550 juveniles to be realesed from prison

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas' troubled juvenile prison system plans to release more than 550 inmates who have completed their minimum sentences and haven't caused any trouble behind bars, officials announced Monday.

The inmates will be released in the coming week, as soon as agency officials are able to line up the services they will need in the community, including parole supervision and counseling, Texas Youth Commission spokesman Jim Hurley said.

The move is part of a top-to-bottom investigation of agency policies amid burgeoning allegations that inmates were sexually and physically abused and employees who knew about the problems did nothing to stop them.

Britain calls for direct talks about captives

LONDON (AP) - Britain called for direct talks with Iran to resolve a dispute over 15 captive Britons Tuesday after its first contact with the chief Iranian negotiator. The announcement followed the sudden release of an Iranian diplomat in Iraq that raised new hope for resolving the standoff.

In a statement late Tuesday, Prime Minister Tony Blair's office said there had been "further contacts" between the two countries, including with chief international negotiator Ali Larijani.

Authorities shorten Baghdad curfew

BAGHDAD (AP) — Citing improved security in the capital, the Iraqi government said Tuesday it was shortening the Baghdad curfew by two hours and would allow citizens to be on the streets until 10 p.m.

The easing of the ban on movement around the city coincided with a one-day sharp drop in the number of people known to have been killed in sectarian violence nationwide. According to police and morgue reports, 18 people were killed or found dead Tuesday.

Deann Lechtenberger, an assistant professor in the College of Education, said the awareness week and its events are sponsored by the Handicapped Awareness Programs. "The Handicapped Awareness Program has organized this week to help the Texas Tech students, staff and faculty become more aware of the abilities that individuals with disabilities have and to include them more on the Texas Tech campus and the Lubbock community," Lechtenberger said.

Students can learn how to work with their fellow classmates who have disabilities from 3:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. today in Room 151 of the Teaching, Learning and Technology Center located in the north wing of the Tech Library.

At the presentation, Randell Resneder, a doctoral student in special education and founder of HAP, will speak to students, faculty, staff members in attendance.

Students who enjoy sports and are looking for to participate in a wheelchair basketball match from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday in the Robert H. Ewalt Student Recreation Center.

Meredith Selby, a senior advertising major from Denton, said the group is encouraging anyone who is interested to play, including those who are able-bodied and those who require

wheelchairs. She said students also are needed at the event to support and cheer on the players.

"I think it would be an overall good experience, especially for able-bodied students to see how to operate a wheelchair and how to operate it in a sporting event," Selby said.

Playing wheelchair basketball will teach students how difficult it is for handicapped people to get around, Selby said. Members from an old Lubbock wheelchair team will be in attendance, and Selby said she would like to see a mix of able bodies and handicapped participants involved in the game.

Resneder said he founded HAP in 1988 because he wanted to teach his fellow classmates how to work with people who have disabilities and educate his peers about the handicaps everyone has. Resneder said he chose to use the word

Wal-Mart stores evacuated after bomb threat **By NAOMI KASKELA**

At 6:28 p.m. Tuesday, employees at the Wal-Mart on South Loop'289 and Quaker Avenue called in about a bomb threat, said Sgt. Ray Mendoza of the Lubbock Police Department.

Wal-Mart employees were stationed at all of the entrances to the parking lot, preventing individuals from entering.

One store employee confirmed the bomb threat and said there also had been one at the Wal-Mart located on Fourth Street and Avenue Q.

The employee said no one from the store was able to give any information concerning the incident.

Mendoza said the bomb threat at the Fourth Street and Avenue Q location was called in either earlier in the week or last week, and that the only bomb threat on Tuesday was at the store located on the Loop.

A male voice phoned in the bomb threat directly to the Wal-Mart, Mendoza said.

Wal-Mart employees requested a bomb-sniffing dog to canvass the whole building, he said. Since only one was brought to the store and used, it took some time before everything was checked.

Employees were allowed back into the store a little after 8:00 p.m.

"It was pretty basic, we got a call that they were evacuating the store," Mendoza said. "It was their decision (to evacuate and search the store)."

Letting customers back in was also left up to individuals at the store, he said.

"That's totally up to them, Wal-Mart would be the one to determine that," he said.



CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 get home, get a bill, and get it to my desk," Bush said. "And if it has artificial timetables for withdrawal, or cuts off funding for our troops, or tells our generals how to run a war, I'll veto it."

The Senate is in recess this week; the House is on break for two weeks.

The House and Senate are preparing to send Bush a bill by the end of the month that would approve of some \$96 billion in new money for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, but also set an end date to combat in Iraq.

The House wants to order troops out by September 2008, whereas the Senate wants troops to begin leaving right away and set a nonbinding goal of ending combat operations on March 31, 2008.

"If the president vetoes this bill, he will have delayed funding for troops and kept in place his strategy for failure," Reid said in a statement after Bush spoke.

Reid spokesman Jim Manley said the bill to cut off funds for the war would likely be introduced as standalone legislation and would not be tied to the supplemental spending bill.

Reid's proposal would be the most extreme and divisive. measure to be considered by Democrats to try to force Bush's hand on the war.

Most Republicans and many conservative Democratic senators, including Ben Nelson of Nebraska, have been reluctant to embrace a timetable in Iraq. Nelson agreed last week to swing behind the Senate spending bill, which calls for troops to leave by March 31, 2008, only because the date was nonbinding and not a firm deadline.

Nelson also agreed to vote for the measure because Reid added language Nelson wanted outlining steps the Iraqi government should take to improve stability in Iraq.



The City of Lubbock water utility rate change, which began Sunday, could result in higher water bills for Texas Tech.

An ordinance passed by the Lubbock City Council in February bases the rate customers pay on the average amount of water they use during the months of water sprinklers generally are not used.

Douglass Chowning, managing director of the Tech Physical Plant, said he anticipates the rate the City of Lubbock charges Tech will increase next year, but he does not know by how much. He said the university pays a special industrial rate for water consumption.

Tennessee captures seventh national title with 59-46 win

CLEVELAND (AP) — Everyone is gazing up at good ol' Rocky Top again.

After a nine-year title drought, Tennessee and coach Pat Summitt are NCAA champions.

The Lady Vols captured an elusive seventh national title Tuesday night, beating Rutgers to the ball for second and third shots in a 59-46 win to reclaim their customary place above all other programs.

Rutgers coach C. Vivian Stringer had hoped to win her first title, 25 years after her first national title appearance. Instead, Summitt won her seventh, 20 years after her first.

"I can't even describe it," said Tennessee's All-American Candace Parker. "This is what everyone came to Tennessee to do, and we did it."

Parker scored 17 points to lead the Volunteers (34-3), but the game's most outstanding player got plenty of help from Shannon Bobbitt and a supporting cast of less-heralded stood around and watched her.


