Storms bring heavy rain to North Texas

DALLAS (AP) - Showers and thunderstorms flooded roads, damaged buildings and knocked out power Monday as the strong weather system swept across North Texas.

The rainy weather was blamed for at least one death and caused numerous accidents, snarled traffic and canceled more than 100 flights at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

An unidentified man in Denton was killed when he lost control of his car and slid into the path of an oncoming semi-truck, authorities said. The driver appeared to be driving too fast on the rain-slickened roads, Denton police spokesman Jim Bryan said.

9 drivers missing from deadly crash

SANTA CLARITA, Calif. (AP) — Authorities scrambled Monday to find at least nine drivers who apparently escaped from vehicles trapped in a weekend tunnel inferno that killed three people on a key trans-

Thirty-one vehicles were involved in the pileup in the curving tunnel on Interstate 5, but the California Highway Patrol has accounted for only 23 people, including two men and a 6-year-old boy who were killed.

Interpol identifies suspected pedofile

PARIS (AP) — First Interpol unmasked his face. Now it knows his name.

The international police organization, working off tips from people who responded to a global appeal for help, said Monday it has identified a suspected pedophile shown in Internet photos abusing young boys.

The man, whose face initially was disguised behind a digitalized swirl, is now thought to be on the run in Thailand, Interpol said. He is said to be an English teacher at a school in South Korea.

Donating plasma could have health risks

In his inaugural State of the University address Monday afternoon, the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center's president focused on growth happening now and in the future of the center.

Dr. John Baldwin, who took office Sept. 1, addressed the Health Sciences Center's faculty members to discuss some important issues associated with the growth of the university. "We are proud of our yesterday, but we do

stand on the threshold of a great tomorrow," Baldwin said in his speech. "Our great university will still be here, doing things we can't currently imagine, 100 years from now."

The Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences has 102 students, up 3.03 percent from last year, and is still growing, Baldwin said. Within the school, faculty members are working to expand the veterinary program to the Health Sciences Center's Amarillo and

Texas Tech researcher contributes to Gore's Nobel Peace Prize win

Al Gore and the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change can attribute their winning the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize in part to the contribution of a Texas Tech researcher.

Former Vice President Gore and the IPCC, which was founded by the U.N. in 1988 to research the effects of climate change, were announced as co-recipients of the prize by The Norwegian Nobel Committee Friday in Oslo, Norway, according to the committee's Web site, www.nobelprize.org.

Katharine Hayhoe, an associate professor of atmospheric science at Tech, said as a member of the IPCC, she contributes to collaborative research efforts with scientists and researchers from around the world and believes receiving the prize will play a significant role in advancing and promoting further research.

"It's enormous, first of all, because it recognizes the efforts of people who have been working on this for almost 30 years," she said. "The fact that this body of scientists, to which I'm actually a part, is sharing this award is fantastic, and I think it's a tribute to the years



Rice says time for a Palestinian state is now

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) sides to drop contentious demands — Saying the time is now for a Palestinian state, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice on Monday prodded Israel and the Palestinians to agree at a U.S.-sponsored conference this fall on how and when to start formal peace talks.

In one of her strongest statements yet on the issue, Rice declared that creation of a Palestinian state is a key U.S. interest and urged the two

Obama rejects triangulation and poll-driven politics

MADISON, Wis. (AP) -Barack Obama said Monday the nation has had enough of "triangulation and poll-driven politics," a reference to the presidency of Bill Clinton, the husband of his chief Democratic rival.

Addressing a convention center rally dominated by students, Obama said that he had spoken out against going to war in Iraq in would be a mistake to challenge a popular president, George W.

Then an Illinois state lawmaker, Obama said he did so because he did not want to "enter the United States Senate already having compromised on core principles."

"We've had enough of ... triangulation and poll-driven politics,"

Fisherman lands 844-pound shark in Florida

friends went to a fishing tournament looking to catch some grouper. They caught an 844-pound shark instead.

The fight by Adlee Bruner and friends to pull the 11-foot mako shark onto the boat from the Gulf of Mexico took more than an hour on Saturday. But when they made it back to land, it was a record for the decadesold Destin Fishing Rodeo.

"It was tense," Bruner, 47, said about the fight to land the shark, which has a mouthful of

DESTIN, Fla. (AP) — Six huge, fearsome teeth. "I've fished for 40 years. I've never see one that big."

Bruner and his fishing buddies were on a 52-foot charter boat with Capt. Robert Hill, about 70 miles southwest of this beach city in the Florida Panhandle.

The fishermen first noticed the big mako because it kept eating grouper and scamp they had hooked.

"It was like 'Jaws," Hill said. Hill hooked a two-foot amberine on as bait and tossed it out. The shark eventually hit it.

After the long fight, the shark was gaffed and eventually gave up after its tail was roped. But even then, the men could not get the big shark in the boat. They tied it to the stern with three ropes and made the four-hour trip back

The shark was hoisted at the rodeo before a big crowd. It tipped the scale at 844.4 pounds.

After it was gutted, the mako still weighed 638 pounds, breaking the tournament's previous shark division record by 338 pounds.



Simpson turncoats' testimony could hurt or help the former football star in hotel heist case

men who cut plea deals Monday in a Las Vegas heist that authorities say O.J. Simpson masterminded could hamper the former football star's defense, but the men's dubious backgrounds could give prosecutors problems.

The question will be whether prosecutors can build a strong enough case against Simpson on the words of his cohorts or whether the testimony will be eroded through contradictions and cross-examination targeting the unsavory background of his co-defendants.

"It's a defense lawyer's dream to cross-examine these witnesses," said Laurie Levenson, a professor at Loyola Law School in Los Angeles and a former federal prosecutor. "You can put someone up before a firing squad and the squad members can start shooting at each other."

At this point, prosecutors appear to have the upper hand. Two of Simpson's co-defendants, one a former friend, agreed to testify against him in return for drastically reduced charges.

"It's always a prosecutor's strategy to go after the little fish to get to the big fish," said lawyer Edward Miley, who represents defendant

> A lawyer for Walter Alexander, a former golf buddy of Simpson's who plans to testify against him, said he hasn't been in trouble in a decade.

Alexander, 46, said he will plead guilty to conspiracy to commit robbery. He was arrested in Los Angeles in 1987 for kidnapping and assault with a deadly weapon, but the charges were dismissed because a witness refused to identify the culprit, court records show.

Charges against Simpson and three others include kidnapping, armed robbery, assault, burglary and conspiracy. A preliminary hearing for them is scheduled Nov. 8 and 9.

"This might feed into the idea of a setup," he said. "They set him up in the hotel room and tape recorded it and now they're setting him up in court."

Simpson's celebrity and the fact that many feel he was wrongly acquitted in 1995 of murdering his wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend, Ronald Goldman, could weigh heavily against him and may emerge as the dominant theme in the case.

"All the others are getting a good deal and Simpson, the one without a conviction, doesn't? It's all about who he is," Mesereau said. "They probably wouldn't have brought charges if it wasn't for who he was."

Defense attorney Harland Braun, another of Blake's original attorneys, said the critical factor is whether Simpson knew anyone in the group had a gun and whether he intended for anyone to use a gun that-night.

President Vladimir Putin pledged Monday to negotiate with Iran on behalf of the international community in their nuclear standoff, although he didn't come to Tehran as scheduled amid warnings of a possible assassination plot.

Putin's planned trip, the first here by a Kremlin leader since World War II, raised hopes that personal diplomacy could find a solution to the impasse over the Iranian nuclear program, but he delayed his arrival, which had been set for Monday

The Russian leader insisted to reporters in Germany that he was going ahead with the trip, but the Kremlin declined to discuss details. The official Iranian news agency said late Monday that Putin had only put off his trip by several hours and would be in Tehran early Tuesday in time for a Caspian region summit.

"Putin will arrive in Tehran at the head of a delegation tomorrow morning," the Islamic Republic News Agency said, quoting Iran's presidential press service.

Iran gave no further details, and Kremlin officials wouldn't comment on reasons for the delay or say exactly when Putin would arrive. Officials in Germany, where Putin wrapped up a two-day visit, said they could not say where the Russian leader was.

Putin's trip was first thrown into doubt when the Kremlin said Sunday that he had been informed by Russian special services that suicide attackers might try to kill him in Tehran, but he shrugged off the warning Monday.







If students' majors do not apply to anything in the Peace Corps, applicants can go and volunteer for an organization in the field they choose for at least three months beforehand. He said 35 percent of volunteers work in education, while 21 percent work in healthcare.

Lucking said those interested in working for the Peace Corps should allow the application process to take at least 10 months. He said he will return to Tech in the 2008 spring semester to conduct more informational meetings.

'We want people to have a desire to help people," Lucking said. "Peace Corps is exciting and challenging at the same time."




