### Tejano music star regaining consciousness

HOUSTON (AP) — Tejano music star Emilio Navaira is showing signs of improvement, including opening his eyes and moving his limbs, days after being severely injured when his tour bus crashed, his neurosurgeon said Thursday.

Navaira, who had been in a coma since the accident, is slowly regaining consciousness. He moved his arms and legs Wednesday evening, said Dr. Alex Valadka, with Memorial Hermann-Texas Medical Center.

### Gates orders inventory of US nukes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Robert Gates has ordered a full inventory of all nuclear weapons and related materials after the mistaken delivery of ballistic missile fuses to Taiwan, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Gates told officials with the Air Force, Navy and Defense Logistics Agency to assess inventory control procedures for the materials and to submit a report within 60 days.

Earlier this week, Gates directed Navy Adm. Kirkland H. Donald to take charge of a full investigation of the delivery mistake in which four cone-shaped electrical fuses used in intercontinental ballistic missile warheads were shipped to the Taiwanese instead of the helicopter batteries they had ordered.

# Student recalls military path leading to Tech

A year out of high school, with a steady job under his belt and no intention of joining the military, Richard Rodriguez thought he had life planned

Having a keen interest in computers, he just had taken a job as a flash animator with a computer company in Houston.

"I was 19 years old, sitting at a desk, and I knew that I was going to be doing that for the rest of my life," Rodriguez said. "I could literally feel my butt getting bigger." Rodriguez said his plans changed after the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001. He said he told his boss he was joining the army, and he left Houston

that day to go back to his hometown, Borger, to talk to a recruiter. "That recruiter was the same recruiter that tried to get me to join the military in high school," he said. "I was the most prejudiced about joining

the Army when I was in high school."

After the terrorist attacks, Rodriguez said he knew he did not want to stay at home and let the problems come to him. "Nothing like that had ever happened before in the U.S., at least during my lifetime," he said, "and because it was such a big deal, I figured there

was probably going to be a big conflict." After going through about 30 weeks of training, Rodriguez was stationed in Fort Louis, Wash., as a communications sergeant, he said. Though

he was deployed to many places, the decision that influenced his college career came when he was in Thailand.

"I was sitting in a tent, hooking up wires," he said, "when my captain came up to me and flat out told me that I needed to go to college. He asked me where I wanted to go and even paid for my application fee." Rodriguez said he applied for the Green to Gold program, a scholarship program for enlisted soldiers who want to attend college and become a

## Clashes with Shiites, Iraqi forces increase

BAGHDAD (AP) — The widening clashes between Iraqi forces and Shiite militiamen mean more than a showdown on the streets: it could be a defining moment for U.S.-backed Prime Minister Nouri

Al-Maliki, in office since May 2006, is almost certain to pay a heavy political price if he fails against Shiite militias in battles that began in the southern city of Basra and then flared in Baghdad and other cities.

And he knows the stakes are high. He has promised not to compromise and vowed to battle to the end against the Mahdi Army militia led by anti-American cleric Muqtada al-Sadr.

That's a bold position considering the fight so far.

The Iraqi campaign in Basra - launched this week to uproot Mahdi Army's influence in the important oil center — has been bogged down in the face of strong resistance, desertions and mutiny in government ranks, security officials said Thursday.

But al-Maliki appears unshaken and has turned the fight into a personal test.

He has traveled to Basra, 340 miles south of Baghdad, to take personal charge of the operation — the first major battle waged by Iraqi forces alone without strong U.S. backup. It's a gambit with clear fallout for al-Maliki if Iraqi security forces come up

His political standing would be seriously bruised at a time when he is attempting to play unifier between the nation's three fractious groups: majority Shiites, Sunni Arabs and Kurds.

Sunni leaders, who complain of being sidelined by al-Maliki's government, could feel emboldened and press harder for al-Maliki's ouster.

# City council approves funds for \$6.7 million visitor center

In a 6-1 vote, Lubbock City Council members approved \$6.7 million in funding for a visitor center on the former South Beach nightclub lot.

Funding for the center will come from the city's hotel/ motel tax money, generated largely from out-of-towners who stay in Lubbock. The state restricts city officials on what the hotel/motel tax money can be spent on, and a visitor center is among the list of approved items.

Marcy Jarrett, executive director of the Lubbock Convention and Visitor Bureau, said she was relieved the council approved the budget, as this is a project she has been involved in for several years.

"We've done extensive research over the last three years," Jarrett said. "It was our travel research study that recommended the location because that puts it near two of our top attractors: it is visible from and has easy access to the interstate, as well

as easy access to Texas Tech."

Jarrett said a state report suggests that 2.7 million leisure visitors come to Lubbock each year.

"When they're coming here, how do they know what to do? Where do they get their information?" she asked. "When you drive along the intersection, it looks like there is nothing

According to a travel survey from the bureau, 80 percent of Lubbock visitors said they likely would visit the center.

"One overnight stay gives us \$322.80 in economic impact," Jarrett said. "If even 20 percent of the people that we estimated using the visitor center stayed just one night, that is over \$1.5 million in economic impact."

In addition to generating more than \$1 million in hotel/ motel tax revenue, Jarrett said she expects more revenue to be generated when it comes to sales tax. Money generated from sales tax can be used in the city's general spending fund, she said.

In addition to being a revenue tool for the city, Jarrett

said she predicted the visitor center will be used as a tool to recruit Tech students.

"Imagine the families that come through in the summer

who have kids in junior high and didn't even know Texas Tech was in Lubbock," said Jarrett. "It gives the university increased exposure at no charge."

Todd Klein, councilman for District 3, issued a statement Wednesday in a news release explaining why he was not in favor of building the visitor center.

"A visitor center in and of itself does not generate tourism," Klein said in the news release. "Additional visitors will not come to Lubbock simply because we have a \$6.7 million tourist information center, and I believe there are better ways to achieve the very laudable goal of increasing tourism

One technique Klein said he suggested the city use to promote tourism was placing information kiosks in key areas

# Tech colloquium to promote diversity in graduate schools

Texas Tech will host a higher education summit targeting underrepresented students during the Lone Star Graduate Diversity Colloquium today and Saturday in the Student Union Building.

Shannon Samson, coordinator for graduate recruiting at Tech, said the university is hosting more than 30 universities in Texas, including Baylor, Texas A&M and the University of Texas at Austin.

"The underlying mission of this event is that we are trying to not only promote graduate education in the state of Texas," Samson said, "but we are trying to encourage our promising students to stay in the state of Texas to pursue their graduate degree ... with a particular eye to students from historically underrepresented populations."

Samson, who is on a steering committee hosted by the Association of Texas Graduate School Deans focused on keeping the event going and directing its future activities, said the colloquium is in its third year and previously has been hosted by UT and Texas A&M.

"It's going to bring different voices, and it's going to help us - those of us who our business is recruiting graduate students and promoting our particular university," she said. "It's a great opportunity for us to just talk to students."

Though Samson said the university closed registration for the event Wednesday with just fewer than 300 students and recruiters com-

mitted to attending, she encourages cause they are not fully realizing their other students interested in graduate school who did not register to attend seminars and programs with additional room.

Included in the colloquium, Samson said, will be sessions featuring student speakers, training and preparation for the GMAT, GRE and LSAT tests and a seminar focusing on the application process for a graduate degree in the Health Sciences Center.

"The goal for this is to have kind of a one-stop-shop for preparing for graduate school," she said.

The colloquium also will offer multiple sessions focused on funding graduate education, Samson said.

"A lot of students have problems with their student loans and knowing how to go about the process of taking loans in a way that you're not oppressed by them for the rest of your life," she said.

Juan Munoz, special assistant to the president at Tech, said he encourages students to consider graduate school because a graduate education often offers greater professional flexibility, a greater income potential and prepares students for the changing educational needs of potential employers.

"You've got to have the intellectual wherewithal to change as markets and industry and products equally change," he said, "and graduate school affords you that advanced understanding."

Though Munoz said minorities currently and historically are underrepresented in higher education "beincome potential," he believes it is important to target first generation students and women because "first generation students are (the most) underrepresented of any ethnic persuasion and because there continues to be an earning gap between men and women."

"Women need to pursue advanced degrees in order to constraint that gap," he said.

Munoz, who also is on the colloquium's steering committee, said the concept for the colloquium was introduced by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board with the idea that, over time, different campuses would host the annual conference with the purpose of encouraging Texas undergraduates to attend graduate school in the state.

Munoz said he anticipates hosting the colloquium will bring added attention to Tech's graduate programs, as the current registration of undergraduate and transfer students. - and representatives from universities from across the state — exceeds that of the colloquia at UT and Texas A&M combined.

Though the colloquium begins today with student activities and a graduate student roundtable at 4 p.m. in the Student Union Canyon room, most of the seminars and events are scheduled between 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Saturday in the Student Union and other locations on campus, according to the Web site, www.depts.ttu.edu/gradschool/ lsdc/index.php.


"The physical training is for those who are really serious about the program and want to become commissioned upon graduation," Buscher

McNeill said he tries to push that message across to his players, keeping them humbled and


