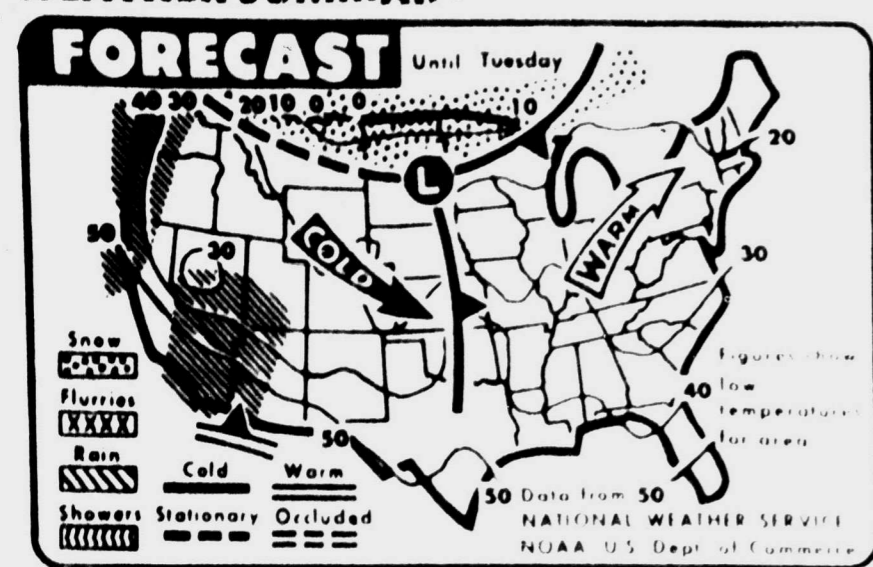


WEATHER SUMMARY

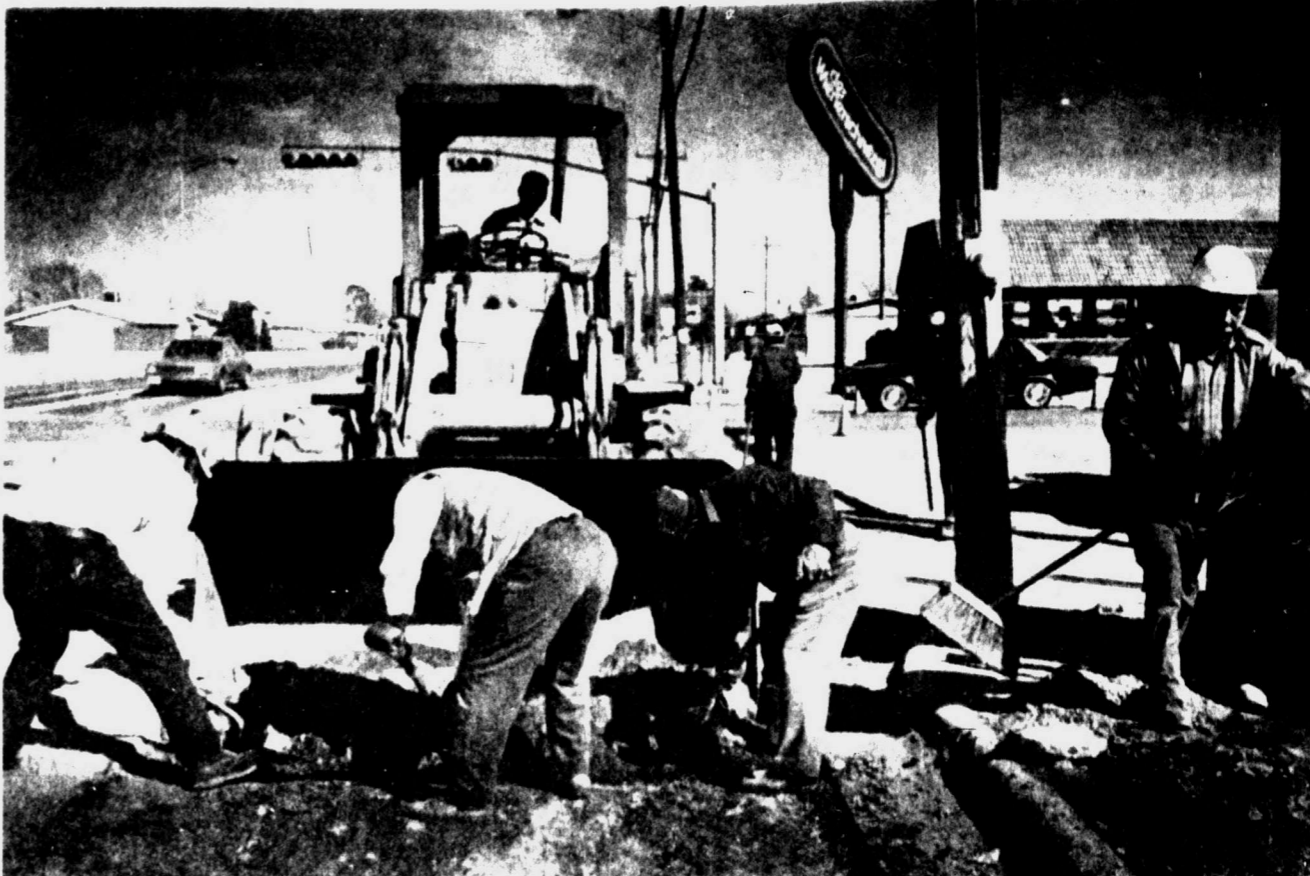

Cuban visitor tells of military bases

DALLAS (AP) — A former Cuban newspaper editor and political prisoner said the Soviet Union is "laughing at the United States" while it builds forts and nuclear submarine bases in his native land.

Some of the Soviet installations are so secret, said Eugenio de Sosa Chabao, that even Cuban President Fidel Castro is not allowed to visit them.

De Sosa said he served 20 years in a Cuban prison for being a "dangerous person" in Castro's eyes.

"Russia must really be laughing at the United States," said de Sosa, who claims 130,000 Russian, Bulgarian and East German soldiers are currently wearing Cuban uniforms.

He also said the Russians have a nuclear submarine base at Cienfuegos Bay where "atomic submarines are going in and out."

"Any atomic weapons in Cuba would blow up the southern United States if things ever get going," de Sosa said.

And, he said, the Soviets are behind a new "reign of terror" that has jailed 25,000 political prisoners and forced scores of Cubans to secretly flee for asylum in the United States.

"They are coming now like they were 15 years ago," he said. A week ago, 65 Cubans escaped to America on a barge.

De Sosa, 63, said he was subjected to electroshock treatments and other tortures while in prison.

He said his arrest as a dangerous person came because of his educational background and his refusal to accept the Communist doctrine. De Sosa said he attended the Choate School, England's Brighton College and law school in Havana.

In Cuba, he said, he owned a sugar plantation, mill and refinery and for five years was editor of Diario de la Marina, a conservative Havana newspaper that opposed Castro's takeover in 1960.

Although the death penalty was recommended, the prison jury obtained a 20-year sentence and a 20-year probation for him, de Sosa said.

After his release, he was reunited with his wife in Miami and came to Dallas to visit his five children and 17 grandchildren.

De Sosa said the Russian troop presence in Cuba is "... no secret. They've been there all these years."

Dangerous precedent reported

WASHINGTON (AP) — A congressional report says the Interstate Commerce Commission set a dangerous precedent by approving the rates railroads charge a Corpus Christi, Texas, utility for hauling coal to its new plant.

"If allowed to stand, this decision would severely erode protection for captive shippers which Congress sought to assure," the report of the House commerce subcommittee on oversight and investigations said.

The ICC authorized a coal freight rate of \$20.85 per ton for hauling coal to Central Power and Light Co.'s new generating station at Coletto Creek.

The report, released Saturday, said the main significance of the case was not in its relatively high rate but in the commission's justification for its decision.

The ICC said it did not have jurisdiction to decide whether the rate was reasonable because railroads faced the prospect of competition from the utility's comparative shopping and its ability to import South African coal.


"The commission concludes that a shipper is not entitled to rate regulation if it considered alternative coal sources and transportation modes in its planning process and if it is authorized to transfer or assign its contract," the report said.

Win attributed to 'organizational politics'

Bush put right people in right places in Puerto Rico

By MARC D. CHARNEY



SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — George Bush once said this Caribbean island's politicians had "a feel for organizational politics that frankly is missing in some places across the water."

His Republican primary victory here Sunday shows he knew how to put the right local organization to work for him, make the right friends and parade the right images before the public to win even in a place where he — as well as the other leading candidates — didn't even speak the language.

On the surface, there was little difference among the candidates on issues of interest to Puerto Ricans. All were for statehood and spoke of little else, although Sen. Howard Baker of Tennessee did emphasize how much he could do for the island as a senator while Bush stressed experi-

ence in foreign affairs, a serious concern in the volatile Caribbean.

But Bush's masterstroke was probably the moment when, early on in the organizing, he secured as his chief campaign aide here, the island's Republican national committeewoman, Julia Rivera de Vincenti. She is a close associate of the patriarch of Republican politics and the statehood cause here, former Gov. Luis A. Ferre.

Publicly, Ferre was neutral urging simply a large turnout to show support for statehood. But Mrs. Vincenti's enthusiasm for Bush was a strong signal that the former CIA director, ambassador to the United Nations, and GOP National chairman was Ferre's personal choice.

Bush also wound up with the aid of the organization of San Juan Mayor Hernan Padilla, another Ferre protégé. Padilla, like Ferre, was nominally neutral — but he made sure Bush was

by his side when he held a final meeting with his ward chiefs late last week.

It is conventional wisdom here that elections are won only with an organization that gets out your vote — as much as that was ever true in Richard Daley's Chicago or in James

close between Bush and Baker — the balance between the two varied wildly from town to town. In other words, it depended on which leader got out which voters.

Bush, 55, had another asset: A 27-year-old son, Jeb, who speaks Spanish, has a Mexican wife and lived here in a borrowed luxury apartment on the beach since January, coordinating the campaign.

The younger Bush became affectionately known as "el joven Bush" — "young Bush" — to many Republicans in this family-oriented, openly sentimental society. He drew "oohs" and smiles when he got up on a podium and spoke unabashedly of how proud he was of his father.

The candidate himself won points from many Republican leaders for a style that emphasized personal warmth.

Then came Bush's strong showing in the Iowa caucuses, which allowed

Jeb to use, on leaders and the public, the argument, "Don't throw your vote away," coupled with an appeal to local pride.

"Since this is the first (Puerto Rican) primary, Puerto Ricans have to understand the national political game.... The whole thing is a step toward statehood, OK?" Was the way he characterized that argument in an interview.

Last week, as the Bush sound trucks preceded the candidate through Ferre's home town of Ponce, they blared that Bush was "the only candidate who really has a chance to win."

And if there was any doubt about whom Ferre really liked, the truck followed its appeal to take part in the primary — "Don Luis asks this of us, and we must grant it" — with an immediate "Here is your candidate, George Bush!"

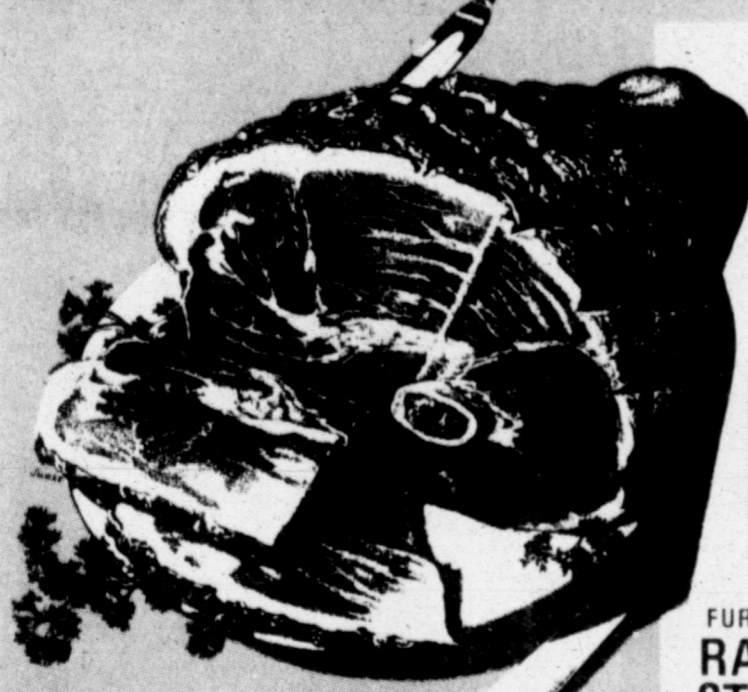

Bo's 'Bolero' not Ravioli

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — It might not have been director Blake Edwards' intention to inject new life into Maurice Ravel's perennial orchestral favorite, "Bolero," but his box office smash "10" has done just that.

In the film, a dazzling Bo Derek tells a bedazzled Dudley Moore that "Bolero" is her favorite background music for sex — her exact words are unprintable here — and begins a demonstration with Henry Mancini's arrangement of the piece grinding away in the background.

When the film was first released last fall, publicity releases on the film score made no mention of "Bolero," talking rather of Mancini's original contributions.

But while the soundtrack album sold a respectable 120,000 albums and tapes, record stores countrywide were suddenly besieged by customers seeking recordings of "Bolero" — any version at all.

Warner Bros. responded by releasing the soundtrack's "Bolero" cut, a shortened adaptation of Ravel's original Spanish dance, packaged with Mrs. Derek's picture on the jacket and a poster inside.

Although it's displayed in many stores where classical music usually means old Buddy Holly and Elvis Presley tunes, the record has sold a cool 175,000 copies since December, "and it's still selling," says Warner singles sales manager Mark Maitland.

Other record companies are jumping on the bandwagon. There's a disco version out by the

Philadelphia Luv Ensemble for Pavillion Records, and in March CBS Masterworks is releasing a two-in-one "Bolero" with a re-release of Leonard Bernstein conducting the Orchestre National de France on one side and a Moog synthesizer version on the other.

"It's a boom time for 'Bolero,' that's for sure," said Masterworks spokeswoman Susan Koscis. "If there's any time that a record company is going to sell its Boleros, it's now."

At Tower Records in West Hollywood, singles buyer Richard Petitpas said he believes the Bo Derek poster has a lot to do with the sales of the single, running about 30 a week.

So, apparently, did Warner Bros., which plastered the poster on a special display box for the disc. Petitpas put it by the cash register, but it isn't there now. "Somebody stole it," he said.

"Bolero" is an even hotter item at Tower's classical record annex. Manager Chuck Hoffmeister said taken together, some 15 recorded performances of "Bolero" were the store's best sellers.

"They're selling about 50 a week, plus 20 eight-track and cassettes, which makes 70 a week, and that's just this store," Hoffmeister said. "Before, we might have sold 10 a week."

"Bolero" is attracting a number of crossover customers who normally don't buy classical music and don't know much about it.

"I've heard them ask for 'Ravioli's Ball,'" he said. "One lady came in, well-dressed and in her 50s, and said she wanted an eight-track and an album."

The eight-track, Hoffmeister overheard her telling a friend, was for use in her bedroom.

August Sebastiani, winemaker, dead

SONOMA, Calif. (AP) — August Sebastiani, head of one of California's largest wineries for 30 years, has died of cancer at the age of 66.

Sebastiani, who died Saturday, turned the operation of the Sebastiani Vineyards and Winery

over to his eldest son, Sam, after he had learned he had terminal cancer.

Sebastiani, well known for his blue and white overalls, was also an avid environmentalist and bird lover. He rose before dawn daily to feed

ducks and other wild birds at a lake which he had created for them. He also maintained a large collection of live doves.

His father, Samuele, founded the winery in 1905 in this historic town 30 miles north of San

Francisco.

Survivors include his wife, Sylvia; sons Sam and Don; a daughter, Mary Ann Cuneo; a sis-

ter, Sabina McTaggart, and 10 grandchildren.

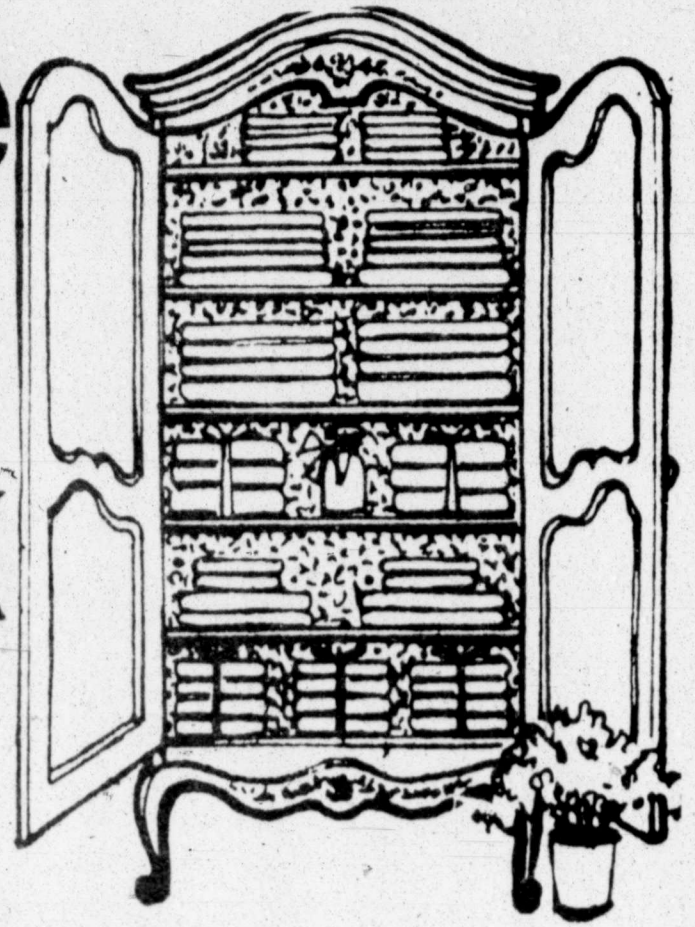

Millionaire faces life sentence

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — A Tennessee millionaire faces a possible life prison sentence after a federal court jury convicted him on six criminal charges, including continuing criminal enterprise allegations.

The jury deliberated six hours before finding John Ruppel, of Gatlinburg, Tenn., guilty in a rare Sunday court session.

Ruppel, 61, was found guilty of racketeering, continuing criminal enterprise and four counts of possessing marijuana with intent to distribute it.

Conviction on a charge of continuing criminal enterprise carries a mandatory sentence of 10 years to life in prison.

Ruppel had been charged as part of an alleged

scheme to smuggle more than 70 tons of marijuana into the United States between 1976 and 1978.

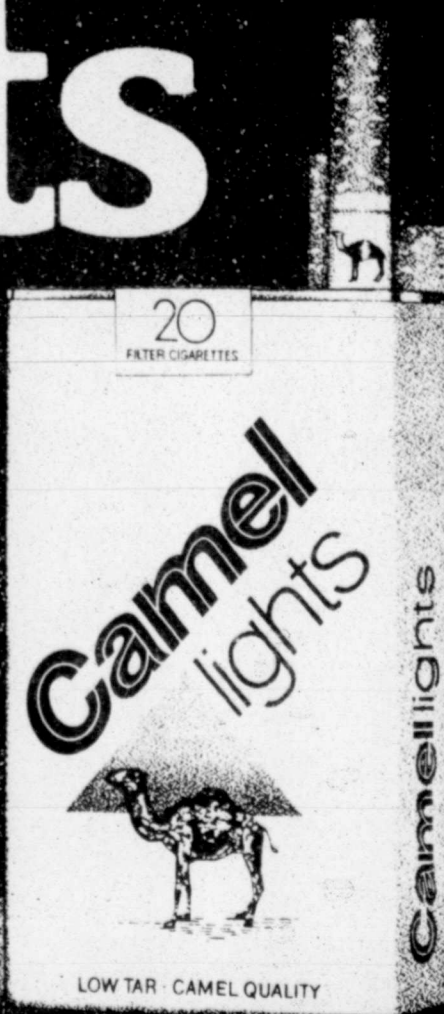
An earlier trial resulted in conviction of nine persons and acquittal of two others charged with Ruppel. However, the jury could not reach a verdict on Ruppel's charges during that trial.

Ruppel took the stand in his own defense late Saturday and early Sunday.

He gave his version of a tape-recorded telephone conversation the prosecution offered as evidence involving Ruppel and government witness Willis Judge Butler.

Ruppel said he was trying to "bluff" Butler to get him to leave alone James Holland, convicted in the earlier trial on marijuana smuggling charges.

Hit woman arrested

NEW YORK (AP)—After tracking down clues in a double killing a week ago, police have arrested a 21-year-old woman whom they say is the first female killer-for-hire they have ever encountered.

Blanche Wright, who has no police record, is accused of murdering four men and a woman, and Mount Kisco Detective Sgt. Jerome Herlihy said she admitted two other murders that police now are investigating.

A relative's attempt to retrieve the body of Miss Wright's partner, a criminally insane contract killer, led to her arrest Wednesday.

Her last contract killing for \$10,000 was last Friday when she killed Marshall Howell, 28, near his Mount Kisco home, police said.

Police said Miss Wright had gone last Friday to a luxury apartment house in the Westchester County suburb with her partner, Robert Young, with assignments to kill Howell, a reputed cocaine dealer, and his aide, Norman Bannister.

In a shootout that followed, police said Howell killed Young, and Miss Wright shot and killed Howell. She left the guns in Young's car.

Police said she walked to the train station and took a taxi to her home in the Bronx.

Police found \$250,000 in cash, a substantial amount of heroin, four guns and a silencer in Howell's apartment but they said Wright and Young were not after loot.

"This was just a rubout, believe me," Herlihy said. "They had no intention of going into that apartment or killing anyone else."

Howell's 24-year-old wife Sheila also was found in the apartment, and Mount Kisco police said they charged her with illegal possession of a controlled substance.

Young, 35, had escaped from the Matteawan Facility for the Criminally Insane in 1978, where he was being held on several murder charges. He was described by one police psychiatrist as "the craziest killer I have ever seen," police said.

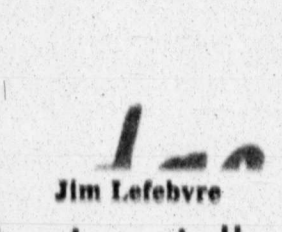

Former coach gives jolly Dodgers' Lasorda fat lip

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) - Tom Lasorda, the usually jovial manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers, has a fat lip today, courtesy of his former first base coach, Jim Lefebvre.

"He started it, he came after me like he was going to kill me," said Lefebvre Sunday night, referring to an altercation between the two earlier in the day at the KNBC-TV studios here.

"I've been in golf tournaments and tennis tournaments that he participated in and tried to avoid him. I wanted to avoid any problems with him. I've even spoken to (Dodger President) Peter O'Malley about the situation."

"The altercation took place after Lasorda's interview and before Lefebvre's interview in a vacant studio," said sportscaster Steve Somers, who reported that the pair appeared separately on the station's Sunday afternoon interview show.

"Lasorda left with blood on his face and Lefebvre left with a smile on his," continued Somers. "Lefebvre said it was a one-punch fight and was sorry the whole thing happened. Lasorda could not be reached for comment."

Lefebvre, 37, was the Dodgers' first base coach last year. He was hired by the San Francisco Giants as a coach for the 1980 season just after the 1979 campaign ended and reportedly said later that he was fired by the 32-year-old Lasorda, who will manage Los Angeles for the fourth year in 1980.

Following the altercation, Lefebvre appeared as scheduled on the afternoon program.

"When I saw him today, he appeared very upset and said 'I want to talk to you,'" said Lefebvre Sunday night. "Then we went into a vacant studio and he started swearing at me. He used four-letter words like you wouldn't believe."

Aspirin does have benefits

Dear Dr. Solomon: A friend of mine, who is generally knowledgeable and informed about medical matters, is taking aspirin every day, although there is nothing wrong with him. He claims that aspirin can prevent the occurrence of a stroke or heart attack. Is this true? — Tom.

Dear Tom: There is some indication that aspirin may have a lifesaving potential for people who are in danger of suffering from heart attacks and strokes. It has been known for some years that aspirin has an anti-clotting effect, and people on daily doses were observed to be far less prone to heart attacks. Recent studies indicate that aspirin, when taken in very low doses each day, can block the formation of dangerous blood clots; however, a \$17 million national study is in progress, and results are still incomplete.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My husband is generally a reasonable man, and he knows all of the reasons that he should quit smoking (I recite them daily): It's a nasty habit, unhealthy, expensive, etc., with no redeeming qualities. He admits all this — but he won't give it up. I simply can't understand such lack of self-discipline. Can you? — Mrs. R.B.

Dear Mrs. B.: Although I've been warn-

ing about the dangers of smoking for some time, and urging people to stop, I've never said it is a simple thing to do. Smoking involves both a psychological and physiological addiction, an ingrained habit that is very hard to break. Many smokers believe that there are benefits associated with the habit, i.e., that smoking is not just a case of slow suicide. Some people feel that smoking helps them relax or to concentrate, and whether the benefit is real or imagined, we should not ignore the fact that this is the smoker's perception of it.

Moreover, as Dr. Godfrey Hochbaum of the University of North Carolina School of Public Health points out, smoking is not an isolated habit, but is associated with other habits such as eating and drinking. One habit demands the other and, in this fashion, reinforces it.

As you have probably learned, efforts to frighten someone into giving up cigarettes usually are ineffective; your husband is undoubtedly aware of the health risks as you are. While the most effective method of stopping is to do so all at once — cold turkey — some smokers find this impossible. Since you say your husband is a reasonable man, if he cannot go the "cold turkey" route, maybe he can be convinced to cut

down gradually over a period of time. I realize how difficult it is for a nonsmoker to understand the addiction, but I would urge you to be supportive of your husband if he agrees to a gradual withdrawal. Once started on this path, he may find that real benefits, such as an enhanced taste for foods and improved endurance, more than compensate for the perceived benefits of smoking.

Plants addicted to pollution, researcher says

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Corn, cabbage, cotton and other crops have become addicted to sulfur dioxide pollution from power plants, and cold turkey withdrawal from the daily 15,000-ton habit could cost more than \$300 million a year in crop losses, a Tennessee Valley Authority researcher says.

Eliminating or reducing the sulfur dioxide pollutants coming from TVA plants in seven states could eventually cut farm production as much as 10 percent, says J.C. Noggle, a TVA soil chemist in Muscle Shoals, Ala.

And to avoid such a costly crop loss, he said, farmers would have to spend more than \$6 million annually to add sulfur to fertilizer.

Noggle has concluded after four years of research that air pollution from coal-burning power plants has taken the place of fertilizers in providing the sulfur nutrients needed by many crops.

"The air pollution problem is complex and this is just one little parcel of it," Noggle said. "But if we clean up the air, then the cost of putting sulfur back into fertilizers should be considered in the costs of the cleanup."

TVA, under pressure from court suits and the threat of fines, is spending \$6 billion in a program that will raise its consumers' electric bills 10 percent by 1983 to reduce its sulfur dioxide pollution 40 percent over the next five years.

Sulfur dioxide has been linked with human lung ailments and even Noggle agrees that excessive sulfur pollution can harm plants. He has proposed more studies to determine the benefits of pollution to plant life, however.

"The notion that it is essential or desirable, or even marginally acceptable, to continue supplying sulfur indiscriminately by using polluted air masses instead of fertilizer is just that — fertilizer," said Norman Glass, a researcher for the Environmental Protection Agency in Corvallis, Ore.

Behind nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, sulfur ranks fourth as the nutrient most needed by crops, Noggle said. It is a building block for protein and chlorophyll, the green substance that allows plants to use energy from the sun.

Sulfur is abundant in manure and, until 20 years ago when TVA developed new methods of producing nitrogen-based fertilizers, most plants got all the sulfur they needed as an incidental ingredient of fertilizer.

But, while TVA's researchers were taking sulfur out of fertilizers, its power system began building coal-fired generating plants to meet the growing demand for electricity.

"What we would expect is pretty widespread sulfur deficiencies," Noggle said. "The reason we don't have them is that crops are getting the sulfur they need from the air. We found deficiencies only in areas where there are no power plants."

SHEINWOLD ON BRIDGE
Don't Expect Caviar
By Alfred Sheinwold

It's reasonable to ask for food when you're starving. Don't expect caviar.

South took the second spade and led a heart to dummy's king. East won and returned the queen of diamonds.

Declarer cashed the queen of hearts and gave up a heart, hoping that East would have to win. But West won and ran the spades.

South had to hope that the hearts would break 3-3 and that East had the ace. He didn't have to hope that East would win the third heart.

DEEP FINESSE
When South first led hearts and West played the seven, South should play dummy's eight, passing the trick to East. South plays the king of hearts later, losing to the ace. When the suit breaks 3-3 the last two hearts are good, and South makes his game.

If West first plays the ten of hearts, South must put up dummy's king. If West plays the seven when south leads the next heart, declarer plays the eight from dummy. South is helpless only if West's hearts are precisely J-10-9.

Pediatricians concerned with Kawasaki disease

ATLANTA (AP) — Pediatricians throughout the United States are concerned over a puzzling new illness that causes heart attacks among infants and children under five, according to the national Center for Disease Control.

The malady — named Kawasaki disease for the physician who first discovered it — was reported in Japan in 1967 and now is occurring in increasing numbers in this nation and other countries, the CDC said.

"It's a very strange disease," said Dr. David Bell of the CDC's Bureau of Epidemiology. "We don't know if it's contagious. We don't know if it's caused by a virus or a bacterium."

The disease at first appears to be scarlet fever and is characterized by prolonged fever, inflamed eyes, sore throat and a body rash, Bell said. But unlike scarlet fever, Kawasaki disease does not react to penicillin treatment.

Between 1 and 2 percent of the children who contract the disease develop some kind of heart damage. And in Japan, where 15,000 cases have been reported since 1967, those who develop heart trouble die within six months, Bell said.
