Fugitive waives extradition in hearing

HOUSTON (AP) — One of Wisconsin's most wanted fugitives told a judge he would not fight extradition during a makeshift hearing Thursday morning in an ambulance parked behind a Houston courthouse.

Timothy Riley, 46, who is on Wisconsin's top ten most wanted list, fled parole in his home state for aggravated sexual abuse of a child. He was strapped to a gurney during the hearing outside the Harris County criminal courthouse.

Police find body of missing student

ELDORADO, Kan. (AP)—A body found in Kansas appears to be that of a missing college student who led a secret life as an Internet porn star, police said Thursday.

Authorities said the preliminary physical description of the body found about 50 miles east of El Dorado matches that of missing college student Emily Sander. Investigators refused to give details about the state of the body or how it was found.

Sander's case drew wide attention after it was revealed that she appeared nude on a popular adult Web site.

Musharraf sworn in as president

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Pervez Musharraf embarked on a new five-year term as Pakistan's civilian president Thursday, but gave no indication of when emergency rule will be lifted — a key demand of both his domestic rivals and the United States.

The inauguration ceremony came a day after he ended a fourdecade military career as part of his long-delayed pledge not to serve as both president and army chief.

Tech Library honors coach Knight for donations, generosity

he Texas Tech University Library celebrated the generosity of men's basketball coach Bob Knight by hosting A Legacy of Giving: The Bob Knight Exhibit on Thursday night.

Tech students, faculty members and Lubbock residents were in attendance as Knight prepared to speak about the importance of the library on campus, but first, he posed a question.

"If any of you come from farms or ranches where your dad would allow me to hunt, I would appreciate it," he said to a laughing audience. "Just as long as your dad isn't a lying 'sonbitch,' that would be great for me; I would enjoy that immensely."

Crabtree named to All-American team

Texas Tech receiver Michael Crabtree grabbed another honor

Being named an All-American by the American Football Coaches Association may be his most significant award to date.

"It's a good reflection on the whole program," Tech quarterback Graham Harrell said. "It's good for us. A lot of the times people say receivers are products of the system and whatever. I think it kind of helps break that label. Help us get some big time recruits. Big time receivers get interested in Texas Tech."

Crabtree is coming off a regular season in which he broke numerous Tech records.

He leads the nation in receiving with 125 receptions, 1,861 yards and 21 receiving touchdowns, all NCAA freshman records. Crabtree has led the nation in receiving since the first game of

Crabtree is the first freshman AFCA All-American since three-time winner and former Georgia running back Herschel Walker, who played for Georgia from 1980 to 1982. Walker also is the only player to be named to the AFCA All-American team three times.

Crabtree was unavailable for comment.

The AFCA has been selecting All-Americans since 1945. Crabtree also is a finalist for the Biletnikoff Award recognizing the nation's best receiver.

Tech faculty recognized among most productive in nation

Texas Tech faculty members in three academic departments and programs have been recognized as being among the top 10 in the nation in the 2007 Academic Analytic's Faculty Scholarly Productivity Index.

Tech's composition, rhetoric and writing program in the Department of English ranked fifth in its respective category, the Department of Industrial Engineering ranked sixth in its category and the wildlife sciences program ranked eighth in the nation in its category, according to the index, which is available on The Chronicle of Education's Web site, www. chronicle.com.

Sam Dragga, chair of Tech's Department of English, said he believes receiving the recognition increases the university's national visibility as a competitive academic institution.

Dragga said Tech being recognized as having highly productive teachers will make Tech alumni' degrees more competitive.

Rich Rice, an assistant professor of English at Tech, said the Academic Analytic's index measures productivity in terms of faculty members' articles and books published, grants earned and the use of their ideas in other researchers'

He said he credits part of his contribution to Tech's recognition to having cowritten two books that have sold more than 70,000 copies each — books that he believes have made a

"To be listed as one of the top 10 of being productive means to me that we're doing a really good job at teaching because all of our projects are in some way related to teaching," he said.

The 15 technical communication rhetoric faculty members at Tech included in the index's distinction earned the recognition, in part, for incorporating their research into their teaching, Rice said.

"Research is really the flip side of the coin of teaching," he said. "If I'm able to produce a book and that book is used to teach other people, it is much better than just having the accolade of a book being published."

Rice said being recognized for having productive English faculty members can help in reassuring students of the quality of their

America's first woman in space, Sally Ride, will keynote the 2007 Texas Boosting Engineering, Science and Technology Robotics Competition at 8 p.m. today in the City Bank Municipal Coliseum.

Kambra Bolch, associate vice provost at Texas Tech, said the competition, which the university is hosting for the second year in a row, is an opportunity for area high school and middle school students to design, build and test robots. The competition is intended to inspire students to consider careers in math, science, engineering and technology.

Bolch said Ride, a former NASA astronaut who became the first American woman in space in 1983, was invited to speak at the competition's opening ceremony not only for her achievements as an astronaut, but also for her involvement as president and CEO of Sally Ride Science, a company focusing on supporting students' interests in science, math and technology.

Graveyard shift soon to be listed as 'probable' cause of cancer

LONDON (AP) — Like UV breast cancer. rays and diesel exhaust fumes, work-

It is a surprising step validating a concept once considered wacky. And it is based on research that finds higher rates of breast and prostate cancer among women and men have found that women working at whose work day starts after dark.

Next month, the International Agency for Research on Cancer, the cancer arm of the World Health Organization, will add overnight shift work as a probable carcinogen.

The higher cancer rates don't prove working overnight can cause cancer. There may be other factors common among graveyard shift workers that raise their risk for

However, scientists suspect that overnight work is dangerous because it disrupts the circadian rhythm, the body's biological clock. The hormone melatonin, which can suppress tumor development, is normally produced

Scientists believe having lower melatonin levels can raise the risk of developing cancer. Light shuts down melatonin production, so people working in artificial light at night may have lower melatonin levels.

Melatonin can be taken as a supplement, but experts don't recommend it long-term, since that could ruin the body's ability to produce it naturally.




