Substitutions **Authorized for** 1965 Programs

of flexibility in farm operations, substitution between wheat and feed grains are authorized under the 1965 programs according to the Callahan County ASC office.

The substitution applies on farms only if the farm has a feed grain base, or oat-rye base, and a wheat allotment. The substitution provisions can be used by farmers who take part in both programs and make at least the minimum diversion for both wheat and feed grains.

As this year's program, marketing certificates will be issued to wheat farmers taking part, but the number of certificates alloted to a farm will not be increased because of the wheatsubstitution.

The total wheat production of farmers who carry out wheat program provisions will be eligible for price support loans even though the wheat acreage is in the substitution provisions.


