#### Border patrol agents involved in shooting

EL PASO (AP) — An unidentified man was shot Tuesday after a confrontation with two U.S. Border Patrol agents, authorities said.

The agents were conducting surveillance when they followed two vehicles into an auto parts store parking lot and saw two men exchange a roll of money, said Doug Mosier, a spokesman for the Border Patrol in El Paso. One man surrendered when the agents approached, but the other drove toward them, Mosier said.

One of the agents shot at the driver of the approaching vehicle, which fled the scene. The driver was found later at a hospital, where he was being treated for a "non lifethreatening injury to the arm and shoulder area," Mosier said.

The names of the suspects, who are in custody, and the agents weren't released.

### Vigil shows support for Va. Tech victims

More than 75 students gathered Tuesday night outside the Student Union Building to give their support and prayers to the victims and families of the Virginia Tech shootings.

The mood of the gathering was embodied by a banner with the insignia of Texas Tech and Virginia Tech where students could leave messages of encouragement for those involved with the tragedy. The banner featured the message "Prayer from one Tech to another Tech."

Faith Webster, a junior psychology major from Houston, said she organized the event to bring together Texas Tech students and show the college community is unified and supportive of the students at

"There's a need for prayer for their family and friends and students," Webster said. "My heart goes out to them."

As students gathered to pray for those involved with the tragedy, a list of the known victims was read. Students also were given a list of specific

### Officials look to improve warning system

Texas Tech personnel have developed a plan to be implemented if the Red Raider community were in danger of an attack such as the shootings at Virginia Tech where 32 people were killed.

"We have a detailed response plan," said Ronald Seacrist, chief of police for the Texas Tech Police Department. "The emergency response plan we have is good. It's been in place several years, and I don't see a need to change that."

Texas Tech officials are aware of the emergency response plan, Seacrist said, but the plan is not published anywhere for security reasons.

As a result of the Virginia Tech shooting, Texas Tech police are reviewing the method of conveying information across the campus during emergency situations, Seacrist said.

Joe Gantt, an instructor in the Department of Communications Studies, said one way to prevent incidents from escalating is by effectively communicating urgent information to members of the community as quickly

"(Monday) was a very hectic morning trying to track down the people we knew from PRSSA chapter at Virginia Tech," he said. "My friend made it out OK. She heard the gunfire. I have talked to her two times since then, and she doesn't really like talking about it."

Copeland said after he met with Natalie Billingsly, the president of the Texas Tech chapter of PRSSA, the pair decided to go ahead with the fundraiser.

"Anyway that we can show support or solidarity, I think is necessary," Copeland said.

A new piece of public art was introduced at the Student Union Building's courtyard Monday morning.

The large, musical stainless steel ball, called "Comma," was the creative vision of artist Po Shu Wang, and has been in the works since 2005.

"We have been wanting to develop the courtyard as a sculpture court," said Cecilia Carter Browne, the public art manager for the Texas Tech system. "We had some funds, so we advertised nationally. We narrowed it down to three finalists who came to present their design proposals."

Wang said his inspiration for the sculpture came from standing at the piece's current site, at the south end of the courtyard.

"I wanted something that related to this place," Wang said. "I saw the sun and the music department, and this was what I came up with."


The sun's convection cells put out an extremely low-frequency tone, Wang said. The tone is so low humans cannot hear it, but machines can pick it up. To achieve his desired sculpture, which blends the spherical shape of the sun and its tone, Wang raised the tone up many octaves so humans can hear it.

"We tuned one bell to that tone," Wang said. "The other is a tone that shows natural harmonics."

We need to try to find multiple channels of communication," Gantt said. "There is not going to be one channel of communication that's ever going to be sufficient with a campus of 28,000 people."

Gantt said he believes Texas Tech should find ways to saturate every medium of communication. He advocated using Texas Tech's Mobile Campus message services as a way to disseminate information.

Mobile Campus, which uses text messages to inform students about classes, campus organizations and special offers from businesses and restaurants, is currently used on a voluntary basis but could be used in the future as a main source of information delivery for all university students.

The Texas Tech Police Department has 49 commissioned officers at the Lubbock campus, Seacrist said, which is approximately one police officer for every 571 students.

"We don't look at it as a ratio," Seacrist said. "It's an average based on calls for service. We probably could close the campus if we had to, and we'd get assistance from local police."

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## International students feel effects of Va. Tech shootings

Nagy said an Asian student and the student's wife were yelled at while crossing Fourth Street on foot, possibly because the shooter at Virginia Tech, Cho Seung Hui, was from South Korea.

Nagy said after the 1966 Texas Tower Sniper incident, no one targeted Caucasian males because Charles Whitman, the individual responsible for the killings on the University of Texas-Austin campus, was a Caucasian male.

The Visas branch of the U.S. State Department declined to comment on the Virginia Tech shootings, but according to www.unitedstatesbecame more difficult for an international student to obtain a Visa to study in the United States.

"The U.S. government made some changes in Visa procedures after the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001. The changes in various procedures make sure that both U.S. citizens and visitors within our borders are safe," according to www. unitedstatesvisas.gov.

Additional measures added to the process included application forms and security clearances, according to the Web site.

While additional measures like this may deter some international students from coming to the United States to study, Nagy said he believes the reasons for international students

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### Busting marijuana myths

ver since the early years of our great nation, hemp has been an Jimportant cash crop for American farmers and business. The New England shipping industry at one time completely depended on hemp for the ropes and canvas sails integral to the sailing ships of yore. In fact, Latin word "cannabis." Today, hemp's potential is even greater because of technologies that can make hemp into products ranging anywhere from paper to lotion to clothing.

Unfortunately, we have turned our backs on our proud history. Feb. 2, two North Dakota farmers applied for a license with the Drug Enforcement Agency to grow hemp for commercial use. Yet, the DEA delayed its final decision past when the crop would need to be planted for the spring growing season and thus prevented American farmers from doing business in this lucrative industry.

Under current law, hemp is considered equal to marijuana and thus, the DEA has control over its use. Some believe the DuPont corporadolph Hearst — to economically benefit themselves — propagandized to outlaw hemp by including it in the drug paranoia frenzy of the time. The tion, along with early 20th century study examined the link between newspaper magnate William Ran- marijuana smoking and lung cancer. According to the findings, people who had smoked the equivalent of 22,000 marijuana cigarettes over their lifetime had no increased risk of lung cancer over non-users. 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
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
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## Tech to update e-mail security to handle increased spam

Because of an increase in the number of spam e-mails received on Texas Tech students' Techmail accounts, the university will implement a new procedure today to try to reduce unwanted e-mails.

Spam messages account for 70 percent of the 1 million e-mails processed by Tech's mail server every day, said Sam Segran, Tech's chief information officer. The new system will process e-mails receiving a high spam-likelihood score and will return the mail to the sender and not direct it to the

"We're using a lot of infrastructure to handle junk mail and conelse," Segran said.

Techmail is screened by a computer spam filter that assigns each message a spam-confidence-level score between zero and nine, with nine being the highest degree of spam, said Segran.

'We've been watching that traffic for a while, and we're confident that those we will not accept will tend to be closer to what is (considered) spam with a very high confidence level," Segran said.

E-mails receiving a score between zero and two will continue being delivered to individuals' Techmail in-boxes, Segran said. Those receiving a score between three and six will be sent to each account's junk mail folder, and

sequently it slows down everything those receiving a score higher said than six will be delivered back to the sender. The sender will receive notification the message was not

> Matthew De La Torre, a senior human development and family studies major from Hobbs, N.M., said he has noticed an increase of about five spam e-mails delivered to his Techmail account every day during the past few months. He said having to delete the e-mails has been only a minor burden.

Segran said recent increases in spam have been seen globally and are not unique to Tech. In 2006, the number of computer viruses, worms and harmful attachments detected and stopped by Techmail was more than 2.9 million, Segran

Another issue that will be addressed is the blacklisting of the Techmail domain by external mail servers, he said. Forty percent of Techmail accounts are redirected to other mail systems, like Yahoo or America Online, which frequently see Tech e-mail as spam and block it. The office also is developing a plan to disable redirected e-mail accounts by January 2008.

"To those people, like AOL or AT&T, it looks like all this spam mail is coming from Texas Tech, and what they will do is block the TTU domain so nothing will send to or receive from TTU, which causes a lot of problems," he said.

Bryan Morris, a junior Electronic Media and Communications

major from Lubbock, said he set up a Yahoo e-mail account specifically for his Techmail to be forwarded to, and has not used it for anything else, but he said he started receiving spam immediately.

"I'd like to see Tech do a better job of keeping our user names and e-mail addresses private," Morris

Morris said he believes Tech might be selling students' e-mail addresses to other companies, and the university is not doing a good job of keeping the addresses

"They may not be giving them away intentionally," Morris said, "but somehow companies are obtaining them."

Segran said the university does

not sell e-mail addresses, but because it is a public institution, the university is sometimes asked to release e-mail addresses as part of the Texas Public Information Act. He said businesses like The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal have obtained e-mail addresses from the university.

"Sometimes e-mail addresses get provided through that mechanism. but the university does not sell anything like that," Segran said.

Students are offered the option of requesting their e-mail addresses remain private, Segran said. Students can access their information release restrictions through the TechSIS Web site, http://techsis. tosm.ttu.edu/student/.

### Chavez shifts ethanol stance to ease dispute with Brazil

(AP) — Venezuela President Hugo Chavez appeared to soften his opposition to a U.S.-Brazil ethanol deal Tuesday after running up against a staunchly defiant Brazil.

Chavez insisted that he doesn't object to ethanol, which the U.S. and Brazil have agreed to jointly promote, but that he does oppose U.S. plans to step up production of ethanol made from corn. He called it "taking corn away from people and the food chain to feed automobiles — a terrible thing."

He said he has no objection to Brazilian ethanol produced with ally Fidel Castro. sugar cane.

"We aren't against biofuels," Chavez said. "In fact we want to import ethanol from Brazil."

PORLAMAR, Venezuela He said Venezuela needs some 200,000 barrels of ethanol a day to be used as a fuel additive.

He also urged the U.S. to lower tariffs on Brazilian ethanol made from sugar cane, a point that has been pressed with Wash-Inacio Lula da Silva.

Chavez used to speak warmly about ethanol's future, but he came out harshly against a U.S.-Brazil pact last month to promote its production in Latin America. He warned that rampant ethanol production would monopolize arable lands and starve the poor — concerns shared by his Cuban

Brazil dismissed those criticisms, saying that starvation is caused by a lack of income — not a lack of food.

"The truth is that biofuel is a way out for the poor countries of the world," Silva told reporters after the summit. "Obviously there is no possibility of competition between food production and biofuel production. ... No ington by Brazilian President Luiz one is going to stop planting rice to plant biofuels. The problem of food in the world now is not lack of production of food. It's a lack of income for people to buy food."

Chavez did not voice specific criticism of plans by Brazil and the U.S. to promote ethanol use in other countries.

Amid the differences, Chavez has gradually modified his criticisms, insisting that Brazil's ethanol plans are fundamentally

different from Washington's. Chavez last week spoke out against U.S. aims to substitute gasoline with ethanol, raising environmental concerns that have been voiced by experts. However, Brazil also has pioneered the use of cars that run on both gasoline and ethanol.

David Fleischer, a political scientist at Brazil's University of Brasilia, said Chavez appeared to backtrack in order to avoid a confrontation with Brazil.

"Chavez was convinced to back off," Fleischer said. "His main problem is with Bush."

Chavez denied shifting his position, saying "we have always said that the bio-ethanol project ... that Brazil has had for more than 30 years is very different ... from the madness that the U.S. president has proposed. It's completely the opposite."

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

Professor Carolyn Rude, chairdepartment, said Cho's writing was so disturbing that he had been referred to the university's counseling service.

"Sometimes, in creative writing, people reveal things and you never know if it's creative or if they're describing things, if they're imagining things or just how real it might be," Rude said. "But we're all alert to not ignore things like this."

She said she did not know when he was referred for counseling, or what the outcome was. Rude refused to release any of his writings or his grades, citing privacy laws. The counseling service refused to comment.

Cho — who arrived in the United States as boy from South Korea in 1992 and was raised in suburban Washington, D.C., where his parents worked at a dry cleaners — left a note in his dorm room that was found after the bloodbath.

A government official, who spoke of condition of anonymity because he had not been authorized to discuss details of the case, said the note had been described to him as "anti-woman, anti-rich kid."

The Chicago Tribune reported on its Web site that the note railed Va. against "rich kids," "debauchery" and "deceitful charlatans" on campus. ABC, citing law enforcement sources, said that the note, several pages long, explains Cho's actions and says, "You caused me to do this."

Col. Steve Flaherty, superintendent of the Virginia State Police, said there was no evidence so far that Cho left a suicide note, but he said authorities were going through a considerable number of writings.

Citing unidentified sources, the Tribune also said Cho had recently set a fire in a dorm room and had stalked some women.

Monday's rampage consisted of two attacks, more than two hours apart — first at a dormitory, where two people were killed, then inside a classroom building, where 31 people, including Cho, died. Two handguns — a 9 mm and a .22-caliber — were

found in the classroom building.

### Princeton nutritionist gives Tech students taste of sports diet

Spectators won't see Mandy Clark on the sidelines at the Princeton University football games, but she's just as much a part of the team as the head coach or the cheering Tiger mascot.

Clark, a sports nutritionist for Princeton athletics, left the Garden State to talk about health and nutrition in a city where a garden is a collection of tumbleweeds.

Clark spoke to sports nutrition classes Monday afternoon and the Student Dietetic Association Tuesday morning.

"I'm talking to (students) for two days," she said. "I'm basically giving them a look into my position working in the athletic department as a sports dietitian and the roles I have in that department."

Among her roles as the sports dietitian for Princeton, she works with student athletes on a regular

She said she works with athletes individually and as a part of their respective teams. When she speaks with the football squad, she speaks separately with the different positions, but also with various players who come to see her.

### Dave Chappelle breaks Los Angeles comedy club's endurance record

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Now that he's back on the standup circuit, Dave Chappelle has a lot to say.

The comic, who walked out on a \$50 million deal to continue his TV show and briefly took a respite in South Africa, shattered the Laugh Factory's endurance record by taking to the comedy club's stage for six hours and seven minutes on Sunday.

"He was absolutely amazing, for six hours making people laugh," the club's owner, Jamie Masada, said Tuesday.

Masada said the previous record of three hours and 50 minutes was accomplished earlier this month by Dane Cook. But until then the mark had stood at two hours and 41 minutes since Richard Pryor set it in 1980.

Chappelle walked out on the third season of his hit Comedy Central show last May, leaving fans and industry observers to question his motives and even his sanity.

He has said since that he didn't feel he could be himself on the show.

"The bottom line was, white people own everything, and where can a black person go and be himself or say something that's familiar to him and not have to explain or apologize?" he told Esquire magazine.

He has since returned to the standup circuit and released the documentary "Dave Chappelle's Block Party."




Sosa has two homers this season, raising his total to 590, fifth on the career list.







The NBA also fined Duncan \$25,000 for verbal abuse of an official. Crawford said Duncan referred to him with an expletive.

Crawford was the first referee suspended since Rodney Mott was banned three games on Jan. 12 for making an obscene gesture toward a fan and also using inappropriate language in Portland.

Crawford comes from an officiating family. His brother, Jerry, is a major league umpire, as was his father, Shag.

Joey Crawford is in his 29th season as an NBA referee. He has officiated more than 2,000 games during the regular season and 252 in the playoffs, including 36 in the NBA finals.


But his temper has gotten him noticed before, especially in Game 2 of the 2003 Western Conference finals, a matchup involving the same teams as in Sunday's game. Crawford called four technical fouls in the first 10-plus minutes, leading to ejections of then-Mavs coach Don Nelson and assistant Del Harris.




