Reverend saves puppies By BEATRICE MORIN

Two homeless puppies are currently making their home in the Sudan Sunset Inn Apartments just east of Sudan. Rev. Victor Prentice of the American Orthodox Catholic Church, who recently purchased the once Sands Motel, has temporarily opened his home and heart to the two puppies.

"One of the puppies found its way to the apartments," said Prenctice. The other puppy was found later by him on the side of Hwy 84. It is recovering from two broken hind legs which it suffered after being run over.

Prentice believes the puppy may have been run over intentionally because it was found off the shoulder of Hwy 84. It is a short-haired mix, light brown and white. The other puppy is a boxer mix.

Prentice tried contacting several veterinary clinics in the area before he was able to convince a veterinarian in Littlefield to care for the wounded pup.

Prentice, an animal lover and a former SPCA officer (Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals), said he is unable to keep the puppies because he already has a large dog and has no place to keep them other than inside.

He recently announced the finding of the two puppies over the KMUL radio trading post trying to find the owner or someone willing to adopt the pup-

Prentice is also asking for donations to defray the medical expenses for the injured puppy which totaled \$400. He was only able to pay \$100 out of his own money on a clergyman's salary.

Local resident recuperating from West Nile

Eliodoro "Shorty" Orozco, 58, of Muleshoe has recently been moved from the Intensive Care Unit at Covenant Medical Center in Lubbock to a private room. He has been hospitalized since mid-August due to complications of the West Nile Virus.

One week prior to his admission, he began experiencing symptoms such as diarrhea, headache, fever, vomiting and a rash."He went to the doctor in Muleshoe and he was diagnosed with a colon infection, given antibiotics and sent home," said Stella Orozco Gonzalez, Orozco's daughter. "He didn't get better so I took him back and he was admitted to the hospital."

While Orozco was staying at Muleshoe Area Medical Center, a blood sample was sent off to determine if he had contracted the West Nile Virus.

According to Gonzalez, two days later, her mother requested that her dad be transferred to Lubbock because he had become very disoriented.

"He was unconscious by the

time we got there and he remained that way for a week," said Gonzalez. "He was also having seizures frequently."

"They tested him for encephalitis and meningitis but both tests were negative," she continued. "They said it [the virus] attacked his nervous system."

Orozco had to be given a tracheotomy so that he could breathe but six days ago he was taken off the ventilator and is "doing much better" according to Gonzalez.

cal therapy. He had lost 100 percent use of his right leg and 70 percent use of his left arm," said Gonzalez. "The neurologist didn't think he would gain strength in his leg but Saturday he was beginning to move his leg more."

Orozco is receiving physical therapy every other day. He is still being fed intraveinously because he chokes when he tries to swallow.

According to Gonzalez, Orozco had no prior chronic illnesses and he was in good "He is going through physi- health. Nothing they thought would cause complications with the West Nile Virus.

"About three weeks before he got sick, my dad called me worried that my kids were in danger of getting West Nile," said Gonzalez. "I told him they had good immune systems and they would be fine."

Now, she said her mother keeps "Off," a popular insect repellant, in every room of her home. "We are very paranoid about mosquitos now," she said. .

Gonzalez believes her father will be staying at the hospital at least another month. When he returns home, he will still need physical therapy and home health care.

"I feel we have gotten over the dangerous part now. He just needs strengthening," said Gonzalez. "He's a very strong fighter and he's determined to come out walking."

Orozco is unable to speak due to the tracheotomy but the speech therapist told Gonzalez that he would be able to speak again. Currently, he is communicating by using a chart or by

Mules lose close struggle against the eagles



When the final gun sounded Friday night it had been a good-news, bad-news kind of night for the Mules. The good news was the Mules did not give up a touchdown to the very potent Lubbock Roosevelt Eagle offense.

The bad news was the Mules could not generate any offense of their own. The Mule defense made back-to-back goal line stands in the third period. But the Eagle's Paul Olavarreita nailed a 25-yard field goal late in the third period to down the Mules 3-0.

The Mules only rushed for 79 yards and completed four of 13 passes for 29 more yards.

"The game could have gone either way," said Mule Coach David Wood. "Without our quarterback, we have to find a spark that gives

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

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
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First of all, those carts or gurneys-or whatever the word is now (since hospitals are now all healthcare systems, it's probably a "patient transport system")—look a lot smaller when they're carrying a college football player. Second, during four hours

of surgery, I suppose a doctor uses quite a few suture needles. I know they count all the needles, sponges, etc., to make sure none get left in a

patient and no lawyer is provided with a BMW or a trip to the Bahamas courtesy of the healthcare system. So, count they did-and they came up one suture needle short. A tired doctor who'd been on his feet for four hours came back out to explain (politely to us-but I don't think I'd have wanted to be the O.R. staff), that they were searching for the needle. "It's not in him, I can tell you that for sure," he said, "but it's gotta be accounted for before we send Jeff to recovery. If it doesn't turn up on a sheet or something, we'll x-ray him and then send him on to recovery."

The needle finally turned up on somebody's shoe-covering, but before they found it, they decided to x-ray Jeff. A good idea, I'm sure, but it was three x-ray machines later before they finally found one that would fit over him. They don't x-ray many mountains. Before the x-rays even came back, they'd found the needle and Jeff was off to recovery (which took forever since they had no beds open in the hospital until way late in the day).

After a couple of nights in the hospital, Jeff's now home. His arm is stuck out on a "pilinteresting problems related to low brace" and we're cutting up 4X shirts to try to dress him, and wondering how he'll drive his car, how he'll go to class, how he'll bathe, etc., for six weeks (and during the first four, he can't remove the brace for any reason). Jeff still thinks football is worth it.

One thing this has taught me for sure. One size definitely DOES NOT fit all. Unless . . .

Unless you're talking about the love of God. And His love is big enough to enfold us all.
