Abscam confused

NEW YORK (AP) — Television recordings used by the FBI in its Abscam investigation disclosed Friday that there was confusion both among federal agents and their targets when an agent tried to bribe an individual whom he thought was a high-ranking U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service official.

The tapes, played in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn, showed FBI undercover agent Anthony Amoroso, who posed as bagman for a fictitious Arab sheik, allegedly making a \$50,000 payoff to the defendants in return for help on immigration matters.

The prosecution claimed that Ellis Cook, then a law partner with two of the defendants, went to the meeting posing as an immigration official he thought was named Mario Nopo.

The recordings showed, however, that Amoroso thought he was going to make the payoff to a deputy Immigration and Naturalization Service commissioner named Mario Moto.

In reality, the name the two men were trying to remember is Mario Noto, now a retired immigration official.

New bomber due

WASHINGTON (AP) — Having canceled the B-1 bomber, the Carter administration has plans for developing an advanced bomber to replace the aging B-52s and better penetrate increasingly tough Soviet air defenses in the 1990s.

A compromise weapons bill awaiting Senate and House action would authorize \$375 million next fiscal year to decide technological approaches to be taken in the project.

But senior Pentagon officials already have indicated that they are inclined to use technology which they believe would enable the new bomber to survive the Soviets' future most sophisticated air defenses.

More executions

Iranian firing squads Friday shot 18 more alleged conspirators in a foiled plot to overthrow Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's regime, Tehran Radio reported, bringing to 71 the number sent to their deaths in retribution for the coup attempt.

Tehran Radio, in a broadcast monitored in London, said 15 alleged anti-government plotters executed at dawn Friday were all soldiers and included a retired army officer, Lt. Gen. Said Mahdiyoun.

It said a special revolutionary court in Esfahan sentenced three others to death for participating in the coup attempt and they were executed Friday afternoon.

Writer persists

DALLAS (AP) — A British author leading the effort to exhume the body of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald says he won't go home until he gets what he came for — regardless of the latest rebuff.

Oswald's brother, Robert Oswald of Wichita Falls, was granted a last-minute temporary restraining order against the exhumation Thursday afternoon, shortly after British author Michael Eddowes and his lawyer announced they had the legal authority to disinter the body.

"I'm not leaving ... we are going to fight this thing until we die if necessary," said Eddowes, who says an autopsy would prove the body in Oswald's grave is that of a Russian spy.

"I know, I know," he emphasized, "that a Russian spy killed your president and I'm going to prove it."

Korea's Choi resigns

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — President Choi Kyu-hah announced his resignation Saturday in favor of "new leadership," clearing the way for the assumption of the presidency by military strongman Gen. Chun Doo-hwan.

Choi said in a nationally televised announcement that the job of his "crisis management" administration, begun after the assassination of President Park Chung-hee last Oct. 26, had been completed.

"I intend to put an end to our unhappy political history by establishing the precedent of peaceful transfer of power and to eliminate the climate of mutual distrust by practicing politics of responsibility," he said.

Under the constitution, Acting Prime Minister Park Choong-hoon immediately became acting president, but official sources said he will hold office only until the

electoral college can meet to choose Chun — probably before the end of this month.

While Choi was speaking, South Korea's military forces were ordered on special alert to guard against "possible North Korean provocations" during the government changes, Defense Minister Choo Young-bok announced. A spokesman for the U.S. Embassy said no change was made in the readiness status of the 40,000 American servicemen in South Korea.

In Washington, U.S. officials said Chun's formal selection as president was expected next week, perhaps as early as Monday. The officials, who asked not to be named, said a statement cleared by the White House and Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie would be released Saturday.

Family is falsely notified of son's death

Air Force investigating apparent cruel hoax

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Air Force Friday opened an investigation into a cruel hoax in which a Pennsylvania family was falsely notified their airman son was dead.

Joe McNally, official spokesman at Lackland Air Force Base, said it was at least the third time within two years that a family had been put through the nightmare of believing a son was dead.

"We're doing what we can to identify who and how it's being done. As you can imagine, it's pretty difficult to track an anonymous phone caller," McNally said.

McNally said the Office of Special Investigation was looking into the matter and that OSI agents would seek help from civilian authorities if it were needed.

In the latest incident, the parents of John L. Amirult, 18, of Susquehanna, Pa., arranged for his funeral and placed an obituary in his hometown newspaper before the airman telephoned them from Lowry Air Force Base at Denver, Colo., on Thursday.

The airman's father, Peter Amirult, said he and his wife received a telephone call from a man identify-

ing himself as Lt. Johnson from Lackland about 11:15 p.m. Wednesday night.

"He said John had been seriously injured in a truck accident, that he had ruptured his spleen and had a lot of other injuries," the elder Amirult said. He said the same man called back about midnight and said the airman had died.

The father, who said he suffers from diabetes and a heart condition, said he arranged with the caller to be flown to San Antonio as soon as the

Air Force could send him flight tickets.

"That's somebody's idea of a cruel joke," Amirult said.

The family had contacted a local funeral home to make arrangements for burial and placed an obituary notice in the Evening Press in Binghamton, N.Y., just across the state border from Susquehanna. The death notice ran in the paper's first edition before the hoax was discovered.

John Amirult joined the Air Force two months ago after graduating from high school. He completed basic

training at Lackland and left for Lowry Air Force Base early Thursday.

The hoax was uncovered by a relative of the family, Sgt. Charles E. Noyes of Gunter Air Force Base, Montgomery, Ala.

Noyes, told by members of the family of Amirult's death, said he decided to check the report because he had heard of three false death reports from Lackland in the past. He telephoned Lowry and found Amirult there and Amirult telephoned his family about 11 a.m. Thursday.

Inflation rate turns upward, officials say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reversing four months of declining inflation, food prices soared in July and led a surge in wholesale prices that was double the June rate, the government reported Friday.

Wholesale prices for finished goods increased by 1.7 percent in July — the largest boost since November 1974. A full year's increase at that rate would result in inflation at the wholesale (producer) level of 22 percent, more than twice the 10 percent rate recorded in June.

The Labor Department blamed most of the July inflation on a 3.8 percent increase in food prices, due chiefly to one of the century's worst heat waves. Poultry prices jumped 23.5 percent as millions of chickens were killed by the heat.

"When you eliminate the zigs and zags, this report is perfectly consistent with our view that the best we can hope for in the next couple years is inflation of 10 percent," said Lawrence Chimerine, chief economist for Chase Econometrics.

The Federal Reserve Board, meanwhile, issued a second report, which showed some improvement in the recession that has gripped the U.S. economy since February. Industrial production fell in July for the sixth straight month — but the decline was not nearly as sharp as in the second quarter.

Output of the nation's mines and factories tumbled by 1.6 percent during the month, compared with a 2.4 percent average in April, May and June. That left production 9.0 percent below the figure at the start of the year and 9.2 percent under the July 1979 level.

The Federal Reserve reported a 2.1 percent curtailment in production of materials used to manufacture fin-

ished products. The 1.1 percent decline in output of consumer goods in July was about the same in June but a considerable improvement over the previous two months.

The report attributed that improvement chiefly to a 9.0 percent increase in production of automobile assemblies — resulting in an annual rate of 6.4 million units. The output of durable consumer goods (those with expected lives of more than three years) still was down 18.6 percent from a year earlier.

Chimerine, the private analyst, said the figures are evidence that underlying conditions in the economy are improving, although he forecasts at least another three or four months of sluggishness. "But the bulk of the decline is over," he added.

Another economist, Allen Sinal of Data Resources, Inc., viewed Friday's inflation report as only a temporary spur, due mainly to weather-induced increases in food prices.

"The overall backdrop for inflation, because consumer demand is down so (much) due to the recession, is favorable," Sinal said.

But one element of the Producer Price Index indicated still more inflation in food prices is likely. Food prices at the crude (unprocessed) stage — wheat, for example — skyrocketed by 9 percent in July. When that wheat is milled into flour and later turned into bread, higher food prices are likely.

The Producer Price Index is watched closely by the government because increases at that level can be expected to translate eventually into higher consumer prices. The Consumer Price Index has slowed from the 18.1 percent pace of the first quarter of 1980 to 14.8 percent for the first half of the year.

Brinks employee takes \$1.85 million

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A Brink's employee made off \$1.85 million in cash Friday after taking an armored truck during a routine cash pickup at San Francisco International Airport and hijacking a car, police said.

The theft surpassed the amount taken in the famous 1950 Brinks robbery at Boston, and it appeared to be the second-largest robbery in the nation's history, after a \$5 million robbery in New York in 1978.

"One of our employees seized upon an opportunity to remove a truck away from the surveillance of other crew members," said Robert Haller, vice president of operations for Brink's Inc.

Agents said the loot was Federal Reserve Bank funds from Honolulu.

The FBI said George Manuel Bosque, 25, a guard on the truck, was being sought in connection with the theft. Authorities said he acted alone in the heist.

Although Bosque was still at large, charges of bank robbery and theft from an interstate shipment were filed against him and U.S. Magistrate Richard Goldsmith set bail at \$3 million.

Authorities originally reported only that more than \$1 million was missing, but later raised the amount to \$1.85 million.

Bosque had been employed by Brink's three to four years, Haller said.

"It went down sometime after 7 a.m. He dropped his partner off to make a pickup and took the truck," said Sgt. Jeff Boyd of the San Mateo County Sheriff's Department.

The truck was abandoned at the nearby San Francisco Airport Hilton. Boyd said a man with a gun accosted a hotel maid, Pushpa Lal of San Mateo, who was just arriving for work, transferred two large pouches stuffed with cash to her car and fled south.

Mrs. Lal's husband, Michael, said his 34-year-old wife was "very much upset" by the incident.

"The man wanted to take her in the car. She just managed to escape by opening the door and jumping out of the car when it was moving," he said, adding that she was bruised and shaken. She declined to talk with reporters.

The car was later located at Serramonte Shopping Center in Daly City a short distance north of the airport. The FBI said it was looking for a tan 1971 Oldsmobile Cutlass, a car that Bosque had earlier been driving.

Robert Cates, chief of security for the hotel, said he called the FBI and other authorities after some of his security men found the gray truck parked in the lot about 7:30 a.m.

"Brink's trucks don't park every day in our lot," Cates said. "The truck was entirely locked up."

In 1976, a Brink's guard took about \$400,000 from an armored truck here and went on an 11-month spending spree. Richard Rees vanished in February 1976 and was captured almost a year later by the FBI southeast of Santa Fe, N.M. He pleaded guilty to the theft.

In Boston's famous Brink's heist of January 1950, a well-trained gang of hoods engineered the theft of \$1.22 million — about \$100,000 each.

Demo convention outpulls GOP in number of viewers

NEW YORK (AP) — An estimated 90 million to 95 million viewers saw all or part of the networks' four-day coverage of the Democratic National Convention, NBC's research department said Friday. That would compare with an audience for the Republican National Convention, broadcast from Detroit July 14-17, of 83.7 million. Network prime-time coverage of the final session of the Democratic meeting Thursday attracted about 40

percent of the audience in Chicago and Los Angeles, while just a third of the viewers in New York City watched the political programming, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed. About 42 percent of the viewers in Los Angeles watched one of the three networks between 9 and 11 p.m. EDT, while 39 percent of the viewers tuned in for the convention 8-11 p.m. EDT in Chicago and 33 percent saw network coverage in the same period in New York.

Carter states he has 'no doubt'

NEW YORK (AP) — President Carter, predicting that his political fortunes have "turned the corner," left here Friday expressing confidence that Democrats will unite against Ronald Reagan and declaring that he has "no doubt whatsoever" of winning in November.

Flying off to begin a vacation at the presidential retreat at Camp David, Md., Carter declared himself "underestimated" as a candidate and unfazed by the apparent coolness of his one-time rival, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass.

He said Kennedy's appearance Thursday night on the convention platform was a "gracious" and much appreciated gesture.

"I thought it was a very gracious thing for him to come," Carter told reporters after touring an exhibition of the works of Pablo Picasso at the Museum of Modern Art.

Although the Massachusetts senator joined Carter on the podium in Madison Square Garden Thursday night, his appearance was perfunctory and his demeanor restrained.

Carter conceded that the convention had a "rocky" beginning, but he said he detected a "steady buildup of unity" during the week.

"My belief is that it was a major step forward," he said of Kennedy's appearance.

The president began today with a conciliatory breakfast meeting with some 300 black convention delegates before touring the Picasso exhibition.

Carter received a rousing reception from his black audience as he said: "I have always been underestimated as a candidate. I have a secret weapon, and that is the black people of this great country, who know they have a friend in Jimmy Carter."

Later in the morning, at his last stop before leaving New York for his Camp David, Md., retreat, the president spoke to the Democratic National Committee and reiterated his earlier comment about the party's growing unity.

Carter's record still the issue, GOP says

Ronald Reagan may have been cast as the guy in the black hat during the Democratic National Convention but he and his strategists are convinced that it will not be possible for Democrats to blame him for the nation's problems.

"They went to a lot of trouble to talk about me for four days, but the issue is still the Carter record," the Republican presidential candidate said before returning to Los Angeles from his Santa Barbara ranch.

Reagan spent Democratic convention week relaxing, horseback riding, writing speeches and watching the Democrats on television.

Reagan was, in fact, a centerpiece of that convention, vilified in acceptance speeches by President Carter and Vice President Mondale as, in effect, a warmonger with sympathy only for the white, the male and the affluent. He was also the villain in the early-week speeches by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy and Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz.

Carter aides say they will attempt to make Reagan the central issue of the campaign and Richard Moe, Mondale's chief of staff, said Friday "this is going to be a very heated campaign."

After Carter's Thursday night acceptance speech, top Reagan aides ridiculed the president's strategy as a smoke-screen designed to deflect attention from Carter's record in office.

"It's kind of unfortunate when a president has to make the public not look at his record," said Edwin Meese, Reagan's chief of staff.

Meese said of Carter's allegation that Reagan's tax cut proposal would benefit only the rich: "It's not a program for the rich. It's a program for the middle class."

Lee Atwater, Reagan's southern political director, predicted Carter would run "an unprecedented negative campaign," but he said it would fail, even on the president's home turf.

Odessa connection in extortion try

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. (AP) — A former business agent for a Huntington laborers local union and a Kentucky man have been indicted in connection with an alleged \$200,000 embezzlement scheme that spread from Kentucky to Odessa, Tex.

Joe Frye of Huntington, the former business agent, was charged with 11 counts of extortion, embezzlement and conspiracy, according to court records. He recently retired as business agent for Local 521, the United Association of Journeymen and Apprentices of the Plumbing and Pipe Fitting Industry of the United States and Canada.

Frye is accused of falsifying experience records on applica-

tions in return for payment. The laborers allegedly used the falsified records to obtain membership in the union's locals at Huntington and at the Texas cities of El Paso and Odessa.

Thomas Richards of Rush, Ky., was charged with conspiracy in the alleged scheme.

They were indicted Thursday by a federal grand jury at Huntington. The indictment charges that during 1977 and 1978, Frye received about \$200,000 in illegal payments through extortion from laborers trying to obtain union membership.

Richards is charged with delivering \$250,000 worth of the illegal payments to Frye.

Expert says danger concealed by FAA

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An air traffic controllers union official accused the Federal Aviation Administration on Friday of "systematically concealing" the dangers of computer breakdowns.

Howard Johannsen, president of the Professional Airways Systems Specialists Union, also told a three-member panel of the House Government Activities and Transportation Subcommittee that he supports "amnesty" for computer analysts so they "can report (problems) without harassment."

The hearings come in response to a series of computer failures and near collisions between planes in the San Francisco Bay area this summer, the most recent involving three aircraft over Salinas.

"I've seen massive numbers of outages go unreported... If there are delays of over 20 minutes, they are often reported as 'scheduled maintenance,'" Johannsen said.

The members of Johannsen's group service the FAA's radar computer network, including the \$200 million regional center in Fremont that monitors air traffic over Northern California, parts of Nevada and the Pacific.

Subcommittee chairman Rep. John Burton, D-Calif., said "primary computers are malfunctioning all over the country."

Burton has criticized failures at the Fremont computer system, calling it "like Old Faithful erupting every week on the week." He said computer failures have occurred with "greater regularity than we would like" at the country's 20 regional traffic control centers.

Another speaker, air traffic technician Joe Divine, said "10 percent to 15 percent of the time, something is done to confound the reports."

Besides air traffic controllers and computer specialists, pilots and federal flight officials are scheduled to testify during the two days of hearings that began Friday.

Deaths up

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas traffic deaths and fatal accidents are running four percent ahead of last year, the Department of Public Safety reported Friday.

DPS statisticians said there have been 2,468 traffic deaths this year compared to 2,384 in 1979. There have been 2,145 accidents in which deaths occurred, compared to 2,065 last year.

Mexican volcano takes back seat

SAN JUAN ANGAHUAN, Mexico (AP) — While Mount St. Helens simmers in southwest Washington, Paricutin sleeps in the pine-covered western Mexican mountains as a not-too-popular tourist attraction.

Paricutin, before it was upstaged by Mount St. Helens, was the most-recent North American volcano, having erupted in 1943.

But in contrast to ancient Mount St. Helens, which has had numerous eruptions, Paricutin started from scratch when lava began slopping from a hole in a cornfield, sending thousands fleeing before the molten rock.

Two villages were covered by the lava, but none of the inhabitants, mostly Tarascan Indians, was killed.

The only remnant of civilization remaining in the sea of now-cooled molten rock is part of the stone church of the now-buried village of Paricutin.

For the hardy few who can't live without a trip to

Paricutin, either a bus south from Guadalajara or train or bus west from Mexico City will get them to the city of Uruapan. Either way, you get a view of some of the prettiest Mexican timber country as the road, more than a mile high, winds its way through the mountains.

From there, either a second-class bus or a cab will cross the last 21 miles, half of it by dirt road, to this Indian village. From there, travelers must journey by trail to either the volcano or the buried church.

In the village of San Juan Angahuan, the arrival of a taxicab brings a couple of dozen men charging down the dusty dirt roads, leading horses they hope to rent to the tourists.

"Es mejor, es mejor (he is better)," each of the handlers shouts as the press of men and sweaty horses all but pin the hapless tourist to the cab. The luckless ones mutter to themselves in Tarascan, the language of the village, as they lead the beasts away to await the next of the somewhat infrequent tourists.

By American standards, the horses look impossibly small but the wiry, gentle mounts haul tourists up the mountain road without trouble.

One hundred pesos (about \$4.40) will get you a horse to the lava-covered village and back, a trip of two hours for the tourist who pauses to prowl the ruins and rest a bit.

TB proving health problem for Indochinese refugees

ATLANTA (AP) — A study of nearly 100,000 Indochinese refugees entering the United States in 1979 found 920 with tuberculosis, indicating TB is "an important health problem" among the refugees, the national Center for Disease Control said Friday.

The CDC said it found one refugee who died of tuberculosis. The disease was more common among refugees from Cambodia, who had a rate of 1,531 cases per 100,000 people, the CDC said in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report. The rate for Vietnamese was 1,068 per 100,000 and for Laotians was 412 per 100,000.


The CDC said the risk of developing TB is 40 to 110 times higher for Indochinese refugees than for other residents of the United States, although the risk varies according to age. Refugees aged 65 and older have the greatest chance of developing the disease.

Indochinese refugees accounted for only 3 percent to 4 percent of the new TB cases reported in this country last year, but the concentration was greater in some areas than in others, the CDC said.

In Minnesota, for example, refugees accounted for about 27 percent of the cases added to TB registers in 1979. In St. Paul alone, refugees accounted for 57 percent of the new cases.

Other states where refugees made up a large portion of new TB cases included: Nevada, 26 percent; Colorado, 23 percent; Washington, 18 percent; Kansas, 16 percent; Utah, 14 percent; Oregon, 11 percent, and California, 10 percent.

The CDC said California reported 320, or 35 percent, of the 920 TB cases found among Indochinese refugees last year.

Resistant VD cases reported

ATLANTA (AP) — Some cases of gonorrhea resistant to penicillin have been reported in Albuquerque, N.M., and San Diego, the national Center for Disease Control said Friday.

Five cases of the disease occurred at Albuquerque from April 21 through May 15 and four cases occurred at San Diego from July 1979 through March 1980, the center said in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report.

Each outbreak is believed to have been caused by someone who had been to the Far East, the center said.

Penicillin-resistant gonorrhea has been increasing in the United States as well as other parts of the world in the past few years, the center said. The disease has been reported in about half the states.

Patients developing penicillin-resistant gonorrhea should be treated with tetracycline hydrochloride, the center said.

Other forms of gonorrhea have shown a slight decline in the United States through Aug. 9, with 593,743 cases reported, compared with 595,812 cases for the comparable period in 1979, the center said.

Actress takes new role as successful sculptor

NEW YORK (AP)—Actress Patricia Peardon's career as a professional sculptor was launched when a friend opened her refrigerator door. The friend was Peggy Cass, the comedienne.

"Peggy was over for lunch and saw the wax figures I kept in my refrigerator," Miss Peardon recalled in an interview.

"One in particular — depicting a little girl whose kite is caught in a tree — especially appealed to Peggy, and she asked if it was for sale."

"So I sold my first piece right out of the refrigerator, with Peggy starting the whole ball rolling."

The next step for the artist was Tiffany's windows. The former Broadway star was on her way to deliver the sculpture to Miss Cass but stopped off for a costume fitting for a Shakespearean role.

When Miss Peardon emerged from the fitting room, several people were admiring her bronze-finished work of art, titled "In Pursuit of Happiness."

One of them later suggested to Tiffany's that her works would complement its window displays.

"I was absolutely shocked when they told me they wanted to use them," Miss Peardon says. "I couldn't believe it. That really turned my life upside down."

"If you can imagine that for the first time the public is seeing your work, it's in Tiffany's windows! It really was unbelievable."

After that, there were exhibitions in art galleries and museums in New York and other cities. Among those who have acquired her works are Ethel Merman, Louis Luntz, actress Betsy Palmer, playwright-director Reginald Denham and the late art-book publisher Harry Abrams.

Miss Peardon began her acting career in what has been referred to as the "Golden Days of Radio," performing with such stars as Agnes Moorehead and Orson Welles.

"In one production of 'Uncle Tom's Cabin,'" she says, "I was Little Eva while Orson played Simon Legree. Those were marvelous, marvelous times."

Her first major stage appearance was the title role in "Junior Miss," which had a 2 1/2-year run on Broadway, then toured the United States and went on to Europe for performances before thousands of Allied troops.

She returned to Broadway and played the ingenue in the double Tony Award winner, "The Desperate Hours." Several other Broadway roles followed.

Then came several one-woman shows based on the lives and works of such personalities as Marie Antoinette and Louisa May Alcott.

"After doing these all over the country for the next five years, I felt I'd really had my say on stage," says Miss Peardon. "Meantime, I was having exhibitions of my sculptures, and my two daughters were growing up and going off to school."

"I now envision sculpturing as something I'll do for the rest of my life."

Neither of her daughters appears likely to follow in Miss Peardon's footsteps on stage. Anne, 22, is studying nursing at the University of New Mexico; Christine, 32, graduated with top honors from Brandeis and became a film editor.

Miss Peardon doesn't have a very good opinion of what Broadway is up to nowadays. She explains she objects strongly to obscenity on stage and believes dramatic theater is suffering because of it.

Being both an actress and a sculptor doesn't strike Miss Peardon as creating any particular conflict. To underscore her point, she recalls what playwright-director-producer George Abbott once told her.

"George said every actor should have something he could put his heart and soul into. He said performers, in order to do what they are doing, have to have a certain amount of vitality and energy, and — one hopes — intelligence. When they're not acting, they still have all those things with no place to put them."

Miss Peardon says this can be very frustrating, "which is why I think some performers at times become unhappy with their lives."

"Having another outlet can be very satisfying. It's a tremendous plus."

Retreads International: Over 60 and burning up the roads

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Something about white-haired, 61-year-old Ona House makes you think twice about classifying her as a little old lady.

Maybe it's the "Broken Bones Club" patch on her jeans. Or her biker boots. Or her 850-cc black Moto Guzzi motorcycle.

Though the accident that earned her the patch means she has to get around with a cane, Ona can't wait until her husband, Bob, 55, retires in seven years so they can devote more time to their passion — big bikes and the open road.

The Houses are leaders

of Retreads International, a motorcycle club exclusively for people over 40. This week, 400 club members are in Salt Lake City for their annual convention — a week of parties, road rallies, tours and jawing about bikes.

In the hotel parking lot are thousands of dollars worth of "full dress" Harley-Davidsons, Guzzis, Yamahas, Hondas and Suzukis. Most are huge — 800-cc to 1,100-cc engines — and sport custom paint jobs, windscreens, saddlebags, CB radios, tape decks, and even television.

Members swap yarns about roads and campgrounds and joke about how much their children worry about them. And they indulge in a Retread tradition — telling other members what lousy bikes they bought.

"That's a part of it," said Kathy Davis, Retreads' Utah state director. "You have to run down the other guy's bike."

Club rules are simple. There are no clubhouses, no uniforms, no dues. Members don't even have to own a bike — all they need is to like them and be over 40.

It also helps to like a party. Mrs. House said there's usually a Retread rally or tour every weekend. Scheduled for the convention are five rides, dinners, dances and a parade.

Kathy's husband, Sperry Davis, said most Retreads are in their mid-50s, but some are in their early 80s. A club legend, Julius Kagel, rode until he was killed in a cycle accident at age 87.

"He went the way he wanted to go," said Mrs. House, who broke her leg in an accident last year. The Houses never owned a bike before they reached middle age.

"I always wanted a motorcycle, but when I was raising kids I couldn't afford one," he said.

Davis, 52, began riding seven years ago because "my future wife rode a motorcycle and if I wanted to be a future husband, I had better, too."

Although a motorcycle and accessories can run \$10,000, Davis said high gas prices have more people considering them as recreation vehicles as they approach retirement. In the club's 10-year history, it's worldwide membership has grown to about 15,000.

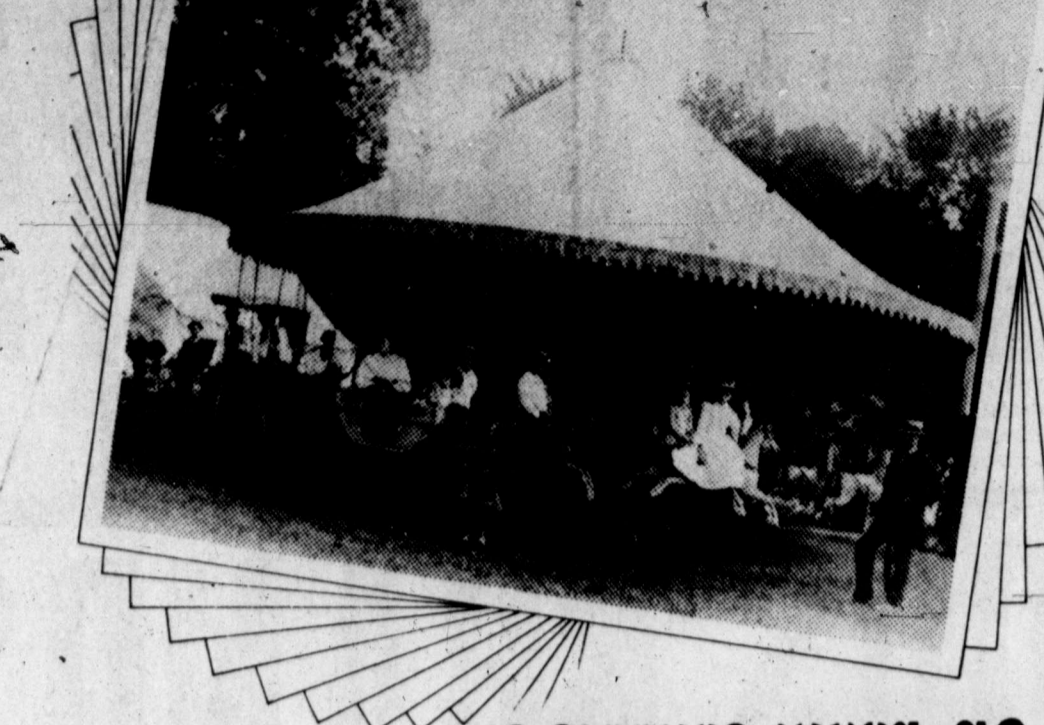

Lutheran says seamen fine family men

By PATRICK CONNOLLY Associated Press Writer SEATTLE (AP) Landlubbers who think seamen are "rowdies and roughnecks" don't know a batten from a bilge pump, says a Lutheran minister whose church is the waterfront. "I'm dealing with some of the finest, most upright family men I've ever met," says the Rev. Norris Stoa, who talks with hundreds of seamen a month. "Many of them wouldn't be at sea if they could find jobs at home that would feed their families and educate their children."

distributed. Families far away are prayed for. He admiringly views countless children's photographs, which crew members pull from their wallets. He eats lunch elbow-to-elbow with the seamen, trying not to kibitz at a card game. Stoa's brown 12-passenger van is always ready on the dock to whisk seamen downtown for a tuor, a movie, or to second-hand stores, where he says crews blow more money than at bars. "The crews ask to go to Goodwill or the Salvation Army thrift store," says Stoa. But officers, who have more money, "want to go to Penney's or Sears."

and Concordia colleges in Minnesota and worked as a minister in Parshall, N.D., and Morris, Ill., before getting a church in downtown Seattle. Six years ago, he was asked to take over the Seamen's Center. "I was excited," he says. "I looked on it as the chance of a lifetime to be kind to all these people and to share the love of God with them. The Christian church sends missionaries all over the earth, but the Lord has sent Moslems, Hindus, Buddhists, Zoroastrians, atheists to me." Stoa is part of the waterfront scene, whether he's wheeling his big van under a maze of viaducts or bolting up a gangplank with a briefcase full of Bible tracts. Ogden Fraser from Japan. On Sundays, Stoa hauls seamen around to churches of their choice. Congregations turn in surprise as foreign worshippers slide, nodding and smiling, into pews. Sunday nights, students from the Lutheran Bible School at Issaquah, Wash., help sailors sharpen their pool and table tennis at the Seamen's Center. Stoa has trouble getting aboard Soviet ships because the U.S.S.R. is officially atheist. He stands on the dock, a bundle of Russian-language Bible readings under his arm, patiently explaining to a ship's officer, "I read what your master, Lenin, wrote. Now you read what my master, Jesus, wrote." Sometimes that line works, but usually it doesn't. "Homesickness is the biggest illness among seamen," says Stoa. "Regardless of their religion, I deal with them in kindness, love and helpfulness. I'm their friend. That's what they need."

First woman chaplain rides in patrol car

By LAURINDA KEYS Associated Press Writer LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Rev. Sheila Banta has been riding around at night in police patrol cars. She's the Los Angeles Police Department's first woman chaplain, but told her division commander: "If you want me because I'm a woman, forget it." The minister of the Unity Church of North Hollywood and Burbank is also the first Unity minister to participate in the program. She said the division commander invited her to take the job after he heard her give a speech "and liked what I said. He said it was what they were looking for, a positive approach to life." She says she was warned when she took the job that she might face resentment. It never came. Her secret of success: "I told everyone not to call me reverend; my name is Sheila. I don't try to bring anyone into my church. I think religion is your own personal business. And I tried to be just me, not holier-than-thou."

She rides with one officer, for no pay, about eight hours a week. She takes the night shift, she said, because she has to work days at the church. "My first duty is to the church," she said, but added: "It's rewarding to see how the police handle these things (problems on the beat)." "I feel I'm a very understanding and patient person. But those men take a lot of abuse. I find myself feeling, 'How do they release those emotions they have to have?' Very often they're able to talk with me about it. Very often, there's a lot of pain involved, in accidents and death." She said the officers also talk to her about their home lives, their families and their feelings about going into a dangerous situation. "They're really very positive men and it amazed me to be around them, to see how positive they are in the midst of such negation. I know all the cuss words. They (citizens) really lay it on them. I'm not saying everyone does, because many of the citizens greet them with tremendous relief. "But when they catch someone doing something he shouldn't do, and they're on drugs, or drinking, that uniform triggers something. I'm free to go with the officers right into any situation. But they do protect me. If any bullets are flying around, they tell me to stay in the car and keep my head down." She said she was attacked only once. "He was on PCP, he had just said he'd taken poison. An officer knocked the poison out of his hand, and he was really

high. It took four officers to hold him, because he had this tremendous strength. I stood behind a gate, next to his mother and grandmother. Whether he went for me I can't say, it looked like it. He threw the gate at me." She wears a badge identifying her as a chaplain and said that often, people who are arrested will bring up the subject of religion. "Very often they'll say they get the concept that God is going to punish them. I do not believe in a punishing God. I say, 'It's awfully handy to have a God to lay all this on when we're responsible for ourselves. Sometimes they stop and think about it, sometimes they use a cuss word and that's it.'" On one occasion, a young man felt it was his fault that a forklift had fallen and a load of lumber crushed his friend. "It wasn't his fault but he was very distraught. I just held him and cried with him," she said. "I've often thought about him, and wondered what happened to him." In 1968, Mrs. Banta began studying Unity, a theology of the brotherhood of man that sees Jesus Christ as "the washover, telling us we can be as good as God wants us to be. He was showing us how." She was reared an Episcopalian, but when she developed a serious illness that required her to walk with canes she said she "had a healing."

Making folk harps puts craftsman 'in paradise'

LAGUNA MOUNTAIN, Calif. (AP) — "I'm in paradise," says Roland Robinson. After 15 years in the daily grind of diplomacy, Robinson is nestled today in mountaintop clouds and the music of the trees — and of his folk harps, which Robinson makes out of oak or maple and sells for \$200 to \$1,200 apiece. The harps look like the biblical harps of King David or the muses of ancient Greece, or the shepherders of today. Once, Robinson even made a lyre out of a toilet seat at the request of one fascinated buyer. But that man found he couldn't play it, "so I put a music box on the back and we ended up calling it a gui-toilet," a cross between a guitar-harp and toilet seat, Robinson said. Working in Brazil for the U.S. State Department in 1962, Robinson said, he discovered the Paraguayan folk harp and learned to play it. "When I first took up the harp," he said, "I would take it to bed and lie down and play. It was the first time in years I'd relaxed. "The diplomatic world is constant intellectual combat. People develop ulcers. I developed a philosophy that each day is one day less in my life." Then in 1965 on a visit to San Diego he came to

Laguna Mountain, 45 miles away, for a barbecue. He bought a house here the same day. Today he and his wife Phyllis publish out of their home a quarterly magazine called the Folk Harp Journal with 450 paid subscribers. They've done that since 1973. The world harbors hardly a handful of full-time harp-makers. An apprentice or two also work for Robinson, who calls himself a craftsman, not an artist. "My philosophy is to copy the best harps made — I'm not too proud to copy," he said in an interview. "I'm just a 61-year-old man. I'm not a weirdo. I don't have a beard. I don't smoke pot. I'm not far out. I'm not in this for money. "I don't care if I sell a harp. I'm in paradise — Mount Laguna is just heaven. I praise God we found it."

Rams to provide tough test for Cowboys

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys and Los Angeles Rams, who usually seem to meet in the National Football League playoffs, play under less crucial circumstances tonight.

The Rams, losers to New England last Monday, try to get on the winning track when they host the Cowboys in a preseason match in Anaheim Stadium. Dallas downed Green Bay 17-14 in its first 1980 exhibition game.

"The Rams are about as tough a test as we can have in the preseason," said Dallas Coach Tom Landry, whose team has a 3-2 record against Los Angeles in the playoffs since 1973.

"We'll know where we are a little better after this one. We hope we can improve everywhere; we've got to eliminate our errors."

Quarterback Danny White, taking over for the retired Roger Staubach, will start for the Cowboys, with backup Glenn Carano seeing duty

probably in alternating quarters.

White completed seven of 13 passes for 99 yards in the victory over Green Bay last Saturday, while Carano was four of nine and connected on a 3-yard toss for the winning touchdown.

Defensive end Ed "Too Tall" Jones, returning to football after a try at boxing, was impressive, blocking a field goal and recovering a fumble that led to the winning score.

The Cowboys will have safety Randy Hughes and wide receiver Drew Pearson, both hurt earlier this month, back in the starting lineup. Cornerbacks Benny Barnes and Aaron Kyle, each coming off surgery, will also be available for duty.

Vince Ferragamo, who put on a strong second-half passing show in the 35-31 loss to the Patriots, will start at quarterback for the Rams. Battling Pat Haden for the starting job, Ferragamo completed nine of 11 passes for 196 yards and four touchdowns in the final two quarters.

Ferragamo, who led Los Angeles to the Super Bowl after taking over for the injured Haden late last season, had thrown three touchdown passes in the Rams' 21-19 divisional playoff victory over the Cowboys last December.

Haden, who was 11 of 17 for 124 yards as the Rams trailed New England 7-3 at halftime, is expected to play the second half against the Cowboys.

"I suppose Vince has a leg up on me," Haden said of the quarterback battle. "Now it's very, very debatable. I'm sure there are going to be a lot of people in Vince's corner."

"That's round one of four rounds," Ferragamo said after the impressive outing against the Patriots. "I'll settle for a decision."

The Dallas-Los Angeles game, the first preseason meeting between the two since 1976, starts at 9 p.m. CDT. A crowd of some 68,000 is expected for the contest, the Rams' second in their new Anaheim Stadium home.

Dan Devine resigns post

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Dan Devine, football coach at the University of Notre Dame for the past five years, announced to a national television audience Friday night he is retiring as coach at the end of the coming college season.

Devine, 55, said the primary factor in his decision was "family considerations," and he stressed he was under "no pressure at all, from anybody."

Last year's 7-4 record was Notre Dame's worst since 1963. Despite winning the 1977 national championship, Devine has come under frequent criticism from die-hard Irish fans who demand nothing less than perfection.

Devine, whose wife reportedly has been ill, said in an interview here at the WSBT-TV studio during Friday night's Pittsburgh-Atlanta football game that he "just wanted to make sure it was announced tonight, before the season, so there wouldn't be any rumors."

He did not announce any future plans, but he left open the possibility he might return to coaching in the National Football League.

"I've won just about every bowl game except the Super Bowl," said Devine, who previously coached at Arizona State and the University of Missouri and then with the Green Bay Packers of the NFL.

Devine's overall college record is 164-54-8, including 44-14 at Notre Dame.

Devine said he told the team earlier Friday evening.

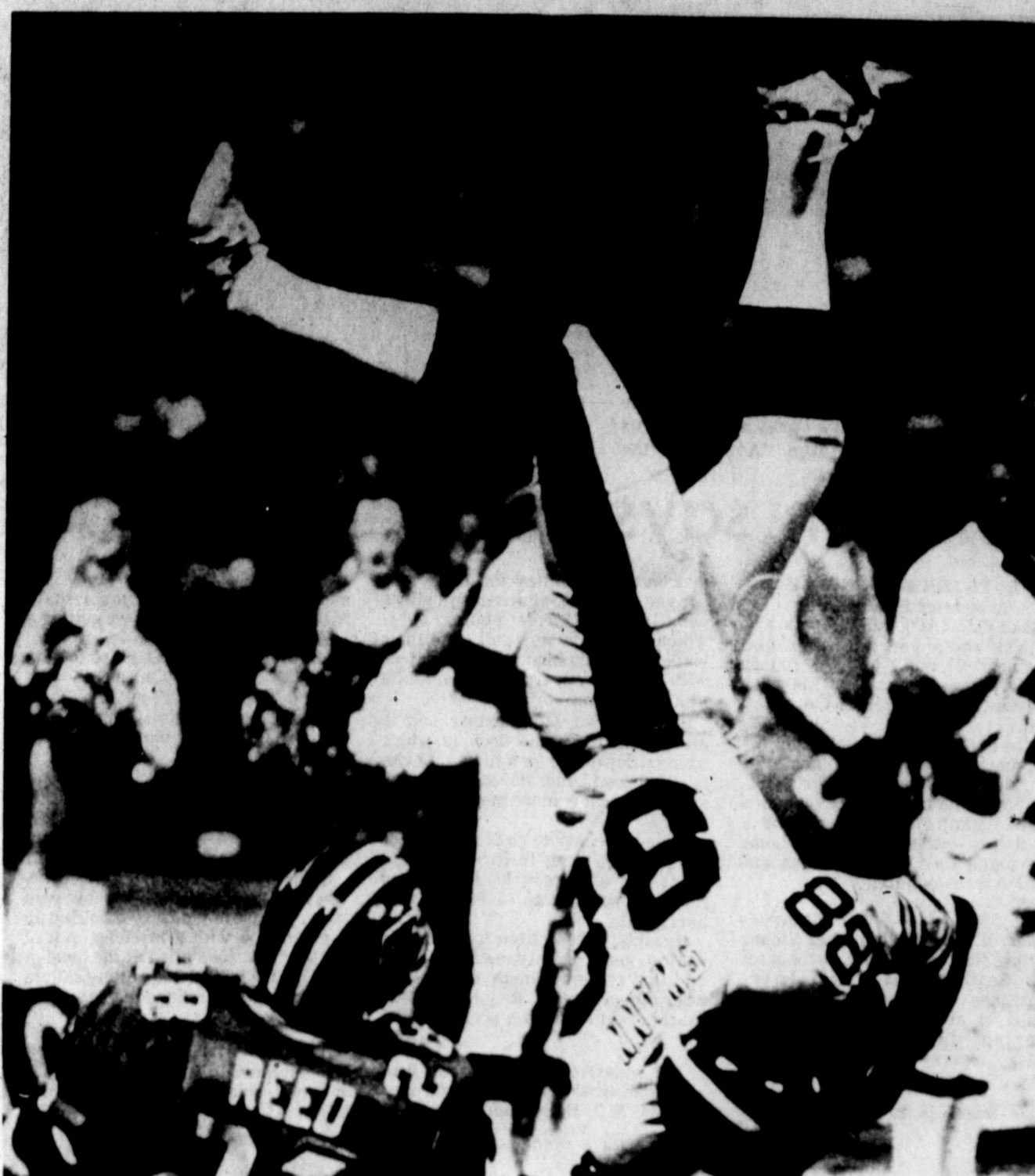
"If I can't devote the time necessary to recruiting, it wouldn't be fair to the school," he said. "I always felt I would be the first to know when it was time to step down."

Devine, who owns a beer distributorship in Columbia, Mo., also has been rumored to be interested in returning to Missouri to enter politics.

Rumors of dissatisfaction began almost as soon as Devine arrived at Notre Dame in 1975, when the Irish lost three games. There were even rumors that he was to be fired during the season and replaced by former Coach Ara Parseghian.

Devine survived that year, although Notre Dame didn't go to a post-season bowl game, and in 1976 the Irish went 9-3 and beat Penn State in the Gator Bowl.

The next year, more discontent surfaced after the Irish lost their second game of the season and "Dump Devine" stickers popped up around campus. He squeaked that challenge by winning the next 10 games and earned the national championship with a convincing 39-10 victory over Texas in the Cotton Bowl.

Quarterbacks feel pinch

The National Football League is in midseason form. After just one full weekend of exhibition games, five quarterbacks have already been bounced around enough to spend time recuperating on the bench.

Jim Zorn, out for a week with a chipped bone in his knee, and Steve Myers, sidelined for at least a month with a badly bruised lower back, leave the Seattle Seahawks without their No. 1 and one of their No. 2 quarterbacks.

Veteran reserve Sam Adkins, the other No. 2, and rookie Dave Krieg from Milton College in Wisconsin will call the Seahawks' signals Monday night against the visiting Miami Dolphins.

"We are still very basic in our approach but we have a lot of confidence in Sam's ability to go out and do the job," Jerry Rhyme, Seattle's offensive coordinator, said of Adkins, who threw just three passes without a completion in 1979.

Like the Seahawks, the Green Bay Packers were without their top two quarterbacks for a while. Lynn Dickey, who suffered an injured arch in the Packers' scoreless tie against San Diego in the Aug. 2 Hall of Fame game, is back and should get some playing time tonight against Baltimore.

But Dave Whitehurst, who damaged a knee in that lightning-abreviated game against the Chargers, isn't due to return for perhaps six more weeks.

The fifth quarterback is Gifford Nielsen, the No. 2 man on the Houston Oilers behind Ken Stabler. Nielsen, who took over for injured Dan Pastorini last year and guided the Oilers to a playoff victory over San Diego, suffered a separated shoulder against Tampa Bay and will miss Sunday's nationally televised game against New Orleans.

Tonight's other games are Dallas at Los Angeles, Buffalo at Detroit, Chicago at Cincinnati, Denver at the New York Giants, New England at Oakland, St. Louis at Tampa Bay and San Francisco at San Diego. On Monday night it's Minnesota at Kansas City and Washington at Cleveland.

Another injured quarterback is June Jones, Atlanta's No. 2.

Vikes place John Reaves on waivers

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. (AP) — Quarterback John Reaves has left Minnesota for his Tampa, Fla., home after being placed on waivers by the Minnesota Vikings, the National Football League team announced.

Reaves was released Friday from the Hazelden Foundation near Center City, Minn., where he had undergone treatment the past month for alcohol and drug problems.

Although the decision to release Reaves was made some time ago, the Vikings said Reaves asked them to delay putting him on waivers until he had completed treatment at Hazelden.

"When I talked to him the Tuesday before training camp opened — and the decision not to bring John back had been made some time prior to that — I told him that," said Coach Bud Grant.

"We wanted to put him on the 'not able to play' list. We asked him to phone us if he wanted to do otherwise. He called us this week and told us that he felt he was capable of playing and asked us to put him on waivers."

The Vikings had encouraged Reaves to undergo treatment at Hazelden after he had problems with alcohol and drugs in Tampa, Fla., earlier this summer. They paid for the treatment.

Reaves said he planned to head home to Tampa "and wait to see if there are any NFL teams interested in me."

The quarterback, who did not play during the regular season last year, said he was disappointed about not being able to return to the Vikings.

"I feel that right now I have more to offer than ever before because, for the first time in the last 10 years, I have a new outlook on life as a result

of the past month that I have spent in the center," Reaves explained. "I've had drinking problems and drug problems for years ..."

He went on to say that he felt himself to be in better mental, physical and spiritual health than any

other time in his life.

"I'm so excited about life now that it is too bad I couldn't work things out with the Vikings ..."

Reaves continued.

"I'm praying that I will be claimed. If not I will be writing letters."

Steelers nudge Atlanta, 17-14

ATLANTA (AP) — Quarterback Terry Bradshaw flipped a 1-yard scoring pass to Rocky Bleier in the opening minutes Friday night and backup signal-caller Cliff Stoudt ran for another touchdown to trigger the defending Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers to a 17-14 National Football League preseason victory

in the final period, getting touchdowns from I.M. Hipp on a 1-yard run and a 20-yard touchdown pass from Mike Moroski to rookie flanker Mike Smith.

Bradshaw, making his first preseason appearance after missing the Steeler's opening victory a week ago, completed 10 of 16 for 163 yards while playing the entire first half.

Jury gives Rhodes \$125,000

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — A federal court jury has awarded a former National Basketball Association player, Richard Rhodes, \$125,000 in damages because of a punching incident in a 1977 exhibition game.

The six-member jury ruled on a lawsuit filed by Rhodes against the Kansas City Kings and former player Lucius Allen.

Rhodes alleged that Allen punched him in the face, shattering his jaw and his professional basketball career.

Attorneys for the defendants argued that Rhodes had struck Allen

with an elbow and the punch was a reflex action. They also argued that Rhodes had no real chance to win a permanent spot with the Chicago Bulls, the team he played for in that exhibition game.

Harlan Heller, Rhodes' attorney, told the jury, "Rich did nothing that would have instigated this event. He was blameless in this circumstance."

In asking for \$1.25 million in damages from Allen and the Kings, Rhodes contended that the injury forced him to miss the remaining exhibition season.

The Patty Berg was Daniel's first tour victory a year ago as a rookie, and the long-hitting defending champion also made her charge on the back nine with three birdies to finish strong at 68, 5-under-par.

"I just look at it as another tournament," said Daniel, the LPGA's 1979 Rookie of the Year. "I tried to play the par fives in sub-par golf. That's the way for me to attack this course."

Two shots back of Bradley was Hollis Stacy, who was the runner-up to Daniel last year. She also birdied three holes on the back nine, including No. 18, to finish at 69.

"I'm happy," said the two-time Ladies U.S. Open winner. "I went home for three days and worked on my game."

Decision irks Blazers Graham takes Westchester golf lead with 67 in drizzle

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The Portland Trail Blazers said Friday the revised award received from the San Diego Clippers in compensation for Bill Walton cannot be viewed as adequate by "any knowledgeable basketball authority."

National Basketball Association Commissioner Larry O'Brien on Friday returned to San Diego its 1982 first-round draft pick and \$350,000 which originally had gone to Portland.

"The final result is that the Portland Trail Blazers received the contracts of Kermit Washington, Kevin Kunnert and a first-round draft choice," for the loss of Walton, General Manager Harry Glickman said in a prepared statement.

"By no stretch of the imagination would any knowledgeable basketball authority contend that this is adequate."

Walton, who led Portland to the NBA championship in 1977 and was the league's Most Valuable Player the following season, signed with San Diego as a veteran free agent in 1979.

"At the time Walton signed with San Diego, he was the most valuable player in the NBA and received the most lucrative contract ever offered a player in the NBA," Glickman said.

"During the compensation proceedings San Diego placed a value on Bill Walton of \$2,250,000.

The Portland Trail Blazers offered to pay this amount in order to retain Walton's contract and San Diego refused the offer — obviously believing he was worth more," Glickman said.

HARRISON, N.Y. (AP) — David Graham shot a 4-under-par 67 in a steady drizzle and took sole control of the second-round lead Friday in the \$400,000 Westchester Golf Classic.

Graham, an Australian who won this tournament four years ago and was second last year, had a 36-hole total of 132 — 10 shots under par for two trips over the hilly, 6,603-yard Westchester Country Club course in suburban New York.

George Cadle came out of the pack with a 6-under-par 65 — including a string of five consecutive birdies — and moved into second at 133, a single stroke back.

Midland's John Adams failed to qualify for the final two rounds after a

two-day score of 148. Tommy Valentine, who shared the first-round lead with Graham and George Burns, had a 69 that left him at 134, two strokes off the pace. He was tied with Curtis Strange and Rob Murphy. Strange shot a 65 and Murphy a 67.

It was another two shots back to Johnny Miller and John Mahaffey at 136. Mahaffey had a 66, Miller 67.

Burns, who had a first-round 65, was one of the late starters. The rain lifted about the time he teed off in the early afternoon, but he finished the day with a 72 and a two-day 137, five shots off the pace. Tom Watson stayed in the hunt with a 66 after an opening round of 68.

San Antonio signs George Jonhson

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The San Antonio Spurs Friday went into the free agent market for the first time in their history, signing center George Johnson to add some defense to the NBA's highest scoring team.

"We've all talked how badly we've needed a center," General Manager Bob Bass said. "George is a reject machine. I think you would describe George Johnson as a defensive genius, the epitome of a team basketball player."

The 6-foot-11 Johnson, second only to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in blocked shots last season, comes from the New Jersey Nets, where he played the past three years during a well-traveled eight-year career.

The two clubs have yet to agree on compensation, according to a Spurs spokesman.

Bass described Johnson as an intimidating player under the basket whose value in menacing opponents on defense would not always show up in statistics.

A native of Tylertown, Miss., Johnson also played at Golden State and Buffalo. After leading the NBA in blocked shots in 1977-78, he was second to Abdul-Jabbar with 3.2 per game while playing only 26 minutes a night last year.

America's candidates concern foreign press

By The Associated Press

President Carter's renomination stirred little enthusiasm among the world press, and some downright hostility — from the Soviet news agency Tass, which assailed his acceptance speech as "militaristic."

Tass, in a dispatch from New York, noted that in his Madison Square Garden speech Thursday night Carter derided the Republicans' military policies but, the Soviet agency said, "he essentially took the same position of the Republicans he criticized."

Faint praise for Carter came in Third World nations where several commentators described him as, in the words of the Indonesia Times, "not ideal ... yet he is far better than Reagan."

The independent Hindu newspaper of New Delhi, India, described Reagan as "an aged, arch-conservative whose finger on the nuclear trigger would disconcert the world."

It said the prospect of Reagan as president "has caused disquiet not just in India ... but in China, the Soviet Union and even among the United States' European allies."

A report in a liberal West German weekly, Allgemeines Deutsches Sonntagblatt, confirmed this to a degree.

It quoted Egon Bahr, secretary-general of Bonn's ruling Social Democrat Party, as telling political associates the Republican candidate "would create gravest problems," but adding, "I would not dare bet in favor of Carter."

A number of foreign political analysts see Sen. Edward M. Kennedy as the key to Carter's future.

Alien marine gets discharge

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP) — A Canadian who found himself back in the Marines when a traffic violation led to a police computer check that showed his discharge 11 years ago was flawed has finally left the corps after five months of "nothing but hassles."

The Marine Corps on Thursday granted a less than honorable discharge to Pvt. Michael J. Ducross, 30. He was arrested in March after the police computer said he was wanted for investigation of desertion.

Ducross, who was released from the brig a month ago, has been on painting duty at the Camp Pendleton base during the days while returning to Huntington Beach at night. He said evidence dug up in the last two weeks led to his discharge.

"We found my name in a file of deserted aliens who were discharged in 1972," he said. "That just blew their case."

A Canadian citizen, Ducross' general court-martial trial which began July 22 was to resume Monday, but he will be released from the Marines before then.

"I'm happy, but I still don't believe it," Ducross said in a telephone interview from the home of his father-in-law in Huntington Beach, Calif. "I don't know why they waited this long."

"After the way they've been treating me like dirt, it's quite a relief. As soon as I get the papers in my hands I'm just going to kick back and relax."

In issuing the order, new Camp Pendleton base commander Maj. Gen. Hugh W. Hardy granted Ducross' most recent discharge request, made last June. Hardy's decision overrode one by former base commander Maj. Gen. Stephen G. Olmsted.

The Marine Corps said in a statement Ducross would be discharged "for the good of the service." The order was issued "as a result of research into his alien status," the statement said.

If convicted of desertion, Ducross could have been sentenced to five years in prison.

An Iroquois Mohawk Indian by birth, Ducross said he and his wife have lost their apartment and he's lost his job as a shipper and receiver after the arrest last March.

"But I'm 95 percent sure I can get my job back," Ducross said.

Hardy could not be reached for comment.

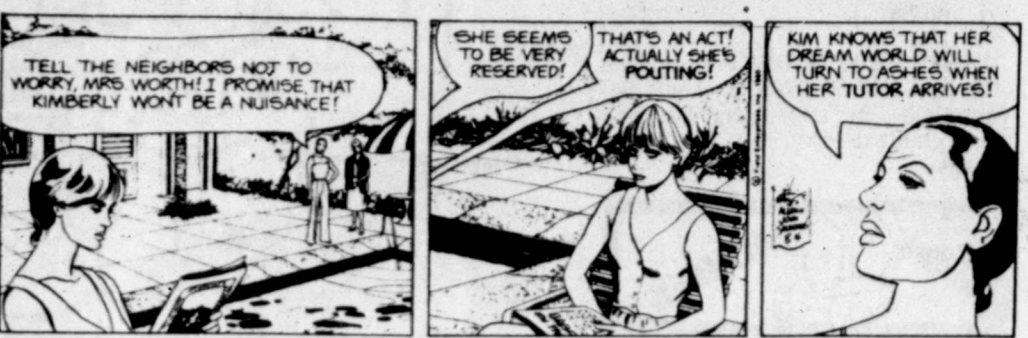

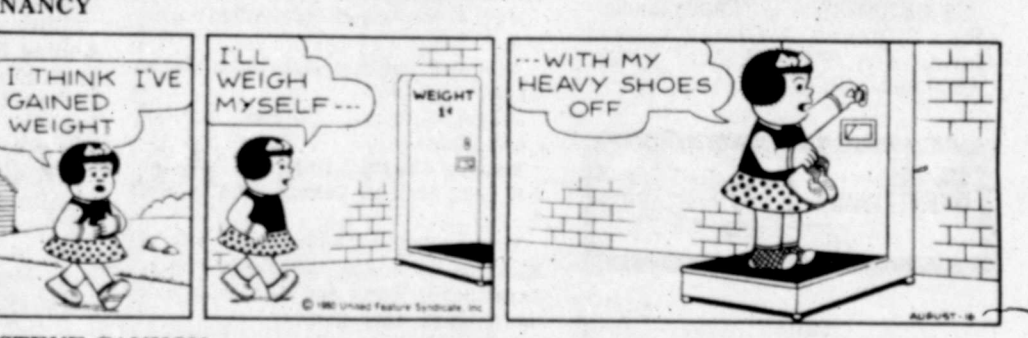

Searchers may have found Titanic

NEW YORK (AP) — Sonar equipment picked up the outline of what is believed to be the lost Titanic, 380 miles off the Newfoundland coast and near where the luxury liner sank 68 years ago in the worst peacetime marine disaster, the expedition leader said Friday.

"We think we've got the Titanic," Mike Harris, leader of the \$1 million expedition, told The Associated Press from the research vessel H.J.W. Fay.

"We won't be sure until we send the television camera down, but the sonar shows it's the right length, right width and right height of the Titanic," Harris said.

The sonar sighting, using sonar gear mounted on a towed sled sub-

merged in the Atlantic, located what appeared to be a ship's outline 12,000 feet down at latitude 41.46 north and longitude 50.14 west, Harris said.

"This is not too far from the historic site where the ship went down," said Harris, a documentary film maker from Tampa, Fla.

The ocean liner, proclaimed unsinkable, hit an iceberg on its maiden voyage and went down with 1,517 people on April 15, 1912. More than 700 passengers, most of them women and children, made it to safety.

The 882.5-foot Titanic displaced 46,328 tons. The world's largest liner today, the Queen Elizabeth II, is 963 feet and displaces 66,852 tons.

Although the site of the sinking has

been generally known, the vast depths in that part of the North Atlantic had prevented searchers from finding the Titanic.

Harris said the Fay hoped to drop television and still cameras for a closer look Saturday.

But Harris said the searchers would have to delay that inspection if forecasts of poor weather hold up.

The mission has been plagued by bad weather. Equipment was lost and damaged last weekend as the ship was buffeted in 12-foot-high swells.

The Fay, a 180-foot chartered vessel with a crew of 38, including 23 scientists, left Port Everglades, Fla., July 17.

Jack Grimm, a Texas oilman, put

up \$1 million to finance the search. He previously bankrolled unsuccessful hunts for Noah's Ark and the Loch Ness monster.

If the Titanic is pinpointed, Grimm hopes to send a research submarine to the site next year to penetrate the hull and retrieve parts of the ship with remote-control equipment.

The sonar gear was suspended from a cable 600 feet above the craggy seabed when it spotted what was believed to be the Titanic.

The gear, designed by International Submarine Technology, Ltd., of Redmond, Wash., has an enhanced scanning range able to pick up objects four times as far as most sonar equipment, the designers claim.

Four enter reactor at TMI

MIDDLETOWN, Pa. (AP) — A four-man team, fighting fatigue and 90-degree temperatures, ventured inside the Three Mile Island reactor containment building Friday and found little visible damage.

The technicians said their exploration, which took them near the top of the reactor vessel and to the basement of the 200-foot-high building, showed that radiation levels were lower than had been expected.

"Mechanically it looked very good. They saw no evidence of damage," said senior TMI official Robert Arnold.

The second manned entry of the building was marred only when the heat and 30 pounds of protective clothing forced two of the team members to leave halfway into the planned 40-minute mission.

Despite the early exit, the team got the first human glimpse of the outside of the reactor that was damaged in March 1979 by the nation's worst commercial nuclear reactor accident.

Using a telescopic probe, engineer William Behrle took radiation readings within 12 feet of the top of the reactor vessel and within 15 feet of the radiation-emitting water that fills the building's basement.

At the reactor, radiation was measured at 100 millirems per hour, which officials described as being low. An average American receives between 100 and 200 millirems each year from natural sources.

One of the team members, engineer Michael Benson, said he noticed a 55-gallon drum "that had been crushed similar to a Pepsi can with your hand." They speculated it may have been crushed when hydrogen gas which had accumulated in the reactor exploded.

A plastic telephone handset found inside the building "had been substantially deformed by heat," Arnold said.

Most of the warbirds will be winging in from the CAF's West Texas Wing, which includes the Desert Squadron of Midland-Odessa.

The CAF will be giving flying demonstrations beginning at 2:15 p.m. today and at 1:45 p.m. Sunday. The Navy Parachute Team will free-fall and blossom after each of the CAF demonstrations.

The West Wing's array of aircraft includes the P-51 Mustang, the P-40N Warhawk, the F4U Corsair, the Wildcat, the Harvard Mark II and Mark IV, the PT-19, the Me. 108 Taifun, the Navy SNJ, PT-26 and the BT-13 Vibrator. Col. Joe Mabee of Midland is leader of the CAF's West Texas Wing.

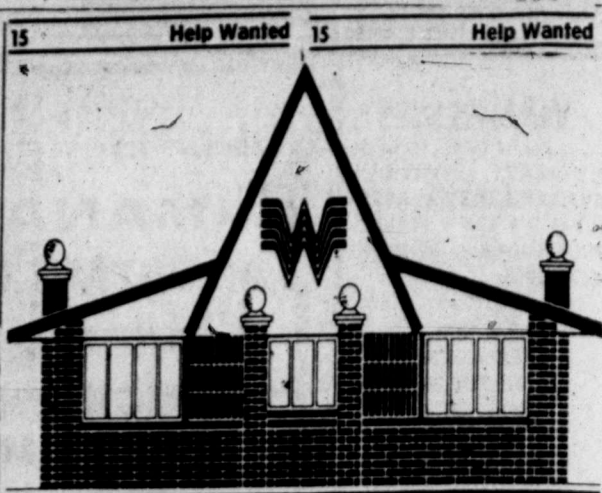

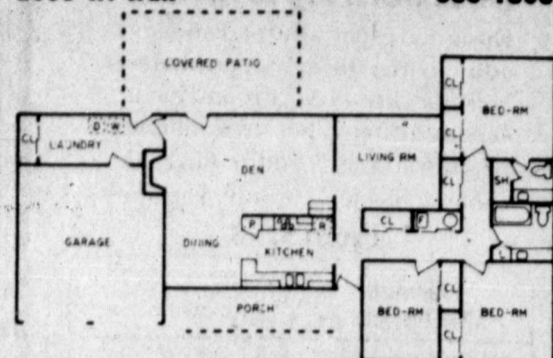
