the hurdling competition at the collegiate level. Indoor track events include the 60-meter hurdles; outdoor events include the 110-meter hurdles and the 400-meter hurdles.

Silvey said flexibility is what makes a hurdler successful, at-

tributing the obstacle to the height of the hurdle.

"You're trying to jump over an object that is 42 inches high," he said.

There is so much training involved in producing a flexible hurdler, Silvey said.

"They have to be a good sprinter," he said. "A prototype hurdler is in between six-foot one-inches to six-foot three-inches." He said hurdlers must be strong, but not just in the legs.

"There are so many muscle groups involved, and it's not just the lower body," Silvey said. "The strength in your pecs, biceps, triceps is just as important as the strength in your hamstring and quads. To jump a hurdle is a complete body function."

Silvey said most hurdlers also participate in other events as well. Of the 14 hurdlers on the Tech team, all of them are also sprinters and two of them partake in jumping events.

"Diversity is key," Silvey said. "I call them my blue-collar athletes. They are the ones that work the most, but they get rewarded for what they put in with their results."

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Aggies alone in first place for first time in Big 12

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Snow and ice in West Texas hardly come close to being the most unusual sight this week on the Big 12 landscape.

For a real shocker, take a look at the men's basketball standings, starting at the top, and be assured that what you see is not a typographical error.

That entry next to Texas A&M claiming the Aggies are 4-0 and the only unbeaten team in conference action is correct.

The breathtaking transformation in Billy Gillispie's third season as head coach in this one-time hoops wasteland continues to unfold. After dismantling No. 12 Oklahoma State 67-49 on Saturday before a Reed Arena record crowd of 13,187, the Aggies are leading the Big 12 for the first time since the conference was formed.

Combined with Texas Tech's 69-64 victory over No. 5 Kansas, it means the Aggies — for this week at least — are in the lead. Right behind at 3-1 come Kansas, Texas Tech and Texas.

While this may be the same school that just three years ago staggered home 0-16, it's not the same team, and it is most certainly not the same feeling that's percolating throughout the entire program.

Just ask Acie Law, one of two players left from that pitiable winless campaign of 2003-04 that led to Gillispie's grand entrance.

"It's a long way to go, but it feels good," said Law. "We've come a long way as a program, but we still have a lot of work to do."

The 18th home win in a row for the Aggies (16-2 overall, 4-0

marked their best start to a conference season since the 1993-94 team went 7-0 in the Southwest Conference.

The Cowboys (16-3, 2-2) were just a few days from their triple-overtime 105-103 victory over Texas, a game that will probably go down as the best of the year in the Big 12.

But Mario Boggan, who scored a career-high 37 points and 20 rebounds against Texas, was harassed all day by Joseph Jones and Antanas Kavaliauskas and wound up with only 11 points.

Could the No. 8 Aggies in just three years vault from 0-16 to 16-0? It's extremely doubtful, of course. They still must take to the road and travel to Texas, Oklahoma State, Kansas and Texas Tech. And road wins are about as rare in the Big 12 as Bog Knight's warm, friendly smiles.

But if the Aggies ace a big road test this Wednesday at Knight's Texas Tech, at least a few fans may start to dream.

Kansas State, given up for dead just a week or so ago, seems to be the only Big 12 team that knows how to win on the road.

The Wildcats beat Iowa State 69-60 Saturday for the only road win in the league this weekend and their sixth victory away from home this year. That's tops among all Big 12 teams.

Kansas saw its 10-game winning streak evaporate because Knight's Red Raiders did exactly what Jayhawk coach Bill Self said last week that they are so capable of doing. They ran their motion offense nearly flawlessly.

And maybe it's true what they

say that Knight can work wonders when given a few extra days to prepare. This squad that snapped the 10-game win streak of the nation's fifth-ranked team was the same Red Raider outfit that got thumped by Baylor.

"How does that happen? How the hell do I know?" Knight said. "Maybe the moon was right. If I knew, I wouldn't be talking to you people."

No. 21 Texas, the other participant in that unbelievable triple-overtime affair, also had a tough time in its next outing. Not only did the Longhorns lose at Villanova 76-69, but Kevin Durant was made to look like just another face in the freshman crowd, not the superhero he's seemed in dominating the Big 12.

After averaging 34 points the last four games, Durant was just 4-for-15 from the field and missed all six of his shots in the second half and wound up with 12 points.

While high-flying Texas A&M is selling out, they're having to give tickets away at Oklahoma.

Students got into the Lloyd Noble Center for free Saturday, and the announced crowd still numbered only 6,057.

But they did see a show. The Sooners improved to 11-6 and 3-2 with a 91-51 thumping of Baylor, their widest margin since routing Norfolk State on Nov. 10.

"The crowd was wonderful," said Oklahoma's Michael Neal. "It was a lot of fun playing for them."

Said coach Jeff Capel, "That may have been as complete a game as we've played all year, against a good team. I thought our guys were really, really good."

Turco gets record in Stars win

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Dallas goalie Marty Turco had to work hard for his milestone win, which capped a momentous week for the Stars to take into the All-Star break.

Stu Barnes scored in the ninth round of the shootout, beating the Minnesota Wild 2-1 and making Turco the Stars' all-time leader in victories on Saturday night.

"To be here where the franchise started, to accomplish that here, was

probably too perfect if you draw it up," said Turco, who has 161 wins in 295 career games. Ed Belfour won 160 times in 307 games.

Dallas played regular-season game No. 1,000 since moving from Minnesota in 1993, winning the fifth straight time against the replacements — who joined the league in 2000.

Barnes, who beat Niklas Backstrom for the winner, was the fifth player to score out of 18 shots in the extra session. For Barnes, this was only his second try in the shootout this season.

"It's usually exciting to watch," he said, laughing. "But when they tap your shoulder, you've got to be ready to go out there."

Pascal Dupuis lost the puck when Turco poked it away on the last chance for the Wild, who lost their fourth straight at home but picked

up nine points in their last six games before the break.

"Especially with the injuries that we have, it's a good five days for them," said Mikko Koivu, who tied the game at 1 with 6:55 remaining in regulation on a rebound in the slot.

"It's going to be big games right away, so we want to be ready for those and all the way the rest of the season," Koivu said.

Defensemen Keith Carney and Kim Johnson and center Pavol Demitra each returned from injuries for Minnesota, positives overshadowed by the loss of Fernandez. Backstrom — appearing for just the second time in the last 12 games — played capably in relief. He made 26 saves.

Coach Jacques Lemaire said he wasn't worried about the injury, especially with five days off for Fernandez during the break.

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Texas uses defense en route to upset over A&M

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Defense, defense, defense. That's all No. 22 Texas heard about No. 17 Texas A&M.

Tired of hearing how good the Aggies and their smothering defense could be, Tiffany Jackson and the Longhorns figured it was time to play some of their own.

Jackson scored 27 points and grabbed 14 rebounds, and the Longhorns forced 23 turnovers to roll over the Aggies 64-45 Sunday.

"This week in practice everybody

was fired up," said Jackson, who also had three steals. "We knew it was a big game for us and we needed this win."

The Longhorns scored 26 points off the A&M turnovers and held the Aggies to 31 percent shooting. Brittainey Raven added 14 points for Texas (14-5, 3-2).

Takia Starks scored 14 to lead Texas A&M (13-4, 3-2). The Aggies had held opponents to an average of 49.1 points this season, but couldn't stop Jackson from posting her seventh double-double

this season. Jackson was 9-of-12 from the floor.

"We take a lot of pride in how we play defense, but I was more impressed with Texas' defense than anything tonight," A&M coach Gary Blair said. "Our post players were scared and not finishing shots. Today, my team lacked toughness and it was all about Texas."

The Longhorns forced the Aggies into 15 turnovers in the first half, turning them into 15 points, and led 28-18 at halftime. It was the fewest

points scored in a half by the Aggies this season.

A 13-5 run by Texas to open the second pushed the lead to 41-23. The Aggies, who waited to use the full-court defense that worked so well this season, tried to disrupt the Longhorns with pressure, but Texas kept extending its lead.

The Aggies forced Texas into 23 turnovers, but their own miscues kept them from making a run.

Two steals and layups by Raven, and consecutive baskets by Jackson helped

the Longhorns counter any momentum the Aggies could muster. Defensively, the Longhorns kept forcing A&M turnovers and Jackson's tough turnaround jumper in the lane made it 49-31.

Texas dominated scoring in the paint 32-18 and outrebounded the Aggies 41-30. Texas was 14-for-19 in the second half (74 percent)

"I don't think I've seen Tiffany Jackson play a better all-around game," Texas coach Jody Conradt said. "Our team wanted to prove they could hang,

they could play hard, be physical and tough mentally."

Raven scored 12 in the second half. Patrice Read, who scored 10 points in the second half for A&M, fouled out with more than 8 minutes left to remove the Aggies' best scoring threat down the stretch.

Texas plays No. 13 Baylor, Texas Tech and No. 7 Oklahoma in a little more than a week — a key stretch if the Longhorns expect to challenge for the Big 12 title.

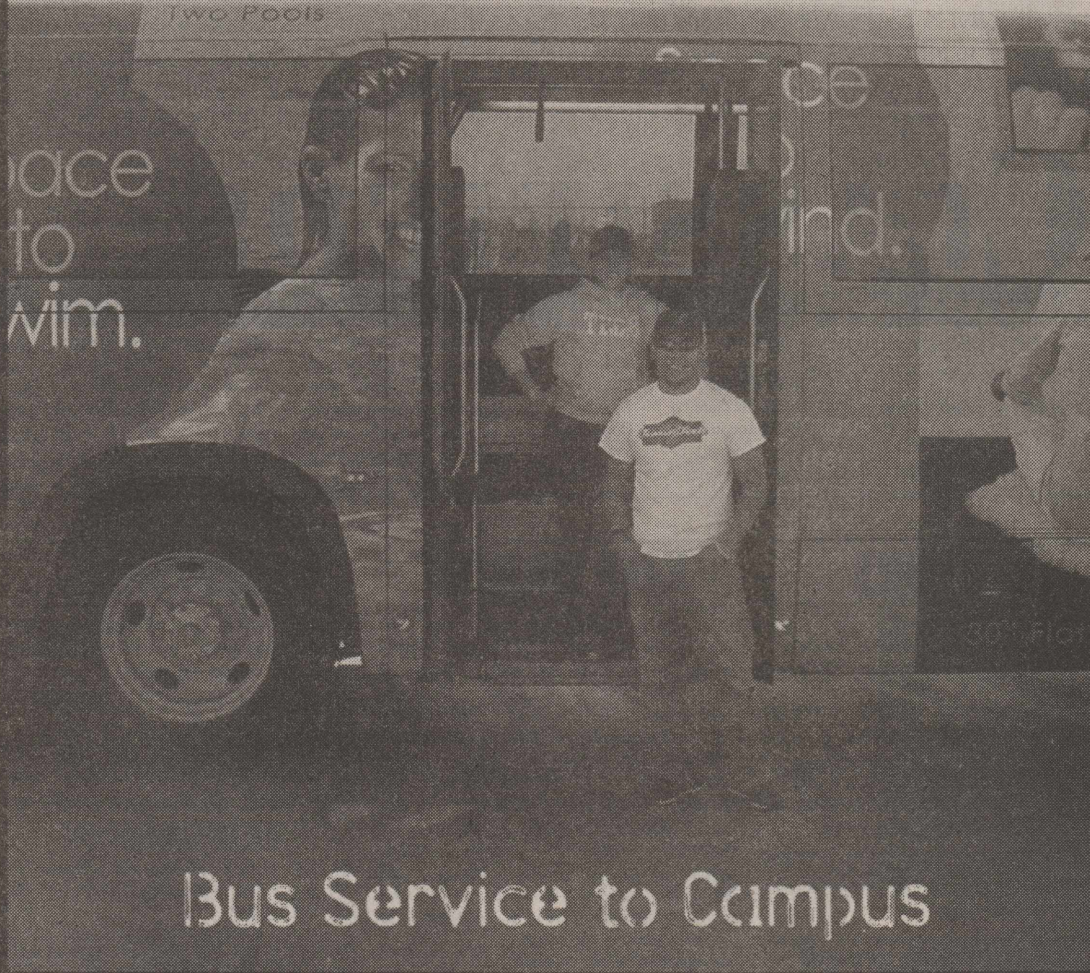
