GALVESTON (AP) - The University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston was already in financial distress before Hurricane Ike's devastation and laying off 3,800 people is designed to keep the state's oldest medical school from going bankrupt, officials said.

The UT Board of Regents unanimously approved the cuts Wednesday during a meeting in El Paso, saying they want to keep the medical school in Galveston but could not allow it to continue losing as much as \$40 million a month since Ike hit the island in September.

The attack outside Jalalabad, the capital of the eastern Nangarhar province, also wounded 74 civilians, said Ajmal Pardes, a provincial health official.



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



Wreck leaves three Tech students dead

Three Texas Tech students died after a traffic accident Sunday in Grimes County.

Jeffery Michael Inns and Kyle Drew Anderson, of Montgomery, were pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, which happened around 1:10 p.m. Sunday. Chelsea Wiseman, of Austin, died at Hermann Memorial Hospital in Houston after she initially was in critical condition.

A fourth Tech student, Marissa Whitworth, a freshman, involved in the accident is in good condition according to the hospital. The driver, Robert Baigrie, did not sustain any serious injuries.

The 2008 Subaru Legacy the Tech students were driving in was

traveling westbound on SH 105 about 2.7 miles east of Plantersville when the vehicle traveled into the eastbound lane, according to the Department of Public Safety.

The Subaru collided with a 2006 Dodge Ram. The accident still is under investigation.

The Tech division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management released a memorandum stating the Tech flag at Memorial Circle would be lowered in Anderson and Inns' memory Nov. 24 and Dec. 1, respectively. No release was made for the death of Wiseman as of press time Thursday.

The families of the students were not available for comment by press time.

November is a time for more than just Thanksgiving celebrations.

Members of the Texas Tech and Lubbock communities gathered Thursday evening at the Museum of Texas Tech University for a film and panel discussion that celebrated Native American Heritage Month, which was established to recognize the contributions of America's first inhabitants.

"We're never going to escape it and, in many ways, we are the creations of our past," said Ethan Schmidt, an assistant professor of history at Tech.

Participants of the American Indian Film Festival gathered in the museum's auditorium to watch the documentary "Incident at Oglala — The Leonard Peltier Story."

The film covers the events surrounding the shootout on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota in which Peltier was convicted for the death of two FBI agents.

Thea Zental, a senior finance and economics major from Germany, said she was impressed by the kinship within the Native American community shown in the film.





College bowl gives 9 teams mental workout

Nine teams competing Thursday evening in the Tech Activities Board's 2008 College Bowl were expected to know about the Spice Girls, Roman gods and everything in between.

The winner of the double-elimination competition received a plaque and trophy combination as well as gift cards to Main Event, said the coordinator of the TAB bowl.

Derek Kelsheimer, a junior marketing and management major from Richmond, said though the competition was not strictly academic, it brought an element most TAB events do not.

"A lot of our events are fun, recreational - interacting with students," he said. "This one is more of an academic based --- we're still here to have fun, it just brings more knowledge."

As an additional prize, he said, he hopes TAB will be able to help the winning team make the trip to the regional tournament, if one occurs.

Teams buzzed-in to answer the questions, and an incorrect answer resulted in no points. However, if a team buzzed in the middle of the question, they either could earn the points for a correct answer or lose five points for an incorrect answer.

The team that correctly answered the question earned three exclusive bonus questions, each also worth 10 points

After the three bonus questions, the moderator went back to a toss-up question to determine which team received the next bonus questions.

The defending champions of the TAB College Bowl, named "That's

Ridiculous," consists of five teammates who each have a different major.

Jonathan Barton, a senior political science and public relations major from Amarillo, said the academic diversity of teammates allows them to cover a broad range of topics.

One change from the previous year of competition is an increase in science questions, which is one of the team's weaknesses, said Barton, the team's captain.

Barton said the team also is utilizing "strategery," which should help them "bring home the 'W."

The team also consisted of Andy Kennedy, Jon "The Donald" Hall, Robert Brauer and Tim Kennedy.

Bryan Mason, a sophomore civil engineering major from Holliday, said he knew the questions would be difficult but hoped the team's knowledge of pop culture would help it get through the competition.



Heisman Trophy not far away from being in Harrell's hands

Texas Tech quarterback Graham Harrell always has been considered a politically correct quarterback during interviews. Ask him what receiver is playing best, and he'll find a way to put every wideout's name in the answer. He's just that kind of person, giving credit where credit is due.

In the past few weeks, he has put that political skill to the test, jumping to the forefront of the Heisman Trophy chatter after three-straight victories against top-ranked foes catapulted his football team to places few ever imagined.

"There's definitely a lot of deserving people out there," Harrell said. "The Heisman Trophy, I think, like I've said in the past, has become an award that is more about team wins than individual actual numbers and things."

So let's talk numbers.



However, this season, Knight will not have that problem.


