Prosecutor: Ex-TSU employee misused funds

HOUSTON (AP) - Texas Southern University's former chief financial officer was a "partner in crime" with the school's ex-president in a scheme that used hundreds of thousands of dollars of public funds to lavishly furnish and landscape the ousted leader's home, prosecutors said Tuesday.

Quintin Wiggins is accused of misspending more than \$200,000 to purchase furniture, landscaping and a high-tech home security system for former president Priscilla Slade. His trial began Tuesday and is expected to last up to a month.

Bush invites Dems for meeting on war

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush offered to talk with Democrats about the standoff over war funding, but he made it clear Tuesday he will not embrace any timetable for a U.S. troop withdrawal. Democrats said there was no point in talking if Bush refused to negotiate.

"We can discuss the way forward



Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi rejected the terms set by the White House.

"Congressional Democrats are willing to meet with the president at any time, but we believe that any discussion of an issue as critical as Iraq must be accomplished by conducting serious negotiations. said in a joint statement.

"With his threat to veto such a plan for change in Iraq, President Bush is ignoring the clear message of the American people: We must protect our troops, hold the Iraqi government accountable, rebuild our military, provide for our veterans and bring our troops home. The president is demanding that

U.S. forces battle gunmen in Baghdad

BAGHDAD (AP) - A raging, daylong battle erupted in central Baghdad on Tuesday and four Iraqi soldiers were killed, 16 U.S. soldiers were wounded and a U.S. helicopter was hit by ground fire at the close of the second month of the massive security crackdown on the capital. Sixty miles to the north, in the mostly Sunni city of Muqdadiyah, a woman with a suicide vest strapped beneath her black Muslim robe blew herself up in the midst of 200 Iraqi police recruits.



Former insurance provider responds to Lubbock lawsuit

In the lawsuit filed by the City of Lubbock against American Administrative Group, the city's former health insurance company, recent developments include a response filed by AAG, and a presentation by the auditor to the city's audit committee on Monday.

Robert Frcek, the founder and chief executive officer of Benefit Plan Audit Services, presented information concerning the audit of

AAG in a closed meeting, said Linda DeLeon, councilwoman for District 1.

Because of ongoing litigation, she said she could not comment on what Frcek said during the meeting.

However, she said information has still been withheld from Frcek by AAG.

"He finished all that he could with the information he has," DeLeon said.

Some of the things stated during the meeting were alarming, she said.

"I think it was in the best interest to the

citizens of this community to have this audit from the beginning of the audit by skewing done," she said. "I think we need to move forward and resolve this issue."

On March 27, AAG filed a response to the lawsuit and audit.

According to court documents, AAG claimed "Lubbock is demanding ... documents to which it has no right, information to which it has not right, and money which it did not pay, and is not owed." AAG also claimed in the documents that Benefit Plan Audit Services targeted AAG

samples.

AAG claimed the business agreed to provide access to "plan-related" information only, but not to any information beyond that.

According to the documents, Lubbock is requesting the Lubbock County Court order AAG to preserve information.

Female body found in East Lubbock

A body was found by a Lubbock resident Tuesday night a formal statement. sometime around 8 p.m. near east Municipal Drive and north Olive Street.

Lubbock police responded to the call at around 8:10 p.m., Assistant Police Chief Thomas Esparza said

"Right now we're treating this as a homicide case," he said.

Esparza said the only information being released about the body was that it was female. The age and race of the body are not being released until further investigation of the crime scene can be conducted.

The resident who made the call, Esparza said, is a man who is staying with relatives in a nearby mobile home park. The man was taken by officers to the police station to give

Esparza said the body was found off of the roadway in the area of a nearby cell tower. Though no one had, as of press time, conducted an up-close investigation of the body, Esparza said there were visible injuries to the female. Police said they would remain on the scene for the remainder of the night to conduct an in-depth investigation.

"Hopefully when the sun comes up, we'll know something," Esparza said, "and if we have a murder then hopefully we'll have someone in jail." ▶ michelle.casadv@ttu.edu

San Angelo and Lubbock. This is only detrimental to Texas State."

Darby said the regents representing Texas State had some issues with the separation, but he believes their claims are invalid.

"They claim the existing tuition would need to be refinanced," he said. "That is just not right. The income stream is paid by the State of Texas already — the state is going to pay the bonds whether Angelo State is with Texas Tech or Texas State."

He said the regents claimed the move would create higher administrative costs per student in the Texas State system.

In a statement to The Daily Toreador, Texas State Chancellor Charles Matthews said he anticipates working with Angelo State in the future.

"Although the bill has been touted as simplistic and routine, in reality it is quite complex and has serious statewide policy implications for higher education in Texas," Matthews said. "By hearing from both sides on the issue, the legislature can now make an informed decision about what is in the best interests of the ASU students and the taxpayers of the State of Texas."

Darby said he is confident the bill soon will be put before the entire House for a vote.

Attempts to contact several regents of the Texas State system went unreturned, and Rep. Geanie Morrison, R-Victoria and chairperson of the Higher Education Committee, was not available for comment.

Jim Manley, a spokesman for Reid, said Bush must drop his conditions on the meeting before Reid would attend. Pelosi agreed.

"What the president invited us to do was come to his office so that we could accept without any discussion the bill that he wants," Pelosi said at a news conference in San Francisco. "That's not worthy of the concerns of the American people, and I join with Senator Reid in rejecting an invitation of that kind.'

Bush said the Defense Department will soon send Congress a request to transfer \$1.6 billion from other military accounts to cover funding for troops - a move needed, he said, because lawmakers have delayed his emergency spending request. He warned that continued delays would undermine troop training, slow the repair of equipment and force soldiers to serve longer tours of duty. Bush got an assist for his argument on Tuesday from Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, who said he saw no need to set a timetable for the withdrawal of U.S. troops. His comments in Japan came a day after tens of thousands of Iraqis took to the streets of two Shiite holy cities, demanding that U.S. forces leave the country. Meanwhile, House Armed Services Committee Chairman Ike Skelton wrote to Defense Secretary Robert Gates questioning whether additional National Guard units named Monday for possible deployment to Iraq will be properly trained and equipped before they leave.





She said she longed to smell the fresh air of her home country again. "The air is so different, here," she

said. "You can't breath in deeply."

During her presentation, Sadikova spoke at lengths about the wedding process in her country compared to what people in the United States are used to.

She said weddings in Uzbekistan are long affairs in which the bride and groom will invite people they went to school with 15 years ago but haven't spoke to in years.

"Food is important at the wedding," she said. "We eat and drink a lot."

She said food tables in Uzbekistan have little-to-no white space showing. Dishes of all kind pack the table, and almost nothing goes to waste.

Sadikova has spoken with people who are timid about visiting her country when they see it borders Afghanistan, but Sadikova said there is nothing to fear.

"My family lives in Uzbekistan, but I'm not afraid for them," she said. "Only a small part of the country borders Afghanistan."

Collin Alexander, a senior landscape architecture major from Fort Worth, said he attended the presentation because he wanted to learn. something about the country.

"I saw it in Tech Announce," he said. "I wanted to just learn a little more. I like to inform myself."

Kyle West, a senior Russian language and area studies major from Abilene, said he was at the event to earn extra credit for a class.

"I think it will be interesting," he said. "I know a very little about Central Asian countries." ▶ jeremy.n.reynolds@ttu.edu


Kelsey Matchen, a junior philosophy major from Sweetwater, said the main objective of the debate is to get the students on campus talking about the issue of abortion.





DNA shows Birkhead is father of Smith's daughter

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP) -DNA tests prove it: Larry Birkhead is the father of Anna Nicole Smith's million-dollar baby.

"I told you so!" the late Playboy Playmate's former boyfriend said Tuesday upon emerging from a closed court hearing. He added: "My baby's going to be coming home pretty soon."

Birkhead, a 34-year-old California photographer, then hugged his rival, Howard K. Stern, who has been caring for baby Dannielynn since Smith's sudden death in February.

The hearing was a pivotal mo-

ment in the battle over who gets custody of the girl, who could inherit a fortune from the estate of Smith's late husband, J. Howard Marshall II. Although Birkhead is the father, Stern's name is on the birth certificate. Another custody hearing was scheduled for Friday.

Stern, who was Smith's lawyer and later became her companion, said he wouldn't fight for custody, but a lawyer for Smith's mother, Virgie Arthur, indicated she might. The judge scheduled another hearing for Friday in the pink colonial courthouse to discuss who will raise the girl, who could inherit hundreds

of millions of dollars.

Stern said he loved the baby despite the DNA results and would support Birkhead.

"I'm obviously very disappointed, but my feelings for Dannielynn have not changed," he said, adding of Birkhead: "I'm going to do whatever I can to make sure he gets sole custody."

Birkhead had been fighting for custody of Dannielynn even before Smith's death.

"Nothing's been determined except parentage and I'm the father," Birkhead said. "It's been a long road and I'm just happy to have this behind me."

A crowd of about 250 people, many of them tourists, cheered from behind police barricades when Birkhead, clutching a piece of paper, announced the DNA test results. The court's DNA expert, Dr. Michael Baird, confirmed it.

"Essentially, he's the biological father," Baird said.

This tropical capital has been transfixed by the Anna Nicole saga since she moved here last year. Smith gave birth to Dannielynn in September, only to see her 20-yearold son Daniel die days later at her bedside from a lethal combination of

drugs. Smith died in February at age 39 in Florida.

Many in the crowd took pictures of the impromptu news conference with cameras and cell phones. One man in the crowd wore a T-shirt emblazoned with the handwritten message: "I'm the baby's daddy."

Arthur, who had been estranged from Smith for years, said she wanted to be present in her granddaughter's life, but seemed appeased by the DNA results.

"I'm happy that Dannielynn will know who her real father is," she said.





Indiana spokesman says Knight friendship put him in tough spot

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Indiana University's chief media spokesman during the firing of Bob Knight writes in a new book that his friendship with the basketball coach left him in a tough spot at the time.

Christopher Simpson said in "Weathering the Storm: Protecting Your Brand in the Worst of Times" that when he had first come to IU in 1994 as an aide to then president Myles Brand, he was frustrated that Knight was synonymous with the university and that the coach's reputation overshadowed highly ranked academic programs.

But Simpson eventually found himself enjoying Knight's company and considered the coach a friend, even after Brand in 2000 had imposed on the coach a."zero tolerance" policy for inappropriate behavior.

"My fatal misstep was to become buddies and swap stories and inside trustees and other administrators," wrote Simpson, who was IU's vice ernment relations.



NBA bound: Durant entering 2007 draft

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Kevin Durant is done with college.

Durant, an 18-year-old Texas freshman and The Associated Press Player of the Year, said Tuesday he's leaving the Longhorns to enter the NBA draft.

"I enjoyed my year here at Texas," Durant said in a statement released before his news conference. "All the fans and everyone here at Texas made me feel right at home, considering I was so far from home. I will always be a Longhorn and never forget what the people of Texas have done for me."

After an All-American season in which he swept the major player of the year awards, few expected Durant to play another season in college.

Now the question is whether he'll be the first pick of the June 28 draft. Durant and Ohio State's freshman center Greg Oden who has not yet said if he'll leave college — are considered the likely first two picks.

"He's made history," Texas coach Rick Barnes said Monday night at the team banquet. "No one's done what he did this year. He swept every major award as a freshman. It's a year we may not ever see again by anybody. It's remarkable."

Players have until April 29 to declare for the June 28 draft in New York.

Durant, the Big 12 player and freshman of the year, shot 47 percent from the field, 40 percent from 3-point range and 82 percent 11 times.
