## Pentagon pushing mobilization plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - While youths are registering for a possible
wartime draft, ,he Pentagon is moving to expand voluntary enlistments in a reserve manpower pool that would be tapped for combat strength
early in a crisis. If it succeeeds, the plan would provide what the military calls "pre-
trained" men to bring Army regular, National Guard and resesrve units to full wartime strength and to regular, National Guard and reserve units to in the first months of fighting.
