### Wal-Mart truck used to smuggle immigrants

McALLEN (AP) — Four illegal immigrants were found in the back of a Wal-Mart truck, and the driver and two alleged accomplices were accused of trying to smuggle them through a Border Patrol checkpoint.

Authorities acting on a tip arrested driver Alejandro Hernandez and two other suspects Thursday just south of a checkpoint at Falfurrias, authorities said. The four Mexican nationals in the trailer also were taken into custody.

### Bonfire blamed for sparking wildfire

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A bonfire built by a group of young adults caused a weekend wildfire in Santa Barbara that destroyed 210 homes, including multimillion dollar mansions, and injured more than two dozen people, authorities said Tuesday.

An anonymous tip led to the discovery that 10 college students had gathered for a late night hangout at an abandoned property where the fire originated, Santa Barbara County Sheriff Bill Brown said. He declined to say which college the students attended.

### US says it fired at insurgents in Pakistan

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) - U.S. troops in Afghanistan launched a barrage of artillery at insurgents attacking their position from inside Pakistan's volatile tribal region, in a cross-border strike coordinated with Pakistan's military, U.S. and NATO officials said Tuesday.

The strike less than a mile inside Pakistan came after the militants fired rockets at a U.S. position in Afghanistan. Al-Qaida and Taliban militants have long found refuge in the border region, where they launch attacks on U.S. and NATO forces in Afghanistan.

Sunday's operation highlights growing cooperation between Afghan, Pakistani and U.S. officers, military officials said.

## Lowered gas prices afford students chance to make trip to Norman

**By MIKE GRAHAM** STAFF WRITER

Gasoline prices fell steeply during the past few weeks just in time to ease the burden on students' wallets for travel to and from Norman, Okla., for the football game between No. 2 Texas Tech and No. 5 Oklahoma.

Peter Summers, a Tech assistant professor in economics, said international economic uncertainty has played a major role in slumping fuel prices.

"It seems that most of the developed world is going into recession or already has," he said. "Prices are much lower than they have been in a very long time. Consumer spending is declining or slowing down very sharply which is keeping demand for crude oil down."

In the short term, Summers said, the only way prices would increase would be if the gas supply chain was disrupted.

"Supply and demand are relatively fixed in with several friends.

the short term," he said. "Hurricane Ike caused gas in some places in the Southeast's gas prices to increase 30 to 40 cents overnight. But we're out of hurricane season, so it would have to be something big and totally unpredicted to disrupt supply — like a major refinery fire, which occurred to a Valero refinery last year."

Summers said he expects gas prices will remain low through the weekend.

"There are lots of things that could happen between now and then," he said. "But it would have to be something fairly surprising or severe to drive up prices quickly enough to impact prices this weekend."

The price decreases in gasoline have eased the monetary strain on students who plan to drive about 700 miles, round trip, between Lubbock and Norman.



## Tech judging teams win national titles

Two Texas Tech judging teams ranked best in the nation this week for the second consecutive year.

The Livestock Judging and Meat Judging teams won national championships in competitions Sunday in Dakota City, Neb., and Monday in Louisville, Ky., respectively.

Tech's Livestock Judging team won the 2008 North American International Livestock Exposition by a 50-point margin, breaking the previous contest record by 11 points.

The teams' wins shine a good light on Tech's Department of Animal and Food Sciences and the university, said Bryan Bernhard, a Livestock Judging team member and highest ranked individual at the competition.

"It's good to know you're at a successful university that has a lot of strengths," said Bernhard, a senior animal sciences major from

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## Tanker capture raises alarm over Somali piracy

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — It seems inconceivable: Somali pirates in speedboats foil warships from the world's most powerful navies to prey on shipping lanes crucial to the oil

How do they do it? Basically, it's a big ocean and no one wants to be

NATO and the U.S. Navy say they can't be everywhere, and American officials are urging ships to hire private security. Warships patrolling off Somalia have succeeded in stopping some pirate attacks. But

military assaults to wrest back a ship are highly risky and, to this point, uncommon.

Yet when pirates took their biggest prize to date over the weekend - a Saudi supertanker carrying \$100 million worth of crude oil — it raised the stakes dramatically. The pirates struck hundreds of miles off the coast of East Africa, far out to sea where ships were presumed to be safe.

Governments, navies, oil companies and ship owners are scrambling for solutions, and finding few options are ideal. At least one private

security company said it has been flooded with requests from shipping companies for protection, including from Saudis.

Shippers and insurance companies that once minimized piracy's risks - at worse, pay a ransom, get your ship, crew and cargo back unharmed - have now awakened to the potential economic impact. The turmoil could force cargo ships and tankers to take longer routes around Africa, drive up costs and, though it hasn't happened yet, even raise oil prices.

said, it cost him \$60 to \$65 to fill his gas tank, but it recently has been costing him closer to \$35.

With gas prices as low as they are now, he said, he might be able to afford to travel to the Big 12 Conference Championship Game in Kansas City, Mo., if Tech defeats Oklahoma, and possibly a Tech bowl game in addition to driving home for Thanksgiving. Aday said he would not miss the

Tech-Oklahoma game regardless of the teams' respective records.

"It's Tech versus Oklahoma," Aday said. "It's a huge game no matter what, but going to Norman this year and what's at stake is a once-ina-lifetime opportunity."

Although gas prices have fallen, students like Tucker Williams, a sophomore from Dripping Springs, said simply driving around Lubbock are remaining conservative with their gas usage.

"I know gas prices will rise up again," Williams said. "So the drop in price has not affected me. I'm driving the same amount I have been lately — I don't speed as much as I used to and I don't accelerate as quick as I did to save gas."

NEW YORK (AP) — Country singer Mindy McCready claims she broke off her relationship with Roger Clemens when the former baseball star wouldn't marry her, according to an interview to be broadcast Monday by the syndicated show "Inside Edition."

McCready, however, was quoted on the Web site of the New York Daily News on Monday as saying she didn't want to marry Clemens.

McCready told "Inside Edition" she met Clemens when she was 16, not 15, as reported by the New York Daily News last April. She told the news magazine they met in a karaoke bar, that her relationship with the pitcher didn't turn sexual until several years later and the relationship lasted for a decade.

"Carrying on a relationship with him is not something I'm proud of," she said, according to a partial transcript released by the show. "Roger Clemens is one of the most

## Lawyer: Jackson may be too sick to travel

LONDON (AP) — Michael Jackson might be too sick to travel to London to testify in a suit claiming he owes an Arab sheik \$7 million, the pop star's attorney said Tuesday.

Jackson is seeking to give his testimony by video link from the United States.

"It would be unwise for him to travel, given what's he's got now," lawyer Robert Englehart said, declining to elaborate "for the obvious reasons."

A lawyer for Sheik Abdulla bin Hamad Al Khalifa said the medical evidence presented by Jackson's legal team was unsatisfactory.

"It's not the first time a sick note has been presented by Mr. Jackson," the lawyer, Bankim Thanki said. He gave no precise indication of what the illness might be, but told the court that Jackson's condition could be treated with a bandage "if the diagnosis is positive."

Jackson has often been seen wearing a surgical mask in public. In one infamous court appearance in California, he appeared to have a bandage hanging from his hollowed-out nose.



## Round 2: Tech expects more experienced Bradford

STAFF WRITER

Texas Tech safety Darcel McBath does not remember any specifics in last year's win against Oklahoma, when Tech shoved the Sooners out of the national championship picture.

"Getting the 'W,' that's all I remember really," McBath said. "I don't remember much of too many plays or anything in particular but just us winning the game."

What about OU's freshman quarterback Sam Bradford, the nations leader in passing efficiency at the time, going down with a concussion in the first quarter?

Back-up quarterback Joey Halzle stepped in for Bradford and OU's offense sputtered as Tech's Graham Harrell manufactured 24-straight points in the first of five-straight wins over ranked opponents for the Red Raiders.

"Oh yeah that did happen," said McBath, whose No. 2 Red Raiders collide with No. 5 OU at 7 p.m. Saturday in Norman, Okla. "It's all a blur. When we're so focused, I don't even think about all the stuff."

If McBath cannot remember it, Bradford probably does not either.

Now the 6-foot-4, 218-pound Bradford is a year older, and he has

been playing like it all season. The sophomore is second in the nation with a 188.94 passer rating, fourth in totaloffense with 343 yards per game and first in touchdown passes with 38.

In OU's last three games, its offense gradually increased its scoring from 58 against Kansas State to 62 against Nebraska and 66 at Texas A&M, so it's no surprise the Sooners rank first in the nation in scoring offense with 51.4 points per game. No other team is averaging more than 50 points a game.

Tech safety Daniel Charbonnet acknowledged Bradford as "the best professional quarterback that we'll face," putting Bradford ahead of Kansas State's Josh Freeman, Kansas' Todd Reesing, Texas' Colt McCoy and Oklahoma State's Zac Robinson. Charbonnet did not specify if he was including practicing against Harrell in his assessment of Bradford.

With his statement, it is clear Charbonnet understands this year's game against OU will have a higher degree of difficulty than 2007.






