PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

H. J. R. No. 33 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 2 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their resignation to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article 2 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows: "Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their resignation to active duty where and when needed."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age or disability and for their resignation to active duty where and when needed."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

H. L. R. No. 23 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows: "Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty percent (3%) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of roads to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.

Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

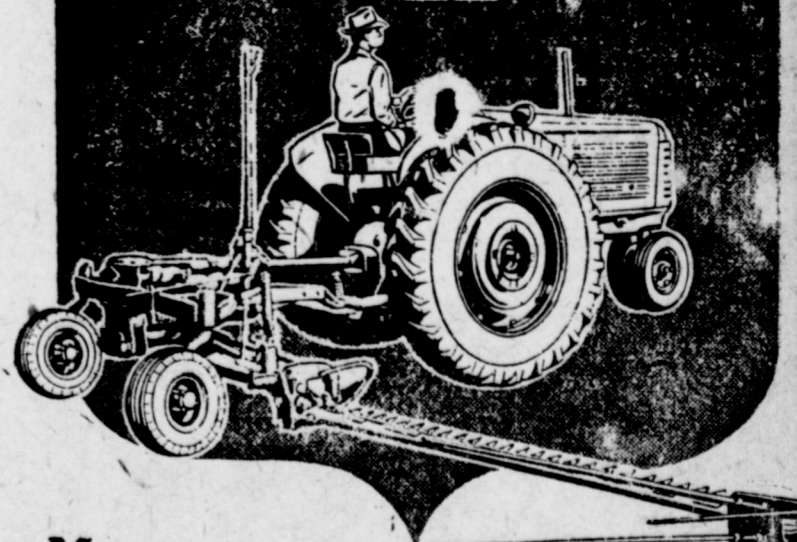

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

H. J. R. No. 12  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may by writing partition between themselves in severality or into undivided interests all or any part of their community property whereupon without prejudice to the rights of existing creditors the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse; further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:  
"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her husband, provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument partition between themselves in severality or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse."  
This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of execution of such instruments, and providing for their recordation, and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and providing for their recordation and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipatory hereto, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect just as though this Constitutional Amendment was in effect when the Act was passed.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas provided that husband and wife from time to time may by writing partition between themselves in severality or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."  
Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may by writing partition between themselves in severality or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."  
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

**Figures On 1948 Crops Are Released**

College Station.—Texas has about the same total number of acres in crops this year as last, but there is a big change in the acreage of some crops, says E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A. & M. College.

The July report from the USDA crop estimates office in Austin indicates a shift of around 2 million acres from wheat and oats to cotton and sorghums. Wheat acreage is cut down about a million and a half, while oat acreage is down a half

million, says Miller. Texas land under cotton went up about three-fourths of a million acres, and sorghums climbed a million and a quarter 3 million acres, 5 per cent below last year and the smallest acreage for harvest since 1925. Grain sorghums are still replacing some of the corn land. The grain sorghum land stands over 6 million acres, more than twice the corn total.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

H. J. R. No. 35  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; providing the effective date; providing for the submission of said Amendment to a vote of the qualified voters at an election and providing for necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Sections 1-b and 1-c be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows: "Section 1-b. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes."  
Section 1-c. Provided, however, the terms of this Resolution shall not be effective unless House Joint Resolution No. 24 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this Resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951."

**Typhus Fever Said Prevalent In Texas**

AUSTIN—Statistical information compiled by the State Health Department shows a total of 182 cases of typhus fever so far this year. During the week between July 17-24, seven new cases were reported, one-half the seven year median of fourteen for the week of July 24.

Disease reaches its peak in the month of August, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

Over a five-year period from 1943 to 1947, typhus fever has been responsible for 273 deaths. The death rate has been reduced from sixty-three in 1943, to thirty in 1948.

"Typhus fever as we know it in Texas is transmitted by the fleas of infected rats," Dr. Geo. W. Cox,

State Health Officer, said. "It can be controlled by the simple expedient of consistently maintaining a program of rat poisoning, rat trapping and rat proofing."

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

H. J. R. No. 7  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an Amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 2a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as and the same is hereby amended, by adding another section to follow Section 2, and be designated Section 2a, to read as follows: "Section 2a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the office of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any successor to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

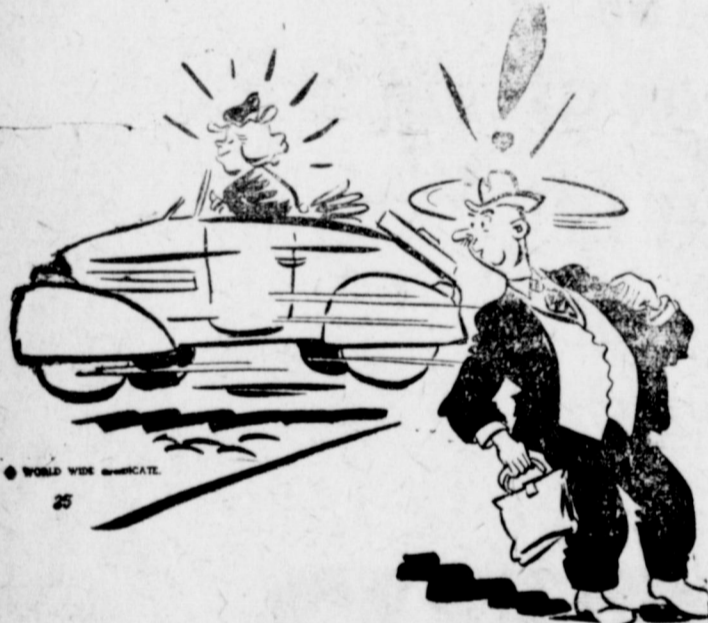

Sanders A Director Of West Texas C C

Homer Sanders, Muleshoe lumberman, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, was given a write-up in the current issue of West Texas Today, official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Sanders is a member of the regional body's board of directors. The article follows:

Muleshoe's Homer Sanders is no newcomer to WTCC's board. He first became a director at Silvertown in 1935 and served there until his removal to Bailey County in 1945. At Muleshoe he succeeds the late R. L. Brown, another WTCC pioneer member and a director, continuously since 1923 until his passing, last January, removed from the earthly scene a true top West Texan.

Willson of Floydada—now second vice-president of the WTCC and head of the well known lumber chain bearing his name in 11 West Texas towns—and is co-owner with Mr. Willson and operator of the yard at Muleshoe.

He has successively lived at Floydada, Quitaque, Silvertown and now Muleshoe. In 1934 he was Democratic county chairman for Briscoe

County; chairman of War Bond sales throughout World War II; of the school boards at Quitaque and Silvertown; and led Red Cross and other activities. Currently he is president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

Spraying Weeds Gets The Job Done

College Station.—Three hundred and forty acres of bindweeds were sprayed with 2, 4-D on Gray county farms during May with one county owned sprayer, reports Co. Agent Ralph R. Thomas.

The 150 gallon sprayer was mounted on a pickup truck and equipped with low volume nozzles. With 30 pounds pressure and a speed of four and a half miles per hour, the solution was applied at the rate of 10 gallons per acre.

Last year, Thomas pointed out, the two county sprayers, one 150 gallon tank and one 200 gallon tank, sprayed only 220 acres during the summer. And about half of this had two sprayings. Three hundred gallons of 2,4-D to the acre was sprayed on the first time, and 100 gallons the second time.

"We are using the same amount of 2,4-D per acre that we used last year

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 110. An amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to provide insurance for county employees, providing for the Governor's discretion, and submission to the electorate.

SECTION 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 53, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have the name of the proposed Constitutional Amendment providing Workmen's Compensation Insurance for county employees, and "AGAINST" the Constitutional Amendment providing Workmen's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall indicate on one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, in counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

SECTION 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

S. J. R. No. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide a Board of Apportionment, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature to do so shall constitute an appointment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as such. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951.

SECTION 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

SECTION 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

SECTION 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

AUSTIN—Texas farm cash income, totaling \$131,858,000, climbed 23 percent from May to June, the Bureau of Business Research reported.

However, June farm cash income slid 29 percent below June 1947.

Wheat brought Texas farmers \$38,769,000 in June, for the greatest source of farm cash income. Increased marketing of oats, wool, sheep, calves, poultry, eggs, and milk products contributed to the over-all gain from May.

The largest farm cash income was in the Red Bed Plains where farmers' incomes increased 95 percent from a month earlier, totaling \$24,346,000. Black and Grand Prairies' income totaled \$19,652,000, and Edwards Plateau registered \$18,800,000.

**"RAISE MORE PIGS,"  
FARMERS ARE URGED**

Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan has again urged farmers to increase the fall pig crop by at least 10 per cent. Holding back rather than selling, bred sows and gilts now on hand offers the first and most rapid means of increasing the Nation's red meat supply, the Secretary pointed out.

Farmers can plan to expand the number of sows they keep for farrowing this fall with increased confidence, according to Secretary Brannan. This belief is based on (1) ex-

support. Under recent legislation, Government price supports on hogs continue excellent prospects for 1948 feed crop production, (2) the probable strong demand for meats next year, and (3) assurance of continued price during 1949 at 90 per cent of parity. This is the same level of support that has been in effect the past several years. 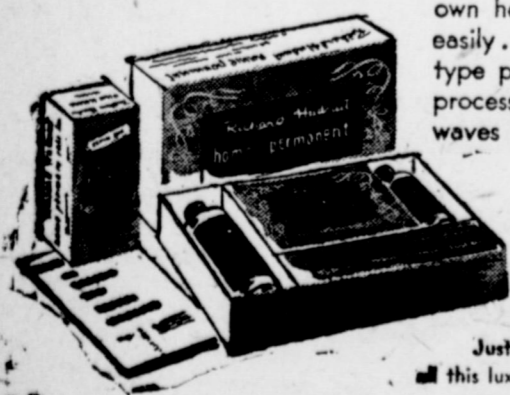
