





DDT Proves Effective

On Peach Tree Borer DDT, when used as a trum spray, will control the peach tree borer, according to the New York State agricultural experiment station. The new method of borer control takes the place of older methods using ethylene dichlo of PDB crystals, since it is now injurious, labor-saving, time-saving and inexpensive. DDT is used at the rate of two pounds to each 100 gallons of water.




