

Texas approves restoration of beaches

GALVESTON (AP) — The Texas General Land Office plans at least one project to restore Texas Gulf Coast beaches eroded by the powerful storm surge of Hurricane Ike.

A 51-block stretch of beach on Galveston Island along the city's seawall will be replenished as part of a \$6 million project, the land office said Thursday.

The agency, which is responsible for managing Texas' 367 miles of coastline, is still working to approve at least two other projects.

Bailout hopes rise as more 'no' votes switch

WASHINGTON (AP) -Desperate to avoid another market-crushing defeat, House leaders won key converts Thursday to the \$700 billion financial industry bailout on the eve of a make-orbreak second vote.

President Bush and congressional leaders lobbied for the supporters he'd need to reverse Monday's setback and approve a rescue plan.

Investors sent the Dow Jones industrials plunging another 348 points, suggesting Wall Street is expecting tougher economic times even if the measure is rushed into law.


Suicide attackers strike Shiite mosques, kill 24

BAGHDAD (AP) — Suicide bombers struck two Shiite mosques in Baghdad on Thursday, killing at least 24 people and wounding dozens during celebrations marking the end of the Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

To the north, suspected Shiite militiamen gunned down six members of a Sunni family, including women and children, police reported.

Those attacks occurred four days after a series of explosions killed 32 people and wounded nearly 100 in Shiite areas of Baghdad, raising fears that al-Qaida in Iraq is trying to provoke Sunni-Shiite reprisal killings now that the last of the American "surge" troops have left the country.

"It was great to have him here," said Rick Walker, a research associate at the Wind Science and Engineering Research Center. "We're developing a new program in wind energy, so to have people like him interested in it is a good thing. It can mean more funding for the research programs that Tech has and for wind energy in general. I think he was impressed with what he saw."

Cornyn's visit came approximately 30 days before much of the 2010 federal funding education budget is passed, said David McClure, assistant vice chancellor of marketing and com-

Cornyn said he was impressed with what he saw of Tech's facilities and research.

"Texas Tech is No. 1 in the world offering PhD's the wind energy field," Cornyn said. "But this program is more than wind energy. It's about keeping people safe from the kinds of storms we have encountered recently. This is very impressive, and I'm certainly happy to do everything I can to continue to support the good work that is being done here."

Cornyn arrived around 3:30 p.m. at the Wind Power/Hurricane/Water Desalination Building and was greeted by regents, government officials and Reese faculty members. The senator then boarded a bus with several Tech faculty members and government officials and was given an approximately 10-minute bus tour of the Reese Center campus. Cornyn then was briefed on the history of Tech's programs at the center by Kishor Mehta, a Horn professor in the Department of Civil Engineering.

Cornyn's bus tour ended at the Tornado Research Building. The senator viewed a demonstration of the Debris Impact Facility, commonly referred to as the Tornado Cannon.

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Voter registration deadline nears

Texas voters can count down the days to cast their ballots: 32 days to go until the Nov. 4 election and three days to register to vote.

Voters hoping to participate in the November election, which includes the race for president of the United States, the U.S. House of Representative as well as many state offices and issues, have until Monday to register to vote.

Texas Tech students have a choice if they want to register in Lubbock County or vote absentee from their home towns, but should keep in mind the deadlines for registering to vote and requesting a mail ballot, said Dorothy Kennedy, the Lubbock County elections administrator.

"But unless you've got a relative who's on the ballot from your home county," Kennedy said, "just go ahead and register to vote in Lubbock while you're here."

Patrick Murray, vice president of the Tech Democrats, said his organization began operating a registration booth two weeks ago in the Free Speech Zone near the Student Union Building, and has registered more than 230 students to vote in one day alone.

The primary goal of the Tech Democrats, Murray said, is to encourage as many students to register to vote as possible.

"The main attitude on campus is basically political apathy, and we want to try to raise awareness and get as many young people voting as possible," he said.

Though the organization's booth is decorated with political signs for Democratic candidates, Murray said they are not intended to isolate voters supporting other candidates.

"It shows who we support, but we cannot legally turn anyone away because of political party," he said. "We have to register anyone and

"The groups can support the candidates of their choice," she said.

Elections officials anticipate an increase in the number of voters registered in Lubbock County since 2004, Kennedy said, with 159,000 voters registered as of Thursday.

In 2004, more than 162,000 people registered to vote in the county, she said, with about 4,000 registering on the last day.

Bailey discusses university priorities at State of the University address



President Guy Bailey and Chancellor Kent Hance addressed several university issues ranging from fundraising to elevating Texas Tech to flagship status at the State of University address Thursday afternoon.

Right now, university officials are trying to fill any empty positions Tech has, Bailey said. One of the main priorities is to fill the position of provost, which currently is being filled by Interim Provost Jane Winer. Tech already has had a number of people apply for the provost position, and university officials plan to have the top candidates visit the campus

after Thanksgiving break.

"It's an aggressive timeline, but I think we can beat it," Bailey said. "I think if we beat that timeline, we'll get somebody here on campus shortly after the first of the year.'

Also, the university is striving to become a flagship institution, he said.



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Organically designed bus to visit Lubbock | SGA discusses sportsmanship, officials address Student Senate

A Senate Bill and a Senate Resolution were passed by the Texas Tech Student Senate Thursday during a meeting that also featured Michael Shonrock, Ron Seacrist and Gerald Myers speaking about fans' sportsmanship during sporting events.

Shonrock, the vice president for student affairs and enrollment management at Tech, said the fans at the university formerly were known for good sportsmanship at football games.

Because of a need to keep students out of the gates who are "not ready for the game," he said, Tech police needs the help of the Student Government Association.

Seacrist, chief of the Tech police department, said he would like to see the SGA become a regular supporter at the football games, as SGA senators have been present and assisted Tech police officers at the football games in the past.

In the first few home games of the football season, he said, there have been a large number of arrests for public intoxication, especially because the largest number of public

intoxication arrests during a single game in the 2007 season was 12, and no students were arrested in several games. The previous Tech football game saw 21 public intoxication

Seacrist said he has reassigned officers and asked others not to attend games again in an enforcement capacity because of not having the right attitude at games.

To keep intoxicated fans out of the stands, he said, it would be helpful to allow SGA members to "pre-screen" fans, and warn them from entering the stadium at an intoxication level that presents a danger to themselves and others.

James Baumgartner, president of the senate, said he wants members of the Student Senate to become leaders by example as well as inform students before they approach the gates of the football game.

"It takes everybody at Tech, not just me or the senators or Lee (Bobbitt) working hard," he said, "it takes all the fans to want to change, and it's going to take time."

Senate Bill 44.03, which was enacted to change rules on organizations that receive funding penalties, was passed to help good organizations that have been negatively affected by poor leadership in the past, Baumgartner said.

Previously, student organizations only could receive an additional 100 percent increase in funding after taking penalties into effect. An organization that received \$1,000 but had penalties to reduce funding to \$200 would only be able to receive \$400 the following year. Because of this bill, the organization now could receive up to \$1,400 the

Kyle Crowl, senator at-large and co-author of the bill, said the final decision to increase the funding is up to the senate and would depend on factors relating to the current

Senate Resolution 44.13 asked the Division of Student Affairs to excuse students from class that will be working for the city on election day at the voting booths. Reasons given in the bill included good experience on how government works; that it is the "civic duty" of students to help with the election process; that the average age of election voting booth workers is 75 and will reflect well on the university.

Money sent home by Mexicans in US drops 12 percent

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexicans living in the U.S. sent home 12 percent less money in August, the largest drop on record since the Bank of Mexico began tracking remittances 12 years ago, the central bank reported on Wednesday.

After years of record gains, remittances from the U.S. have dipped across Latin America as the U.S. economy slowed and the dollar fell, slashing the real value of money sent home. The falling dollar even slowed emigration to the U.S. from Brazil, where the local currency rose about 7 percent against the dollar in the first eight months of the year.

Mexicans migrants are sending

less money home, stranding small towns and neighborhoods that live off the stipends. Remittances will likely continue to fall in the coming months amid the "difficult problems the U.S. economy faces," Mexico's central bank said.

Remittances dropped 12 percent to US\$1.9 billion, compared to US\$2.2 billion in August 2007, the bank said. For the first eight months of the year, they dropped 4 percent to USS\$15.5 billion.

A slowing U.S. economy and stepped-up U.S. immigration enforcement, including record deportations and increased border security, are behind the drop.

Remittances are Mexico's sec-

ond-largest source of foreign income after oil exports. Nearly all of the money comes from the United States, which is home to 98 percent of the at least 11 million Mexicans living abroad.

Mexico's IPC stock index rose 0.9 percent to close at 25,117 Wednesday, shrugging off the bad news on remittances and rising on optimism that the U.S. Congress would approve a plan to bail out struggling U.S. financial institu-

Mexico has largely weathered the global economic crisis, buoyed by a national housing boom and government-funded infrastructure



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



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Gay performance artist offers students perspective on 'Mind, Body, Self'

International performance artist Tim Miller addressed gay issues through a comedic performance in what he called a "queer night at Tech."

The Association of Creative Writing at Texas Tech hosted Miller's "Sex Body Self" performance and lecture at 8 p.m Thursday in the Human Science building.

The performance with Miller reenacting his birth, which he referred to as "one queer little spermlet fighting the odds.'

Miller, a controversial performance artist who taught theater at the University of California, Los Angeles, California State University, Los Angeles and New York University, said he develops shows based on his personal life as a gay man and as an activist.

Miller spoke about several political issues, including gay marriage and equal treatment.

"I am the same as you," he said. "So why am I getting treated differently?" Miller alternated between spurts of

performing short pieces he said were "a playful satire" on serious concerns.

Whitney Neal, a junior architecture major from Brady, said she thought the performance was "erotic and different."

"He tested the boundaries," she said. "Whatever your sex, you should be able to do that.'

At one point in his performance, Miller crossed the stage and told the audience about a man he dated during his senior year in high school, a man who was stabbed outside of a bar with an ice pick.

Also, Miller performed a piece about his experiences at Montana's ferring to the upcoming presidential Gay Pride rally in 1997.

"The Ku Klux Klan from 12 counties came with their festive outfits," he said, gesturing above his head with his hands.

As he walked along a sidewalk, he said, several men in a pickup truck with a gun rack pulled up to a nearby intersection and threw a half-full can the Exercise Science Center. of beer at him.



Tech coach Nancy Todd said the team is not going to change its focus very much as it heads into its sixth Big 12 match.


"Tough serving, ball control, we have to have better blocking and defense," she said. "There's a lot of things in there that we have to have better stats at."

Napoleon Bonaparte, the historic military and political leader during the French Revolution, once said "Vengeance has no foresight."

The Texas Tech women's soccer team (6-3-1, 1-2 in Big 12 Conference) will probably take these words to heart as they look to get revenge on the team that ended their season last year, the Missouri Tigers (6-3, 1-1 in Big 12 play) at noon Sunday in Columbia, Mo.

"We are just going to go out and play hard like we do every game," forward Zhaleh Rezaie said, "but just because they knocked us out last year makes me want to go out harder, so I hope the rest. of the team feels the same way."

Last season, the Tigers and Red Raiders met twice, once during the regular season and again in the Big 12 Tournament. Missouri won the first game in Lubbock 2-0, and looked like it was on its way to another two-goal victory in the first round of the Big 12 tournament as it led 3-1 with less than 10 minutes to go.

Out of nowhere, Tech rallied with two goals scored less than 30 seconds apart by Maegan Wilber and Rezaie to send the game into overtime. The Red Raiders could not carry the momentum into extra time, though. Missouri eventually won the game in the second extra period with a goal by Kristin Andrighetto to effectively end Tech's season.

"It was a thriller for the fans but not for the coaches," Missouri coach Bryan Blitz said. "(Texas Tech) gave us one of the toughest games we played all year."

have not forgotten about that game.

Although the players are focused on avenging the heart-breaking loss from last year's tournament, Tech coach Tom Stone said the game is a chance for his team to prove much more.

"I don't think it's vengeance as much as we need to prove we can play with those teams in the upper echelon of our conference," Stone said. "I thought Missouri was as good as it got last year in our conference. To stay with them the way we did in the Big 12 Tournament told us that on the day that we play our best, we can hang with them."

This season, Missouri and Tech find themselves in similar positions. Both teams are unranked, with winning records, have four shutouts, and are sitting in the middle of the conference standings with three points a piece.

The Tigers were riding a five-game winning streak going into Sunday when they lost to Nebraska in double overtime, 3-2.

"We got to be better defensively," Stone said. "They are extremely athletic. They are very vertical in nature and they just try to run and gun you for 90 minutes, and if you're not ready for the track meet that is Missouri, it's a tough

Before Tech gets its shot at revenge, the Red Raiders start the road trip against the previously-ranked Kansas Jayhawks (7-3, 1-1 in Big 12 play) at 4 p.m. today in Lawrence, Kan.

"We just need to come out with intensity," defender Sarabeth Clopton said. "We have to start the game fast and start the game hard."

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



Harrell-Freeman chosen as marquee matchup

The matchup between Texas Tech's Graham Harrell and Kansas State's Josh Freeman will garner a little extra attention this weekend.

The Davey O'Brien Foundation highlights marquee matchups every week this season between two quarterbacks featured on the Davey O'Brien Award list. The list recognizes candidates in line for the award which honors the best quarterback in the nation at season's end. Past marquee matchups this season include Kansas' Todd Ressing against South Florida's Matt Grothe and BYU's Matt Hall and Washington's Jake Locker. This week's matchup will be between Harrell and Freeman.

"We always try to select the best pure quarterback to quarterback matchup," said Danielle Moorman, executive director of the O'Brien Foundation. "That's really what we're going for is to highlight the quarterbacks. We just didn't think there was a better game out there than the Tech-Kansas State game this weekend. We think it'll be a real good offensive battle between the two."

Harrell enters Big 12 play completing 120-of-186 passes for 1,573 yards, 12 touchdowns and three interceptions. The passing yards are second in the nation to Houston's Case Keenum. Freeman has completed 77 of 115 passes on the season for 1,105 yards, 11 touchdowns and two interceptions. His passing yards rank 24th in the nation.

Moorman said the matchups this year have varied from many different conferences and many different teams.

"We've had a lot of (Southeastern Conference), Big 12 (Conference), (Pacific-10 Conference), Mountain West (Conference)," she said. "It really has been spread across the country to highlight all the quarterbacks."

There are 10 Big 12 quarterbacks on the list this season. Some besides Freeman and Harrell included Baylor's Robert Griffin, Missouri's Chase Daniel and Oklahoma's Sam Bradford.

Fans will impact the outcome for the O'Brien Award for the second year in a row. Moorman said fans can visit voteobrien.org to vote for their favorite quarterback to be a semifinalist. She said the top three votegetters automatically will be added to the foundation's semifinalist list. After the semifinalists are announced, 5 percent of the votes will go into determining the finalists and the winner for the award, Moorman said. The semifinalists will be announced on Oct. 27 and the list approximately will be 15 to 17 quarterbacks.

Harrell is seventh with 472 votes, while Freeman is 27th with eight. The leading vote-getter currently is Texas' Colt McCoy with 2,839 and counting. Last year, Florida's Tim Tebow took home the award.

Tech travels to Kansas State for Big 12 opener

It is difficult to overshadow the talent at quarterback in the Big 12 Conference.

Texas' Colt McCoy, Oklahoma's Sam Bradford, Missouri's Chase Daniel and Oklahoma State's Zac Robinson have the second, third, fourth and fifth best passer ratings in

But in a literal sense, at 6-foot-6, 250 pounds, all Kansas State quarterback Josh Freeman has to do is find a way to stand next to them.

In his third year as a starter, Freeman's 175.8 passer rating is eighth in the nation. He has passed for 1,105 yards, 11 touchdowns and only two interceptions while rushing for six touchdowns. His 272 yards passing in a win Saturday over Louisiana-Lafayette gave him 6,238 career yards, breaking former quarterback Lynn Dickey's 38-year old record.

"His size, he has a very strong arm and is very accurate," Tech safety Darcel McBath said of Freeman's strengths. "From 10, 15, 40 yards down the field, he can make all the throws. He is strong. I can't really find anything bad to say about him."

However, Freeman said his numbers need to translate to the win column like his fellow Big 12 quarterbacks accomplished in 2007 when the Wildcats fell out of the bowl picture with four straight losses to end the season.

"In the college game it's about wins and losses," said Freeman, whose Wildcats open Big 12 play against No. 7 Texas Tech at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in Manhattan, Kan. "The other quarterbacks had a much more successful season than I had last year. Their teams were playing on the national stage,

for the big games. They're all great quarterbacks in this conference."

With the kind of size and arm strength Freeman possesses, it may be only a matter of time until he hears his name called from the green room of the NFL Draft. The only question is which draft, the 2009 or the 2010 Draft?

Kansas State coach Ron Prince said Freeman has his mother and father to thank for blessing him with the physical and mental tools to perform on the football field.

"Clearly, they gave him a body that's six-six, 250 (pounds) and a lot of eye-hand coordination," Prince said. "He's a tremendous competitor. I would say that the way he was raised and the atmosphere he was brought up in, he's carried that over to college.

When Freeman hears comparisons to current Oakland Raiders quarterback JaMarcus Russell, who is 6-foot-6, 260 pounds, or the recently retired NFL veteran Daunte Culpepper, Freeman said he tries to keep a level head about it.

"I don't try to compare myself to anybody playing right now," Freeman said. "I just try to go out and play my best football every week. Sure it's flattering to be compared to guys that are in the NFL, but right now my main goal and focus is to play the best game I can at the college level and win games."

The question of staying all four years at Kansas State was an issue Freeman said he used to wrestle with, but for the time being he said one step at a time should keep him busy.


