#### Pipeline explodes

LEVELLAND, Texas (AP) -Officials at the Oil and Gas Cryogenics plant estimate damage from a liquid nitrogen pipeline explosion "in the thousands of dollars."

No one was hurt when the underground pipeline, about 3 miles west of Levelland, exploded early Friday. But Levelland Fire Chief Eddie Sanders said the blast awakened residents as far away as Whiteface, 10 miles to the west.

President Jack Joplin, who flew in from Houston to survey the damage, said his company plans to rebuild the plant, which produces liquid nitrogen used to enhance oil recovery.

#### Island blacked out

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) - All of Puerto Rico suffered a massive blackout Friday night from a breakdown in the islandwide electricity network, officials reported.

The San Juan police radio carried reports of looting and gunshots in various sections of San Juan, but a spokesman at the general police headquarters said there were no major disturbances

This U.S. commonwealth plunged into darkness at 7:30 p.m. EST, and officials of the state-operated Electric Energy Administration said they did not know how soon power could be

#### Several injured

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP) - A natural gas explosion rocked downtown Columbus at midafternoon Friday, injuring several people and destroying part of an office building, authorities said.

Witnesses said the explosion destroyed the interior of the Oglethorpe office complex of Rankin Square, a restored area of shops and office buildings in this west-central Georgia city.

Columbus Medical Center spokesman Tom Titus said 18. people were treated for burns and cuts. The extent of the in juries was not immediately known, but Titus said no one was injured critically

#### Quake reported

WASHINGTON (AP) - Astrong earthquake occured Friday in the South Pacific, the U.S. Geological Survey report-

The survey's earthquake information service said the tremor registered about 6.5 on the Richter scale and occured in the sparcely populated Loyalty Islands area, about 1,000 miles northeast of Brisbane, Austra-

There were no reports of any damage.

#### Navy short-handed

WASHINGTON (AP) - For the first time in at least 15 years. the Navy has taken a ship out of operation because of a shortage of key crewmen, it was learned Friday

The Navy said the oiler Canasteo, based at Norfolk, Va., has "temporarily suspended operations due to a personnel short age" of veteran boiler technicians and machinists mates Two Navy reserve destroyers. the Johnson and the Dyess, are "in the same fix," Navy officials said, but they are due to be decommissioned anyway.

However, the Canasteo was supposed to be undergoing refresher training before being deployed overseas and its deployment will now be delayed, probably beyond this summer, officials said

# Warnings issued in Iranian rallies

Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr, addressing a mammoth anti-American crowd in Tehran, warned Western Europe and Japan on Friday they will not get "so much as snake's poison" from Iranian oil wells if they help Washington put an economic squeeze on Iran to free the U.S. Embassy hostages.

A leading Moslem clergymen took the threat a step further, broadcasting a direct appeal to the people of Arab oil-producing countries to stand by for orders from Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to "cut off the vein" of all Mideast oil to the

Friday, the Moslem sabbath, were aimed as much at Iraq as at Ameri-

The Iranians claimed Friday to have inflicted "heavy losses" in lives and materiel on Iraqi forces in the two countries' continuing border hostilities, and the first Iranian deaths

Bani-Sadr threatened to invade Iraq if Iraqi forces "dared to take one step forward" into Iranian territory.

The Iranian news agency Pars said one Iranian soldier was killed and two were wounded in an artillery exchange with Iraqi gunners near the Iranian border town of Qasr-e-Shirin, 300 miles west of Tehran. Tehran Radio reported one Iranian revolu-Massive "unity rallies" across Iran tionary guardsmen killed and four

wounded in a clash near Paveh, 50 miles north of Qasr-e-Shirin. The radio said the Iranian military command reported a "serious clash" Friday in the Kermanshah border region, with one Iranian soldier killed and another wounded.

There have been no battle or casualty reports from the Iraqi side.

Bani-Sadr had called for Friday's marches and rallies after President Carter severed diplomatic ties with Iran and imposed an almost total economic embargo against it because of Iran's continued holding of the 50 American hostages, who spent their 160th day in captivity Friday.

Revolutionary organizations brought shouting, fist-waving demonstrators into central Tehran by the

truckload. They marched in long lines toward the rallying point at Tehran University, many toting guns, some with flowers sprouting from the barrels, and many chanting "Death to Carter!'

Tehran Radio claimed 3 million people thronged the rally - which would be two-thirds of the capital's population — but Western reporters put the number in the hundreds of thousands.

As rivers of humanity flowed through the city, the Tehran ambassadors of U.S.-allied nations were preparing to withdraw from Iran in a show of concern over the continued hostage-holding.

The ambassadors of the nine European Common Market countries are

to meet Saturday with Bani-Sadr to demand on behalf of their governments that the U.S. Embassy hostages be freed. Afterward, in a coordinated attempt at diplomatic pressure, the ambassadors will return to their home capitals for consultations. The Japanese Foreign Ministry said its ambassador will do the same.

It was unclear when the ambassadors would return to Iran.

The Common Market governments and Japan, which import large amounts of Iranian oil, have thus far not agreed to President Carter's request that they join in economic and other sanctions against Iran. But they say they will review their positions depending on Bani-Sadr's response to

### Brief, violent outbreak staged by 150 in Colombian prison

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) - More than 150 prisoners, including members of the guerrilla organization holding 18 diplomats hostage in the Dominican Republic's Embassy. seized control of a prison area in a brief but violent protest over suspension of family visits, it was reported

Among the inmates involved in the prison disturbance were two whose freedom has been demanded by the embassy captors as part of the hostage release price. Officials at La Picota Prison said some doors were broken down before guards restored order

Two government negotiators met representing the embassy invaders It was the 13th meeting since the embassy takeover 45 days ago and than before lasted 110 minutes

La Picota Prison director Col. Rolando Pena Angarita said Friday that family visits at the penitentiary had been suspended March 19 for security

He said guerrilla suspects awaiting courts martial under the country's state of siege law took over an interior patio on Thursday, shouted slogans, bashed in several doors, tore off some locks and urged other inmates to riot. No injuries were reported.

Two imprisoned leaders of the M-19 guerrillas, Ivan Marin Ospina and Elmer Marin, are among the 28 prisoners the embassy invaders say must be freed. The newspaper El Timeo quoted Osgina and Marin as saying after the prison disturbance that they "could not control their colleagues."

### Israel pulls troops out of Lebanon

TEL AVIV. Israel (AP) - Israel said it began pulling its troops out of southern Lebanon Friday after a three-day occupation in retaliation for a Palestinian guerrilla attack on a Jewish settlement that killed three

U.S. officials said they were informed all would be withdrawn in several days.

A brief announcement by the Israeli army spokesman here gave no indication how many of the 360 troops estimated to have crossed the border in the previous two days were pulling back Friday. The army said it "began to withdraw from southern Lebanon those of its forces which have completed their missions.

U.N. spokesman Timor Goksel told The Associated Press in a telephone interview from U.N. headquarters in Nagoura, Lebanon, that as of late afternoon, about 150 Israeli troops with 12 armored personnel carriers and three halftracks were deployed in two positions near the villages of Markabe and Shakra. This was 100 troops fewer than the number reported in those positions a day earlier.

An additional 110 Israeli soldiers with nine armored personnel carriers were reported deployed near the village of Kounin on Thursday. There was no information on their status Friday because they were out of view of U.N. peacekeeping troops who patrol most of the Lebanese-Israeli bor-

Goksel said there was "some movement" but it would be difficult to determine how many Israeli troops were still in the area until Saturday

U.N. spokesmen in Lebanon have said the Israelis, with about 23 armored personnel carriers, were in an

A spokesman for U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim called the Israeli move "a very serious develop-

#### Wamba, Texas, plane crash claims lives of Missouri couple

TEXARKANA, Texas (AP) - Two Sikeston, Mo., residents were killed Friday afternoon when a single engine airplane crashed in an open field near Wamba, Texas

Bowie County Sheriff Earl Sabo identified the victims as Dr. Daniel L. Rosenstein, 52, and his wife, Elba B Rosenstein, 53.

Sabo said the pilot had radioed the tower at the Texarkana Municipal

Airport shortly before the crash that the plane had run out of fuel and would have to attempt a forced land-

The airplane apparently attempted a landing in the open field, but clipped the top branches of a row of trees next to the field, Sabo said.

Sabo said the aircraft nosedived to the ground killing the passengers in-

### While vacationing, Moscow diplomat resigns position

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - The consular section chief at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow quit his job Friday because, among other things, the Carter administration "doesn't have a clue how to-conduct foreign policy.

Thomas Hutson, on leave to visit relatives here, said he resigned, by a telegram to Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, because he had "no choice. We have had secretaries of state who do not know how to use the Foreign Service," Hutson said.

There was no immediate reaction from the State Department or the Hutson, 40, a member of the Foreign Service since 1967, said he hadn't

intended to speak publicly until later, but decided he could not say "no comment" to a reporter's question Friday afternoon. He said he plans to offer his services to the Republican Party to help formulate foreign policy

Hutson said the United States was surprised by the takeover of the embassy in Iran "because of the small-mindedness of our State Department bureaucracy and the lack of forceful leadership by secretaries of state

As a result, the country didn't have an adequate analysis of the situation, he said, adding his comments referred specifically to Vance and former secretaries William Rogers and Dean Rusk

Hutson said President Carter is a decent man who forced the "moral ingredient" to be considered in foreign policy. "However, it got out of control and perhaps only now is being brought

into proper perspective." He also supports Carter's call for a boycott of the Moscow Olympics in protest of the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan, saying it will be an "unforgettable condemnation of Soviet aggression in Afghanistan." Hutson said he likes the Russian people, calling them "incredibly warmhearted generous, intelligent, entertaining people.

But of the Soviet government, he said: "The system stinks. The philosonly behind the system stinks. It's comfortable living (in Moscow) if you don't mind every phone conversation and every conversation in your bedroom or kitchen being monitored."

### They won't be flooded with aid

LAKE ELSINORE, Calif. (AP) — You can't go home again, at least not if you want government aid to do so in Lake Elsinore. That's the message to hundreds of residents whose lakeside homes were flooded during this winter's rainstorms.

Under a "hazard mitigation" program authorized by Congress in 1974, the federal government is refusing to authorize low-interest Small Business Administration rebuilding loans or issue new flood insurance for homes located below the 1,265-foot flood threshhold elevation above sea level.

"It makes a lot of sense," said Jim Keene of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. "If you're going to have to come back here every two years and rebuild or seek loan money for a place that was destroyed two years ago, it makes sense to loan people money to move out of there

The lake, swollen from both rainfall and runoff in its 750-square-mile watershed area, peaked on March 20 at 1,265.72 feet. By Friday it had receded half a foot from that level. The Army Corps of Engineers has estimated it will take until April 21 for the lake to fall to the 1,265-foot level and until the start of next year's rainy season for it to approach the pre-flood level of

Keene said that while 500 federal flood insurance policies were issued in Lake Elsinore, it was impossible to determine how many people will be affected by the hazard mitigation measures "because a number of people down there moved out long before we ever were on the scene. But there are at least 400.

Homeowners that had federal flood insurance are

eligible for up to \$35,000 in benefits, he said, and can get

that money even if they rebuild below the flood level. "But who would choose to do that?" he said. "You can't get new federal flood insurance below 1,265 feet, and you can't get an SBA loan without new flood insurance.

Homeowners who meet SBA requirements are eligible for loans of up to \$55,000 at 3 percent interest. Renters can also take out loans of up to \$10,000 for property loss. The loans are available only for uninsured portions of losses. While the city has banned new construction below the

1,265-foot flood line since 1967, City Manager Ira B. Pace said there are no laws barring rebuilding below that elevation. But he said such reconstruction would be virtually impossible without federal support.

In Harrison Canyon in North San Bernardino, residents of 27 flood-damaged homes have also decided to move to safer sites, leaving the area an uninhabited flood control channel. Seven Southern California counties - Los Angeles,

Orange, Ventura, San Diego, Riverside, San Bernardino and Santa Barbara - were declared federal disaster areas in the wake of torrential rainstorms in February and March. Keene said about 25,000 stricken families sought some sort of aid - grants, loans, insurance benefits,

temporary housing and the like - at 19 disaster centers that were set up shortly after the storms. The SBA expects to lend more than \$255 million to nearly 3,000 Southern California businesses and about 12,850 homeowners who have already filed disaster

relief claims, compared to about \$120 million loaned to 2,491 businesses and 15,333 families after flooding in



### 'Gang' to be tried, Deng says

PEKING (AP) - China's senior vice premier, Deng Xiaoping, said Friday the "gang of four" will face trial "as early as possible." While its members would be tried according to law, he said, their crimes were so atrocious they could be convicted "with our eyes closed.

In an interview with The Associated Press, the 75-year-old Chinese leader said a specific date for the trial could not yet be announced because "we must make the necessary preparations from the legal standpoint." He did not elaborate.

Asked whether the group, led by Jiang Qing, the widow of the late chairman Mao Tse-tung, might be tried and win freedom, he said "Oh

no, the people won't agree to it." The four are accused of plotting to seize power and are blamed for nearly everything that has gone wrong in China since 1965, when Jiang helped Mao launch the Cultural Revolution.

Her close associates were the late Defense Minister Lin Piao and Politburo members Chang Chunchiao, Yao Wenyuan and Wang Hongwan. Lin died in a 1971 plane crash after allegedly plotting treason. The others have been held without outside contact since their arrests in October 1976, a month after Mao's death.

"While emphasizing the rule of law and democracy, we plan at an appropriate time to put them on trial. They have committed extremely grave

crimes in violation of law. They have brought tremendous disasters upon China and on the entire nation and tremendous damage to the whole country. Untold numbers were

"Of course, they didn't kill them with their own hands, but with the results of their policies. So if we talk about towering crimes, those two words fit them perfectly. Of course, even after the trial, we plan to let them continue to have their meals," Deng said.

And I also feel more and more politicians and statesmen in the United States are coming to realize the importance of Sino-America rela-

Deng also discussed Wei Jingsheng, the 29-year-old political dissident sentenced to 15 years imprisonment last October after being convicted for selling military secrets to a foreigner, whose identity was not disclosed. Wei was the editor of an unauthorized magazine which criticized the present Chinese leadership, including Deng.

"You know, there are some materials about Wei Jingsheng which have not been published because we considered the bad effect they may have,"

For example, Deng said "We did not publish what kind of intelligence and how much money he got for it because we did not want it to affect the relationship of our people with foreigners." He did not further identify what he meant by foreigners. An unofficial transcript of the trial, the validity of which could not be confirmed, said a foreign journalist had approached Wei and offered him several hundred dollars.

Deng added that Wei had not "done anything to show signs of repentance for his crimes" and that handing over intelligence to a foreigner was a crime so serious that Wei's sentence was reasonable

#### Pilot retires

WASHINGTON (AP) - After 169 presidential flights, invariably involving the smoothest landings of any four-engine jet, Col. Lester C. McClelland is retiring as pilot of Air Force One, the presidential airplane.

McClelland, who entered the air force after playing professional football in Canada, has flown President Carter around the world, taken Gerald R. Ford to Peking, and Henry Kissinger to Hanoi.

"Overall, it's been one great career," the 47-year-old pilot said in a telephone interview. "I've thoroughly enjoyed it."

McClelland, who in the earlier days of the Carter administration flew the president somewhere every few weeks, hasn't had Carter aboard the silver, white and blue aircraft since Oct. 29. He was given five minutes on the president's schedule Friday for a farewell chat at the White House.

Within about a week, McClelland will begin a "terminal leave," based on accumulated time off, before officially leaving the Air Force on July 1 to begin work for a commerical aviation firm in Connecticut.

#### Disbandment of 'Arrowhead unit announced by Guard

Army National Guard announced Friday it has disbanded the 36th Airborne Brigade, which carried the name and flag of the famed 36th Infantry "Arrowhead" Division.

The Arrowhead division was the all-Texas unit that was hailed in World War II for its assault on Salerno, Italy, the Rapido River crossing and its march into Paris and Rome.

The 36th Airborne was the second largest command in the Texas Army Guard. Replacing it will be three new units — an airborne ranger company. a combat engineer battalion and an armored cavalry squadron.

Houston and Austin will be the dual locations of Company G, 143rd Infantry, an airborne ranger company that is being transferred from Puerto Rico

The 386th Combat Engineers, which disbanded in 1968, will be reinstated as a support unit for a corps, the level above a division. It was part of the original 49th Armored Division, which was formed in World War II and is now the largest military command in Texas.

Two of the five companies in the engineer battalion will return to the same cities they left in 1968. Brenham once again will host Company B, and Company C will return to Pasadena.



### Transit workers to return to work

NEW YORK (AP) — The 11-day bus and subway strike that had left millions of commuters without their usual means of travel ended at least temporarily Friday when union officials deadlocked on a contract proposal and ordered a return to work.

Buses and subways were expected to begin returning to service within hours, with full service by Saturday morning, said Richard Ravitch, chairman of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority.

John Lawe, president of Local 100 of the Transport Workers Union, ordered his 35,000 members to return to work after the union's board reached a 22-22 deadlock on whether to accept a 17 percent wage hike package over a two-year period.

The offer which the TWU executive board members could not agree on must be approved by a majority of the union's divided rank and file. No date was set for this voting, which is to be by mailed ballot. Lawe said negotiations would resume if the pact were rejected.



The Saudi government protested to the British government, saying the film was "very offensive." The British government expressed its "profound regret" to the Saudis but said it could not interfere with such a TV program.



#### Clements characterizes state as economic 'bright spot'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas will be the "bright spot" in any severe national economic depression, Gov. Bill Clements predicted Friday.

"I'm bullish about Texas. I'm optimistic," the Republican governor told a news conference Friday.

Clements also said he had no sympathy with Democratic Party officials who have complained the Republican administration in Texas, the first this century, is giving Republicans a break on primary election expenses.

"I challenge these disgruntled Democrats to take their case to court." Clements said, smiling.

Clements said there are many answers to how Texas would be affected by a "severe depression."

"In the past, Texas has been immune to the national economic factors to a great extent...it is reasonable that Texas would not feel the effects of a deep recession as severely as the rest of the country. Our economy may be the strongest in the nation.'

Clements said some experts have predicted Texas' economy may increase 50 percent by 1980, "It will bring on problems but it also will do much for our economic activity," he said.

"I am bullish on Texas," said the former Dallas multimillionaire who established a worldwide oil drilling

"While we may have nationally a rather severe depression, I think Texas will remain a bright spot economically," he said.

Clements was asked if he planned to do anything about recent complaints from some Democratic county chairman that Secretary of State George Strake had bent state election laws to give Republicans an advantage in dispensing state funds for the May 3 primary elections.

Strake, as chief state elections official, held that state appropriations for the primary elections should be based on voter participation in the 1978 gubernatorial race, when Clements was elected. In previous years, funds appropriated by the Legislature have been based on votes in previous presidential election years.

"I have no plans in that direction (to make any changes)," Clements said. "I think we are doing more or less what has been done in the past by the Democrats.

Earlier, sources said the large turnout expected for Republican primaries when John B. Connally was still a presidential candidate caused a larger allocation for the Republicans to take care of defecting Democrats.

""I don't know that is right," Clements said. "I think it should be normal to use the last governor's election as a basis. I challenge these disgruntled Democrats to take their case to

On other subjects, Clements said:

He had received no more word on how a decrease in revenue sharing funds would affect Texas. "Sooner or later we will have to consider this but to say anything now is premature, We do not know which funds will be cut and which the state might pick up."

He has no plans to see GOP presidential candidate Ronald Reagan on Reagan's April 17-18 visit to Texas but he understands Reagan would visit him personally about April 24. Clements said he was sure Reagan knew he was neutral in the Republican presidential race.

### Mailing of tax refund checks delayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Treasury Department is delaying sending about \$3 billion in tax refund checks for a few days just to be sure there will be enough money in its accounts to

The delay, from Friday until Monday, reflects "conservaive cash management policies" by the Treasury, said a spokesman. He said there probably would have been enough money to cover the tax checks if they had been mailed as

"It was really a decision to get refund checks to recipients on Tuesday, rather than Monday, which simply reflects the Treasury's cash management policy during this period of a seasonally heavy drain of government cash," said the spokesman, who did not want to be identified.

The Treasury's cash needs have increased sharply in recent weeks, in part because of tax refund payments, but also because of large-scale redemption of Savings Bonds and of U.S. government securities by foreign investors.

The spokesman said the Treasury Department tries to keep its cash balances as low as possible to keep its interest costs on

### Methodists hold conference Tuesday

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. - The United Methodist Church will hold its quadrennial general conference beginning Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. at the Indiana Convention-Exposition Center here.

Between the conclusion of the Laity Address and the final adjournment, scheduled for 10 p.m. April 25, the major task facing delegates will be the processing of more than 900 pages of reports, legislative proposals and special study committee recommendations as well as action on more than 20,000 petitions from individual members, congregations, caucuses and boards and agencies of the church.

Issues expected to garner major attention include homosexuality, finances, pensions for ministry, quadrennial emphasis and special programs, agency accountability, the church's stance on social issues and communications.

Among new programs being proposed which carry sizable funding tags are a special program on Africa with a \$7 million fund for African church growth and development; a television and ministry program which include a three-year campaign to raise \$25 million to purchase a television station and produce programs for prime-time TV; a single mission priority on the ethnic minority local church with an apportioned fund of \$5 million for each year of the quadrennium, and a new pension plan designed to create no new unfunded liability and eventually eliminate the current \$542 million worth of unfunded liability.

#### Women priests not welcome

NEW YORK — One of the first women ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church linked her Church's attitude toward women to belief in witchcraft.

The Rev. Suzanne Hiatt, one of 11 women who forced the Episcopal Church to accept women as priests, explained that women priests are still not welcome in many dioceses.

"The real resistance we find out there is not having women preach as deacons but in having them celebrate the Sacrament," Hiatt said. "That goes back, I think, to some very primitive feelings about women and magic. For women to be involved in the mysteries of the Sacrament conjures up ideas about witchcraft in the minds of some people.

Hiatt was one of "The Philadelphia Eleven," who entered the priesthood without the church's blessing and eventually won enough support that the church voted to accept women as priests. She now teaches pastoral theology to other candidates for the priesthood, both women and men, at the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass.

NEW YORK (AP) — How did the princess feel when she kissed the

"It may sound curious," says novelist Walter Tevis, "but I'd really like to know. Feelings interest me."

This interest, the 52-year-old Tevis says, may be seen in his new novel, "Mockingbird."

Although the book is a science-fiction tale on the surface, Tevis says he deliberately chose that literary form in order "to deal with spiritual growth. Much science fiction writing doesn't have any great interest in human beings, preferring ideas instead. But I try to deal with the emotional life, with the feelings of my characters and not have the ideas run away with the book."

"Mockingbird" is set in the 25th century, but Tevis is quick to point out that "I'm not all that interested in the future. What I tried to do is write in a fairy tale kind of way about the pres-

The book deals with a society run by robots in which humans have nothing to do but enjoy themselves — primarily by sedating themselves heavily with drugs. Paul Bentley, the protagonist, however, rebels against this way of life and, says Tevis, "what I'm trying to do is show the hero waking up out of his stupor and realizing his own feelings, of becoming aware that there is a world out there.

"When I first started Paul's story I thought about doing a novel about an alcoholic. That didn't work, so I thought about using the science-fiction form as my vehicle, and, as it turned out, that worked."

"Mockingbird" is Tevis' third novel. The first two—both made into movies—were "The Hustler" and "The Man Who Fell To Earth."

"The Hustler," says Tevis, was "straightforward, and I can still write that way, but I don't want to. I want to make up the world I write about.

"That's why I use science fiction. I have a reformer's zeal toward science fiction. I feel it is a great potential

medium that has never realized itself. When I read contemporary science fiction I so often find myself in the midst of sophomoric writing. I find good ideas that tend to turn comicbook. I find characters who are stick figures. They have no feelings. I try to make my characters real. I'd like to see science fiction become a serious

Tevis currently lives in New York
City and writes full time. But for
many years he taught and wrote in his
spare time.

"I started teaching high school English in rural Kentucky when I was 21," he says, "and then I was a professor of English at Ohio University at Athens. I'm now on leave of absence. I had a full career as a teacher for some 30 years.

"I like teaching and I miss it. I have verbal energy and I use it when I'm teaching. I love to talk and spin ideas with students. I suppose I spent a lot of my imagination in teaching, and I used it up that way instead of in

"But now I feel that it is more important for me to write. I feel very guilty when I'm not writing. Unfortunately, I have difficulty doing so. I do work at high speed when I'm at the typewriter. I really turn it out when I'm hot, but I only get hot about every 20 days or so, and I hate to force it. I could write junk but I don't want to.

"Like a lot of novelists, I'm a failed poet so it's painful to squeeze the emotions every day. Unfortunately, it's also painful not to write."

Tevis, who says a book of his short stories, "Far From Home," will be published soon, currently is working

"It's science fiction. It deals with a middle-aged tycoon whose life is so messed up that he buys a spaceship and goes off into space looking for uranium. I'm about halfway through, and I like it a lot. It's a more grown-up piece of work than 'Mockingbird.'"

## Extensive use of glass in building expected to make it energy-efficient

CHICAGO (AP) — Maximum use of glass is expected to make the new \$115 million state office building in Chicago one of the nation's most energy-efficient buildings, says an industry publication.

The 17-story structure, scheduled to be occupied in 1983, will have walls made of a mixture of reflective and clear glass designed to make the best-use of the sun's rays, according to Energy User News.

The building will also have a heatpump system for heating and cooling, plus a 250-foot-high atrium and ancillary atriums located along a curved wall to bring light into the inside of the building.


Officials estimate it will cost about \$666,000 a year for energy to operate the building, while a conventional structure of similar size and function would cost some \$1.26 million.



### Newly arrived refugees describe Cubans as hungry, desperate folk

By DAN SEWELL

MIAMI (AP) - While their relatives chomp on quarter-pounders in Miami hamburger joints, families in Cuba carefully ration the quarter-pound of meat that must last them 10 days.

While their relatives run thriving shops and restaurants or climb the ladders of American business, workers in Cuba find their jobs dull and frustrating, with little prospect for bettering themselves.

While Miami Cubans wear expensive designer jeans and gaudy jewelry, the people in Cuba wear treason, arrived here Monday on a flight carrying plain-colored, poorly made clothes.

A gloomy portrait of life in Cuba emerges from conversations with the newest refugees to arrive here, and even recent Cuban government statements admit the island nation is staggering in its 21st year under President Fidel Castro.

There have been reports from Cuba of increased street crime, worker absenteeism and black market

Some 10,000 Cubans - made desperate by a worsening economy and freshly aware of a better life available elsewhere - have been jammed into the compound of the Peruvian embassy in Havana since last weekend. The human flood began when six Cubans crashed a bus through the embassy gates seeking asylum, and Castro removed guards from the embassy area.

The Cuban government calls the people at the embassy "vagrants and bums" and says they may leave. Some Cuba-watchers say they believe Castro is hoping to end his nation's malaise by allowing such "anti-social" refugees to emigrate.

"I think that the events (at the Peruvian embassy) are playing more or less as Castro wanted them to play," said Harvard University professor Jorge Dominguez, author of several books on Cuba.

"The people there are so desperate to leave, they will do anything. This is the opportunity they have been waiting for," said Benjamin Valdes Perez, a

Perez carried a list of Miami exiles he was asked to contact by relatives in Cuba. He said rumors are rampant that Castro will soon open a port to all Cubans wishing to leave.

In 1965, Castro reacted to a series of boat escapes by opening the northern port of Camarioca. Over 5,000 Cubans were picked up by boats rented or borrowed by members of southern Florida's Cuban exile population, which now numbers half a million

Another apparent factor in the unrest is a program that has allowed more than 100,000 exiles to visit their homeland since 1978. Their glowing portrait of life in America differs with the Castro government's version: that Cubans in the United States live a disgraceful ghetto life.

When they talk to their families, they learn how much worse the Cuban economy is, and they then want to live in Miami," said exile leader Dr. Diego

"For 20 years the people have lived in hunger, and they can't take it any more. Thousands - millions want to leave," said Abelardo Zamora, 35, who served five years in prison for alleged sabotage.
"People get tired of working because the future

doesn't get better. Things keep getting worse.
"In one month, a family must live on five pounds of rice, 20 ounces of grain, three quarter-pounds of meat. There are a lot of eggs, but there is not enough of anything else," Zamora said.
