

### STATE Pilot collapses in flight, later dies

McALLEN (AP) - The pilot of a Continental Airlines flight became ill after takeoff and was later pronounced dead after the plane made an emergency landing Saturday, a company spokeswoman said.

The 210 passengers on the flight, which departed from Houston, were never in danger and the co-pilot landed the plane safely, Continental spokeswoman Macky Osorio said.

The airline is not yet releasing details about the pilot or how he died, only saying that he suffered a "serious medical problem." Continental believes the pilot died of natural causes, Osorio said.

### Chavez to U.S.: 'Go to Hell, Gringos!'

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) - President Hugo Chavez told U.S. officials to "Go to hell!" on his weekly radio and TV show Sunday for what he called unacceptable meddling after Washington raised concerns about a measure to grant Venezuela's fiery leftist leader broad lawmaking powers. The National Assembly, which is controlled by the president's political allies, is expected to give final approval this week to what it calls the "enabling law," which would give Chavez the authority to pass a series of laws by decree during an 18-month period.

### Lubbockites heed weather warnings **By NAOMI KASKELA**

Predictions of severe winter-weather conditions over the weekend did not lead to increased business for JR Lindsey, owner of JR's Towing Storage and Repair, as might have been expected.

Lindsey said he believes this is because residents of the Hub City and the surrounding area are practicing more caution than normal when driving, and some are staying off the road entirely.

"I think people were being more careful," he said. "I think (weather reports) scared a bunch of them off."

The three phone calls Lindsey received Saturday night were the result of vehicles becoming stuck in the mud, he said. Two were stuck together on a street, and another was stuck in an alley.

## Mavs win in first finals rematch

MIAMI (AP) - Jerry Stackhouse regained his scoring touch at the right time for the Dallas Mavericks, helping them finally stave off a comeback attempt by the Miami Heat.

Stackhouse - slowly working his way back after spraining his left ankle last month --- scored 16 of his 23 points in the final quarter as the Mavericks held on to beat Miami 99-93 on Sunday in the first matchup between the teams since last season's NBA finals.

Josh Howard had 25 points and Dirk Nowitzki added 22 points and 11 rebounds for Dallas, which improved its NBA-best record to 34-8 and is 20-1 in its last 21 games. Plus, the Mavs got some tiny measure of revenge over the Heat, who lost the first two games of last year's finals before rallying to win the championship in six games. "We just had to keep grinding," Stackhouse said. "It was a great game which had some great players making great plays." Dwyane Wade - who suffered a left ankle injury in the first quarter, but returned and played 44 minutes - finished with 31 points, six rebounds and six assists for Miami, but missed a potential tying 3-pointer with 5.8 seconds left. Jason Williams had 17 points and Udonis Haslem, who missed his first eight shots, had 15 for the Heat. "We still had an opportunity to win the game," Heat center Alonzo Mourning said. "When you put yourself in a position to win, you don't want to just settle for that. They don't keep stats for moral victories."
