# Iranian-Iraqi border dispute escalating

An Iraqi invasion force punched into Iran today and waves of Iranian warplanes bombed Baghdad and other Iraqi cities, reportedly killing three Americans, as the war between the Mideast neighbors escalated. Iran said Iraqi jets attacked the huge Ira-

nian oil refinery at Abadan. Diplomats and other officials in London said three unidentified Americans and three Britons were among 47 people reported killed in Iranian air raids on six Iraqi cities and harbors, and on a half-dozen airfields and military bases.

The Americans and Britons were killed in an attack on the petrochemical complex near Basra, Iraq, the reports said. Iraqi reports said. 116 other people were wounded in the

Iraq claimed 26 of the U.S.-made Iranian jets and two helicopter gunships were shot down. Many of the pilots were taken prisoner, it said.

For the second straight day, the Iraqi air force launched heavy raids against targets in Iran. The Baghdad command said its jets struck seven Iranian air bases in western and southwestern Iran, "set scores of enemy aircraft ablaze on the ground and destroyed many hangars and installations." Iraq conceded losing four of its MiG-21 fighters in the

The state radio in Abadan, Iran, said Iraqi planes also attacked the refinery, considered the world's largest, in that southwest Iranian city. There were no immediate damage

The United States no longer imports any Iranian oil, but other Western nations and Japan depend on it to varying degrees.

In New York, U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim called for urgent consultations among the 15 nations of the Security Council on the conflict, which he said constituted a "grave threat" to world peace.

A U.N. spokesman said that as of this morning neither Iran nor Iraq had asked for a Security Council

Tehran Radio, angrily accusing Iraq of waging war in order to force Iran to free the Americans, announced that the Iranian Parliament has now "frozen" its consideration of the hostages' fate.

In an Arabic-language broadcast, the Iranian government radio called on "brave Iraqi soldiers" not to "turn yourselves into tools for Carter's fiendish plans."

Earlier, Baghdad Radio broadcast a report that the hostages had been freed by the Iranians. But Tehran Radio denied this, and the I ragi radio

later withdrew the report.

The invasion was reported in a communique broadcast by Baghdad Radio, which said Iraqi ground forces "advanced to take control of vital positions inside of Iran" to "break the racist government" of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

The targets were not specified. But Radio Tehran said Iranian armored troops routed Iraqi troops around Khorramshahr, Iran's main port on the disputed Shatt al-Arab estuary at the head of the Persian Gulf.

Reporting on the air war, the Iraqi state radio said Iranian jets struck all over the country, attacking Baghdad, Masul, Nineveh, Basra and other tar"Many men, women and children were killed," the broadcast said. 'The largest portion of casualties occurred among the workers of the pet-rochemical and fertilizer factory of Basra, where 20 were killed and 50

Damage at the airfields was limited to one runway that was quickly repaired, the communique said.

Iraq said its invasion was in retaliation for the "unlawful and irresponsible closure to navigation of the Hormuz Strait," which connects the Persian Gulf and the Gulf of Oman and through which much of the Arab world's exported oil passes.

# Effects of border war on hostages questioned

WASHINGTON (A.P) - Despite a pledge of U.S. neutrality and some words of hope from President Carter. administration officials are worried that the border way between Iran and Iraq could have an "extremely disruptive" effect on efforts to free the 52 American hostages in Iran.

The officials, who asked not to be identified, said the Iraqi conflict could sidetrack. Iranian authorities who have focused increasing attention recently on the hostages, now in their 325th day of captivity.

The administration quickly moved to quell any suspicions in Iran that the United States is assisting the Iraqi

CBS News reported Monday night that a message to that effect has been sent to Iranian authorities, and Carter declared as he arrived in Los Angeles on a campaign swing: "We are not taking a position in support of

either Iran or Iraq. "Our only hope is that the two nations can resolve the dispute peace-

But Carter, while emphasizing he was making no predictions, also said the fighting between the two longtime Mideast enemies could convince Iran that it needs friends and neighbors 'and therefore induce them to release the hostages.

Carter said "the signals coming out of I.ran" have indicated "some new desire to resolve the problem between us and them.

Iran's government radio denied a claim by Baghdad Radio early today

that Iran has released all 52 American hostages unconditionally. Baghdad Radio said "this surprise move goes to show that the racist regime in Tehran is a collaborator with U.S. imperialism."

A few hours later, the Tehran radio said the people of Iraq should not believe "the lies carried by your

radio." It said the American hostages problem "has been frozen indefinitely by the Iranian consultative assem-

Before the denial from Tehran, a spokesman for the Iran Working Group at the State Department said the report was "dubious.

An Arab magazine published in London reported Monday that Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini has agreed that the hostages should be released within six weeks. The newsweekly 8 Days predicted negotiations will resume early next month in "a frantic race to beat the U.S.

presidential election. But Hashemi Rafsanjani, speaker of the Iranian parliament, said the

parliament will take up the hostage question only after the United States meets Iran's demands, including return of the wealth of the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi.

At the United Nations, Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie said the United States is ready to resolve the issues fairly but will not apologize for

Despite those developments, officials privately expressed frustration that a flurry of activity on the hostage question in recent days, including some seemingly conciliatory statements by Iran's top leaders, now is being overshadowed by Iran's new crisis with Iraq.

That fear seemed to gain credibility when Rafsanjani said Monday that 'the Iranian-Iraqi war will not be without effect on the fate of the hos-tages." He said "Iraq's position is close to that of the United States."

One administration official ack-Iran of U.S. neutrality in the conflict with Iraq could be complicated by the administration's decision earlier this year to approve the sale of \$11.2 million worth of equipment for use by the Iraqi Navy.

The sale, involving eight turbine engines for Italian-made frigates, is not yet final. House and Senate conferees are scheduled to meet Wednesday to take up a Senate amendment to deny Iraq the engines.

# County Commissioners sanction bonds, debate office purchase

Midland County Commissioners promptly gave their sanction on a \$1.5-million bond program for the Midland Industrial Development Corp.'s expansion of Compressor Systems plant here Monday.

But the four commissioners spent far more time in toying over the merits' of two competing \$5,000 postage machines than they did over the

\$1.5 million. "That bond has to stand on its own," Commissioner Charlie Welch noted just to make it clear that the county - and taxpayers - would not be liable should the program falter.

The funds are to be used to expand the plant, which manufactures compressors for the oil field. An economic effect of the expansion would be an additional 65 or more workers at the plant, which is off FM 1788 and between Interstate 20 and U.S. Highway 80 and near Midland Regional Air-

"SOUNDS VERY interesting," Commissioners Durward Wright had said just after MIDC's Grant Billingslev had explained the proposed use of the bond money. "I think we're very interested in it.

The commissioners unanimously approved MIDC's application after Billingsley's "short and very sweet"

The Commissioners' Court also granted an audience to salesmen for Pitney Bowes Inc. and Friden Mailroom Electronic Systems.

"This is it," said Pitney Bowes representative Robert Jones in introducing his company's machine, who he seemed to suggest was as close to magic as any electronic gadget. "It's completely revolutionary...

'Excuse me," interrupted Welch, who politely jested that they talk about the weather.

"It's very revolutionary to anything that has been introducted before this time," continued Jones, who lauded the speed, sealing, postage stamping and efficiency of his company's solidstate machine. He rapidly processed about 100 of his company's letterhead envelopes to demonstrate the efficiency of the desk-size machine.

His competitor, Friden's Boyd Bowen, handed out company brochures in the absence of a comparable machine to exhibit and demonstrate. "We have made this our biggest

and best machine," Jones said, and noted that the life-expectancy of machine was about five to seven years.

# Reagan, Carter each storming the other's political strongholds

President Carter and Ronald Reagan trooped one another's political strongholds today in forays launched by a brutal exchange of charges over suffering, betrayal and even life and

The president, campaigning in Reagan's home state of California, declared flatly Monday night that the Nov. 4 poses a choice between "peace or war." It was Carter's severest characterization to date of the Republican nominee's prospective responsibility as commander in chief.

As for himself, Carter said he already has dealt with crisis after crisis that "you never knew about." He didn't elaborate, except to say that had he acted improperly, it "perhaps would have endangered the safety and peace of the entire world."

Reagan, for his part, said Carter had betrayed the South, had spread "distortions and nalf-truths" about the GOP campaign and was responsible for more than tripling what Reagan termed the "family suffering

After stops in Knoxville, Tenn., and Miami Monday, Reagan stumped in Pensacola, Fla., today before setting out for Baton Rouge, La., and Spring-

Independent challenger John B. Anderson, meanwhile, insisted he had gained equal footing with Carter and Reagan via his nationally televised debate with the Republican Sunday night. But his balloon was deflated somewhat by a poor turnout at a rally in Philadelphia and burgeoning indications that the first debate may well have been the last of the 1980 cam-

Carter headed for Northern California and stops in Portland, Ore., and Tacoma, Wash., today after opening his tour of the Golden State with an embrace from the man who won its Democratic primary, Sen. Edward

M. Kennedy. The Massachusetts sen-


ator joined Carter at a Beverly Hills fundraiser, exhorting the party faithful to rally behind the president. Earlier, at a question-and-answer session at a Torrance, Calif., high

school, Carter said the current fighting between Iraq and Iran could speed the release of the American "It could convince Iran that they

need peace with their neighbors, that they need to be part of the international community, they need to be able to have a strong and viable economy, they need to get spare parts for their military weapons and so forth, and therefore induce them to release the hostages," Carter said.

"I'm not predicting that, but it's a possibility," he said.

Carter told the California AFL-CIO convention the state will be vital in determining who wins the White House. Carter has lost it three times so far, twice in the 1976 primary and general elections, and to Kennedy this

training. Applications currently are being accepted at the Midland College registrar's office for the third respiratory theory class, which begins in January, 1981, and continues for 12

Class will be limted to 20 students. Deadline for making application to become a respiratory therapy student

# Scientists study volcanic emissions

PORTLAND, Ore (AP) - One researcher got airsick and Mount St. Helens hid behind a blanket of clouds, but scientists undertaking the first detailed federal study of volcanic emissions were smiling when they completed their maiden flight over the southwestern Washington moun-

"All of the instruments functioned as they were supposed to," said James P. Friend, director of Project RAVE, or Research on Atmospheric Volcanic Emissions.

Dartmouth College vulcanologist Richard Stoiber agreed. He called Monday's exercise "a fire drill."

The scientists, using a National Aeronautics and Space Administration plane, flew for nearly four hours, following the path of a thin plume of

gas drifting from Mount St. Helens. Friend, an atmospheric chemist at Drexel University of Philadelphia, said the project was developed because there is little scientific infor-

mation on the gasses that spew from

About 20 scientists and their assistants flew in Monday's tests. Inside the plane, they worked like children with new toys collecting samples from the volcano.

Stoiber, who already has made two trips to the Washington mountain to take samples since it erupted in a devastating blast May 18, operated a machine which monitored sulfur dioxide emissions.

"We can't necessarily predict eruptions," Stoiber said, "but we think sulfur gives us a key to what's going

Stoiber said he would have to analyze his readings to determine exactly how much sulfur was coming out of

The plane encountered heavy turbulence as it traveled at slightly over

200 mph, making steep bank turns through the clouds and water vapor around the mountain. At least one scientist spent the last half of the trip with his head hanging over a plastic Meanwhile, scientists in Washing-

ton reported that the volcano still has a small bulge growing in the northern rim of its crater. No earthquake activity was reported Monday.

The last seismic activity at the mountain was Sept. 12, when a minor quake rattled the area north of Mount St. Helens. The mountain's most severe eruption, on May 18, left 31 people dead and 32 others missing.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Prime Minister Indira Gandhi has armed herself with the power to jail anyone for a year without trial, raising fears of a return to her 1975-77 emergency rule. But the government says it has provided safeguards against misuse of the new preventive detention ordi-

President Neelam Sanjiva Reddy signed the ordinance Monday night giving the central and state governments power to detain any person regarded as a threat to state security or maintenance of public order, supplies or essential services. It became effective today.

# Full-service gasoline prices in Midland among highest

Full-service gas stations in the Midland-Odessa area ranked among the highest priced cities to obtain gasoline, according to a survey conducted by the American Automobile Association of gas prices through mid-Sep-

tember.

The survey of 432 service stations around the state shows that the average price of full-service regular gasoline had fallen by 1.1 cents per gallon to 118.4 cents. Prices of other grades of gasoline had decreased by nearly 1 percent.

In the Midland-Odessa area, average price of regular gasoline at fullservice stations was 119.4 cents per gallon. Unleaded gasoline at the fullservice stations averaged 122.6 cents statewide, and 123.9 cents at Mid-

Self-service prices were lower. The average price of regular at these do-ityourself stations statewide was 112.8 cents while Midland's was 111.5 cents. Unleaded in Midland was 116 cents

while it was 117.9 cents statewide. The study also shows that availability of gasoine has improved slightly on weekday nights with 52 percent of the stations pumping gas after 8 p.m. It also reveals that 59 percent of the stations are open on Sundays with 10 percent open 24 hours a day.

A few stations are closing earlier on Saturdays, with 69 pumping gas after 6 p.m., compared with 73 percent in August, according to the survey.



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# Victim can be anyone

Few will shed tears over the death of former Nicaraguan dictator Anastasio Somoza. There is, oddly, something ironic in the manner in which Somoza died, at the hands of terrorists.

Somoza had been overthrown in July 1979, and had been in exile in Paraguay since August 1979. His car was ripped apart by bombs and sprayed with bullets. He was the apparent victim of international terrorists.

His assassination is believed to be the result of a conspiracy involving Yasir Arafat, head of the terroristic Palestine Liberation Organization; Mario Firmenich, leader of the Argentina-based Montonero terrorists; and Tomas Borge, Nicaragua's Marxist minister of the interior.

Some likely would say that Somoza received exactly what he deserved; that he killed enough innocent people in his own bloody life. Yet, anyone endowed with civilized instincts must feel a pang of remorse that anyone, including Somoza, can be cut down by terrorists.

# Electing new leaders will make U.S. safer

As more Americans become aware of the Soviet Union's great gains in military strength, they must be careful not to succumb to defeatism. The Soviet Union is no paper tiger, but is not an invincible bear either.

I have actually heard Americans, once they discovered the Soviet's military superiority, say, "Gee, we better not try to catch up or we might provoke them." That's like telling a doctor not to treat a cancer because it

might get angry and kill you.

For all the Soviet Union's advances in military power, it still has a number of weaknesses. The American people have millions of allies behind the Iron Curtain. The greatest single deterrent to Soviet agression against us, which would mean war, are the Poles, Hungarians, Czechs, Ukrainians, Lithuanians, Latins and others who endure but do not accept Russian domination

Liberals often foolishly claim that the Soviets do not want war because they remember how terrible World War II was. What the Soviet leaders remember about World War II are the massive desertions and how the people in the Soviet Union initially greeted the Germans as liberators until the Nazi madmen stupidly began to massacre them

The Soviet Union knows why its divisions are in Eastern Europe if American "experts" do not. Those

divisions are there to keep the East Europeans in line, not to invade the West. What the leaders in the Kremlin want to do is bluff us into surrender because they are not at all sure which way the Warsaw Pact armies would aim their guns in the confusion of

If we elected American leaders who were smart and gutsy, we could put the Soviet Union on the defensive overnight at very little cost. We could bleed them in Angola and Afghanistan just by supplying arms to rebels who are already fighting. We could overthrow their puppets in the Caribbean. We could launch a devastating counter-offensive in propaganda. We could weaken their economies by cutting off credit, food and technology. We could initiate United Nations resolutions condemning them instead of abstaining while resolutions they initiate condemn us and our allies.

All of this we could do without committing a single American soldier to

Then why don't we do it? Because the Council on Foreign Relations, a front group for New York financial interests, is hell-bent on a policy of appeasement. They decide our foreign policy. They advise all of our presidents. They staff our state department.

This is no conspiratorial goblin story. The CFR's domination of American foreign policy since World War II is a well-documented fact (see 'Who's Running America: the Carter Years," by Thomas R. Dye, a liberal professor, Prentice-Hall, for just one non-right wing account.)

What we have to do is change the leadership by electing a new president and a new Congress. A rational strategy based on what's good for the American people instead of what's good for the New York bankers will see us through this dark valley of

military weakness. Some people, when they discover that a relatively small clique has been calling the shots, get hung up on the idea of conspiracy, but I think that's a waste of time. In the first place, Americans have a right to be wrong. of appeasement, disarmament or world government. In the second place, motive is irrelevant. If you are on a bus and discover the driver has taken a dangerous detour, your correct priority is to get the bus back on the right road, not analyze the driv-

We can get back on the road and defeat the Kremlin's dreams of a planet-wide slave state. As corny is it sounds, truth is on our side; our system is better than theirs and all we need to regain our safety are new leaders who believe that and have enough sand in their craw to take the offensive.

# Fate of 'Carlos the Jackal' uncertain

WASHINGTON - In the "wilderness of mirrors" that makes up the espionage game, the Central Intelligence Agency once conspired to save the life of the world's most notorious terrorist - Carlos the Jackal.

WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND

He picked up his animal nickname from the fictional assassin who almost nailed Charles de Gaulle in Frederick Forsythe's novel "The Day of the Jackal," but his real name was Ilitch Ramirez Sanchez. He was the eldest son of an expatriate millionaire Colombian lawyer in Venezuela.

This is his story, as pieced together by my associate Dale Van Atta from top-secret CIA and State Department documents:

- 1966: At 17, already influenced by a younger brother who was a leader in the Venezuelan Communist Party. Carlos was trained in one of Fidel Castro's guerrilla camps. There he rned the terro Viktor Simenov of the Soviet KGB.

1969: Carlos was expelled from Lumumba University in Moscow where he had developed a fast friendship with a Palestinian commando named Mohammed Boudia.

- 1970: Carlos fought with Palestinian guerrillas in Jordan against King Hussein.

- 1971: Carlos was the hit of the Latin-American cocktail crowd in London, where he escorted his beautiful mother and charmed women with his guitar-playing talent. He was known as "El Gordo" - the fat one. - 1972: Carlos helped organize the massacre of Israeli athletes at the Munich Olympics, and the Japanese Red Army's indiscriminate machine-

- June 1973: An Israeli hit team assassinated Carlos' old Moscow friend Boudia, and Carlos took over Palestinian terrorist operations in

gun slaughter at the Tel Aviv air-

mar Qaddafi financed the extremist Palestinian group, called the Rejec-December 1973: Carlos shot Zionist department store tycoon Joseph

Sieff in London, but failed to kill - January 1974: Carlos bombed an

Israeli bank in London. August 1974: Carlos

three bombs in downtown Paris aimed at a Jewish newspaper and two French newspapers that supported

September 1974: Carlos supervised the Japanese Red Army seizure of the French Embassy at The Hague, Netherlands, using grenades stolen from a U.S. Army depot in Germany by the Baader-Meinhof terrorist gang. Carlos tossed a grenade into Le Drugstore in Paris, killing two and wounding others, preparatory to the embassy takeover in Holland.

- Late 1974: Enter the CIA. Through its intelligence contacts, the agency learned that an assassination squad of the six-nation consortium of South American dictatorships, known as "Operation Condor," had been ordered to kill Carlos. The assignment was apparently in retaliation for Carlos' assassination of Col. Ramon Trabal, Uruguay's military attache in Paris: and for two other murders he

was suspected of plotting - that of a Bolivian ambassador in Paris and a Chilean official in the Middle East.

According to a top-secret document based on CIA internal files, Carlos was spared when the CIA warned the French government of the proposed execution, and the Condor nations were warned to call off the murder

Why did the CIA save Carlos? Several sources in the agency suggested that it was a Mafia-like professional concern - that if Carlos were murdered, it would set off a wave of retaliatory killings by the Palestinians that would cause chaos in the murky world of international espionage.

One source thought it was at least possible that Carlos had been a CIA informant, and that the agency was simply protecting one of its own. This source did not, however, suggest that Carlos had ever been a paid killer for the CIA.

At any rate, Carlos was spared, thanks to the CIA's intervention, and lived to wreak his bloody handiwork for at least a few more months. He was captured by French police in June 1975, but managed to escape after killing an informant and two policemen; he masterminded the kidnapping of the OPEC oil ministers in December 1975, and was reportedly rewarded with a \$2 million bonus from his paymaster, Muammar Qad dafi; he helped engineer, in July 1976, the hijacking in Athens of an Air France plane which wound up at Entebbe Airport in Uganda, where the Israelis pulled off their daring rescue mission

After that failure, Carlos the Jackal dropped from sight. Intelligence sources say he wound up in Iraq, and may have been exterminated in that nation's secret purge of Palestinian terrorists. There is some speculation he is now in Libya, but the smart money in the intelligence community bets that Carlos is dead. Still, no one is sure.

# Soviet nuclear explosion violates test ban treaty limit

By ROWLAND EVANS AND ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - An underground nuclear test exploded by the Soviet Union at its testing grounds in Semipalatinsk appears to have greatly exceeded the 150 kiloton limit set in the Threshhold Test Ban Treaty between the U.S. and the Soviets.

An intelligence report citing the Sept. 14 test as having an explosive power of between 160 and 650 kilotons - far over the maximum limit set in the treaty - is now under secret study at the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA), the State Department and the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). There is no sign yet that the Carter administration has done anything more than ask Moscow for an explanation of the reported violation.

The September test is the first that friendly seismographic instruments have measured at so high a level. But since the 1974 treaty, intelligence sources have reported at least seven other probable violations. All are 'under study" by the U.S.

# FORD VS. ABDNOR

When President Ford came to South Dakota Sept. 11 to plug for the election of Rep. James Abdnor over Sen. George McGovern, he stepped on a hornet's nest by making the presidential debates a major issue in a press conference he held side-by-side with

anti-debater Abdnor. Every political candidate should debate his opponent, Ford said, di-recting his remark right at President





Carter. Carter refused to debate Sept. 21 with Ronald Reagan and John B. Anderson. What Ford did not know is that Abdnor has refused to debate McGovern despite repeated challenges by McGovern.

Abdnor was stoical about Ford's embarrassing pro-debate stand. He said it did not change his mind about refusing to debate McGovern under any conditions, period.

### PD 59 TARGETS CHINA The controversial Presidential Di-

rective 59, which is designed to retarget U.S. missiles against Soviet military targets rather than population centers, includes about 100 military targets in China - a fact not disclosed or even hinted at in all the furor over the new directive.

That word leaked after secret testimony about PD 59 to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Sept. 16. The purpose of the new directive is to give the U.S. retaliatory options in case of Soviet nuclear attack, rather than the sole option of a massive

anti-population reprisal. It has been bitterly attacked by liberals as preparing the way for possible "limited nuclear war.

Inclusion of Chinese military targets under PD 59 makes sense, Pentagon authorities say, because China has a nuclear capability and because there is no proof that present harmony in U.S.-Chinese relations will persist. But word that Chinese military targets are getting such attention from the U.S. could deeply disturb Peking.

# CUTLER'S EMPIRE

White House chief counsel Lloyd Cutler, a Washington super lawyer before going to work for President Carter, is believed by White House staffers to have his eye on a more powerful role in a second Carter administration

The signals, say these White House staffers, are multiplying: a highlypublicized article in Foreign Affairs magazine that calls for major, constitutional reorganization of the U.S. government, and a gradual enlargement of his own White House staff to 17 persons.

Cutler's sideways move into highlevel political analysis convinces insiders that he wants to succeed Zbigniew Brzezinski as national security aide. Others believe his eye is set higher - on the job of secretary of state. Whatever Culter's goal, White House aides say he probably has enough bureaucratic know-how and proximity to Carter to get what

### AMBASSADOR MIKE Former Senate Majority Leader

Mike Mansfield, whose appointment as ambassador to Japan in 1977 turned out to be one of President Carter's rare diplomatic triumphs, has not closed the door to staying in Tokyo if Carter is re-elected.

That will be good news in Japanese political and business circles, where it had been assumed Mansfield would leave in January to be replaced by another of the non-descript ambassadors usually sent to Tokyo. Mansfield, whose age (76) and authoritative air appeal to the Japanese, is credited with a major upgrading of U.S.-Japanese relations

Along with other U.S. ambassadors, he will routinely submit his resignation after Nov. 4 no matter how the election goes. But he has enjoyed immensely his second career and may well remain as ambassador if Carter wins.

UNREPENTANT RECRUITER: Last March I commented that the Department of Energy had a disturbing habit of packing its top staff with oil industry people who had once worked for government agencies that supposedly regulate Big Oil. The example I used was Allan P. Weeks, an attorney who had bounced from the Federal Energy Administration to its successor, DOE, then to Crown Central Petroleum and back to DOE.

In a recent speech to a Texas oil group, Weeks' boss, Hazel Rollins, head of DOE's Economic Regulatory Administration, stuck up for the revolving-door system. "The fact that we want people to flip from government jobs to industry and back again, I think, only makes us all brighter,' she said brightly

She said I had implied that she had 'appointed some sort of lowlife from the evil depths of the oil industry' (her words, not mine) and boasted that she had "used all the pressure I could muster to get him to come back to work for me." Wonderful.

"It could convince Iran that they need peace with their neighbors, that they need to be part of the international community, they need to be able to have a strong and viable economy, they need to get spare parts for their military weapons and so forth, and therefore induce them to release the hostages,"

"I'm not predicting that, but it's a possibility," Carter said.

He also said that "the signals coming out of Iran lately" have indicated a new desire to resolve the hostage situation.

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# Teenagers not impressed by warnings against smoking

What makes toenagers smoke, not smoke, or quit

One thing is clear: teenagers are not much impressed by mere warnings about its effects on their health. The young just can't see far enough ahead to worry about something that may happen to them in their sixties -- or even to imagine that they may someday be s'ixty. Recent studies, according to an article in the

current issue of the new Science Digest, suggest that the danger is not that far off. University of Cincinnati researchers have demonstrated harmful changes in the blood and lungs of teenage smokers.

Reasoning that an imminent danger might have some effect on teen motivation, the New Hampshire Lung Association tried an experiment. They used



# Pantex confirms missile shipment

(AP) - The nuclear warhead damaged in the Titan II missile accident will be disassembled or analyzed at a nuclear weapons plant in this Panhandle city, a Pantex plant official says.

Paul R. Wagner, the ranking Department of Energy official at Pantex, confirmed Monday that the weapon was destined for Pantex, but said he had not been told

when it would arrive. "I have been told ... that the damaged warhead from the Titan missle accident will be sent to Pantex for disassembly or analysis,"

Meanwhile, the Air Force still would not confirm or deny a nuclear weapon was involved in the weekend accident.

At the devastated Titan II missile silo site in Damascus, Ark., the warhead, apparently contained in one of two canisters labeled "Do Not Drop," was loaded onto a flatbed truck Monday and taken to Little

Rock Air Force Base. Arkansas law enforcement officers followed the truck on the 90-minute trip to the base near Jacksonville, about 12 miles northeast of Little Rock. Two helicopters flew ahead to report traffic conditions.

The weapon in question - carried by the Titan II intercontinental ballistic missile - is the largest in terms-of yield in the U.S. arsenal. This conclusion is based on the "throw weight" of the Titan II, or its ability to carry heavy items.

The Titan II is a liquidfueled rocket with the range of some 7,000

A June 1976 environmental assessment report on Pantex said part of the plant housed plutonium-239 residue from military accidents. The residue "is mixed and diluted by the debris" making recovery of the hazardous material "virtually impossible," the report said.

The residue is from military weapons accidents in Palomares, Spain, and Thule, Greenland, the report said.

Louisville appears twice facing Providence on Jan. 27 and Marquette on Feb. 14.


Five of the games will be shown on Mondays, three on Saturdays and the Louisville-Providence game will be aired on a Tuesday.

That's SMU, the SWC's most pass happy crew in the last few years with Mike Ford at the throttle. The Mustangs have won their first two games with a ground game built around sophomores Craig James, Eric Dickerson, Charles Drayton and Michael Charles. And Ford, the busy junior who has a shot at becoming the first 10,000-yard career passer in NCAA history, is working less and enjoying it

As a result, SMU is hitting 44.7 per cent of its passes. That's dead last among SWC marksmen as Arkansas is leading with 70.6 per cent, Texas A&M and Houston are tied for seventh with 50.8 per cent.

Arkansas' Tom Jones, the sophomore who won the starting job this fall, leads in completion percentage at 70.6 on 24 of 34. Rice's Randy Hertel is second at 68.8 per cent on 11 of 16.

Meanwhile, three runners continue to gain at better than 100 yards a game. Texas junior A.J. Jones is averaging 145.5 yards per game, followed by Baylor junior Walter Abercrombie at 112.0 and James at 111.5. Abercrombie set a Baylor career rushing record in the 43-15 victory over West Texas State. He has 1,771 yards to surpass the record of 1,713 set by Larry Hickman in 1956-58 and he's done it in 19 games. He has 20 more regular-season games left in his Baylor career to pad the mark.

And the way the Bears are going, he may add a few. After opening the season with the seventh-best total offense day in SWC history (655 yards against Lamar), Baylor kept the gates open against West Texas. The Bears continue to lead the SWC in all three team offensive cagegories and in two of the three defensive dnartments

# Alabama, OSU head AP poll

While Alabama and Ohio State remained solidy entrenched at the top of the Associated Press college football poll, Nebraska's Cornhuskers began to make serious inroads in the rankings.

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market declined slightly in active trading today, pausing after Monday's late rally.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which closed Monday at a 31/2year high, slipped back .51 to 974.06 by noontime today.



# 'Super Chicken' foiled by storm

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) - Two men who said they named their helium balloon "Super Chicken" because they were themselves chickens at heart screwed up their courage and jumped ship in a thunderstorm - one using a parachute for the first time

It was the second time Ohio weather spoiled an attempt to cross the nation by balloon.

John Shoecraft, 35, and Ron Ripps, 37, were shaken up but uninjured Monday night when they decided to abort their three-day flight near an airfield outside Columbus.

Shoecraft leapt from the craft as it bounced on the ground, while Ripps was forced to don a parachute for the first time in his life and jump from a height of more than 2,000 feet.

The 10-story balloon, meanwhile, bounced back into the air and headed east without a pilot.

Shortly before 2 a.m. EDT, the Super Chicken was nearing Pitts-burgh at an altitude of 27,000 feet and racing along at between 40 to 50 knots, according to an observer at Port Columbus Airport.

"The balloon will be tracked until its transponder (a transmitting device) gives out or until it's too far away for any traffic station to track it

by radar," said Arthur Smock.

He said the Super Chicken would probably be carried out to sea once it

got caught in the jet stream. "With a helium-filled balloon, I would suspect it will stay up as long

as the envelope that contains helium stays attached," he said. The balloon lifted off from Oceanside, Calif., at 4:30 a.m. EDT Saturday, and until it ran into thunder-

storms over this Midwestern state, the Super Chicken's flight - usually about at 20,000 feet or higher - was 'beautiful," said Ripps. "We had no problems," he said as he sat on a couch in the hospital emergency room here.

But the two Phoenix, Ariz., businessmen said they encountered sever-

al problems in trying to come down. Weather stations advised them to land the balloon when they encountered large squall lines in Ohio, Ripps

Shoecraft, visibly shaken by the experience, said the pair "pulled with all our might" on the balloon's ripcords, but the Super Chicken failed to deflate and began to ascend as soon as it hit the ground.

"I instructed Ron to jump at the moment of impact," he said. Shoe-craft managed to scramble out of the gondola, but Ripps was caught inside as the Super Chicken lifted into the

"We bounced about three times. I couldn't get out," Ripps said.

When the balloon reached about 2,300 feet, he parachuted out.

"I never parachuted in my life be-fore," he said. "I was scared."

The voyage was originally expected to end today near New York City.

Last October, the DaVinci TransAmerica, another 10-story helium balloon, crashed in Spencerville in northwestern Ohio during a severe thunderstorm as it attempted a

cross-country flight. Its woman co-pilot broke her leg on impact.

The Super Chicken was similar in design to the "Kitty Hawk," a he-lium-filled balloon that traveled from San Francisco to Canada in May. The pilots of that craft, father-son team Maxie and Kris Anderson, landed several miles from the coast but further east than much of the U.S. shoreline and claimed success in their attempt to be the first to cross the continent in a helium balloon.

In 1978, Maxie Anderson was one of three men to make the first Atlantic balloon crossing.

# Jenrette aide describes effects of 'bad drunk'

WASHINGTON (AP) - A former aide to Rep. John Jenrette, D-S.C., testified today that on the day in December that Jenrette was videotaped talking about bribery with an FBI undercover agent, the congressmen was suffering the effects of "a bad drunk" the night before.

Doug Wendell, the congressman's former administrative assistant, said that on Dec. 4, the day Jenrette met with the FBI agent, he also addressed a meeting of industry executives in connection with a new congressional caucus Jenrette had set up to promote

"He was under the impact or effects of a bad drunk the night before," Wendell said. "Because of his drinking, he didn't do as well as he could have done." He said Jenrette's speech was rambling and overly long.

Wendell, testifying before a U.S. District Court in Jenrette's bribery trial, confirmed the testimony Monday of the congressman's wife, Rita, that her husband's drinking problem worsened last December and Jan-

Wendell said he disapproved of Jenrette's heavy drinking, and early in 1979 he removed all the liquor in Jenrette's office cabinet and placed it in boxes that were not accessible to the congressman.

Another time, Wendell said, he sent staff aide home with Jenrette to make certain the congressman did not drink the night before he was to make an important speech to industry leaders on the congressional tourism

'The congressman was very sensitive about his drinking," said Wendell, a defense witness. "He was embarrassed and uncomfortable around



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

# Unemployed painter charged in bomb deaths of family

BY JIM DRINKARD

OLATHE, Kan. (AP) - A little more than a year ago, Danny Eugene Crump met a pretty 18-year-old woman in a supermarket parking lot as he was "cruising" the main street of this Kansas City suburb, friends say. They were married three months later.

On Monday, the 27-year-old unemployed painter was charged in a courtroom a few blocks from the supermarket with killing his former wife and five members of her family

Prosecutors alleged that Crump, who was charged with six counts of first-degree murder, planted a bomb that shattered the family's two-story frame

Crump also was charged with three counts of aggravated battery and one count of arson. Johnson County District Court Judge Gerald Hougland set bond at \$500,000 and scheduled a preliminary hearing for Oct. 1. As Crump was ushered into the courtroom, a

reporter asked whether he had made the bomb. "No, I did not," he replied in a quiet voice.

Johnson County District Attorney Dennis Moore said the bomb apparently was placed in a cardboard

box and left on the hood of a car in the house's garage early Saturday.

Moore said it was possible the bomb had been intended only to damage the car. He wouldn't elaborate on a possible motive.

Authorities wouldn't speculate on the type of explosive or triggering device used, but Terry Schell of the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms said the blast had the explosive force of about ten sticks of dyamite.

Lt. Jeff Herrman, chief of detectives of the Olathe Police Department, said 12 federal and local officers were continuing to follow up leads in the case. Earlier, authorities said the motive was believed to be revenge.

Crump was divorced in August from 19-year-old Diane Crump, who had won custody of the couple's 4-

The explosion that ripped through the house killed Mrs. Crump, her parents, Robert Post, 51, and Norma Jeanne Post, 47; her brothers, James, 10, and Richard, 21; and sister Susan, 20.

The Crump's son, Randy, was in fair and stable condition Monday at Olathe Community Hospital. Kraig Weber, 8, a friend of James who had been visiting at the time of the explosion, also was in fair

# Crimes against women creating furor in India

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - The crimes of rape, bride burning and dowry demand, reportedly on the rise in India, are causing a nationwide furor, reflected in street protests, heated editorials and irate speeches by politicians.

Indian newspapers carry daily reports of rape and sexual assault on women, some allegedly by police-

In June, several police officers were accused of stripping and raping a bousewife in the dusty northern Indian town of Baghpat. One of the accused was shot and killed on the street by the Tape victim's brother-in-law. An investigation is continuing; none of the men has been tried.

Protests by women's organizations have increased since that incident, and the news media have been giving increasing attention to the problems of women in this tradition-bound, predominantly Hindu nation of 660 million.

Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's government has presented legislation to Parliament which would establish sentences of two years' hard labor for people who demand gifts and cash from a bride's

The legislation also seeks to toughen rape laws by specifically providing jail terms for police officers convicted of the offense. Current laws do not differentiate between policemen and other offend-An official Indian commission has joined the fray

with a report backing the proposed two-year prison term for dowry offenders and also recommending a fine of 10,000 rupees, about \$1,250

The current maximum penalty for demanding dowry is six months in jail and a 5,000-rupee fine, but convictions are few.

A woman sometimes "is tortured in every possible way and even deprived of marital rights" if she does not bring sufficient dowry to her in-laws, said the government report

The report cited numerous cases of harassment and, in some cases, even murder by husbands or in-laws if women fail to provide sufficient dowries at the time of their weddings.

Dowry takes several forms, ranging from cash payments to household goods such as furniture, refrigerators, air conditioners and sometimes even OC campus. motorcycles and cars. Police statistics show 69 women were burned to

death in New Delhi last year because of low dowries. Few of the cases have been successfully prosecut-

Already this year, between January and July, 67 dowry deaths have been reported. Social workers and women's leaders say the real figure is far higher because many cases go unreported.

Rape is also on the rise. According to Home Affairs Minister Zail Singh, 3,281 rapes were reported to police throughout India in 1977, and 3,781 the following year. More than 4,000 rapes were reported in 1979. Again, women's leaders say the actual figures are much higher - that many rapes go unreported because of the stigma attached to them.

Women in India face discrimination from birth. For centuries, the birth of a son has been deemed a gift of god: a daughter is regarded, at best, as a disappointment.

Even in educated homes, the female infant gets less nourishing food," says sociologist Promilla Kapur. Others agree that the attitude of neglect follows women through life Tara Ali Bail, president of the international Union

of Child Welfare, says many Indian men believe sons are better because "you must have sons to look after you in your old age. The majority of Indian women live in villages under conditions of grinding poverty where the struggle for survival takes precedence over every-

thing else. Often married off as teen-agers to strangers of the same caste or community, rural women have little say in how their lives are molded. A majority are illiterate, their lives centering around producing children, toiling in fields foraging

Few women have forged independent careers for themselves. Most of those who have, like Mrs. Gandhi, come from educated, privileged or rich families. Official figures show that only 2.5 percent of Indian government workers are women.

The attitude of some top officials has also been blamed for slowness in tackling the problems. 'There are much more serious things happening in

the country," was how Delhi Police Commisioner P.S. Bhinder recently replied to a question on crimes against women

Subhadra Butalia, a lawyer and anti-dowry crusader, disagreed.

'India has a woman prime minister who is aware of the problems of her sex," Mrs. Butalia told a reporter. "Women seek no charity. Dignity and equality are their birthrights. If they are denied them, they will fight.'
