

Officers enter grounds of polygamist compound

ELDORADO (AP) - Law enforcement agents entered an enormous temple on the grounds of a polygamist compound, but by Sunday morning they still had not found a 16-year-old girl whose initial report of abuse led to the raid.

"There were some tense moments last night, but everything has remained calm and peaceful and they are continuing their search," said Allison Palmer, a prosecutor from a nearby county handling the case, early Sunday.

Bush, Putin divided on missile defense plan

SOCHI, Russia (AP) — President Bush and Russian President Vladimir Putin failed to overcome sharp differences over a U.S. missile defense system, closing their seven-year relationship Sunday still far apart on an issue that has separated them from the beginning.

"Our fundamental attitude toward the American plan has not changed," Putin said at a news conference with

Bush at his vacation house at this was eager to work with him. Black Sea resort. "We got a lot of way to go," Bush said. Despite the impasse, the two leaders agreed that Moscow and Washington would work together closely in the future on missile defense and other difficult issues.

Bush also conferred with Putin's hand-picked successor, Dmitry Medvedev, but did not claim gaining any insight into his soul, as he had with Putin upon their first encounter. He pronounced Putin's protege "a straightforward fellow" and said he

Putin was asked whether he - or Medvedev, the president-elect would be in charge of Russia's foreign policy after May 7, when Putin steps 'down as president and is expected to be named prime minister.

Putin said Medvedev would be in charge, and would represent Russia at the Group of Eight meeting of industrial democracies in July in Tokyo. "Mr. Medvedev has been one of the co-authors of Russia's foreign policy," Putin said. "He's completely on top


of things.'

National Security Adviser Stephen Hadley, when asked later whether he thought Putin actually was going to cede authority on Russian foreign policy to Medvedev, said, "My guess is that these two men who have worked very closely together for now almost two decades will have a very collaborative relationship. That seems to be a good thing, not a bad thing."

Hadley, who spoke with reporters aboard Air Force One on the way home to Washington, also said he

didn't see any prospect of a breakthrough on missile defense before Bush leaves office next January. "They can leave that to their prospective successors," he said.

At their 28th and presumably final meeting as heads of state, Bush and Putin sought to emphasize their good personal relations, praising each other extensively. But they also both acknowledged remaining strong disagreements, principally missile defense and NATO's eastward expansion.

20 killed as gunmen release students seized

BAGHDAD (AP) — Iraqi troops backed by U.S. forces battled Shiite fighters in Baghdad's Sadr City neighborhood in clashes that killed 20 people and wounded more than 50 despite a cease-fire between the government and the militia, officials said Sunday.

To the north, police said gunmen seized 42 students off a bus near the city of Mosul - al-Qaida's last major urban stronghold — but later released them unharmed.

Boots and blood, dust and mud: Rodeo lovers recapture adolescence

As a thin layer of dust covered the crowd's knuckles, another pair of cowboy boots hit dirt after surviving more than four seconds on the back of an angry, one-ton goliath of a bull.

Marine Lt. Cpl. Cole Stanley of Lubbock said the rodeo is a yearly tradition for him, and he would not miss it for the world.

"I go every year," Stanley said. "It brings back childhood memories."

Many people were creating their own childhood memories - each being sucked in by different rodeo attractions.

"I like the clowns," 5-year-old Jaquline Hernandez said, her face and fingers covered with cotton candy. "I also like horses, especially the white one."

Hernandez's mother, Rebecca Villa, said the rodeo was a family affair.

"I love that my kids are getting to experience something that details the uniqueness of West Texas," she said. "This is where they are from, and I want them to know what that means."

Even those who are involved with the rodeo said the love started before they hit 3 feet in height.

"I grew up in Texas and around horses; it's just something that becomes a part of your system," Jordyn Concle, a barrel racer from Tyler, said. "I was in love the minute I sat up in a saddle."

Concle said she had lost her motivation at times but always managed to come back to find her place in the stirrups.

"I've taken a few pretty bad spills, and that can really scare you away, but it truly is an addiction," she said. "My dad told me, the first time I was injured, that I have to get right back in the saddle, because if I took too much time to think about it, I might never want to again."

The true fans said they would continue to come back and get their yearly bull-driven rush, and Stanley said there was a particular reason he was drawn back to the cattle-filled arena vear after vear.

"I just like the bull rides; it looks like a rush," he said. "I've always wanted to do it, but I've never had the balls. Plus, I love the cowgirls." ▶ ja.eicher@ttu.edu

Student government officials step down, swear in successors

Texas Tech's Student Government Association leaders swore in the next batch of executive officers and student senators at an emotionally charged banquet in downtown Lubbock Friday evening.

Addressing an audience of prominent Lubbock personalities, including Lubbock Mayor David Miller and Tech President Jon Whitmore, the 2007-08 group of student leaders officially stepped down from their positions and offered words of encouragement and advice to the 2008-09 group of elected student representatives, whose terms begin today.

Looking back upon his past year in office, Mason Moses, now the former SGA president, offered words of advice to those who will be leading next year's student body.

"You must have a strong sense of service," he said. "We are here to serve our fellow students. That is our sole responsibility. That is our sole charge.'

Also, Moses commended his fellow leaders for their accomplishments in the last year. He applauded Scott Gorenc, former vice president for graduate and professional affairs, for successfully bringing renovations to the lobby of the Architecture building.

He then thanked Taylor Hutcherson, now the former SGA external vice president, for making the on-campus bus system

run the "smoothest" Moses ever has seen.

Speaking to Suzette Matthews, former SGA internal vice president, Moses said the two were not friends when they met several years ago as members of the Freshman Council, but now, as close friends, Moses lauded Matthews' ability to make the leisure pool a reality and for her adroit administration of what was a "young" student senate.

"You all were young," Moses said to the 2007-08 student senate, "but you were all ready to make some big changes."

Hutcherson also reiterated the fundamental role of elected student officials in his own farewell speech to the audience.

"You were elected by the student body, and they are your bosses," he said. "Don't forget that."

Matthews' last year as the SGA internal vice president "has flown by" and now seems so "surreal," she said in her tearyeyed farewell speech, but she looks forward to the next year of administration by the new group of student leaders.

Speaking to the next group of student leaders, Matthews said they should be prepared to "sign your life over to Texas Tech," which she, herself, did and regards as "honestly, the best decision I have ever made.'

Now in a time of transition, the SGA looks to its new leaders for guidance and vision, said Michael Shonrock, Tech's vice president of Student Affairs, remembering the last year

Despite approximately 10 percent of the recipients failing to receive the messages, Ron Seacrist, chief of the Tech Police Department, said he believes the test was a success.

"That means 90 percent of the people we're trying to get ahold of, we're able to get ahold of," he said. "I'd love to see 100 percent, but that's dependent upon, again, the community has to be part of it and has to give us the information."

Seacrist said the notification system is the most effective and efficient way for the police department and other university officials to make an emergency notification to everyone on campus at one time.



Zimbabwe's ruling party demands election recount

- President Robert Mugabe's ruling party demanded a vote recount and a further delay in the release of presidential election results, the state Sunday Mail newspaper reported, prompting outrage from the opposition party.

Meanwhile, militant supporters of the ruling party invaded eight of the few remaining white-owned commercial farms, the farmers reported, another sign Mugabe plans to use violence to stay in power. At least four cattle ranchers

were driven off their land, and equipment and livestock were seized, the farmers said.

"I've got one farmer and his wife with two young children, and people banging on windows, ululating and beating drums and telling them to vacate the farm," in northern Centenary, Hendrik Olivier, the head of the Commercial Farmers' Union told The Associated Press.





Woman may need rabies shots after biting pit bull

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Amy Rice feared for her dog's life when a pit bull jumped over a fence into her yard and attacked her pooch. So she took matters into her own mouth.

Rice says she bit the pit bull on the nose Friday after trying to pull the dog's jaws off her Labrador retriever, Ella. The dog had jumped a fence to get into Rice's northeast Minneapolis yard, and Rice says she feared the pit bull would kill Ella.

"I didn't plan it, that's what happened. I broke the skin and had pit bull blood in my mouth," said Rice, 38. "I knew what happened, and I knew that it wasn't good."

The pit bull was quarantined Wednesday by Minneapolis Animal Control officers while rabies tests are being completed. Rice's doctor will determine whether she needs shots for rabies.

"I was sure that my dog was dying in my arms; it was horrible," Rice said.

Ella is recovering with staples and stitches to her head and a crushed ear canal, but she is afraid to go for walks, Rice said.

Purdue team concocts hamburger-making device.

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP) - A team of Purdue University students concocted a 156-step recipe to prepare a hamburger to win Saturday's annual national Rube Goldberg Machine Contest.

This year's task was to assemble a burger consisting of no less than one precooked meat patty, two vegetables and two condiments, sandwiched between two bun halves.

The victory by the 17-member Purdue Society of Professional Engineers was the team's third such win in the past four years in the contest, named for the late cartoonist known for his drawings of complicated devices performing simple tasks.

Texas A&M University placed second; the University at Buffalo in New York was third.

After winning the regional contest in February, Purdue's team added 55 more steps to perfect its machine, said captain Drew Wischer.

"We put 4,000 to 5,000 man-hours into this machine since September, and all the hard work has been well worth it," said Wischer, a senior in aviation technology from Cedarburg, Wis.

The competition, sponsored by Phi Chapter of Theta Tau fraternity, rewards machines that most effectively combine creativity with inefficiency and complexity. Machines must complete the assigned task in 20 or more steps

Winning machines must complete two successful runs. Points are deducted if students have to assist the machine once it has started. Judges award points on the creative use of materials, team chemistry, flow of the machine and each machine's theme.

Other teams competing Saturday were Ferris State University in Michigan; Michigan Technological University; Penn State University Brandywine; and the University of Texas at Austin.

Chimp grabbed dart gun before being shot to death

AUSTIN (AP) — A 140-pound chimpanzee escaped from a research center by jumping more than 15 feet, snatched a tranquilizer dart gun from an animal worker and threatened police by flailing its arms before an officer shot and killed the animal last month, according to a new report.

Officials said the University of Texas police officer who shot Tony shouted he was going to shoot before firing at the 17-year-old chimpanzee.

Bombing at Sri Lanka marathon kills government minister, 11 others; more than 90 wounded

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) - A suicide bomber attacked the opening ceremony of a marathon outside Sri Lanka's capital Sunday, killing a government minister and 11 other people, authorities said. Dozens were wounded.

Officials blamed the bombing, the second this year resulting in the death of a senior government official, on Tamil Tiger rebels.

Runners and onlookers gathered at the starting line of the marathon in Weliweriya, 12 miles from Colombo, part of the national celebration of the upcoming Sinhalese New Year.

Jeyaraj Fernandopulle, the minister of highways and the ruling party's chief whip, approached the starting line with a flag he planned to wave to start the race when the bomb exploded, witnesses said.

"There was a sound of huge explosion and I saw a fireball" said Nishan Priyantha, a local journalist who stood few yards away from the blast, but escaped unhurt.

Television footage showed chaotic images of screaming people running through the bloodied streets.

Fernandopulle, an acid-tongued politician who acted as the government's chief political enforcer and was considered a top rebel target, died on the spot, said government

spokesman Lakshman Hulugalle, blaming the rebels.

"I saw the minister's body. It had been torn into pieces below the waist and there were other bodies without heads and legs," Priyantha said.

Eleven others were killed — including 1992 Olympic marathoner K.A. Karunaratne and national athletic coach Lakshman de Alwis — and more than 90 were wounded, Hulugalla said.

President Mahinda Rajapaksa condemned the attack as an act of savagery and vowed to push ahead with the war on the rebels.

"This dastardly act will not weaken our resolve to eradicate terrorism from our midst, and bring peace, harmony and democracy to all our people," he said in a statement.

Rebel spokesman Rasiah Ilanthirayan did not answer calls seeking comment. The Tamil Tigers, listed as a terror group by the United States and European Union, routinely deny responsibility for such attacks.

Fighting in Sri Lanka has increased in recent months since the government officially ended a sixyear cease-fire in January. The truce had been faltering for more than two years as escalating violence killed about 5,000 people.

The military has vowed to crush the rebels by the end of the year, but diplomats and other observers say the army is facing more resistance than it expected.

Tony's escape and death were detailed in an internal report obtained by the Austin American-Statesman through an open-records request.

The chimpanzee escaped March 12 from his area at the Keeling Center for Comparative Medicine and Research in Bastrop. The center is managed by the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

Tony's escape was one of three at the center since November. Another 17-year-old chimp, Jake, got out of his enclosure in November and again this week but was quickly recaptured each time.

Tony got out by bounding 15 feet from a jungle gym and grabbing the top of a corral wall, according to the report. Tranquilizer darts failed to stop him.

According to the report, the police officer, who was not named, saw Tony jump into a truck bed and lunge at an attendant.


"The chimpanzee took the attendant's dart gun away from him and discarded it," the report said.

The chimp either fell off the truck or jumped from it when the truck sped up, according to the report. The officer said Tony started coming toward him.



Charlton Heston, dead at 84, left political mark to rival cinematic legacy

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Nancy Reagan was heartbroken over Charlton Heston's death. President Bush hailed him as a "strong advocate for liberty," while John McCain called Heston a devotee for civil and constitutional rights.

Even Michael Moore, who mocked Heston in his gun-control documentary "Bowling for Columbine," posted the actor's picture on his Web site to mark his passing.

Heston, who died Saturday night at 84, was a towering figure both in his politics and on screen, where his characters had the ear of God (Moses in "The Ten Commandments"), survived apocalyptic plagues ("The Omega Man") and endured one of Hollywood's most-grueling action sequences (the chariot race in "Ben-Hur," which earned him the best-actor Academy Award).

Better known in recent years as a fierce gun-rights advocate who headed the National Rifle Association, Heston played legendary leaders and ordinary men hurled into heroic struggles.

"In taking on epic and commanding roles, he showed himself to be one of our nation's most gifted actors, and his legacy will forever be a part of our cinema," Republican presidential candidate McCain said in a statement that also noted Heston's involvement in the civil-rights movement and his stand against gun control.

Heston's jutting jaw, regal bearing and booming voice served him well as Marc Antony in "Julius chariot race in "Ben-Hur." Caesar" and "Antony and Cleopatra," Michelangelo in "The Agony and the Ecstasy," John the Baptist in "The Greatest Story Ever Told" and an astronaut on a topsy-turvy world where simians rule in "Planet of the Apes."

"Charlton Heston was seen by the world as larger than life," Heston's family said in a statement. "We knew him as an adoring husband, a kind and devoted father, and a gentle grandfather with an infectious sense of humor. He served these far greater roles with tremendous faith, courage and dignity."

The actor died at his home in Beverly Hills with his wife, Lydia, at his side, family spokesman Bill Powers said. He declined to comment on the cause of death or provide further details Sunday.

One of the biggest box-office draws of the 1950s, '60s and '70s, Heston's work dwindled largely to small parts and narration and other voice roles from the 1980s on, including an uncredited cameo as an ape in Tim Burton's 2001 remake of "Planet of the Apes."

Fans remember Heston for some of the most epic moments on film: Parting the Red Sea as Moses in "The Ten Commandments," cursing his self-destructive species as he stumbles on the remnants of the teers," "Midway" and "Soylent Green."

Statue of Liberty in "Planet of the Apes," tearing hell-bent through the

"Ben-Hur" earned 11 Oscars, the most ever until 1997's "Titanic" and 2003's "The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King" tied it.

Born Charles Carter in a Chicago suburb on Oct. 4, 1923, Heston grew up in the Michigan wilderness, where his father operated a lumber mill.

Heston took up acting after serving in the Army during World War II. He took his professional name from his mother's maiden name, Charlton, and the last name of his stepfather, Chester Heston, whom she married after his parents' divorce.

After his movie debut in two independent films by a college classmate, Heston was put under contract by producer Hal B. Wallis ("Casablanca"). Cecil B. DeMille cast him as the circus manager in "The Greatest Show on Earth" and then as Moses in "The Ten Commandments."

He followed with Orson Welles' "Touch of Evil," William Wyler's "The Big Country" and the sea saga "The Wreck of the Mary Deare" before "Ben-Hur" elevated Heston to the top of Hollywood's A-list.

His later films included "Earthquake," "El Cid," "The Three Muske-




