IT IS DIFFICULT to say which is getting the most coffee-cup discussion in Baird this week -the basketball season or the approaching visit by exchange students from Peru.

Few, if any, events in Baird's history have drawn more cooperative effort from the entire community than the program for this weekend.





Item 3. The term "refuse" shall be interpreted to mean all solid wastes, including garbage and rubbish.

Item 4. The term "garbage" as used in this ordinance shall mean all putrescible wastes, except sewage and body wastes, including all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, and carcasses of small dead animals and dead fowls from any premises within the city limits.

Item 5. The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean tin cans, bottles, papers, tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 3 feet), papers, etc., from any premises within the city limits.

Item 6. "City Health Officer" as used herein shall mean the City Health Officer of the City Garbage and Rubbish

Item 1. It shall be the duty tion owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where garmaintain in good order and reportable container or containers the City Health Officer. for refuse, which shall be made of galvanized metal not easily corrodible, rodent and fly proof, with a tight-fitting lid which shall not be removed except when depositing or removing the contents of the receptacle, and with handles on the sides, and of sufficient capacity and in sufficient numbers to accomodate and securely keep all the garbage and rubbish that may accumulate between collections; provided, that each container shall have a capacity of not less than twenty gallons nor more hibited. than thirty-two gallons. Provided further all containers shall be kept clean and free junk within the city limits is from accumulation of any substance remaining attached to inside of container which would attract or breed flies, mosqui-

ties or any other insects. Item 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm, or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place the daily accumulation of garbage and rubbish in the container or containers required in Section 2, Item 1, and it shall be the duty of every person placing garbage in any such container to eliminate as far as possible all water and liquid from such garbage and so securely wrap garbage in paper before placing same in such container.

Item 3. All ordinary accumulations of rubbish such as tree limbs, paper boxes, and scrap lumber which cannot be conveniently placed in the containers required under this ordinance shall be gathered together, tied or sacked in compact bundles and placed in a location easily accessible for the collec-

SECTION III. Collection of Garbage and Rubbish.

Item 1. The City of Baird, Texas, shall collect from the residential areas of the city not less than twice weekly and from the business area of the city each business day, all garbage and rubbish; provided it shall be the duty of any person in possession or control of any premises to place the containers required in Item 1, Section 2, in a location easily accessible for the collector as directed by the City Health Officer.

Item 2. The places of excessive accumulations of garbage and rubbish, such as killing and dressing plants for fowl, may be excluded from the service provided by the City Garbage Department and such accumu-lations shall then be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge, provided, that the owner or person having such accumulations in charge shall secure from the City Health Department a written permit for removal and disposal of same. Said permit shall be issued only after said Health Officer has satisfied himself that the licensee is capable of complying with the requirements of this ordinance. The permit may be revoked by the City Health Officer when deemed necessary to the public welfare.

Item 3. Heavy dead animals, such as cows horses, and mules, shall be removed and disposed of at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge and by the method directed by the City Health Officer.

The destination of the four truckloads of gold out of Fort liabilities as a part of their gov-Knox remains somewhat of a mystery. With the condition of our balance of payments abroad, some of us feel we should be trucking gold into Fort Knox, rather than taking it out.

It is an essential function of government to provide and maintain a stable currency. At intervals in the history of most nations this has proved a difficult job. Some nations have even fallen when the stability of their currency eroded and inflation ravaged the economy.

The law requires that the United States government keep reserve of gold to back up its currency. Gold was chosen because it is one metal which has kept a stable value for centuries. Our government is required to buy all gold offered it at 35 per ounce.

Federal law requires the reserve to be at least 25 per cent of the amount of Federal Reserve notes (currency) and depercentage. The purpose of the requirement is to provide a brake on the amount of money issued to create confidence in the value of the dollar.

American citizens can not demand gold for dollars, but foreign governments can. The de-mands of a foreign government Abilene Lodges eign governments can. The demust be paid from our supply of gold in excess of the 25 per cent reserve requirement.

In the last fifteen years our short-term liabilities to foreigners callable in gold have increased from about \$131/2 billion to more than \$26 billion. Our total gold holdings have decreased from about \$22 billion to around \$15 billion. Deducting the 25 per cent reserve, this leaves less than \$2 billion in "free" gold to apply against demands from foreign governments on the more than \$26 billion they hold. Only once in the last 15 years have we earned more credits abroad than we marily caused by imports, forbusiness overseas, American stationed in foreign countries, and tourist spending.
