#### Toddler dies after vehicle falls into river

SPRING BRANCH (AP) - Police are investigating the death of a 3-year-old boy who was pulled from a vehicle that had rolled into the Guadalupe River.

It's unclear why Cole Ryan Ewald was left unattended Saturday morning or how the car he was in rolled and became submerged, police said. Rescuers didn't reach the child until about an hour after the car went into the water.

"We don't know how or when the child got into the vehicle or whether it was running or not," said Comal County Sheriff's Lt. Mark Reynolds. "We have just got a lot of questions that need to be answered. It does appear to be an accident.'

## Men's Health study suggests Lubbock children at high risk for obesity

By GLENYS BOLLS STAFF WRITER

Lubbock children are among those most at risk for childhood obesity in United States, according to a study in the October issue of Men's Health magazine.

Lubbock ranked No. 99 on a list of the 100 "Fittest or Fattest Cities for Kids," receiving a grade of F for its efforts to keep children at healthy weights. Lubbock came in just ahead of Cheyenne, Wyo., which claimed the title of The Fattest City for Kids.

"I'd say that's pretty true," said Jeremy Waller, owner of The Wall Fitness Club in Lubbock. "Adults don't put much emphasis on being healthy for themselves, and they probably don't for their kids either. It's just easier to pick up junk food than to cook a healthy meal."

According to the magazine, cities were ranked based on the

the state's physical education requirements, children's fitness by federal standards, adult fitness in general, the number of sports camps, the number of fast food restaurants and the amount of fast food children consume.

Sherry Mulkey, owner of the West Texas Training Center, said the number of sports camps and physical programs alone does not really affect children's health levels.

"There's a tremendous amount of sports activities available, but parents don't take advantage of it," she said. "It's laziness in the parents."

Lubbock is not the only Texas city that ranked poorly on the list. Arlington came in at No. 98, San Antonio was No. 95, Fort Worth ranked No. 90 and Corpus Christi was No. 89. With Dallas at No. 74, Houston at No. 65 and Austin at No. 62, no Texas city ranked in the top half of the list.

One way to fix the problem of overweight children is to

implementation of nutrition and physical-activity programs, teach them healthy things they can do on their own, Waller

"If you teach kids at school, teach them healthy recipes and healthy snacks, they're going to go home and want to do that," he said. "Kids are really impressionable. If you tell them they'll be better at sports and things; they'll be motivated to do it."

Mulkey said she believes the problem could be fixed if there were more health-related education programs available for parents.

"A lot of parents think they're feeding their kids properly, but they're not," she said. "Our children are terribly obese. I was at the fair (Saturday) night, and I was just looking around at all the fat kids. It's very sad."

Seattle topped the list, claiming the title of Fittest City for Kids. New York came in second place; Cincinnati in third; Durham, N.C., in fourth and Salt Lake City in fifth.

# French mime Marcel Marceau, who turned silence into poetry, dies at age 84

PARIS (AP) — Marcel Marceau, the master of mime who transformed silence into poetry with lithe gestures and pliant facial expressions that spoke to generations of young and old, has died. He was 84.

Wearing white face paint, soft shoes and a battered hat topped with a red flower, Marceau breathed new life into an art that dates to ancient Greece. He played out the human comedy through his alter-ego Bip without ever uttering a word.

Offstage, he was famously chatty. "Never get a mime talking. He won't stop," he once said.

A French Jew, Marceau escaped deportation to a Nazi death camp during World War II, unlike his father who died in Auschwitz. Marceau worked with the French Resistance to protect Jewish children, and later used the memories of his own life to feed his art.

He gave life to a wide spectrum of characters, from a peevish waiter to a lion tamer to an old woman knitting, and to the best-known Bip.

His biggest inspiration was Charlie Chaplin. In turn, Marceau in-

The son of a butcher, the mime was born Marcel Mangel on March 22, 1923, in Strasbourg, France. His father Charles, a baritone with a love of song, introduced his son to the world of music and theater at an early age. The boy was captivated by the silent film stars of the era: Chaplin, Buster Keaton and the

Marx brothers. When the Nazis marched into eastern France, he fled with fam-

ily members to the southwest and changed his last name to Marceau to hide his Jewish origins.

With his brother Alain, Marceau became active in the French Resistance, altering children's identity cards by changing birth dates to trick the Nazis into thinking they were too young to be deported. Because he spoke English, he was recruited to be a liaison officer with Gen. George S. Patton's army.





# Boy's struggles help many children

be 10 years old, but Jonathan Carrington has already moved mountains for other disabled children in Texas.

At the age of 4 months, Jonathan had a reaction to a Diphtheria. Tetanus and Pertussis (DTP) vaccination, which resulted in a ruptured aneurysm in his brain. Jonathan on the way to the hospital but was resuscitated and rushed to the ICU where nine doctors began an grueling procedure to save the tiny boy's life.

While in the hospital, waiting for either news of hope or news that would bring tears of grief, Tammy Carrington, Jonathan's mother, prepared for the worst. Her pastor rushed to her side, driving from Lufkin to Shreveport to discuss funeral plans and help prepare Tammy for the possibility of her son's death. The nurses explained to Tammy what Jonathan's last breath would look like and finally Tammy surrendered to God the one thing her heart most desired — her son's life.

"I gave him back to the Lord,"

Two hours into what should have been an eight-hour surgery, the doctors came out to Tammy with news they could not explain.

The Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) provided nursing care for Jonathan for seven years, but when Jonathan's health began to improve the agency decided he was no longer eligible.

A hearing was held, which Tammy and Jonathan won, but since Tammy had to reapply every 60 days for the nursing care and the hearing took longer than 60 days she ended up in a cycle of reapplication and fighting for her son's life at hearings. During this time she was not receiving the care she so desperately needed to keep her son alive and healthy.



student from Austin, has been with the Tour since its inception, and said his favorite thing about the event is people who are new to the experience. "Virgin riders — it's what it's all







## Texans defensive tackle taken off on stretcher

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Johnson injured his ankle. Texans defensive tackle Cedric Killings was taken off the field on a stretcher Sunday after a headfirst collision with Indianapolis receiver Roy Hall.

The 6-foot-3, 310-pound Killings, playing special teams, hit Hall on a block as Jerome Mathis was returning a kickoff in the second quarter. The Texans said Killings suffered a neck injury, but had feeling in his extremities. Killings was taken to a hospital.

Hall and Killings went down together and Hall walked slowly off the field with trainers helping

Killings lay motionless as trainers attended to him and a stretcher was wheeled onto the field. Coach Gary Kubiak watched medical personnel strap Killings to the watched intently.

The 30-year-old Killings was re-signed on Sept. 14 to add depth to the defensive line when Travis

In the season opener, the Buffalo Bills lost tight end Kevin Everett to a life-threatening spinal cord injury. Everett, however, is making a strong recovery and doctors expect he'll be able to walk again.

Early in the second quarter Sunday, Houston running back Ahman Green left the game with a left knee injury.

Green, Houston's leading rusher, caught a short pass and was tackled after a 9-yard gain by Colts safety Bob Sanders. Green hopped up, but limped off the field as trainers attended to him on the

Green hobbled to a training table behind the bench as Kris Brown kicked a 33-yard field goal to put the Texans up 10-7.

On Wednesday, the Texans said stretcher as players from both sides Green was limited at practice with a knee injury.

Samkon Gado replaced Green cut by the Texans on Sept. 1, then on the Texans' next offensive series. Green sat on the bench with ice wrapped around his left knee.

## Szymanski leads Baylor past Buffalo

AMHERST, N.Y. (AP) -Blake Szymanski may be known for making things happen with his arm, but it was his legs that did most of the work for Baylor on Saturday.

Szymanski rushed for 91 yards, including a career-long 39-yard touchdown scamper in the fourth quarter, and Baylor gained 229 yards on the ground to defeat Buffalo 34-21. The Bears (3-1) have won three straight heading into Big 12 Conference play.

Baylor, which eclipsed the 200-yard rushing plateau for the first time since gaining 215 yards on the ground against SMU in the 2005 season opener, plays at Texas A&M next Saturday.

"We're rolling," Szymanski said. "We just laid it on the line and executed."

Szymanski ended 21-of-45 for 172 passing yards and three touchdowns, shaking off a sluggish first half in which he completed just 8 of 25 passes for 65 yards.

Things opened up for Szymanski in the pivotal third quarter. The sophomore quarterback went 10of-14 passing and gained 50 yards on the ground, including a 29-yard run around right end on Baylor's second drive of the half.

"We didn't shoot ourselves in the foot," Szymanski said. "We put together two good drives in a row, including one as a touchdown. We ran the ball better and everything clicked. We have to play like we did in third quarter, especially when it comes to conference play."

With Baylor up 10-7, Szymanski engineered an 11-play, 85-yard drive to open the second half, capping the march with a 9-yard touchdown to Krys Buerck.

The Bears made it 24-7 with 2:30 left in the third when Szymanski hit Brandon Whitaker from 2

Shea Brewster connected on a 39-yard field goal 2 minutes later to give the Bears an insurmountable 27-7 lead.

"The bottom line is Baylor executed better than we did," Buffalo coach Turner Gill said. "If you have success running you're going to continue to do that until the team stops it. That's what they decided to do."

Baylor was also helped by a defense that forced five turnovers, with defensive back Jordan Lake playing a major role in four of them. Lake intercepted two passes, forced one fumble and recovered

## McCoy leads Texas past Rice

AUSTIN(AP) — Texas needed one of those everybody-gets-toplay kind of games in the worst

The No. 7 Longhorns got one in a big way Saturday night with a 58-14 drubbing of Rice in the final tuneup for the start of Big 12 play.

By dominating the winless Owls in every phase, the Longhorns (4-0) pounded out any lingering frustrations after three close wins and a wave of bad publicity surrounding player arrests and suspensions in recent weeks.

"It's good to be excited about a win," Texas senior defensive tackle Derek Lokey said. "I don't think anybody knows how good we can be. We have the talent to be great, but we're not there yet."

Colt McCoy looked sharp with 333 yards passing and three touchdowns, including scoring tosses of 52 and 24 yards to Limas Sweed

The Longhorns rolled up 560 vards on offense. Sweed finished with 139 yards on five catches and Jamaal Charles had three short touchdown runs. Even freshman backup quarterback John Chiles looked good in mop-up duty, teasmoves running the ball.

Texas led the Owls (0-4) 41-0 in the second quarter. The final score could have been much worse but McCoy and most of Texas' starters were on the bench after the first series of the third.

Even then, Chiles quickly drove the Longhorns to another TD, rushing for 49 yards on an eightplay scoring drive in his first action of the season.

This game won't be considered much of a measuring stick for the Longhorns — Rice's offense ranks among the worst in the country - but it was sure to massage the ego of a team that struggled through games against Arkansas State, TCU and Central Florida and left some wondering if they were overrated.



# Leach: Defense acts like 'some inferior group'

Stillwater, Okla. — To their dismay, members of the Texas Tech football defense saw the return of Oklahoma State's leading rusher and the spark of the Cowboys' rushing offense.

Tech allowed 610 yards of total offense, 366 of which were gained on the ground. The Oklahoma State Cowboys had three rushers gain more than 100 yards in running backs Kendall Hunter and Dantrell Savage and quarterback Zac Robinson.

This is the Tech defense's third-

100 yards on the ground. The Red Raiders have allowed 795 rushing yards in 2007 with seven rushing touchdowns. Tech's opponents average 4.4 yards a carry on the ground and 198.8 rushing yards a

"Defensively we acted like we're some inferior group and we can't perform because we're not good enough and wanted to over-analyze and give a bunch of reasons for not being successful," Tech coach Mike Leach said. "They can feel sorry for themselves all they want or they can be tougher."

Savage finished the game with

straight game to give up more than 25 carries for 130 yards and one wouldn't trade him for anybody in personas on the team. touchdown. Robinson rushed for 116 yards and two touchdowns, while Hunter had 14 carries for 113 yards and one touchdown. The Cowboys rushing offense managed to have 61 combined carries while maintaining six yards a carry.

> Prior to Saturday's game, Savage played in only one game because of an injury. Savage had 55 yards rushing before Saturday's game with Tech.

> "Dantrell is an unbelievable player and definitely having him back was huge," Robinson said. "We have a ton of running backs that can run the ball, but when he's got the ball in his hands, I

the country."

The last time two OSU running backs ran for 100-yards in the same game was in 2003 against Southwest Missouri State. This is the first time in school history Oklahoma State has had three 100-yard rushers in the same game. Savage's 130-yard game was the sixth game of his career to exceed 100 yards. A 48-yard score by Robinson was the longest of his career and the longest by a Cowboy quarterback since Bobby Reid's 56-yard score in 2006.

OSU offensive coordinator said Hunter and Savage are similar in their running styles and their

"They always run alike," Fedora said. "Someone asked me about their personalities, and Dantrell doesn't talk that much, and Kendall talks even less. He never says a word other than 'no, sir' and 'yes sir.' And Hunter isn't a very tall kid, but he's a tough kid. He's very tough."

The OSU running backs were behind an offensive line with right guard Steve Denning and center Andrew Lewis making their first career starts.

"We had a new center starting the first game of his career," Fedora said. "We just lost a three-year starter. Andrew Lewis did a heck of

a job. I think he had one bad snap, a quarterback-center exchange, but other than that he was pretty dang solid the whole game, and that's huge."

Leach said the key to the defense's improvement is a matter of state of mind.

"I think they need to work on their mentality," Leach said. "They need to work on having a burning desire to be tougher than the guy across from them. I think it falls on the coaches. The players need to be committed enough to rise up. If we have a few that aren't, we need to get rid of them."


