Organization and residents sue FEMA

McALLEN (AP) — A farmworker rights organization and 14 poor South Texas residents sued the Federal Emergency Management Agency on Thursday alleging that the agency refused to help thousands of poor families repair their homes after Hurricane Dolly.

The lawsuit, filed in federal court in Brownsville by Texas Rio Grande Legal Aid on behalf of the residents and La Union del Pueble Entero or LUPE, says that FEMA denied requests for money to cover home repairs to 10,000 to 15,000 residents in the Rio Grande Valley since the July 23 hurricane.

Congress rushes to extend benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jarred by new jobless alarms, Congress raced to approve legislation Thursday to keep unemployment checks flowing through the December holidays and into the new year for a million or more laid-off Americans whose benefits are running out.

The economic picture was only getting worse, if Wall Street was any indication. The Dow Jones industrials dropped more than 400 points for a second straight day, reaching the lowest level in more than five years, and the Standard & Poor's 500 index fell below lows established six years ago.

Iragis fight loudly over US security pact

BAGHDAD (AP) — Iraq's parliament persevered Thursday in its debate on a proposed security agreement with the United States despite raucous attempts by opposition lawmakers to disrupt proceedings ahead of next week's vote on

The measure, which would keep U.S. forces in Iraq for another three years, has a good chance of passing in the Shiite-led parliament. But the uproar created by loyalists of radical Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr suggests the pact could remain divisive as the country struggles for reconciliation after years of war.

Hispanic enrollment inconsistent with Texas population

Lubbock officials predict one-third of the population of Lubbock will be Hispanic by 2010.

Hispanic presence at Texas Tech.

"The growth of student enrollment is more of a reverse procedure, meaning when Tech enrollment grows, Lubbock grows," said Senior Planner David

The City of Lubbock Web site reported a 24.7 percent increase in the Hispanic population from 2000 to 2008, bringing Lubbock's total Hispanic population to 31.8 percent, a percentage which is consistent with Texas as a whole.

Karl Eschbach, a demographer for the state of Texas, said 32 percent of the state's current population is Hispanic. He expects Texas' Hispanic population to increase to 36 percent by 2010, but he said the population growth is not consistent with Hispanic presence at college campuses across the state.

"I know that Hispanic college enrollment lags behind the population growth," Eschbach said. "We are aware that enrollment rates for this ethnicity fall behind the total number of Hispanics in Texas."

According to Tech's Institutional Research and

Information Management Web site, 9.8 percent of enrolled students were Hispanic in the fall semester of 2000. In the fall of 2007, 12.1 percent of the university's enrolled students were Hispanic.

While the number of Hispanics enrolled is in-But campus statistics tell a different story about creasing slightly, Rosa H. Gallegos, associate director of Tech's Cross-Cultural Academic Advancement Center, said she believes family plays a large role in the number of Hispanic students attending college in Texas, and family support is important to Hispanic

"Building their own family on campus is important," she said, "because that's the way students compensate for not having their own family here."

Gallegos acknowledged that the small portion of Hispanic students on Tech's campus is inconsistent with the Hispanic population statewide.

"We're at about 12 percent right now," she said, "but that's a very tiny part of the whole student body."

As Tech attempts to grow total enrollment, Gallegos believes the number of Hispanic students will grow too, and the Cross-Cultural Academic Advancement Center is preparing to welcome a more diverse student body.

"From my point of view, it all depends on the resources," she said, "The number of Hispanic students will only grow as much as our resources grow."


opinions and suggestions regarding an alcohol sales zoning draft prior to a potential Lubbock County May 2009 alcohol sales expansion vote.

Neugebauer opposes automaker bailout

Congressman Randy Neugebauer said he does not support the \$25 billion in aid Detroit automakers are requesting, which the

auto companies said is necessary for their long-term survival. Earlier this week, the chief executives of the three Detroit automakers — Robert L. Nardelli of Chrysler, Alan R. Mulally



of Ford and Rick Wagoner of Chevrolet — were back on Capitol Hill appealing to the House of Representatives to approve \$25 billion in bailout funds to stave off industry collapse, according to The As-

sociated Press. Neugebauer, the deputy ranking member of the financial services committee, said he has been concerned with the large

degree of government intervention in the U.S. financial markets.

"I am not convinced that further government spending will address the issues of these struggling automotive companies or our economy," he said in a statement. "Congress must draw the line somewhere. We cannot keep writing blank checks, expanding our national debt and leveraging our children and grandchildren's future."

Neugebauer said the federal government must be held ac-

countable for the total cost and exposure put on taxpayers. "Congress also has an opportunity to take a step back and reassess how funds not yet committed from the bailout legislation should be used or whether these funds are still needed,"

Michelle Richmond, Neugebauer's communications director, said the congressman believes it is wrong for Congress to pick winners and losers in the economy.

"Congressman Neugebauer has always been concerned about government intervention in our financial markets," Richmond said. "He voted no against the first economic rescue package because he believed the legislation was not the best way to solve the problem. He continues to believe that American taxpayers, who made conservative lending and investment decisions, should not have to pay for the mistakes made on Wall Street."





SGA reviews IT budget discrepancy

The final Texas Tech Student Government Association Student Senate meeting of the fall 2008 semester ended Thursday night with three resolutions passed and one resolution tabled until the next meeting.

Senate Resolution 44.24 addressed information technology costs split between the Information Technology Department and Housing and Residence Life.

Because the authors of the bill were not able to get the housing side of the story before the meeting, the bill was tabled until the next meeting, when it will go to a vote.

According to the resolution, the two departments split the \$509,334 cost, with the housing department paying 75 percent of the cost and the IT department paying 25 percent of the

However, the budget for housing did not include the IT costs for fiscal




year 2009 or fiscal year 2010. Sarah Saunders, a member of the Rules and Administration Committee and an author of the bill, said this is a potential problem, because students not living on campus are unable to use the IT services provided by the residence halls.

According to state law, Saunders said, the IT student fee cannot be used to support auxiliary operations, which includes residence hall-only

for Lubbock, Beane said, because Lubbock is much larger than the other communities in Lubbock County and the city is the second-largest remaining city with significant alcohol sales restrictions - second only to Salt Lake City, Utah.

"There are very few communities we can compare ourselves to," Beane said. "Most cities have not had restrictive alcohol sales laws in years, so we're kind of on our own on this one."

Beginning Oct. 1, Let Lubbock Vote, a political action committee solely interested on getting alcohol sales expansion issues on the May ballot began two simultaneous petition drives which required 18,747 registered Lubbock County voters to sign the respective petitions, according to previous articles in The

Daily Toreador.

Less than two weeks later, Let Lubbock Vote announced it believed it obtained enough signatures to get the two petition issues onto the May ballot.

Eddie McBride, Let Lubbock Votes' chairman, said approximately 23,000 people signed each petition.

The petitions were submitted on Nov. 12 to the Lubbock County Office of Elections where the elections office is inspecting the signatures on the petitions to verify that at least 18,747 registered Lubbock County voters signed the two respective

The elections office has until Dec. 12 to evaluate the petitions, according to the articles. From there, the petitions will be submitted to the Lubbock County Commissioners Court who will place the two petitions' propositions on the May

Explosion, fire reported at Tyler refinery

TYLER (AP) — An explosion and fire at an East Texas oil refinery Thursday injured four workers, two

of them critically. Officials said two employees were taken to a Dallas hospital, where they were in critical condition with burns. Two others were in good condition at Tyler hospitals.

All other workers at the refinery, located about 90 miles east of Dallas, were accounted for, said Paula Lovell, spokeswoman for Nashville, Tenn.-based Delek Refining Ltd.

Tyler Fire Department Capt. Jeff Akin said several fire crews were able to bring the fire mostly under control within about an hour Thursday

The refinery, which employs about 270, refines up to 60,000 barrels of crude per day and is the 94th-largest oil refinery in the U.S., according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

The refinery is located in a mostly industrial area. People in a nearby residential area were advised to stay indoors, and other Tyler residents were asked to stay

Tom Mullins didn't hear an explosion but he could see it from his third-floor office window half mile away.

"For an hour or so there were large clouds of thick black smoke billowing up from the refinery," said Mullins, president/CEO of the Tyler Area Chamber of Commerce. "This is a refinery that's been there for decades.... We were worried about the people."

UN approves sanctions on Somali pirates

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.N. Security Council voted unanimously Thursday to impose sanctions on pirates, arms smugglers, and perpetrators of instability in Somalia in a fresh attempt to help end years of lawlessness in the Horn of Africa nation.

The 15-nation council endorsed a British plan for a council panel to recommend people and entities whose financial assets would be frozen and who would face a travel ban. It also reaffirms an arms embargo.

Enforcing the sanctions poses steep challenges, however, as those responsible for much of the anarchy plaguing the country are well outside any traditional finance

such mayhem there," Britain's U.N. Ambassador John Sawers said. "There are other problems — off the coast of Somalia with piracy. There are problems in Somalia

Somalia has been without a functioning government since 1991 when clan warlords ousted a longtime dictator. The current government, formed in 2004 with the help of the U.N., has failed to protect citizens while it battles a growing Islamist

The council action was followed by discussion on the deteriorating situation in Somalia — both on land and at sea, which includes some of the world's most important shipping routes.

U.N. Assistant Secretary-Geninto Somalia, which is such causing eral for Peacekeeping Raisuddin Zenenga reflected the view of many speakers when he said: "Piracy, as well as the recent terrorist attacks against international targets, are only symptoms of the fundamental problem which is the state of anarchy in Somalia."

He said the multinational effort being mobilized to fight the pirates off Somalia - involving the European Union, NATO countries, Russia, India and others — should be replicated to mobilize an international force to tackle the security problems in Somalia itself.

U.S. deputy ambassador Rosemary DiCarlo called for immediate steps to stabilize the deteriorating security situation, which threatens political progress and an Oct. 26 cease-fire agreement between the Somali government and the

lation Wednesday that amends the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 to put Congress back in control of the taxpayer's money. Neugebauer said the federal government must be held accountable for the decisions made on behalf of the American taxpayers.

"The federal government cannot keep writing a blank check to our financial institutions in hopes of solving the current instability," Neugebauer said in a statement. "Prior to allowing Treasury to use another \$350 billion of the taxpayer's money, I believe Congress must step back to evaluate the alternatives. Although stabilizing the markets is a priority, we must ensure a longterm solution that will allow the government an exit strategy."

The legislation, H.R. 7276, requires Congress to vote on

the Treasury's plans for using the second \$350 billion. With this approach, no funds could be spent until after Congress passes a resolution that specifically approves the Treasury's plans. Under the current law, the Treasury department can spend funds without the approval of Congress.

"While in Washington, Congressman Neugebauer continues to meet with financial experts to discuss possible alternatives," Richmond said. "He remains committed to working with his colleagues to develop a solution that will provide the federal government an exit strategy while leaving the financial markets and economy stronger.'

Leach tries for win at Oklahoma in highly anticipated matchup

Although Texas Tech coach Mike Leach helped establish a productive system for years to come as offensive coordinator for Oklahoma in 1999, that does not mean fans take it any easier on him when he makes the trip to Norman, Okla.

"I wouldn't think," said Leach, whose No. 2 Red Raiders take part in another pivotal game against No. 5 Oklahoma at 7 p.m. Saturday in Norman. "I haven't really found that to be the case; going to Owen Field is not a take-it-easy-onsomebody environment really."


