A farmer who is eligible for credit from regular lending sources is not eligible for a loan from the Farmers Home Administra-

"Using this system of operation, the agency has helped 650 families in Bailey county toward better farming and better living with farm purchase and farm ocerating 'cans," Mr Wilson said. In the past 12 month 200 applications have been received for this type of credit.

THE PROBLEM OF EROSION W. E. Moore of the Soil Conservation District has furnished us with a copy of a USDA booklet entitled Our American Land and

from its interesting pages we lift the following from the article under the above title: What Is Erosion?

Soil is not permanent Under many conditions it is extremely unstable. When wind or water move across bare earth they usually carry some soil with them. They may move it hundreds of miles or only a short distance, but eventually they carry away large amounts of soil unless it is tied down.

Dense plant growth helps to slow down this soil movement. This gives nature time to replace what little soil is removed by erosion. Nature does this by constantly forming new topsoil from underlying subsoil and rock. This slow process, known as natural erosion, o- "geologic erosion," goes on unnoticed over hundreds of years. This type is not dangerous usually; it may be beneficial to man and the earth. Many fine agricultural areas have been formed in this way.

But where land is cultivated or left bare, another and faster kind of erosion occurs This is accelerated

carelessness. When land is cultivated there is no dense growth of tion methods. plants so erosion may be a thousand times faster than on protected land. Accelerated erosion damages grass lands whn the grass is thinned out by overgrazing. It damages woodlands left bare by overcutting, overgrazing and burning. This is what we now know as soil erosion, and unless it is checked it may ruin our good

What has happened to our land?

Man seems to have a habit of wasting the gifts of nature. Nowhere has our waste has been greater, however than in our misuse of land. A survey made in 1934 indicated that we had let erosion badly damage or ruin about 282 acres of the country's crop and grazing land. Another 775 million acres of our crop, grazing, forest and other kinds of land had eroded to some extent. This is tragic, because so many families have lost a means of earning a living It is tragic because productive land is the basic resource from which future generations must live. Generally the worst erosion has taken place on the farm lands of southern United States where erosion goes on at all seasons.

) HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article VIII
of the Constitution of the State of Texas
to provide that Three Thousand Dollars
(\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of

law shall be exempt from all taxation for
all State purposes; providing the effective
date; providing for the submission of said
Amendment to a vote of the qualified voters at an election and providing for necessary proclamation and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 1-b and 1-c be
added to Article VIII of the Constitution
of the State of Texas to read as follows:
"Section 1-b. Three Thousand Dollars
(\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of
all residence homesteads as new defined by
law shall be exempt from all taxation for
all State purposes.
"Section lee. Provided, however, the

24 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this Resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amend-ment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State

the Constitutional Amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the accessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

EE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows:

"Section 1-a, From and after January 1, 1951, no State advalorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$8,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.







BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speakes, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the high-

shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Spanier, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor.



Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and smount as they would receive wh

"Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000,00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.




