Increase supports stance on recession

WASHINGTON (AP) — A record 4.6 percent increase in the government's index of economic indicators in July offered support for President Carter's economic program. The Commerce Department Friday said the economy will improve significantly. The index points to the direction of economic activity, but not the magnitude.

"What it does is confirm what other statistics are telling us, that the economy is reaching bottom and in some areas is beginning to improve," said a high administration official who didn't want to be identified.

"Any improvement, no matter how slight, is certain to be welcome to President Carter in an election year, especially since Ronald Reagan accused him this week of plunging the economy into a 'severe depression.' Carter, however, said in announcing his new economic program Thursday, 'The recession is near bottom and we will recover.'"

Most economists would agree that while the recession has been serious, it has nowhere near approached de-

pression levels. Unemployment was 7.8 percent of the labor force last month, compared to a high of 25 percent in 1933, during the Great Depression. It reached a high of 9 percent in the 1974-1975 recession.

Stuart Eizenstat, the president's chief domestic adviser, told reporters Thursday that the administration believes "the recession will soon bottom out, certainly by the end of the year at the latest." But he admitted the nation faces a slow economic recovery.

The administration's own projections point to a continuing rise in the unemployment rate, to 8.5 percent by the end of this year, easing only to 8.1 percent by the end of next year — even with the benefits of Carter's new \$30 billion economic program.

Republicans believe that the high jobless rate likely will be a major point of vulnerability for Carter in the election campaign as it will be higher at the end of his term than when he took office. Reagan has promised to do a great deal better.

The July increase in the Index of Leading Indicators follows a revised 1.5 percent rise in June, the Com-

merce Department said. Previously, the index had fallen for eight consecutive months by a total of 12.6 percent.

"Two consecutive increases are highly encouraging," said Feliks Tamm, a Commerce Department economist. "The combined 6.1 percent rise in June and July have been very broadly based, and upward movements of this magnitude usually signal a new future trend."

But Tamm cautioned that the July figures are preliminary and subject to labor revision, which could be substantial.

A private economist, Lawrence Chimerine of Chase Econometrics Associates, agreed the index indicates an end to the recession, but said, "It would be a terrible mistake to conclude that we're in for a very rapid recovery."

Dr. Richard W. Rahn, vice president and chief economist of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, cautioned against interpreting the index figures too optimistically.

Cubans take hostages, demand flight to U.S.

LIMA, Peru (AP) — A California-bound Braniff jetliner was invaded at the Lima Airport early Friday by 168 Cuban refugees who took 15 people hostage and demanded to go to the United States.

U.S. officials said the Cubans would be arrested if they arrived in the United States. Peru refused to supply a replacement airplane and the hostages and Cubans, including women and about 65 children, remained aboard the DC-8.

Witnesses said three of the Cubans were wounded by policemen who opened fire as the refugees forced their way aboard the plane at about 1 a.m.

Peruvian security forces were stationed near the pilotless craft, which

had been towed from the main runway.

"They are hungry. There is no more drinking water and they are demanding food," a spokesman for Braniff International Airlines said. "They must be very nervous, because the air conditioning is not functioning and with that many people inside it must be suffocating." The plane is fitted for 164 passengers.

Transport Minister Fernando Chaves said President Fernando Belaunde rejected the invaders' demand for another airplane after meeting with Interior Minister Jose Maria de la Jara, U.S. Ambassador Harry Schlaudeman and Foreign Minister Javier Arias Stella.

Chaves said Peru's prestige and authority would be diminished by granting the refugees exit. "In Peru, it's Peruvians who determine what we do or don't do," he said.

More than a thousand Cubans were given refuge in Peru after they packed into the Peruvian Embassy in Havana, Cuba, last April seeking political asylum from Fidel Castro's communist regime. They were placed in resettlement camps here, but many seek to join relatives who fled to the United States in the massive boatlift in May and June.

Chaves said the Peruvian government had offered to help the Cubans aboard the DC-8 apply for visas to go to the United States.

Brezhnev says U.S. nuclear strategy 'dangerous'

MOSCOW (AP) — President Leonid I. Brezhnev, in his first major foreign policy address in six months, Friday accused the United States of pursuing an "extremely dangerous" nuclear strategy while the Soviet Union followed a "clear and honest peace policy."

Brezhnev's nationally televised speech from Alma Ata, in Soviet Central Asia, summed up at the highest level the various Soviet responses to actions taken by Washington since the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan last December.

Western diplomats said the speech broke no new policy ground. But they found it notable for its broad scope and the sharpness of its attack on the United States, and for Brezhnev's silence on the current crisis in Poland caused by widespread strikes by workers demanding independent trade unions and relief from sharply rising

prices.

From the outset, Brezhnev focused on "the forces of oppression, militarism and aggression," adding "Here special mention has to be made of the policy pursued by the government of the United States in the present time."

The 73-year-old Soviet leader criticized the NATO decision to deploy new medium range nuclear missiles in Western Europe and Washington's "new nuclear strategy," which envisions selected nuclear strikes rather than an all-out retaliation in the event of a Soviet nuclear attack.

The essence of the new strategy — President Carter's Presidential Directive 59 — Brezhnev said, "virtually comes to making the very idea of nuclear war sort of acceptable to public opinion."

"This is the policy which is extremely dangerous to the peoples of the whole world," he declared.

By contrast, Brezhnev said, "We do not encroach on somebody's land and do not interfere in somebody's internal affairs, but we shall always manage to defend our rights and legitimate interests."

Brezhnev challenged the West to respond to Soviet proposals for immediate new talks on limiting medium-range nuclear arms as well as on troop and arms reductions in Central Europe.

He repeated charges that the United States, aided by China and Pakistan, were seeking to "stifle the Afghan revolution" and turn it into armed springboard "threatening to the Soviet Union."

But he said, the Soviet Union would "discharge our duty to the last" in Afghanistan, adding "None should

have any doubt about this."

Brezhnev discussed American actions taken since the Kremlin sent an estimated 85,000 troops into Afghanistan to help oust Marxist President Hafizullah Amin, who later was executed, and install the current president, Babrak Karmal. The United States led a boycott of the Moscow Olympics and urged other nations to curb delivery of goods to the Soviet Union.

"Those attempts at burying detente and at plunging the world into another Cold War were not at all approved by broad masses of the people and by most of governments, and proved of no benefit to their initiators," Brezhnev said.

The Soviets have managed to buy "necessary amounts of commodities" from other countries and the Olympics were "an excellent success," he said.

In response to bad publicity, Willie offers to perform free

BIG SPRING, Texas (AP) — Country singer Willie Nelson has offered to perform for free to help a Big Spring benefit concert stung by publicity surrounding the singer and an inmate doctor, concert sponsors said Friday.

Dr. John Marcus Young, 41, who was sentenced to three years at the federal correctional facility near here for illegally dispensing drug prescriptions, was instrumental in convincing Nelson to perform at Sunday's benefit concert sponsored by the Jaycees.

The Associated Press and the Longview Morning Journal reported Thursday that documents showed Young had earlier illegally dispensed drug prescriptions to Nelson, Waylon Jennings, Johnny Rodriguez and Priscilla Davis, the ex-wife of Fort Worth millionaire Cullen Davis.

"When people started seeing all those stories they thought that Willie was bringing a bad influence into the town," said J. D. Gregory, advisor for the Jaycees prison group.

"Willie called us today — he was very concerned with all the bad publicity this thing has had — and said he's backing us 100 percent and would donate his share (of money)," Gregory said.

"I'm kind of blown away by this offer. I hope it's good," he added.

Gregory said sponsors had agreed to pay Nelson a \$20,000 "break-even" fee for his performance at the concert aimed at raising money for a Texas Jaycees-supported college for the handicapped in Gonzales.

John Young, superintendent of the federal facility, said Young had helped with concert arrangements, but insisted the doctor "is not running the show."

"Willie is one of the big money makers and all this money is going to help that school," said Gregory. "The doc just offered to contact his old friend and approach him about doing the show."

But following the reports of Young's relationship with Nelson, concert sponsors drew sharp criticism from some residents of this conservative West Texas city.

Members of a local church circulated a petition, signed by 700 people, that asked that the concert be cancelled.

"An irate minister presented the petition to me today and wanted to know why I couldn't get someone with a better reputation," Gregory said. "He said Willie is a bad influence on our young people."

But, Gregory insisted that money, not influence, was the issue.

"We need money for this school. These handicapped kids have nowhere else to go," said Gregory. "And where Willie goes, he makes money."

Gregory said ticket sales have been brisk despite the publicity.

"We've sold about 15,000 and have a capacity of 20,000. I wouldn't say ticket sales are really suffering."

He said since Nelson has decided to donate his payment for the concert the Jaycees expect to make around \$50,000 for the school.

Financially troubled Alaska pipeline consortium gains three new partners

WASHINGTON (AP) — The consortium building the Alaska natural gas pipeline picked up three new partners Friday. A spokeswoman for the financially troubled project called the additions a tremendous boost.

Acting like bargain hunters on the last day of a special sale, two U.S. natural gas pipeline companies and one Canadian firm signed on as partners with the group building the Alaska segment of the pipeline.

A company official said the new partners acted on the last business day in which the consortium was allowed to add companies who will be able to share the same profit percentage as the original partners.

The three companies Friday followed the addition of a fourth company on Monday, bringing the total number of partners to 11.

President Carter has made the Alaska pipeline a key plank in his energy independence program. When completed, hopefully at the end of 1985, the pipeline will deliver 2.4 billion cubic feet of natural gas daily to the United States, enough to replace the equivalent of 400,000 barrels of oil daily.

The entire 4,700-mile pipeline, which will carry gas from Alaska's Prudhoe Bay to terminals near San Francisco and Chicago, is expected to cost \$25 billion.

Human-rights advocate, 47, sentenced by Soviet judge

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet judge on Friday sentenced human-rights advocate Tatyana Velikanova to four years in a labor camp, plus five years of internal exile. Spectators in the courtroom cried "Not enough, not enough!" family members said.

Mrs. Velikanova, 47, who has been an activist since the late 1960s, was convicted of "anti-Soviet agitation and propaganda," the Soviet news agency said.

Family members present at the trial said shouts arose from a what they called a hand-picked courtroom audience when Chief Judge Vasily G. Romanov announced the sentence — matching the prosecution's request.

"Muscovites of different ages and professions who packed the session hall met the court's ruling with approval," Tass reported.

Mrs. Velikanova, a mathematician and computer programmer, became a dissident when her former husband, Konstantin Babitsky, was arrested for demonstrating against the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1968 and was sentenced to jail and internal exile.

She was one of the original members of the "initiative group on human rights" formed in 1969 and subsequently was active with the underground "chronicle of current events."

Mrs. Velikanova was ordered to serve the four years' imprisonment in a "strict regime" labor camp, the second most severe type in the Soviet penal system, and after that will be exiled to a remote area of the country.

family members said.

The charges carry a maximum penalty of seven years' imprisonment and five years' exile. Tass said Mrs. Velikanova received less than the maximum because she is a woman.

Her sentence came a day after another Moscow court condemned dissident Russian Orthodox priest Gleb Yakunin to five years at hard labor and five of exile on similar charges. The two cases were the first major dissident trials since the Olympics.

About 20 dissident supporters waited quietly on the sidewalk outside the courthouse in eastern Moscow where Mrs. Velikanova's trial began Wednesday. Family authorities permitted five family members inside the courtroom, but other supporters as well as Western correspondents were barred.

Dissident sources said Mrs. Velikanova refused to sign statements during pre-trial detention and took little part in her trial. On Thursday, the sources said, she simply declared in court: "The force is over."

Announcing the verdict Friday, Tass said: "The court found well-grounded the charge leveled against Velikanova that she was engaged in anti-Soviet agitation and propaganda in 1969-79."

Tass said Mrs. Velikanova maintained "unlawful links with correspondents of the bourgeois mass media and emissaries of anti-Soviet organizations."

No specific correspondents, diplomats or other westerners were mentioned by name during the trial.

Some programs banned in Mexico

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — The Mexican government recently cracked down on religious programming in that country and knocked off the air programs broadcast on Mexican stations by American evangelistic operations.

A local minister who had broadcast a Spanish program on Mexican stations and Back to the Bible, a Lincoln, Neb., outreach ministry, said Friday they have been notified of the government order.

A reliable source in Mexico City with the Mexican Interior Department confirmed Friday that radio stations have been "reminded" by telegram that the country's constitution prohibits broadcasts of "religious propaganda or proselytizing of any kind."

"We will be affected by this on the handful of stations we operate on," said Vernon Friesen, director of radio business for Back to the Bible. The ministry learned two days ago of the crackdown from its Mexican agent.

The Nebraska operation has a 30-minute program, "La Biblia Dice" that aired on seven Mexican radio stations and a five-minute program in English, "Pause for Good News" that ran on a Mexico City station.

One station airing the Spanish program already notified the Lincoln office that the broadcast has been cancelled.

Clinton Looney, a minister who has operated programs for 12 years in Mexico, said Friday he received a copy of the government's telegram that had been sent to a station using his broadcast.

"It said that by order of the government, cancel all religious broadcasts of every type and to notify the government in writing of the date of cancellation," he said.

Looney said he works with two evangelists from Mexico and Cuba who broadcast "La Hora Cristiana," a 15-minute program in Spanish in nine countries.

"We made a point in our programs

never to mention a church. We started with a hymn and then a seven-minute Bible-based message," said Looney, who lived in Mexico for 13 years.

The broadcasts advertised Bible correspondence courses offered from four schools in the United States, Guatemala, the Dominican Republic and Honduras, he said.

Looney's programs aired on stations in Tapachula, Aguascalientes, and several towns in the state of Coahuila on the Texas border.

The Back to the Bible broadcasts affected aired in Comalcalco, Leon, Merida, Monterrey, Torreón, Jalapa and Veracruz.

"This doesn't kill our work because we still have programs on 34 stations in nine countries even after the cancellation," Looney said.

Back to the Bible also broadcasts in several Central and South American countries and along the border.

Programs beamed into Mexico from other countries are not affected

by the order. The Mexico City source said religious messages will be permitted as long as they are not "propaganda or proselytizing."

"Abuses" of that restriction have been increasing, especially along the border, the source said.

Mexico has a strict separation of church and state. Priests and other clerics may not wear religious clothing in public. A notable exception was allowed for Pope John Paul II's visit to Mexico.

Church property is owned by the state in Mexico and leased to denominations.

Looney said he did not understand why the sudden order cancelling his programs, which have been aired more than a decade.

Back to the Bible officials had expected the action, they said, for almost a year and were not surprised but found the situation "serious and cause for concern."

Moonies to appeal court decision

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — The Unification Church says it will appeal a jury's \$30,000 award to a man who claimed the church had violated his rights as a parent when it recruited his 16-year-old daughter and used mind control to keep her a member.

David Hager, the church's legal director, said Wednesday's finding was unprecedented. But he discounted its significance, saying the case dealt with parental rights, not the church's recruiting practices.

However, James Winston, the lawyer for Don Kieffer, who brought the suit in 1977, said, "I think at least 99 percent of the trial was directed to establish that there was mind control."

Members of the Unification Church, headed by Korean industrialist the Rev. Sun Myung Moon, are sometimes called Moonies.

Kieffer saw his adopted daughter, Jana, for the first time in five years when she testified against him in the U.S. District Court trial. The jury reached its verdict Wednesday after 15 days of testimony and five hours of deliberation.

Kieffer charged that the church "denied his natural parental right" by recruiting his daughter when she was a minor. He also contended that the church "continued to exercise its mind control methods" to keep her a member.

Jana, now 21, joined her mother, Gloria Kieffer Paradis, at the church's Barrytown, N.Y., seminary in 1975. Church officials said they were not aware that the Kieffers were divorced and that Jana was in her father's custody. Kieffer adopted Jana, a child of his wife's first marriage, before the divorce.

"It was an argument over the facts, whether the church had knowledge" of the custody arrangement, Hager said. Mrs. Paradis is a member of the church.

Hager said the case should not affect any other civil suits against the church because none deal with minors who joined without parental consent. He said minors constitute "less than one-half of one percent" of the church's membership.

He said the case would be appealed because it involves the issue of religious liberty.

However, Winston disagreed that the case focused on Miss Kieffer's age when she joined the church. "They said it was a legitimate religion, and we had to rebut that to show they are not a legitimate religion because of their recruiting techniques, their use of brainwashing and mind control," he said.

Although he called the award a victory, Kieffer said he would not be satisfied until his daughter returned home.

"I feel good about the decision, but I still feel badly that Jana is not back with her family," said Kieffer, who lives in Bedford, N.H., and works for a shoe manufacturer.

"I would give up everything to have her back."

On Aug. 20, Miss Kieffer, who was living with relatives in Concord when she left to join the church, testified that she didn't think "brainwashing" goes on in the church.

"You can't control somebody's mind," she said. "That's ridiculous." Miss Kieffer also testified the church had taught her that "evil is selfish motivation, good is unselfish motivation." She called her father "very selfish."

But Kieffer said, "I'm still hopeful of reconciliation, of bringing her home to her family. And that's my next goal."

U.S. wants to deport bishop accused of WWII persecution

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Justice Department official says the government will try to deport Bishop Valerian D. Trifa, the 66-year-old Romanian Orthodox church leader who has been accused of persecuting Jews in his native Romania during World War II.

Trifa surrendered his certificate of naturalization in Detroit on Monday, stating his intention to give up his fight against a Justice Department suit aimed at stripping him of his citizenship. But his attorney said he planned to remain in the United States as a resident alien.

In a statement issued Thursday, Allan A. Ryan Jr., head of the Justice Department's Office of Special Investigations, said the government would soon ask a federal judge in Detroit to sign the formal order revoking Trifa's citizenship. And after that, Ryan said, "we will proceed in an appropriate forum to seek his deportation."

Federal officials originally filed suit in 1975 against Trifa, seeking to remove his naturalized citizenship on grounds that he had obtained it illegally in 1957 by concealing his membership in a Romanian fascist organization called the Iron Guard.

The government alleged at the time that Trifa took part in a pogrom that led to the death of hundreds

and perhaps thousands of Jews in Bucharest in 1941.

Trifa said earlier this week that "the relinquishment of my citizenship is in no way to be considered an admission of the government allegations in any manner, form or substance." He said he decided to give up his court battle to retain citizenship because of the heavy monetary cost and because the time involved had prevented him from devoting full attention to the 35,000 members of his Romanian Orthodox Episcopate of America.


Trifa entered the United States in 1950 as a displaced person.

He was not available for comment on Thursday.

Deprogrammer convicted of kidnapping

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Cult deprogrammer Ted Patrick was convicted Friday of conspiracy, false imprisonment and kidnapping in the sidewalk abduction of a Tucson, Ariz., waitress whom he never saw.

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — For the first time in nearly a generation, children may pray in Louisiana public schools, under a new state law. But the American Civil Liberties Union says it will fight to have the law overturned.

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Cult deprogrammer Ted Patrick was convicted Friday of conspiracy, false imprisonment and kidnapping in the sidewalk abduction of a Tucson, Ariz., waitress whom he never saw.

It was his first felony conviction in almost a decade of work financed by people unhappy with religions taken up by relatives.

Patrick, a one-time aide to former Gov. Ronald Reagan, has been charged 13 times and found guilty twice of misdemeanor false imprisonment, serving a year in prison in Denver.

He could be sentenced to as much as seven years in prison.

In the latest trial, a jury of seven women and five men deliberated almost three days before convicting Patrick in the abduction of Roberta McElfish, 26, last March 27.


Mrs. McElfish testified that relatives who believed she had joined a "Wesley Thomas Family" cult had forcibly taken her off a Tucson street, although none of her relatives was charged.

She managed to escape before being delivered to Court Judge Norbert Ehrenfreund allowed Patrick to remain free on \$20,000 bail until the sentencing Sept. 26 but ordered him not to engage in deprogramming in the meantime.

GOP fund challenge tossed out

WASHINGTON (AP) — A three-judge federal court has rejected suits to block plans by independent political committees to raise millions of dollars to support the presidential campaign of Republican Ronald Reagan.

In two brief orders Thursday, without written opinions, the court turned down challenges by the Federal Election Commission and Common Cause. It said the decisions were expedited because of the nature of the case and that written explanations will follow later.

The FEC had asked the court to uphold the constitutionality of a portion of the campaign financing law that prohibits unauthorized political committees from spending more than \$1,000 on behalf of candidates who accept public financing.

Common Cause, while joining in the constitutionality challenge, contended in a separate suit that the committees were not truly independent because their activities and officials were closely related to the Reagan campaign.

It was unclear whether the court, in the FEC case, had found the law unconstitutional or decided it was inapplicable to the case. The committees had contended that the \$1,000 limit did not apply to committees which are independent of the candidate.

In the Common Cause case, the court dismissed the question about the committees' independence for lack of jurisdiction. The committees had contended that challenges to their independence would have to be made first to the FEC.

The FEC went to court for a constitutional ruling after the Democratic National Committee and President Carter's reelection campaign complained that the Reagan campaign should not get public financing if it was to benefit from money raised by independent committees established by prominent Republicans.

Both Reagan and Carter have been certified to receive \$29.4 million of public funds for their presidential campaigns.

Boston remains 'troubled'

By DANIEL Q. HANEY

BOSTON (AP) — When court-ordered busing began in 1974, the code word for Boston schools was "troubled." The label is still appropriate — this time because of a budget crisis, a teachers' strike threat and the firing of the school superintendent.

When schools open Wednesday for Boston's 65,000 public school students, they will be run by a temporary chief administrator, no budget will be in effect, and teachers may be off the job. Busing, which has brought sporadic violence, is in the background for now.

The latest imbroglio surfaced two weeks ago when the Boston School Committee fired Robert C. Wood, school superintendent for two years.

Wood, 56, is a former secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and former president of the University of Massachusetts. His hiring broke with the tradition of promoting from within, and some fear his departure will disrupt efforts to upgrade the schools.

The schools are run by the School Committee, a five-member, unpaid board that has long been a stepping stone in politics. Two moderate members gave up seats in the last election, one after an unsuccessful bid for the U.S. Senate and the other to run in vain for mayor. Their replacements made for a new, more conservative panel.

Wood had riled some long-time school employees by hiring young, idealistic out-of-towners to help run the department.

"There's been trouble here between members of the old guard and the new guard," said Mary Ellen Smith, a Wood aide who is leaving voluntarily. "Some of the new people flaunted their authority and refused to try to work with people who have been here for years and years. They showed a lot of insensitivity."

The movement to oust Wood seemed to gain strength Aug. 7, when the committee rejected his choice of an outsider to run a new \$35 million

vocational center. Wood angrily walked out of the meeting.

Committee President John J. McDonough described that action as "really bush." But he said Wood was fired because he built up an \$18 million budget deficit. McDonough denies Wood's claim that he was a victim of patronage politics.

"We were busting up an old network," Wood said. "Now I see it going back to the old patronage ways. The new committee is really old politics."

Bush attacks Carter again

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — George Bush assailed President Carter again Friday for failing to resolve the 300-day-old Iranian hostage crisis, but conceded he didn't have a plan for gaining the release of 52 Americans held hostage there.

At a news conference preceding a rally in Portland, Maine, the Republican vice presidential nominee told reporters the hostages were languishing in the Persian Gulf nation because of Carter's "failed foreign policy."

But when asked what he would do to win their release, the former United Nations ambassador replied: "I have no specific answer, nor am I empowered to come up with one."

During his unsuccessful campaign for the GOP presidential nomination, Bush had repeatedly assailed Carter's efforts on behalf of the hostages, taken captive by militant Islamic students last Nov. 4.

Bush, preparing for an intensive campaign schedule, also accused Carter of making a "shambles" of the nation's economy.

He said Carter's proposed \$27.6 billion tax cut would represent little in the way of savings for the typical American worker earning \$15,000 a year.

But Bush also said he did not know the impact on that same worker of Ronald Reagan's economic program.

At a news conference at Portland Jetport before an outdoor rally, Bush acknowledged that Reagan's

plan probably would produce a budget deficit for a year or so, "given the sorry economic situation it looks like he (Reagan) is going to inherit."

Bush would not estimate how much the Reagan deficit would be, nor whether it would be more or less than that resulting from Carter's economic recovery program.

Following the news conference and rally, Bush planned to fly to New Jersey, embarking on an intensive campaign schedule with few letups between now and Election Day on Nov. 4.

Reagan, meantime, met with key campaign advisers on Friday at his new home in Middleburg, Va., not far from the nation's capital.

Reagan meets with top aides

MIDDLEBURG, Va. (AP) — Ronald Reagan met privately Friday with top campaign aides after a couple of rocky weeks in his quest for the White House.

For the past two weeks the Republican presidential candidate has found his campaign to oust President Carter from the White House has been dominated by his remarks on Taiwan.

The former California governor and his running mate, George Bush, became embroiled in a controversy over Reagan's call for formal or official relations between the United States and Taiwan. Both men subsequently emphasized that nothing would be done under a Reagan administration that would harm the U.S. relationship with the People's Republic of China on the main-

land. Also, the wide lead Reagan enjoyed in public opinion polls after the Republican National Convention in July has evaporated and most polls now show the race a toss-up.

Among those meeting with Reagan at his rented estate 50 miles west of Washington were William Casey, campaign manager, and senior aides Lyn Nofziger, Edwin Meese, Michael Deaver, Richard Wirthlin, James Baker, Drew Lewis, Anne Armstrong, and media adviser Peter Daley.

Palestinian families moved

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel ordered three Palestinian families out of their homes in Arab East Jerusalem adjacent to the new office building Prime Minister Menachem Begin is to occupy, officials said Friday.

Political observers interpreted the order as a sign that Begin intends to move into his new office in the Arab sector despite protests from the United States and the diplomatic storm over Israel's new law declaring Jerusalem its undivided capital.

In Cairo the Egyptian government said it will not resume the Palestinian autonomy talks unless U.S. envoy Sol Linowitz convinces Israel to change its stance on Jerusalem.

The statement published Friday in the semi-official newspaper Al Ahran came on the eve of Linowitz's visit to Egypt and Israel to negotiate a return to the bargaining table. Egypt suspended the talks earlier this month to protest the Jerusalem matter.

"The success of the Linowitz mission in the region is hinged on his success in changing the Israeli rigid stance that imposed a fait accompli (the Jerusalem law) during the negotiation process," the newspaper quoted a government official as saying.

"But the mere call for resuming the talks as if the negotiations are a target in themselves would be productive only if Washington adopted a new policy for pushing forward the peace process," it said.

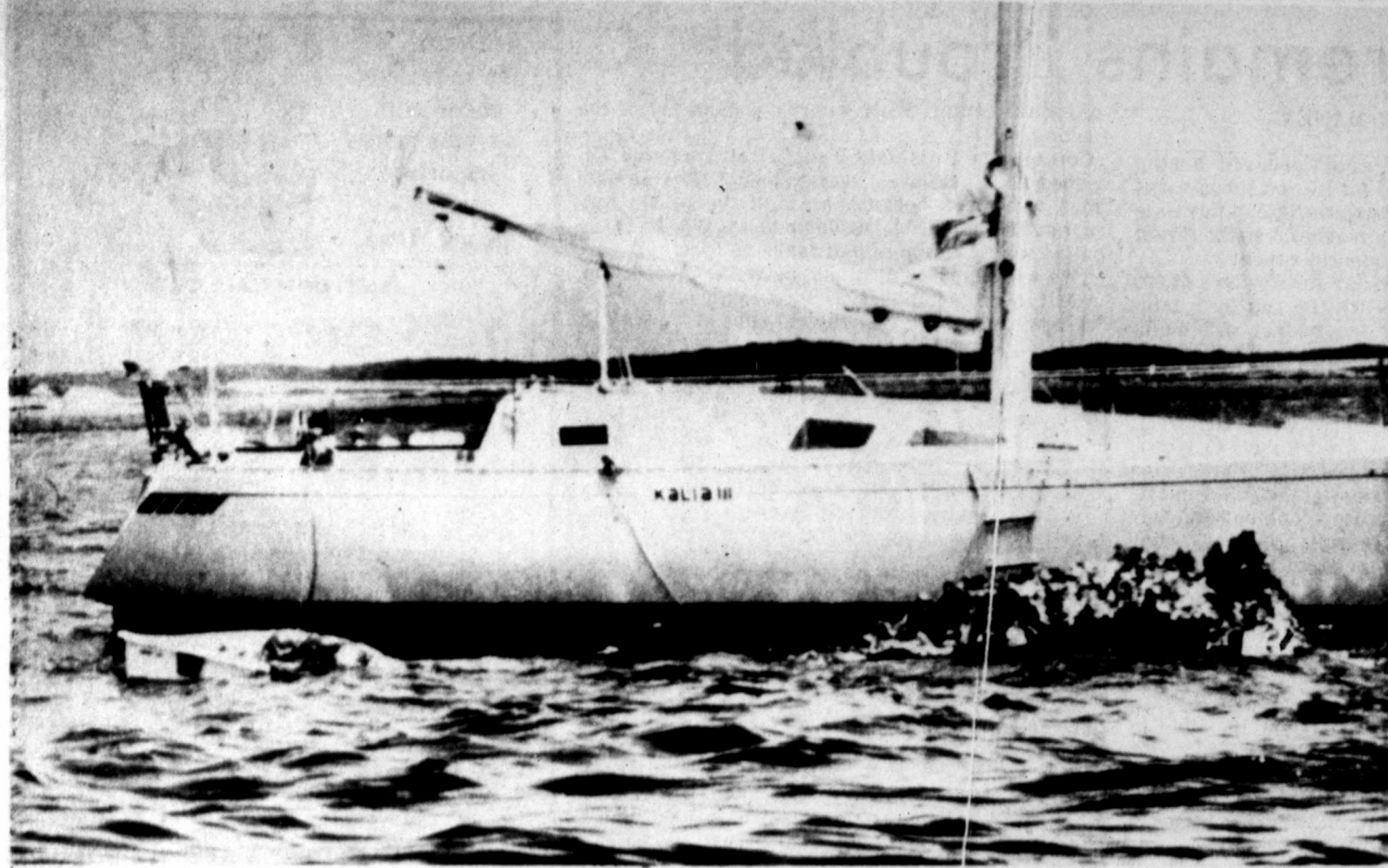
In other developments: An Israeli court sentenced an Arab from the occupied West Bank of the Jordan River to 25 years in prison for terrorism, and police worked to stop a spate of small terrorist bombings this week in southern and central Israel.

In Kuwait, Palestinian guerrilla leader Yasser Arafat said this week's dogfight between Syrian and Israeli jets heralds an escalation of conflict not only in southern Lebanon, but in the entire Middle East, according to the Kuwait newspaper Al-Qabas. Israeli jets shot down a Syrian MiG jet Sunday over southern Lebanon.

Egyptian Vice President Hosni Mubarak arrived in Bonn, West Germany, on the first step of a lengthy European visit to discuss Middle East developments.

Sources who declined to be named said Mubarak and German Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher would discuss Israel's controversial moves in Jerusalem.

—In Beirut, Lebanon, dissident groups of right-wing Christian militiamen fought gunbattles in a Christian quarter. Preliminary reports said one militia commander was killed and another slightly wounded. The wounded man was identified as Dany Chamoun, son of former president Camille Chamoun and commander of the "Tigers," the military wing of the National Liberal Party.

Bahama mystery continues

Son fears fate of missing parents

CHICAGO (AP) — The son of a Florida couple missing in Bahamian waters says his parents "may have been slaughtered by pirates, picked off like moving targets on the open sea" and no one cares.

One who does care is state Rep. Harry Yourell, who says he found a man's body aboard the blood-stained yacht of William and Patti Kamerer on July 31 while on vacation in the area, and has photographs to prove it. Yourell seeks a U.S. State Department inquiry.

The legislator says he found the body hanging over the side of a dinghy attached to the Kamerer's yacht Kalia III by a rope. The yacht was jammed on a rock near Pipe Cay, he said, and he could not tow it to port.

When Bahamian police arrived 18 hours after Yourell reported the discovery, there was no body with the boat, they said.

Both U.S. and Bahamian officials have said they could find no bodies or evidence of crime. And U.S. officials say they have no jurisdiction, although the U.S. consul did look into the matter.

"The plight of our family has been ignored," said Bill Kamerer Jr., 27, of Rochester, Minn., the missing couple's son. "The State Department has done nothing, except to say they can do nothing."

Yourell was with his son on a power boat when they found the yacht, he said. He radioed the nearby Staniel Cay Yacht Club, and they called officials in Nassau.

He said in a telephone interview Friday that he went aboard the Kalia III to anchor the vessel and prevent it from drifting out

to sea with the tide. He said he did not search the boat because he did not want to disturb evidence, but that the cockpit was ransacked, there were bullet holes near the galley and there was blood everywhere.

"These people were American citizens and their families are going through a nightmare wondering what hellish thing happened to the couple sailing into what they thought was paradise," he said.

The middle-aged couple set out from Fort Myers Beach in early July. The last entry Mrs. Kamerer made in the ship's log, dated 5 p.m. July 26, said: "Moored at Pipe Cay."

When the Yourells reached Staniel Cay, Nassau police Capt. Bradley Platt told him an airplane crew had flown over the boat and spotted the body, Yourell said. He said the Bahamians told him they suspected the couple to be victims of piracy.

U.S. Embassy Vice Consul Phillip Wall checked the boat after it was towed to a Bahamian military base. He said bloodstains in the cockpit were the only evidence of violence.

"No body — no crime. And the U.S. claims they have no jurisdiction. I can't believe it. Thank God I took the pictures," Yourell said.

"We are aware of the case, but we must rely on the integrity of the Bahamian police to conduct an investigation," said Jack Komitor, a consular official at the State Department's Citizen's Emergency Center.

"It is an area of drug runners, and it isn't the first time Americans have disappeared."

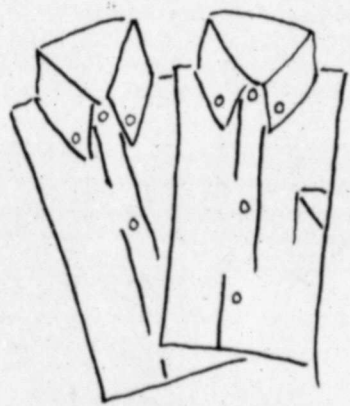

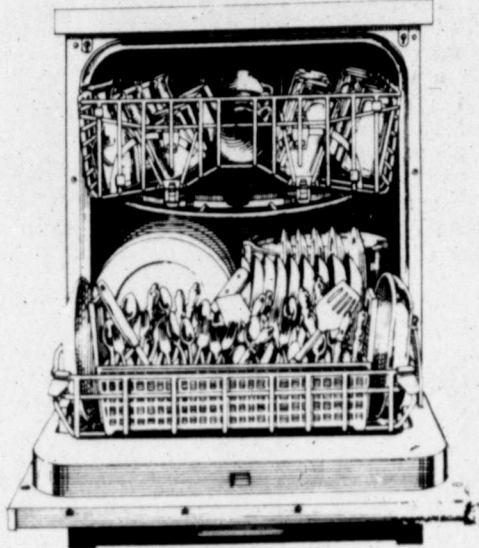

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States, citing recent terrorist incidents "which appear to have had Iraqi involvement or support," turned down Friday an Iraqi request for the purchase of five Boeing jetliners.

A brief statement issued by the State Department offered no elaboration but informed sources, asking not to be named, said the rejection was based on separate incidents several weeks ago in West Berlin and in Vienna.

Iraq had sought the purchase of three 727 Boeing jetliners and two 747s. The State Department statement said the rejection of the request was based on "the clear sentiment of the Congress with respect to international terrorism."

On Aug. 1, West Berlin police seized two Iraqi diplomats after they allegedly delivered a suitcase full of explosives for the purpose of attacking an association of Kurdish students. The Kurds are a Moslem minority seeking autonomy in Iraq.

Chuck Fusina leads Bucs over 'Skins

Tampa Bay reserve quarterback Chuck Fusina scored a fourth-quarter touchdown and the Buccaneers benefited from a pair of safeties to post an 11-6 National Football League preseason victory over the Washington Redskins Friday night.

Fusina, a second-year pro from Penn State, directed a 59-yard scoring drive in the waning minutes and ran the final four for a touchdown which gave the Bucs a 9-6 lead with 3:34 remaining. Highlighting the drive was a 31-yard pass to wide receiver Danny Buggs and a 10-yarder to tight end Jim O'Bradovich.

Tampa's other scores both came on safeties as Redskins punter Mike Connell's chased down bad snaps from center and was tackled in the end zone.

Washington took a 6-0 lead in the second quarter on field goals of 32 and 42 yards by Mark Moseley. The Bucs closed the margin to 6-2 in the third period when Redskins center Ted Fritsch, centering from the Tampa 47-yard line, hiked the ball over Connell's head. The Washington punter raced back, picked the ball up at his own 18 and ran into the end zone.

Fusina's touchdown put the Bucs ahead and the second safety with a minute left made it 11-6. On that play Fritsch hiked the ball from the 37, Connell ran it down at the three and ran into the end zone.

Tampa Bay improved its preseason record to 3-1, while Washington dropped to 3-1.

The simmering Texas League West Division pennant race boiled down to the final night of the season with Midland's Cubs facing a "must-win" situation and needing, at the same time, an El Paso victory over Amarillo in the final night of the regular season tonight.

The Cubs and Gold Sox remained in a flat-footed tie for first after both notched wins Friday night.

The Cubs squeezing the final drop of drama from every game as well as the season again held off the San Antonio Dodgers at the wire for a 9-8 win before 1,170 fans at Cobs Stadium Friday night while Amarillo reeled off its fourth straight victory over El Paso, 3-1, in the Border City.

Paul Semall, who will be married at 1 p. m. today on the pitcher's mound at Cobs Stadium, will take the mound at 7:30 p. m. in quest of his 10th victory and perhaps a second half pennant. Ricky Wright, 7-9, former University of Texas, hurler will go for the Dodgers.

The season's final night also will be Fan Appreciation Night. There was high drama in the ninth inning Friday when lefthander Norm Churchill stalked out of the bullpen in to relieve the Cubs' Super Saver in recent weeks, Herman Segelke, with the score 9-7, one out and runners on second and third.

The southpaw got Tom Beyers, who yanked a two-run homer over the right field fence in the first, on a sacrifice fly to center. That left only Dale Holman to dispose of. Holman had walked, singled in the third, homered in the sixth and his two-run homer in the eighth had whittled Midland's 9-5 lead to 9-7.

Holman fouled off three pitches after the count reached three-two before Churchill whipped a swinging third strike by him to end the game. For the Cubs, Tom Grant's bases loaded in the triple in the four-run third and Randy La Vigne's two-run double in the seventh were the big hits, but it was Dave Stockstill's run-producing single to left after La Vigne's double that drove home what proved to be the winning run, giving the Cubs a 9-5 lead at the time.

Dallas Tornado coach resigns

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas Tornado head coach Al Miller says an inability to reach a contract compromise prompted him to submit his resignation after five years with the North American Soccer League team.

He said he reached the decision Wednesday after two contract discussions with general manager Kent Kramer failed to "meet at a middle ground" on the new contract. "No way do I want to leave here," Miller said Thursday, his voice cracking with emotion, "but this decision had to be made. It is a very complex and complicated situation. There has been a lot of misunderstanding, and a problem with communication."

A major area of disagreement concerned the Tornado's participation in a winter indoor soccer league, sanctioned by the NASL. Miller said he wanted more money for the extra games; Kramer said no. "I made the gut decision that if I was going to stay on as the Dallas coach, I wanted to get reimbursed for the indoor season," Miller said. "This game is not a money-making proposition right now," said Kramer, explaining the team management did not think it could afford the higher salary Miller wanted. "We made offers. He did not accept them."

Dodgers lose Smith

LOS ANGELES (AP) — All-star rightfielder Reggie Smith of the Los Angeles Dodgers will undergo surgery on his right shoulder next week and is lost for the rest of the season, the Dodgers said Friday night.

Smith injured the shoulder in his throwing arm six weeks ago. He was put on the 15-day disable list last week, and the decision to have surgery was made after a Friday evening examination by Dodgers' team physician Dr. Frank Jobe.

Because of his age, 35, Smith had said recently that he wanted to avoid surgery that might end his baseball career prematurely.

Dallas, Pittsburgh to set off sparks

It's not the Super Bowl. It doesn't count in the standings. But whenever the Dallas Cowboys and Pittsburgh Steelers get together, sparks fly.

Dallas hasn't lost to the Steelers in an exhibition game in six years—but when the games count, it's a different matter. In that same stretch, with the standings or titles on the line, Pittsburgh has won four from the Cowboys including a 14-3 mauling last year and two Super Bowls before that.

Tonight's exhibition will no doubt gear up each team for its season opener, and each one of those will be a beauty—Pittsburgh taking on division and playoff rival Houston on Sept. 7 and the Cowboys visiting division rival Washington the next night.

Dallas goes into the game unbeaten in the preseason with close victories over Green Bay, Los Angeles and Houston. The Steelers, 2-1, beat the New York Giants and Atlanta and lost to the New York Jets.

The game will start at 8 p. m. in Texas Stadium. "I'm surprised we're 3-0," Cowboys Coach Tom Landry said. "We very easily could have lost any of the three games. But I'm satisfied. Winning is winning and it's very important for us to get off to a good start this year."

Tonight's other National Football League exhibitions are San Diego at Los Angeles, St. Louis at Chicago, Denver at Green Bay, Detroit at Cincinnati, the New York Jets at the New York Giants, Cleveland at Minnesota,

Philadelphia at Oakland, and Kansas City vs. San Francisco at Tucson, Ariz.

In Friday night's games, it was Washington at Tampa Bay, Baltimore at Atlanta, New England at Seattle and Miami at Houston.

On Thursday night, Houston beat Buffalo 24-7. The Steelers, who won't have to chase the retired Roger Staubach this time, will give the Cowboys' new quarterback, Danny White, a taste of the tough life in this Texas Stadium meeting. And Terry Bradshaw, his counterpart with Pittsburgh, will be out to prove that his marital problems aren't getting in the way of his game.

Landry said White has "had a good summer," particularly a week ago when he rallied the Cowboys to a 20-13 victory over intrastate rival Houston. "He did as Roger does in that game," Landry said. "That drive was very significant to this team."

It's not certain whether running back Tony Dorsett will play for Dallas. He has a deep thigh bruise. At fullback, veteran Robert Newhouse and second-year man Ron Springs will be battling for the starting job. In Los Angeles, the great quarterback battle enters its final round with Pat Haden and Vince Ferragamo dueling for the Rams' starting job. Haden was No. 1 last year although he was injured midway in the season and watched Ferragamo guide the Rams into the Super Bowl. Coach Ray Malavasi has said a starter doesn't lose his job because of an injury, and each quarterback has performed admirably in the exhibitions so far.

Pass defense, fumbles mar Purple Pack's performance

SAN ANGELO — "We've got an awful long way to go before we are a competitive football team," said new Midland High coach Pat Cuipepper following a 2-2 Mexican standoff with the Brownwood Lions on the Angelo State University campus Friday night.

The scrimmage sets the stage for the season opener Friday in Amarillo against Tascosa's Rebels.

Midland tailback Jerry Zachery had a brilliant night running by picking up 218 yards in 28 carries, but the 200-pound senior also coughed up the football three different times. "We've got to learn to tuck the ball in after we get hit or we are in deep trouble," Cuipepper said afterwards.

On one drive, the Bulldogs went 75 yards only to lose the ball on a fumble and the Lions alertly took advantage of six MHS turnovers.

"We did hit hard on defense, but our secondary needs a lot of work. Brownwood burned us good on deep patterns and I would imagine Tascosa will use of crossing patterns against us Friday after watching our poor pass defense."

Midland opened the scrimmage by putting the ball into play on their own 20 and then drove to the Lion 10 only to lose the ball. Besides fumbling away the football four times, quarterback Michael Feldt also had two passes intercepted by Brownwood's Greg Williams and Terry Wilde.

On the plus side, Feldt played both ways on offense and defense and really stood out at the free safety slot for the Bulldogs. The gifted senior made several key hits in the secondary and ran well in testing a knee that was hurt last year.

The Bulldogs' secondary got burned early in the scrimmage when quarterback Tim Oehalen hit Bill Donahugh with an 80-yard TD bomb on its first possession. Oehalen also hit Williams with a 17-yard touchdown for a 2-0 lead before the Bulldogs scored. Gene Gibson was another of Oehalen's favorite targets during the scrimmage.

Elston Montgomery, Gary Willis, Lance Langford, Feldt, Scott Yocham and Matt Carr stood out on defense for Cuipepper's crew. On Brownwood's third possession, Carr knocked Mark Campbell loose from the ball with Montgomery recovering

for MHS. While Zachery gained 218 yards, fullback Johnny Garza and Yocham also ran well and Feldt picked up some key gains.

Midland pretty well shut down the run, but the pass was something else.

Zachery's four-yard touchdown run capped a 70-yard TD drive for Midland to cut the Brownwood lead to 2-1, but the Lions cranked up and marched all the way to the Bulldog eight where Gibson dropped a sure TD pass from Oehalen. The ball was moved all the way back to the Lion 30 where Langford pulled off his heroics.

He picked off a swing pass and returned it 30 yards for the second Midland score to tie the scrimmage at 2-2.

The Midland Bullpups took a 3-0 win in the junior varsity scrimmage with Wesley Williams, Scott Sears and David Nelson standing out. In fact, Williams broke for 75 yards and a TD on Midland's first possession. He also had a short four-yard TD run and Sears dialed Nelson's number for the third TD on the final play of the scrimmage from 17 yards out.

John Blake, an Oriole spokesman, said third base Coach Cal Ripken was expected to run the team in Weaver's absence.

Blake also said Weaver would pay a fine to the league office soon.

MacPhail suspended and fined Weaver an undisclosed amount in connection with a ruckus during the Orioles' game with the New York Yankees Aug. 16.

Lake who joined the Mustangs only a week ago, had a tough 13-yard carry to the 1.

Andrea Jaeger continues phenomenal tennis rise at Open

NEW YORK (AP) — Andrea Jaeger, tennis' newest wunderkind, made her debut at the 1980 U.S. Open an impressive one with a 6-0, 6-2 second-round victory Friday over Jeanne DuVall.

"I'm not going to put pressure on myself by predicting how far I might go," said the 15-year-old Jaeger, who had a first-round bye. "I'm here to have fun, gain experience and do the best I can."

Jaeger's best was far too much for the 21-year-old DuVall, a baseline player with few attacking weapons.

Jaeger, her blonde hair bouncing around in two floppy pony tails, returned virtually everything hit in her direction with strong groundstrokes, occasionally venturing to the net behind deep approach shots. She won the first nine games of the match and was never in any trouble.

Also enjoying an easy second-round match was third-seeded Jimmy Connors, who blasted Butch Waltz 6-3, 6-1, 6-3 in his second strong showing here. Connors won this event in 1974, 1976 and 1978 and is eager to keep up his string of successes in even years.

"Today's scores weren't close," said Connors, "but we played good tennis out there. Believe me, I was hitting some shots."

John McEnroe, who dethroned Connors last year and is seeded second behind Bjorn Borg, had a tough first set but then eased into the third round with a 7-6, 6-0, 6-2 victory over Steve Kruevitz.

Ilie Nastase, the 1972 Open champion but unseeded this year, looked tired and sluggish in the humid weather and lost to No. 7 Harold Solomon 6-2, 6-2, 6-2.

Nastase, who was fined \$50 for misbehaving in his first round match,

was twice penalized points — once for an obscenity and once for throwing a ball at the umpire. He was fined an additional \$504 Friday by the Grand Prix supervisor for twice throwing balls at officials.

Two other seeded men also advanced to the third round. No. 10 Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia beat Chris Mayotte 6-2, 6-2 and No. 13 Brian Gottfried defeated Tim Gullikson 6-3, 6-2, 7-6.

The afternoon matches drew a total crowd of 20,026, the most ever to watch a session of any tennis tournament — except Wimbledon, which sells grounds passes as well as stadium seats. The paid crowd was 17,872.

Jaeger's game is mature beyond her years, but there is still ample teenager in her. She's trying hard to achieve the right mix between 15-year-old girl and touring tennis pro.

"I don't think I'm missing out on anything," she said. "I have a better life than any 15-year-old I know. I'm having a good time on the tour, I'm enjoying school, I have a good family and lots of friends. What more could any 15-year-old want?"

Still, life is not all fun and games.

"Tennis is now work for me," she said. "Once you turn pro, you don't just wear a T-shirt, goof around and do what you want. As a pro, if you have a contract to wear certain clothes, you wear them. That's being a pro, contracts and endorsements and all that."

"But the game itself, that's still fun."

Jaeger, who was the youngest person ever to make the main draw here when she competed as an amateur last year, lost to the eventual cham-

Champion, Tracy Austin, 6-2, 6-2 in the second round. This year she is seeded eighth and coming off a victory over Austin in the semifinals of a tournament at Mahwah, N.J., last week.

"Last year I didn't go out with a very positive attitude and I got killed," she said. "Now it's different. I think I've gone pretty far in a year."

Far enough to know the difference between the juniors and the touring pros.

"The pros are so much more experienced, and that means so much," she said. "Juniors might get ahead against pros, but then they tighten up and lose because of a lack of experience. Even now I have that problem. Once I played Chris Evert Lloyd and when it got close, she just pulled away and won."

Second-seeded Martina Navratilova, who struggled to a 6-1, 4-6, 6-2 second-round victory over Leslie Allen, observed that a new wave of youngsters, led by Jaeger, had made its mark on women's tennis and that the older players were getting "older and worse." Navratilova numbered herself among the latter.

"That's funny," said Jaeger. "I sure don't think Martina's getting any worse, or Chris. I think people get the idea that because juniors come up and do well right away, after they're around for a couple of years. Like Tracy — people consider her old because she's been around for a couple of years, and because of me."

"But she's only 17."

Cards name Herzog as GM

ST. LOUIS (AP) — In a surprise move, the St. Louis Cardinals Friday named Whitey Herzog their general manager and appointed Red Schoendienst interim manager.

Herzog, 49, was named manager of the club June 8, replacing Ken Boyer, who was fired. Schoendienst, who managed the club for 12 seasons beginning in 1965, has been a St. Louis coach the past two seasons.

"When Whitey Herzog was named Cardinal manager last June, we were aware we were getting one of the top managers in baseball," said an announcement from August A. Busch Jr., board chairman.

"But we also knew we were getting a man with total baseball experience, including significant experience in the front office. At the time, Whitey's broad experience was a bonus to us. But as soon as the position of general manager became open, we began to

consider him immediately as an obvious candidate."

Herzog, who led Kansas City to American League West Division titles in 1976, 1977 and 1978, was fired by the Royals following a second-place finish in 1979.

As cards manager, he has guided the club to a 38-35 record. When he took over, the team was 18-34. As general manager, he takes over the general manager's post left vacant Aug. 18 by the firing of John Claiborne.

"Decisions made this season can have a very great effect on the team's performance in the 1981 season and beyond," Busch's announcement said. "We felt it was critical to fill this position — one of the most critical in the Cardinal organization — as soon as possible."

Herzog also has managed the Texas Rangers and served as a scout and a

ENDICOTT, N.Y. (AP) — Lee Trevino made up for a poor first round by blistering the En-Joie Golf Club course Friday with a 7-under-par 64 to share the halfway lead with three other golfers in the \$275,000 B.C. Open.

Tied with Trevino at 6-under-par 136 were Peter Jacobsen, who got his first Professional Golfers' Association tour victory last week, first-round leader Artie McNickle and defending champion Howard Twitty.

Jacobsen shot a 5-under-par 66 — second-best of the day — to catch McNickle, while Twitty had rounds of 67-69. McNickle, who fired a 66 Thursday, shot 70.

"I three-putted the first hole yesterday," said Trevino, who had a lackluster opening round 72. "I didn't even go to the practice tee today. I just started over from my room about 15 to one, got my cleats and some balls and teed it up."

That made him the fastest of the second-day qualifiers and put his car on the inside of the eighth row for Sunday's \$290,000 race at Ontario Motor

Speedway.

Carter, 30 years old and a former midget and sprint car champion, had the misfortune Thursday of hitting the wall after sliding in a pool of oil dumped from a blown engine in another car.

Carter's crew worked through the night to reassemble the battered car and get it back onto the track in time to qualify Friday.

"We had to replace the engine, some of the transmission case, the left rear upright, wing plates, camber rods and shocks," Carter said.

"But the car feels good and we can run 184 or 186 on race day. That's about all we need to run. I don't think these guys (the top qualifiers) can run 190s on race day."

Defending champion Bobby Unser won the pole Thursday with a two-lap average of 195.200 mph, with Rick Mears second at 191.396. Johnny Rutherford also made the front row of the 11-row grid with a 189.685.

Eleven cars managed to get through time trials Friday before the qualifying session was officially closed.

Championship Auto Racing Teams, the sanctioning group for the race, chose Roger Rager, 20th on the current point list, to fill the last position on the basis that his ranking was the highest among drivers with non-qualified cars.

Unzers are very different, but Albuquerque is still home

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — The main tourist attractions in this largest of New Mexico cities are the Sandia Peak Tramway, the pueblo-style architecture of the University of New Mexico and Old Town, a 250-year-old antiquity.

The Chamber of Commerce is missing a bet. Overlooked is an item that helps keep Albuquerque's dateline in the news.

Bobby and Al Unzer live here. Bobby, 46, winner of two Indianapolis 500s, three California 500s and two national driving championships. Al, 41, winner of three Indianapolis 500s, two California 500s and one driving championship.

Their homes are west of town, across the Rio Grande from bustling downtown Albuquerque, on the remains of Route 66, that legendary ribbon of concrete that connected Los Angeles with Chicago back before there were freeways. Route 66 was

the "Main Street of America" in the '30s and that's why the Unzer family set its roots here. When cars came rattling and steaming across the great deserts of Arizona and New Mexico, the first garage they saw was Unzer's.

Route 66 is all but deserted now. Interstate 40 carries the flow of cars through Albuquerque today and what was once Route 66 is now Central Ave. The Unzer like it that way. Even if you know they live here, it takes a sharp eye to spot their homes — Bobby's on the south side and Al's across the highway.

There's an old white stucco building that looks as if it might have been a garage. A cement walk across a dusty parking lot, past a corral with spotted deer, leads to a rambling adobe-style ranch house, that's where Bobby and Marsha Unzer live.

From the garage — it's the original one Daddy Unzer built that Bobby has turned into a racing shop — you can look across Route 66 and see a wrecking yard of rotting cars. Leaning

against a corrugated tin building is another sign: UNSER WRECKERS. Off to the right is a residence. That's where Al and Karen Unzer live.

The wrecking yard was Al's principal source of income until he won the Indianapolis 500 in 1970. His check was \$71,897.

"When I came home I gave the crew two weeks notice, locked the gates and that was the end of my wrecking business," said Al. The broken cars are still there, desert grass and weeds creeping up their sides, tumbleweeds their only attendants.

The brothers grew up playing, catching snakes, working on cars and brawling together in the desert. They are close yet their lifestyles are light years apart.

Bobby is outgoing, confident to the point of appearing arrogant, a gregarious individual who wants to meet everybody, do everything and be in the spotlight. Racing's man in motion.

Al is quiet, introspective, likes nothing more than to be left alone. He

shuns the limelight, preferring the company of his wife and a close friend or two to a party atmosphere.

Bobby's home is a racing museum. Pictures, trophies, helmets, racing paraphernalia line the walls, file cabinets occupy most of a giant-size den. Much of the time his home is an airplane. Bobby spent only 40 to 45 days here last year.

He tests and races exotic ground-effects cars for Roger Penske — winning three championship car races this year — and builds and prepares cars for Dick Ferguson (Formula Ford), Rich Galles (Sports 2000 series), son Robbie (go-karts) and himself (Pikes Peak car). And he is involved in 10 businesses — Clayton Manufacturing (dynamometers), XRG fuel additives, KYB shocks, Heublein (Ortega chili from Mom Unzer's recipe), Goodyear (tires), Chevrolet (dealership in Phoenix), Chalfont Industries (Stop-a-Flat), SK tools for mechanics, Polaris snowmobiles and Farrah clothing.

"Bobby makes a personal appear-

ance, either as a spokesman at a convention or doing a commercial, or a visit to a firm to chat with the personnel, nearly once a week," says Bruce Barnes, the Unzers' business representative. "Al, on the other hand, doesn't care for that sort of thing."

Al represents only Polaris, American Motors Corp., Valvoline and SK tools. His participation is usually limited to appearing in commercials and putting their decal on his race car.

Al, when he's not testing Bobby Hillin's new longhorn car in Midland, Texas, or racing in one of CART's championship races, is either at home, restoring an antique car or swimming in his backyard pool, or at his ranch in Chama, in the northwest

corner of the state.

Although Al and Bobby operate on different wave lengths they remain fiercely competitive, on and off the race track.

Both are among racing's finest test drivers. It was Bobby who wrung out Dan Gurney's Eagle that broke the 200 mph barrier in the early '70s and he did the development work for the Penske cars that finished 1-2-3 in last year's California 500.

The brothers will match wits and horsepower this week in the 11th annual California 500 at Ontario Motor Speedway. Bobby's Penske and Al's Longhorn are the major threats to Johnny Rutherford's favored Midland Chapparal of Jim Hall in the \$300,000 race.

Tampa vs. Taiwan in LL series final

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. (AP) — Tyrone Griffin, 12-year-old shortstop from Tampa, Fla., does drum solos with the bamboo chopsticks he was given by a player from Taiwan.

"We tried to get them to teach us karate, but they wouldn't," said Griffin, who will suit up against Taiwan today in the championship game of the 34th annual Little League World Series.

Relaxing outside the dining hall in the Little League barracks area, Griffin looked at ease for a guy awaiting the biggest ballgame of his life. It was the same with his teammates, an all-star squad picked from Tampa's Belmont Heights Little League.

"It's nice to be here. Taiwan is pretty good, but I think we'll beat them," said the 5-foot-2, 95-pound Griffin, who hit two of the four home runs that helped Tampa beat Kirkland, Wash., 16-0 in Thursday's semifinals.

TAIWAN, SEEKING its fourth title in a row, and ninth in 12 years, hit a record seven homers in a 23-0 semifinal victory over Canada.

Competition aside, the players from Tampa and Taiwan live in adjacent barracks in a wooded area overlooking the Little League field, where a crowd of 30,000 is expected for the final.

"They're nice. We play together," said Griffin. "We play with a little plastic ball, throw frisbees, play chase and things like that."

When they leave the barracks area, the players from Taiwan are followed by youthful autograph seekers.

One Taiwan player printed up his own calling cards. "Shun-Chi Kuo, catcher, Little League Baseball team, Republic of China," say the cards, which also carry Kuo's home address and telephone number.

"They (the players) say they are proud and very happy to be here. They love mixing and making new friends," said an interpreter from Drexel University.

Tampa's pitcher in Saturday's final will be either Kirk "Dr. Poo" Walker or Dallas "The Junkman" Brown.

Griffin wasn't sure where Walker got his nickname, but he knows how Brown got his and it has nothing to do with his pitching style.

"Dallas keeps his room real junky and messy," Griffin said.

TAIWAN WILL pitch Shuh-Shin Li, who tossed a two-hitter against Latin America and had two homers against Canada.

"I never say I'm an underdog," said Tampa Manager Vernard Seider, whose players average about three to five inches shorter than the Taiwanese, most of whom are 5-5 or better.

"Just like they hit the ball, we hit the ball. They've got to throw to us and we've got to throw to them. We'll play ball," said Seider.

Last year, Campbell, Calif., lost 2-1 to a team from Pu-Tzu Town, Taiwan, in two extra innings. This year, Taiwan is represented by an all-star team from the province of Hua Lian.

"There are three teams (in Taiwan) who are very competitive, and we lost two games to them," Taiwan manager Ching-Con Hsiao, said through the interpreter.

Today's final will be televised live in Taiwan, beginning at 2 a.m. there. The game starts at 1 p.m. CDT.

Pittsburgh Pirates team captain Willie Stargell, currently on the disabled list, will provide color commentary for ABC, which will televise the game in the United States at 4 p.m.

In consolation games Friday: —Pawtucket, R.I., defeated the team from the U.S. Air Force base in Madrid, Spain 6-0 behind the two-hit pitching of Steve Bergeron, the tallest player in the tournament at 6-foot and a lean 123 pounds. Pawtucket placed seventh and the Air Force team was eighth in the tournament.

—Al Gallardo pitched a three-hitter with 14 strikeouts in six innings to lead Des Moines, Iowa to a 2-0 victory over Latin America. Des Moines's Mike Stralte snapped a scoreless tie with a run-scoring single in the top of the sixth, and another run scored on a throwing error. The victory gave Des Moines fifth place and Latin America was sixth.

Canada met Kirkland, Wash., late Friday in the third-place consolation game.

Abscam jurors consider fate of Myers, 3 others

NEW YORK (AP) — The nation's first Abscam trial went to the jury Friday, with the panel asked to decide whether U.S. Rep. Michael Myers and three co-defendants had conspired to take a \$50,000 bribe to help a fictitious Arab sheik with immigration matters.

That the Philadelphia congressman actually took the money was not in dispute — undercover FBI agents posing as the phony sheik's representatives videotaped the transaction.

and the tapes were presented as evidence.

However, Myers and his co-defendants insisted there was no intent to actually assist the sheik or to perform any official acts on his behalf. Myers testified he took the cash as "easy money."

Deliberations by the panel of nine women and three men began shortly before noon after U.S. District Judge George C. Pratt instructed them on legal issues. Over defense objections, the judge told the jury a defendant has "a motive to lie."

Casino plans to open tables

STATELINE, Nev. (AP) — Operators of a bombed-out casino said Friday they would reopen some of their gambling tables, hoping to cash in on the crowds of curious onlookers the governor predicted would be drawn to the resort.

A small section of Harvey's Resort Hotel-Casino was scheduled to resume operation Friday evening, offering gambling, drinks, meals and a gift shop.

Guards were hired to keep customers away from areas damaged when an extortionist's bomb exploded Wednesday, doing more than \$3 million damage. The area to be reopened, known as the old Lake Club section, was not affected by the explosion.

The hotel-casino has been closed since early Tuesday, when it was evacuated after the bomb and a threatening letter were found. The explosion came during an attempt to disarm the device after a botched effort to deliver the \$3 million the extortionist demanded. No one was injured, and no arrests have been made.

Gov. Robert List predicted the explosion would make the casino more of a tourist attraction than ever, saying: "Knowing Americans love the bizarre, I bet it will be mobbed..."

Meanwhile, more than 50 federal agents, aided by Nevada and California officers, worked on tips received on a special hotline, interviewed casino employees and looked into other clues, "trying to piece together a huge puzzle," said one agent.

FBI supervising agent Joseph Yablonsky said the key clue so far may be fingerprints lifted from the bomb before the explosion. He said agents were working to identify the prints.

Agents said they had no hard leads on the identities of two men and a woman seen with a van about the time the bomb was delivered by men posing as computer technicians.

FBI agent Bill Jansen said Harvey's employees on duty when the bomb was delivered were being interviewed, and some were being questioned under hypnosis.

About 20 persons killed in concert stampede

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — About 20 people died in a stampede outside a concert hall Friday night in Maseru, capital of the kingdom of Lesotho, when police fired tear gas at a crowd of young people trying to force their way in, according to reports reaching here.

The South African Press Association said its correspondent in Maseru counted 18 bodies in the local mortuary after the stampede at the AMI concert hall and many other injured fans were admitted to the Queen Elizabeth II hospital.

The South African Broadcasting Corp. reported that "at least 20 people were trampled to death" in the stampede when the fans tried to push their way into the already full hall to hear a performance by a black singer from Johannesburg, Steve Keka.

"Eyewitnesses said the stampede took place halfway through Keka's show," SAPA said. "The hall was packed with fans who had queued for hours before the start of the concert." The agency quoted the witnesses as saying, "Police inside the hall fired the tear gas into the crowd at 8:30 p.m. when the fans tried to force their way in."
