## Relatives Of War Dead Victimized

Warning that individuals who claim to have inside information or influence in the government program to return the remains of World War II dead are "chillers" trading upon the emotions of grieving families, Colonel E. W. Macatee, Commanding Officer, San Antonio General Depot, today outlined the plans as they now exist for the repatriation of our war dead.

Colonel Macatee pointed out that prior to each temporary cemetery overseas being evacuated, the next of kin—wives, children, parents, brothers and sisters—will receive an official letter of inquiry and application for disposition of remains from Washington. As there are 209 temporary cemeteries, letters of inquiry may be received as late as the fall of 1948. Scit-styled big shots who promise reward for a serviceman's remains ahead of schedule are seeking money for services they can never perform.

Complaints have already been received of "chillers" operating in the Texas Area. Colonel Macatee urged relatives of the deceased to refuse to have any dealings with these racketeers but rather to address all requests for information on the repatriation program to the American Graves Registration Service, San Antonio General Depot San Antonio 3, Texas or the Port of Embarkment, Depot, Fort Worth, Texas. He further urged that report be made to the above when individual approaches relatives with promises of "cutting red tape" or arranging for the early return of loved ones upon the payment of fees for such service.

## Insurance Gain In '47 Sets Mark

While the largest gain in the history of legal reserve life insurance were being made nationally last year, Southwestern Life Insurance Company recorded a growth of \$67,345,554 in insurance in force—more than twice the business gain attained during 1945. ## Further Water Tests In March

Measurements of water levels are to be made during March 1947 in several hundred observation wells throughout the irrigated region of the High Plains. Such measurements have been made in the same wells about this time of the winter each year since 1937. They are made by employees of the United States Geological Survey and the State Board of Water Engineers, and the depth to water from fixed points near the surface are recorded to the nearest hundredth of a foot.

All of the records of water-level measurements are published annually in the U. S. Geological Survey Water Supply Papers and a part of the have been included in each of several mimeographed reports on ground water in the High Plains, which have been released to the public at regular intervals during the last eight years. The most recent mimeographed report, Progress Report No. 6, released on January 31, 1947 includes measurements in 163 wells that were made only two weeks before.

Most of the pumping plants are idle during the 5 months from October through February. Therefore, a comparison of the late winter measurements from year to year gives the most accurate information regarding the rise of the water table due to rainfall, the amount of water pumped, and additions to or losses from the underground reservoir.

The men doing this work hope to contact the owner or operator of each well used for observation purposes so that "complete information" be obtained and retained, and in return, the owner may be informed regarding the past record of water levels in the well.

This work is a part of the state-wide investigation of the groundwater resources of Texas, and is of primary importance in connection with the detailed studies of the ground-water supply in the High Plains region.

A copy of Progress Report No. 6 will be mailed to any resident of the Plains who will send a request by letter or postal card to the Texas State Board of Water Engineers, Austin, Texas.

**Cleanliness 'Must' in Making Baby's Formula**

IMMACULATE cleanliness is necessary when preparing baby's formula, for such care is important in keeping baby healthy, writes Georgia Leffingwell in an article in the nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer.

"For efficiency and cleanliness, the utensils used in preparing baby's formula should be kept to a minimum and not be used for any other purpose."



Utensils needed are: 8 to 10 eight-ounce bottles with rounded edges; bottle covers that can be sterilized; a dozen nipples, a funnel and a strainer; a bottle brush; teaspoon or forceps for picking up nipples; a sterilizer or kettle large enough to boil bottles, nipples and utensils; a 32-ounce measuring container for measuring formula; 2 wide-mouthed glass jars, one that can be sterilized for storing boiled bottles and covers and one for used bottles.

Wash hands thoroughly before beginning formula preparation, "the whole 24 hours supply should be made up at one time, poured directly into the sterile bottles and tightly capped." All bottles, nipples and utensils should be washed inside and out with a clean bottle brush, using hot, soapy water. Place equipment in a sterilizer or large kettle and allow to boil at least 5 minutes. Then let them drain and cool. Fill the bottles, being careful not to touch the top edge. Cover at once with sterilized rubber caps or bottle covers. Allow to cool a few minutes before placing in the refrigerator. When putting on nipple before a feeding, take care not to touch end that goes into baby's mouth.

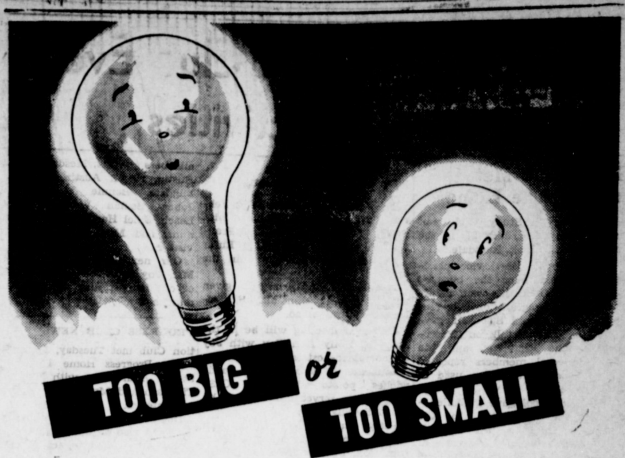

**SOIL TESTING SERVICE SET UP AT A AND M**  
**COLLEGE STATION.**— A soil testing service, set up at Texas A. and M. College last July is proving useful to Texas farmers in determining what fertilizer and soil treatment their lands need.

and other specialists to determine just what treatment need be given to the soil from which the sample was taken.  
 When the soil recommendations are completed, they are sent, along with a copy of the analysis, to the farmer. Copies of these recommendations are also sent to the agricultural agent of the county, who checks the farmer's activities to see what results are being obtained

from following recommendations.  
 M. K. Thornton, Extension Agricultural Chemist, states that by following this procedure, the Extension Service hopes to build up a pattern of soil treatment for the various parts of the state that will be of lasting benefit. Already, promising results have been shown by farmers who have fertilized their lands according to the recommendations coming from the soil tests, Thornton says.

**HIGHLIGHTS OF CLUB WORK**  
 College Station—Highlights of '46 home demonstration work in Extension Service District 3 in Northwest Texas were recently released by Ruth Thompson, former Extension District Agent.  
 District 3 Extension Service is composed of a block of 20 Northwest Texas counties bordered on the west by Motley, Dickens and Kent Counties, and on the east by Montague and Wise Counties.  
 In this area Miss Thompson reports that at home demonstration club women were particularly outstanding in home improvements. As a direct result of club work, 700 kitchens in the homes of these women were remodeled. In addition to kitchen improvements, 140 other rooms in District 3 rural homes were put in better working order due to home demonstration training.

In foods work, the women of the area prepared and stored in freezer locker 278,800 pounds of meats, fruits and vegetables; they also grew 6,444 home gardens and planted 1300 fruit trees and 3500 berry vines.

## SIDELIGHTS From Washington

By George Mahon

West Texas wheat and grain sorghum producers have long known of the critical box car shortage, but not until very recently has the whole nation felt the full impact of the shortage. Officials in Washington tell us that we are being threatened with a national calamity because of the shortage of box cars.

It is claimed by Monroe Johnson, a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission who appeared before our committee on Appropriations the other day that many manufacturing concerns will have to slow down production or close entirely because goods are piling up and transportation is not available. He predicts that this sort of thing might easily precipitate widespread unemployment and economic chaos.

Among shipments most seriously affected by the box car shortage are those of grain and newsprint, but nearly all items of commerce are now affected to some degree. A cut of approximately 40 per cent. in the production of flour milling concerns has been necessary, and some daily papers foresee the possibility of having to suspend publication.

The railroads did a great job in the war, but the fact is that since V-J Day box car loadings have increased each week over the corresponding week of the previous year, and loadings are at an all time high. In the face of this great transportation demand, the number of box cars is decreasing rather than increasing. 40,000 new cars were built last year, but 50,000 became unfit for further service. One-third of all box cars in service are over 26 years of age, despite the fact that the average life of a box car is supposed to be only 23 years. A single box car costs about \$35,000. There are 22 factories in the United States which are engaged in the production of these cars.

There is now a definite ray of hope that decisive action will be taken to meet the situation. Senator Reed, Chairman of a Senate Committee investigating the box car shortage, called a conference of railroad presidents, steel manufacturers and Government officials which met last week in an effort to

work out a plan for increasing the production of box cars. At this meeting agreements were made between steel companies and manufacturers, and we are now promised box car production at the rate of 7,000 per month for the present, which should increase to 10,000 per month in the near future. Even so, it will take about a year for production to catch up with demand.

Our Committee on Appropriations has approved a request for \$130,000 for the Office of Defense Transportation, which will have a part in expediting the production program.

The proposed box car program is important to West Texas. A portion of last season's grain sorghum crop is still lying on the ground deteriorating because of the unavailability of box cars. The accelerated program for box cars is going to help, but unfortunately, it appears hat box car difficulties will

continue to plague us during the 1947 crop year.

I voted for a House Resolution which was approved last week and which provides for a continuation of the Committee which has been investigating the newsprint shortage. Newspapers have been confronted with both transportation and production shortages. This Committee claims credit for having essential equipment which resulted in speeding up the production of newsprint in the paper mill at Lufkin, Texas.
