Uncle Sam wants—but may not get—registrants

WASHINGTON (AP) - Starting today, Uncle Sam wants 19- and 20year-old men to sign up for the draft, even though the law under which registration is resuming could be ruled unconstitutional before their next birthday because it excludes

After a flurry of late legal maneuvering, in which a federal court blocked registration only to be overruled by Supreme Court Justice William Brennan, the first of an estimated 4 million young men began filling out Selective Service information cards at post offices around the coun-

The first phase of the registration will continue over the next two weeks.

Within 90 days, registrants will receive formal notice through the mail that they are registered for possible induction in the event of a national

Early response to the government's call was light today with postal officials reporting no lines or crowds. But some young men said they came early to get it over with.

They're going to get me anyway so it ain't no use trying to hide," said Marvin Wallace, 19, of Baltimore. He as well as other young men among the first group of registrants around the country said they signed up reluc-

There has been no draft since 1973, and President Carter has said he has no intention of asking Congress to reimpose one.

But registration, which was stopped five years ago, is expected to shorten by almost a month the time it would take for a callup, officials said.

"With this, within hours of a military emergency we could start the induction process," Selective Service Director Bernard Rostker said in an interview Sunday.

This week's registration covers young men born in 1960. Those born in 1961 will begin registering next Monday and those born in 1962 are to register in January. After that, all young men must register upon reaching their 18th birthday.

During the registration the men are

required to fill out a card giving their name, sex, date of birth, current address, permanent address and Social Security number. There also is a box they may check if they want to be contacted by a military recruiter.

Rostker predicted 98 percent of those required to sign up will do so. Others, including some draft critics, predict hundreds of thousands of youths will ignore the order or be unaware that registration is re-

Leaders of draft protest movements planned demonstrations across the country. Several peaceful protests, including one near the White House, were held over the weekend. Draft critics vowed to set up shop at many post offices to urge registrants to place a gummed label declaring "I am registering under protest" on their cards. The return to registration, approved by Congress earlier this year,

was thrown into confusion Friday when a three-judge federal panel in Philadelphia declared the Selective Service Act unconstitutional because it does not include women. Although Brennan on Saturday re-

versed the lower court's injunction against registration, questions about the law's constitutionality still must be resolved.

Daniel Weinberg, the attorney for the plaintiffs in the nine-year-old Philadelphia suit, said he expects his case to reach the full Supreme Court by fall with a decision late this year.

In explaining his order, Brennan indicated the Supreme Court could go either way in the case. But he said a failure to proceed with registration in the meantime could cause foreign policy and military problems, while the government could always just destroy the computerized information it has collected if the law eventually is found to be unconstitutional.

Draft critics said Sunday the confusion arising from the legal maneuvers, and to some extent problems the Selective Service has been having in promoting the plan, will cause as many as a half million young men not

Afghan athletes hope to defect

MOSCOW (AP) — As Soviet athletes dominated the Olympics in the absence of boycotting Americans, several members of the Afghan team announced they want to defect to the United States.

Americans are boycotting, at President Carter's direction, over the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan.

CBS News reported Sunday that a member of the Afghan team approached CBS to say several Afghan athletes wanted to defect to the United States. There are 17 athletes on the

"Five members of our team want to go to the American or British embassy. We do not like it here," a team member, who said he had a brother in the United States, told another report-

An Australian basketball player said he had been with Afghan athletes who talked to reporters about defecting. He said the athletes were led away by two men in gray suits.

An U.S. Embassy spokesman said the embassy here was aware of the contacts but could do nothing to help, while a spokesman for the British Embassy said he was unaware of any contacts. In Washington a State De-

partment spokesman said, "I don't know anything about it." A man who identified himself as secretary of the Afghan delegation, but who refused to give his name, denied that athletes were seeking to

CBS said it had withheld the story until "a British TV news organization went ahead with it, alerting Soviet authorities." The British organization was not identified.

"The Afghan athletes who want to defect realize that security may be beefed up around them now, but feel that getting their story out is their last chance to escape," CBS said. The athletes were not named.

In the first day of competition, Soviet athletes won four of the five gold

medals awarded. Among the winners was Soviet swimmer Sergei Fesenko, who won the gold medal in the men's 200-meter butterfly event. It was the first gold medal for a Soviet man in a sport ordinarily dominated by the United States. Fesenko said he would not retire as planned because he wants to swim again against the Americans.

The other Soviet golds were in free pistol, 100-kilometer cycling and 52kilo class weightlifting. East Germany took one gold, in the women's 4x100-meter medley swim relay.

A total of 36 nations are boycotting, and the number of athletes and officials here as competition began Sunday - about 8,300 - was down by about 2,000 from the number that would otherwise have been present.

The boycott appeared to have no immediate effect on the level of competition — four world records were set as Soviet and East German teams dominated the medal harvest.

Few Midlanders sign up as registration resumes

Only a few were straggling in to sign up on the first day of the U.S. Selective Service System's revived

draft registration. There was no hurrah.

Darryl Saenger sauntered in before his work-day as a pumper began. He's 20, ripe for the draft, willing to serve his country in time of war, but figures others - not just the 19- and 20-yearold men - should register with the SSS and be ready to pack duffel

"I think they should make all the guys register for the draft," said Saenger. "I've got a bunch of friends who are 21 and didn't register.

"Actually, I'm for the draft," he said. "I think they should draft everybody - not just a few."

In Midland County, that few could be interpreted as a men ages 19 and 20, noted Stan Sartain, who is overseeing the registration at the downtown U.S. Postal Ser-

vice office here. Men age 20 are being registered this week at post offices throughout the nation. Next week, 19-year-old men will come to the fore to fill out the white and green 5-by-7-inch cards. Beginning this January and in the Januarys to follow, men age 18 will

be required to register. The SSS was enacted in 1940, but draft was suspended three wars later - after World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War - in 1973. That year, the Armed Forces turned to an All-Volunteer Force to supply the needed military manpower. And the SSS says the all-volunteer concept will continue until a beefed-up military force is needed.

Registration is being conducted in the post office for convenience of the government and for a cost-savings to the taxpayers, said Sartain, director of consumer services for the 168 post offices in the USPS's Midland Sectional Center.

Far more regular postal customers were in line to pick up stamps, mail or packages than there were young men

waiting around to register. Jeanette Pulse of Greenwood was waiting for a postal position spot to

open up. "My 8-year-old (daughter Kim) is

really worried that I'll have to be drafted," said the mother. "She's worried that I'll have to go

and that she might be drafted when she turns 19. I say, 'By then, I hope

A silver-haired woman who vividly recalled the draft from decades ago also was standing in the postal line.

"Of course, I don't object (to the draft)," said Lucille Arick, who worked in the SSS office in Midland in the 1940s and 1950s. "But it sure makes hard feelings around the city, I'll tell you."

The few young men who had drifted in to register for the draft were no where about. No demonstrators or protesters were outside the George Mahon Federal Building carrying anti-draft or anti-war placards. The day was uneventful.

Midland accountant Skip Allen, 32, who was heading up toward the postal window, indicated that the renewed drafted was good sign.

"I think it's about time," he said. 'The Russians think they can push us around, and we've got to show them

Pentagon pushing mobilization plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — While youths are registering for a possible wartime draft, the Pentagon is moving to expand voluntary enlistments in a reserve manpower pool that would be tapped for combat strength early in a crisis.

If it succeeds, the plan would provide what the military calls "pretrained" men to bring Army regular, National Guard and reserve units to full wartime strength and to provide replacements for combat casualties in the first months of fighting.

So far, the idea has been tested on a very limited scale. But officials say they believe that, in a full-scale effort, they can enroll as many as 10,000 young men a year directly into the Individual Ready Reserve.

Since they would have completed basic training, these individual reservists would be available for overseas deployment in a war much more quickly than draftees, who are required by law to receive at least 12 weeks of such training after induction.

While draft registration was resuming today, Congress would have to pass separate legislation to actually reinstitute the draft. Young men would sign up for a six-year hitch in the Individual Ready

After three months of peacetime active duty for basic training, they would spend the remaining five years and nine months at their normal civilian pursuits. They would be obligated to undergo two brief periods of refresher training, but would not be required to drill regularly as is the case with members of the Guard and reserve units.

Some critics question whether this sparse training would produce useful combat soldiers when needed.

"It's a lot better than having nobody to call when we need individual fillers and replacements in a crunch," said one Pentagon official who asked to remain anonymous.

The plan for expanded voluntary enlistments into the Individual Ready Reserve carries no provision for any bonuses. So far as can be determined, no other tangible incentives are offered.

The Individual Ready Reserve, or manpower pool, has shrunk from a peak of almost 1.6 million before the draft ended in mid-1973. In those days, youths finishing two years as conscripts were placed on the ready reserve rolls for an additional four years to complete a six-year military

Bush, Reagan take vacations

Candidates resting in Maine, California

HOUSTON (AP) - Ronald Reagan headed west and George Bush east after appealing to the voters in this city of conservatism and Republicanism to join the crusade to beat Jimmy Carter in November. Reagan was going to take a rest at his California ranch and Bush went to

relax at his resort home in Maine before beginning the long campaign into November. It was a homecoming for Bush, and the 3,000 to 4,000 spectators jammed

into stairways and aisles of the fashionable Galleria shopping mall gave him an ovation that rattled the glass fronts of the exclusive shops nearby. Both Reagan and Bush spoke for about five minutes and renewed their appeal for Democrats and independents to join the GOP in ousting Carter from

the White House The Republican presidential nominee said, "This country cannot go for another four years under Jimmy Carter. Now, I'm sure Jimmy Carter is doing his best and that's our problem. There is a world out there, that no matter how many times they have said 'Yankee go home', there's a world that has always known they are safer if there is a great United States as an anchor to windward. That is what we are going to be again in the

Bush, former Central Intelligence Agency director, former congressman and former United Nations ambassador, said the Republicans can expect a tough battle in November.

"So we ask you who are Democrats and you who are independents to not only vote for us, but work for us," he said,.

Texas, with 26 electorial votes, has supported a Republican presidential nominee only four times since admitted to the union in 1845. But, in three of the last five elections, Democrats won by less than 2 percent of the

Bill Clements, who appeared at the rally, broke the Democratic hold on the governor's mansion when he became the first Republican governor since Reconstruction. In recent elections, the big cities, such as Houston and Dallas, have

gone Republican, but the Democrats still hold the balance of power in those thousands of small towns in the woods of East Texas and plains of the The only disruption in an otherwise solidly-GOP affair was when a group of about a dozen women began chanting their support of the Equal Rights Amendment. They were booed down by the crowd, then gave up when the band struck up "Dixie." Clements and Anne Armstrong, former ambassador to Great Britian,

were out early to warm-up the crowd that had to wait through an hour-long delay in the appearance of Reagan and Bush. Clements did a partial strip and Mrs. Armstrong a slip.

The governor, because of the almost 100-degree temperature and a air conditioning system in the mall that went on the blink, stripped off his


Bush, meanwhile, returned to his home near the Houston Country Club, with a group of newsmen, Secret Service agents and staff members at his

Miami 'cool and calm' after lifting of curfew

MIAMI (AP) - Liberty City, still heavily patrolled, was "cool and calm" after authorities lifted a curfew imposed during outbreaks of sniping and rock-and-bottle throwing last week, officials said.

No arrests were reported overnight other than for routine matters, police said. A large number of black youths gathered for a "street disco" in the area Sunday, but dispersed peacefully when rain fell, according to author-

Since Tuesday, when new disturbances began after white police officers tried to arrest several black robbery suspects, 130 people have been arrested in the riot-torn neighborhood. More than 40 people were hurt in the outbreaks of violence.

A dusk-to-dawn curfew, along with restrictions on firearms, gasoline sales and on carrying alcoholic beverages in public, was imposed Thurs-

day. "Everything is cool and calm," police spokesman Pete Cuccaro said Sunday. "The official line is that we're going to maintain a high police presence and high visibility in the

A unit of 400 National Guardsmen and 50 Highway Patrol troopers which had been placed on alert was sent home Sunday, Cuccaro said. He said an unspecified number of extra police officers would remain on duty in Liberty City, but would cut back from 12-hour shifts to regular eighthour days.

In May, Liberty City was the scene of racial rioting that took 18 lives. Authorities believed the latest disturbances were caused by young hoodlums not necessarily motivated by racial concerns.

During the disturbances, a group of six black police officers and several white officers walked through Liberty City, urging young blacks to stay out

Willie Morrison, chief of special services in the police department, said he believes the effort helped to

"If someone perceives they have a racial problem, the first thing they want is black officers," Morrison

said. "The black community expects them to relate, so whether they can or not is not the point." Soviets prevent cameramen

from filming gay activist

* MOSCOW (AP) - An Italian gay activist was seized by Soviet plainclothesmen today when he tried to chain himself to a fence in Red Square in a protest timed to coincide with the Olympics, "a festival of the

Three Western correspondents were also detained. Television cameramen who witnessed the action at a fence in front of St. Basil's Cathedral in the square said they were roughly prevented by the Soviets from filming

The Italian, Enso Francone, 32, of Turin, said he planned the action in connection with the Soviet Union's hosting of the Summer Olympics "to show the world repression of the body in this country, because the Olympic Games are a festival of the body. Francone had earlier said he wanted to unfurl a towel calling for an easing of Soviet laws. Article 121 of the Russian penal code calls for up to five years in prison for sexual relations between two men.

Scores of plainclothesmen were already at the cathedral when Francone arrived. He was bundled roughly into a waiting sedan before he could succeed in handcuffing himself to the chain or opening his banner.

Francone said he held a similar demonstration in March 1979 in Tehran, Iran, five days after 10 homosexuals were executed there. He said he was thrown into prison for five hours and expelled from Iran.

The United Press International bureau chief in Moscow, John Moody, said he was questioned for 25 minutes and had his camera taken away by seven policemen inside a tower of the Kremlin wall.

'Partly cloudy' in forecast for Permian Basin for Tuesday

Winds should be out of the southeast and light and variable tonight and Tuesday, the weatherman added.

Area towns reported fair skies and warm temperatures early today.

Southerners still fight in Bolivia

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — Miners in southern Bolivia said they were still battling the new military government and reported heavy casualties as sporadic gunfire continued in La Paz through the nightly curfew. Troop convoys traveled the capital's streets all night

The junta that overthrew the civilian government on Thursday claimed in a communique it had eliminated all resistance. It threatened to fire all workers who did not abandon the general strike against its rule that began Friday.

The mine workers' clandestine Democratic Solidarity Radio said the miners in the southern Santa Ana district on Sunday fought the troops sent there by the junta and captured three tanks. The broadcast reported "many casualties" and "a lot of working-class blood has been shed."

The miners' radio also reported heavy fighting in the mining city of Huanuni, and sources in La Paz said air force jets were strafing the miners. But other reports reaching La Paz said there were only minor skirmishes in the mining districts and that the troops returned to their barracks.

No confirmation was available of any of the reports.

The miners said after the coup that 5.000 of them were armed with submachine guns and had blocked roads in the mining districts 400 miles southeast of Laz Paz with trucks and dynamite charges.

Two heavy explosions rocked La Paz early Sunday and there was sporadic gunfire as convoys of soldiers moved through the streets. There were unconfirmed reports that jet fighters strafed slum areas on the hills surrounding the capital.

The army appeared to be setting up a military staging area around the Miraflores garrison in La Paz. Reliable sources believe the army is worried about resistance in the capital.

The commanders of the three armed forces took over the government to prevent leftist ex-President Hernan Siles Zuazo from being elected president by the new Congress, but Siles Zuazo escaped and went into hiding. He sent a taped message to the news media Sunday calling on Bolivians to support the general strike and overthrow the junta.

He said the junta, which ousted interim President Lidia Gueiler and named the army commander Gen. Luis Garcia Meza as president, would make Bolivia "a huge cemetery in the very heart of South America. This regime of national destruction will not consolidate itself as long as there is a people ready to fight against it." Siles Zuazo appealed to the Roman

Catholic Church, the International Red Cross and human rights organizations to "demand the names of the dead, so the sad story of missing people in other countries under military regimes will not be repeated."

Siles Zuazo also accused the junta of "attempts to transpose the Argentine model to Bolivia via Argentine military advisers." Advisers from Argentina's right-wing military regime reportedly helped with the

Some sources believe Siles Zuazo has taken refuge in the French Embassy or the residence of the French ambassador in La Paz.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Fighting back tears, freed American hostage Richard Queen returned to the State Department today to a tumultuous welcome, telling his cheering colleagues that "You all know how much I love to be back.

Thousands of department workers crowded into a lobby to greet him. He was hugged by two secretaries freed from Iran in November. "This is just the first step back for the other 52,' Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie

At a press conference, Queen said his Iranian captors were mostly dedicated Moslem students who made no real effort to turn him against the United States. "There was no brainwashing,"

Queen said. He said he was treated well by the militants who have held the U.S. Embassy in Tehran since November, although there were "a

The 28-year-old diplomat, set free because of a neurological illness, said he was out of touch with most of the 52 other American hostages, but he was confident that they would survive their ordeal.

"I think they are pretty strong people," the bearded former vice consul

Queen said he spent much of his time in captivity reading the contents of the embassy library, playing penny-poker with a cellmate and learning French.

He said his captors "didn't care what we did as long as we didn't escape.'

In answering questions, the ex-hostage showed no hostility toward his captors. He said that while a few tried to turn him against the U.S. government, for the most part they left him alone once they became convinced he

Five 'plotters' executed by Iranian government

A firing squad executed five military officers convicted of plotting against Iran's revolutionary government and a court today reportedly handed death penalties to four others in the foiled coup. On Sunday Iran's new Parliament

elected a militant Moslem cleric as its speaker. He is a leader of the conservative and influential party that has a number of members lobbying to try the 52 U.S. hostages as spies.

Revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, meanwhile, urged the Parliament to purge the government of those who are not "100 percent Islamic.'

And Pars, the government news agency, today reported a man convicted of "armed revolt against the government," specifically blowing up an education facility, was executed

The Tehran newspaper Enghlab Eslami did not name or offer the ranks of the latest four condemned military leaders. Nor did it say if they had been shot.

The five who were executed Sunday, including a retired brigadier general and four air force officers, were executed at 1 a.m. at Tehran's Evin prison, Radio Tehran reported. They are among some 500 Iranians,

many of them military men, who were rounded up a week ago on charges of plotting to overthrow the government. Radio Tehran said a special Islamic

court convicted the five men Saturday of planning to "establish an American social-democratic system and bring back the treacherous fugitive Bakhtiar, preparing 35 to 50 jet planes for the operation and for bombarding the Imam's (Khomeini's) reesidency, bombarding other sensitive places and highly populated areas, and preparing printed material to be distributed in various

Shahpour Bakhtiar was the last prime minister appointed by Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi before Khomeini's revolution overthrew him. Now an exile in Paris, he escaped an assassination attempt last

The new Parliament, or Majlis, elected as its speaker Hojjatoleslam Ali Akbar Rafsanjani, a leader of the powerful Islamic Republican Party which controls the assembly.

The election of the speaker was the final organizational step for the Majlis, and it can now turn to such business as the election of a prime minister and members of his cabinet, such pressing matters as economic reconstruction and the fate of the hostages. The Americans today spent their

261st day in captivity.

In an address to the nation, Khomeini criticized the army and government for "indecisiveness" and told them it "must decide on a government which is 100 percent Islamic and not accept any minister like some of the present ministers."

"The Majlis should not accept anybody with the slightest doubt of his commitment to Islam," the leader of the revolution said. This was viewed as a call for a

cabinet of Moslem militants rather than Westernized moderates favored by President Abolhassn Bani-Sadr.

Iraq rebuffs U.S. try to restore normal relations

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Iraq has rebuffed American proposals for restoration of diplomatic relations despite increasing trade between the two countries and shared views on Iran and Afghanistan, Western diplomatic sources say. The sources here in the Iraqi capital

say President Saddam Hussein's government also rejected overtures, relayed through third parties, for a meeting between Secretary of State Edmund Muskie and Foreign Minister Saadoum Hamadi. Relations "will remain severed

until a substantive change occurs in the U.S. position on the Arab-Zionist conflict," said Hamadi in a recent interview with the Beirut magazine Monday Morning. "The severance of relations with

the U.S. was not prompted by secondary or bilateral considerations, but by American hostility toward the Palestion.

way," said one diplomat. Iraq broke diplomatic relations with the United States during the 1967 Arab-Israeli war. However, a U.S. Interests Section staffed by 14 Americans operates in the Belgian Embassy. It monitors commercial and political affairs and issues visas.

Both governments are embroiled in serious feuds with the revolutionary regime of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini in Iran. Both oppose the Soviet military occupation of Afghanistan.

Both are also concerned about the safety of the oil traffic through the Persian Gulf. But Hussein has condemned America's military buildup in the approaches to the gulf, President Carter's pledge to defend America's vital interests in the area and the agreement by the United States and Oman giving American warships increased access to Omani ports.

Stamina, money required

Texas delegates 'overspent'

By GARTH JONES

DETROIT (AP) - It takes stamina and money to be a political convention delegate.

One hundred and sixty delegates and alternates, with husbands and wives, are willing to testify to that after five days at the National Republican Convention.

Seldom did any Texas delegate get back to the hotel, the old Book Cadillac, before 1:30 or 2 a.m. after maybe seven or eight hours sitting in a folding chair in Joe Louis Arena. For some, there had to be a nightcap in the bar followed by fellowship in another delegate's room.

"I haven't slept three hours any night since I have been here," a woman delegate moaned one morning.

As for the financial effect, quick estimate shows the Texans spent at least \$160,000 for the trip, not to mention that spent by

Texas newspaper and broadcast staffs. The Texas GOP delegates were told to expect to spend \$1,000 to \$1,500 for the Detroit trip. Some spent less, but many spent

"If you worry about the cost you shouldn't come," said delegate Lee Nutter of Dallas.

'I have to worry about costs and I figure I am spending about \$1,500," said Dave Lowry, delegate from Bedias. Basically the airline cost to Detroit was \$300 to \$350 round trip, the hotel rooms \$50 to \$65 and personal expenses including meals

One wealthy Houston delegate got a suite, brought his secre-

tary along to continue his regular business routine and mired a Detroit driver and car to stand by at all times.

"I just ate at McDonalds," said delegate Michael Ellis of Daingerfield. "I'm hoping to get by for \$770 to \$800. I couldn't

afford to bring my wife along."

Delegate Steve Lilly of Nacogdoches, who brought his wife along, figures the trip cost them \$2,500. It is their vacation for this

Jean Bensmiller of George West said "we just don't eat breakfast to save money. We drove up here but it is still going to cost us at least \$1,000 each.

"In additon it cost us about \$100 to attend a special meeting of delegates and we probably spent \$400 at the Houston state convention when we were elected...but someone has to pay the price for good government. I've been a volunteer worker for the party for more than 20 years," she said.

A number of the Texas delegates ate at the drug store lunch counter instead of paying \$5.95 for a buffet breakfast in the hotel

A bourbon and water in the bar went from \$1.90 the day before the convention to \$2.25 a day later. Several Texas delegates were seen carrying brown bags out of a nearby liquor store. And there were other necessities, some thought.

The blue denim hats, seen so often on TV, cost \$20 each. The Texas lapel button with the motto "Viva Ole" cost \$3. Naturally, you also had to have a Reagan-Bush, Reagan-Kemp, Reagan-Ford, etc. button. There was a big run on the Reagan-Bush buttons after Bush was chosen.

And a lot of delegates wore still other buttons. One of the favorites was: "A Democrat shot J.R."

Anderson doesn't like limelight

WASHINGTON (AP) — John Anderson says sometimes he's so embarrassed by the sirens and the flashing lights accompanying his motorcades that he crouches down in his limousine seat and hopes nobody recognizes him.

He says he'll be relieved when "this period of public adulation or semi-adulation" is over and the last thing he'll miss is the hoopla that goes with campaigning.

In short, Anderson — who is just back from a grueling 11-day European and Middle Eastern tour - finds that running for president is not much fun.

The Illinois congressman knows that the trappings of campaigning, of just being seen, are absolutely vital if his independent effort is to succeed against the better financed, better advertised and better supported candidacies of Democrat Jimmy Carter and Republican Ronald Reagan.

But he doesn't have to like it. In fact, he says he is resigned to

Anderson isn't impressed, for instance, with being treated like a combination of monarch and movie star, at the center of a traveling circus of television cameras, bands, gladhanders and autograph seekers.

"That kind of fame is so fleeting and so ephemeral that I don't kid myself one bit," he says. "The very same people that come to me and want my autograph, a year from now will have forgotten

Just before leaving on his foreign tour, Anderson paused, in an interview, to reflect on what impels a man to decide that he, among 225 million Americans, has what it takes to lead the country

"You don't just wake up one morning and a great white light shines down from above and tells you you're qualified to be president," he says.

"When you have two candidates come along like Carter and Reagan, you do tell yourself, 'I certainly could do a better job of addressing the country's problems than they could and therefore why should I shy away from the challenge?'

Having said this, Anderson worries that he might be misunderstood and adds quickly: "It isn't the kind of challenge that a man sees when he looks at a mountain and says this is a mountain that I simply must climb because if I don't I will go to my grave

"That isn't the kind of challenge that the presidency offers to me. It is rather just a very pragmatic judgment that I spent my life really preparing for this — not consciously during all of that period - and that it honestly has given me the kind of depth of understanding and knowledge and perspective about problems that a president needs.'

He is inclined to sound a trifle pompous in public when asked whether his quest is not just an ego trip.

'There is something involved in this campaign that is more important than John Anderson, more important than my political career - it's the future of this country," he told campaign workers in Chicago

Anderson says he first talked about running for president one night after making a speech to the Michigan state Republican convention. It was, he says, in September 1977, "when was still in better standing in the Republican Party.

He was sitting late with Paul Henry, an old friend, now assistant minority floor leader in the Michigan House of Repre-

"We talked about the fact that 1980 would be upon us and the Republicans would be looking for candidates, and with Ford gone and Nixon gone maybe they would be willing to turn to a new generation of political leaders and that I cold aspire to running for the White House.'

It was not, Anderson says, "an apocalyptic vision." He had misgivings, and his wife, Keke, he says, "entertained the same doubts that I have about how feasible it was" for him to

"We certainly didn't just clap our hands and say, 'Oh Joy! This

is a great thing, let's go.' We talked about how exhausting the process is and what it involves as far as your family life is concerned and the enormous expense and the fact that the Republican Party is the kind of party that maybe wouldn't take too kindly to my kind of candidacy.

Anderson believes he would make an interesting president -"interesting in the sense that I could be inspirational, because I do believe that is an important function of the office; interesting in the sense that I could give people a sense of pride and conviction and inspiration about the country.

But religion, says Anderson, a born-again Christian, would not

play any part in his effort to inspire the nation.
"I would not be a president who would be restoring church services to the East Room of the White House as Richard Nixon did," he says. "People do not like pietizing politicians and they don't like politicized preachers. They tend to regard both categories with suspicion.

He says the influence of his evangelistic church would be zero in his administration.

The president was flying first to Evansville. Ind. He was scheduled to go by motorcade to Henderson, just across the Ohio River, for a brief parade through town on his way to the home of Dale Sights, a long-time Carter supporter.

The cost of cleanliness

Inflation has no single cause, but one contributing factor is the governmental regulations that boost the cost of every product we buy, every service we receive.

According to Dow Chemical Co., anti-pollution laws have added an average of \$565 to the cost of manufacturing each new American car over the last decade. Additionally, another \$400 will be added to that figure for 1981.

Pollution controls have boosted the cost of generating electricity, too. In Ohio, Dow says, one utility expects its customers to find bills almost 24 percent higher because of clean-air rules imposed by the Environmental Protection Agency. (EPA).

The EPA itself says that during the period from 1977 to 1986 its rules will cost some \$360 billion or an average of \$36 billion a year.

Industry pays 51 percent of the costs for anti-pollution equipment, the agency says. Government pays 13 percent and consumers pay 36 percent. Analyze that breakdown carefully.

In most all cases industry passes its costs along to its customers. Government is funded via

Korean master proves American dream still lives

Everytime I hear the usual complaints about immigrants taking jobs away from Americans or mooching off the government, I think of my friend, Y. K. Kim.

Master Kim is a taekwondo (Korean karate) instructor. My son and I met him two years ago when he inherited 10 students, one worn heavy bag and a small rented room from another Korean who had, for family reasons, decided to return to New

Master Kim is a small man who weighs about 130 pounds. At that first meeting, he was wearing neat but rather worn clothes and not much more than a grunt and a faint smile came from his stern, battered face.

He was facing a large problem. In our city, there were several karate schools already, including one chain which operated three gyms and advertised heavily.

Master Kim had no car, no capital, and could barely speak English. I don't think he ate very much and I know he slept on the floor of the gym. He did nothing but teach his students,

practice himself, and study English. After some months, he saved enough money to have handbills printed. Starting at 10 p.m., after the last student had gone home, Master Kim would trudge for miles, putting

his handbills under the wipers of parked cars.

To make the story shorter, today Master Kim has one of the largest and most successful karate schools in the state and just recently handed over the entire proceeds from a benefit exhibition, about \$6,000, to a home for dependent children. Within two years, he has become not only a successful small businessman who pays a hefty chunk of taxes, but a respected and loved member of his community.

There is a lesson here for all of us. For one thing, he has shown that the American dream is still a reality. For another, he has demonstrated that a person can succeed without government assistance. He never asked for a government job, food stamps, welfare or a loan. Instead, he followed the classic path of success: he worked hard, he lived within his means, he saved and re-invested what he saved instead of consuming it. When he couldn't afford a bed, he slept on the floor; when he couldn't afford a car, he walked; when he couldn't afford food, he didn't eat.

Not once did Master Kim show any sign of self-pity. Not once did he complain of discrimination even though prejudice against Orientals is a reality. Not once did he gripe about the system or rail against his competitors. But more importantly, not once did he show any hint of greed or envy nor any doubt that he would eventually be successful.

In fact, Master Kim never showed any interest in money at all. He focused entirely on providing the best instruction for his students. If only one student showed up, as was often the case, Master Kim worked with him with complete concentration. And when a student couldn't afford even the modest fee he was charging. Master Kim would insist that he come anyway.

Thus, he proved again the old principle that those who give, receive.

Admittedly, Master Kim is an extraordinary person, a man who has spent his life mastering an art which requires extreme self-discipline if you want to reach his level of proficien-

But I tell you this: He put to shame a lot of lazy bellyachers in this country who don't have time to succeed because they're so busy looking for government handouts and blaming everybody but themselves for their

Vesco reveals startling news to Senate

WASHINGTON - Senate Investigators have just heard some startling new revelations from financial freebooter Robert Vesco. He told them that, in return for keeping silent about a White House scandal, he was promised in 1978 that the ban would be lifted on some airliners sought by his friend, Libyan dictator Muammar Qaddafi.

Not long afterward, the White House overruled the objections of then-Secretary of State Cyrus Vance, and delivered two Boeing 727 airliners to the Libyan government, which paid Vesco "a substantial sum of money" for their release.

Vesco was questioned by the Senate Judiciary Committee in Nassau, where he is on the lam from the law. His startling testimony was buttressed by an all-day lie detec The polygraph operator, Fred Cain, of International Investigations, Inc., certified to the committee that Vesco had answered all the relevant questions truthfully.

The fugitive financier admitted that he had transferred a bloc of stock, worth \$10 million to \$12 million, to a group of Georgians in 1977. In return, they had offered to fix his legal problems through Spencer Lee IV, an Albany, Ga., attorney who is a bosom buddy of White House aides Hamilton Jordan and Richard Harden.

Lee later swore to a federal grand jury that Harden had persuaded him to pull out of the conspiracy in February 1977. This was affirmed under oath by Harden who also testified that he had reported the plot to President Carter. The president, thereafter, wrote a note of introduction for Lee and appointed him to a judicial nominating committee to help select

federal judges. Yet Vesco insisted to the Senate investigators that he had remained in contact with Lee long after February 1977 - a statement that registered true on the polygraph machine. This



contrasts with a lie detector test that the Justice Department persuaded Lee to take. He not only failed the test but tried again and failed the second

The lie detector test suggests that both Lee and Harden may have committed perjury before the grand jury. Then where does this leave President formed of a criminal conspiracy, which he failed to report to the Justice Department, but he rewarded one of the conspirators by allowing him to help screen federal judicial appointments.

Meanwhile, the Securities and Exchange Commission learned that Vesco had transferred some of his stolen stock to the Georgians. This led to an SEC inquiry which sent one of the Georgians winging to Nassau, according to the Senate Judiciary Committee account, to urge Vesco "to maintain silence."

As related in the Senate report, Vesco demanded, "Why should I be quiet?" then added, "If you guys can't stop the extradition attempts, at least you can help my friends in Libya." This would help "make him whole." Vesco suggested.

"This was followed," states the Senate report, "by the release of three airliners to the Libyan government. (Actually, only two were released.) Reagan refused to accept the ultimate in 'Fordization'

DETROIT - Leading up to the mo-ment of cold truth just before midnight Wednesday when Ronald Reagan finally decided something was very wrong, agents of Gerald R. Ford were engaged in an exercise they called "segmenting" the presidency that looked much like a backdoor road to power. What Reagan refused to accept was

the ultimate in a "Fordization" of the presidency that had been well underway for several weeks with senior officials in the Ford administration joining the Reagan team. In the frantic talks Wednesday night, they were trying to institutionalize that power in a future Reagan administration. Unanswerable questions of consti-

tutional propriety pulled Reagan back from the brink. But the exercise demeaned the prestige of the Republican Party's two dominating figures. Reagan emerged looking disorganized and careless of the prerogatives of the office he seeks. Ford came over as relentlessly insensitive and perhaps vindictive about the man whose 1976 challenge he blames for losing him the presidency.

Two key figures in Ford's apparatus - Henry A. Kissinger and economist Alan Greenspan - asked for what was constitutionally impossible to give: operational control by Ford of "the national security portfolio," the domestic budget and the White House chief of staff. Although some Ford advisers felt Reagan had accepted this package, he never quite





Novak "They offered Ford the right to name the secretary of defense," one Ford insider told us, "but that wasn't enough." That it wasn't enough was perhaps less the judgment of Ford himself than of his close aide from White House days, Jack Marsh. It was Marsh, the lawyer inexorably pounding out an agreement, who talked about "segmenting" the presi-

But even if Ford was not aware of the letter of his negotiators' demands. they would not have squeezed the Reagan agents so remorselessly without encouragement and approval

from the former president.

Ford, who could hardly utter a favorable word about Reagan in his well-received speech to the convention Monday night, has harbored four years of resentment about him, spiced with general low regard. That could not be wiped out in four hours of

pressure-cooker talk. The operation culminated a process that has concerned Reagan's conservative supporters, who fear Ford Republicans want to undercut Reagan's tax-cutting and hational defense poli-

Bereft of experienced political talent since the sacking of John Sears as campaign manager on Feb. 26, Reagan has been taking aboard experienced and respected old Ford hands such as William Timmons and Stuart Spencer as key political operatives. There is no sign that Timmons was intimately involved in the Wednesday negotiations, and Spencer purposely kept himself out of these talks. But the role of Dr. Greenspan, representing Ford's interests after being named as Reagan's budget policy adviser, was ambiguous.

The prominent inclusion of Dr. Kissinger inflamed these conservative fears. Although there is no substantiation to reports that Ford wanted him back at the State Department in a Reagan-Ford administration. But for the man regarded by the right as a symbol of what was wrong with the Ford administration to be negotiating a delegation of Reagan's presidential powers was of questionable political

Even if none of this represented a Ford putsch, the idea of restructuring the presidency in a few hours of superheated convention climate was dubious. One Ford insider with business ties commented: "If General Steel thought of any such reorganization, they would do a two-year study by Booz Allen and Hamilton (management consultant firm) before de-

ciding anything." Talk of Reagan as board chairman and Ford as chief operating officer reflected a desire by Ford to win the fruits of victory he dared not seek on the bloody battlefields of primary

Walter Polovchak...seeks political asylum in U.S.

12-year-old seeks political asylum

CHICAGO (AP) - Ukrainian-born Walter Polovchak, who is 12 years old, says he does not want to return to the Soviet Union, even if it means never seeing his mother and father

Rather than go back, he is seeking political asylum in the United States. A judge is to decide later this month whether to place Walter in the custody of one of two aunts who live in this country or return him to his father.

"I would rather never again see my parents than leave Chicago," Walter says. "I want to stay here. I have new friends, a nice school, a bicycle I fixed myself, and I don't want to be sent back. Here is better than my coun-

"This is a free country. It is a good to go home." country. But I want to go home," Michael Polovchak, Walter's father, said Saturday through an interpreter. "Children should stay with their parents.

His comments echoed those of the Soviet embassy in Washington, where spokesman Valentin Kamenev said: 'Our position is that a 12-year-old boy

should not be able to tell his parents what he wants to do. He does what they say.'

Walter emigrated from the Ukraine to Chicago six months ago with his father, 42; his mother, Anna, 38; his sister, Natalie, 17; and 6-year-old

brother, Michael Jr. Last week, Walter learned that his father planned to return soon to the Soviet Union, so he and his sister moved out of the family's house and into an apartment with their cousin, Walter Polowczak, 24, a computer engineer.

Police found the boy Friday and took him to a district police station. But when his father tried to take Walter home, the police called the State Department, which issued a temporary order keeping the boy in the United States until a court hearing could be held.

An emergency hearing was held Saturday by Circuit Judge Joseph Mooney, who ordered Walter placed under the supervision of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services pending a final custody

The elder Polovchak appeared at the hearing without a lawyer or an interpreter and did not say anything until after the proceeding was over. Then he shouted, "They're kidnap-ping my boy!"

Julian E. Kulas, Walter's lawyer, said Soviet authorities have told Polovchak that because the two boys were on the couple's visa, both must accompany the parents or the family will not be allowed to return to the Ukraine.

Michael Jr. is too young to under-stand the situation and will be returning with his parents. Natalie, who entered the country with her own visa, has decided to stay in the United

"I am so scared for my brother," she said. "If he is forced to go back with my parents he will be punished there. He can have no good education or job and will be followed for the rest of his life for speaking out against the Soviet Union this way."



HOUSTON (AP) - It's a long way from a Houston ghetto to the cabin of a jet airliner, and Carolyn Shelton, who hasn't forgotten what it was like getting there, wants to help other young people over the obstacles she

So she spends a lot of time telling kids in big-city phettos that they can get out if they try, and she shows them a good example — herself. Today she is a veteran of 12 years as flight attendant for Continental Airlines and flies one of the carrier's prime routes, between Los Angeles and Australia.

She lectures at schools and runs self-improvement classes all over

Houston, and she works with employers in many cities around the country counseling their young minority employees on self-improvement.

Ms. Shelton, 32, was born in the poor black section of Houston, the oldest of nine children. Her mother was a maid, and when Carolyn wasn't in

Her work with elementary and high schools in Houston's poorer areas. consists mainly of lecturing groups of students on self-improvement. Does it help? She is convinced it does. How many? Ms. Shelton thinks that's beside the point.

"IF I CAN reach just one kid in an audience of 200, then I've done something worthwhile," she says, "and I know I reach a lot more than that."

One of the Houston newspapers ran an article on Ms. Shelton which caught the eye of McDonald's Corp. officials, who asked her to counsel minority employees of their franchises in ghetto areas. She has been doing that for several years.

Later, she and some of her students were filmed for a national television news show, which resulted in Ms. Shelton's developing a self-improvement curriculum for the Portland, Ore., school system, a program which is still being used.

What's next for the volunteer teacher? "I might do some more consulting work and I'm going to keep flying because I love the job. But one thing for sure, I'm going to continue working with the kids because that's the most important thing I can do.

"You have to remember that the things most people take for granted like basic grooming and knowing how to use a butter knife - are new for many ghetto kids. They have to learn that the way they're used to acting and looking often isn't acceptable in the outside world. I made sure my brothers and sisters knew how to act and they tell me I was kind of a bossy big sister sometimes...I guess I still

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - When it's time to pay their bills, I. J. and Charlotte Kraft pick up their pushbutton telephone, call a computer, and let it do the job.

The day is fast approaching when most Americans will be able to get their wages, buy their groceries and pay all their bills without ever handling cash or writing and receiving checks, computer industry leaders agree. Instead, they'll use their pushbutton telephones as computer termi-

The Krafts, retirees who live in Omaha but often go to a warmer climate in the winter, are pioneers among the more than 750,000 persons in this country now using the phone to let their fingers do the paying. Altogether, some 300 financial institutions are now offering some type of telephone bill-paying service.

Telephone bill-paying is nearly seven years old - but much of the

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) - In Taiwan a man cannot get married, divorced, buy a house, borrow money in fact, do just about anything - without his "chop," or personal seal.

Chop carving — the engraving of intricate Chinese characters on fine stone, ivory or jade - is an art in

Take Wang-wang Sun. In his 53 years as a master chop carver, Wang estimates he has engraved 170,-000 animated Chinese characters and cut more than 30,000 chops for government officials and dignitaries

The balding, sharp-eyed Wang, 77, however, says he carves "only for the best." Past clients, he boasts, include President Chiang Kai-shek and Vice President Shieh Tung-ming, among others.

Prices can be high, as much as 100,000 Taiwan dollars (almost \$2,300 U.S.) for a single seal. But Wang, in an interview, said it's not really the money that counts.

Wang, proud of being a fussy worker, says he has done some chops for free, but once turned down an offer of \$13,000 to do a chop because he didn't like the sound of the man's name.

"I have three conditions for doing a chop," he said. "I must like the person I'm doing it for. The name must be a good one, and the quality of the stone must be high.'

Everyone, from the president down to the humblest noodle vendor, owns at least one seal. Many own more than one, and each has a specific purpose.

Size, shape and material cover a wide range. Popular designs are chops designed as chickens, tree roots or bamboo, but always flattened on the bottom so that the owner can apply the device to vermillion ink that leaves an imprint of the person's name.

Since chops have the same legal validity as signatures, they are closely guarded and highly prized possessions. The custom originated in China thousands of years ago and is now practiced in many Asian countries.





Ancient town exhumed from grave beneath receding Lake Falcon

OLD GUERRERO, Texas (AP) -This 230-year-old town, regarded as the birthplace of modern civilization along the current Texas-Mexico border, has been resurrected from its watery grave by the drought.

For ranchers, farmers and just plain folks, the present drought offers precious few bright spots, with cattle dropping dead, crops burnt to a crisp and persons young and old seeking shelter from the relentless sun.

But as the Rio Grande slows to a trickle and the waters of Lake Falcon recede to a fraction of their usual depth, the Roman-like ruins and rubble of the once bustling border town again have emerged and provide photographers and history buffs a glimpse of a bygone era.

The old town was established in 1750, five years before Laredo became a town upstream. It is situated on the banks of the Salado River, a mile or two from the course of the Rio Grande.

For a century, Guerrero was the pre-eminent center of commerce on the border for an area that extended from the Gulf of Mexico to El Paso.

In its heyday, the town boasted a population of perhaps 10,000 permanent residents and formed the wellspring from which descended many families who now populate nearby Laredo — now regarded as the busiest commercial port of entry along the 1,950-mile border separating the United States and Mexico.

Guerrero led Laredo in every category until the early 1880s when two rail lines converged at Laredo and it eclipsed the older city as a center of

Oldtimers say this is not the first time Guerrero has been left high and dry by the lower lake levels. At least four times since Falcon Lake was built and swallowed the town in 1954, the plaza and church of Guerrero have re-emerged and the piles of stone rubble that surround the landmarks have been left to dry in the

Sadly for those who are enjoying the town's most recent resurrection, the periodic re-emergence of the ruins may prove the downfall of the onceproud old city, because the receding waters give vandals and treasure hunters a chance to do their worst.

Throughout the six to seven acres of ruins, the handiwork of scavengers is evident. Not satisfied with a mere souvenir of the city, the vandals usually take the best and most fragile of the artifacts.

Old lintel posts, cut from oak or mesquite dating from the Spanish conquest, have been snatched from their sockets above the doors and windows of the church facade. The keystones of the gracefully arched windows and passageways, hand carved from native stone and hand fitted to the arch, have been pulled from their niches, leaving a snaggletoothed reminder of the scavengers'

Two or three families still occupy a few of the buildings on the outskirts of the city, the part that stays above the water-line of Falcon Lake the year round. They cling to the old ways and are as much a part of the old settlement as the stones.

One family lives in a house that has been in continous habitation since it was built on he first day of April in 1871. The date is proudly written across a hand-hewn rafter of the house and is a source of pride for the present residents.

In time, the rains will come again and the lake again will embrace the ruins of Old Guerrero, and some folks in the area say perhaps that is best.

The death toll from the month-long hot weather continued to rise over the weekend, with at least 1,167 heat-related deaths reported by today, according to an unofficial tally compiled by The Associated Press.

Temperatures in North Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana were mostly in the high 80s and low 90s Sunday, welcome relief from the high 90s and 100s that predominated for weeks.

"I would say that for the most part, our heat wave is over with," said National Weather Service forecaster Bob Dietlein on conditions in Alabama. However, the National Weather Service in Georgia predicted a return to 100-plus readings, possibly by week's end.

The weather service forecast for the Southeast for today and Tuesday called for temperatures in the 80s and 90s with a chance of scattered showers. In the Northeast, it was a differ-



Effort to recover 'windfall' cash from Texaco to be announced

WASHINGTON - An effort to recover a purported \$373 million "windfall" from Texaco Inc. for consumers of natural gas will be announced today by Sen. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, and a coalition of unions and consumer and energy organizations.

They will ask the Federal Energy Regulatory Com-mission to modify a settlement that has let the oil company retain the windfall, which resulted from Texaco's unlawful diversion of 208 billion cubic feet of gas from public lands to its own use.

The diversion, a violation of the Natural Gas Act, occurred over an 11-year period and deprived interstate customers of the equivalent of a year's supply of gas for 1.7 million homes.

'Wrongdoers should not be allowed to profit from their own wrongdoing," Metzenbaum said. "But that is exactly what happened" under the settlement, which was initially approved in 1977 by the Federal Power Commission and made final in 1978 by FERC, its suc-

While Texaco was taking the gas from leased federal lands in offshore Louisiana for its refinery in Port Arthur, Texas, some consumers in many areas of the nation "were literally freezing because this gas was unavailable in the interestate market," Metzenbaum

The agencies ordered Texaco to "pay back" the diverted gas with replacement fuel from non-federal

lands, charging the affected interstate pipelines the going national rates.

The settlement became effective after Congress enacted a 1978 law sharply raising gas prices. As a result, Texaco was enabled to sell the "pay back" gas at prices several times higher than had prevailed in the

This produced the so-called windfall, which has been put by experts consulted by The Washington Post at \$373 million, but has been estimated by others at between \$300 million and \$400 million.

"FERC has not exhibited any inclination to do anything about it, so our only recourse is to petition to modify this settlement and seek some justice for consumers who have had to foot this bill," Metzenbaum

Under the coalition proposal, FERC would modify the settlement to lower gas bills for millions of consumers by providing the replacement 208 million cubic feet "at prices low enough to deprive Texaco of the profits resulting from its unlawful diverson . . .

The coalition includes the United Auto Workers, the United Steelworkers, the International Association of Machinists, the Service Employees International Union, the Citizen-Labor Energy Coalition, the Consumers Energy Council of America, Energy Action, Consumers Union, the Ohio Public Interest Campaign, the New York Sate Consumer Protection Board and the Office of Consumers' Counsel.

And leading the way for DADS was durable Susan Nolen, who claimed three victories — 1,500 freestyle, 100 backstroke and 200 individual medley — and was top point gainer with 71 in girls' 13-14.

Five other swimmers, including four from the Hurricanes - bagged a pair of events each and one pool record and two new West Texas standards were established. Also, there were seven reportable top

For the City of Midland Swim Team, third in the team race with 238 points, Andrea Freeman notched the team's second title of the meet with an 18:24.16 victory in the rugged girls' senior 1,500 freestyle. But the day really belonged to DADS. And Bill

Lavine, one of the team's coaches, liked what he saw. "I think I was pleased with the team as a whole," he said. "We pulled together a lot better today than we did Friday. I think the kids are happy and we look forward to doing this meet every year because there's more to swimming than winning a meet. I always bill this meet as a place to get good times and have a good

Certainly, the crew must've enjoyed the victory. But Lavine, in his third year with the team which won the 1978 Allison championship, said he wasn't exactly sleeping soundly — even before the meet began. "I had some apprehension," he said, "when I heard El Monte (California, the defending meet kingpins who didn't come) and the Hurricanes were going to be here. I heard the Hurricanes were going to bring a lot of people, but they didn't. Which was lucky for us, and I guess, unfortunate for them.

"After the first day or so," he continued, "I felt confident."

It was the other way around for COM coach John Jordan. "My kids swam well in the finals," he said. "I thought we swam real well the first two days and swam tired the last day. On the whole, we did a pretty

There was one point on which Jordan and Lavine agreed — the brand of competition at the meet.

"The first couple of places in each event were real solid," said Jordan, whose team goes to Odessa next weekend for an important pre-state meet tuneup. "But there was not quite the depth overall because of the numbers."

Other shoe never drops as Rutherford wins Twin 200

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) - Johnny Rutherford kept waiting for the other shoe to drop as he wheeled his yellow Jim Hall-prepared Chaparral to victory in a 200-mile championship car race at Michigan International

He won going away, turning laps at between 181 and 189 mph and leaving his closest and fiercest competitor, Bobby Unser, 13.25 seconds behind at

Despite leading 71 of the 100 laps on the high-banked two-mile oval, the 42-year-old Texan had more to sweat about than the 90-degree temperatures and saturating humidity Sun-

"The oil temperature gauge went berserk about halfway through the

race, and I just wasn't sure what was. going to happen," Rutherford said. 'Since the oil pressure didn't drop, I thought it was probably a bad

"But I had to give some thought to what would happen if that thing opened up and dumped oil on the rear tires. It was a little scary.'

The car's owner-designer, Midland's Jim Hall, and his crew remained unaware of the situation. Rutherford didn't want to worry

"I didn't tell them about it. I figured there wasn't anything they could do about it anyway, so why not just let them concentrate on the things they had to do to keep me near the front,' Rutherford said.

Rutherford, who won for the second

straight time and the fourth time in six Indy car races this season, proved over and over throughout the 200 miles that his ground-hugging "Yellow Submarine" was the fastest car on the track.

The lead changed hands several times on pit stops, with Unser - the winner of the other two champ car races this season - going on top when Rutherford made his final fuel stop on

Unser's teammate, Rick Mears, also moved ahead of Rutherford at that point, but both Roger Penske cars still had to pit for fuel.

They waited as long as they could. Unser finally came in on the 92nd lap and Mears, who led briefly, followed him in one lap later.

That left Rutherford ahead of Unser

by 9.5 seconds, but he quickly built that to an insurmountable margin.

There was a spectacularly violent accident early in the race. Tim Richmond, the Indy rookie of the year, veered up the first-turn banking and

The car split into three parts, with the engine flying across the track and into the infield. The 25-year-old Richmond casually stepped from the wreckage and walked away unhurt.

Rutherford averaged 148.515 mph as he won \$21,850. Unser took home \$16,150 for second place. Pancho Carter was third, followed by Mears and Gordon Johncock, one lap behind

Four records fall as Olympic Games begin

OLYMPICS - Four world records were set and one was tied as competition began in the XXII Summer Olympics, with the Soviet and East German teams dominating. The Soviet Union took the first medal of the Games when Aleksandr Melentev set a world record of 581 of a possible 600 targets in the free pistol event.

The East German women's medley relay swim team of Andrea Pollack, Rica Reinisch, Ute Geweniger and Caren Metschuck won the 4 x 100 meter gold medal in world record time of 4: 06.67, bettering their previous world mark of 4: 07.95.

Barbara Krause of East Germany set a world record in the 100-meter freestyle swimming semifinals with a time of 54.98 seconds, breaking her own mark of 55.41 set two years ago.

Soviet swimmer Sergei Fesenko won the gold medal in the men's 200-meter butterfly event. He was timed in 1:59.76. North Korean weightlifter Han Gyong Si set a world record in the snatch division of the 52-kilo class by lifting 113 kilos. The old mark was 112.5 kilos set by Alexandr Voronin of the Soviet Union. Si had to settle for a bronze medal because of total points, while Kanibek Osmonaliev of the Soviet Union took







Would you believe canoe pooling?

BAYTOWN, Texas (AP) — Richard Gillet has stopped putt-putting and started paddling.

"It's invigorating," said Gillet, who commutes via canoe to and from his job as head operator at Houston Lighting & Power Co.'s Cedar Bayou

"The exercise makes you feel refreshed and you save money - all at the same time.'

Gillet, 36, started his daily glide about three weeks ago, "when I was looking out over the bayou from the plant and I noticed that my house was just about half a mile away by water, but it was five miles by car."

"It seemed like such a waste," he said. Gillet says the trip — which requires about 10 minutes of actual paddling time and a 5-minute walk to and from the canoe — takes no

longer than it did on his motorcycle. He docks his canoe at a boat slip near his home on a small stream that feeds into the bayou. When he arrives at work, he nestles the canoe next

to a wooden walkway on HL&P property. The only traffic he sees during his trip is an occasional tugboat chugging up the bayou.

His daily routine is interrupted only when bad weather is predicted and he plans to continue canoing as long as the weather will allow. "I won't use the canoe when a bad thunderstorm is forecast or if it gets too cold. But I've known it to be 85 degrees here at Christmas time," Gil-

Although the canoe trips started out as daylight journeys, Gillet now paddles through the dark of night because he is working the "graveyard"

"I just bring some lights so the tugboats can see me," he says. His only problems have come from a couple of arguments with snakes over right-of-way and "Sunday water skiers who get a few beers under

their belt and think they're King Kong."
"And," he adds with a smile crossing his face, "I don't want to sound like Jimmy Carter, but I did see a rabbit swimming across the bayou once...though it didn't attack me."

Actors' unions strike; Talks continue

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Members of two actors' unions went on strike today as negotiators for the unions and for producers continued talks in hopes of settling a dispute that could shut down a major part panies from making movies anywhere in the world. of the nation's multimillion-dollar filmmaking in-

"We have no intention now of ending the talks, but things are going so slowly and so tediously that we decided to strike," said Kim Fellner, spokeswoman for the Screen Actors Guild. The American Federation of Television and Radio Artists went on strike with SAG.

Ed Prelock, a spokesman for the Association of Motion Picture and TV Producers, said representatives of major film companies, the three major television networks and independent producers also intended to keep negotiating despite the strike

On Sunday, Ms. Fellner said, "We are down to hard issues," but refused to enumerate them or if any progress was being made toward a new three-

A strike would close down production of all prime time TV shows - just now under way for the fall season - and would stop the major film com-

Ms. Fellner said a strike would not affect daytime TV programming such as soap operas and game shows or TV commercial production. News commentators, who are AFTRA members, would be allowed to cross picket lines to reach their jobs, she

Strike preparations began July 9, when 91 percent of SAG's members voted in favor of a strike. Some 60,000 actors, 30,000 of whom are members of both SAG and AFTRA, would join the walkout, she said.

Money was the major stumbling block during the talks, which began May 19, Ms. Fellner said Sunday. The two unions had asked a 40 percent increase in minimum scales and an increase in pension, health and welfare payments to establish dental and optical plans.

The unions for the first time also sought profit participation in films and television and a percentage of the producers' gross receipts from sup-

plemental markets such as pay TV and videocassette and videodisc shows. Under the old agreement, actors earned up to \$785

week, plus residuals for reruns and motion pictures broadcast on television.

The producers countered with an 8.4 percent scale increase in the first year and a percentage-of-the-gross formula for supplemental markets that the unions said would return far less than the 12 percent

amount the actors sought. Producers also wanted actors to be paid 80 percent of TV scale for original employment on supplemen-

tal market shows. Negotiations broke off June 30, the day the old three-year pact expired, with the contract extended indefinitely. Talks did not resume until July 17 and, during the hiatus, the unions voted the strike

SAG said the cost of living had risen by more than 35 percent in the past three years. In 1979, it said, 88.7 percent of union actors earned less than \$10,000 — 59

percent earning less than \$1,000. The last actors' strike occurred Dec. 19, 1978, through Feb. 7, 1979, when SAG struck TV commercial producers. Drivers' strike shuts down Post

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Post was shut down today in a wildcat strike by drivers who refused to deliver what was to be the first morning edition in the newspaper's 179-year history.

A spokesman for the newspaper, who asked to remain anonymous, said "some" drivers showed up outside the building at the beginning of their scheduled shifts, "but decided they weren't going to

A few thousand copies of the new edition were printed and ready to go, according to a spokesman, who said the newspaper had received no official comment from the union.

Union officials could not be reached for com-

The drivers, part of the Newspaper and Mail Deliverers Union, walked off the job in a dispute over new work schedules despite a decision Friday by arbitrator Hubert Hager and a temporary restraining order issued by U.S. District Judge William C. Conner.

The Post had filed suit "in excess of \$1 million" in damages against the union, saying the union had refused to handle the new editions. Hager ordered the drivers to abide by their contract and report to work so the new morning editions could be delivered. Conner issued a temporary restraining order supporting Hager's decision.

Eight other unions, representing Post employees, had agreed to the new work schedules required to publish the morning edition.

In a statement issued shortly after midnight, Publisher Rupert Murdoch said further editions of the newspaper would be printed "if and when the drivers end their illegal strike and obey the orders of arbitrator Hager and Judge Conner.

According to the statement, when the drivers refused to work they were told "the Post considered them to be on strike." Picket lines were set up around the Post building on South Street in lower

The surgeons planned to argue against accepting the resignation at a committee hearing today. The House of Delegates, the AMA's policy-making body, opened its five-day annual meeting here Sunday. More than 100 surgeons held an informal meeting Sunday afternoon to criticize the resignation of

their professional society and to map strategy to

The move threatens the 214,000-member AMA's attempt to unify and speak for organized medicine. Dr. John H. Dawson of Seattle, one of the leaders of the surgeons, said if the AMA could be prevented from formally accepting the resignation, the College of Surgeons would not have to go through a lengthy reapplication process if its leaders decide to rejoin. Officials of the 42,000-member college pulled the

organization out of the AMA's House of Delegates earlier this year in a policy dispute. Although the surgeons had only one vote in the House of Delegates, their influence went farther than that. Some 156 of the 558 delegates and alternates to the convention this year are fellows of the College of Surgeons, the surgeons said. Another nine sit on

the Board of Trustees or are former AMA officers. The House of Delegates, once composed mainly of doctors from the 50 state medical societies, in recent years has admitted nearly six dozen medical specialties - surgeons, radiologists, neurologists and so forth - as part of a program to broa

He's climbing out of debtor's world

By LOUISE COOK

NEW YORK (AP) - Five years ago, R.W. had a good job, a happy family life and a pocketful of credit

Then came the effects of recession. A business loss. Some bad investments. In the space of only a few months, R.W.'s world of credit collapsed. His debts added up to more than many people earn in a year. His creditors wanted their money. His wife talked about leaving.

"I was out of control," he recalled recently, sitting in his office at a Manhattan employment agency. To get out from under, he said, "I would have sold my soul to the devil."

R.W., who didn't want his name used, has paid off his debts. "We even have a savings account now," he bragged. He cleared his financial slate with the help of the

local Consumer Credit Counseling service, one of some 200 such non-profit groups operating under the umbrella of the National Foundation for Consumer Credit, 1819 H St. N.W., Washington, D.C., 20006. R.W., 38, is a native New Yorker. After graduation

from college in 1963, he served in the military and worked for a manufacturer before forming an employment agency with a partner.

His parents, he said, "were not poor, but we

certainly did not have a lot of money." Financial success was important and it seemed easy. "I was making \$32,000 a year when I was 28," R.W. said. Credit also seemed easy. "I was getting credit cards mailed to me unsolicited."

By 1975, however, the recession had hurt the employment business. R.W.'s partner used company money to pay gambling debts. And R.W. lost money in the stock market. "All my savings," he

"I really started to have to scramble to pay my bills...I was so far behind, my debt was a solid, five-figure debt

When business had been good, R.W. lived well. "I was never really budget conscious. I was kind of living from month to month." During slow periods, he borrowed. If you think there's a good month coming, he said, "you don't reduce your spending. You use credit cards."

After his business failed, R.W. said, "there was a period when I was making zero." He finally found another job with a base salary of \$12,000, but it





Dear Dr. Solomon: I was recently hospitalized for some diagnostic tests that were supposed to take only a couple of days. However, I was obliged to remain three days longer taken to another hospital for a CAT scan. Can you explain what is so important about the CAT scan that I had to incur the cost of three additional days of hospitalization? - Mr.

Dear Mr. I.: The computed axial tomography (CAT) scan is a relatively new diagnostic tool which, in some cases, cannot be duplicated. For example, Dr. Stanley S. Siegelman, director of diagnostic radiology at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, says it is the single most effective way of evaluating the pancreas. And Dr. William H. suns, have been under strong Mosberg, chairman of neurosurgery at Maryland General Hospital, maintains that a CAT scan should be done whenever neurosurgery is planned for patients with acute head injuries, fuel-efficient, small-model vehicles brain tumors or brain and lung cancer metasttasis.

Since not all hospitals in every community have scanners, it often becomes necessary for one facility to refer patients to another. consumption of 70 million tons of aluminum, Parker said. He said the authority produces six million tons of fly ash wastes from its 12 coal-burning power plants.

The recovery process uses a technology developed by Mineral Gas Co. of Memphis to recover about 50 percent of the silicon and 20 percent each of iron and aluminum composing the fly ash wastes.

The Lawrenceburg plant will provide \$61,000 to buy and install the equipment, with Memphis State University operating the plant and monitoring the costs of the \$300,000 project.

Parker said the Lawrenceburg plant would be able to process about 24 tons of coal ash per day, reducing the nation's dependence on foreign bauxite for its aluminum production and freeing land now committed for fly ash disposal.





Indefinite layoffs among auto workers fall slightly

DETROIT (AP) — Indefinite layoffs among autoworkers are down slightly, according to this week's reports from the five major auto-

The automakers said Thursday they had 246,950 employees at home without a recall date, down from 249,-250 last week. Comparisons are difficult, however, because statistics on layoffs at General Motors Corp. refer to the upcoming week while those of the others refer to the current week.

No count of temporary layoffs was possible because of changeovers to 1981 models. GM, with nine U.S. assembly lines being rearranged next week, and Ford Motor Co., with four, both said they did not consider those employees laid off.

GM said it had 138,000 indefinite layoffs and Ford said it had 65,500. Both figures were unchanged from

layoffs fell from 43,000 last week to 40,700. Chrysler will have 18,600 workers temporarily idle, most of those in five assembly plants closed for the model change.

An unspecified number of workers will be recalled this week at the Jefferson Avenue plant in Detroit to prepare for the start of 1981 production on July 28, Chrysler said. American Motors Corp., ranked No.






