Hurricane Ike death toll in Texas rises

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas death toll from Hurricane Ike rose to at least 32 with the discovery of three bodies, which were found this weekend amid storm debris in Galveston and Orange counties.

On Sunday afternoon, volunteers with Texas Equusearch discovered the body of Greg Walker, who had been missing since Sept. 13, when he made a 911 call for help after he got caught in Ike's storm surge, said Lt. Jimmy LeBoeuf, with the Orange County Sheriff's Office.

Citigroup to buy Wachovia operations

NEW YORK (AP) - Citigroup agreed Monday to purchase Wachovia's banking operations for \$2.1 billion in a deal arranged by federal regulators, making the Charlotte, N.C.-based bank the latest casualty of the widening global financial crisis.

The deal greatly expands Citigroup's retail franchise — giving it a total of more than 4,300 U.S. branches and \$600 billion in deposits — and secures its place among the U.S. banking industry's Big Three, along with Bank of America Corp. and JPMorgan Chase & Co.

Brazil: Amazon destruction up sharply

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Brazilian officials say the Amazon is being deforested more than twice as fast as last year.

They blame higher global food prices for a sharp increase in illegal logging as soy farmers and cattle ranchers clear rain forest for crops and grazing land.

Authorities say 756 square kilometers (292 square miles) of Amazon was destroyed in August. That's a 228 percent increase over

August of last year. Brazil's National Institute for Space Research uses satellites to track the destruction. The latest data released Monday represents a reversal for Brazil, which had seen three years of declines in the rate of deforestation before this year.

BAGHDAD (AP) — Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki said Monday that the government is ready to compromise to reach a security accord with the United States because Iraq still needs American troops despite the drop

In an interview with The Associated Press, al-Maliki said neither he nor Iraq's parliament will accept any pact that fails to serve the country's national interests. A poorly constructed plan would provoke so much discord in Iraq that it could threaten his government's survival, he said.

Al-Maliki said, however, that he is firmly committed to reaching an accord that would allow U.S. troops to remain in the country beyond next year.

"We regard negotiating and reaching such ent as a national endeavor a national mission, a historic one. It is a very important agreement that involves the stability and the security of the country and the existence of foreign troops. It has a historic dimension," al-Maliki said.

The Iraqi prime minister spoke at length about the difficulty he faces in trying to negotiate the accord that would set the terms for the U.S. presence in Iraq for years to come. Supporters of anti-American cleric Muqtada al-Sadr oppose the accord, arguing U.S. forces should leave Iraq as soon as possible. Neighboring Iran also has been speaking out vociferously against a long-term U.S. presence in Iraq.

"Pressures are coming from east and west and north and south, but we are determined to rise above all these difficulties and pressures because we want this agreement to be passed," al-Maliki said, "and we will go ahead despite all that is being said."

The prime minister also noted with gratitude the high cost paid by American taxpayers, the U.S. military and the forces of other coalition members to secure Iraq's freedom over the

Texas Tech's campus at Fredericksburg received a \$281,500 grant to purchase telecommunications equipment for the new Hill Country University Center.

The Distance Learning and Telemedicine Grant Program administered by the United States Department of Agriculture's Rural Development program awarded the school with the grant so it could put video conference rooms in the new university center, according to a university news release.

"The purpose of the grant is to reach more people in rural settings," said James Morris, director of Tech's Fredericksburg site. "We asked for monies so we could purchase equipment for interactive video conferencing classes."

All of the video conference classes will be located in the new Hill Country University Center, Morris said. The university center is a new 25,000-square-foot classroom facility that is located on the eastern side of Fredericksburg.

The university center will house Tech's site at Fredericksburg, as well as four other university programs, Morris said. Austin Community College, Angelo State University, Concordia University and Schreiner University all will offer courses at this location.

Tech's partnership with the four other colleges brings a number of different programs to one place, Morris said. Students will be able to work on degrees in a variety of fields, and will have an opportunity to take classes from a variety of schools.

"The neat thing about these

kinds of arrangements is one school doesn't have to bring everything to the table," he said. "You get different commitments from different universities.

Even though the university center will house five different programs, Tech will be the lead or anchor university at the location, Morris said.

Students will be able to take undergraduate and graduate coursework at the university center, Morris said. Majors will be offered in a variety of fields ranging from general studies to teaching.

This center also should help Tech in its push for 40,000 students, Morris said. They are expecting more than 500 students to be enrolled at the university center when it opens.

Construction for the university center has begun, he said, and it should be completed and open for class by the fall 2010 semester.

helicopters on Monday buzzed a hijacked Ukrainian cargo ship carrying 33 Soviet-designed tanks and other weapons that officials fear could end up in the hands of al-Qaida-linked militants in Somalia if the pirates are allowed to escape.

Thursday's seizure of the MV Faina off Somalia, a failed state seen as a key battleground in the war on terrorism, could bring dangerous effects across the Horn of Africa and the Gulf of Aden, one of the world's busiest shipping lanes.

Piracy has become a lucrative criminal racket in impoverished Somalia, bringing in millions of dollars in ransom.

The pirates aboard the blueand-white Ukrainian-operated freighter are demanding \$20 million to release the ship, its 21 crew members, one of whom has died of an apparent heart attack, and its cargo of T-72 tanks, rifles and

Navy watches seized ship

The ship, now anchored off Somalia's coast near the central town of Hobyo, apparently was destined for Sudan when armed pirates overtook it, likely from a speedboat, and climbed up the side of the ship.

"We maintain a vigilant watch over the ship and we will remain on station while negotiations between the pirates and the shipping company are going on," Lt. Nathan Christensen, a deputy spokesman for the U.S. Navy's Bahrain-based 5th Fleet, told The Associated

Although the pirates have not been allowed to take anything off the Faina, they have been allowed to resupply, one U.S. official said when asked if those aboard needed anything such as food. The official declined to comment on whether the negotiations between the pirates and the shipping company are being monitored.

ers have been deployed within 10 miles of the hijacked vessel and helicopters were circling overhead because of "great concern" over the possibility of the cargo falling "into the wrong hands," Christensen said. At one point on Sunday, the captain of the Faina said a warship was about two miles away.

"Our goal is to ensure the safety of the crew, to not allow off-loading of dangerous cargo and to make certain Faina can return to legitimate shipping," said Rear Adm. Kendall Card, commander of the task force monitoring the ship.

Although analysts say the pirates will likely be unable to unload the tanks, the other military hardware or a huge ransom could exacerbate the two-decade-old civil war in a country where nearly every building is pockmarked with bullet holes and all major civil institutions have crumbled.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA said Monday it is delaying its mission to the Hubble Space Telescope until next year because of a serious breakdown of the observatory in orbit.

Space shuttle Atlantis had been scheduled to blast off in just two weeks, but an unexpected problem with the Hubble appeared on Saturday night when the telescope stopped sending science data.

That potentially means a new repair issue for the astronauts to confront — one that they haven't trained for and never anticipated.

The abrupt, mysterious failure of the command and data-handling system for Hubble's science instruments means that the telescope is unable to capture and beam down the data needed to produce its stunning deep space images.

Early Monday afternoon, NASA announced that the Oct. 14 launch had been postponed until at least early next year, possibly February. Each month's delay will cost the Hubble program about \$10 million.

It could have been far worse, said NASA's science chief, Ed Weiler.

"Think about if this failure had occurred two weeks after the servicing mission, we had just put two brand new instruments in and thought we extended the lifetime for five, 10 years and this thing failed after the last shuttle mission to Hubble," Weiler told reporters Monday evening.

"So in some sense, if this had to happen, it couldn't have happened at a better time."

Hubble manager Preston Burch said the first step is to try to fix the telescope by switching to a backup channel for the science instruments' command and data-handling system, and allowing observations to resume. That should take a week or two. Even if the effort succeeds as engineers suspect it will, Burch and other officials still want to send up a replacement part for the bad component.

That's because there would be no other options if that one last working channel malfunctioned.

"Our plan right now is to take the delay and put up the new hardware ... so that we can keep Hubble going for as long as possible," Weiler said. "If we're going to spend the money and take all the risk involved in a shuttle mission, we want to be sure that we leave Hubble as healthy as we possibly can and potentially lasting for five or 10 more years."

Victoria McClure, the academic advisor for the team, said its games averaged about 1,500 attending fans each, which is a large difference from the reported 50 per game two

She said the players tutor each other to keep their grades up, volunteer within the community and wore tutus to support figure skating in the community.

John Griffin, senior captain of the team, said he is optimistic the council will reverse its initial decision because there will be a "devastating impact" on the city without the team

He also said it is a shame that Lubbock is the largest city in North America without a full-time hockey

During the open-microphone meeting, Griffin read a letter addressed to the city from former 1980 Olympian Mike Eruzione, who was the captain of the United States' gold-medal winning ice hockey team that year. Eruzione and former 1980 teammate Mark Johnson were two members of the broader hockey community to show support for Tech's program.

Sean McDougle, an assistant captain on the team, said multiple community activities besides hockey would have to be canceled if the city did not renew their agreement with the team, and it would be tough for the hockey program to last

playing outside of Lubbock.

McDougle said, if no hockey program existed in Lubbock, many players would not have a reason to go to school at Tech, and would probably transfer.

However, he said, the team has seen much support from the community, and Monday's meeting should put pressure on the council to reverse their decision.

Floyd Price, one of the city council members who initially voted for the contract, said after seeing the passion of Lubbock's citizens to continue Tech hockey locally, it will not be a problem to raise the \$4,000 necessary to continue the program.

Price said, before he heard numbers from Clark, he was not aware how much money the city would lose without the Big 12 tournament in Lubbock.

Paul Fioroni, coach of the team, said the amount of people who showed up to the meeting shows that keeping hockey in Lubbock is a big issue for the citizens of

In response to some allegations that Fioroni demanded unreasonable terms in the contract, the coach said he has never demanded anything out of a contract, and only has had good talks with city "I can't put into words what

McCain: Obama policies will deepen recession

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Lagging in the polls, Republican Iowa. presidential candidate John Mc-Cain unleashed a blistering attack Monday on his Democratic rival, saving the race comes down to a simple question: "Country first or Obama first?"

In his first public appearance since Friday night's debate, Mc-Cain said Democrat Barack Obama advocates tax-and-spend policies that "will deepen our recession," and voted against funding for equipment needed by troops in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"That is not putting the men and women of our military first," he said

Later in the day, after a stunning rejection by the House of a bailout of the financial industry, McCain said Obama and his allies had "infused unnecessary partisanship" into the effort to steady the economy.

"Now is not the time to fix the blame; it's time to fix the problem,"

he said, speaking to reporters in Biden of Delaware.

He urged lawmakers to return to work immediately to pass legislation. Aides said he would return to Washington when he could help.

Earlier, McCain stressed his own record of opposing Republicans on key issues, and said: "When it comes time to reach across the aisle and work with members of both parties to get things done for the American people — my opponent can't name a single occasion in which he fought against his party's leadership to get something done for the country. That is not putting the interests of the country first."

Obama's campaign issued a swift rebuttal that accused McCain of an "angry diatribe" that it said "won't make up for his erratic response to the greatest financial crisis of our time."


The Arizona senator spoke at a rally with running mate Sarah Palin, who said she is looking forward to Thursday's debate with Sen. Joe

"I've been hearing his speeches since I was in the second grade," the 44-year-old Alaska governor said of her counterpart, who is 65 and a veteran of more than 35 years in the Senate.

The speech was McCain's first outside Washington since he announced abruptly last week he was suspending his campaign to concentrate on helping Congress agree on a bailout for the troubled financial industry. He drew heated criticism from Democrats who accused him of nearly derailing negotiations that were headed for success, and even some Republicans conceded privately he appeared impetuous and had not helped his own cause.

Recent polls also suggest Obama has regained a lead he held in the race before the Republican National Convention, where McCain's choice of Palin energized conservatives and led to a short-term surge in his poll



Online gaming leads to gambling addiction for some at U. Arizona

By ADAM CURTIS ARIZONA DAILY WILDCAT (U. ARIZONA)

When Derek Norman, a psychology senior, started playing online poker, he couldn't stop. Soon he found himself playing eight to 10 hours a day, neglecting school work and finally losing more than \$2,000 in a roller coaster of highs and lows, Norman said.

Despite being a "terrible poker player," Norman was encouraged. by big wins and started to look at poker "more as a career than a hobby," he said.

As poker's popularity among college students continues to rise, so does the number of students who develop bad gambling habits that can lead to a pathological

said Jeff Friedman, a therapist at Cottonwood de Tucson.

An estimated 1.6 million out of 17 million U.S. college students gambled online -- mostly on poker -- in 2005, according to an article published in the New York Times

Poker, particularly Texas Hold 'Em, owes most of its increasing popularity to its presence on cable

The escalating presence of poker in mainstream media has created an atmosphere of acceptability, said Rick Pyper, director of the Arizona Office of Problem Gambling.

"Poker is different from most forms of gambling because the player has the ability to make more control over the game. This is why poker attracts action gamblers while compulsive gamblers, who play to escape their problems, prefer to play games of pure chance like roulette or slots," Pyper said.

The element of skill is what initially attracted Norman to the game and, after walking away from poker for several months, he realized this is exactly what he had lacked.

Norman began picking up poker books and reading online

When he goes on tilt, Gelfund likes to take a break, breathe deeply and "try not to throw over the poker table," he laughed.

A successful poker player is someone who consistently wins, not someone who wins big once or twice, he said.

Gelfund and Norman agree poker is getting much more popular among students at the UA.

A study done by the Annenberg Public Policy Center concluded that the number of college males who reported gambling online once a week or more doubled in 2005.

One of his friends lost \$5,000 increase in the number of pathological gamblers that come into Cottonwood de Tucson, but attributes this mostly to the fact that there are more opportunities to gamble.

Most college students that report gambling problems come for treatment of a substance abuse problem and don't meet the criteria for pathological gambling because they don't have enough money, Friedman said.

FAFSA applicants rise, future of loans unclear

As students across the nation find themselves in trouble when it comes to paying for their education, there was a 16 percent increase this year in applicants for FAFSA, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

According to data from Information for Financial Aid Professionals, 8.9 million students submitted FAFSA forms in the first half of 2008, up from 7.6 million the previous year.

With the FAFSA's increasing importance, a panel of education experts recently met to propose changes in the current federal policies on financial aid for colleges, including the possible elimination of the FAFSA

The report proposed that Congress should eliminate the FAFSA and retrieve the financial data required for Pell grant allocation from the Internal

However, if the FAFSA is kept, proposed changes include creating a simpler application process; linking the maximum amount of money a student can borrow from the Stafford Loan to the federal poverty level,

and the maximum Pell grant to the consumer price index; and creating federally financed college-savings accounts for children from low-income families, according to the report from the Rethinking Student Aid Study Group.

The combination of a slumping real-estate market, increased food and gas prices, a rising unemployment rate and recent trouble on Wall Street have led to a surge in the number of qualified financial aid applicants, a number that exceeds the available federal funds to support them.

For example, the Pell grant program, from which federal funds for financial aid are taken, is expected to face a \$6 billion shortfall this

The panel also proposed creating an account for children of low-income families, adding money to it each year until the child's 18th birthday. The money could only be withdrawn for college expenses.

CAS sophomore Rajshi Akruwala said the idea of eliminating the FAFSA just seemed like a matter of convenience for the govern-

"It's a nice idea, but it isn't going to change anything," he said. "The government should focus on getting more kids into college, which is why the idea of a savings account really appeals to me."

## At Brown U., 4 rooms go mixed-gender roommates

Sofia Unanue '11 has, by now, observed her roommate's daily rituals enough times to know them by heart.

"In the morning, Sam wakes up, goes to take a shower, looks in the mirror, puts on purple tighty-

whities... "They're not tighty-whities; they're boxer briefs!"

Sam Yambrovich '11 and Unanue are typical roommates in all but one sense: Yambrovich is male and Unanue is female.

Last spring, the Office of Residential Life announced that for the first time, certain doubles on campus would be designated as gender-neutral. For the pilot program, ResLife strategically chose six residence halls, comprising about a third of upperclassmen doubles. Only four rooms were chosen in the housing lottery by mixed gender groups though, according to ResLife.

Richard Bova, senior associate dean of Residential Life, speculated that the small number could be in part due to groups choosing suites or apartments, rather than traditional doubles, in the housing lottery. He ness House. also suggested that the novelty of the program might have impacted the numbers.

Still, Yambrovich and Unanue were surprised to hear they were in such a small minority.

"Granted, it's the first year and it wasn't widely publicized, but still, I couldn't believe it," Yambrovich said. "This is Brown!"

But they didn't choose their living arrangement to make a statement. It was simply what made the most sense.

Last spring, the two were friendly but did not know each other well. They were in a lottery group of eight, hoping to get doubles or a suite. The other six paired off before the lottery, however, leaving Yambrovich and Unanue as the odd ones out.

"We were at dance one day," Unanue recalled, "and I was like, 'Dude, I don't have anyone to live with. Will you live with me?"

Both admit now that they were nervous last spring, and not entirely sure they could live together. But they entered the lottery together and the group of eight was able to secure four doubles nearby in Hark-

Over the summer, Yambrovich and Unanue were coincidentally both in Madrid. They lived together for 10 days, had a fantastic time and returned to school much more confident about their arrangement,

Their friends find it "hilarious" that the two are roommates, though.

"We're kind of polar opposites," Yambrovich explained. "I have a shelf full of cleaning products; she has a laundry basket full of dirty clothes."

But when it comes to their different genders, neither feels uncomfortable. They attribute that in large part, though, to the fact that Yambrovich is gay.

"Otherwise, it would be really hard," Unanue said. "There's always sexual tension.'

"We even have some," Yambrovich joked.

"When I told my mom, the first thing I had to tell her was, 'He's gay," Unanue explained. "Don't worry, he's not going to be my boy-

friend.' That was a big relief." Unanue said her mom has since met Yambrovich, and is "obsessed"

Yambrovich's situation is somewhat different: His parents think he lives in a single. They are coming to visit in two weeks, which both said should be interesting.

"I can completely see my parents being like, 'What? You can't do that!" Yambrovich said.

Yambrovich said he acknowledges the opposition from the Brown community at large - including alumni and parents - when the policy was instituted, "but I never understand why," he said.

"If I'm more comfortable living with Sofia, who's a girl, why shouldn't I have that option?"

For Bova, that's the main reason to allow gender-neutral housing. He said he wants to ensure that all students feel safe and comfortable in their housing environments, and for some students, the option that makes them happiest may not be the traditional housing model.

So far, he said, the eight students living in gender-neutral rooms seem to be pleased with their setup, but ResLife will continue to monitor the results of the new policy throughout





The team may have come out for the fourth set a little too comfortable, said Tech libero Jenn Harrell, which is an issue the team must address.


"Our strongest point is definitely not urgency," she said. "We came out and played great in game one, played decent in game two and then won game three and then we came out in game four very, very, very, very flat."







## Big 12 Conference teams move up in polls, coaches, players stay focused

It started with Oregon State knocking off the previously topranked USC Trojans during a nationally televised game Thursday.

A few days later, the upset bug carried over to Florida and Georgia, both Top 5 teams who lost at home.

When the smoke cleared, three more Top 25 teams fell -including No. 9 Wisconsin — and Tech reaped the benefits along with the Big 12 Conference.

In The Associated Press poll, the Red Raiders jumped from No. 10 to No. 7 — marking the highest ranking of don't want to look past an opponent in any poll since 1976, when they were ranked No. 5 for three consecutive weeks.

Three Big 12 teams are ranked inside the Top 5: No. 1 Oklahoma, No. 3 Missouri and No. 5 Texas.

Tech coach Mike Leach said although players understand that any team can win on Saturday, there is no substitute for seeing "well-illustrated examples."

"We shouldn't be blind to that," said Leach, whose team experienced its first bye week since 2004. "I hope we're not."

In order to make sure his team realizes the gravity of these upsets,

Leach said during a recent team meeting he used a message former UCLA basketball coach John Wooden believed in.

"We talked about it just like John Wooden says, 'It's important to respect everyone and fear no one.' If you don't respect everyone, any of them can beat you, and if you fear anybody, then you can't have great victories, like Oregon State did.'

Tech cornerback Brent Nickerson said watching so many powerful teams go down either at home or to unranked teams provides a lesson in itself: Don't let your guard down.

"You look at it and you see it and the thing that it makes you do is really focus on the next game," he said. "You because some of these teams that are dropping in the Top 10, that are in the Top 5 in the BCS, are going down. You learn from other people's mistakes. We see those mistakes and the things that they're going through and we don't want that to be us."

Tech safety Darcel McBath used the 2005 season as an example not to get caught up in any talk about a ranking. Looking to go 7-0 for the first time since 1976, Tech was ranked No. 10 heading into a showdown with Vince Young's No. 2 Texas Longhorns in Austin but lost 52-17.

"We kind of took it in too much, reading too many newspaper articles,"

McBath said. "I'm gonna make sure it doesn't happen this year."

Along with OU, Missouri, Texas and Tech, Kansas moved up two spots to No. 16 and No. 21 Oklahoma State entered the rankings.

McBath said six Big 12 teams ranked nationally and four in the top seven only adds up to more media

"It's always fun to play against the best in the country, I mean we do that every year," he said. "To have it ranked, its gonna have a lot more hype around it. It's no different than any other year, but a little more hype. I'm not really paying attention


Kansas State coach Ron Prince said this could be a very unpredictable Big 12 regular season schedule for any team because of so many potent offenses.

How potent?

Nationally, six Big 12 quarterbacks rank in the Top 10 in passing efficiency and six teams rank in the Top 12 in total offense.

"I'm pleasantly surprised with our play," he said. "At the same time, I know that's where we need the most work. Escobar and (David) Gonzalez I think could be a very good team. They've got some improvement to do, but they could be a good team. I know that our No. 1 team, Carvalho and (Christian) Rojmar, have a chance to be as good as a No. 1 team as there is in the country."

Practice this week will focus on preparation for the All-American Championship as Siegel said it is probably the toughest tournament

"I'm just gonna work them hard is what I'm gonna do," he said. "I'm gonna work them hard. I'm gonna analyze where they are weak. They are gonna watch some video of their matches and it's my job and their job to improve their weaknesses from this past weekend and that's what we're gonna do."
