Verdict to be read in Muslim charity trial

DALLAS (AP) - Jurors who deliberated 19 days reached a verdict Thursday in the trial of former leaders of a Muslim charity accused of funneling millions of dollars in illegal aid to Middle Eastern terrorists, but the decision won't be unsealed until Monday.

The defendants faced up to 35 counts each, and it is possible that jurors were unable to decide on some or all of the counts.

Federal District Judge A. Joe Fish, who presided over the Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development case, was out of town at a judicial conference, and the magistrate who took the jury's verdict said he was not legally empowered to read it.

Study shows drug use significant in U.S. work places By MATT MCGOWAN STAFF WRITER

Illegal drugs often have severe effects on those who use and abuse them, but when it comes to the workforce, the consequences only get worse.

According to a study compiled by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to examine drug use within the nation's workforce, 8.2 percent of full-time, adult workers between the ages of 18 and 64 years old in the United States reported using illicit drugs within one month prior to the survey.

Bob Stephenson, director of the Division of Workplace Programs at the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, said drug use adversely affects the workforce and can be profoundly costly if not accurately measured.

"A lot of studies have been done in the past about the cost to society, but the biggest cost to society is lost productivity by lost wages," he said. "In other words, people who are involved in drugs don't have a job or they can't get a job; therefore, their contribution to society is reduced." George Comiskey, associate director for Tech's Center for the Study of Addiction and Recovery, said employees with addictions pose safety risks to themselves and others at work. It is important that employers look for signs of drug addiction and offer help to those who need it. "Once they do identify it as being drugs, they usually want to help them, which is what we find," he said. "If they can get over their drug problems then they can actually come back to be better employees because they have a renewed sense of life and have better coping abilities to handle the job." The administration offers a help line for employers seeking help establishing a program to help employees struggling with drug use, Stephenson said, and offers a drug-free program kit to help employers. "It's not all just about trying to identify users of illicit drugs and heavy alcohol consumption," he said. "It's also about trying to deter it before it's present and to help identify it from a health and wellness perspective." Employees between the ages of 18 and 25 years old reported the highest percentage of illicit drug use, according to the study, with nearly one out of five individuals within that group reporting past-month usage "They are faced with stressors they have never dealt with before," Stephenson said. "Increasingly, employers need to understand that young people are coming in to the workforce, and that it's very important to help young people be set up for success." Also, according to the report, 5.7 percent of college-educated employees reported they either had

Showdown looming over Iraqi execution

BAGHDAD (AP) - Iraq's leaders grappled Thursday over the death sentences for three former Saddam Hussein regime heavyweights - including the notorious enforcer known as "Chemical Ali" — amid warnings the hangings could enflame sectarian violence and derail efforts at reconciliation.

But any serious delays in carrying out the executions also risk backlash from the victims of Saddam's attacks, including Kurds who faced a brutal crackdown in the 1980s that led to the death sentences.

Tech researchers question Nobel winner's claims about racial intelligence

An American scientist who won the Nobel Prize in 1962 for co-founding the model of the DNA double helix believes "testing" suggests blacks are intellectually inferior to whites, a claim some Texas Tech researchers say is without merit.

In an interview with a reporter from the British newspaper The Sunday Times, James Watson, a 79-year-old geneticist, said he was "inherently gloomy about the prospect of Africa" because "all our social policies are based on the fact that their intelligence is the same as ours — whereas all the testing says not really," according to the publication's Web site, www. timesonline.co.uk.

Lou Densmore, a professor and director of undergraduate research in the Department of Biology at Tech, said he does not

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believe there is a correlation between race and intelligence.

"There's no indication from anything that I've ever heard or ever read that that's even remotely close to fact," he said. "It's really difficult for me to swallow that there are going to be racial differences in intelligence. I'm not saying that because it's politically correct; I'm saying it because I just don't think it's probably true."

According to the article, Watson said he hoped everyone was equal but said "people who have to deal with black employees find this not true."

Watson's statements, which were published Wednesday, were made during a tour of the U.S. and the United Kingdom to promote his new book, "Avoid Boring People: Lessons from a Life in Science."

"My first impression when I heard about this was that it was simply senile ravings of an old man," Densmore said. "It could also have been a conscious attempt to garner some sort of press coverage about his new book, but as sad as it makes me to say so, it may also be the personal prejudices of a person that has been given an international forum to speak his mind about lots of topics because of his scientific accomplishments, including those for which he has no data."

Though disagreeing with Watson's claims, Densmore said he believes Watson has been valuable in researching molecular biology.

"In fact he's an author of a book that I use in molecular biology," he said, "but as far as his major contributions in biology, I don't think they've continued on to the same degree, which doesn't mean to say that he's not an important scientist. It just means that I think he's become a little bit more of a



Tech soccer prepares for Senior Day

The Texas Tech women's soccer team could accomplish a feat not seen since 1999

Wins against Oklahoma and Oklahoma State would secure Tech a spot in the Big 12 Conference Tournament. The Red Raiders play Oklahoma at 7 p.m. Friday in Norman, Olka., and Oklahoma State at 1 p.m. Sunday at R.P. Fuller Stadium.

Tech won back-to-back conference games for the first time since 2000 after defeating Iowa State Oct. 12, and Nebraska Sunday in Lubbock


