

Prosecutors drop some charges in Holy Land trial

DALLAS (AP) - Prosecutors have dropped most charges against two defendants accused of helping a Muslim charity finance terrorism, an apparent sign that the government will focus its case on two other men who were leaders of the group.

Leaders of the Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development are accused of funneling millions of dollars to the Middle East group Hamas, which the U.S. government considers a terrorist organization.

Southern US coast watches Hanna

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — Nervous residents rushed to buy plywood and generators while emergency officials in Georgia, Florida and the Carolinas weighed possible evacuations Tuesday as Tropical Storm Hanna was expected to shift toward a tough-to-predict landfall along the southern Atlantic coast by the end of the week.

Florida Gov. Charlie Crist declared a state of emergency as Hanna, downgraded from hurricane status Tuesday but with ample time to regain strength, was forecast to turn to the northwest from the Bahamas. Emergency officials in Georgia and South Carolina went into 24-hour alert mode.


Probe disputes civilian deaths in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — A U.S. investigation released Tuesday disputed a U.N. report that found "credible evidence" that up to 90 civilians died in a raid on a western Afghan village, saying an afterbattle assessment found most of the victims were Taliban fighters.

The military probe found that up to seven civilians and between 30 and 35 Taliban militants were killed in an operation in Azizabad village in the early morning hours of Aug. 22. The U.N. backed a finding by the Afghan government that all the victims were civilians.

The competing claims illustrate the difficulty of determining how many civilians fall victim in a war fought in distant mountains and densely populated villages.





Energy efficient light bulbs come to Tech, require special disposal

An energy bill signed into law by Pres. Bush in December 2007 will phase out Thomas Edison's incandescent light bulb by 2012.

The Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 calls for bulbs to use 25 percent to 30 percent less energy for the same amount of light.

Most bulbs that currently meet those standards are compact florescent bulbs, which use 75 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs and last up to 10 years, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

But the bright idea is no shock to those who have already implemented the more energy-efficient bulb.

Mark McVay, associate director of the housing facilities and operations at Tech, said residence halls began replacing incandescent bulbs with compact flo-

President Bush praises McCain, Thompson defends Palin as VP pick

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — President Bush, relegated to a minor role at the Republican National Convention, praised John McCain Tuesday night as "ready to lead this nation," a courageous candidate who supported the war in Iraq despite risks to his campaign for the White House.

As Bush addressed the convention from the White House — his speech was to last less than eight minutes — Republicans in St. Paul defended McCain's vice presidential running mate, Sarah Palin. The governor of Alaska is "from a small town, with small town values, but that's not good enough for those folks who are attacking her and her family," former Sen. Fred Thompson said in convention remarks released in advance.

He said McCain's decision to place her on the ticket "has the other side and their friends in the media in a state of panic." In the days since her selection, Palin has

disclosed that her 17-year-old unmarried daughter is pregnant, and that a lawyer has been retained to represent her in an unfolding investigation in Alaska into the dismissal of a state employee.

"We need a president who doesn't think that the protection of the unborn or a newly born baby is above his pay grade," Thompson

Bush's remarks, also as prepared for delivery Tuesday night, reprised national security themes that propelled him to re-election in 2004.

"We live in a dangerous world," he said, "And we need a president who understands the lessons of Sept. 11, 2001: that to protect America, we must stay on the offense, stop attacks before they happen and not wait to be



Tech going greener: No more meal trays in Hulen/Clement Dining Hall

Texas Tech is taking a small step toward a "greener" campus this semester by eliminating meal trays in the Hulen/Clement Dining Hall.

Tech is one of several schools making an attempt to be gentler on the environment by removing meal trays.

Sam Bennett, director of Hospitality Services, described tray elimination as a "nationwide phenomenon" and said the university is seeing an immediate benefit by eliminating the cost of trays, and cutting down on water and chemicals used to wash

The university plans to remove trays completely from campus if it proves to be beneficial in Hulen/ Clement, he said.

By eliminating meal trays, Tech is following in the footsteps of Georgia Tech, which was recently awarded The Princeton Review's Top Green Ranking, according to the Associated Press.

Georgia Tech's 18,000-student campus has saved 3,000 gallons of water per day since eliminating the trays.

In September 2007, the Tech campus used 25,201,000 gallons of water - 7,397,000 gallons of that were used in on-campus housing and dinning, said Physical Plant Managing Director Doug Chowning.

air-cooled ice machines, which saves the university about 6,000 gallons of water per year. He hopes to see more water saved with the removal of the meal trays this semester.

Getting rid of trays also has meant reducing the amount of food waste for some universities. For New York University, food waste has been cut from 4.03 ounces per tray to less than 2.37 ounces, according to an article in USA Today.

Timothy Canty, a sophomore Architecture major and Hulen/Clement resident, said he has noticed he does not get as much food without a tray.

"Last year I piled everything on," he said. "I ate what I could then the rest went in the trash."

But it is too early for Tech to calculate food waste since removing trays in Hulen/Clement, Bennett

Along with saving water and energy, students could save a few pounds if they only eat what they can carry

Though Bennett said he can not predict the percentage of food waste Tech might eliminate without the trays, he admits that even he overeats when the trays are available. Tech's Director of Dietetic Internship, Shelley Fillipp, said she believes some students will continue to eat whatever and however much they want.

Fillipp said sees an opportunity for students to eat less food without the meal trays. Eating 100 fewer calories per day can help a person shed 10 pounds per year, she said.

Thomas Snyder, a freshman from Cypress who lives in Hulen/Clement, said he eats every meal on campus. Snyder, who chooses to get his food then get back in line for more, said the lack of meal trays has had no effect on how much food he eats.

Emergency officials strongly defended the decision to evacuate coastal areas, saying that with something as unpredictable as a hurricane, it is better to be safe than sorry — a lesson driven home by Katrina, which killed 1,600 people in the U.S. in 2005, compared with nine deaths attributed to Gustav.

director of the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, said he agrees with Haldenby that cotton has a significant impact on the Lubbock

"An average year yields three to four billion dollars for the economy, and that's a conservative estimate," he said. "Cotton drives the economy."

Robinson said land in the area that could be used for increased cotton demand is currently being used to farm wheat, and more land currently is in the United States Department of Agriculture Conservation Reserve Program and can become available for cotton production at a later time.

"It's a great thing when farmers have the choice to produce one of two profitable crops," he said. "The price of wheat has increased more than cotton over the past few years, so it's currently more profitable to produce. But if demand for cotton increases, and it becomes more profitable than wheat,

farmers can produce cotton instead." Tech and Texas A&M University have played a large part in the increase of quality in cotton produced, according to the report. This may make the Lubbock area and other cotton-producing regions around the nation more competitive with other cotton exporting nations such

"The quality of our cotton has increased over the last few years," Robinson said. "Traditionally, we grew a rough, shorter staple length which is good for blue jeans but not very comfortable. Due to research in cotton genetics, longer staples of cotton crops, which are softer than short staples, can be grown here now."







yon National Recreation Area have not received a missing person report or official notification of the search for Krasnick and currently are not conducting a search, said Marianne Karraker, public information officer at the recreation area. Karraker said 87 percent of the 1.2 million acre park is roadless and

would require the use of aircraft to search. "It can be a maze out there," she

said. In addition to placing Krasnick

in a national law enforcement database as missing, Lubbock detectives plan to file subpoenas for access to Krasnick's banking and cell phone records to help them narrow the area in which they are searching.

"Of course, you watch TV and it's a phone call away," Stevens said. "That's not reality."

Upon calling Krasnick's cell phone, detectives discovered his service had been discontinued, according to the Tech police incident report. Also, Krasnick's landlord said his rent has not been paid in about two months.

Lubbock police investigated Krasnick's local residence, he said, but found nothing out of the ordinary.

The best-case scenario, he said, is that Krasnick - an "outdoorsy," healthy and well-liked person with no history of unexpectedly disappearing - decided to extend his camping trip by several weeks with the intention of postponing his return to school until the spring.

The worst case scenario, Stephens continued, could involve something like Krasnick getting injured or lost in a national park.

"We're just trying to pinpoint the things we really need to focus on so that we can narrow the location," he said, "and have the best chances of success in finding him."







Harrell surprised by Eastern Washington defense

Tech quarterback expects more exotic coverages at Nevada this weekend

Prior to the season opener between Texas Tech and Eastern Washington, Eagles' quarterback Matt Nichols hinted about a brand new defense that would catch the Red Raiders off guard.

"It's another thing that kind of gives us a little bit of confidence," said Nichols, who threw for 335 yards in a 49-24 loss to Tech Saturday. "We have a brand new defense. defense."

Nichols was right, according to the observations of quarterback Graham Harrell, who said because of a new defensive coordinator, the Eagles left no trace of an unknown defense on tape.






