THIS LATEST COLD wave, although it brought some welcome moisture to our area the first of the week, was an abrupt reminder that winter still can deliver a punch despite the nearness of spring.

THAT LOSS Friday night to the Clyde Bulldogs was a heart-breaker for the Bears. But a victory would not have meant Baird had clear sailing into the playoffs.

Had Baird won, the Bears would have to have played Eastland in a single, sudden-death game to determine which team would represent the district against the 9-A champion.

Eastland, as all Baird fans know, has a top-notch boys team. They would have been very hard to defeat, especially if the game had been in Eastland.

WITH THEIR CLOSE, come-from-behind win at Clyde last Friday night, the Baird Bearetties completed their third straight district season without a loss.

In fact, only one team has planned a district loss on the Baird girls in the last five years. That team, Eula, defeated Baird twice in conference warfare in the 1961-62 season, and once in the 1960-61 season.

But since they became members of this present Class A district, Baird girls have yet to taste a defeat while running up three straight 10-A championships.

We wonder if any girls team in the state can match that record.

WHILE FILINGS have been slow so far in Baird, both local elections coming up in April could turn out to be contested. There are several rumored candidates here for both the school board and the city council races.

While many people do not share our view, we feel that a contested race for either group is a good sign -- a sign that people in the community have a deep interest in their city and their school.

Re-Entry Project Set for County

Rhodes Drilling Co., of Abilene filed application to re-enter to 680 feet with rotary, in a Callahan County regular field project 12 miles northeast of Baird. Located on a 1,151.89 acre lease, it is No. 1-A Jackson, Drillsite is 300 feet from the north and west lines of Section 2, G&M Survey.

It was originally drilled and plugged as William A. Austin No. 1 Jackson.

Gulf Central Oil & Gas Co., and Pete Palasota, both of Abilene, staked an offset to a recent discovery five miles northwest of Clyde in Callahan County.

It is No. 1 Gale Dyer Akers, located 1,336 feet from the south and 1,548 feet from the west lines of Section 55, BBB&C Survey. Permit depth applied for is 4,000 feet with rotary to test the Moran Sand and Gardner.

Site places the project 660 feet south of Rhodes Drilling Co. No. 1-J A. E. Dyer, re-entry project completed as a Moran Sand discovery in the regular field.

Four Escapees Held in Jail

Four teenagers from Pennsylvania were still in Callahan County jail Wednesday, awaiting officers who are to return them to their home state. All four recently escaped from a detention home in Pennsylvania.

The boys were stopped about 7 p. m. Sunday by Bob Favor of Baird, highway patrolman. He arrested the four, ranging in age from 15 to 17, about eight miles east of Baird. They were driving a stolen car.

Favor handcuffed two of the boys together, but while he was handcuffing the other two, the first pair grabbed Favor's keys from his patrol car and ran into the pasture adjacent to the highway.

The second pair remained in the patrol car while Favor briefly chased the escapees, then radioed for help. Officers from throughout this area, assisted by a number of citizens, searched the area for several hours Sunday night.

The two escapees flagged a motorist and came to a Baird cafe about 1 a. m. Monday. Officers arrested them there. They were then placed in Callahan County jail, where their companions were already confined.

The Bearettes had to subdue an aroused Clyde team, 43-40, Friday night to wind up the district chase unbeaten. That same night, Baird's Bears were blasted from a tie for the boys crown by Clyde, 58-52.

Eastland, the team which was tied with Baird for the boys lead going into the final night, won the championship by whipping Cross Plains, 74-41.

with a torrid fourth quarter to sink the Clyde girls. Baird took the first-quarter lead, 13-9, but could count only three points during the entire second period -- all on free throws -- to trail at halftime by 25-16.

The third period was about even, with neither team scoring well. Clyde was ahead, 32-24 when it ended.

Come To Life

But the Bearettes roared to life in the fourth period to score 19 points to eight for Clyde. Vickie Jones accounted for 11 of the Bear points in that quarter.

Miss Jones was high for Baird with 24 points, but Mitzl Trussell took honors for the night with 27. Yvonne Shelnett hit 12 for Baird and Sally Green had seven.

The Bears, hampered by illness, took an early lead against the Bulldogs. It was 13-7 for Baird after one quarter and 23-19 at halftime. Clyde gained eight points on the Bears in the third period, and when it ended were ahead 37-33.

Best Quarter

Scoring-wise, the fourth was the best quarter for both teams, but the Bulldogs increased their lead by two more points.

Bobby Black of Baird and Ken Kniffen of Clyde tied for scoring honors with 18 each. Tommy Barton added 14 for Baird and Kelton Jones was next with six.

Maxie Gordon, who started all season, saw no action because of illness and Wally Harris, another Baird regular, played only briefly for the same reason.

AUSTIN — Gov. John Connally's top legislative project -- creation of a powerful coordinating board to control state colleges and universities -- apparently is headed for early enactment.
Bills to establish the board breezed through Senate and House committees to floor calendars with direct attack after members of the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School testified for them.
Quick and easy committee approval contradicted early rumbles that establishment of the strong central board would meet vigorous opposition in the Legislature.
It seems that opposition, if there is to be any, will be confined to specific details of the bill and not to the overall proposal.
If enacted, the 18-member coordinating board would have broad powers over all aspects of higher education in Texas -- junior colleges, as well as senior institutions.
It would have the final word on launching or eliminating college degree programs, control the addition or deletion of courses, develop future plans for higher education and pass on proposals to create new senior colleges.
It would supplant the existing Commission on Higher Education, although members of the commission would be eligible for appointment to the board.
Said Governor Connally: "I am very pleased with the action of the two committees. This reflects what I have said all along -- that there is a great will and desire on the part of the Legislature to make some real strides toward excellence in higher education."

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria is handling the bill in the House and Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan has it in the Senate.
WOMEN'S RIGHTS DEBATED — Legislative committees set aside another Ladies' Night to hear a familiar debate -- should the state constitution be amended to insure that no legal rights be "denied or abridged because of sex?"
Without even hearing argument for or against, a Senate panel quickly agreed that the amendment should be submitted to the voters.
On the other hand, the House committee listened to hours of testimony. Most of it was in opposition to such an amendment. The State Bar and spokesmen for university law schools led the opposition.
Opponents claim the amendment goes too far and would "open a Pandora's box" of future litigation. Specific statutory changes were recommended as preferable for correcting such discrimination as might exist.
Spokesmen for the women's groups, who have stubbornly pushed the amendment, retort with considerable conviction: after all these years of talking about giving women full powers to manage their property and other rights long denied them, little serious effort has been made to repeal the discriminatory statutes one at a time.
POOLING BILL NEAR PASSAGE — Although subject to bitter legislative controversy two years ago, the oil and gas lease pooling bill cleared the Senate with no more than a handful of dissenting votes.
There was practically no flood discussion on the bill which is backed by Governor Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, as

well as most oil and gas interests.
Its House companion landed in a friendly sub-committee after an extended hearing.
Bill would authorize Texas Commission to prescribe requirements for owners of small tracts to pool their interest for oil and gas drilling purposes when they cannot get together voluntarily.
Among opponents of the bill were members of the Texas Farm Bureau and local farm bureaus in oil counties which have had small-tract problems.
C. H. Devaney of Coahoma TFB president, asked the committee to consider the opposition to the bill "in the light of the fact that an overwhelming majority of our member families are landowners and that the Texas Farm Bureau probably represents the largest single group of landowners in any organization."
Devaney read a policy statement saying in part, "We oppose any and all legislation that would deny the landowner or mineral owners the American tradition of freedom of choice."
Free choice remained the central issue as the measure went on House and Senate calendars. Opponents called the measure "compulsory unitization" and "land collectivism." House sponsor, Rep. Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, said it is intended "to encourage voluntary pooling."

PERMIAN RATE CASE ARGUED — Three top Texas officials entered personal protests before the Federal Power Commission in Washington of gas rate findings for the Permian Basin area of West Texas and New Mexico.
Governor Connally, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon argued against approval of an F.P.C. examiner's memorandum recommending a rate range of 10 cents per million cubic feet to 16.75 cents per mcf. State contended single price of 20 cents per mcf would be more reasonable and forward-looking.
Adoption of the examiner's findings would be a serious economic blow to the state. It would result in a tax loss of \$4,500,000 a year, officials contended. They pointed out that 4,700,000 acres of land belonging to the University of Texas or the Permanent School Fund are located in the vast Permian Basin. Income to the university and the public schools, in addition

to substantial losses of taxes, depend heavily on gas prices. Similar hearings, Carr reported, already have begun in the Gulf Coast and East Texas fields. Hearings begun in 1961, now cover 35,000 pages of testimony.
COMMITTEE ON AGING ENDORSED — Senate State Affairs Committee gave its blessing to establishment of the Governor's Committee on Aging as a permanent organization.
Sen. Walter Richter of Gonzales, chairman of the present committee, is author of the Senate bill to set up a nine-member panel aided by seven state officials and executives dealing with problems of aging. Committee now is trying to get programs going for senior citizens in every county.

COURTS SPEAK — Third Court of Civil Appeals agreed the trial court that the cigarette distributor's permit of a Houston dealer accused of participating in a fraud scheme which cost the state an estimated \$4,200,000 should be revoked.
Same court heard arguments on an eight year old case where the City of San Antonio seeks to overturn a ruling of the Texas Water Commission denying its application for supplemental water supply from Canyon Dam near New Braunfels. Commission (then the Board of Water Engineers) said the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority is entitled to available water to benefit the cities in its watershed.
CRIMINAL CODE REVISION FAVORED — Senate Jurisprudence Committee recommended passage of an overall revision of the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, which cleared the Legislature in 1963 but was vetoed because a faulty copy was sent to the governor.

Her fiancé, a graduate of Baird High School and Hardin-Simmons University, attended North Texas State University. He is employed in Abilene.

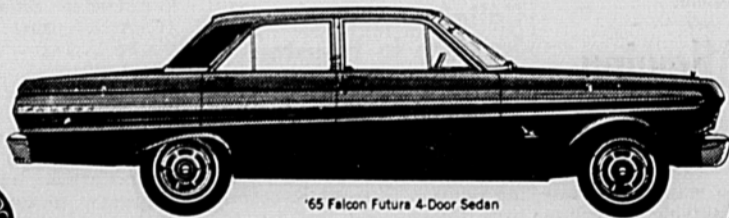
Miss Long, Jerry Corn To Marry on June 2

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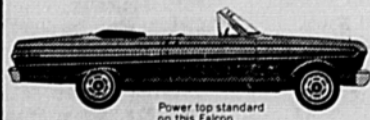

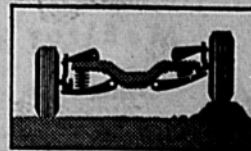

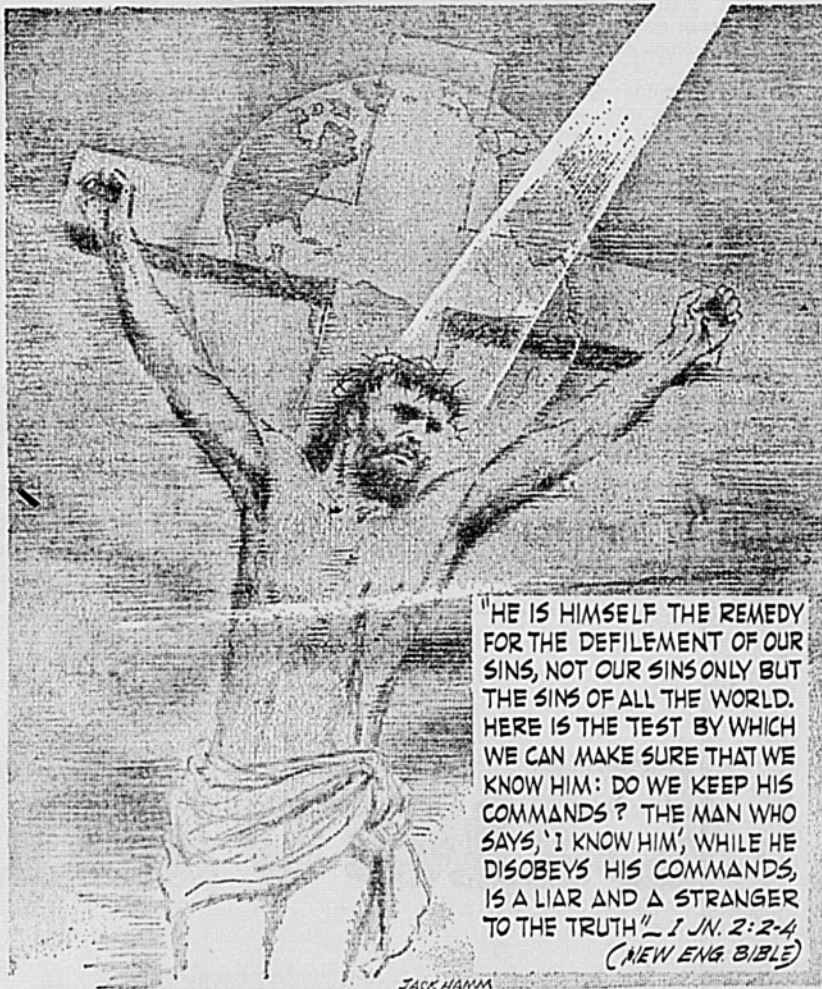

Bill is the result of four years work by a Senate Bar committee.

Most protests at the committee hearing centered on a section which would allow a convicted person to decide whether he wished a jury or a judge to determine the penalty.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED — Governor Connally appointed Rev. Robert S. Tate Jr. of Austin to the Texas Youth Council. He succeeds Dr. Guy Newman of Brownwood.

Connally also named Frank Sparks of Eastland as judge of the 91st district court. He succeeds the late Judge T. M. Collie.

Durwood Manford of Smiley was named to a new term on the State Board of Insurance.

CARR ASKS MORE MONEY — Attorney General Carr is seeking some \$210,000 more a year for his budget. Request is mainly for funds to represent Texas in hearings before federal agencies and to handle "scandal" cases.

Federal agencies must have a

better understanding of Texas problems, contends the attorney general. He noted that consumer state of the north and east have explained their cases in a more convincing manner than has Texas.

Carr said a scandal could result from judiciary committee hearing in support of a bill to tighten controls on such trusts.

WATER DEVELOPMENT BILLS — A friendly Senate subcommittee will consider a bill by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas which would authorize the Water Development Board to use the \$200,000,000 water development fund to build reservoirs, treatment plants, pipelines and other facilities for water delivery to wholesale users and to obtain permits for storage and use.

Two other Parkhouse water development bills also remain under Senate committee study. They would convert the Water Commission into the Water Rights Commission, an agency with expanded responsibilities and an executive director, and would revise the Water Develop-

ment Board and expand its powers, keeping the granting of permits with the Water Commission.

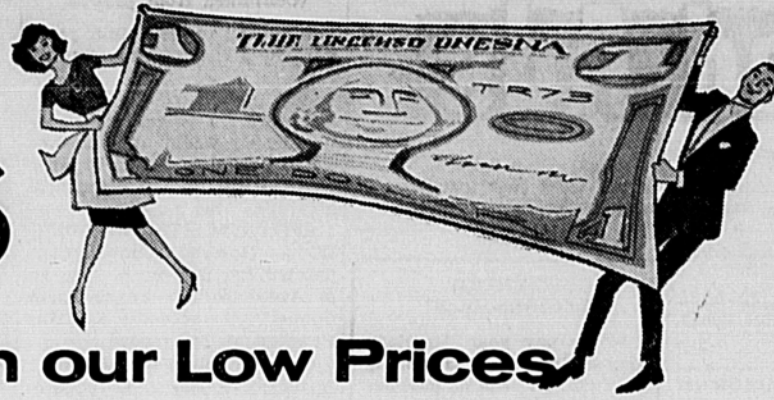
