Polish party chief fired

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Edward Gierek, whose regime was jolted by Poland's worst labor unrest in a decade, was removed as Communist Party chief early Saturday at an emergency session of the party's Central Committee.

The official news agency PAP said Gierek, who suffered an apparent heart attack Friday, was replaced by Stanislaw Kania, a full Politburo member and a Central Committee secretary believed to be responsible for state security. Gierek also was dropped from the Politburo, the Central Committee's policy-making body.

Gierek met the same fate as his predecessor, Wladyslaw Gomulka, who was ousted as party leader in December 1970 after he used force to crush strikes in the port cities of Gdansk and Szczecin and 45 workers were killed.

The announcement of Gierek's removal was made at 1:30 a.m. Saturday (7:30 p.m. EDT Friday) following an emergency meeting of the Central Committee at party headquarters in downtown Warsaw.

PAP reported: "In connection with the serious illness of Edward Gierek, the Central Committee released him from the function of first secretary and Politburo member. The Central Committee unanimously appointed Stanislaw Kania as first secretary (party leader) of the Central Committee."

PAP said the committee also ap-

pointed Kazimierz Barcikowski and Andrzej Zabinski as Politburo members and Tadeusz Grabski, Zdzislaw Kurowski and Jerzy Wojtecki as secretaries of the Central Committee.

Barcikowski, a deputy premier, negotiated the agreement that ended strikes last week at the Oder River port of Szczecin.

Gierek, 67, had been hospitalized after experiencing "a serious disturbance" of the heart, according to the state radio and PAP. They said he was resting under the care of five doctors but gave no further details.

The 53-year-old Kania became a secretary of the Central Committee in 1971 and was said to be responsible for police, army and security matters. He had headed the party's powerful administrative department from 1968-71.

He is not widely known, but experienced Polish observers said he has the reputation of being a strong figure in the Central Committee. They said that even though he headed the state's police and security agencies, he advocated political solutions rather than force to end the strikes.

Gierek was replaced as the Parliament began taking up concessions his government made to the strikers. Premier Josef Pinskiowski, named to his post in a Cabinet reshuffle at the height of the crisis, told Parliament that the government would "rebuild the confidence of the nation." He admitted some strikes were continuing.

Gierek, whose handling of the crisis drew indirect criticism from the Soviet Union and other Warsaw Pact nations, had been expected to attend the parliamentary session in his capacity as a member to show that he had weathered the labor crisis. The announcement of his hospitalization was the first official explanation for his absence.

Western diplomats had speculated about a possible change in the leadership following criticism in the official media of the party's handling of the economy and the subsequent strike wave.

There had been comparatively little mention of Kania and speculation centered on former Foreign Minister Stefan Olszowski, the ambassador to East Germany who was returned to the Politburo in last month's shakeup. Olszowski, 49, had been dropped from the Politburo without explanation in February.

Kania was born in Wrocanka, southeastern Poland, and during World War II worked as a blacksmith's apprentice. He joined the Communist Party in 1945 and rose through local ranks in Rzeszow and Jaslo and was named to the Central Committee in 1968.

Central Committee deliberations are secret, and rarely are official explanations issued later.

Political wars escalating

Carter's spokesman strikes back

WASHINGTON (AP) — Strategists for President Carter and Ronald Reagan, capping the caustic opening week of the fall campaign, are escalating a war of words over whether the administration compromised national security and played politics by revealing a secret new military project.

Carter spokesmen struck back hard Friday at the Republican presidential nominee's assertions that the disclosure damaged national security and gave the Soviets a head start on counteracting the project. Reagan aides continued their attack.

White House press secretary Jody Powell said Friday the president was "as angry as I've ever seen him" over charges concerning disclosure of a system designed to make planes invisible to enemy radar.

And Powell met Reagan's contentions with a charge of his own. By raising the issue, Powell said, Reagan went "far beyond the acceptable bounds of political partisanship."

Reagan's press secretary, Lyn Nofziger, called Carter's anger "completely phony" and contended it was "just another one of his attempts to change the subject. We don't intend to let him do it."

But Vice President Walter F. Mondale, campaigning in San Francisco, said the Soviets "have known for some time" about the project.

"What they did not know, and do not know, is how it's done. And that's something we must protect," Mondale said. "We thought it would leak out long ago, and it did not."

As their stand-ins picked up the battle, Carter and Reagan were staying out of public view.

The president and his wife, Rosalynn, flew to Camp David in the Catoctin Mountains of Maryland for a weekend vacation.

Reagan remained at his rented estate in suburban Middleburg, Va., where he enlisted support from former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

After the two met Friday, Kissinger told reporters the "Stealth" system was one of the "most sensitive secrets" of former President Gerald R. Ford's administration.

While Kissinger stopped short of

calling the disclosure a threat to national security, he said the Ford administration felt it "should be preserved with very special precautions."

The issue arose Aug. 22, when Defense Secretary Harold Brown confirmed the existence of the system. Brown said he disclosed the program because earlier news leaks convinced him the project no longer could remain secret.

Powell said Friday that Carter knew of Brown's planned announcement and did not try to prevent it.

Reagan, the former California governor, charged Thursday that Carter was guilty of a "cynical misuse of power and a clear abuse of the public trust" in the disclosure.

He accused the Defense Department of deliberately leaking the program "in order for Secretary Brown to justify calling his press conference four days later" to reveal "some of the most tightly classified, most high-

ly secret weapons information since the Manhattan Project," which developed the atomic bomb.

Powell insisted the first leaks "were being done by people intent on denigrating the importance of the accomplishment" and not by the Pentagon.

Reagan's vice presidential running mate, George Bush, campaigning Friday in Pittsburgh, questioned the "coincidence" that the Stealth system was leaked to the press "at the very time that President Carter's reelection campaign was stressing his newfound interest" in defense.

Mondale, speaking to the San Francisco Commonwealth Club, issued a lengthy response to Republican criticism of President Carter's foreign and defense policies and criticized Reagan for advocating "naive and dangerous" measures to win new respect for the United States.

Texas GOP leaders call for the defeat of Carter

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Texas Republican Convention opened Friday with top state leaders, backed by vice presidential nominee George Bush, calling for all-out defeat of President Jimmy Carter in Texas.

"The battleground is Texas this year," said State GOP Chairman Chet Upham.

After the mid-afternoon opening, the convention of 3,780 delegates and about that many alternates moved quickly through organizational procedures and into a series of addresses, all aimed at Carter.

Gov. Bill Clements, who shocked Texas Democrats in 1978 by becoming the first Republican governor this century, was the keynoter.

Clements was followed by former governor John B. Connally who has teamed with the governor in touring 14 cities in non-urban areas in recent weeks.

"It is lack of leadership in both the Whitehouse and Congress," Connally told the convention. "That's what's wrong with America...if you want a change the only way to change is to get rid of the Democrats. That should be the battle cry in this election."

Also speaking Friday afternoon, was Anne Armstrong, former U.S. Ambassador to Great Britain and former co-National Party Chairman.

"Today, Jimmy Carter is a joke — not a very funny joke

— in most foreign capitals," she said. "Four years of weakness, vacillation, bluster and deceit in foreign policy have left the United States with fewer friends, more enemies, and the world far more dangerous than it was in 1976, when Carter became president."

At the end of her speech, Mrs. Armstrong read a "personal" message to the convention from Reagan.

"As I said in my acceptance speech in Detroit, Jimmy Carter has concocted an economic stew which has turned the national stomach," said the message from Reagan. "We are not going to get over our national bellyache until Jimmy Carter is defeated and you Texans are the key to making this a reality."

Delegates later planned to kick up their heels at a traditional San Antonio fiesta in the historic La Villita section. Bush will join them briefly after his arrival.

Highlight of the Saturday session will be an address by Bush, following a nationwide closed-circuit television program sponsored by the Reagan-Bush campaign.

An "impromptu" floor demonstration by Texas delegates for Bush will be a part of the TV program.

Other featured speakers Saturday include Sen. John Tower, R-Texas; Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, and Bill Brock, national GOP chairman.

NEWS BRIEFS

100-year-old rescued

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — Like the famous masked man, he rode through town, righted a wrong and sped off without leaving his name. Cameron County sheriff's deputies are calling him the "Lone Ranger" after a 100-year-old woman was rescued from two attackers Friday morning by an identified man.

"I think that man did a good deed and he ought to come forward and be recognized," said sheriff's investigator Julio Herrera. "There's very few times when people will get involved. He turned out to be the good Samaritan."

Herrera said the rescuer was driving past the woman's home in an area outside the city limits when he saw the woman being attacked.

The "Lone Ranger" later told a neighbor he was enraged at the sight, went over and beat up the attackers and then tied them up. He told the neighbor to call police and left.

Seven killed in explosion

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) — A powerful bomb exploded outside the National Palace Friday morning, killing eight people, injuring at least 20 and blowing out hundreds of windows along the main square, authorities and witnesses said.

A Red Cross spokesman said some of the injured were in critical condition. Most were hit by flying glass inside the palace, which is the seat of government.

Soon after the explosion blast another bomb and tear gas device exploded in the nearby Justice Ministry. Police said there were no injuries and said damage to the ministry was slight.

Police evacuated five buildings near the National Palace within minutes of the first blast. No other bombs were found.

St. Helens quiet again

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Recent earthquakes around Mount St. Helens apparently are part of a long-term "resetting" process following the volcano's violent eruptions, a geologist with the U.S. Geological Survey said Friday.

The mountain itself was quiet after a swarm of small quakes shook an area near the volcano Thursday.

Jane Buchanan-Banks said the quakes, centered about two miles deep in the Elk Lake area about eight miles northwest of the volcano, did not appear to be related to new volcanic activity.

"You can't have an event of the magnitude of the eruption of Mount St. Helens without having an effect on a large area around the mountain," Ms. Buchanan-Banks said at a weekly press briefing.

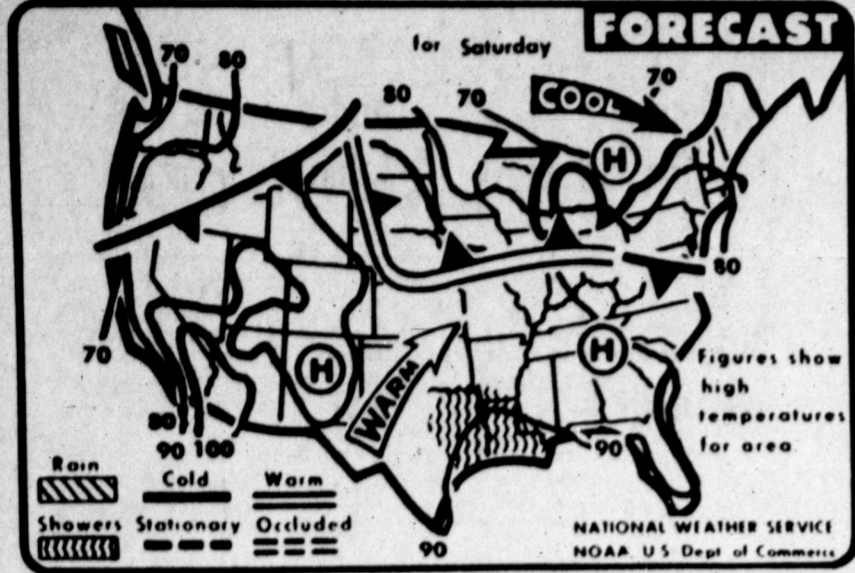

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Four jailed on charges of assault

Bond was set for four Midlanders Friday, all of whom were still in custody late Friday. Willie Faye Ennis, 21, of 1116 E. Cowden St. was formally charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in connection with a shooting early Friday morning at Red's Drive-In.

She is accused of shooting two men at the bar, one of whom fled on foot after police arrested Miss Ennis at the scene. The other, 20-year-old Ruben Rios Lopez of 611 N. Mineola St., was treated and released from Midland Memorial Hospital Friday for a bullet wound to his leg.

Another Midlander, Ennis Lee Cole Jr., remained in custody in the City Jail Friday on charges of aggravated robbery and possession of dangerous drugs. Bond was set for \$25,000 for Cole by Justice of the Peace Robert Pine Friday after formal charges were filed against the 25-year-old.

Cole, of 703 S. Clay St., is being held in connection with the robbery at knife-point of the attendant at Kent Station on Rankin Highway Tuesday. According to police reports, Cole was stopped by officers at Jackson Street and Golf Course Road Thursday afternoon and was found to have what police believed to be dangerous drugs.

Bond was set for two other Midland women Friday at \$35,000 each on charges of burglary. Karen Jolene Key, 18, and Juanita Parker, 23, both of Midland Mobil Ranch, were arrested Thursday afternoon in connection with the same burglary. The women remained in City Jail late Friday.

After 9 a.m., Manuel Vigil of 2601 Dora reported the burglary of his home in which a Whirlpool trash compactor valued at \$240 was taken. Police reports indicate entry was gained through the north window of the home.

At 9:40 a.m., the theft of a single barrel .410-gauge shotgun on Aug. 15 at approximately 3 a.m. was reported by the Southwest Drilling Mud Service. The shotgun was valued at \$120.

After 11 a.m. Friday, Virginia Seay of 207 S. Madison St. reported the theft of loss of a lady's brown purse at the Lee High Chorale Garage sale. According to police reports, the purse contained \$128, the woman's identification and her medication.

She 'would have cried,' says undocumented child

HOUSTON (AP)—Angelica Maria Acre, her pigtailed secured with bright yellow ribbons and her hands filled with a cheeseburger, said she "would have cried with much sadness if I can't to school."

Bertha Vielma, in a plain print dress with her hair in a bun and her hands filled with documents and papers and certificates, did cry, but "it with happiness because my three children can now learn all these wonderful things."

For little Angelica Maria her first day in school was something the 7-year-old said, "I didn't think would happen the way Mamma and Pappa talk. I am so happy."

For Mrs. Vielma enrolling her children for their first day of education in the public school systems of Texas "was the answer to a prayer. No, many, many prayers. I pray and pray the whole time."

Children of illegal aliens were admitted to the Texas schools Friday after a lengthy federal court trial, an appeal to the U.S. 5th Circuit Court, and an order from U.S. Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell. After five weeks of testimony, U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals ruled on July 21 that a Texas law prohibiting illegal alien children from receiving a free public education was unconstitutional.

Later, the circuit court stayed Seals' order. The ruling by Powell Thursday set aside the lower court action and opened the school doors to thousands of undocumented children, most of them from Mexico.

Angelica Maria and her sister Angelica Nava, 6, sat together for their first lunch in public school and shyly answered questions in Spanish. Angelica Nava is so tiny she appeared to be a Tinker Bell among grown people. She smiled and smiled when asked about school. "I want to read. I like learning things. I am happy now."

Marcos Hernandez, 7, was much more interested in his food than in talking but did admit the best thing about school "was playtime." At another nearby school in this neighborhood where most of the undocumented workers live, Alma Velia Corpio Villarreal was back in school after a one year absence. Her family had moved from Matamoros, Mexico, and the 12-year-old had been refused admission to the public schools.

In the Houston school district, undocumented children could enroll by paying tuition of \$162 a month. The Villarreal family did not have the money. She spent the year at home with no formal education. "I am happy now. I will learn English," she whispered. Mrs. Vielma, another who left here moros, Mexico, and the 12-year-old had been refused admission to the public schools.

Mexico home in search of a better job, placed her children, ages 6, 7 and 8, in school and then said: "I was so afraid they couldn't come to school because so many didn't want them. But I am a Christian and I prayed and kept praying and praying."

"I have no money for the tuition and I didn't know what to do." Then she cried.

"I strongly believe in the possibility that the body will not be there," she read from a prepared statement after making a surprise appearance in the courtroom of State District Judge James Wright.

However, she told the court she had no doubt that the man who was buried in that grave 17 years ago was, indeed, her husband.

"I met a gentleman in Russia and his name was Lee Harvey Oswald," she said in a soft, accented voice. "That is the same man that is buried there."

She said she identified her husband's body twice after he was shot to death in the basement of the Dallas police station by Dallas nightclub owner Jack Ruby in November 1963. "I saw his body in the morgue and at the funeral home," she told the court, adding that she wants the grave opened and the body—if it is one—examined to remove all doubt.

"I ask the court to move for the opening of the grave as shortly as possible," she said, adding she admits the possibility the grave might have been tampered with. Mrs. Porter, who said she remarried in 1965, was the final witness Friday in a hearing on a temporary injunction, requested by Oswald's brother, Robert Oswald, to prevent the exhumation. A British author, Michael Eddowes, wants to have it done.

Oswald and Eddowes also testified Friday, before Wright recessed the hearing until 9 a.m. Monday. Oswald told the court he saw his brother "for 8 to 10 minutes" on the day of his death and again at an open-casket funeral in Fort Worth's Rose Hill Cemetery.

Asked if he had any doubt that the man buried in the grave was his brother, he answered firmly, "No, sir." He said he is "very strongly opposed" to the exhumation. Eddowes said he has spent about \$250,000 in his efforts to have the body dug up, efforts he began in 1979 when he concluded the man in the grave was a Soviet agent, not Lee Harvey Oswald.

Mrs. Oswald said one reason she signed a consent order last October agreeing to the exhumation was to clarify her own status. "My children and I are illegal aliens, if this is true," she said of Eddowes' theory. "We want to live here without any doubt."

"I went along with this because I didn't want any hardship on anyone," she added. Mrs. Oswald had been secluded in a court reporter's office before taking the stand and after her testimony was hustled out a side door escorted by three sheriff's deputies.

Should Wright approve the exhumation after the hearing concludes, Dallas County Medical Examiner Dr. Charles Petty has agreed to perform the autopsy.

However, Dallas County commissioners placed an obstacle in Petty's way, deciding Thursday that he could not use the county's forensic lab to do the autopsy.

Since he agreed to do the medical work, Petty was named as a defendant in Robert Oswald's legal action. Wright Wednesday agreed to assume jurisdiction in the case, but

transferred Petty's part of the case to Dallas County, at Petty's request.

The judge made that decision after Oswald filed his suit to stop the exhumation. Oswald testified Wednesday that he purchased the gravesite in 1963 and has maintained it since then.

Eddowes says he believes there is a "60-40 chance" that a Soviet agent is buried in the grave, instead of Oswald. He contends that when Oswald went to the Soviet Union in 1958, a Soviet agent named Alex James Hiddell assumed his identity and returned to the United States.

It was Hiddell, according to Eddowes, who shot President John F. Kennedy on Nov. 22, 1963, and was shot by Ruby two days later. Eddowes began pursuing his theory three years ago and asked in 1978 for the body to be exhumed. But Wright denied the request, saying Eddowes did not have the right as an English citizen to seek the action in an American court.

But Civiletti, saying Billy Carter received "fair, hard-nosed and correct" treatment from the Justice Department, denied Friday that he sought to delay investigation of President Carter's younger brother or improperly tip the president off about it.

He said he was making no "deal" or "commitment" when he told the president in a private meeting June 17 that if Billy Carter registered as a foreign agent he would probably not be prosecuted for failing to do so sooner.

"Neither then nor now have I had any doubts that my comments to the president about Billy Carter's obligation to register and the department's general policy were completely proper and consistent with my duties," the attorney general testified. "Billy Carter was shown no favoritism by the Department of Justice," he said. "The final result of our efforts was, I believe, a fair, hard-nosed and correct disposition."

Danielle moves ashore over Galveston with 60mph winds

GALVESTON, Texas (AP)—Tropical Storm Danielle moved ashore Friday night but forecasters said its 55 mph to 60 mph winds were expected to diminish as it moved inland.

At 9 p.m. EDT, the storm's center was located near latitude 29.5 north, longitude 95.0 west, or over Galveston Bay. It was moving westward at about 15 mph and was expected to continue that motion for the rest of the night, said forecasters at the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

Rainfall of three to five inches, with isolated heavier amounts, was expected along and just north of the path of the storm — fourth named storm of the 1968 Atlantic hurricane season — the forecasters said.

There were reports of some high school football games being cancelled because of the high winds and heavy rain, but no flooding or property damage was reported in the early stages of the storm.

In addition, forecasters said one of two tropical depressions moving across the Atlantic could threaten the North Carolina coast by Saturday.

Forecasters Bob Pifer in Miami said the leading front of the storm had moved 100 miles inland, taking thunderstorms to the Lake Charles, La., area. "The strongest winds are still off the coast. During the rest of the night they will be moving inland," he said.

Pifer said it was unlikely the Hurricane Center would advise evacuation of the area. "Short of the thing increasing in intensity or stalling off shore, I doubt we would raise the warning beyond the gale warning," he said.

The storm formed Friday from a tropical depression, which developed from an area of disturbed weather that earlier had lingered over South Florida. Danielle would become a hurricane if the sustained winds top 74 mph.

A second weather system that developed into a depression was located about 450 miles southeast of Cape Hatteras, N.C., late Friday night. The disturbance, with top winds of 35 mph, was moving toward the northwest at 10 mph and could pose a threat to the Outer Banks of North Carolina by Saturday afternoon, forecasters said.

Hurricane Center officials said it was possible the disturbance could strengthen late Friday night and early Saturday.

Partly cloudy skies due here

It looks like Midland won't be getting much activity from Tropical Storm Danielle, but it will have some partly cloudy skies through Sunday and a 20 percent chance of rain today and tonight.

According to the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport, the slight chance of thunderstorms will be during the afternoon and evening hours today.

The high today will be near 90 degrees, followed by a low tonight in the upper 60s. The high Sunday is expected to be in the low 90s. Even though Danielle's winds have been clocked at near 55 mph, Midland winds will be even lighter than usual, coming southeasterly at 5-10 mph today and tonight.

Linowitz' Mideast mission had been regarded as a nearly hopeless attempt to restart autonomy negotiations that Sadat had broken off a month before to protest Israel's new Jerusalem law.

In a surprise announcement Wednesday the U.S. envoy said Israel and Egypt had agreed to resume the talks within a few weeks and to hold a summit meeting with Carter after the U.S. election.

The suspension came after the Israeli parliament adopted a controversial law declaring unified Jerusalem the eternal capital of the Jewish state. Sadat complained that the law blocked his plans for Israeli-Egyptian negotiations eventually on the future of predominantly Arab East Jerusalem, which Israel annexed after capturing it from Jordan in the 1967 Arab-Israeli war.

Linowitz, in a brief news conference at Andrews Air Force Base, said the Egyptian and Israel leaders have made a new commitment for peace.

Asked when the negotiations would take place, Linowitz replied that it would be before the end of the year, but he gave no specific date. He said four major points were agreed upon at the Middle East talks:

- "A strong commitment to the Camp David accords as the only viable path to a comprehensive peace in the Middle East."
- Negotiations must be based on mutual trust.
- To resume the negotiations.

Miss Texas is coached by full-time chaperone

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Since Terri Eoff became Miss Texas on July 12, her diet, exercise regime and wardrobe have been under the constant scrutiny of a chaperone. June Graves works most of the year as a grooming instructor and fashion coordinator for American Airlines. But when pageant time comes, she makes herself available to help Miss Texas vie for the Miss America title. "When they choose Miss Texas, I take her into my home with me," the 49-year-old former model said Friday on her sixth official tour of duty in Atlantic City. "I get to oversee everything they do. By living with them, I get to know what makes them tick. Whether they are morning people or night people. Then I know how to control their little moods." Far from feeling smothered by the approach, Miss Eoff, a 19-year-old Lubbock resident, says she enjoyed it. "I felt flattered that someone would want to spend that much time with me," she said. For about 18 hours of every day, Mrs. Graves shepherded the sophomore at North Texas State University through an exercise and diet program, shopping tours for clothes and sunbaths to deepen her tan. "I have them lift weights," says the slim, red-haired chaperone. "With that, I see to it they have as

many proteins as possible." Mrs. Graves said with a wink that she also selects most of Miss Texas' wardrobe. But she quickly adds, "She has to feel good in them, of course. Since they (the contestants) don't know what they'll need here, they usually take my word." The beauty consultant has two children and two grandchildren. She said her husband has no objections to her sharing their home in Hurst, Texas, with the Miss Texas winners. "He enjoys it," she said. "It's a modest home, and I do not have a maid. I tell the contestants they are part of the family and have to share and clean up after themselves." Miss Eoff's summer was interrupted by two problems, both involving her talent entry, a dramatic reading from "The House of the Blue Leaves," by John Gure. The sponsoring organization for the runner-up in the state event asked a judge to lift her Miss Texas title because the dramatic reading went two minutes over the three-minute time limit. "The judge dismissed the case completely," Miss Eoff said, but there were four days of hearings. Later, NBC objected to two phrases of her monologue. The passages referred to a "green latrine" and "abuse of Cardinal Spellman," Miss Eoff said.

El Paso files suit to get the water it needs for growth from New Mexico

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — The city of El Paso, contending it needs more water to grow and stave off depletion of current water supplies, filed suit Friday in U.S. District Court seeking water in New Mexico. "Water for municipal and industrial use is a scarce natural resource which is vital to the growth and economy of El Paso," the suit said. "Without sustained and increased water supplies, El Paso will not be able to support its present residents, expected future growth, and the interstate and international economic activities required to provide employment for them," the suit said. Steve Reynolds, New Mexico state engineer; Jeff Bingham, New Mexico attorney general; and Lalo Garza, Dona Ana County district attorney, were named as defendants. El Paso wants the federal court to declare the 1978 New Mexico water embargo statute unconstitutional. And the city is seeking a permanent

injunction against enforcement of the statute. "The New Mexico water embargo statute is an absolute prohibition against the export of ground water from New Mexico except for oil and gas purposes, and on its face discriminates against the city of El Paso and its citizens who need water available in New Mexico for municipal and industrial purposes," the suit said. The statute imposes an undue burden on interstate and foreign commerce, the suit said. However, Reynolds said New Mexico has tough water laws that protect a valuable resource for the future growth of the state. "Of course I believe New Mexico water statutes are defensible and of course we will undertake to defend them," he said. Garza said he was unaware a suit had been filed and didn't know there was a problem. "I had never heard of the problem of the suit and I don't know why I'm a party," he said. "I just never heard of the matter before." The suit was scheduled to be heard by U.S. District Judge Edwin L. Mechem in Albuquerque, but a date was not set. John Hickerson, general manager of the El Paso Public Service Board, said the decision to sue stemmed from extensive studies of El Paso's water needs and water supply options. "The only large quantities of good water which are near enough to be economic, and relatively unused by others, lie in New Mexico," he said. "If New Mexico law prevents us from using these water sources, sooner or later one of two things would have to happen," he said in a statement. "El Paso would have to go to massive importation projects at enormous expense to El Pasoans and to the federal government, or we would face sharp conflicts with Valley farmers over river water," Hickerson said. El Paso currently draws 35 percent of its water from renewable resources — the Rio Grande and shallow river-related ground water, the suit said.

The city obtains 65 percent of its water from a single aquifer — the Hueco Bolson, the suit said. And El Paso and other users are withdrawing ground water from the Hueco Basin at a faster rate than natural recharge, the suit said. "El Paso thus needs an additional water supply to postpone the inevitable depletion of the Hueco Bolson and the economic disruption which would result from such depletion," the suit said. El Paso's Public Service Board has approved plans for a \$33 million waste water treatment plant in the city that would pump treated sewage water back into the Hueco Bolson. The board also has refused to extend new water lines outside the city limits, which has sparked a storm of protest from residents of outlying suburbs who now are using brackish water from local wells. The most appropriate potential additional water supplies are ground

water in New Mexico — especially the Mesilla Basin northwest of El Paso and the northward extension of the Hueco Bolson north of the city in New Mexico, the suit said. "Mesilla Bolson ground water is largely unused at this time," the city said in the suit. A portion of the Mesilla Bolson could be used for municipal and industrial use in El Paso without hurting agricultural users who consume the bulk of the region's current water supply, the suit said. Ray Pearson, Public Service Board chairman, said there is more water north of El Paso "than in all of Texas within 200 miles of El Paso — significantly more." If El Paso wins its federal case, water officials there say the Mesilla Bolson could provide about 30 percent of the city's water needs by 1995. El Paso is seeking rights to the 34 million acre feet in the southern half of the aquifer, officials said.

Oil truck burns near Greenwood

Eight Midland firefighters battled an oil truck blaze for more than an hour Friday on County Road 1050, three miles east of Greenwood. The hot oil truck apparently caught fire shortly before 10 a.m. Friday when a plug blew and ignited the oil, Fire Department reports indicate. The Tamarack Petroleum Co. truck was on fire for over 90 minutes before firefighters from three trucks were able to extinguish the blaze. The truck was a total loss and the wheel head sustained heavy damage, the reports indicated. The driver and owner of the truck, Roy Greer, was treated and released from Midland Memorial Hospital. All three trucks were back by 12:30 p.m.

Garwood arrested

JACKSONVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Marine Pfc. Robert Garwood, who faces charges of desertion and collaborating with the enemy in Vietnam, was arrested Friday and charged with two counts of felony child abuse, Onslow County Magistrate Margaret Murrill said. Garwood was charged with attempting to commit sexual abuse by force against a 7-year-old girl and with committing and attempting to commit a sexual offense on the body of the girl, Mrs. Murrill said. Both incidents allegedly occurred on or about Aug. 7, 1980, she said.

HOUSTON (AP) — A state district court jury Friday sentenced George Marshall Hall of Borger to life in prison in the murder of a Hutchinson County jailer. A guilty verdict had been returned Thursday against Hall, 24, in the trial moved to Houston on a change of venue because of extensive pre-trial publicity. Hall was charged in the June 11, 1979, fatal shooting of jailer Jack Thompson, 43, during a jail break at Stinnett.

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Reagan views criticized

'Naive, dangerous,' says Mondale

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Vice President Walter F. Mondale rejected as "naive and dangerous" Friday the emphasis in Ronald Reagan's campaign on winning new respect for the United States around the world.

In his first lengthy response to Republican criticism of President Carter's foreign and defense policies, Mondale criticized the concept that measurement of national strength should be "limited to arms." At the same time, the vice president proclaimed the nation's military might second to none.

Though he never mentioned Reagan's name in the address to the non-partisan San Francisco Commonwealth Club, Mondale's frame of reference was clear. The audience of 500-750 interrupted the vice president with applause five times.

Reagan has been working hard to portray Carter policies as having weakened the U.S. position around the world, but Mondale said: "militarily, economically, politically, socially, and I believe morally, the United States is not only superior to the Soviet Union; we're the strongest nation on earth. And I believe we will remain so."

Mondale was reiterating a view stated by Carter in an foreign policy address last month in Boston. The vice president said he knew of no American general or admiral who would trade U.S. defenses with those of any other nation "now or in the foreseeable future."

Mondale said U.S. naval technology is "far more advanced" than that of the Soviet Union, and decried "the counterfeit comparisons" of the two forces.

"In the debate on achieving peace, it is said, the question that seems the most flawed, to me, is this: isn't it time that America stopped trying to be liked and started trying to be respected?" Mondale said.

"I reject that view as naive and dangerous," he said, questioning whether that meant the U.S. military should be used to intimidate smaller nations or whether it meant the nation cannot be simultaneously admired and respected.

"A strength which is limited to arms implies a cynicism we reject," Mondale said. "Power without commitment to human values is dangerous. An America frozen in the ice of its own indifference is not the nation our forebears pledged their sacred honor to protect."

An administration official, who asked not to be identified, said the Mondale speech was cleared with Carter's national security adviser, and the secretaries of state and defense.

While Mondale, in his text, made no reference by name to either Reagan or the Republicans, a well informed administration aide who traveled to San Francisco to help work on the speech, said:

"It's fair to say the speech is a response to what we regard as the

increasing stridency of the Reagan discussion of serious national security and defense issues which we fear is leading to a superficial and shallow discussion of what is the strength of America."

Mondale broached the question of the "Stealth technology," the latest area in which the Republican presidential nominee has criticized Carter, and said that the sophisticated weapons development and air-launched cruise missiles "will make Soviet air defenses - in which the Soviet Union has invested \$50 to \$100 billion - obsolete."

Mondale aides said the speech would be the first of perhaps as many as 10 the vice president will deliver on what he sees as the issues of the campaign.

Reagan defense statements called 'reckless distortions'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Defense Secretary Harold Brown charged Friday that Ronald Reagan uttered factual errors and "reckless distortions" when claiming that the Carter administration handed Russia defense secrets by deliberately leaking information on the "Stealth" warplane project.

"As a scientist I am offended by Governor Reagan's cavalier attitude toward the facts," Brown said in a hastily-called news conference at the Pentagon.

"As a public official, I am indignant at his reckless distortions about a program which we managed to keep secure ... for over three years."

Brown, who has become increasingly involved in the presidential campaign, said heatedly that Reagan's remarks in Jacksonville, Fla., Thursday added up to "a combination of factual errors and gross distortions."

Brown took particular issue with Reagan's assertion that the "Stealth" project, which would permit U.S. bombers, warplanes and cruise missiles to become virtually invisible to Soviet radar, will not be ready until the 1990s. He also disputed the Republican presidential candidate's claim that administration leaks have "given the Kremlin a 10-year head start on developing measures to counter this revolutionary technology."

In his rebuttal, Brown said, "Both statements were incorrect," but he did not provide any details to demonstrate why this is so.

"The facts are that nothing we said

has given the Soviets a countermeasures advantage," Brown told reporters.

The Pentagon chief said, "We have drawn a line" to protect technological details that would enable Russia to develop such countermeasures. He said he assumes the Russians are trying to do so.

"I can only conclude that Governor Reagan is trying to divert attention from a very significant achievement, not only of this administration, but of the U.S. military and the U.S. industrial and contractual structure," Brown said.

The defense chief said he had called the news conference because "Reagan's attack was directed at me personally and very strongly."

Once again, he defended his holding a widely advertised news conference Aug. 22, at which he acknowledged the existence of the "Stealth" project but refused to give any specifics, and said such details will remain secret.

As he has told Congress, Brown said the late August meeting with reporters was held because three news leaks within a few days earlier made it clear that the existence of the project, in general terms, could no longer be kept secret.

"What I saw was a pattern of frequency of leaks along with expansion of the program," Brown said, noting that many more members of Congress, contractors and others were becoming aware of the program, which he said had been increased 100-fold.

Anderson seeks Indians' support

WASHINGTON (AP) - John B. Anderson, seeking the endorsement of an influential Indian tribal organization, said Friday he would sweep "a new broom" through the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The independent presidential candidate drew applause from the Council of Energy Resource Tribes when he said any White House meetings on national energy policies would include Indians.

Before announcing the most recent of his energy plans earlier this year, President Carter held a series of meetings with various non-governmental leaders at the presidential retreat at Camp David, Md.

Noting that Indians were not included, Anderson said, "I can assure you that under an Anderson administration there will be no Camp David energy conferences which do not include Indian representation."

All three major presidential candidates were invited to speak before the council, but only Anderson accepted in person. Carter sent Energy Secretary Charles Duncan and Republican Ronald Reagan sent Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M.

Council vice chairman Wilfred Scott said the organization will postpone any formal endorsement for now.

"We are going to take a little more time," he said.

The council represents 25 tribes in eight western states. It is designed to protect Indian interests on reservations where oil, natural gas and uranium deposits are found.

Anderson pledged expanded health care for Indians and said he "will not repeat the mistakes of previous administrations which have tried to wrest control of education out of the hands of Indians."

After two days in Washington, Anderson campaigns on Saturday in New York where he is expected to receive the endorsement of the Liberal Party, which has traditionally backed Democratic presidential candidates.

Technical problems Friday caused a one-day delay in the scheduled Monday start of the Texas Brilab trial of Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton and two Austin lawyers.

U.S. District Judge Robert O'Connor rescheduled the trial for Tuesday after being advised final checking had not been completed for transcripts of some of the conversations FBI agents and informants secretly recorded during the 10-month operation aimed at corruption among labor and public officials.

Also to be tried on charges of racketeering, extortion, fraud and conspiracy are attorneys Ronald W. Ray and Randall B. Wood of Austin. A trial date has not been set for the fourth defendant, Houston labor leader L.G. Moore.

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Reagan's 'foot-in-mouth' remarks 'no step forward,' says Connally

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Former Texas Gov. John Connally does not see that recent criticized remarks of Ronald Reagan will have any permanent damage on the campaign.

"That was no great step forward," Connally said when asked at a news conference about Reagan's "foot-in-mouth" remarks.

"However, it will not really hurt at this point. The campaign is just beginning ... but I do not recommend that he keep it up."

Connally, who was here to address the Texas Republican Convention, said the only advice he had given Reagan was to stick to standard issues "such as 10 percent inflation, 10 percent prime rate, high taxes and unemployment."

Connally also said he thought President Jimmy Carter's announced Sept. 15 trip to Texas, the day before Reagan's long scheduled trip to San Antonio, the Rio Grande Valley and Houston was no coincidence.

"I'm sure it was all planned," Connally said. "He will be talking about a bunch of Republican fat cats dining in Houston and demigod it all over the state. Then he will sneak back to Washington and have a

Noted anthropologist called in to determine what killed babies

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A noted anthropologist who researched the age of Ramses III centuries after the pharaoh's death has been asked to help determine what killed five babies whose remains were found stuffed in an attic trunk as long as 50 years after their deaths.

The infant remains were discovered this week in the southwestern Pennsylvania town of Gallitzin after a two-page letter was released following the death of 76-year-old spinster Stella Williamson. Miss Williamson lived in the house where the trunk was discovered.

Dr. Wilton M. Krogman, who once worked for crime fighter Elliott Ness, is among a handful of anthropologists who analyze bones and other human remains for police detectives, and will assist Dr. Halbert E. Fillinger, Philadelphia's medical examiner, in his latest assignment.

Krogman, 77, is director of research at the Lancaster Cleft Palate Clinic, an institute which specializes in repairing disfigured faces.

John Barron, coroner in Cambria County where Gallitzin is located, said tests on the infant remains will be done at the Philadelphia medical examiner's office and at the clinic in Lancaster. They are expected to take several weeks.

"We have a good line on what went on, but we can't reveal it until after the examination is completed," Barron said Friday. "There are a lot of facts and good clues."

Krogman's interest in anatomy began at age eight when he and a twin brother uncovered the skull of a horse while digging in a vacant lot in Oak Park, Ill. They dug out the remaining bones and fit them together.

Couple offers to trade baby for used \$8,800 sports car

FLEMINGTON, N.J. (AP)—A young couple's offer to trade their 14-month-old son for a \$8,800 used sports car left the auto dealer dumbfounded.

"I've traded a lot of things in my life, but I've never traded a baby," said Italo Patinella, owner of Patinella's Auto Sales in Baptistown. "It's beyond my comprehension."

But Patinella, whose son, daughter-in-law and grandchild were killed in a 1978 fire, said his first reaction was to make the trade.

"I knew moments later it would be wrong — not so much wrong for me or the expense of it, but what would this baby do when he's not a baby anymore?"

"How could this boy cope with life knowing he was traded for a car?"

The couple, James M. Green, 29, and Pamela Spencer Green, 21, of Frenchtown, a tiny community on the Delaware River across from Bucks County, Pa., were being held Friday in Hunterdon County Jail in Flemington in lieu of \$100,000 bond each.

Municipal Court Judge Jeffrey Martin said the Greens were officially charged with endangering the welfare of a child and selling a child. If convicted, they could be sentenced to from three to five years in jail and fined \$7,500 on each offense, the judge said.

Authorities said the Greens, who tried to trade the baby to the car dealer in exchange for a 1977 Corvette, were charged in civil court proceedings in Fort Smith, Ark., with abusing their 2-year-old daughter sometime before they moved to Hunterdon County three months ago.

Green is a maintenance man for a pet food manufacturer in Frenchtown. Mrs. Green is unemployed. State Trooper Jerry Van Riper said Green told him the couple

had another child who was in the custody of Arkansas authorities.

"They took the kid, but we never hurt her," Van Riper quoted Green as saying.

Hunterdon County Prosecutor William Palleria said the case will go to a grand jury within the next few weeks.

Officials said the Greens couldn't afford to pay \$8,800 for the car, so they allegedly suggested trading their son to Patinella.

Patinella notified the state Division of Youth and Family Services, which investigated the incident with the aid of the state police and the Hunterdon County prosecutor's office.

The Greens were arrested by state police on Wednesday as they left the car dealership where Patinella had signed the car over to them.

The child, whose name has not been made public, was placed in a foster care facility.

A spokesman at the prosecutor's office said the Greens were "emotionless and docile" at the arrest and booking.

The couple's older daughter had been taken from them following court proceedings in Arkansas, said Kendall B. Jones, a Fort Smith attorney appointed to represent the daughter in the civil proceedings.

A clerk at Sebastian County Probate Court in Fort Smith said the Greens were accused of abusing the girl. Officials at Arkansas Social Services would not provide any details about the case and would not explain why the parents were allowed to keep their son.

When the couple moved to Flemington, the New Jersey authorities were warned by Arkansas Social Services that the boy may need "protective services," said spokesman department Lou A. Chimenti.

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Orders for nuns small but strong Jews to observe High Holy Days

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Fifteen years after the Second Vatican Council, which tried to make the Catholic sisterhood more attractive but set off a mass exodus of nuns, orders are still having trouble filling their ranks. But some feel stronger for it.

There were 180,000 nuns in the United States in 1960. Vatican II ended in 1965. By 1979, there were only 120,000 nuns, and half of them were said to include women either at or over retirement age — despite Vatican II's relaxing of standards of conduct and dress.

Gone are the days when a sister could not have a "particular friend" in an order because all sisters were equal and one could not be liked more than another. Also, a nun need no longer ask the Mother Superior for permission to go on an errand, nor must she wear prescribed undergarments and stockings.

Still, church orders have been unable to replace the large number of nuns who felt Vatican II deprived them of a sense of community that traditional church doctrine had maintained, according to Sister Elizabeth Thoman of the Sisters Communications Network.

The Sisters of St. Joseph Carondelet in suburban Bel-Air have only four novitiates to replenish their aging ranks. But Sister Thoman and others believe post-Vatican II orders are stronger now as sisters realize community can be achieved in diminished circles.

"In the women's movement there is a whole trend toward networking, toward bonding. In religious life we've already got that," she said.

Smaller numbers may also mean tougher standards for prospective sisters, said Sister Thoman, member of a small midwestern order.

"We don't want to talk to anyone until they are 22 or so, with college or some work experience," she said.

Vatican II allows nuns to move outside traditional teaching-nursing roles as well, working with migrant laborers, in social-justice ministries, parish-ministry teams and as community organizers.

Sister Marilyn Rudy entered the Bel-Air order in 1955 after a year as a social worker with a degree from UC Berkeley. She taught for 20 years and now runs St. Joseph's Center in Santa Monica's Ocean Park, passing out clothing, food stamp informa-

Bolivian says archbishop 'possessed by the devil'

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — A representative of Bolivia's new military regime said Wednesday night the Roman Catholic archbishop of La Paz, Jorge Manrique, is "possessed by the devil" and should be exorcized.

Canedo Reyes, a retired lieutenant colonel attending a meeting of the Latin American Anti-Communist Confederation, also said he would urge Bolivian authorities to expel all foreign priests responsible for Marxist subversion.

The military took over coup-prone Bolivia July 17 to head off the expected election of a leftist president.

Delegates from 20 countries ended their three-day meeting with a series of resolutions for fighting Marxism, including one calling for expulsion of Jesuit priests who "organize rural guerrilla movements under the pretext of evangelizing."

Reyes, the only delegate officially representing a government, told reporters Archbishop Manrique, a critic of human rights violations by the military regime, "should also be expelled from Bolivia," he added.

"Because of his advanced age, Manrique has not been touched, nor do I believe he will be touched. So we ask Bolivian priests who are our friends to help us exorcize him, because I believe he is possessed by the devil."

"I think we've made changes and I think most of the changes are not as noticeable as in changing the habit," said Sister Francilla. "We've kept the habit and we've kept the schools and we've agreed that we are going to stay in the teaching field. We've certainly done what Vatican II has asked and we've made a much, much deeper study of our tradition, of our roots, and I think what that has brought about is many changes in our attitudes and in our apostolate."

Pope chooses freedom as theme

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Polish-born Pope John Paul II has chosen freedom as the theme for the World Day of Peace marked by the Roman Catholic Church on Jan. 1, the Vatican announced Thursday.

"Every threat to true freedom is also a threat to peace. The violation of the freedom of individuals or the freedom of peoples creates intolerable situations, structural oppression or visible or hidden domina-

tion," the Vatican said in a statement detailing the pope's views.

John Paul has avoided direct comment on the recent Polish strikes, but his calls for prayers for that country have been interpreted as thinly-disguised support for the strikers, who demand free trade unions and greater religious freedom. In predominantly Roman Catholic Poland.

The World Day of Peace was started by Pope Paul VI on Jan. 1, 1968. Sermons on peace are delivered in all Catholic churches that day. The pope will deliver a major address with the call, "to serve peace, respect freedom," the Vatican said.

At his Alban Hills summer retreat in Castel Gandolfo south of Rome, meanwhile, the pope told mayors and urban planners Thursday the "sacredness of human life and its transmission" and the invariability of human rights must be the guiding principles in forming policies on population and urban planning.

Millions lie sleepless suffering with 'lumberjacks of the night'

NEW YORK (AP) — The young woman needed to know whether Robert Crossley's anti-snoring invention really worked. "If it does," she said, "I might get serious about the guy."

Another customer, a prison inmate, wrote that his cellmates had threatened to set his bunk on fire if he didn't stop snoring.

And a Connecticut man worried that if he didn't stop snoring before he died, "it'll take the undertaker three days to quiet me down."

About 35 million Americans — the American Medical Association estimates the number at one in every eight persons, evenly divided between men and women — "saw logs" regularly and enthusiastically.

LETTING OFF SLEEP, as snoring has been euphemistically termed, can be a sign of serious medical problems, but is generally not considered abnormal, doctors say.

In fact, some of history's more noted snorers include Beau Brummell, Cato the Elder and U.S. presidents such as George Washington, Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt.

Some people claim their mates' snoring is a most comforting sound, and Irish playwright George Farquhar, circa 1700, hailed the snorer's various sniffls, chirrs, buzzes, zips, pops and wheezes as "The tuneful serenade of that wakeful nightingale, the nose."

But snoring can be a real problem for roommates, husbands and wives, brothers and sisters and sometimes even neighbors whose sleep is shattered by a blissful lumberjack of the night.

THE COMPLAINERS HAVE a point: Tests in London concluded that a hearty snore can reach a noise level of 69 decibels. Some jackhammers are quieter.

"He snored so loud," 18th century satirist Jonathan Swift once wrote of a fellow traveler, "that we thought he was driving his hogs to market."

More recently, David Reed of Seattle learned that two tenants in his apartment building had moved out because of his snoring. He was not surprised.

Reed, 38, ruefully recalled that once, after snoring through a night in a barn during a church outing, "Someone thought it was a tractor."

Snoring is caused by vibrations of the soft palate, tongue and other muscles in the mouth as air is inhaled. Drinking, smoking, obesity, congestion, loose dentures, tension and lack of exercise can contribute to snoring, as can more serious medical problems such as enlarged tonsils and adenoids, oral and nasal deformities, nasal polyps, allergies and inflamed sinuses.

DR. PHILLIP GREEN of the sleep disorders clinic at the Marshfield (Wis.) Clinic said snoring can also be a sign of a dangerous condition called sleep apnea.

Apnea is caused by a deformity that makes the sleeper stop breathing for anywhere from 20 seconds to two minutes several times an hour. It can be successfully treated by a tracheotomy, making an incision in the windpipe.

Advice columnist Ann Landers tells wives of snorers to sew ping pong balls to the backs of their husbands' pajamas to discourage them from sleeping on their backs.

A similar ploy was used 200 years ago when snoring colonial soldiers were ordered to do the same thing with musket balls so their comrades could get enough rest to fight the Revolutionary War.

But what about people who snore in any position? Or don't wear pajamas? Ann Landers admits the ping pong ball method is only about 50 percent effective.

IT'S STILL BETTER, however, than some other methods, such as the bicycle horn a woman tried to get her husband to strap on so he would toot himself awake when he snored.

Like alcoholism, the snorer's biggest battle may be admitting he or she does rattle the roof. Tape recordings sometimes work, if the snorer doesn't protest, "That can't be me!"

"There ain't no way," Mark Twain mused, "to find out why a snorer can't hear himself snore."

Snorers who do want to reform may try everything from tape to hypnosis. Snorees who can no longer suffer a partner's sibilant insufflations may resort to earplugs or separate bedrooms.

For those willing to try almost anything, patents have been issued on more than 100 various anti-snoring contraptions involving straps and springs, flaps and prongs.

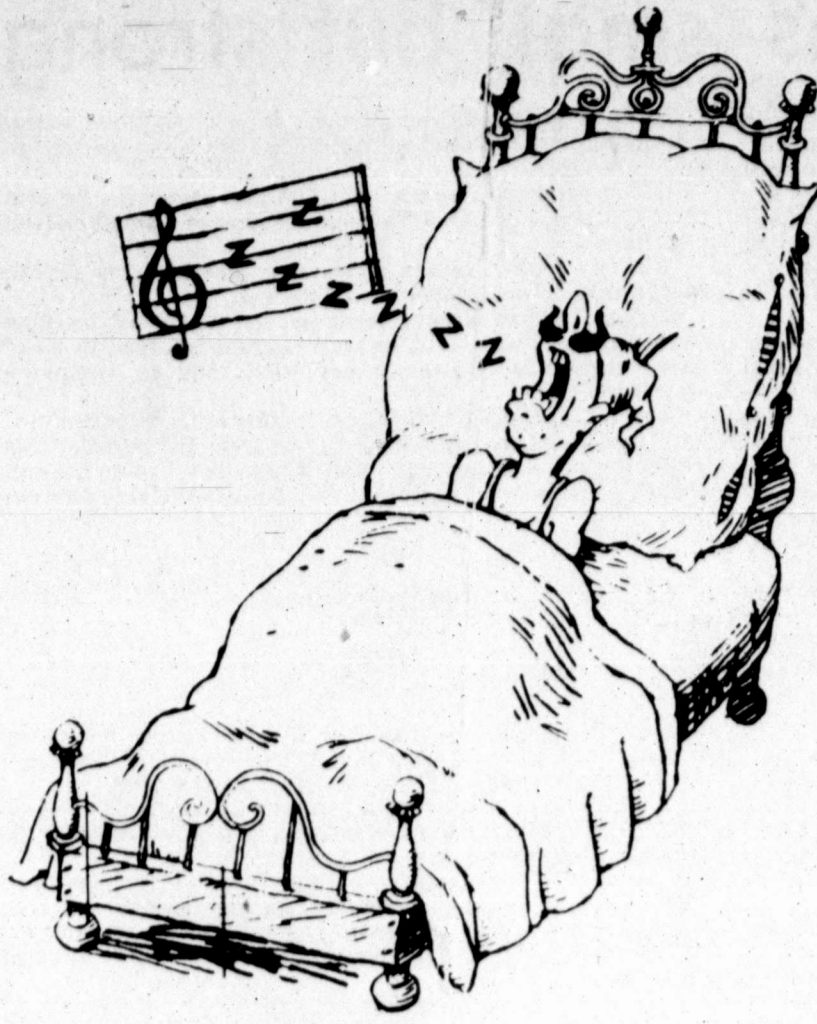
BUT THE ONLY ONE with a money-back guarantee is the "snore suppressor" invented and sold by Crossley, a reformed snorer and retired engineer in Austin, Texas.

For \$79.95, Crossley's 1,000 customers so far this year have received a three-ounce plastic sleep collar that sends electrical impulses into the neck with each snore.

"My collar punishes the body, very mildly but enough to build up a mental block against snoring," Crossley explained. He claims a success rate of more than 90 percent.

Crossley, whose snores once drove his wife to a bedroom down the hall, knows the truth in the old saw:

Laugh, and the world laughs with you; snore, and you sleep alone.



Agency offers big savings on rental of clunker cars

CHICAGO (AP) — Dennis Streeter is in the business of renting junk.

Streeter, 28, is the manager of Fender Benders Rent-a-Car in Evanston, an agency that rents clunkers for half — or less — of what competitors charge.

Operating out of an abandoned gas station, Streeter has about 30 vehicles — compact, mid- and full-size cars and station wagons — which he rents for up to two months for as little as \$9.95 a day.

One of Fender Benders' biggest customers, Ethel Merker, said she was delighted when she saw the agency's ads.

"It's a lot of fun renting wrecks," said Ms. Merker, a musician who lives on the near North Side. "I'm a hotrod-racer in a car, just like a cabdriver, I've had a Corvete and a 442 Olds, but I like the rented cars better. They're character cars."

Since the cars are already beat up, Ms. Merker says she doesn't worry about dents. "You take out a little insurance on the car, and if you get a dent, the more merrier," she said.

Ms. Merker says she has rented so many different cars from Fender Benders since it opened two months ago that when she leaves her apartment for work in the morning, she's not sure which of the cars parked in front of her home is hers.

With today's prices for cars and auto repairs, renting from Fender Benders is economical, said Streeter, a graduate student in business at DePaul University. For \$9.95 a day you can rent a Ford Pinto — with about 70,000 miles on it — compared to \$30.99 a day for a newer and shinier car from a major rental agency.

The concept of the business isn't new — similar outfits began cropping up in California several years ago.

Since the agency opened, customers have been pouring in, said Streeter, who came to Chicago several years ago from Cherry Valley, a small town near Rockford.

Fender Benders' customers are usually people whose cars are being repaired or young people who don't own their own cars but need one on the weekends, Streeter said.

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Genetic research foresees no monsters

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — No "genetic monsters" are likely to result from gene implantation, but the breakthrough in manipulating mouse genes could provide important clues to genetic development and the treatment of genetically caused disease, Yale scientists say.

The researchers announced this week that after injecting foreign genes into newly fertilized mouse eggs, 2 of 78 injected embryos were born with the foreign gene incorporated in their own genetic systems.

Dr. Jon Gordon, a Yale researcher who developed the gene implant process, said the successful experiment was another step in a current biological "revolution."

"This technique demonstrates that we can take genes and insert them into living cells in a natural setting (the mouse)," he said.

Researchers already had succeeded in implanting genes from viruses into isolated mouse cells and other living cells. But until now, scientists had not performed implants on egg cells that later developed into living animals, he said.

If mice with lab-altered genes are produced in large numbers and develop to adulthood, they can be used for research on how genes affect the development of different organs, he said.

Such research also may provide clues in the treatment of diseases caused by genetic deficiencies.

It is "very unlikely" that gene implanting could lead to creation of new and possibly dangerous forms of life, Gordon said, because the mice experiments use small, harmless genetic material and living cells usually die if their genetic content is altered drastically.

"I kind of think we will always be operating below the threshold of creating genetic monsters," he said.

The experiment was carried out over the past year under the direction of Frank Ruddle, chairman of Yale's biology department, who was in West Berlin on Thursday to describe the findings at a scientific meeting.

George Scangos, a researcher who analyzed the experiment results, said, "I was quite ecstatic. This was a process that we had no reason to believe would work."

In the implant procedure, the researcher took fragments of microscopic viruses and joined them through recombinant DNA technology. DNA, deoxyribonucleic acid, the active material of genes, transmits a code of instructions that determines the inherited characteristics in all living things.

The DNA then was injected into newly fertilized mouse eggs that were implanted in the reproductive organs of a female mouse.

Yale now has about 40 mice born of female mice implanted with eggs containing added genes.

Publisher wants custody of boy who 'stowed away' in plush hotel

ATLANTA (AP) — A South Carolina publisher is fighting for custody of a 13-year-old boy he found roaming the hallways of a plush Atlanta hotel, sleeping under stairways and snatching food from buffet tables and room service trays.

Jim Broomfield, who publishes union newsletters in Beach Island, S.C., was attending a convention at the Hyatt Regency Hotel last month when he met young Marcus Maddox.

Broomfield said he became involved in the boy's problems, calling social agencies and police officials. Finally, he took the boy home and applied for permission to become his foster father.

"I was raised an orphan," said Broomfield. "I can remember when I was 13. I was at a crossroads, and I can see that Marcus is at the same place."

Marcus was put up for adoption at birth and lived for 11 years in a foster home. But his foster mother had to give him up when she became ill, and the youth was placed in a second home in Atlanta.

He ran away from the second home a few days before Broomfield arrived at the hotel with his wife and 12-year-old son, Jimmy.

"I noticed Jimmy had a young companion who was

running around the place with him," Broomfield said in an interview published in Friday's Atlanta Journal. "I thought it was one of the other delegates' children."

At 6 a.m. on the third day of their stay, Marcus knocked on the Broomfields' hotel door looking for Jimmy.

"We thought it strange he was there so early, and that he was wearing the same T-shirt and Levis he had on the first day," said Broomfield. "I let him in and told him to lay down on the couch and wait till Jimmy woke up. Marcus didn't get up until noon; it was obvious he had been awake all night."

Broomfield said Marcus told the family he had been living at the hotel for about a week, sleeping under a stairway.

"He ate food left on trays and buffet tables. He spent his days going up and down the elevators, and in the swimming pool and children's recreation room. Nobody seemed to bother with him until I took notice."

Hyatt spokeswoman Dotti Naeci said the convention had "kids all over the place" and it would have been possible for Marcus to have gone unnoticed for several days. But she said it was not likely.

"We aren't saying his story isn't true, but we have so many things locked up and we have 'walk-throughs' by guards all night."

Broomfield contacted Atlanta authorities about Marcus, who was taken to a temporary shelter. Marcus contacted the family a few days later, during the Labor Day weekend, and said he had run away again.

Broomfield said he called police to tell them Marcus was with him, and he tried to reach social service agencies, but no one was in because of the holiday.

So the family took Marcus home to their 15-acre ranch in South Carolina, where Broomfield began attempts to become the boy's foster father.

MC enrollment continues to climb toward record

Carter approves AFL-CIO aid to Poland's unions

WASHINGTON (AP) — With an eye on the presidential election, the Carter administration is reluctantly going along with an AFL-CIO plan to aid Poland's new independent trade union movement.

Qualified informants, who asked not to be identified, confirmed Thursday that election-year politics were a factor in the administration's tacit decision to soften its opposition to any American involvement in Poland's labor upheaval.

The AFL-CIO announced the establishment of a special fund, with a proposed \$25,000 initial contribution, to assist Polish worker efforts to organize an independent union movement.

The president of the giant American labor federation, Lane Kirkland, gave Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie 24 hours' notice of the AFL-CIO decision.

The AFL-CIO announced its plans Thursday, shortly before it formally endorsed President Carter's re-election bid and pledged a massive campaign to defeat Republican Ronald Reagan.

During the 18-day labor strike in Poland, the Carter administration adopted a hands-off policy in the hope of minimizing the possibility of Soviet intervention there.

That prospect was defused somewhat when Polish workers ended their strike this past weekend but, according to the informants, the administration is still uneasy about the AFL-CIO plan.

Asked for Muskie's response to the AFL-CIO action, State Department spokesman John Traitner said the secretary told Kirkland there was a "risk" that it could be "deliberately misinterpreted."

The statement was seen as evidence of Muskie's concern that the Soviets might view the plan as a provocation.

Almost as Traitner spoke, the Soviet news agency Tass accused Western labor organizations of meddling in Poland's internal affairs and denounced their aid to Poland's workers.

It was not clear whether the Tass dispatch was referring to the AFL-CIO action or to previous demonstrations of solidarity with Polish workers by American and Western European unions.

In any case, the informants said Muskie was not about to try to dissuade Kirkland from going ahead with the plan on the eve of the AFL-CIO endorsement of Carter.

If the administration had opposed the plan outright, it would have alienated organized labor and many Polish-American voters as well, one source said.

The heaviest concentration of Polish-Americans, 1.2 million, is in the Chicago area. Chicago Mayor Jane Byrne, on a visit to the Vatican, gave Pope John Paul II a \$10,000 gift from her campaign fund and asked that it be used to help Poles affected by the strike, two Chicago newspapers reported Thursday.

But Muskie's attitude was not governed entirely by domestic political considerations. The sources pointed out that Muskie was careful not to give his blessing to the AFL-CIO plan, mindful of the continuing sensitivity of Poland as a foreign policy issue.

"Muskie could have come down with his arm draped around Kirkland's shoulder and endorsed the plan but he didn't," one informant noted.

The aid plan was approved by the AFL-CIO's general board, composed of the presidents of all 104 member unions.
