Texas A&M settles decade-old lawsuit

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — Texas A&M University agreed Tuesday to pay \$2.1 million to settle a lawsuit over the collapse of a bonfire tower that killed 12 people and injured dozens more nearly a decade ago.

The families of four students killed and several of those who were injured sued the university and construction contractors hired to help build the 59-foot-tall tower of logs that fell apart in November

Authorities: skinhead plot wasn't fully formed

BELLS, Tenn. (AP) — Two white supremacists charged with plotting to behead blacks across the country and assassinate Barack Obama while wearing white top hats and tuxes were likely too disorganized to carry out the plot, authorities said, and their planning was riddled with blunders.

Paul Schlesselman, 18, of Helena-West Helena, Ark., and Daniel Cowart, 20, of Bells are accused of dreaming up the plan. While authorities say they had guns capable of creating carnage, documents show they never got close to getting off the ground.


Iraqi Cabinet authorizes reopening of US talks

BAGHDAD (AP) — The Iraqi Cabinet on Tuesday authorized Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki to reopen talks with the United States on a security pact that would allow U.S. troops to stay in Iraq for three more years after their U.N. mandate expires Dec. 31.

With a week to go before the American presidential elections, the Iraqi decision could delay the key agreement that provides the legal basis for the U.S. to operate in Iraq past the end of the year.

Iraqi government spokesman Ali al-Dabbagh said members of the Cabinet proposed unspecified "essential" amendments and gave them to al-Maliki to offer to American negotiators.

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

Peace Corps expects funding shortages, possible delays in volunteer departures

Life is calling, and the Peace Corps catch phrase asks Americans, "How far will you go?"

But, with economic uncertainties looming overhead, perhaps the question should be, "How long will

you wait?" The humanitarian assistance program, which sends thousands of Americans abroad every year, plans to delay or cut between 300 and 400 volunteer positions

as a result of the rising cost of food, fuel and other 'We're currently in a financial situation that leaves certain. us feeling the pinch of inflation abroad and steep currency losses due to the dollar," said Peace Corps spokeswoman Josie Duckett from the agency's Washington D.C. headquarters. "With a small budget like ours, those

Officials estimate foreign currency-related losses at \$9.2 million for the fiscal year 2008 alone, and she said the agency is preparing for an \$18 million shortfall in the current fiscal year, which began Oct. 1.

Duckett said the agency's managers have asked regional offices to cut their budgets by 15.5 percent and it even plans to discontinue providing copies of Newsweek magazine to volunteers in the field. "We're trying to

remain as lean as possible, but we're not cutting back everywhere," she said. "We're not closing any posts or taking any volunteers out of the field.'

Grant Weldon, a senior Spanish major from Lubbock, said he began his application process in September and is scheduled to leave for Latin America in July.

"There's just always been something about Latin America and the culture and the people that I've been attracted to," he said. "The opportunity to teach English and learn more Spanish and learn more about the culture and live with the people — that's what the Peace Corps offers."

But he said he is aware that his departure is not

"That's why they call it a 'nomination," he said. Volunteers become nominated and placed on a list, which contains information about themselves and where they would like to go. They are chosen based on the opportunities available and their qualifications.

Volunteers whose departure is delayed by budget cuts will have to wait longer before they can begin providing humanitarian aid overseas, Duckett said, but it's a continual process of matching up.

'We'll do everything that we can to increase the number of volunteers in the field," she said. "We want

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Stocks surge as Wall Street investors hunt for bargains

NEW YORK (AP) — Wall Street had another astounding advance Tuesday, with the Dow Jones industrials soaring nearly 900 points in their second-largest point gain ever as late-day bargain hunters stormed into the market. The Dow and the Standard & Poor's 500 index each shot up nearly 11

There didn't appear to be any one catalyst for the surge that saw the Dow nearly double its gain in the last hour of trading. Many analysts said investors were grabbing up stocks in the belief that Wall Street had fallen too far in recent sessions; the Dow had dropped 500 points in two days. Some said buying early in the day came from anticipation of an interest rate cut Wednesday by the Federal Reserve, and the market just followed its recent pattern of building on its gains or losses in the last minutes of the session.

"There is nothing fundamental that came out today or yesterday that would take it up or down. We're all groping for something meaningful to talk about," said Bob Andres, chief investment strategist at Portfolio Management Consultants. "The market is exhausted from going down."

But given the relentless volatility in the market — out of 20 trading days this month, there have been only two that didn't see the Dow close up or down in triple digits — no one expects that stocks are now headed higher for good. After Wall Street's devastating losses that slashed 2,400 points off the Dow in eight sessions, market veterans warned that the recovery would be rocky, including huge gains followed by huge declines.

"I don't think it will be a sustained move," said Matt King, chief investment officer at Bell Investment Advisors, of Tuesday's surge.

It was clear that investors wanted to buy — they looked past news of a sharp drop in consumer con-

fidence early in the session. The Conference Board said its index of consumer confidence has fallen to a record low 38 in October, well below the 51 analysts expected; with consumer spending accounting for more than two-thirds of economic growth, the reading was the latest in a long line of disappointing data.

The market's reaction was notable because it was investors' anguish over a likely recession that had them selling just days ago. But analysts don't necessarily see that change of heart as a sign of health.

"I would like to hope that a little bit of fear is being replaced by greed at this point," said Kim Caughey, equity research analyst at Fort Pitt Capital Group. "I'm not that happy, though. There's no big news out there."

The Dow rose 889.35, or 10.88 percent, to 9,065.12. That was its second-largest point gain, coming after the 936 points the Dow jumped on Oct. 13.

Analysis: Raid into Syria complicates Iraq's ties

BAGHDAD (AP) — The deadly U.S. raid into Syria may complicate efforts to win approval for a new U.S.-Iraqi security deal by drawing attention to a fact many Iraqis detest — that they can't control everything American forces might do.

Iraq's government offered its first official criticism of the raid on Tuesday, two days after Syrian officials say U.S. troops and helicopters swooped into Syrian territory close to the Iraqi border, killing eight people.

The U.S. command in Baghdad would not comment, but a U.S. military official said American special forces targeted the network that smuggles fighters and weapons into Iraq. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the raid was

In a sign of how sensitive such attacks can be for Iraq's government, Syria summoned the top Iraqi diplomat in Damascus and demanded that Iraq "shoulder its responsibilities" and prevent the use of Iraqi territory "for aggression against Syria."

On Tuesday, Iraqi government spokesman Ali al-Dabbagh said the government "rejects" the raid but urged Syria to crack down on what he said are "organizations" on its territory that are trying to hurt Iraq. A U.S. military official said

the target was a network that smuggles fighters and weapons into Iraq. That strikes at the heart of Iraqi

criticism over the security agreement — that Iraqis cannot take control of their own country so long as big U.S. military forces remain on their soil.

The raid could also encourage Syria and Iran to step up pressure on Iraqi lawmakers to reject the deal. Parliament must approve the measure before the U.N. mandate expires Dec. 31, and Iraqi Shiite lawmakers have expressed doubts the current version would pass.

"It will be used against the agreement and will give the Iranians reason to increase their interference here against the agreement," Kurdish lawmaker Mahmoud Othman predicted.

"Now neighboring countries have a good reason to be concerned about the continued U.S. presence in Iraq," he said.

The Iraqi government has so far issued no formal statement about the raid, but the chief spokesman Ali al-Dabbagh noted that the reported

target was a center of "anti-Iraq terrorist activity."

But another lawmaker — this one a prominent Shiite who has not taken a public stand on the deal said the raid would hurt the security agreement's chances of approval because it sends "a message that Iraq is not in control of its own affairs.' He spoke on condition of anonymity because the issues are sensitive.

The proposed deal would allow American troops to stay in Iraq through 2011 to help build up Iraq's own forces and fight the remaining al-Qaida militants and Shiite

But critics inside Iraq believe the agreement would tie Iraq to American political and military policies in the region. That could harm Iraq's efforts to build good relations with neighbors like Syria and Iran - who aren't on good terms with Washington.

U.S. officials insist the agreement respects Iraqi sovereignty.

But critics maintain that there is no way that Iraq will be anything but a junior partner. That's not an image Iraqis relish, even though many privately hope U.S. troops will stay here until Iraq's own security forces can maintain order.

Parties pouring cash into legislative races

AUSTIN (AP) — Democrats are pouring money into their effort to take back the Texas House, but powerful Speaker Tom Craddick is dipping into his own multi-million dollar campaign account to shore up his ever-thinning Republican majority.

Craddick's spending — at least \$720,000 — helped give the GOP an edge in most of the 15 hotly contested House races The Associated Press is tracking, but Democrats were keeping it competitive and spending much more than in previous years.

At least two state Senate races are in play, even if control of the chamber isn't. One of them, in Fort Worth, has seen combined spending approach an unusually high \$2.3 million since Sept. 26, according to campaign reports due a week before the Nov. 4 election.

Fueled by wealthy trial lawyers, the Texas Democratic Trust went through all but \$232 of its vast bank account, shelling out \$2.1 million over the last month alone — five times more than the \$420,000 it spent during the same period two

The trust gave about \$200,000 to the House Democratic Campaign Committee and about \$1.5 million to the Texas Democratic Party.

Craddick, the first Republican speaker since the Civil War era, has increased his burn rate significantly in the waning days of the election. The new reports show he donated \$500,000 to the GOP-aligned Stars Over Texas committee, and another \$220,000 to the Republican Party

"There's clearly a lot of late contributions.

The Stars Over Texas committee, to which Craddick is the largest contributor, focused their contributions on the most competitive races in the state, including \$200,000 to Arlington Republican Rep. Bill Zedler. The seat is seen as one of the most likely pick-up opportunities for Democrats.

Zedler, who has outspent Democrat Chris Turner, also picked up almost \$70,000 in cash from Texans for Lawsuit Reform as well as almost \$60,000 in in-kind mail




"They have to contact us and we can tell them if they had paid the fee or not," she said.




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Hate crime legislation still needed

Little more than 10 years after Matthew Shepard was pistolwhipped, tortured, tied to a fence post and left to die in the country outside of Laramie, Wyo., there still is no federal hate crime legislation inclusive of sexual orientation or gender identity.

"I think people expected a ton of change and progress to happen in the wake of his death, and that just didn't happen," said Cathy Renna, an expert on lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender rights and managing partner of Renna Communications, an LGBT advocacy group based in Washington, D.C.

Shepard, then 21, was studying political science at the University of Wyoming and was openly gay. Because of his sexual orientation, Shepard was specifically targeted by Russell Henderson and Aaron McKinney on the night of Oct. 7, 1998. Both men are serving two consecutive life-sentences in prison for his kidnapping and murder.

"We can't get a federal law through - it's called the Matthew Shepard Act for God's sake. ... It's a no brainer, and somehow it can't get passed," Renna said. "So we're a decade later, to try and get a piece [of] federal hate crimes legislation passed that includes sexual orientation and gender identity."

Although the U.S. House and Senate passed the Matthew Shepard Act in 2007, it never made it into law. Initially part of a larger bill authorizing increased pay for military personal, the Shepard Act was dropped from the bill's final

It remains stalled in Congress, though the House and Senate are set to hear it again in early 2009.

According to Julie Haught, a Bowling Green State University professor in LGBT studies, Capitol Hill isn't the only place where legal equality for gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgenders has stalled out.

"I would argue that here, in this century, we've been seeing some backlash," she said. "And I think it's best evidenced by the way in which right wing forces have used gay marriage initiatives to rally their bases for elections. Classic choice and example, I think, is 2004."

In that year there were 13 separate state ballot initiatives to ban same-sex marriage, according to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, an advocacy group that

waiting for new administration, for tracks LGBT initiatives and legislation among other things. All of them passed. Two more states joined the list in 2005, and eight more in 2006.

> Currently, only four states allow gay marriage or civil unions. California became one as recently as May, although an initiative to ban same-sex marriage, Proposition 8, will appear on that state's Nov.

> In terms of hate crime legislation protecting LGBT people the numbers do go up - slightly.

> Eleven states and the District of Columbia have hate crimes laws protecting on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity. An additional 20 states have laws protecting only sexual orientation.

> But Haught and Renna argue that legislation isn't the most effective way to gauge cultural acceptance.

"There's been an effective kind of backlash, but I think the general movement of the population is towards inclusion," Haught said. "At least verbally.'

"Cultural progress always precedes political progress and legislative progress. And so the fact is that culture has moved some, not a ton, but some," Renna noted.

Duckett said these "troubling" numbers will not affect the competency of volunteers or lower requirements in areas such as safety and training at foreign posts.

Although the economy may affect his departure, Weldon said, he is determined to go.

"The lifestyle that you live in Peace Corps is something that you can't get from too many other organizations," he said.





Do you remember when you were a child, and you would play with goo?

You would roll it, mold it and marvel at how sticky and easy it is to shape.

Then you would stack a bunch of it together to form crazy goo structures in order to loving goo species.

Then either you had an thought.

The premise of "World of Goo" is absurdly simple: Drag and drop goo droplets to connect them to each other to form goo structures. These structures are built with the sole purpose of reaching an exit pipe at the end of the level.



From one weight room-loving lineman to another, Texas Tech left tackle Rylan Reed welcomes the incoming competition Texas defensive end Brian Orakpo brings.

"He benches what? 510 pounds? That's not normal," Reed said of Orakpo, who leads the Big 12 Conference with 8.5 sacks and 12 tackles for loss. "So I mean he kind of possesses everything. You gotta watch speed. You gotta watch bull rush, spin moves. You gotta watch everything. He's an all-around player."

It's ironic how the 6-foot-7, 305-pound Reed, who bench pressed a Tech record 625 pounds this past summer, is calling someone else's bench press abnormal. However, he may have a point considering Orakpo's size. The Houston native is 6-foot-4, 260 pounds and can bench 515, squat 600 and power clean 380 pounds.






