Muskie sees movement on hostages

Muskie says there are signs that the new Iranian government may be ready to begin discussing release of the American hostages.

"There are signs that they're beginning to think of actually debating the hostage issue. There are signs of increasing awareness on the part of leaders of the various factions that the hostage issue ought to be settled in Iran's interest," Muskie said on CBS-TV's "Face the Nation" interview program Sunday.

"There are, of course, signs that there will be responses to some initiatives that have been taken on our side from members of Congress (and) my own letter to the prime minister," he said. "There are signs also they are listening to urgings from other sources, other countries, to settle the hostage issue in their own

'So it may be that as governmental authority is put together, they will begin to debate this issue, consider the terms on which they're willing to resolve it, and we

with them on those terms," said the former Maine

Meanwhile, Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr formally presented the revolutionary government's first proposed cabinet for parliament approval, according to Tehran Radio.

Asked whether a congressional inquiry, reportedly proposed in a draft response from Iran to a letter from 187 U.S. congressmen, would be successful in securing the hostages' release, Muskie replied:

"I think it would depend on its timing and nature ... and other possible terms that might be raised ... standing by itself, its value might be lost."

He wants less taxes, government

Libertarian Party presidential candidate speaks here

Slashing income taxes and abolishing numerous government agencies which interfere with business and private life are two primary points in Edward E. Clark's presidential campaign which he brought to West Texas

on Sunday. Clark, Libertarian Party's candidate for president, held a news conference Sunday morning in the Midland Hilton following a fund-raising breakfast.

He was introduced by J.D. Webster, who described himself as the "only congressional candidate in this district who is willing to run with his presidential candidate." Webster is challenging incumbent Kent Hance, D-Lubbock, for his 19th District congressional seat.

Clark's tax cut proposals involve a bigger slash than those voiced by Republican Ronald Reagan or Democrat Jimmy Carter. In the Libertarian's plan, taxes in all income brackets would be cut in half and the minimum taxable income would be upped, leaving many of the lower middle income people completely off the tax rolls.

WITH THAT TAX cut would come "substantial cuts in spending," said the 50-year-old Clark. The ax would fall first on the Department of Energy which causes massive energy con-

sumption in the United States and discourages production of oil and

The Massachusetts native called for "letting oil and gas companies dig holes in Texas and Alaska for oil and gas" instead of U.S. men digging holes to fight a war in the Persian Gulf.

Tax cuts would extend to the agriculture business where Clark sug-gested abolishing the estate and gift tax. This tax, he said, "is an impedi-

ment to family farming."

Continuing on his point, Clark said he would end all embargos on exports and stop limitations on how many acres are farmed with what crop. This would give farmers benefit of the free market and free taxpayers from paying the "massive subsidies that are going to farmers."

THESE TAX CUTS have another end result, he claimed - more employment and a better economy.

Current foreign policy "is dangerous to our society.' he said in pushing for a withdrawal by the U.S. from defending other countries and to concentrating on the home front.

Tying the country to treaties with other nations is dangerous, Clark warned, and could lead to nuclear war. A simple war can lead to use of tactical weapons and intercontinental ballistic weapons, and "this means destruction of our society."

He called first for phasing out of treaties with the North Atlantic Trea-

ty Organization (NATO), saying that other countries should be willing to

spend more on their own defense. Now a Los Angeles business counselor, Clark used the example of Japan in explaining his point. He said the U.S. subsidizes that country's defense to the point that each Japanese citizen pays \$87 for defense. In the U.S., defense costs per person run to

PRESENTLY, FORD Motor Co. and General Motors actually are the ones bearing the load of subsidizing Japan's defense, he charged. "Datsun and Toyota are not paying anything. Phase out our subsidy of defense of Japan and let Datsun and Toyota pay for their own defense."

When questioned about the party's stand on drugs and homoseyuality.



Matthew Mueller's abduction ended late Saturday when the boy wriggled free of his bonds and fled the back of a light blue van. FBI agents, informed of the escape on their radios, cheered the news, and the boy's mother, Beth Smith, cried "I want a kiss!" when she was reunited with Mueller.

Mrs. Smith had spent many of the hours after her son was taken driving to several designated drop-off points, only to be stood up.

Sgt. W.D. Cobb said Sunday investigators were looking for a specific individual, but he declined to elabo-

Bani-Sadr OK's part of cabinet

In another step toward debate on the American hostages, Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr accepted two-thirds of Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai's proposed Cabinet and submitted the names to Parliament for approval. But the Bani-Sadr and Rajai remained at odds over the other seven ministers.

Tehran Radio reported Bani-Sadr accepted 14 of the 21 ministers nominated by Rajai, who was elected prime minister by the Majlis, or Parlia-ment, after Bani-Sadr's first choice for the job was rejected. The broadcast said Rajai nominated seven other men for the vacant posts, but five of them were the same nominees Bani-Sadr refused to agree to earlier. Hossdein Musavi, Rajai's pick for foreign minister, was among them.

In a letter to the Majlis, the prime minister said he hoped Bani-Sadr "will finalize the investigation of some cases and that I can take the necessary measures to introduce the rest of the members of the Cabinet "

The Majlis will begin consideration of the Cabinet nominations on Tuesday, Radio Tehran said. Approval of

the lineup will advance the Parliament another step toward consideration of problems facing the country, including the fate of the 52 American hostages who today were spending their 310th day in captivity.

Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the Iranian revolution, has given the Majlis authority to determine the fate of the Americans taken prisoner when militant Islamic students occupied the U.S. Embassy in Tehran last Nov. 4.

The Foreign Relations Commission of the Majlis held preliminary discussions on the issue Saturday, but no date was announced for debate in the full parliament to begin. However, Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said Sunday, "Thera are signs that they're beginning to think of actually debating the hostage issue. There are signs of increasing awareness on the part of leaders of the various factions that the hostage issue ought to be settled in Iran's interest.

Appearing on CBS-TV's Face the Nation, Muskie predicted there would be a U.S. congressional inquiry after the hostages are released into the U.S. role in Iran during the reign of Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

Gunmen holding seven hostages in steakhouse

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - Three gunmen who apparently bungled a robbery attempt took several persons hostage at a popular steakhouse early today, then served them free drinks and told them not to worry, authorities and witnesses said.

Six of the hostages later were released, but deputies said as many as seven still were captive.

Bart Whalen, a Multnomah County sheriff's spokesman, said communications had been established with the men inside The Ringside in northwest Portland and negotiations had begun. He said the FBI also had been called in with a negotiations specialist. The gunmen asked for handcuffs,

which were placed on a porch. A hostage crawled out on hands and knees to retrieve them.

An early-morning fog had settled over the area, reducing visibility to less than 200 yards. Deputies said they feared that would encourage the would-be robbers to make a break, but the sun broke through shortly after dawn.

The well-lit building stood eerily in the suburban neighborhood where dogs barked occasionally and deputies ran from hedge to hedge. Residents were not evacuated.

A soprano who won district Metropolitan Opera auditions this year in Oklahoma, the 54th Miss America took the crown with a witty rendition of "Lucy's Aria" from the opera, "The Telephone.

She plans to use her \$20,000 scholarship for voice lessons and hopes to sing with a major opera company someday. She also hopes to earn "as much as possible. A hundred-thousand

dollars? That sounds good. That would be really nice. Her predecessor, Cheryl Prewitt, earned some \$100,000 through ap-

The green-eyed Miss Powell, who wears her dark hair in a chignon - a knot of hair worn at the back of the neck - says she's a "middle class" woman from a small town who relaxes by watching television.

When she's not at Oklahoma City University, she lives with her mother, Vinita, who is divorced from her father, Wendell Powell. She doesn't have a boyfriend and said premarital sex is "not right for me at this time in my life."

About marriage, she said: "I will marry only if I meet someone I can't live without. The new Miss America says abortion should be a matter of choice for a woman and her doctor, but said she personally was against it.

She has never used illegal drugs and supports decriminalization, not legalization, of marijuana, she said. Miss Powell said she would support a draft for women "if it meant living in a free country," but would not reveal her presidential choice.

Brown and Mrs. Cornelius, who admit they're more than just business partners, say they are undecided about their own wedding plans. The member of the CHARLES MANSON "family," imprisoned at the Federal Correctional Institute for Women at Alderson, W.Va., spoke about the 1975 incident in an interview with the Sacramento Bee, published Sunday

"I was fed up. With lots and lots of things," Ms. Fromme said. "Here's this guy coming in to Sacramento, smiling like everything's all right with the world, and we got all these problems over here.'

She said she was "checking things out" when she confronted the president. Officials said after the incident that the firing chamber in her gun was empty but there was live ammunition in the clip. Ms. Fromme, 31, said she ejected the top shell before she left home.

Also at the Alderson prison is SANDRA GOOD, another follower of Manson, the convicted mastermind of the 1969 Tate-LaBianca slayings. Ms. Fromme said the two don't want to leave prison until Manson

"We just were not content out there without him ... If you look into yourself enough, you'll see Charlie there," Ms. Fromme said. 'You'll see Manson because he's been there so long.

During the past six years, Hoffman has been in hiding, dodging trial on charges of cocaine possession and bail jumping. His return to society last Thursday had all the trappings of a Hoffman production.

The period during which the Yippies existed was a tumultous one. The United States was rocked by the controversy of the Vietnam War, the horror of the drug culture, the confusion of the flower children and contempt for the draft evaders.

Carter's scare tactics give U.S. no protection

President Carter's shoddy campaign tactic of announcing a new nuclear strategy in the middle of the Democratic National Convention is just replacing one fraud with another

The new policy is a fraud because thanks to Carter we do not have the weapons to implement it, assuming he even intends to do it once he's past the election. The old policy is a fraud because it was flawed from its incep-

The new strategy - to aim our nukes at Soviet military and command targets — is correct and logi-cal. It was also recommended in the Republican Party platform. To counter criticism, Carter dusted off a oncerejected counterforce strategy so fast his own Secretary of State had to learn about it from the newspapers.

This follows the pattern of the Carter Administration which pretends to govern by issuing press releases. It is a lie to tell the American people we have a new strategy be-cause we do not have the weapons to implement it. To destroy Soviet missiles and command posts requires great power and great accuracy. The only weapons we have with such power and accuracy are the ones the Soviets would knock out in a first

Let me explain the two strategies. The old one said that if the Soviets make a first strike against our nuclear weapons, we will fire the remainder at Soviet cities and industries. This brainchild of Robert McNamara, former secretary of defense, was de-

fective for two reasons. The major reason is that it puts an American president in the position of surrendering or committing national suicide. The Soviets have enough missiles to blast our land-based missiles, our air bases and our sub bases with only about a third of their available warheads. The experts figure such a strike might kill 18 to 20 million Americans.

Now, suppose it happens. The president can blow up some Soviet cities and factories but he can't hurt the remaining two-thirds of the Soviet nuclear force. So the Soviets say, "Okay, Mr. President, you can hurt us pretty badly, but if you push that button, 120 million Americans in your cities will die and it's all over. Do you want to commit national suicide or

You see the second reason McNamara's plan is flawed is that civilians and factories have a secondary priority in the Soviet Union. What they value most is military power and command structure. Granted, the Soviets would be gambling that the president would surrender, but don't forget we surrendered in Vietnam to avoid much less pain than a nuclear

holocaust. A Soviet first strike makes less sense if we target what they value most - their missiles and their command structure. Then, instead of shooting at their cities, we could reply by knocking out most of their remaining missiles, thus protecting our cities and taking away their blackmail

The catch is that to do that requires a powerful nuclear warhead delivered with exceptional accuracy. The warheads on our 41 subs are too small and not accurate enough. The Minuteman and Titan missiles would be the targets of the first strike. Thus, Carter was reduced to talking about the MX missile and the cruise mis-

Videotape poses potential woes for Congress

WASHINGTON - John Burton appeared enraged, as he often does, but this time he was really agitated, some of his colleagues recalled

The 47-year-old Democratic congressman, who represents Marin County and parts of San Francisco and who is also younger brother of the equally high-voltage Rep. Phillip Burton of San Francisco, was feeling the chill of political danger and he

was mad. John Burton, a six-year House veteran whose re-election this November is not a sure thing, had just learned that his Republican challenger was planning some television commercials featuring videotapes of the congressman speaking on the House

"You know I can't stand up there (on the floor) and not make an --- of myself," Burton confided to a col-

league. This was several months ago, and Burton now says he was "never concerned" about his challenger's novel

But Dennis McQuaid, a 41-year-old Novato attorney making his first run for public office, believes the tapes could play a key role in his campaign, according to his campaign manager,

Gary Flynn. 'We have some tapes that would make the congressman look less than businesslike," he said in a telephone interview. "His style of dress, speech and hand-waving - they don't see that much in the (home) district."

If McQuaid buys television time and shows scenes of Burton speaking on the House floor, the House may be faced with a thorny legal question that could threaten the continuation of the televised floor proceedings.

House rules say the gavel-to-gavel broadcasts, which are produced and controlled by the House, may not be used for any political purpose by any House member.

The rule was adopted to discourage legislators from giving self-serving speeches on the House floor.



When McQuaid last month asked the clerk of the House for clarification of the rule's possible application to persons who are not members of the House, he received a letter dated Aug.

1 saying the whole situation is "un-An official of the House Ethics Committee, to which complaints of House rule violations would be sent, said the matter has been discussed unofficially by staff lawyers, with the consensus being that only a House member is bound by a House rule of

Another House official, aware of the potential McQuaid tactic, said House reaction to the whole question of its legality "would depend on whether Burton or any other member (of the House) is defeated and contends he was done in by the video-

tapes. But even then, he said, the option may be only to shut down the cam-

"Everyone knows an audiovisual record is a thousand times more effective than the same words on paper," he said, "but there were a lot of guys who never wanted television in here in the first place and would be happy to see it taken out."

A stenographic record of floor proceedings is published in the Congressional Record every day. Although members of Congress may edit their own remarks before the Record goes to press each night, it still is combed by political challengers for statements that can be used against an

Any citizen may purchase videotapes of floor proceedings. The cost is \$104 for a 30-minute cassette.

But what many representatives fear is the possibility that their chal-lengers are sitting at home with videotape recorders hooked up to their television sets, if they subscribe to a cable television system that carries the House proceedings.

While the broadcasts that began in March 1979 are sent via closed-circuit wiring to each member's office, the same signal is relayed to the Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network, known as C-SPAN, which beams the broadcasts by satellite to cable systems around the country.

When the House went on the air last year, C-SPAN served 350 cable systems hooked up to 3 million homes. Today, that has grown to 820 systems in all 50 states hooked up to 6 million

Nearly every new cable system that now wins local government franchises are C-SPAN customers, says network president Brian Lamb.

When John Burton first heard about McQuaid's plan, Burton, according to several colleagues, complained to House Speaker Thomas (Tip) O'Neill of Massachusetts, who suggested to Rep. Charles Rose, D-N.C., chairman of the committee that oversees the broadcasting operation, that he do something.

Rose immediately introduced a bill that would have made it a violation of federal law for any radio or television network to broadcast House proceedings for political purposes.

But Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin, D-Calif., chairman of the House Communications Subcommittee to which the bill was referred, quietly informed Rose the bill was unconstitutional. It was shelved.

Rose ordered the broadcasts to carry a notice that House rules prohibit use of the broadcasts for political purposes. C-SPAN was told to put the notice on the screen four times

during each broadcast. McQuaid seems to be the only candidate known to be considering using videotapes in this election, the first since the House went on the air, according to officials of the Republican and Democratic congressional and national committees.

Americans working overseas.

Among the principal findings of the study is the conclusion that: "The increased cost of employing U.S.

workers overseas and the reduction in the number of U.S. workers overseas reduces the competitiveness of U.S. oods and services abroad and results in a substantial drop in exports."

Additionally, with documentation to back it up, the study says: "The return of American workers from overseas will increase the domestic labor force but will not increase the number of domestic jobs. Therefore,

domestic unemployment increases.' The study also concludes that there is a direct, causal linkage between the presence of Americans in overseas markets and the sale of U.S. goods and services. Americans overseas lay a significant role in directing business back to the U.S. domestic

economy, the study shows. Although there are a number of variables, depending upon market sector and various market biases on a country-by-country basis, the study claims that it is generally the case that a 10 percent drop in Americans overseas leads to a 5 percent drop in Culpepper, commenting on the

scope of the loss of overseas business points out that, "once you lose markets overseas it's very hard to get back in." He said, "We're finding that to be especially true in the U.S. engineering and construction industry where we ranked first in worldwide contracts in 1976 and have now dropped to seventh.

Gants adds, "The U.S. engineering and construction industry had over 10 percent of the construction volume in the Middle East four years ago and now has less than 2 percent, almost entirely due to the current U.S. tax treatment of overseas Americans, and industry is finding it very difficult to recapture its former standing."

A complete reversal of current tax practices to effectively eliminate U.S. taxes on most Americans overseas would, over a 12-month period result in an increase of at least 5 percent in U.S. exports or more than \$6 billion in real net tax revenues to the federal Treasury and an additional \$700 million in state and local tax revenues. More sales and more jobs mean more tax revenues. Lost sales mean no tax

Gants said, "We are not suggesting that the tax treatment of U.S. citizens living and working overseas accounts entirely for cumulative trade deficits since 1976 that now exceed \$130 bil-lion. Neither do we assert that rever-sal of current U.S. tax practices on foreign earned income will, in itself,

restore our nation to the 23 percent of worldwide trade it enjoyed in 1969 as compared to the 14 percent share it maintains now.

"But we do assert that reversal of current U.S. tax practices will constitute a major step on the road to recovery to our traditional place in international market share.

"In fact," Gants says, "of all of the current U.S. disincentives that discourage trade, none is easier to eliminate than the U.S. practices of taxing foreign earned income. And none," he stresses, "will produce faster or more substantial results for our balance of trade.

Bank robberies at record level

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A record number of bank robberies — 36 so far this year with an average take of \$1,500 — has law enforcement and bank officials here baffled.

During all of 1979, there were 30 bank heists. One police theory is that many of the 300 banking offices here are small, drive-in structures, in suburbs and near freeways, that are convenient not only for customers, but for robbers as well.

Economic conditions apparently are not to blame for the increase, police say. And the fact that most stickups are solved and many robbers caught and convicted has not deterred the crimes.

On Aug. 28, Carter unveiled a \$31 billion "economic revitalization" plan with tax cuts and job-creating spending designed to combat the recession, spur business investment and offset the impact of higher Social Security taxes.

Carter declared, however, that he did not want the \$27.6 billion tax cut portion — or any other tax cut bill — enacted before the Nov. 4 election, fearing the effects of political pressure on the legislation.

Carter's plan came under sharp attack from Republicans who called it

politically motivated and won only mild praise from congressional Democrats, who indicated they wanted to change it.

Reagan has proposed a \$37 billion tax cut plan with a 10 percent across-the-board income tax reduction and an accelerated depreciation plan that would allow businesses to more quickly write off the cost of new buildings and machinery.

And the Senate Finance Committee has drafted its own tax cut bill, which would reduce taxes \$39 billion next

The House Budget Committee will take the president's plan into account when it begins work, probably next week, on drafting a binding budget for fiscal 1981, which starts Oct. 1.

Despite this week's review of Carter's economic package, Congress is still not considered likely to approve a 1981 budget before the election. House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. has said a post-election, "lame-duck" session is almost cer-

In other congressional action this week:

—Top administration officials will also be on Capitol Hill to testify about the president's brother.

White House counsel Lloyd Cutler will appear Wednesday before senators who want to know if Billy Carter was given inside information to help him fend off federal prosecution concerning his dealings with Libyan officials.

That open hearing will come one day after a closed session in which intelligence witnesses, possibly including CIA Director Stansfield Turner, will appear before the nine-member investigative subcommittee.

Billy Carter registered earlier this summer as a Libyan agent following 18 months of prodding — but no prosecution — by the Justice Department. He acknowledged taking \$220,000 from the Libyans but said the money was a loan from friends, not a payment intended to buy influence in the United States.

—The House plans to consider legislation making it easier to build slurry pipelines to transport coal from the vast coal fields of the West.

The pipelines would carry pulverized coal mixed with water. Supporters of the concept say the method would be cheaper than rail transportation and thus save consumers money. But the railroad industry opposes slurry pipelines, saying they could deal a death blow to the struggling rail industry.

No-name cigarettes sell well at supermarket

DENVER (AP) — Cigarette smokers unhappy that too much of their money is going up in smoke are stampeding a Colorado supermarket chain that sells generic cigarettes at 44 cents a pack — a savings of 11

The cigarettes hit the shelves of 53 King Soopers stores two months ago and promptly outsold every brand except Marlboro, a spokesman for the supermarket chain said. The cigarettes, king-size filtered lights, are packaged in plain white wrapping with black lettering, leaving smokers guessing about what brand lies beneath.

"I don't really like filter cigarettes, but I thought I'd try them," said Charles Mayo of Denver as he purchased a carton of the cigarettes recently. "They taste like Winston or Marlboro."

Mayo said he tried the generic cigarettes because of their low price and his need to change brands every once in a whle.

Bill Boggess, vice president of merchandising and advertising for King Soopers, declined to say how many packs of generic cigarettes the supermarket chain was selling. He said Marlboros were the top seller, and King Soopers sells 9 million cartons of cigarettes a year.

Customers are attracted by the generic brand's low price, made possible because "there are no advertising, no salesmen and no marketing costs for it," said Boggess.

King Soopers purchases the generic cigarettes from Topco & Associates of Chicago, which distributes more than 200 generic food and

household items to 36 grocery store chains in the United States.

The cigarettes are manufactured for Topco by a nationally known company and are exactly like cigarettes packaged under that company's own label, said Topco president Marcel Lussier. He would not identify the manufacturer.

Other chains selling the generic cigarettes, with varying degrees of success, include Shopping Bag stores in southeastern Pennsylvania and southern New Jersey; Tom Thumb stores in Dallas and other Texas cities; Big Bear stores in Columbus; and Meijer stores in Detroit and western Michigan.



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

Cubans claim they were cheated by candidate

MIAMI (AP) - A group of 200 Cuban refugees stranded in Costa Rica have complained to the U.S. ambassador there that a Republican congressional candidate duped them out of nearly \$100,000, The Miami Herald reports.

The Cubans, in an affidavit submitted to ambassador Francis Mac-Neill, said that Evelio Estrella, who hopes to oust Democratic U.S. Rep. Claude Pepper, promised to get them to the United States.

But their ship was stopped, they're stuck in Costa Rica and their money, most of it collected from relatives here. has not been returned, the Herald said Sunday.

Estrella, 52, denied any wrongdoing and said he was trying to get the refugees' money back, the newspaper reported. He could not be reached Sunday for com-

communist. "Rulikovo was an example of the high patriotism and selfless courage of Russian soldiers, of the triumph of the rightful duty of the nation."

Izvestia, the government newspaper, said the victory on Sept. 8, 1380, "proved that the unification of Russian people opens the way to the overthrow of the yoke of foreign conquerors."

"The battle became a synonym of Russian military glory," it said. "It became a turning point in Russia's battle for independence. It led to a fundamental change in the entire political situatiion of Eastern Europe.

'It was at Kulikovo Field that the features which subsequently lent Russia her unique national character were first diplayed," wrote historian Fyodor Nestorov in a new book "Continuity of Epochs." He listed courage, modesty, selflessness and patriot-

The Mongols had been ravaging and plundering Russian cities for about 150 years when Prince Dmitry Donskoi assembled a force, mostly of raw recruits, from Moscow and neighboring cities to confront the armies of Khan Mamai.

They met on a muddy field 160 miles southeast of Moscow at the confluence of the Don and Nepryada

According to the ancient chronicles, the carnage was so great that the field ran with rivers of blood, the sun was obscured and the commands of the chieftains could not be heard for the clash of swords, the neighing of horses and the groans of the dying. The rivers cut off the Russians' retreat, and after

three hours of slaughter the Mongols broke and fled. Only one in 10 of the fighters returned home; Dmitry's forces spent 12 days burying their dead. The battle did not end the Mongol yoke, which lasted 100 years more. But the unity the Russian princes found there and the inspiration of the victory

finally drove the Mongols back east. Kulikovo has been a rallying cry against invaders ever since. Czar Alexander I invoked it to inspire resistance to Napoleon. Stalin had posters printed showing Prince Dmitry alongside Soviet troops fighting the Nazis





NEW YORK (AP) - President Carter and his Republican challenger, Ronald Reagan, ran even in Time magazine's latest poli of voter preference, the magazine says.

Carter and Reagan both attracted 39 percent of those surv eyed, Time said Sunday. The poll's sampling error was plus or minus 3 to 4.5 percent,

Meanwhile, Rep. John B. Anderson was favored by 15 percent of the ,644 registered voters nationwide surveyed Aug. 26-28 for Time by the polling organization Yankelovich, Skelly and White, the magazine said. Fifteen percent is the level of support the League of Women Voters has said is necessary for a candidate to be included in the presidential

debates it will sponsor this year. Seven percent of those surveyed were undecided, Time said. Time's news release did not list results of the magazine's previous surveys of voter preference, but it reported there were 'areas of serious

slippage for Reagan in important areas" and noted voter support for all the candidates was "shaky. Time said 55 percent of the voters surveyed "say they are not 'personally interested or excited about' any of the c andidates. Only 11

percent report genuine enthusiasm for Reagan, a mere 9 percent feel that

Both D'Amato and Javits will be on the November ballot, regardless of the outcome today - D'Amato as the candidate of the Conservative Party and Javits as that of the Liberal

In the Democratic Senate race in New York, Bess Myerson, a former New York City commissioner of consumer affairs and former Miss America, has led in the polls. Other candidates include former New York mayor and onetime Republican John V. Lindsay; U.S. Rep. Elizabeth Roltzman of Brooklyn; and Queens District Attorney John Santucci.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) -Gov. Bill Clements got a lot of what he asked for in the Texas Republican platform - and a lot he didn't want.

The state GOP convention finished work late Saturday night on the platform after two days of state and national speakers calling for defeat of President Jimmy Carter plus 41/2 hours of bitter argument over platform and a few minor party rule

The 23-plank platform approved generally followed the national platform, but also covered a number of controversial single-interest issues, plus a long list of legislative proposals that Clements wanted sanctioned.

Last Wednesday, James Kaster, Clements' top legislative liaison aide, told the convention's platform committee that the governor did not want the group to consider any planks on the Equal Rights Amendment or the so-called "pro-life" issue.

"He is concerned that we don't get divisive in the state platform," Kaster told the committee. "He feels that we have the national platform and that addressed the meaningful

Despite Clements advice, much of the convention's argument Saturday night over the platform was spent on the two old controversie - women's

rights and abortions. After numerous unsuccessful efforts to amend, the convention shouted approval of planks opposing the Equal Rights Amendment and urginng the Legislature to restrict use of state funds for abortions.

Still another plank would recognize the right of states who have ratified the national ERA amendment to rescind that approval. This was a direct attack on Texas' 1972 ratification of the natioanl ERA.

Other "firecracker" planks approved would mandate non-probated penalties for those convicted of a crime while carrying a gun, urge the Legislature to end mandatory licensing for church schools, encourage strict enforcement of pornography laws, oppose forced busing of children beyond neighborhood schools, and urge the Legislature to approve voluntary silent prayer in public

A plank endorsing the state's rightto-work laws was amended to urge prohibition of union or agency shops, where non-union members must join the union or pay dues to hold a job.

The pro-Clements planks would urge the Legislature to pass a provision allowing citizens to initiate legislation, to give the governor more contol over agency budgets, to work for repeal of federal windfall profits taxes, to permit restricted wiretap-ping in felony drug cases, to call for some sort of documentation for alien parents of pupils attending Texas schools and to encourage Clements to continue his efforts to decrease the state employee payroll and to hold the cost of government to the rate of the state's economic growth

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
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

WASHINGTON (AP) - Expectant mothers, beware. The number of foods, substances and activities to be avoided when pregnant is growing.

The Food and Drug Administration added products containing caffeine coffee, tea, cola drinks, chocolate and some medications - to the list last

Commissioner Jere Goyan said the available evidence does not condemn caffeine as a culprit in human birth defects, but he advised expectant mothers to abstain from the products or at least practice moderation in

Surgeon General Julius B. Richmond issued a warning against smoking for preganant women earlier this

He said an expectant mother who smokes is likely to deliver a lowerweight baby who may suffer behavioral problems or stunted intellectual development. For the pregnant woman who smokes, he said, risks also increase for spontaneous abortion, fetal death, death of a newborn baby and sudden infant death syn-

Then there is alcohol. Pregnant women are being warned that drinking beer, wine or liquor can lead to fetal alcohol syndrome and might contribute to growth problems, hyperactivity, retardation, heart defects and other birth defects.

'Our advice is all drugs and chemicals should be avoided unless prescribed by a doctor or dentist who knows you are pregnant," said Doris Davis, director of science information for the March of Dimes.

The advisory applies to such seemingly commonplace drugs as aspirin and vitamins as well as to hard drugs,

Elaine Clift, program director for the National Women's Health Network, added another caution. "There is no drug that has been proven safe to the fetus," she said. "Everything carries a risk."

One problem with much of the advice offered to mothers-in-waiting is that those giving it often call for moderation and prudence without saying how much is too much.

But Doris Haire, a medical sociologist who is president of the American Foundation for Maternal and Child Health, doesn't shrink from giving tough advice. She calls on women to undergo a "washout" six months be-fore they plan on becoming pregnant by stopping smoking, drinking and drug taking.

There are other things which authorities say pregnant women should avoid and habits they say the women

should change. While many pregnant women continue to work at their regular jobs, some types of physical labor may have to be discontinued and in some cases, such as where a woman works around toxic chemcials, the job may have to go.

Ms. Haire of the maternal and child welfare foundation recommends that an expectant mother avoid painting, varnishing, oven-cleaning or other pursuits which generate chemical



"If she moves out... Well, some of the other places take about 7 to 10 years to get into. She'll be playing a harp by then," Miss Jepson said. The only real estate most of us

plan to acquire is a cemetery lot," Knickerbocker resident Audrea Swift said in a letter to the editor of The Milwaukee Journal.

Daily newspaper and television stories have thrust Plunkett into the limelight

At a recent Mass at a downtown church, when a priest criticized the condominium development, Plunkett strode out of his pew, faced the congregation and defended his plans.

Plunkett, who still speaks with a faint brogue, defends the conversion. as constructive rather than destructive. He says the 52-year-old building needs repairs and that selling apartments as condominiums will help finance the estimated \$1 million reno-

"I'm not really all that interested in making money," he said. "I want the accomplishment of developing the East Side, of making it what it used to be. When I look back down the beach at where I've been, I want to be able to see footprints.

He's already made some footprints. Although Knickerbocker residents and sympathizers regard Plunkett as a villain, others see him as the classic rags-to-riches hero.

His investments on the East Side include two dozen commercial, officeand apartment buildings and condominiums. He bought the Knickerbocker in 1978. He and his wife, Monica, who have

Still lacking loafers, Hondo will get federal aid

HONDO, Texas (AP) - When this south Texas city wanted federal help to build a civic center, it was told its unemployment rate wasn't high enough to merit the aid. So Mayor Woody Glasscock wrote to President Carter asking for some bona fide, hardcore loafers.

Three years and 2,000 would-be loafers later, Hondo's getting some federal money for a project it didn't really want - a new sewage treatment

Meanwhile, the maverick mayor is fighting a census count that he says is too low and will cost Hondo revenue sharing funds. Glasscock got national headlines

and thousands of letters and telephone calls after he asked Carter in June 1977 for "a list of people who won't work under any circum-

"I intend to write them letters to move here in sufficient quantities to enable us to qualify for some of your programs," he wrote

Glasscock wrote the tongue-incheek letter because the Department of Health. Education and Welfare, since divided into the departments of Education and Health and Human Services, refused to chip in for a \$1 million civic center.

Paid pupils proposed

SAN DIEGO (AP) - Memorial Junior High School lost \$132,000 last year because students played hooky. Principal Bob Amparan figures the school could save some dollars by paying the kids to show up.

'My idea may sound a little crass, but it ought to appeal to them," says the principal of the school with the worst attendance record in the San Diego area.

"I could drop all these truant kids and let them become a permanent problem on the streets. Instead, it's bold and controversial, but why not convince them that school is in their

The district-wide school board is to vote within two weeks on whether to experiment for three months with Amparan's proposal. Under the plan, each of the 950 students would be issued a card marked "25 Cents" for each day he or she attended class the month before.

Perfect attendance would be worth \$5 monthly, and the "pay" could be spent only for school-related items such as paper, notebooks, gym clothes or library fines. Apples and milk could be bought with the credit money but not "junk food.

Amparan envisions extending the program to discounts to public shows or sporting events like San Diego Chargers football games.

"It's not a giveaway but an earning thing," he said. "If it works, besides enticing these youngsters back for an education, this could save us a thousands of dollars.

countercyclical stimuli," laughs Glasscock.

He says he intended his letter as humorous criticism of a government that pumped millions of dollars into areas with high unemployment but ignored the needs of low-income towns with low unemployment.

Four people eventually came to Hondo looking for work, and "they've all got jobs. The longest anyone was unemployed was nine days," he sadi. Hondo's unemployment rate now is about 3 percent.

The mayor's presidential plea also earned Hondo more than 2,000 letters and 2,000 phone calls. "Some of the letters were absolutely hysterical... One lady said, 'if you'll just feed my son, I'll pay the bus ticket down there.' He (the son) was 26 and never

"A bunch of people were serious. All I had to do was tell them to come on and I'd of had 'em standing up to my ankles," Glasscock said.

His latest battle with the federal government is over the census count. He claims it's 5 percent too low, which could cost the city of 5,000 federal revenue sharing funds. People with post office boxes weren't counted, he says. "If I hadn't gone down and got a form myself, I wouldn't have been counted.

The city will get some federal funds, "thanks to the Environmental Protection Agency," says Glasscock in a sarcastic tone.

'The EPA told us if we didn't build new sewer plant, they'd shut us down. The price is \$4 million. The federal government will pay 75 percent, but we have to come up with \$1 million. That means our sewer fees will go up 400 to 600 percent.

Glasscock, who lost a 1978 bid for the Democratic nomination for a congressional seat undertaken on the strength of his notoriety from the Carter letter, says "I'm not going to vote for Carter.

U.S. builders shy away from solar homes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Despite proven technology and the potential for large fuel savings, U.S. home builders have been shying away from building solar homes, government and construction industry officials told Congress Monday.

Lack of consumer demand and a disinclination by most builders to experiment were blamed for the relatively low number of solar homes now being built, witnesses told a House tax-writing panel.

The testimony came as the Ways and Means Committee studied legislation to provide tax breaks to builders of solar homes incorporating socalled "passive" solar devices.

Home buyers are already eligible for federal tax subsidies — up to \$5,000 — for installing solar equipment under exising law. However, make \$2,000-per-unit tax credits avaialable to the builders for installing the equipment in the first place.

Carter proposed such a tax credit in April 1979 and "continues to support this approach," Assistant Energy Secretary Thomas E. Stelson testi-

Passive systems use elements of the building to collect, store and distribute energy with little dependence on mechanical equipment.

Large south-facing windows that collect heat from the sun, dense wall materials such as adobe or masonry that retain this heat, and tanks of water or other liquids used to store

solar heat are some examples. At the present time, Stelson said, builders "have not undertaken the construction of homes with passive solar systems in any significant quan-

Builders are not familiar with the technolgy and "are unsure of the market for residences with passive

solar systems," he said. He said the tax credit could mean 500,000 solar units through 1990 with a savings of the equivalent of 180 million barrels of oil. Additional cost of prassive solar systems betwen \$2,-

000 and \$8,000, he said. Industry groups agreed with the as-sessment. "Only 15 percent of builders are building passive solar homes because it is an additional and somewhat unknown risk," said Robert Peterson, a spokesman for the National

Association of Home Builders. He also said that the needed materials for passive solar systems are hard for builders to come by because of the lack of demand. "The only barrier is a lack of a market," he said, indicating his organization's support for the tax credit.

The bill, which has already passed the Senate, has over 100 cosponsors in the House TVA Chairman S. David Freeman

told the panel that, uner TVA sponsorship, 50 passive solar homes will be in place in the TVA region by next spring.

He said that the homes were 3 to 5 percent more expensive than conventional homes, with the typical 1,-655-square foot solar home costing \$56,500 to build. "The big payoff is in energy sav-

ings," he said. He said that, at TVA electric rates of 3.9 cents per killowatt hour - the occupant of one of these TVA demonstation homes could expect to save \$306 a year on their electric bills.

'The problem is that despite these efforts which show that passive solar nomes are cost effective over their life, the builders have little incentive to spend the extra money for them, he said. "Unfortunately passive solar is not well known to the general public.



Dear Dr. Solomon: My sister and her family live in the vicinity of a high-voltage electrical transmission line. At times, she says, she can feel her skin tingling, a sensation she attributes to radiation. Is there any danger in living this close to a highvoltage transmission line? - Pete.

Dear Pete: Studies performed so far indicate no apparent harm from electromagnetic radiation to people living close to high-voltage transmission lines. However, the effects of long-term exposure are still to be

Dear Dr. Solomon: My brother has a beautiful 16-year-old daughter whose only cosmetic flaw is discolored teeth. When I asked my dentist about this, he speculated that it might be due to some drug given my niece when she was younger, or even something taken by her mother during pregnancy. Do you have any idea what this drug is and whether anything can be done to correct the discoloration of the teeth? - Mrs. N.Y.

Dear Mrs. Y .: If the condition is in fact due to a drug taken by your niece or by her mother during pregnancy, it could very well have been tetracy cline, an antibiotic. It is now well established that terracycline taken by a child in infancy or early childhood, or by a pregnant woman, can permanently stain a child's teeth. This results when the drug combines with calcium and becomes part of the dentin, the portion of the tooth located

is not affected, the stained dentin is visible through the enamel. The Food and Drug Administration has warned physicians of this side effect of tetreacycline, and has recommended that the drug not be prescribed for children under eight years of age, or for women during the last

half of a pregnancy, unless no other suitable medication is available. If tetracycline is taken during the last half of pregnancy, the stain becomes apparent as soon as the child gets his or her baby teeth. But if it is the child who is given the drug during his or her first eight years, the stains may not become visible until the per-

manent teeth appear several years The effect of tetracycline on the teeth generally is purely cosmetic. Although in rare instances the enamel may be weakened, the teeth usually function normally. The extent of the staining depends on the degree of tooth development at the time the drug was taken, and the amount and

type of the drug prescribed.

Unfortunately, all treatment approaches to removal of the stain have decided drawbacks. When the child reaches the age of 18 or so, artificial caps may be considered. Bleaching or coating the surface of the teeth has also been tried, but with mixed results. Your brother might want to explore these various methods with his dentist, but when it comes to tetracycline-stained teeth, prevention is reallly the only satisfactory approach.

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

McEnroe thwarts Borg once again

NEW YORK (AP) - The 1980 U.S. Open tennis championships came down to two simple facts: No one could hold back Chris Evert Lloyd from fulfilling her dreams, and a gritty left-handed virtuoso named John McEnroe could shatter those of Bjorn

Lloyd became Open champion for the fifth time Saturday by beating Hana Mandlikova of Czechoslovakia 5-7, 6-1, 6-1 in what she called the most emotional victory of her distinguished career. She then yielded the spotlight to the men - and McEnroe and Borg filled it with a topsy-turvy five-set final.

McEnroe denied Borg his first American championship and a shot at tennis' Grand Slam with a 7-6, 6-1, 6-7, 5-7, 6-4 triumph Sunday that cemented a place in history for the 21-year-old from nearby Douglaston, N.Y.

The second seed became the first man to repeat as Open titlist since Neale Fraser of Australia in 1959-60 and the first American to do so since Pancho Gonzalez in 1948-49. "It's great to win this tourna-

ment two years in a row," said McEnroe, who used a variety of slices, offspeed shots and blazing returns to reverse the fiveset loss to Borg he suffered at Wimbledon in July. "After Wimbledon, I didn't know when I'd get my chance to beat him, but I figured my best chance would be here on my best surface (cement).

"There wasn't as much intensity here as at Wimbledon. I don't think Bjorn played that well the whole match.

HE CERTAINLY didn't serve well. The Swede who has won Wimbledon the last five years and also took the French Open for the fifth time earlier this year - he would have needed the U.S. and Australian Opens to complete the slam - connected on just 49 percent of his first serves and double faulted nine

"It was the worst I have ever served in a final," said Borg. "I had to work on my second serve the whole match. It was very tiring.

McEnroe began to tire in the fourth set. He played a 4¼ hour semifinal match with Jimmy

hours before the start of Sunday's final.

'I figured I'd be pretty stiff but I woke up and didn't feel bad," said McEnroe.

"I felt real good the first couple of sets but began feeling it after the fourth set. After I lost the fourth, I thought my body was going to fall off. "But I felt better in the fifth set here than at Wimbledon.

He also felt lucky. "He had the upper hand in the first set," added McEnroe. "He was serving for it at 5-4. I think he got discouraged after losing

the set.' The last four games of the first set went against service. McEnroe grabbed the last three points of the tiebreaker to win

"In the second set, I was trying my best but had no feel for the ball," noted Borg, who lost his four service games in the set. "I didn't have timing on the returns.

Borg rediscovered his form in the third set although his serve still was on vacation. He broke in the seventh game and was serving once more for a set at 5-4, only to be broken back. But he rallied from 1-3 in the tiebreaker to win it 7-5.

THE FOURTH set went with service until the 12th game, when Borg broke with a pair of perfect returns on McEnroe's second serve. Just as at Wimbledon, they marched into the fifth set.

This time, however, the ending was different. For the first time in 13 matches (since 1976). Borg lost a fifth set.

"I would have been just an other victim if I lost to him in five sets," said McEnroe, who got the break he needed in the seventh game. "I felt lucky to come back in the fifth set. I thought I was in a lot of trouble after losing the fourth set."

Trouble is something Borg is very familiar with in this event, which was worth \$46,000 to McEnroe and \$23,000 to Borg out of a \$654,082 purse, the largest in tennis history. Eight times he has failed here, including the last three years with the Grand Slam still alive. It was his third loss in the final.

"As long as I play tennis, I want to win the U.S. Open," said Borg. "I'll keep trying. It's my

Theismann conceded that the Cowboys game is

important to him as a test of how well he has performed.

"I use Dallas as a measure of how well I'm playing," he said. "They force you to be at your best"

He also said the game is important because "it is the opener, a Monday night game and against a conference opponent. We're hyped up and every-one is excited. Every game is always important against the Cowboys, whether it is the first or the last one of the year.

"For many of us, it is more than just a season opener," he said. "But for most of the veterans, it is also just the first of 16 games."

That door turns out to be Steel

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Houston Oilers may be back here this season. They may get another chance to kick in that door. Ken Stabler may make the difference.

But maybes aside, the Pittsburgh Steelers beat Houston 31-17 Sunday to open the National Football League season and launch their drive for a fifth Super Bowl title.

'The more we win, the more spoiled we get. We don't want to accept anything else," cornerback Mel Blount said after he grabbed two of the five interceptions thrown by Stabler.

"I didn't play as well as I'll be playing in four or five weeks, but we got it done," said quarterback Terry Bradshaw, who helped the Steelers to a 17-0 lead, watched the Oilers rally for a tie, and then broke the game open in the last quarter with a touchdown sneak and a 50-yard scoring pass to John Stallworth on a broken

"The Steelers are a great football team," said Oiler Coach "Bum" Phillips. "They don't have any weak-nesses. If they do, we haven't discovered them. Or we haven't exploited

FOR TWO years running, the Steelers have finished just ahead of the Oilers in the American Conference Central Division. Each year, the Oilers have made it to the AFC title game as a wild-card and lost in Pitts-

After last year's title game loss here, Phillips pledged his team would "kick the door in" this time around. And the Oilers acquired Stabler in a trade that sent Dan Pastorini to the Oakland Raiders.

After Sunday's victory, Joe Greene of the Steelers downplayed the 'door" business.

"That's a hot potato that's being tossed around by you guys who don't block and tackle," he told reporters. "I don't have my losin' speech prepared," said Phillips. "It's one game.

There's 15 to go.' A year ago, the Oilers lost 38-7 here the second week of the season. The Steelers intercepted five passes that day, three off Pastorini and two off Gifford Nielsen.

STABLER threw all five interceptions Sunday, while hitting 24 of 43 at-

tempts. Oiler receivers dropped several balls, and tipped three of the five interceptions

'We just didn't play well. We didn't execute and we got beat," said Stabler.

But beyond the dropped passes and tipped balls, the Steelers suggested Stabler was forcing some passes.

"We had seen in the films that Stabler will throw the ball even if you've got the man covered," said Blount.

Does Stabler gives the Oilers something they lacked with Pastorini, who threw two touchdown passes Sunday as Oakland beat Kansas City?

"I'm not saying that. You'll have to ask Bum Phillips that," Blount said. 'But I always had a lot of respect for Pastorini. It was a surprise to me that they traded him.'

The Steelers took a 17-0 first-quarter lead on a 29-yard touchdown reception by running back Sidney Thornton, a 1-yard run by Franco Harris and a 27-yard field goal by Matt Bahr, set up by Blount's second interception.

The second quarter was scoreless. But the Oilers, who didn't cross mid-field the first half, erupted for 17 points in the third quarter.

Toni Fritsch booted a 31-yard field

goal on Houston's opening series of the second half. Later, Oiler fullback Earl Campbell heaved a pass to Billy Johnson for a 57-yard touchdown.

"It was one of those things we had worked on three or four days in practice," said Campbell.

It was Campbell's first pass as a pro, but the Steelers halted his string of seven straight 100-yard rushing games, which ties the NFL record also held by O.J. Simpson. Campbell had 57 yards on just 13 carries.

After Pittsburgh's Theo Bell fum-

bled the ensuing kickoff, Houston drove 21 yards for a game-tying touchdown by Campbell.

The Steeler offense was dormant in the third period, except for the fact that Harris got the yards he needed to move past Jim Taylor into third place on the all-time NFL rushing list.


—Phil Simms, the second-year quarterback of the New York Giants,

Les Armes: Lesson in winning

MOLINE, Ill. (AP) - Funny thing about the day Les Armes was

It was like the day he was supposed to lose the national junior college wrestling championship because of ripped cartilage in his

It was like those days when he would collapse on the high school football field in an epileptic seizure and the team would huddle around him. He always pulled himself up again. He always finished the game

"That kid would never give up," said George Girardi, his former high school coach.

So when the priest said last rites over the spent body of Les Armes and the doctors all agreed he would not survive after brain surgery, he did a funny thing. He sat up in bed. That was eight years ago.

"I feel great now. Never felt better," Armes said the other day, sitting in his living room, fit and very much alive at 30.

Not far from his old wrestling weight of 180, Armes is a big man. He looks broad as a door and has a big jaw and brown hair thinning at the crown. As a boy his dream was to be a wrestling coach. This fall, he begins his third year as wrestling coach at Alleman High in Rock Island.

Having overcome injury, epilepsy and an almost fatal operation, Ames is teaching some wrestlers what it takes to win. He talks dispassionately to a reporter about obstacles he's had to

A week after his premature birth, Armes' mother died of a brain

"With all the medication my mother was given, I wasn't supposed to live myself," he said. "I can remember people saying I wouldn't live past age five.' Armes was raised by his grandparents in a little house in

Bloomington near the railroad tracks.

Despite his epilepsy, he played football and wrestled. Girardi sometimes stalled for a brief delay in a wrestling match because Armes was stretched out behind the bleachers, convulsed by a seizure.

At Black Hawk Junior College he won the 177-pound national title two years running and captured the National Wrestling Federation freestyle championship.

He had won a scholarship to wrestling power Oklahoma State

and seemed bound for the 1972 Olympics when things began getting foggy and his head began throbbing incessantly.

"Doctors told me that if he didn't have an operation for a brain tumor, he'd go blind and die," said his wife, Teresa, who watched him degenerate after the August 1972 surgery and eventually

In the months up to Christmas, Armes gradually lost touch with the world. He babbled and could not walk.
