## Rural Electric Co-op Buys Site Downtown For Their New Building

Purchase of a building site within a block of Main Street and the heart of the Muleshoe business district was announced this week by directors of the Bailey County Rural Electric Cooperative Ass'n.

E. R. Hart sold the cooperative six lots, making a building site of 150 feet wide by 140 feet long, with pavement along the west side. The building will face south. It will be just south of the Bendix Laundry, a half block and across the street east of the postoffice.

The directors had been casting about for a suitable location for the building since Washington REA officials objected to the site originally purchased, located near the grade school.

Picture of the architect's drawing of the headquarters building was run in The Journal two weeks ago. It is estimated the building will cost about \$75,000, and it is believed that construction can begin by July 1.

## Elevated Tank Contract Let

Contract for construction of a 200,000 gallon overhead water storage tank in Muleshoe was awarded Friday by the city commission to the lowest bidder, Chicago Bridge & Iron Co. The project is a part of the water and sewer extension program authorized by the voters at a recent bond issue election. The firm's bid was \$35,295.00. One other bid was received from the Pittsburg Des Moines Iron Co., \$35,600.00.

City officials said that work is to begin in about two months, and that the company hopes to have work finished before cold weather sets in, or around October 1.

## Dory Detton To Teach Muleshoe Youngsters Wrestling And Boxing

Dory Detton, Amarillo wrestler, all round athlete and promoter, will conduct a weekly two hour school here for the youngsters of the neighborhood each Saturday afternoon beginning immediately after school closing. Mr. Detton will teach wrestling, boxing, jiu jitsu, judo, weight lifting, tumbling, etc. He stresses good sportsmanship, clean living and thinking in these classes and the JayCees believe the parents of the community will be glad to have their boys with him for these two hours.

Mr. Detton is a deputy sheriff in Amarillo, where he helps with the

Junior Deputy organization of Sheriff Paul Galbraith. The boys are given badges, but to get one they have to observe some very strict rules, and infraction of these rules leads to a lifting of the badge and expulsion from membership. Hugh Freeman, Bailey County sheriff, told The Journal he will investigate and if Mr. Galbraith makes a good report on the movement he will cooperate with Mr. Detton and the JayCees in the Junior Deputy organization here. Detton regularly fills the pulpit of an Amarillo church, it was said. He is promoter of the wrestling matches staged here every Saturday under sponsorship of the JayCees.

A. R. Edmiston, member of the JayCees, has offered to take the night class on one or two nights a week. He taught judo in the Army.

## Farm Acreage Report Of Every Farm In U. S. Is Requested By The USDA

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has requested that a Farm Acreage Report be prepared for every farm having cropland. This report will be used for determining future farm cotton and wheat acreage allotments.

It will be necessary that an Acreage Report be prepared for every farm that has cropland on it, and the report must be submitted in person and the report signed by either the operator of the farm or the landlord. This must be done by calling at the county AAA Office in person not later than May 20, 1949.

It will be necessary that you report the acreage of all crops grown on the farm for the years 1941, 1945, 1946, 1947, 1948 and what you intend to plant in 1949. If you do not know the acreage that was on the farm for all the different years find out and make your report by May 20, 1949.

According to a representative of the Bailey County Agricultural Conservation Association, producers who fail to make this Acreage Report to the County Office may not receive a Wheat or Cotton Acreage Allotment, and there-

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Dr. Virginia Blocker, who patiently plotted the Grand Camp injury and death pattern by 1,000-foot zones, reports in the spring issue of Texas Reports on Biology and Medicine, a Medical Branch publication that 274 patients with one or both ear drums perforated were discovered.

One case was found almost a mile away and many perforations occurred in persons outdoors without protection of buildings in the residential zones from 2,000 to 4,000 feet away.

Approximately 250 persons within a 1,000-foot radius of the Grand camp when it exploded required no medical treatment and escaped without demonstrable injury. In

the same zone, the industrial and dock area, nearly all deaths and 75 per cent of the serious injuries were recorded, Dr. Blocker says.

Her information was obtained from disaster relief, law enforcement and industrial agencies, from direct interviews with patients and from questionnaires distributed among the homeless.

The Grandcamp explosion killed approximately 560 persons, severely injured 800 and less seriously injured about 3,000. The High Flyer explosion April 17 caused one death and hospitalized fewer than 10 persons for treatment of major injuries.

### UNDERGROUND WATER LEGISLATION SEEN

A local option plan of the regulation of Texas underground water systems passed the State House or Representatives Monday. Quick passage by the Senate was indicated to give the state its first set of rules governing use of subterranean waters.

For a number of years water control legislation has been sought but different areas over the state have been unable to draft a plan that was suitable to all.

The bill as it passed the House would allow a State Board of Water Engineers to designate the boundaries of the underground reservoirs. Users of that pool would then vote on whether or not regulations were needed, if so, then an underground water district would be formed, with the district headed by five elected directors.

The directors would be empowered to adopt spacing of wells, limit withdrawals of water and prescribe equipment to eliminate waste, in short to take any measure practical to conserve the supply of that basin.

Restrictive measures would not be allowed on farmers or ranchers using less than 100,000 gallons daily, and grazing land of 640 acres or more would be exempted from paying duties to finance the district.

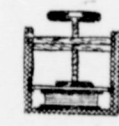

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A local option plan of the regulation of Texas underground water systems passed the State House or Representatives Monday. Quick passage by the Senate was indicated to give the state its first set of rules governing use of subterranean waters.

For a number of years water control legislation has been sought but different areas over the state have been unable to draft a plan that was suitable to all.

The bill as it passed the House would allow a State Board of Water Engineers to designate the boundaries of the underground reservoirs. Users of that pool would then vote on whether or not regulations were needed, if so, then an underground water district would be formed, with the district headed by five elected directors.

The directors would be empowered to adopt spacing of wells, limit withdrawals of water and prescribe equipment to eliminate waste, in short to take any measure practical to conserve the supply of that basin.

Restrictive measures would not be allowed on farmers or ranchers using less than 100,000 gallons daily, and grazing land of 640 acres or more would be exempted from paying duties to finance the district.

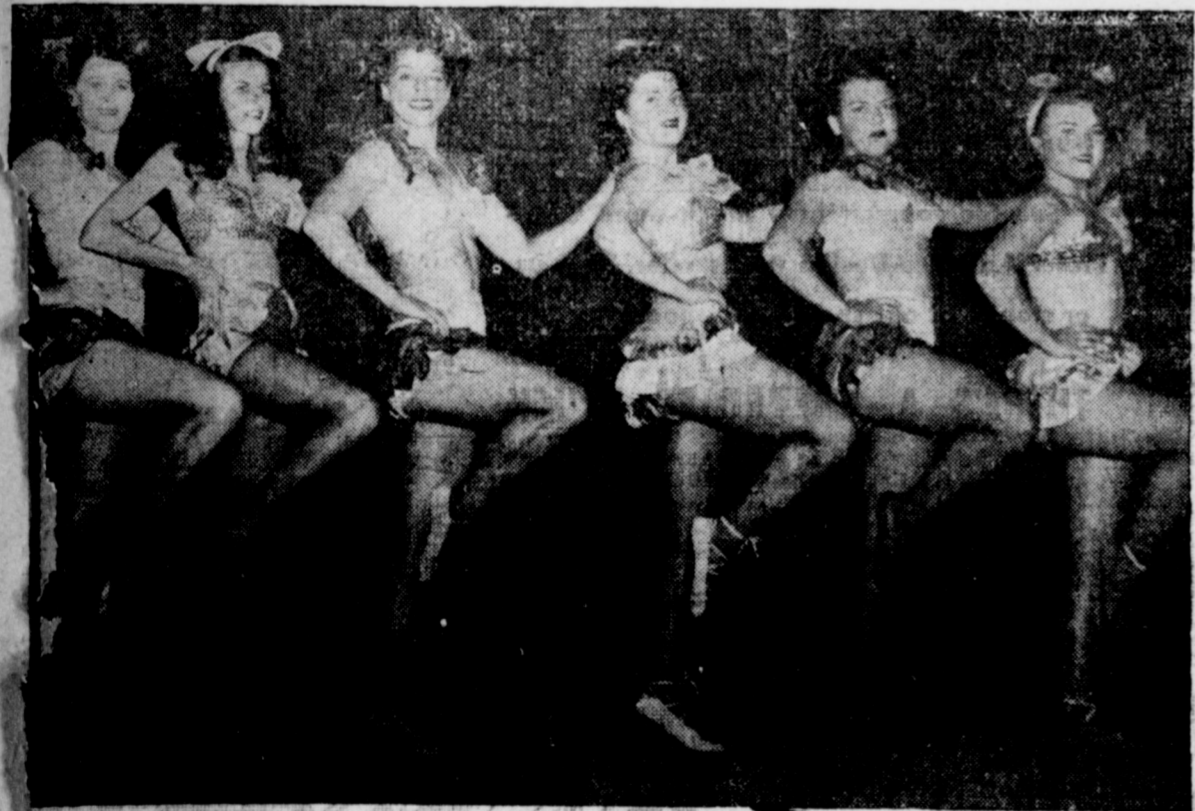

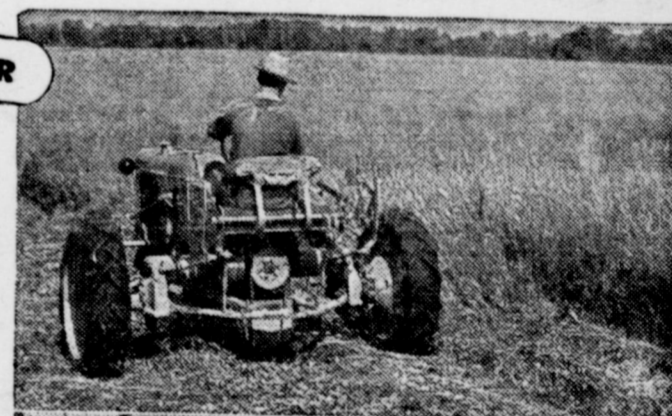

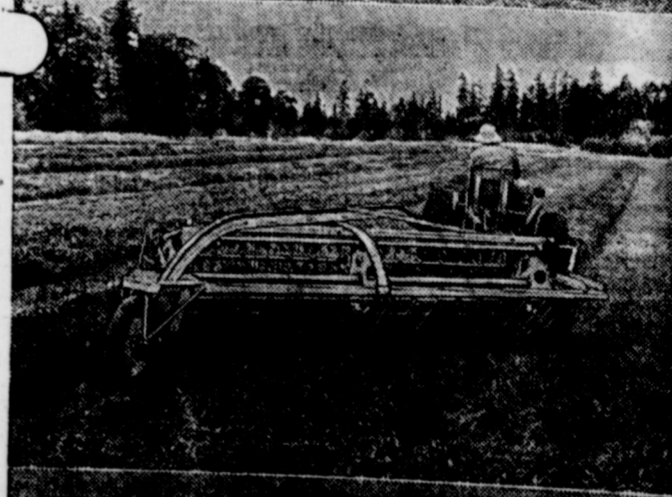

**Public Land For Sale In Texas**

AUSTIN, May 4—State Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, states

there is still public land for sale in Texas. However, not much of it, as Texans measure land. Less than one per cent of the once colossal public domain is available to high bidders as the unsold acreage has dwindled to a total of 1,025,875.70 acres. (The total acreage of the

state is 172,687,000). The unsold land includes 145.70 acres in Lamb County.

Not all of the million acres can be purchased, Giles explains. The domain administration by the School Land Board, of which Giles is chairman.

"No school lands within five miles of oil or gas production can be sold," Giles points out.

When there is sufficient demand, the school Land Board authorizes the sale of specified tracts. A public sale is advertised and information about the tracts supplied by the General Land Office upon

request. Sale is by sealed bids. The higher bidder, if conforming with regulations, is the new owner.

The terms are 20 per cent down with 40 years to retire the balance at five per cent interest. The Permanent School Fund retains one sixteenth free royalty in all production and one-eighth free royalty in sulphur production.

**Texas Dairymen Are Over-alarmed**

COLLEGE STATION, May 5—Texas dairymen seem to be over-alarmed about the recent reports on the use of DDT, says James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College.

So, let's get straightened out on the DDT situation right now. Nobody has died from effects of DDT in milk. In fact, there aren't even any recorded cases of sickness caused by milk produced from DDT-sprayed dairy cows. When cows are sprayed—or when DDT is used to spray dairy barns—small quantities can sometimes be detected in the milk supply. It hasn't hurt anybody so far, but the food specialists feel that such an important food item as milk should be free of any trace of this material. So the recommendation against the use of DDT is merely a precautionary measure, says Deer.

That's why methoxychlor or pyrethrum insecticides have been recommended in place of the DDT for insect control both on the cattle and in the dairy barns as well.

And the warning about feeding DDT sprayed forage to dairy cattle or animals being finished for slaughter still holds. It isn't a good practice, says Deer, since traces of the insecticide may show up in the finished product.

Don't give up the DDT altogether though, the entomologist continues. It's still recommended for livestock other than dairy animals and many crop pests as well.

If there's still any doubt about what insecticide to use, see your county agent, advises Deer.

Prevent the destruction of eggs. Never stand eggs on the large end. Keep the small end down and the large end up when packing eggs. Open egg cases carefully—use care in removing fillers—replace caps and fillers—don't drop cases—and make every case go one more trip.

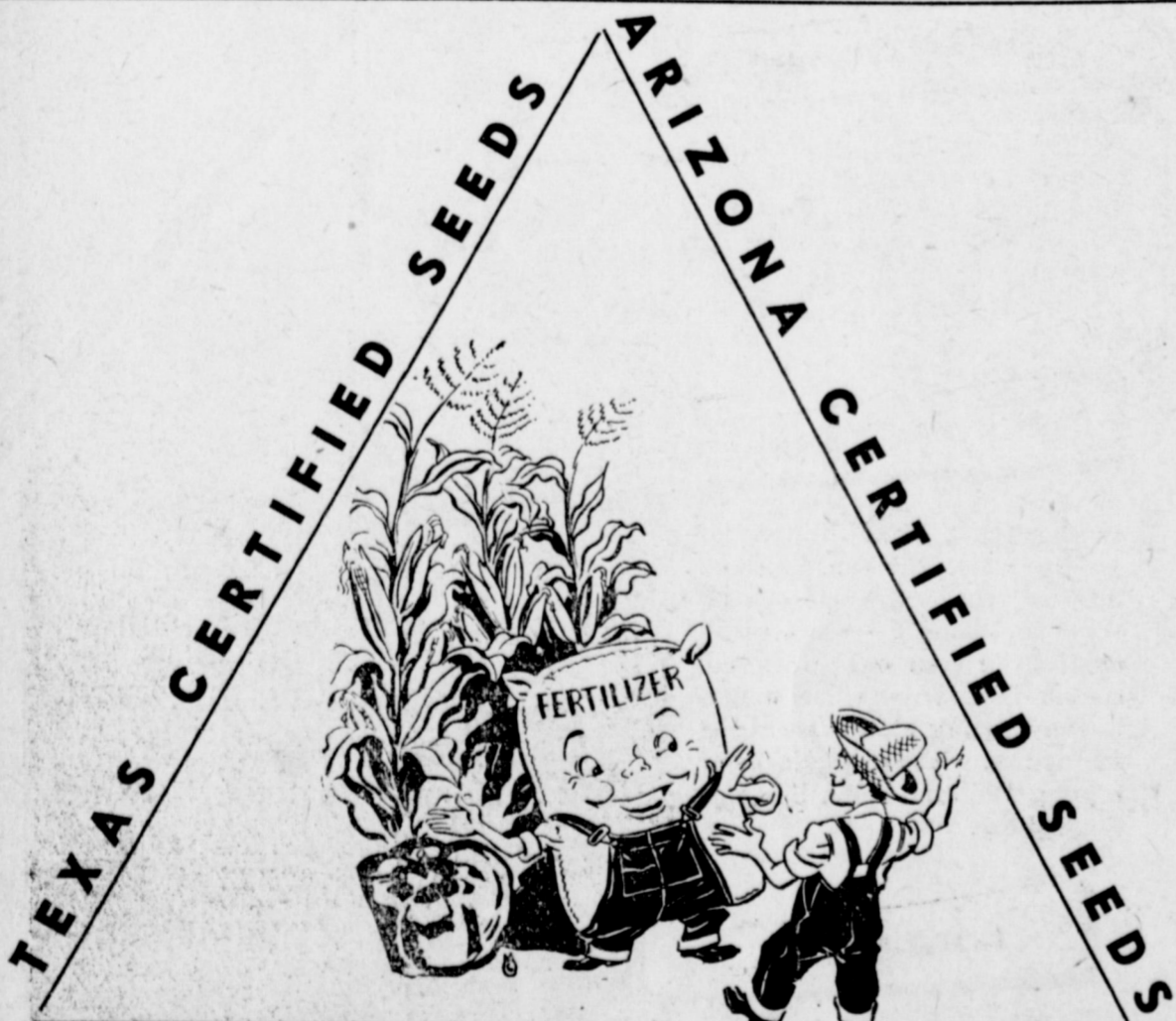

### Lots Of Work Is Required To Keep Yard At It's Best

COLLEGE STATION, May 4.—It takes mowing, watering and fertilizing to keep a yard looking its best.

That's the word from Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College. Regular mowing with a sharp, properly adjusted mower keeps your lawn looking neat and helps the grass grow and spread.

How high the grass is mowed depends on what grass you have. Bermuda, St. Augustine or centipede grass can be mowed closely if the yard is well fertilized. The fescues and bluegrass should be mowed at one and a half inches or higher, Miss Hatfield says.

Now about watering the lawn. If you have the water supply to do this during the hot, dry weather

it's best to soak the ground thoroughly now and then—just soak long enough to keep the plants alive.

Here's a point to remember, too. Light sprinkling every day just to cool things off encourages shallow root system and helps crabgrass more than it does the better lawn grasses.

Further information on lawn grasses and fertilizing the yard can be obtained from the local county agent.

Nice green lush lawns in the summertime means taking care of your yard the year round, Miss Hatfield concludes.

A neutral-wax liquid does a good cleaning job on most smooth leathers. And a word of precaution: a couple of coats applied to brand new shoes helps to protect them against scuffing.

Fabric shoes can be spot cleaned quite satisfactorily with dry cleaning fluid and in some cases with a cloth and mild soap suds. For the best polish job don't forget a bottle of sole-edge dressing.

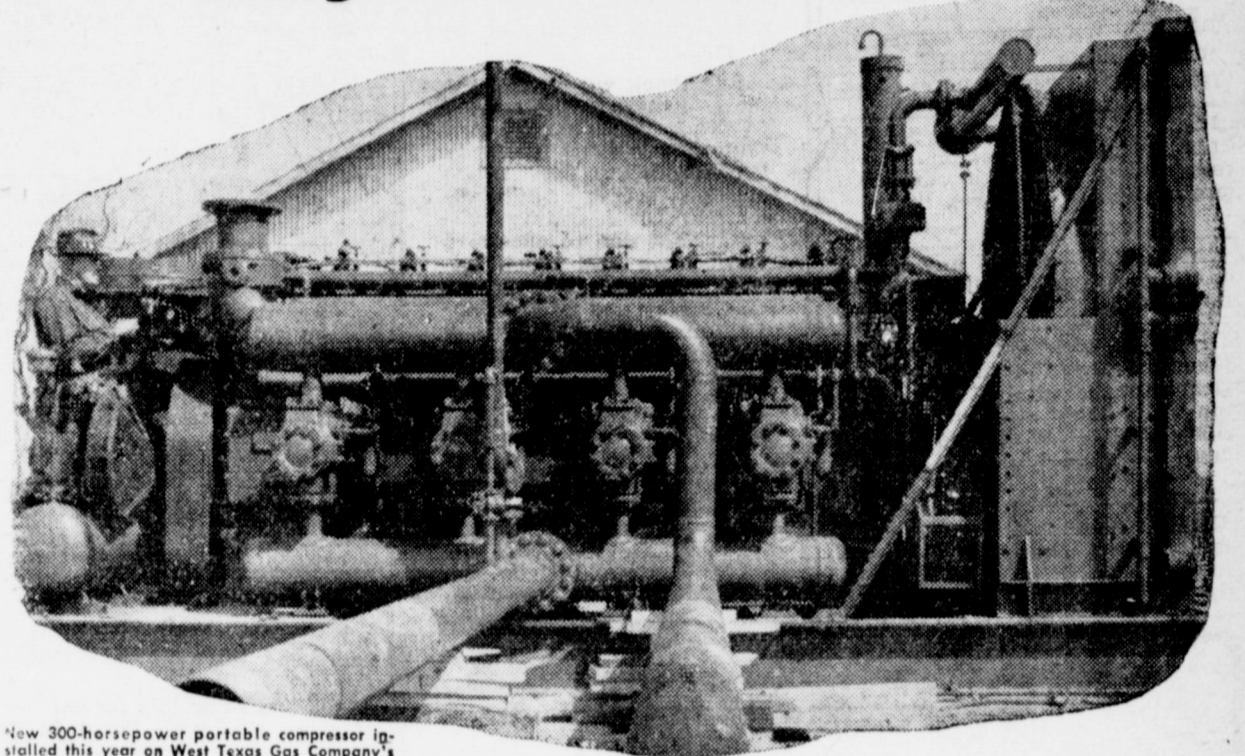

**Wheat Looks Like A Record Crop**

Present general condition of wheat in the southwest is excellent, and the fact that harvest is due to start within less than 30 days, virtually assures a crop of large proportions, unless the weather should suddenly go haywire and upset a very bright outlook.

Marring the picture to some extent is the spotted situation existing in the far western edge of the wheat belt. This includes dry land wheat in Colorado, a few western and north central Kansas counties, the Oklahoma Panhandle western tier of counties in the Texas Panhandle, and New Mexico.

Summer fallow fields in this part of the territory generally are in promising condition, but continuously cropped land shows need of additional moisture. Considerable wind damage has been reported and this danger is not entirely over, although favorable weather conditions have brought an improvement during the last two weeks.

East of this area, more than two-thirds of the wheat belt has plenty of moisture, and with normal conditions from now until harvest, there is a possibility of a near record crop on the largest acreage ever seeded. Winter kill was relatively small; however, considerable loss of this nature is showing up in Central Kansas, and especially in Eastern Nebraska.

Unless maturity is delayed by cool weather and too much rain, everything points to a normal harvest, so far as time is concerned. It should start in North Central Texas about May 20, reach Oklahoma a week or so later, and move on into Kansas the last week in June. There are already reports of rank growth but little or no rust has developed.—Santa Fe.

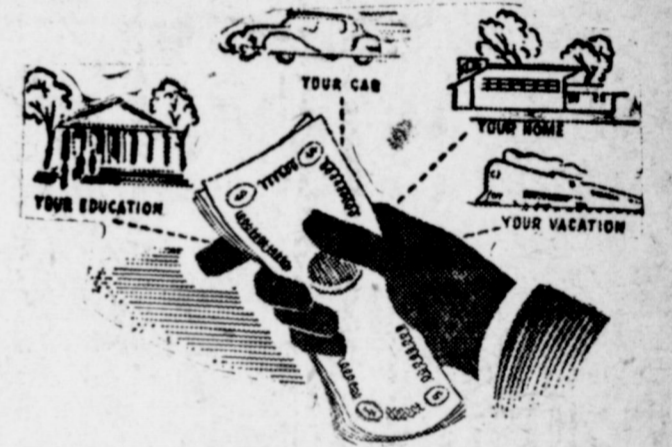

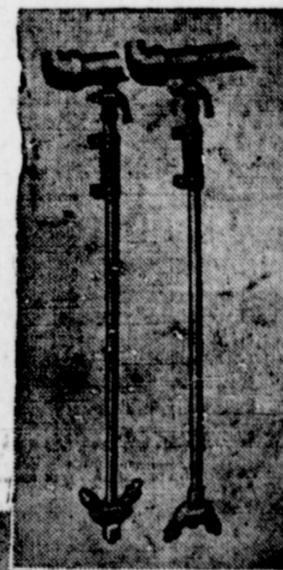

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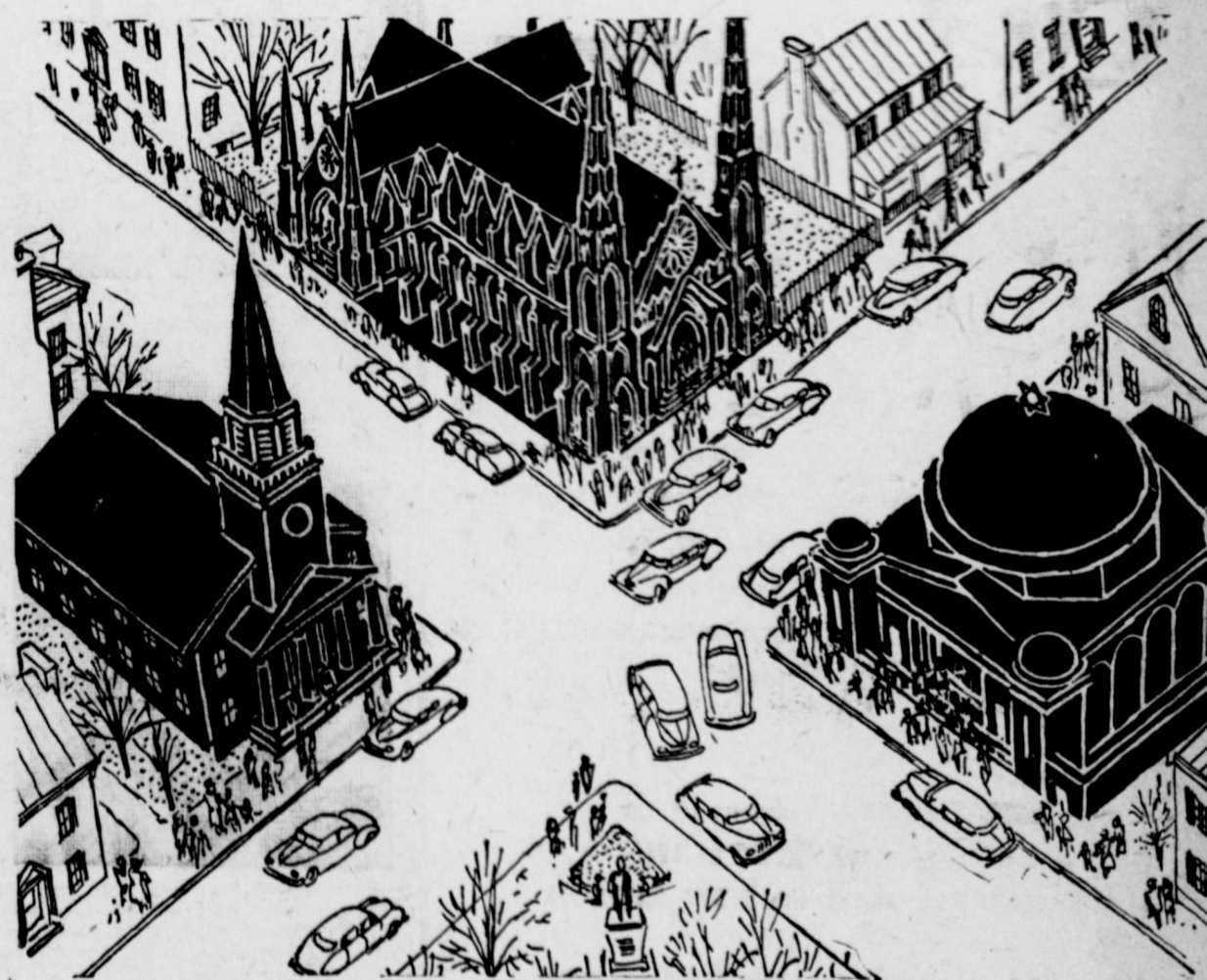

## National Home Demonstration Week Now Being Observed Over Nation

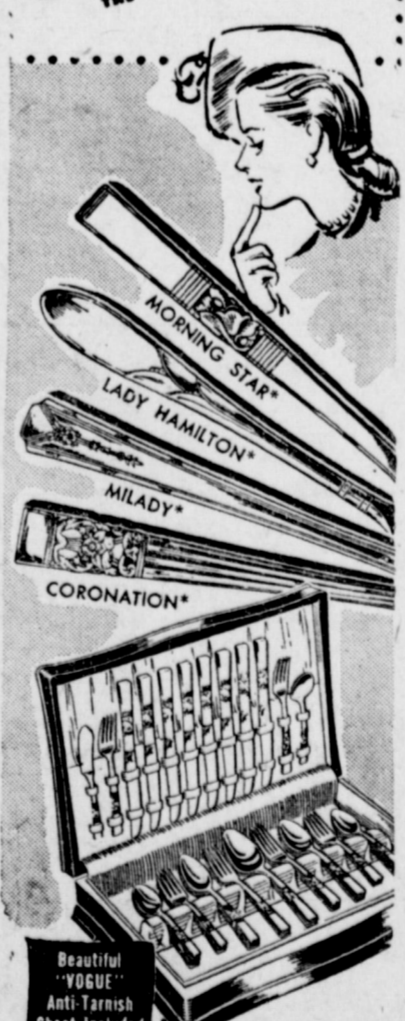

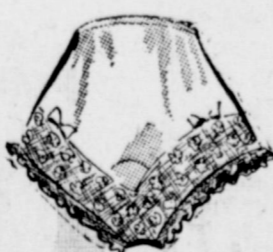

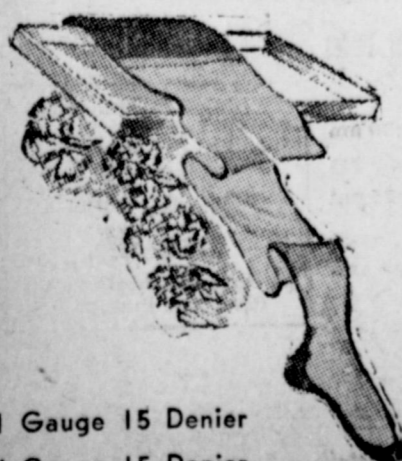

## Paper Of Long Time Ago Found

From the dusty files of The Muleshoe Journal, one of the printers retrieved this week a copy of the paper issued Friday, December 23, 1927, the Christmas special, C. S. Holland, editor. We thought some names contained in the paper might bring back memories to the old timers.

Advertisements in the paper were carried that week by Levi Pressly, attorney at law; A. P. Stone, abstractor; R. L.
