Asylum granted

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States has granted political asylum to a 38-year-old Chinese translator who defected from a delegation of visiting engineers and technical specialists, government officials said

David Ilchert, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in San Francisco, said in a telephone interview that he had authorized the asylum after consulting with the State Department.

Bus overturns

DALLAS (AP) - A Dallas school bus loaded with 30 children overturned Friday, injuring 26 students and the driver, when it swerveds to avoid hitting two stopped vehicles, authorities said.

One of the two vehicles was another school bus that had stopped to unload students.

A hospital spokesman said 13year-old Cynthia Jones was admitted at Parkland Memorial Hospital in fair condition with possible internal injuries. All the others injured in the accident were treated and released. All the children were students at Holmes Middle School

Acquittal expected

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -The attorney for Peoples Temple member Larry Layton says he expects the Guyanese government will drop murder charges against his client.

Rex McKay said in a telephone interview from Guyana with the San Francisco Examiner that he expects the government will not press the charges because Layton was acquitted Thursday of lesser counts of attempted murder and possession of illegal firearms.

Layton has been held since shortly after the shootout at the Port Kaituma airport on Nov. 18, 1978, in which Rep. Leo Ryan, D-Calif., three journalists and a defecting temple member were shot. The assault preceded followers of the Rev. Jim Jones in the Jonestown jungle settle-

Tapes available

WASHINGTON (AP) - Start ing next week, the general public will be able to listen to tapes of private conversations be tween former President Richard M. Nixon and his advisers during the Watergate crisis.

The 31 Watergate tapes. grouped in 15 segments and running a total of 121/2 hours, will be put on display by the National Archives next Wednesday, the agency announced Friday

Listeners will be able to hear only one segment during each session and will not be allowed to record from them

Thirty of the tapes, which provided the evidence that eventually led to Nixon's resignation. were played in open court during the trials of key Watergate defendants.

The National Archives also will display a small exhibit in its second floor lobby showing elements of the White House recording system used by Nixon, it said in a statement.

Carter resigns

WASHINGTON (AP) - Hodding Carter, who has served as State Department spokesman for more than three years, said Friday he is resigning, effective July 1

Carter's face and voice have become known to millions of Americans as a result of his role as the principal spokesman for administration policy on the Iran hostage crisis.

With the resignation of former Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance last month, Carter's departure had been expected. He said Vance's successor, Edmund S. Muskie, accepted his resignation on Wednesday.

Carter said he offered to resign to enable Muskie to select his own spokesman as soon as possible. He added that he expects President Carter will be re-elected in November and that Muskie will serve as secretary for the next 41/2 years.

Inflation eases; Prime rate slashed

eased significantly in April for the first time in more than a year, as stable gasoline prices and a deepening recession held consumer prices to a 0.9 percent monthly rise, the government reported Friday.

Meanwhile, the nation's second largest commercial bank, Citibank, slashed its prime lending rate 2 percentage points Friday to 141/2 percent, another sign of lower loan demand resulting from a weakening economy. Several other major banks followed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Inflation suit immediately, including topranked Bank of America.

The latest reduction in the prime rate from a record peak of 20 percent just one month ago came on the heels of the Federal Reserve Board's decision Thursday to relax some of the credit controls it clamped on consumers and businesses in March. The controls were imposed to ease inflation, but in the process have hastened and worsened the economic down-

The increase in the Labor Depart-

ment's Consumer Price Index was the smallest since January 1979 and marked the first substantial drop in the nation's inflation rate since late 1978. Department analysts said inflation might show further easing in

Consumer prices had been jumping by 1.4 percent a month since January of this year - equal to a near-record 18 percent annual inflation rate.

April's price rise, if it were to continue at that pace for a full year, would translate into an 111/2 percent annual inflation rate. That's still a very high level by historic standards, but a sharp improvement relative to the inflation that has been battering consumers since late last year.

White House Press Secretary Jody Powell called the report "extremely good news" for consumers and business. "It is, perhaps, the first major evidence that we are on the right track. However, we are not out of the

woods yet on inflation," Powell said.

But if the report suggested some inflation relief for consumers, it was not felt immediately where it counts
— in the pocketbook. The Labor Department said in a separate report that the buying power of an American family of four declined 1.2 percent during April because wages failed to keep pace with inflation. During the prior 12 months, the department said, the family's inflation-adjusted buying power declined 6.7 percent.

Eruption of ash, steam reported at Spirit Lake

TOLEDO, Wash. (AP) — A geyser of ash and steam shot up from the Spirit Lake area north of Mount St. Helens late Friday, scaring passengers in a passing helicopter and ending search and rescue efforts for the day, officials said.

Gene Smith, search and rescue coordinator for the U.S. Forest Service, said all planes and helicopters were ordered out of the area, about three miles north of the volcano's gaping

The geyser was reported spouting from 1,000 to 2,000 feet into the air Before the warning to leave the

area, helicopters had flown among the devastated hills beneath the peak. searching for bodies and survivors of Sunday's volcanic blast

Seventy one people are still missing since the volcano blew its top with the force of a hydrogen bomb, leveling 150 square miles and spouting a cloud of volcanic ash over most of the United

The death toll was raised to 18 by the U.S. Forest Service, which gave no further details

Forest Service officials downplayed the significance of Friday's fountain on the mountain's flank

Lynn Robertson, a forest service spokesman, quoted U.S. Geological Survey scientists as saying such occurrences were to be expected. He said the ash probably was from earlier eruptions and was kicked upward by trapped steam, rather than from an actual eruption from a new vent

Chief Warrant Officer Roger Kramer, a helicopter pilot ferrying a load of journalists and rescue personnel over the Spirit Lake area when the vent began spewing steam, was impressed

I'm no geologist but I was scared bad. I knew something was happen-

ing." Kramer said
"We could see stuff coming up out of that hole, and the center started turning black, and there were small eruptions that began in an area maybe a quarter of a mile wide

Kramer said the activity did not seem to endanger the mass of mud and volcanic debris holding back the waters of Spirit Lake

With 18 known dead, the search and rescue teams had 15 areas pinpointed that officials speculated could yield more bodies, said U.S. Forest Service spokesman Joe Nadolski

For three days, the dead were left where they fell, while searchers concentrated on findingthe living. Now the dead are being picked up. The 18 bodies were brought to a makeshift tent morgue at the Toledo Airport, then turned over to coroners.

Damage to state and private land was estimated at \$859.6 million by the Washington state Department of Emergency Services However, the estimate excludes thousands of acres of federal land, mainly forest, which were burned and covered with mud and ash

We have some hope that people may be alive out there, but that's slim," said Gene Smith, coordinator of the search for the Forest Service. He said every report of tracks in the

ash "has led to nothing But Sgt Chuck Foster, a National Guard spokesman who lives at Silver Lake down from the mountain, said searchers haven't given up

"If someone was on high ground and got to the backside of the hills facing away from the mountain, there is a darn good chance they sur

The latest survivors airlifted out were a dog and three puppies that were found Thursday next to the bodies of two persons

The mountain, which blew 1,300 feet of its top in the eruption, had practically quit rumbling by Friday. Only a small earthquake measuring 2.9 on the Richter scale was detected, said Tim Hait, a U.S. Geological Survey geologist

"This latest earthquake fits the overall picture of lowered activity that has developed since Monday,'

There are still no signs of lava, no indications of magma pushing up," he

A glistening plume of steam rose out of the volcano to 20,000 feet, but there was no ash

Scientists took the earth's temperature five miles north of the mountain Thursday and found that it was so hot that water could boil only three feet below the surface Farther down, the temperature was 295 degrees.

Because of flood threats, it could be months before people evacuated from the banks of the Toutle River are allowed to go home, according to Sam Frear, a U.S. Forest Service spokes-

Frear said a proposal to turn the devastated area into a national volcanic monument is under study, but a decision is a long way off.

Hait called Sunday's blast "a 10, 000-year event. The odds of having another within a few weeks or years are statistically very small.

Founding director resigns Theatre Midland position

The dream took more than 30 years to become reality But today at 2000 W Wadley Ave. sits the undeniable proof of what one man's vision can acomplish.

After 35 years, Art Cole, founding director of Midland Community Theatre and current executive director, has resigned his duties effective July 1. The announcement was made during a news conference Friday in Theatre

"I assume the Theatre would let me stay around until the end, allowing the moss to grow on my north side. However, I cannot do that for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is that it would not be good for the Theatre," Cole stated in his resignation request to William Morrow, president of MCT board of governors.

Instead, I intend to use whatever is left of my three score-and-ten to try some of the things I wanted to do 30 years ago. Among these are: to paint, to act (though no one is queuing up to hire me) and perhaps try my hand at writing the book on community theater that I've never had time to do," Cole continued.

In an explanatory letter to the members of MCT, Morrow stated that "Art Cole's talent, energy, dedication and love for the theater has transformed Midland Community Theatre into a theater with an international reputation offering a broad variety of productions."

Morrow said Friday, "The Board has granted him his every request. These requests include a one-year sabbatical leave

which allows Cole the time to pursue his various inter-As Cole explains in his letter, the "time to sort out and

set about doing whatever it is that I'll be doing for the rest of my life. Morrow also said Cole has been named director emeri-

tus, meaning he will serve the Theatre in a planning and advisory capacity, and "the board unanimously named Don Bachmann (current managing director) as the new executive director. In explaining his timing for the resignation, Cole said

this seemed exactly the right time for this change because the Theatre now has multi-talented Don Bachmann to take over. Cole's last production as the executive director will be the "Summer Mummers." Bachmann, who has been at Theatre Midland for four

months, was director of the comedy play, "No Sex Please, We're British."

Bachmann said he considers Theatre Midland "one of the strongest, if not the strongest, community theaters in the country. I am aware of the work of Art Cole and his leadership role in the national and international picture. It will certainly not be easy to come in and build on a foundation so ably built by Art Cole."

Five Miami officers reinstated as police threaten to strike

MIAMI (AP) - Five Miami policemen, called "bums" by the mayor and suspended for their alleged misconduct during racial rioting, were ordered reinstated Friday after some fellow officers threatened to strike.

Miami Police Chief Kenneth Harms said the five men would be back on the force Tuesday. Jack Sullivan, local president of the Fraternal Order of Police, said Harms had said the time missed would be treated as regular time off. They had been suspended with pay

Harms made the announcement after meeting with police union officials to discuss the suspensions and proposals to grant amnesty to some of the more than 1,200 people arrested in the riots.

As the city prepared for a three-day holiday weekend, 1,100 National Guard troops remained on standby in armories and warehouses to guard against a renewal of the mayhem that began last Saturday. About 2,700 troops have been sent home.

The riot claimed its 16th victim Friday when Berta Rogers, a 53-yearold white woman, died at Jackson Memorial Hospital. She had been beaten and burned as she tried to escape from her car, which was set afire in the height of the rioting Saturday night.

Hundreds of policemen, angry at Mayor Maurice Ferre because he called the suspended officers "bums" and because other officials had proposed amnesty for some of those arrested during the riots, rallied across the street from police headquarters during the meeting.

Petitions calling for Ferre's ouster were circulated by officers as police chanted, "recall, recall." Three thousand signatures must be collected on petitions within 10 days to force a recall referendum.

"I'll walk with any of you anytime," Harms, wearing a bullet-proof vest, told the officers after announcing the reinstatement.

Police sharpshooters stood on the roofs of nearby buildings, watchful for possible snipers, and state troopers, wearing riot gear and armed with M-16 rifles, guarded the street during

Four officers were suspended during an investigation of allegations they vandalized cars of suspected looters and spray-painted the words "looter" and "thief" on the autos. Another was suspended after being accused of using excessive force in arresting a looter. No formal finding was made in any of the five cases.

Long, hot summer threatened Prosecution of brutality cases urged

WASHINGTON (AP) - An Hispanic coalition

warned Friday of a possible long, hot summer following the Miami riots unless the Justice Department promptly prosecutes cases of alleged police brutality against minorities

'What does it take to get these people off their ass? Does it take burning, looting, kiliing?" Ruben Sandoval, an attorney from San Antonio, Texas, said at a news conference called to bring attention to an Arizona

Joe Sinohui Jr., a Mexican-American, was killed by a South Tucson police officer in 1977. Hispanic groups are calling for prosecution on federal civil rights charges because the officer was acquitted by an allwhite jury in state criminal court.

Sinohui's mother, Lupe R. Sinohui, said the Justice Department has lost credibility because it takes too much time deciding whether to prosecute

"How can the Justice Department claim to be dealing out even-handed justice, when an army of lawyers and FBI agents are sent to Florida to take swift and just action within a few days, while in Arizona, in the Southwest, nothing has been done?" she asked.

Mrs. Sinohui noted that she heard the mother of slain Miami insurance executive Arthur McDuffie speak about her hope for federal prosecution after a state court acquitted four white Miami police officers in the

"I say to Mrs. McDuffie, may the Lord in his mercy help you, because you are going to go through hell,' Mrs. Sinohui said, adding that nothing will be done.

The verdict in the McDuffie case sparked three days of violence in black sections of Miami, leaving 14

Since the rioting, Attorney General Benjamin R. Civiletti has started an investigation of all police brutality allegations in Miami.

Mike Hudson, representing the National Black-Hispanic Democratic Coalition, said the Justice Department's response in Miami demonstrates quick action is possible if there is political incentive. 'We strongly urge the Justice Department to conduct

a diligent investigation in the Sinohui case, as it is in McDuffie, and to reach a decision in the very immediate future," said Hudson, administrative aide to Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas.


"Only with timely and active response by the Justice Department to protect the rights of blacks and Hispanics can respect for our legal system be maintained and disasters like Miami be prevented," Hudson said.

In a statement following the news conference, Justice Department spokesman Robert M. Smith said Ci-

viletti has made civil rights his first priority. "The Justice Department is extremely sensitive to the rights of the Hispanics and all other minorities,' Smith said. "Given the department's record, charges of insensitivity to the civil rights of anyone are ab-

Meanwhile, the chief of the criminal section for the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division, Dan Rinzel, said the Sinohui case is under review.

Federal officials confirm denial of CBS request for satellite use

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal officials confirmed Friday they had refused to allow the transmission of a CBS news story via satellite from Cuba because they are limiting the use of Cuba's facilities to coverage of specific news events, such as the evacuation of Cuban refugees. Officials at CBS, the Communica-

tions Satellite Corp. (COMSAT) and the Federal Communications Commission all agreed the Treasury and State departments had refused to allow a satellite transmission on Thursday

Friday evening, CBS officials said they had tried once again to gain permission for a satellite transmission and had been rejected. "CBS News believes that news

should be free to move on satellites all over the world, divorced from political considerations," said CBS news president Bill Leonard. While a Treasury spokesman failed

to return repeated phone calls, State Department spokesman Hodding Carter confirmed the government's action Friday afternoon Since 1963, Carter explained, the

U.S. government has maintained a strict trade embargo against Cuba which precludes upgrading any existing links between Cuba and the United States; for instance, scheduled air service and telecommunications facilities.

When Cuba began operating a new satellite earth station last September, Carter continued, U.S. policy "was modified to allow COMSAT facilities in the U.S. to be used to cover specific events of immediate international importance.

"However, the policy as opposed to the exceptions remains to deny satellite hookups covering non-specific events such as a news special on Cuba involving several days of shooting," the spokesman concluded. "These types of stories can continue to be provided through other means ...

The latter remark was an apparent reference to the networks' past practice of flying film from Cuba to

Cuba's operation of the earth station involves the trade embargo because it can now charge American companies for the right to transmit information over the world-wide IN-TELSAT satellite system. 'We're moving news, not commer-

cial product," said Bud Benjamin, a CBS vice president and director of news. "We've had problems at the source before, such as Moscow refusing to send something, but not here in this country. An executive of COMSAT, who

asked not to be named, said Treasury officials had informed him earlier this week they would not approve CBS transmission "because our application said we would be handling general news and was not tied to a specific news event. We've never faced an explanation like that before."

CBS said no attempt had been made by federal officials to review the content of the news dispatch. Ironically, the network said, the dispatch reported on a host of new economic woes facing the island nation and its president, Fidel Castro.

Carter, when asked if he did not find it unusual that the United States

would permit transmission of news on a specific event such as a huge anti-American rally, but would block a dispatch on Cuba's economic problems, replied: "The irony is not lost

"This matter is under review," he added.

Until last fall, Cuba had no satellite earth station capable of reaching the INTELSAT satellite system. When the major TV networks were allowed to cover a meeting of non-aligned nations in Havana last September, they discovered Cuba had just built such an earth station. COMSAT, which represents the

United States in the INTELSAT global system, must obtain permission from the FCC to handle satellite transmissions from Cuba. Because of the trade embargo, however, the FCC cannot act without the concurrence of the State and Treasury departments.

According to the COMSAT source, such concurrence has been granted 21 times since Cuba opened its new earth

Western Europe's satellite launcher suffers setbacks

PARIS (AP) - Western Europe's effort to produce a satellite launcher to compete with the U.S. space shuttle suffered a setback Friday when the Ariane test rocket developed engine trouble shortly after liftoff in French Guyana, disintegrated and fell into

Officials of the European Space Agency said the project was not compromised but conceded the next two launchings in the test period, in November and early 1981, would have to be successful to convince potential clients a European launcher was a viable proposition.

The U.S. space shuttle also is in trouble following announcement of a new four-month delay by the National Aeronatics and Space Administration Thursday, giving the Europeans more time to solve Ariane's prob-The 155-foot tall, three-staged rock-

et roared off a jungle launching pad in French Guyana in northeastern South America after four countdowns. Its 3,600-pound payload was two West German satellites.

A minute after the liftoff, one of the four engines in the first stage lost pressure, the European Space Agency said in a statement. The other three motors died 40 seconds later and this caused the rocket to fall into the sea, the statment added. Officials said once the rocket lost boost and started wobbling, stresses would have caused it to break apart.

The agency said the cause of the failure could only be determined after a detailed examination of the signals the rocket sent to instruments at the ground control center. The countdown was stopped three

times, twice because of computer problems and once because a tropical storm swept the launch site. Friday's launch was the first at-

tempt to put a working payload into space and followed a successful test launching Dec. 24.

Moseley was indicted Wednesday by a federal jury in the Midland-Odessa Division of the U.S. court system's Western District of Texas.



Gift 'sparks' college drive

By MICHAEL HOLMES

STORM LAKE, Iowa (AP) — The nine-paragraph letter was signed simply "A Friend of Buena Vista College." Nothing more. But with it came a gift of \$18

The bequest is more than double the current assets of the little Presbyterian school tucked amid rich farmland in northwestern Iowa.

"No one ever offered this big a chance to this size school. We want to be worthy," says Keith Briscoe, president of the college that counts fewer than 1,300 full- and part-time students.

Buena Vista has 899 on-campus students who attend classes in tidy red brick buildings near the wooded shore of Storm Lake. It looks like a quiet, ordinary campus, but looks can be deceiving, Briscoe said. Buena Vista strives for excellence.

Full-time teachers hold masters degrees or higher and are among the highest-paid in the state. Freshmen are taught only by professors, and nine of 10

have high school grade averages of "B" or better. Seniors often find themselves in classes of four to six. Sometimes they are taught one-on-one. More than 70 classes have fewer than 15 students; 40 classes have fewer than five.

Briscoe praises his faculty, acknowledging how difficult it can be to attract professors to remote

"But many want, and find here, a real collegiate environment that serves as a haven. Here, they can do their research. There aren't the large-campus politics. There isn't the 'publish or perish' philoso-

"We pay them to be outstanding teachers. Anything else they do, they do for the sheer joy of it." In the eyes of the donor, whose identity the school has sworn to keep secret, Buena Vista is something special.

His letter said he first was apprehensive about giving money to such a small school.

"I found, however, at Buena Vista College a jewel quietly and continually radiating its mission and services through a truly dedicated teaching faculty and staff," the donor wrote.

"Greatness can come from as small a place as Buena Vista College. Great teachers and high-potential students can come from small towns. Our country and the world needs our small colleges."

'Great" is a word not often applied to small colleges when most in Iowa are projecting enrollment declines up to 25 percent next year.

But it is a word Buena Vista officials dare to say out loud. Storm Lake attorney Edgar Mack, chairman of the

school's board of trustees, said it as he noted that the University of Chicago and Buena Vista were founded the same year, 1891. 'Chicago got gifts totaling \$35 million from John D. Rockefeller. Buena Vista did not. Any great

institution requires one major, sparking gift. We believe this is ours," said Mack. "It gets you away from the struggle with poverty. It gives us an opportunity to do things we could never

Here are Buena Vista's preliminary plans for the \$18 million:

 Establish an endowed business school and set up endowments for the college's six academic divisions

and the library. - Build a conference center.

Begin an "American heritage" lecture series featuring international leaders in business, academics, the press and religion.

Upgrade pre-med and pre-law curricula.

As a condition of the donation, Buena Vista must raise \$9 million on its own over six years, a figure that doesn't worry school officials. The fund-raising effort will become part of an existing 10-year program aimed at building school assets to \$54 mil-

Founded 89 years ago, the college got by for years with about 125 students, Mack said. Only after World War II did it begin to grow.

Today, the school has branches at Fort Dodge, Spencer and Council Bluffs and conducts a respected business program in Florida.

Although enrollment has climbed 60 percent since 1974 and the new business school likely will attract more, Briscoe said Buena Vista isn't interested in growing much larger.

"Each year, we've been turning down more applicants than the year before," he said. "We hope to stay the same size. We're about 100 percent now. ... We don't want to take 101 percent and put them in the boiler room.'

Briscoe sees a continuing need for small, private colleges despite economic pressures that have driven Buena Vista tuition to \$3,225.

'We are able to provide an awful lot for our kids. We have 60 out of 900 participating in student government. At a big state university, they might have 60 or 70 out of 20,000.



More Cubans arrive in Florida

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) - Persistence paid off Friday for three Cubans who fled under the bows of Cuban patrol boats, but not for a Cuban-American the Coast Guard

said tried to evade a U.S. blockade.

A steady stream of refugee boats returning from the Cuban port of Mariel swelled the 35-day total past 71,000 Friday, including the youngest refugee, Reina Mariela Miranda. She was born about eight hours before the 80-foot "Reef Queen," packed with 308 refugees, docked here early Friday, said Dr. Armando Cruz. The baby's name means Queen Mariel.

Cruz said the mother, Amparo Carillo Miranda, 25, was in good condition and that her 6-pound, 18-inch baby was "very healthy."

Also among the new arrivals were three men who came in a rickety 22-foot fishing boat that entered the "Freedom Flotilla" after slipping away from a fishing tournament near Havana. The men had not been allowed to go to Mariel to join in the

boatlift to Key West. The three men, Jesus Dumenigo Armentero, 46, Raul Roja Cantilles, 25, and their 25-year-old captain, who asked not to be identified, arrived aboard the "Carey," powered by a two-cylinder, 20-horsepower engine.

"If no relatives come after you, you have to have a paper saying you are a political prisoner, a homosexual or from jail," Armentero said.

Adolfo Padron, 50, of Los Angeles, appeared Friday before U.S. Magistrate Jack Saunders on a charge of violating new U.S. Treasury Department regulations against going to Cuba to pick up refugees. He faces a maxmimum \$10,000 fine and 10 years

Saunders set bond at \$5,000, scheduled a hearing for June 6 and told Padron not to leave Florida.

Padron said he purchased the boat in which he was apprehended specifically to go to Cuba and pick up his mother and other relatives.

Consumers can 'spend as usual'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumers have done their job in curbing buying and borrowing and can resume spending as usual, says Treasury Secretary G. William Miller.

"I think consumers have learned their lesson," Miller said. "They have learned their lesson that you don't have to just keep borrowing for fear there's no tomorrow, because there is a tomorrow.... I think the lesson itself is that if we're more prudent, things get better."

He said the credit control program imposed by the Federal Reserve Board and the Carter administration on March 14 has worked, and suggested it is no longer needed. The board dismantled a major portion of the program on Thursday.

Meanwhile, the government announced Friday that consumer prices rose 0.9 percent in April, which translates to a compound annual inflation rate of about 11 percent. Prices had risen at a compound annual rate of 18 percent in the preceding three months

of 1980.

"Now that we have so remarkably corrected the inflationary psychology and the excessive demand for credit, it's time to go back to normal consumer behavior, people behaving in a normal way," Miller said in an inter-

view this week.

Miller's encouragement to consumers to spend stems from concern in the Carter administration that the nation may be facing a more severe recession than the mild downturn forecast previously.

forecast previously.

Officials, including Miller, are worried that banks are not lowering interest rates rapidly enough, and are worried that consumers have cut back on their spending too sharply.

Miller said the slowing of spending by Americans, in response to the credit curbs, has had "its very good results" by bringing on lower interest rates "which means credit is now available on more reasonable terms."

But he added that the government did not intend that Americans stop buying altogether.

Asked if consumers have overreacted, Miller said that had not happened. But then he went on to to suggest that it could happen.

"We are not trying to restrain normal consumer spending. What we were trying to nip in the bud was the anticipatory buying and borrowing, as if there were no tomorrow as sort of a frenzy. And I think that's been broken," he said.

"I think we have to give Americans a lot of credit. They answered very clearly what the president said: 'Stop overdoing it.' And they stopped," he said.

Asked how consumers are supposed to know what is normal spending behavior, Miller said every family has to decide on its own. "Consumers are very intelligent.... All families know when they've been loose on the credit and when its time to get back in order."

Miller said he is concerned that banks have not lowered their prime lending rate more rapidly in response to lower costs for their funds.

"The one thing that...is intriguing is why the market rates have come down so quickly, and therefore the costs of money for banks has come down quickly, but the prime rate has not," he said.

He said the prime rate, now about 14 percent at some major banks, is still higher than the rates banks must pay n money they borrow.

"It seems to me the banks need to get back in line with their costs of funds," he said. He said the burden of the higher interest rates is falling on the small business, farmers and consumers who do not have the same access to other cheaper sources of funds that many large businesses do.

"I think the banks are not going to be serving their customers well if they continue to carry too high a rate for those who need bank financing and don't have access to the other

Use of state trust funds to boost mortgages proposed to panel

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The state could earn a profit and Texans would have a shot at additional mortgage money if state trust funds were invested in the home loan market, a Senate committee was told Friday.

DeWitt Hale, spokesman for the Texas Association of Builders, proposed the use of trust funds — such as the Permanent University Fund, Permanent School Fund and Teacher Retirement Fund — to pump up the faltering mortgage market.

Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur and chairman of the Senate Committee on Financial Institutions, told his staff to look into Hale's suggestion.

Hale said the three state trusts could increase their earnings by investing in home mortgages. He said the trusts, which now earn an average of about 8 percent on investments, could be getting 11 percent.

Parker said the money could be passed on to home buyers through traditional lending institutions or through the state's new housing agen-

The Teacher Retirement Fund has already moved into the secondary mortgage market with investments in the Federal National Mortgage Association. Legislation might be needed to allow investments in first mortgages, according to Hale.

Private pension funds were also mentioned as untapped resources for mortgage money.

The committee also heard a gloomy forecast about home buying in Texas

for the next six to eight months.

Mark Hanna of the Texas Association of Realtors forecast little, if any, improvement in the home buying industry. Altough interest rates have dropped in some areas, Hanna said people have "been sold on the idea of

fearing the recession" and are not buying new homes.

"The rates now under normal course would be attractive and people would be buying, but they're sold on the idea of you better watch out."

Clovis man, 21, gets 6-year sentence on marijuana charge

A 21-year-old Clovis, N.M., man, who admitted he was used as a "mule" for hire to transport marijuana, was sentenced by Federal Judge Lucius D. Bunton in Midland on Friday to six years in prison under the Federal Youth Corrections Act.

The man, Andrew "Andy" Chavez, already had pleaded guilty to possession of about 110 pounds of marijuana he was carrying in a pickup truck. He was arrested Feb. 18 near Study Butte in far Southwest Texas and near the Mexican border.

Moments before the sentencing, Chavez had requested a probated

And his attorney, Gerald Lopez of Odessa, said that his client admitted "that he was to be a 'mule' and went along" with a man and a woman who had agreed to pay him for hauling the marijuana.

"He (Chavez) found an opportunity to make an 'easy dollar' by taking this trip, and had no idea what he was going to be paid," Lopez said. "He (now) realizes that he should not have done this," said the attorney.
Lopez also told the court that Chavez
has been smoking marijuana since he
was 16, and "he's been arrested for
misdemeanor possession" of marijuana several times.


Like his client, Lopez suggested that Chavez be placed on probation "so he may start a new life."

The judge suggested that "new life" should begin at Federal Youth Corrections facility, where Chaves would get supervision and guidance. "What you did was obviously for gain," said Judge Bunton, who sentenced the man to six years.

"I believe with the proper guidance and counseling..., that, perhaps, Mr. Chavez, you can and will make a good citizen."

Chavez, currently on bail, is to begin his sentence sometime in June.

Under the Federal Youth Corrections Act, Chavez could be out of prison in a year or so and his criminal record could be erased if he behaves well and is rehabilitated.



President kicking off Olympic fund-raiser

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter, in return for the decision to boycott the Summer Olympics, is lending his influence to help the U.S. Olympic Committee recover money lost by not sending a team to Mo-

Twenty corporate chief executives invited to a White House luncheon with Carter and USOC officials today were expected to be asked to donate money to the USOC and ask other companies to chip in, too.

Carter promised to help the committee raise money when he first asked it to boycott the Moscow Games to protest the Soviet military incursion in Afghanistan.

The committee's April 12 decision to boycott the Games was upheld Thursday by the U.S. Court of Appeals, which rejected arguments by 25 Olympic hopefuls that the USOC had no authority under the Amateur Sports Act of 1978 to turn down an invitation from a host country.

The USOC expects to lose \$6.5 million to \$7.5 million in individual and corporate contributions because of

Last week, the Carter administration asked Congress to provide \$10 million to the USOC, most of it in one-for-two matching funds which, if successful, could gain the organization \$30 million.

The money would be used, among other things, for completing the U.S. Olympic trials this summer and providing for planning and staging international competitions within the next few months, primarily later in the

The money would also be used to encourage and train U.S. athletes to compete in the 1984 Games to be held in Los Angeles.

Isolated tribe fights for survival

ALTO IVON, Bolivia (AP) — A light rain drizzled over the jungle clearing as a single-engine Cessna touched down and bumped to a stop on the wet grass.

As the prop twirled to a stop Chocobo Indians, some with red toucan feathers piercing their noses, emerged from the foliage to greet the new arrivals with smiles and hand-

The simple act of the friendly reception, said missionary Gilbert Prost of Chicago, shows how far this isolated tribe in the upper Amazon basin has progressed since he first saw them in an aerial survey in 1955.

'The first time I flew over the village they ran into the jungle leaving behind one old woman and a sick boy," said Prost, who with his wife, Marian, is helping the tribe win a desperate battle to survive.

Prost said the United Nations estimated there were as many as 2,000 Chocobos in the 1940s, many wandering half-naked through the jungle living on wild plants and what they could kill with bows and arrows.

But disease and malnutrition whittled down their numbers over the

"When we started our work we took a census and found only 135," said the missionary, who is sponsored by the non-denominational Summer Institute of Linguistics in Huntington Beach, Calif.

Prost said there was little doubt the tribe would have died out by now

without outside help.

Today the tribe has 254 members, the count augmented by stragglers from the jungle and a sharp drop in the death rate through better health and nutrition

"It was difficult for us at first. But I was able to persuade them to allow me and my wife to live with them,' Prost said.

He said he and his wife built a mud hut in the village and began learning the Chocobo language

"Two members of the tribe spoke Spanish which made it a lot easier," said Mrs. Prost. The couple was not the first to contact the Chocobo although they

said they were the only missionaries living with the tribe During the early 1950s the Bolivian government sent several commis-

sions into the area to study the tribe and try to civilize them. There was little progress and the visits caused some pain, said Prost,

adding that it left the Indians with a

general distrust of visitors.

In the mid-1960s Prost said, he asked the government to grant the tribe title to a tract of jungle. The government responded by setting aside 100,000 acres.

"Ownership of the land gave the Chocobos a sense of security they never had before," Mrs. Prost said. "They began a new life."

With help from the Prosts the Indians began planting small crops and collecting rubber, which was sold in Riberalta, 60 miles north over jungle

Money from the sales was used to buy food, medicine, rifles and mos-

quito netting. Prost said getting the Indians to use the netting was a major victory, since many diseases are mosquito-borne.

Search on for SMU president

DALLAS (AP) - The search is on for a new president of Southern Methodist University, the school's Board of Governors has announced.

SMU lost its head when James Zumberge resigned earlier in the week to become president of the University of Southern California in Los

The board announced Thursday that a search committee, chaired by Dallas oil company executive and SMU trustee O. Paul Corley, will begin accepting nominations and screening candidates for the job.

The search committee will make recommendations to a still unnamed trustees selection committee, the board said.

Air controller in similar mishap

CHICAGO (AP) - Federal Aviation Administration officials confirmed Friday that the same controller involved in Monday's near collision of two jetliners at O'Hare International Airport also was involved in a similar mishap April 11.

Both incidents involved Boeing 727 trijets operated by American and Braniff International airlines. No injuries were reported in either situation, the FAA said.

The FAA said the controller, whose identity was not released, has been temporarily relieved of duty.

The Andersons presented Ms. Feinstein with a Kitty Hawk button and a color photograph of their balloon as it floated over California's spectacular Sierra.

Sadat given 'landslide vote of confidence' in referendum

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - A national referendum has given President Anwar Sadat a landslide vote of confidence and cleared the way for him to stay in office as long as he wants, according to official results announced Friday.

Other constitutional changes mandated by the vote make Islamic law "the main source" of legislation in this nation of 42 million people, institutionalize a multi-party political system, allow creation of a presidential advisory council and provide for quasi-government ownership of the press while guaranteeing its "independence.

The official results carried on radio and television said more than 10.3 million persons, 98.96 percent of those who voted, agreed to the six amendments and additions in the referendum package, while 1.04 percent, or 108,657 persons, voted against. Twelve million voters were eligible for Thurs-

Nabawy Ismail, deputy prime minister and minister of interior (police), pointed out that the tiny "no" vote was the largest negative response in the three referenda since Sadat came to power in 1970. The previous two dealt with public approval of the peace treaty with Israel and measures to guarantee national unity and control dissent.

Ismail attributed the negative vote to "instigation by some in Egypt to their countrymen to boycott the polls or vote no."

"But our people did not respond to this unnationalistic call. It had no appeal for them," he said.

Deposed shah 'doing well' in Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - The deposed shah of Iran has improved from the cancer surgery he underwent two months ago to the point where he is able to jog occasionally in the gardens of his palace retreat, medical sources

"The shah is doing well," said one medical source, who declined to be identified. "He is putting on weight slowly ... and there is no sign that the cancer has spread further.

Although the 60-year-old former monarch, Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, remains cloistered in the 19th century Kubbeh Palace, his wife, Empress Farah, has been house-hunting and three of their four children have frequented Cairo nightspots. Egyptian sources said the royal family is looking for a home "probably outside Cairo."

The shah underwent surgery for removal of his cancerous spleen March 28, four days after President Anwar Sadat granted him permanent exile in Egypt. Doctors later revealed cancer had spread to his liver but was being controlled by chemotherapy.

Mugabe, Machel hold private talks

BEIRA, Mozambique (AP) - Prime Minister Robert Mugabe of Zimbabwe flew to this port city Friday for a three-hour meeting with fellow-Marxist President Samora Machel and then flew back to Salisbury, government officials

They said the two black leaders discussed economic affairs but gave no details. It was believed they also discussed anti-communist guerrillas fighting Machel's government.

Zimbabwe's former white-minority government had supported the Mozambican guerrillas, while Machel backed Mugabe's guerrilla forces fighting in Zimbabwe, then known as Rhodesia. A London-sponsored truce in the former British colony ended seven years of guerrilla warfare and Mugabe's party won elections in February that brought black majority rule and the African name Zimbabwe to Rhodesia. It was granted independence April 18.

Both Machel and Mugabe are avowed Marxists, but the meeting Friday was their first since Mugabe came to power.

Newspapers in both Zimbabwe and white-ruled South Africa reported clashes this week between guerrillas of the Mozambique National Resistance group - MNR - and government forces, mainly in an area south of Beira and north of the capital of Maputo. Zimbabwe borders Mozam-

French president defends summit

PARIS (AP) - President Valery Giscard d'Estaing, in the face of sharp criticism from Washington and at home, emphatically denied on Friday that his summit meeting with Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev had dealt a blow to Western unity on the Afghanistan crisis.

"In what way, on what point, regarding what measures was Western solidarity broken by this trip?" The French president asked in a television

"Was there a decision made, was there an action undertaken which modified or shook Western solidarity?" he asked. "None, unless it is the principle that France has conversations and can have them with whomever she wishes.'

The French president's staunch defense of Monday's summit in Warsaw, the first between Brezhnev and any Western chief of state since the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan, was coupled with a strong vow to continue France's independent stance.

Three killed in Lebanese capital

SIDON, Lebanon (AP) — Two artillery shells slammed into a busy market-place, killing three persons and wounding 12 in this southern Lebanese provincial capital Friday, authorities said.

The Palestine Liberation Organization blamed Christian militiamen of rebel army Maj. Saad Haddad for firing the two shells.

The PLO-run news agency WAFA said all the victims were civilians and that

Haddad had threatened to shell Sidon unless the guerrillas withdrew and the Lebanese army assumed control of the ancient city.

Haddad's threats were broadcast by his radio station, the "Voice of Hope"

Haddad's militiamen, at odds with the PLO, control a six-mile-deep strip of Lebanese territory along the 59-mile border with Israel.

The enclave was turned over to Haddad's men by Israel when it withdrew its forces from conquered southern Lebanon in the spring of 1978.

Afghan schoolgirls, forces clash

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Afghan schoolgirls clashed with security forces in renewed anti-Soviet demonstrations in Kabul that left two girls dead and 60 wounded by gunfire and beatings, a report from Afghanistan

Earlier, a traveler from the Afghan capital estimated that 12 persons perished in rioting Tuesday and Wednesday involving schoolboys and girls,

police, troops and armed ruling party vigilantes.

The latest report, from an Afghan source that in the past has proved accurate, said thousands of girls broke out of their guarded high school grounds Tuesday. Many scaled the walls and demonstrated outside the ministries of interior and education before they were dispersed by security forces and the vigilantes, it said.

Iranian army uncovers planned coup

A plot to overthrow the revolutionary government in Iran was uncovered by the Iranian army, the official news agency Pars said Friday. No arrests were reported.

The Pars news agency said the coup was planned for Saturday by a group calling itself the Army of Iranian Freedom-seekers. It said the group sent a message to the military communications center Thursday night calling on military units in western Iran to stop fighting Kurdish guerrillas and move on Tehran.

The western military units were to stage a coup, surround radio and television stations and arrest key Moslem clerical leaders, Pars said.

The head of the Kurdish Democratic Party said Iranian army officers had approached him about supporting a coup against the government, but he rejected the idea, Pars said. Dissension has been reported in the armed forces recently in Isfahan and Kur-

The coup message was attributed to Gen. Gholam Ali Oveissi, martial law commander under the former shah, according to Pars., Oveissi fled Iran during the revolution which overthrew Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi last year.

In Stockholm Friday, officials of the Socialist International confirmed that three European Socialist leaders planned fly to Tehran Sunday in an effort to help solve the 202-day-old hostage crisis. Fifty-three Americans have been held hostage in Iran since In Geneva, Syrian diplomat Adib Daoudy met with United Nations Secretary General Kurt Waldheim and then prepared to fly to Tehran where he is to launch a new effort "to solve the crisis between Iran and the United

A U.N. announcement said Daoudy is visiting Tehran with the Iranian government's agreement to "resume direct contact with the Iranian authorities." He is to discuss resump-tion of the work of the five-member U.N. Commission that looked into Iranian grievances against the United States, but returned from Tehran last month after being refused permission

to see the American hostages. While saying again the hostages will not be released until the deposed shah and his "plundered wealth" are returned to Iran, the militants holding the Americans added "any other decision" dealing with the captives will be up to the Iranian nation or its representatives.

In the Hague, Netherlands, the World Court rules Saturday on the U.S. case against Iran and diplomats expect it to issue a second order for the immediate release of the American hostages. But the outcome of the U.S. claim that Iran must pay damages for seizing the hostages and prosecute those responsible was in doubt. The court ruled in an interim decision Dec. 15 that the hostages should be freed while the judges studied the merits of the case.



KWANGJU, South have been turned in at burned vehicles from the Korea (AP) — Citizen leaders and martial law authorities discussed on Friday a permanent truce for this city ravaged by anti-government rioting. But heli-copter-dropped leaflets warning against further mob violence spurred fears of a new military

effort to regain control. While officials in Seoul remained silent on the situation, some 50,000 persons gathered at the provincial headquarters building in downtown Kwangju to await a report on the meeting. By nightfall, no report had been made. Committees of citi-

zens, in control of this city of 800,000 since police and paratroopers during bloody battles Wednesday, are de-manding amnesty for rioters, a public acknowledgement of government blame for the violence and compensation for families of the victims.

One committee said the number of dead was 65, with at least 400 wounded or injured, in three days of violence before the situation cooled off Thursday.

A handful of foreign residents of Kwangju, including some missionaries, sought safety at the nearby air base where the U.S. Air Force 6171st Support Squadron is stationed. The Americans remained on base.

The 39,000 U.S. servicemen in South Korea had been ordered earlier to curtail travel and offpost activities to avoid being caught up in the distrubances and there was no change in their "state of readiness," the Pentagon said in Wash-

The helicopter leaflet drop and eyewitness reports of military transports arriving at an airbase near the city increased apprehension about a possible attempt by the South Korean army to regain control of Kwangju.

The leaflets, signed by the national martial law commander, Gen. Lee Hee-sung, urged Kwangju residents to avoid gatherings and warned that an operation would be ordered if mobs continued to defy the government's authority. Citizens feared that such an operation would be a military one.

A spokesman for a committee of students said the martial law authorities had set an evening deadline for the surrender of all weapons seized by rioters in raids on police and military posts during the threeday rebellion.

The deadline did not appear enforceable because the city remained under control of the demonstrators

The citizens' committees, meanwhile, were carrying out their own drive to recover the estimated 4,000 weapons taken. Some 2,500 weapons were reported to

School brings back no-frills education

LOS ANGELES - The owners of a small private school in the Fairfax community of Los Angeles are attempting to bring back an old-time system of education where students concentrate on no-frills reading, writing, arithmetic and hard work.

With that goal in mind, the school's co-founders, Genevieve Clements and Laura Tyler, chose to name it after the first reading text for children printed in America, the McGuffey

The seven illustrated books, for grades kindergarten through six were originally published in 1836 by William Holmes McGuffey, but the children at the McGuffey School in Los Angeles read the revised editions, printed in 1879.

themes entered on such lesson titles as "Bubbles," "The Song of the Bee" and "The Clouds" with basic vocabulary, phonics and punctuation. "The book teaches values - not to be angry, to be kind and generous." Clements said. "Unfortunately now, people say do your own thing. If you are not happy, be angry."
She described the McGuffey Read-

er as "the book that made America literate." It was the basic reader in some American schools until World War II, she said.

A native of France who came to this country more than 30 years ago as a "war bride," Clements said that unlike the European schools she attended as a child, American schools have become "too soft on children."

"Many children don't know thir basics because the schools here are not demanding enough from them," she said, "They are bright, but very little is expected of them."

The school administrators hope that by reaching back more than 100 years they can give their students a stronger foundation. They established the school 2 12 years ago because they wanted to provide an alternative to the type of education that places few demands on children, she said.

"It is the most rewarding experince to teach children," said Tyler,

who is the phonics specialist and teaches the second grade — the grade they call the "meat and potatoes grade" because of its importance in learning the fundamentals.

In all grades where classes have 10 or fewer students "one of the most important things we try to teach is how to be neat and organized," she To assure neatness, the children use

the hard composition notebooks. which are graded by teachers for accuracy and neatness, and they even put stickers of animals and stars on each graded page. Report cards are issued every week, Clements said. At the McGuffey School the chil-

dren are taught reading and writing in kindergarten; in the first grade they learn to write cursive style; and by the third they are introduced to languages, Clements said.

The rigorous format appears to have helped the school to flourish. because since its meager beginning it has grown from an enrollment of six and thousands of dollars in debt to 43 students and a surplus in its bank account, its founders say.

The school was started with a \$50,-000 investment. Both women chipped in \$15,000 apiece, and Clements borrowed \$20,000 on her house.

Now, Clements said, they are making enough money on their invest-ment to pay four teachers and ex-penses of the building. Neither woman receives a salary, she said. Tuition is \$1,300 for a 10-month term.

Clements said that before they could use the McGuffey name they had to get permission from Litton Industries, which owns the copy-

Litton spokesman Barney Oldfield remembers when the two women came into his office requesting permission.

"They said there was a crying need for changes in the direction education was heading, especially with reading, writing and arithmetic," he said. 'They were convinced there was a need, and apparently it worked out."

The permission was granted. "We only use the books as Christmas gifts," he said. "We give them out so people can see what a textbook was



Girl wins suit over pajama fire

ST. PAUL (AP) — The Minnesota Supreme Court today upheld a \$1.75 million damage award to a girl who was scarred and disfigured 10 years ago when her flannel pajamas caught fire on a kitchen stove.

The award was ordered paid to Lee Ann Gryc, now 15, of St. Paul, by the Riegel Textile Corp. of New York. Riegel manufactured the fabric used in the girl's pajamas.

In upholding the award of \$1 million in punitive damages, the court said Riegel had "acted in reckless disregard of the public for purely economic reasons.'

The court said the company knew its "flannelette" cotton fabric could burn with explosive speed, even though it met federal safety standards in effect at the time of the 1969 accident. Testimony showed the toddler's pajama top burned in 8 to 12 seconds.

Evidence in the trial included a company memo warning that Riegel was sitting on a "powder keg" because of the pajama fabric.

Miss Gryc was awarded \$750,000 for her injuries, pain and suffering. In addition, \$1 million in punitive damages was levied against the company. Riegel had appealed both amounts.

The girl suffered second- and thirddegree burns over 20 percent of her body. She had leaned over the burners on an electric range to reach a kitchen timer when her pajamas burst into

The burns left scar tissue on her arms, chest, stomach, back, neck and chin. Miss Gryc, then 5, underwent two months of hospital treatment and at times required morphine for the

She will require at least six more operations but will never totally lose the scars, court records indicated.

The unanimous decision, written by Associate Justice John Todd, said that "permanent disfigurement may adversely affect Lee Ann's psychological makeup, and her employment

and matrimonial opportunities."
The court described Lee Ann as "a constricted girl who has a low selfimage and is unable to deal with the emotional problems caused by her burns.'

The company argued its fabric did not violate federal laws then in effect and had passed a fire safety test. The fabric was not treated with flame-retardant chemicals, although court testimony indicated retardants were available.

Current federal laws are more stringent and Riegel no longer makes the "flannelette" fabric.

A 1956 memo from a Riegel official to the company's research department warned of a "powder keg" situation because of the fabric's flammability. Another company letter in 1968 said the firm would not use flame-retardant chemicals on its fabric until required to do so by federal law be-

cause of cost. Because of company actions, the court said the \$1 million in punitive


damages was "not unreasonable." The company's headquarters are in New York. It also has facilities in South Carolina and Georgia.

Three other companies had settled out of court for a total of \$135,000. They were the Dayton-Hudson Corp., Minneapolis, which sold the pajamas at retail; Associated Merchandise Corp., the wholesaler, and Style Undies, Inc., the designer and manufac-

WASHINGTON (AP) - Cleanup of the crippled Three Mile Island nuclear reactor cannot begin until radioactive krypton gas is vented from the structure, says an official of the firm that operates the plant.

The gas must be cleared from the reactor's containment building to allow crews to begin the decontamination process, said Robert C. Arnold, senior vice president of Metropolitan Edison Co.







VATICAN CITY (AP) - The Vatican clamped down further on abuses in the ritual of the Mass and warned in a document made public today against falsification of the Roman Catholic liturgy.

It said the abuses can impair church unity and lead to "scandal, bewilderment among the people of God and the near inevitability of violent reac-

The document decried a "confusion of roles" between priests and lay people during the Mass, an "increasing loss of the sense of the sacred," and the "manipulation of texts for social and political ends."

Anderson meeting 'independent' obstacles with lawsuits

By MIKE SHANAHAN

WASHINGTON (AP) - In West Virginia, citizens who sign a petition to get John Anderson's name on the November ballot as an independent presidential candidate and then vote in a state primary could actually be sent to jail.

It's just one of many obstacles Anderson faces in getting his name on the ballot in all 50 states, a move that is necessary if his independent run for the presidency is to stand a chance.

In Kentucky, officials have notified the Anderson campaign that the presence of the congressman's name on the Republican primary election bal-

lot May 27 — before he dropped his GOP campaign to run as an indepen-dent - will block him from an independent slot on the ballot in November.

In Michigan, officials are requiring Anderson to hold a nominating party convention even though he has no intention of forming a third national political party to get himself elected. In California, where Anderson

campaigned today, he must obtain 101,300 signatures by Aug. 8. But his supporters were barred from seeking signatures on petitions until after the June 3 presidential primary.

Legal barriers have yet to stop Anderson's campaign in any state, but it is becoming clear that they could. Much time and money are going into the problem, and it sometimes seems lawsuits are as plentiful as chicken dinner speeches in other campaigns.

West Virginia is a prime example of state where elections laws designed to discourage third-party and independent candidacies are proving trouble-

There, potential supporters are being told that by signing petitions in his behalf, they will forfeit the right to vote in hotly-contested primary elections June 3.

Anderson, a House member for 20 years, must obtain 7,500 signatures on petitions by June 2, the day before presidential and local primary elecuons in the state.

There have been 1,949 names gathered over the last three weeks so that means another 5,551 signatures must

be found over the next 12 days. Anyone who signs a petition and then votes in the primary can be sent to prison for 10 days under a state

misdemeanor statute 'People are saying, 'I'll be damned if I'm going to give up my vote," said Jim Grant, Anderson's West Virginia

campaign coordinator. Only 1 of each 40 persons ap-

proached have agreed to sign, Grant

He said while he senses a deep well of support for Anderson in the state,

many voters want to insure their right

to vote in closely-fought congressional and local races.

Partially because the petition drive was going so slowly, Anderson made a hurriedly-planned suprise campaign visit to the state last weekend with his

wife, Keke. Ed Coyle, the national deputy campaign director, conceded Tuesday that West Viriginia is "presenting us with our biggest problem."

He and Grant say they are confident they will find enough peition signers by June 2, but with little margin to spare.

If the campaign comes up short of the needed 7,500 names, officials say they will file a federal court suit to get Anderson's name on the ballot, Anderson, a firm supporter of the freeenterprise system, has also joined a lawsuit by the Socialist Workers Party seeking to overturn the West Virginia election statute.

In Michigan, the Anderson organization attracted three times the required 39,000 signatures, but now find themselves with a new legal thicket. State officials are interpreting the election law as requiring Anderson to pretend that he has formed a new party, including the holding of nominating caucuses and conventions. That also may be challenged in the

Later this week, Mitchell Rogovin, Anderson's principal attorney, plans to file suit in Kentucky where the congressman is in a "damned-if-I-do, damned-if-I-don't situation."

Campaign strategists unsuccessfully attempted to get Anderson's name dropped in March from the May 27 Republican primary ballot.

Officials refused to drop his name but are now invoking a "sore loser" provision of the law, which prevents anyone who has run in a primary as a Republican or Democrat from getting on the ballot as an independent or

third party candidate. Anderson lawyers are similarly considering challenging federal election laws which permit the major party candidates to receive \$29 million to finance their fall campaigns, but provide nothing for Anderson until after the election, and then only

if he receives 5 per cent of the vote. Postal regulations which permit the Republican and Democratic candidates to pay lower mass mailing rates will likely be challenged, too.

At the Field Museum she pursued her interest in feathers. "Most of these feather objects had never been on display before. To protect their fragile coloration the featherworks are displayed in a softly-lit, thus vaguely mysterious, but very effective exhibi-tion space. Anita Bryant seeks divorce

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Anita Bryant, strong-principled advocate of God, family and flag, says she is divorcing her husband-manager of nearly 20 years because he "violated...my very conscience" by helping people who tried to "control" her

But her husband, Bob Green, said he did not want a divorce.

Miss Bryant, the former Oklahoma beauty queen and popular singer who became the symbol of Florida orange juice and then of opposition to the homosexual rights movement, surprised friends, foes and admirers around the country by filing for divorce Thursday in Dade County Circuit Court.

Green, cooperated "with certain hired staff members who conspired to control me and to use my name and reputation to build their personal careers instead of my ministry," Miss Bryant, an evangelical Christian, said in a brief statement from her 25-room Miami Beach home.

The statement referred to Anita Bryant Ministries, her latest project, whose stated purpose was to preserve the American family. She said she was resigning from the program.

She said in her statement that Green had "violated my most precious asset: My very conscience.'

There was no elaboration and the statement did not reveal the names of the staff members she said had conspired with her husband.

Divorce papers said he had moved out of their spacious home overlooking Biscayne Bay but then moved back in "of his own accord and without the agreement of the ... wife, which has created an intolerable situation.'

Donna Toney, a spokewoman for Anita Bryant Ministries, released an "open letter" from Green to Miss Bryant. It said: 'Dear Anita:

"I love you with all my heart and I am awaiting your return as my wife and the mother of our children. God's love and forgiveness is open to both of us if we

'Let us both put aside all other earthly considerations and reunite our lives ir Christian love.

'Your husband, Bob.' Miss Bryant asked for custody of the couple's four children - Robert 16 Gloria 15, and William and Barbara, both 10. She also asked for half of the couple's property.

'This comes as a complete shock to me," said Florida Citrus Commissioner Red Phillips, one of Miss Bryant's strongest supporters in the \$2 billion

"I had understood Miss Bryant and he were very close," Phillips said. "I hope something can be worked out and she and her husband can get back

The daughter of an Oklahoma oil field worker and his teen-age bride who were divorced when she was 3, Miss Bryant spent her childhood living with various relatives. She was discovered by radio personality Arthur Godfrey, who helped launch her singing career.

She and Green were married on June 25, 1960, when she was 20. She was already a popular singer at that point, with three million-selling records, "Paper Roses, "Till There Was You," and "My Little Corner of the World." As

Miss Oklahoma in the 1959 Miss America Pageant, she was second runner-up. With the help of a ghost writer, she has written three books, "Bless This House," "Amazing Grace" and "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory." She neither smokes nor drinks and won't work where liquor is served.

While she gained fame and fortune through her orange juice commercials and personal appearances, Miss Bryant attracted international attention in 1977 with her "Save Our Children" campaign against a homosexual rights ordinance passed by the Dade County Commission.

She was successful in working for its repeal at the polls, but at a great price to

"Perhaps now with Bob Green no longer manipulating her, maybe this time she'll support everyone's human rights, including her own," said Bob Kunst, leader of a Dade County homosexual organization which spearheaded support for the ordinance and was her principal opponent on the issue

Kunst, who was in New York trying to raise money to mount a new referendum, said Green "muzzled" Miss Bryant every time Kunst offered to debate the issue with her.

Miss Bryant's controversial stand on the county ordinance, which prohibited discrimination based on sexual preference in housing, employment and other areas, alienated many of her conservative friends among Florida citrus growers because of the national publicity she received.

Although they continued to express public support, many believed her value to the state's major industry had been irreparably harmed

Oil officials recommend delay

Austin Bureau

AUSTIN - Texas oil and gas industry officials recommended Friday that the Railroad Commission of Texas delay seeking delegation of permitting authority under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) program.

Guy Buell, attorney representing the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, told an RRC hearing examiner that delegation of permitting authority to the RRC at this time could adversely affect litigation against the Environmental Protection Agency's "no discharge" regula-

Buell said such delegation would force the RRC to enforce the no-discharge rule, which would cut oil and gas production.

Buell said the main issue is whether on-shore wells in the coastal area which discharge brines into coastal waters will be classified as on-shore or coastal wells

On-shore classification would pre-

vent further discharges from those wells, and many would have to be shut down, Buell said.

"The current EPA regulations, which are the subject of this litigation, place those wells in the on-shore sub-category, and, consequently, impose a zero-discharge limitation on their discharges," said Wayne Smith, attorney for Atlantic-Richfield Co.

"This requirement will significantly reduce the production of oil and gas in the State of Texas, and will have little or no impact on the quality of coastal waters," Smith said.

Exxon engineer Carl Hester said the result of the no-discharge limitation would be the loss of 8.6 million barrels of oil and 26.7 billion cubic feet of gas from 1,404 wells.

"There is no significant benefit to be gained by placing the no-discharge requirement on on-shore-well-produced waters, which are discharged into coastal waters," Hester said. "Additionally, there is a serious loss of oil and gas reserves and an unwarranted fuel usage associated with subsurface injection of the no-discharge produced water.

'The Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association believes Texas should seek NPDES permitting authority, but...we strongly urge such action relative to the oil and gas extraction industry be delayed until the litigation are decided on their merits," Buell said.

The Texas Chemical Council also supported state-permitting authority by stating it would eliminate double permitting, would allow permittees to deal with state and local officials rather than the federal bureaucracy and would eliminate the necessity of federal environmental impact state-

'The TCC is aware that, because of the present state of affairs as they related to oil and gas production under the Texas Railroad Commission and the EPA administered NPDES program, it might not be in the current best interest of all elements of Texas industry to support NPDES delegation," said Robin er deal with the RRC.

Morse, attorney for TCC.

Morse supported the Mid-Continent position of partial delegation for other agencies and delegation for oil and gas following resolution of the legal matters.

"They caught up with him in the yard and shotgunned him to death at extremely close range," the FBI agent said.

The gunmen then fled.

Officials said they did not know the motive for the slaying, but one officer suggested it may have been linked to drug trafficking in and out of the prison.

While the gunmen were still inside the prison, perimeter guards stumbled across a car parked near the reformatory. Prison officials said the guards were searching the area around the vehicle when they received a call that there was shooting inside the minimum security compound

By the time the guards reached the shooting scene, the gunmen had fled and they returned to the place where the car had been discovered.

"By the time they returned, the car was gone," reported District of Columbia Corrections Department spokesman Leroy Anderson.

A description of the vehicle was broadcast to area police and two men were apprehended by Fairfax County, Va., Police following a high-speed auto chase on Interstate 95 south of Washington.

A third man was picked up by an off-duty policeman in a service station near the Lorton Reformatory. York identified the three as Edward

F. Sharrieff, 32 and Germaine P. Stoddard, 24, both of Washington, and John E. Landon, 30, of Alexandria, Va. All were charged with first-degree murder, he said. Police continued to comb the area surrounding the prison for a fourth man.

The minimum security section of the prison, which also serves as prerelease section, is not enclosed by a fence or wall. It normally holds about 150-200 inmates. The dormitories generally house40 inmates ards.

328 million gallons of oil lost in spills during 1979

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) - The world lost more than 328 million gallons of oi, last year in spills and fires, a 56 percent increase over 1978, and most of the fuel drained away in three tanker crashes, a tank rupture and a well blowout, according to a report.

At least 250 people were killed or missing in the accidents, the report said, along with more than than 50,000 birds and 270,000 fish.

The figures were contained in the Oil Spill Intelligence Report, published by the Center for Short-Lived Phenomena. It called its findings "the most comprehensive listing of spill data available in a public docu-

The report lists 159 major incidents in 1979. The year before, 210 million gallons were lost in 109 accidents.

Last year, five incidents accounted for 73 percent of the oil lost. By far the

Danish energy minister denies he knew of contract wording COPENHAGEN (AP) - Danish

Energy Minister Poul Nielsen, under fire because of an oil purchase contract forbidding Denmark to "discredit" Saudi Arabia, said Friday he neither read the contract nor knew its entire contents when it was signed last April.

In response to increasing criticism of the agreement in parliament and in the press, Nielson admitted the deal was signed not by him, but by representatives of the state-owned oil and natural gas company, DONG.

The clause appeared to be aimed at preventing such incidents as the showing of the controversial film. "Death of a Princess," which prompted the Saudis to recall their ambassador to Britain after the film was shown there.

Denmark's national broadcasting company declined to air the film, which documents a journalist's investigation into the execution of a Saudi princess and her lover for adultery. The company said it based its decision on the film's quality. According to newspaper reports,

Explosion, fire halt work in nation's largest underground copper mine

SAN MANUEL, Ariz. (AP) - Fire broke out almost 1,800 feet below surface in an abandoned section of the nation's largest underground copper mine here Friday. Workers blamed the fire on the apparent explosion of an eight-ton battery

Magma Copper Co. officials said all its miners were evacuated safely from their San Manuel mine after fire broke out at about 3:00 p.m. The mined-out section was sealed

off, and crews were sent to fight the blaze, the company said.

Company officials did not say how the fire started or how many workers were in the mine at the time.

But a Tucson television station quoted unidentified miners as saying roughly 2,000 workers were underground when the fire started around the 1,775 foot level surface.

The miners said a battery malfunctioned near an abandoned shaft shored up by old, dried-out timbers, KVOA-TV reported.

One worker described the malfunction as an explosion.

# Foyt prepares for new records

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - If somebody tried to write a movie script along the lines of A.J. Foyt's life, he'd probably be laughed out of the business.

Nobody would believe it. The 45-year-old driver from Houston is a legendary figure at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway - the mecca of auto rac-

And when he starts the engine of his orange Parnelli-Cosworth prior to Sunday's 64th running of the Indianapolis 500, he will add a chapter to the legend.

That race, his 23rd Indy classic, will make A.J. the only driver to compete on the Speedway's 2½-mile oval in four decades.

The burly Texan first came to the Speedway in 1958, starting 12th and finishing 16th. Since then he has held — or still holds - virtually every Speedway

Dick Ferguson, a rookie who will start right behind Foyt in middle of the 33-car grid, said, "I can't imagine anybody being around here that long as a driver and still being as good as he

"I'm gonna keep an eye on what A.J. does and maybe I'll learn something about how to be

successful at Indy." Foyt, rarely a loquacious man, prefers not to talk about

his age or his records.
"What I do on the track is the only thing that counts," he in-

There seems to be credence to what he says. The only four-time winner at Indianapolis has not finished lower than seventh ince 1974, grabbing one victory

(1977), two seconds and a third

during that span.

He finished second to Rick Mears a year ago after being in

And one certainty Sunday is that Foyt will add to some im-

pressive records. He already has driven 8,135 miles in race competition here, won 8,550 championship points at Indy and has won \$1,318,182.73 from Speedway purses.
"To drive here the way he has

has all these years is really a tribute to his ability," Mario Andretti said during a recent

Andretti, who has won one race here, but has suffered through a number of lean years at the Speedway, added. "Foyt has something that not every-body has. Maybe it's intensity or some kind of special ability. There's a lot of great drivers out here, but Foyt's something spe-

The cars remained in the Speedway garages Friday, most of them being torn down and put back together with every nut,

bolt and part getting a thorough inspection and tightening. There will be two drivers meetings Saturday — one public and one private — during which race chief steward Tom Binford will go over the rules, emphasize safety and answer any ques-

"The meetings are particuarly important this year because we have 10 rookies in the race," Binford explained. "We don't want anybody taking the green flag and being confused about they are supposed to do."

# Strike over — momentarily

NEW YORK (AP) - It is "Play ball" under a new four-year agreement reached early Friday between the Major League Baseball Players Association and the 26 clubs. The agreement put aside for 1980 the controversy over the free agent system and averted a strike that would have stopped baseball.

The agreement was announced at 5 a.m., five hours after the strike deadline had passed, and now must be ratified by the 26 clubs and the play-

The contract provides improvement in minimum salaries and pensions. But the key to the settlement was the free agency question, which was set aside for further study and

Grebey said in his statement that the current free agent system will remain in place for the rest of the year, with a four-man committee to be appointed to work out a new system. The study group, which will not include Miller or Grebey, will meet by next Aug. 1 and report to the clubs

and the players association by Jan. 1,

Should a 30-day bargaining period then fail to produce a new system by Feb. 1, 1981, the clubs may put into effect their current proposal for com-pensation which would run for the remainder of the four-year contract, Grebey's statement said.

Miller said the owners' proposed compensation system does not go into effect unless three things happen the committee fails to come up with any recommendation; the parties fail to reach agreement in the next 30 days; the owners do not announce on Feb. 1 what they intend to do about the free agent draft the following November.

Should agreement on a new compensation agreement not be reached by next Feb. 1, the players may also choose to strike at that time, but if they don't there can be no strike over compensation during the remaining three years of the Basic Agreement, the player relations committee stat-

However, the players' union may offer, before March 1, 1981, to waive their right to strike with a request that clubs permit a substitute strike in 1982, not later than June 1, Grebey said, adding the clubs are not obligated to accept such a request.



## Miller Barber cuts shots, climbs into four-way tie

DUBLIN, Ohio (AP) - Old pro Miller Barber set a course record with a 6-under-par 66 and moved into a fourway tie for the second round lead Friday in the Memorial Golf Tournament.

The 49-year-old Barber scored eight birdies on the rain-soaked Muirfield Village Golf Club course, Jack Nicklaus' creation that stretched 7,116 yards over rolling Ohio countryside.

He finished 36 holes with a 138 total, 6 shots under par at the halfway point of the elite event that has grown annually in prestige and importance. "How'd it happen?" he asked, then

answered his own question. "It's a golfer's golf course. It's a tremendous challenge. When you come here, you'd better have your 'A' game or you're gonna shoot some

high numbers. He shared the top spot with Ed Fiori, Don Pooley and funnyman Peter Jacobsen. Fiori, who had the lead alone until he bogeyed the final hole under gray, leaden skies, shot a 68. Pooley and Jacobsen, who ignored gallery pleas to do his imitations of PGA tour stars and concentrated instead on his own game, each had a

Defending champion Tom Watson overcame a shaky start in a steady sometimes heavy — rain and shot a 67 that put him at 141, only 3 strokes back. He one-putted four times, all from about 12 feet, on the first five holes. Three of them were for par.

"At least I got back in the golf tournament; I was pretty far out after that (first round) 74," Watson said.

Bruce Lietzke, a winner last week, John Fought, John Mahaffey and Hubert Green were a single stroke off the pace at 139. Mahaffey shot a 67, Fought and Green had 68s and Lietzke had to birdied three of his last four holes to match par 72.

PGA champion David Graham of Australia, Tom Weiskopf and Bill Rogers were at 140. Weiskopf had a 71, Graham 67 and Rogers 70.

That placed 11 men within 2 strokes of each other going into the final two rounds of the chase for a \$54,000 first prize. Watson, a five-time winner this year, and six others were another shot behind.



# 'Cover Story' new TV magazine

NEW YORK (AP) - As creator of public TV's "NET Journal" in the mid-1960s, Al Perlmutter often found himself in a distant city, short on both time and money and totally without resources for the documentary he was about to produce.

"I'd look up the correspondent for the New York Times or the Washington Post or some other paper or news service," he recalls, "and pay him to sit with me for a few days' briefing.

"Now I've got so much background material available, as a part of the family ... well, it's a pleasure."

Perlmutter is executive producer of "Cover Story," a new joint enterprise of public television and Newsweek magazine, scheduled to premiere on many Public Broadcasting Service stations Monday evening at 9 EDT. As with most PBS programs, air date and time may vary.

WQED, the PBS station in Pittsburgh, is a co-producer of "Cover Story."

The initial, hour-long program, "Your Future Isn't What It Used to Be," features Newsweek editors and columnists Tom Mathews, Pete Axthelm, Jane Bryant Quinn and George F. Will, as well as actor Art Carney and historian Arthur Schlesinger Jr. They consider the future from several perspec-

Perlmutter, as a sort of managing editor, has full access to Newsweek resources as well as personnel. "This is not a televised version of Newsweek." he says, "but we do draw heavily on the magazine for content and research."

"Cover Story" - future editions on inflation and adoption are in production - is a TV magazine, though hardly in the traditional "60 Minutes"

"Looking at the other magazine shows on television today, like '60 Minutes' and '20-20,' I felt that what they did not do was take a single subject and deal with it from various viewpoints," Perlmutter says. "And not only from various viewpoints, but with various techniques and styles.

"The 'Future' show, for instance, has eight or nine segments," he says, "and the 'Adoption' program for this fall, has five. In other words, the approach varies to suit the subject."

In addition, Perlmutter, perhaps best-known as producer of public TV's Emmy-winning "Great American Dream Machine," approaches "Your Future Isn't What It Used to Be" in a number of different ways - documentary, drama, animation. For one segment for the forthcoming program on inflation, he uses a quiz show format.

"I have found then, in the magazine format, and dealing with a single subject, you have various permutations you can deal with," he says. "It's like holding up a stone, and examining it's facets.

"You can't see everything," he says, "but you can focus on one fact, or subject, at a time, for as long as

Perlmutter says each edition will be structured to include one or several clearly defined categories -"Background," "Profile," "Perspective," "Lifestyle," "At Issue."

"What we can do here is structure each program around this basic group of departmental headings, that will vary from show to show," he says. "For the viewer, and I'm sorry we're not on regularly, this will provide a familiarity with the program.

Perlmutter says "Cover Story" offers something found nowhere else on television.

"I am more enthused about this particular format than any I have been involved with for years," he says. "It has the potential of being a tremendously interesting way of giving out information."

# Russian 'Woodpecker' bugging ham operators

WASHINGTON (AP) - In the jargon of ham radio any doubt that this interference was coming from an operators, it is known as the "Russian Woodpecker." To the U.S. military, it is the Soviet OTHR. And to the Federal Communications Commission and the State Department, it's a big nuisance.

OTHR stands for over-the-horizon radar, a sophisticated high-frequency radar system that allows an operator to "see" thousands of miles beyond the range of a conventional unit. The "Russian Woodpecker" refers to the noise produced over the airwaves when the Soviets are operating their powerful

In 1976, when the Russians first began experimenting with over-the-horizon radar, they were using radio channels throughout the high-frequency spectrum and interfering with international airplane and ship communications as well as ham opera-

A minor panic was touched off in this country when the interference began, with various scientists suggesting the Soviets were trying to modify our weather; experimenting with radio waves that could change human behavior; developing a Buck Rogers-style weapon to shoot down nuclear-tipped missles, or testing a wireless system for transmitting elec-

Four years later, FCC field operations chief James C. McKinney laughs at that those suggestions. "I

over-the-horizon radar system.

There have been some developments, however. McKinney says the Russians are now operating around the curvature of the earth. three OTHR transmitters; they are concentrating their signals in the radio bands used by amateur radio enthusiasts instead of safety channels such as those for ships; and the U.S. Air Force has recently begun testing its own OTHR system in Maine.

The interference caused by the Soviet radar system still crops up in unexpected places, though. The high-frequency radio transmission of news photographs between the United States and South America was recently disrupted by the ubiquitous "wood-

And new theories continue to surface. Among them: The Soviets are using the system to purposely jam Voice of America radio broadcasts; and the radar was aimed at Iran during the unsuccessful attempt to rescue the American hostages.

Air Force officials who ask not to be identified say the Russians have other devices that do a better job jamming than radar, and that while interference could be encountered in the Mideast, it is unlikely the Soviet radar would have the range or would be useful over such terrain. OTHR works best over water, they

A conventional radar unit sends its beams out in a straight line and thus cannot pick up images beyond

hand, bounces signals off a layer of the earth's atmosphere known as the ionosphere - much like directing a beam of light off a mirror - to "see"

"We still get complaints all the time from ham operators and we just pass them on to the State Department," McKinney says. "We've complained many times, but the Russians respond by saying they are conducting unspecified experiments and they will try to reduce the interference.'

of "tug" and the nautical suffix "antine" - was born of a party joke five years ago. Its keel was laid April Fool's Day, 1978.

Some called Briggs crazy then. But the launching of the Norfolk Rebel drew the mayor of Norfolk, prominent businessmen and a few hundred specta-If the vessel is rigged in time, it will pull three

tugs from the Norfolk Naval Shipyard on Satur-day as part of Harborfest '80, the city's waterfront

"It's the greatest thing that happened to Norfolk since the end of the yellow fever epidemic," said Mayor Vincent Thomas. 'It's an adventure in new technology," said Dick Farley of the Cousteau Society, which is

moving its headquarters to Norfolk. Christened with a bottle of sourmash whiskey on Thursday by Thomas' wife, Betty, the Norfolk Rebel slid into the water and came afloat just on

"They asked me if she'll go down by the bow or go down by the stern," said Merritt Walter, the boat's designer. "I said I just hope she stops going

down at the right place.' Briggs, who runs a marina here, plans to use the Norfolk Rebel for towing, salvage work and commercial fishing. It should be ready after sea

The boat won't be able to sail close to the wind

She carries a gaff-rigged mainmast and a mizzenmast that can be either gaff- or fore-and-aft rigged. The bowsprit is retractable for pushing, and the masts are short enough to fit under most bridges. Briggs estimates the combination of the 849 square feet of sail and reduced power from the

320 horsepower diesel engine will result in a 40 percent savings in fuel, which is now up to \$1.20 a gallon for diesel. Another recent effort to recreate the age of

sailing ended in failure last December when the 97-foot coasting schooner John F. Leavitt sank on its maiden voyage off Long Island. All crew members were rescued. The Leavitt, billed as the first sail-powered cargo ship built in the United States in 40 years, had been launched in August of last year in Thomaston, Maine.

Neither Briggs nor Walter would disclose the cost of the Tugantine, which was built locally.

Briggs predicted other boat owners will follow his example. The idea of combining power and sail might work on small intercoastal cargo ships for "mom-and-pop" operations, he said, adding, "You'll see sails back on the sea."

The Virginia Institute of Marine Science plans to study the vessel to determine the most efficient power-sail combinations under different conditions and translate the additional knots or time saved The idea of the sailing tugboat wasn't that respectable five years ago when Briggs stuck a couple of masts and a ragtag collection of cloth on his

working tug, the Steel Rebel, for a party joke.

He discovered on a towing job the next day
the parachutes and tablecloths saved him a knot or two, and has worked the tug with salls ever since.
