Homemade explosive found, deactivated

AUSTIN (AP) — A police bomb squad deactivated an explosive found Monday in a south Austin neighborhood, marking the third time in a week the squad has been called to check on a suspicious item in Austin.

No one was injured.

There is no indication that Monday's incident is connected to one last week, when a homemade bomb was found outside a women's clinic that provides abortions, police spokeswoman Toni Chovanetz said in a prepared statement.

Report says terror attacks up sharply

WASHINGTON (AP) — Terrorist attacks worldwide shot up 25 percent last year, particularly in Iraq where extremists used chemical weapons and suicide bombers to target crowds, according to a new State Department report. Among countries, Iran remains the biggest supporter of terrorism, with elements of its government backing groups throughout the Middle East, particularly in Iraq, giving material support and guidance to Shiite insurgent groups that have attacked Sunnis, U.S. and Iraqi forces, the report said.

5 convicted in London bomb plot

LONDON (AP) - Five al-Qaida-linked men were sentenced to life in prison Monday for plotting to bomb a nightclub, power plants and a company doing work in Iraq - a plan that exposed links between their terror cell and the suicide bombers who attacked London's transit system in 2005. The five, all British citizens, were convicted Monday of plotting to attack the London targets with bombs made from a half-ton stockpile of fertilizer after a yearlong trial in which prosecutors claimed the group was linked to al-Qaida leaders.

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Library staff prepared to handle possibility of bomb threats

Employees of the Texas Tech University Library now have a bomb-threat checklist to follow in case such a threat is called in to the

Dean of Libraries Donald Dyal sent out a document instructing pamphlets be placed near each telephone in the library, said Assistant Librarian Chris Starcher.

Dyal said despite the timing, the emergency procedures are not new and are not in response to the shootings at Virginia Tech.

"We have always had emergency procedures, and in times past have even drilled them," Dyal said. "Recently, the state of Texas required that we have a 'business continuity plan.' There may be some assumptions that these procedures are being driven by Virginia Tech scenarios or some other such current event. That is really

only a coincidence."

The checklist Dyal sent out is almost identical to the bomb-threat checklist included in Texas Tech's Operating Procedure 76.06.

"I think it's an excellent idea since we now have the posted numbers for both the Lubbock and Tech police," said Jessica Kunkle, a specialist in the library.

In addition to listing phone numbers for the police, who library employees are supposed to call after receiving a threat, the form asks staff members for information about the bomb, including when it will explode, where it is and what it

Employees also are supposed to notice details of the call, including the tone of the caller's voice and any background sounds.

"It's easy to giggle at the form because if you were on the phone with someone saying they had a bomb, you may not remember to follow the checklist," Kunkel said. "I'd probably be in such a panicked state that I wouldn't know what

The checklist asks for details about the caller, the message and when and where the call was received. It also instructs the person receiving the call to ask the caller specific questions and write down the exact wording of the threat.

"While I am concerned, as we all are, that we have procedures in place to deal with such threats," Dyal said, "this process of identifying bomb threat procedures, pandemics, tornado procedures, etc. got started in the TTU libraries as far back as 2002. It is merely a coincidence that current events are underscoring what we have been trying to do for the last

Kunkel said the library is not expecting a bomb threat.

"I'm not worried about it," she said. "It hasn't happened in the past, and we're not expecting it now. As soon as it became a concern, they took care of it."



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
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

Former DT writer wins national award

A former features writer for The Daily Toreador has been honored with a national award for her series about disadvantaged people in Lubbock.

Ruth Bradley, a senior journalism major from Lubbock, won the 2007 Robert F. Kennedy College Journalism Award for her spring 2006 series "Lubbock in the Dark," which focused on prostitution, drug abuse, racism, child abuse and homelessness in the Hub City.

"I really wanted to write some pieces that covered things that aren't usually discussed in West Texas," Bradley said.

Bradley, who was a features writer for The Daily Toreador in spring 2006 and an intern with the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal in summer 2006, said she credits her features editor at the time, Clara Cobb, for her role in brainstorming the ideas for the series.

"What I wanted to do with those stories was to bring about a positive change, to bring these issues to light and to show that these are people in great need," Bradley said. "I hope that I did that."

Bradley said she forgot about her articles being submitted for the award until she received a phone call from Ethel Kennedy, the wife of former New

York senator and presidential nominee Robert Kennedy, informing her about receiving the award.

Sheri Lewis, assistant director and adviser in student media, said she submitted Bradley's series for the contest because "it was amazing."

"That particular contest required stories that dealt with people who are disadvantaged," Lewis said. "I think in the context of that series, which dealt with child abuse, prostitution, homelessness, drug abuse, racism — that's pretty much the definition of 'disadvantaged."

Bradley said, after she graduates in May, she hopes to find work as a reporter in the Dallas area, where she and her fiancée plan to live after they





later this week on the sidelines of a meeting in Egypt on Iraq.

"Should the foreign minister of Iran bump into Condi Rice, Condi won't be rude. She's not a rude person. I'm sure she'll be polite," Bush said.

The administration in the past has resisted engaging Iran diplomatically on Iraq because of the stalemate over Tehran's nuclear uranium enrichment program. But, in recent days, the administration has signaled more flexibility.


Rice will "also be firm in reminding the representative of the Iranian gov-

ernment that there's a better way forward for the Iranian people than isolation," Bush said.

He called Iran "a significant threat to might meet with Iranian diplomats world peace, today and in the future" because of its nuclear weapons ambitions. He immediately amended his remarks, saying, "today' is the wrong word — in the future. They don't have a weapon today."

> Tehran insists it is developing nuclear energy to meet electricity demands, not to build weapons.

> Bush said the U.S. and European leaders were together in backing enforcement of U.N. resolutions on Iran to allow inspections of nuclear facilities. Bush said that the United States and the European Union are "united in sending this very clear message" to Iran.





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

Four more Tech players named to NFL teams

Four Texas Tech players were picked up Sunday as free agents after the 2007 NFL Draft.

Offensive lineman Gabe Hall signed with the New York Giants, wideout Jarrett Hicks signed with the San Diego Chargers, linebacker Brock Stratton signed with the Tennessee Titans, while a three-year deal with the Minnesota Vikings.

Hall said being signed to the Giants after the NFL Draft was fortunate for him even thoaugh he never heard his name called either Saturday and Sunday.

"Everybody wants to hear their name called, but I think my situation turned out all right," Hall said. "I'm going to the Giants. They don't have a lot of offensive linemen, they have a couple of old offensive linemen, so I think it's going to turn out all right."

According to a press release, Tech coach Mike Leach said he is proud of his players having the opportunity to make an



Tech Men's tennis awaits NCAA tourney opponent

The Tech women competed in the Big 12 Tournament over the weekend, advancing after a win against Kansas State, a team they lost 5-2 to earlier in the season. The Tech women next faced No. 37 Texas in the second round of the tournament, but were blanked by the Longhorns, 4-0. After Tech (12-11, 5-8 Big 12) lost the doubles point, the team's No. 1, 2 and 3 spots in Janet Durham, Lakann Wagley and Samantha van der Drift lost consecutive matches, clinching the win for the Longhorns.

Groce said the team competed well with Kansas State, but the second round match against Texas was more than her team could handle.

"I think we went down there and we played well the first night, finishing off Nebraska," Groce said. "We were able to get a little bit of revenge on our previous loss to Kansas State — we came out and beat them 4-1. Texas was tough. They were tough down the line. 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
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
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
