Grenade scare forces school evacuation

SOUTHLAKE (AP) - A suburban Fort Worth elementary school was evacuated for more than an hour Tuesday after a fourth-grader showed up with a hand grenade, authorities said.

The grenade brought to Old Union Elementary School in Southlake still had the pin in it but appeared to be hollow, said Carroll school district spokeswoman Julie Thannum. A bomb squad was called in and removed the device from a classroom.

"The boy wasn't mad at anyone," Cpl. Mike Bedrich of the Southlake Department of Public Safety told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Tech police increase campus safety patrols

Immediately following the shootings at Virginia Tech April 16, Texas Tech police met with different school administrators and student organizations to ensure the Texas Tech campus was safe. During the meetings, Texas Tech police developed a solution to ease students' anxiety.

"We decided to add more coverage,' Texas Tech Police Col. Gordon Hoffman said. "With more patrollers out there, it helps instill a sense of security, especially in wake of the Virginia Tech shooting. It makes people feel more at ease."

Over the past week, Texas Tech police have added as many as six police officers per shift to meet the demand for the additional overage requested, Hoffman said.

Al-Qaida-linked group claims U.S. deaths

BAGHDAD (AP) - An al-Qaida-linked group claimed responsibility Tuesday for double suicide truck bombings that killed nine U.S. paratroopers in the worst attack on American ground forces in Iraq in more than a year, saying it sent "two knights" for the attack. The Islamic State of Iraq, an umbrella group of Sunni militants that includes al-Qaida in Iraq, said it was behind Monday's double attack on a U.S. patrol base in Diyala province northeast of Baghdad - an area that has seen violence spike since American troops surged into the capital to halt violence there.



Agreement allows Vietnamese students to earn degrees at Tech

Vu The Hiep, deputy director general of the Institute for International Relations, and Texas Tech Provost William Marcy signed an agreement Tuesday that will bring Vietnamese students to Lubbock.

The agreement is designed to train Vietnam's future diplomats in international relations at both the Institute for

The agreement, Marcy said, will have a long-lasting impact on diplomatic relations for the United States.

"This is a unique opportunity for Texas Tech University and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Vietnam," Marcy said, "to establish an academic program in which students will complete one year of work in Vietnam and one year of work at Texas Tech University and receive a masters of arts in interdisciplinary studies with an emphasis on American studies. The additional coverage includes asking the Lubbock Police Department to assist in maintaining security at Texas Tech.

We asked the LPD to assist us in drivethroughs on campus," Hoffman said.

Since the shootings at Virginia Tech, Texas Tech police investigated one threat by a student, Hoffman said. However, police who talked with the student determined the student had no intention of carrying out the threat.

Though Texas Tech police received the same weapons training as Lubbock police, Hoffman said it would help to have more patrollers around to add to the sense of security on campus.

"We had a student who alluded to the situation at Virginia Tech that upset quite a few people," Hoffman said. "Our investigators talked to the student and it was quickly resolved."

He said heavy patrolled areas include the Student Union Building, the Texas Tech Library and the Robert H. Ewalt Student Recreation Center.

Hoffman said whether a police officer is patrolling the computer lab of the library or the weight room of the recreation center, he or she is trained to look for the same thing.

"We look for people's reactions and anything out of the ordinary," he said. "How they react around us or any erratic behavior. If anyone see's anything out of the ordinary, be sure to contact a staff member."

When patrolling the streets, officers search for the same type of behavior.

"If someone is pre-occupied with a certain area, maybe circling the area, then we definitely check into that," Hoffman said. "Or if someone is hiding themselves, maybe lying down in the seat."

Hoffman said a number of concerned parents and students attended the studentgroup meeting. He said they gathered helpful information from a wide audience, including residents of Texas Tech residence halls.

"We wanted to know and reevaluated all types of lines of communications between us and students," Hoffman said.

One solution offered at the meeting is a text-messaging system between the university and students that would send out mass text messages to students in case of an emergency, Hoffman said. One Texas Tech student said he noticed the addition of more police on campus.

Tech professor studies ways to eliminate E. Coli

By GLENYS BOLLS STAFF WRITER

A Texas Tech faculty member is researching methods to reduce the occurrence of Escherichia coli and salmonella in meat.

The ground-beef industry has experienced a reduction in the number of recent recalls, Brashears said, but the occurrence of recalls on other products has increased. Because of this, she said she believes the overall number of recalls in the food industry Arizona. has remained the same.



WASHINGTON (AP) - For the first time astronomers have discovered European Southern Observatory's a planet outside our solar system that telescope in La Silla, Chile, which has is potentially habitable, with Earth- a special instrument that splits light like temperatures, a find researchers to find wobbles in different wave described Tuesday as a big step in the lengths. The planet is just the right size, might have water in liquid form, and in galactic terms is relatively nearby at 120 trillion miles away. But the star it closely orbits, known as a "red dwarf," is much smaller, dimmer and cooler than our sun.


King said she looks forward to rallying support for the students in the tournament and because the tournament is co-ed makes it more interesting.

With Jones back in charge, Cowboys may look to move up in NFL Draft

may be looking to move up in the NFL draft, something the Dallas Cowboys owner and general manager never did with Bill Parcells at his side the past four years.

Parcells left the roster in good shape when he retired, even though it was the only of his four NFL coaching jobs where he never won a playoff game.

"I feel like that we could line up and play with the players that we have before the draft. ... We do not have to have a player at a position," said Jones, who is preparing for his 19th NFL draft. "That gives me a lot of flexibility in any decision that I may make as we get into the draft."

So does having 10 picks, though there is one small problem: The Cowboys, who haven't won a playoff game in 10 seasons, have the 22nd spot Saturday.

"Bill didn't do us any favors," lones said, smiling. "He left us with a low draft pick."

Without a specifically pressing need and with a few extra picks, Jones may try to move up to get an impact player, preferably on the offensive side of the ball.

"I'm looking at the possibility of, and probably more seriously consider it than I ever have, doing some bundling up (of picks)

Since Jones bought the team in 1989 — when he got Hall of Fame quarterback and three-time Super Bowl winner Troy Aikman with the first overall pick — the Cowboys have made 40 draft-day trades. There are only five years

involve a first-round pick.

The Cowboys moved up in 1990 to get NFL career rushing leader Emmitt Smith with the No. 17 pick. But even Jones knows the nearly impossible chances of something like that happening again that low in the round.

The Cowboys may look for a receiver - Terrell Owens and Terry Glenn both will be 33 at the start of their 12th NFL seasons — but the group behind Johnson is somewhat equal and probably not worth trading up for.

With the emergence of Tony Romo, the Cowboys may finally have a true successor to Aikman seven years after his last game, so they don't have to draft a quarterback high. Plus, they've already signed veteran Brad Johnson as insurance after Drew Bledsoe was released and retired.

The Cowboys also don't have to worry about trying to get an offensive lineman early after their offseason moves. They spent big money on free agent Leonard Davis and gave long-term contracts to keep right tackle Marc Colombo and center Andre Gurode.

If the Cowboys go for defense, they'd probably have to do some to get them all that just fit."

FBI seeks author of threatening letters **Classifieds Continued**

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - The FBI offered a \$5,000 reward Tuesday for help tracking down whoever mailed dozens of threatening letters — including some containing a potentially harmful insecticide - complaining about TV coverage of college cheerleaders.

The letters were sent to national networks and their local affiliates, as well as people in states throughout the West and Midwest, according to the FBI office in Portland. Recipients also included people associated with university athletic departments in Ohio, Michigan and Arizona.

The initial batch of letters was postmarked in Portland and delivered in September 2004. Subsequent batches of letters were delivered between November 2006 and February, mostly with postmarks from Seattle, but some also were sent from Chicago, the FBI said.

The letters claim camera crews spent too much time on close-ups of cheerleaders. One letter also complained about coverage of WNBA players.

The FBI released excerpts of two letters in the hope of identifying who sent them.






