## Cattle From Boys Ranch To Kansas City This Week

A carload of calves, fed by the lads at Boy's Ranch, Springlake, will be shipped from Plainview Friday to Kansas City. Lyle Jackson, who has been designated to supervise the feeding operations at Boy's Ranch, hopes that the eight boys who have tended them will get to go to Kansas City for the sale. He expects to drive a car up there and anticipates another car will go.

Proceeds of the rodeo the boys held here several months ago were invested, with other contributed funds. Twenty-three head of yearlings were bought at 28 and 29 cents per pound said Jackson. The rodeo Boy's Ranch put on cleared \$2,100.

The cattle now weigh an average of around 1,000 pounds.

Proceeds of this sale and all profit made on the feeding operation will be ploughed back into stocker cattle. It is hoped that the number fed will increase from time to time, Jackson said. "By pyramiding the funds from such operations we will help find all the ranch, and I can't think of a better thing to do with the money than to help boys who haven't the guiding hand of parents, that they may become useful citizens."

## Local Grain Men Frantically Search For More Storage Space

In the face of the beginning of wheat harvest only a few days away, and with one point in the Panhandle, Quittaque, already reported started, wheat farmers and grain men are confronted with the most difficult marketing situation in many years.

There is no storage in sight at big terminal elevators, such as at Galveston or Kansas City. One local grain man was told that government owned grain, wheat and sorgum grains, have filled the terminals at Galveston; and that on many sidings north of Galveston may be seen freight cars filled with grain destined for Galveston or Houston.

If the customary rush at harvest is again experienced, country elevators everywhere will be filled. However, country elevator men are doing whatever they can, writing letters, wiring, telephoning for a hint as to storage for grain they want to buy from their farmer patrons.

At Amarillo it was said the buildings of the former powder manufacturing plant, Pan-Tex ordnance, will be made available for wheat storage. A local elevator man said this storage will be suitable but someone has to take over all arrangements there and he had not heard that this has been done. Several million bushels of storage might be available in this way.

Meantime, the farmer, who is in a very critical spot in this situation, is faced with the problem of obtaining storage so that he can obtain a government support price loan on his grain. This amounts to \$1.87 a bushel. Since no storage was available, price being offered further east where the Texas harvest already has begun was down around \$1.50 a bushel.

Many wheat growers therefore are likely to adopt farm storage plans. Local lumber yards are advertising their ability to furnish materials needed for farm storage bins and other firms will offer steel bins for quick delivery.

Harvest Two Weeks Away

Ray Griffiths, veteran grain dealer here, said harvest will start around the 15th to the 20th in this immediate territory. Some fine wheat has been grown in this territory north of Muleshoe. Spring rains added millions of bushels to the prospective production of wheat in the Plains region.

Local elevators will do everything within their power to take care of the business of their grower friends in the coming harvest, and are still hoping that something will occur to break the log jam that now threatens to disrupt the normal flow of grain to market.

## Bailey County Exceeds Quota In Opportunity Savings Bond Drive

Bailey County reached and exceeded its quota by the end of the first week in the Opportunity Drive for the sale of Series E Savings Bonds, E. R. Hart and Jesse Osborn, county co-chairmen, announced today.

The drive officially opened on May 16 and sales for this county through Saturday, May 21, were \$41,043.75, or 195.44 per cent of the county quota of \$21,000.00.

The county chairman received a telegram from Nathan Adams of Dallas, state Savings Bonds chairman, congratulating him for exceeding the quota so promptly.

The report, received from state Savings Bonds headquarters in Dallas, also showed that sales for Texas were \$19,460,304, or 52 per cent of the \$36,950,000 state quota.

Other counties surpassing their quotas during the first week of the drive are Andrews, Blanco, Bass, Coke, Dawson, Fector, Colliad, Hall, Iron, Kimble, Lampasas, Mills, Montgomery, Newton, Scurry and Stephens. Numerous other counties showed sales of 50 per cent or more of their quotas, causing Mr. Adams to predict that the state will reach and far exceed its quota "in the most successful Savings Bonds campaign since the war". The drive will continue through June 30.

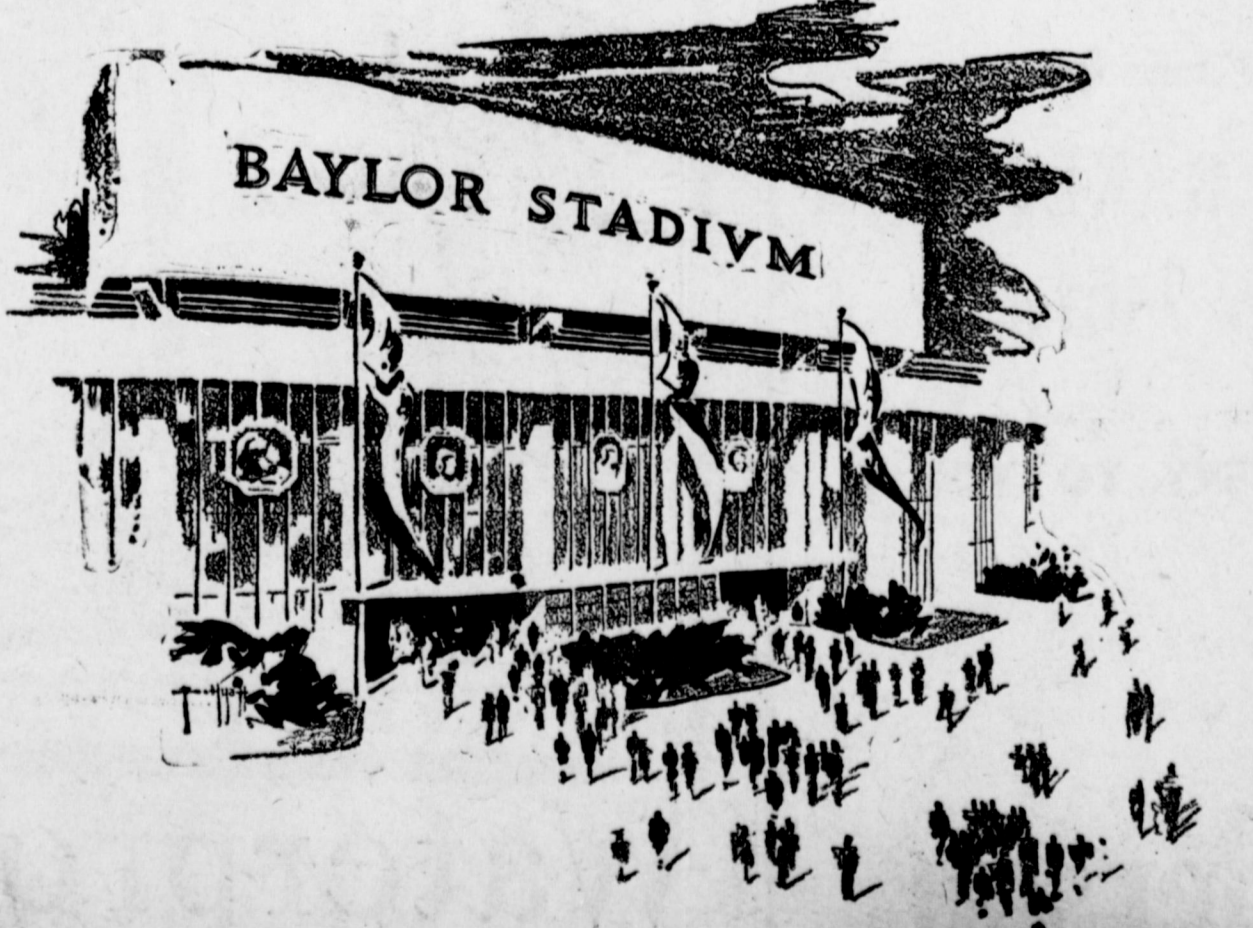
## ATTEND FUNERAL RITES

## "POLITICAL MEDICINE"

**MOST OF THE** tyrannies of the world began first as acts of kindness and benevolence. It is interesting that self-styled "liberals" of this modern age propose to take us into bondage again, by first offering the people security of one kind or another. That's the gimmick by which the bureaucrats propose to perform colossal feats of magic—and get elected (and appointed) again and again.

These "securocrats" are ready to trade anybody all the security he'll want, in exchange for his freedom. An example is the latest scheme for socialized medicine being proposed in Congress, under the false name of "compulsory national health insurance." We have been told for years that the nation's health is in an awful shape, that the American people are a bunch of weaklings.

**No Need To Pamper**—Most of this hallyhoo has come from the federal agency that wants to supervise and direct the medical care of every person in the nation. This is the Federal Security Agency, the same bureau that once spread the untruth that half the nation's young men were unfit to bear arms in the recent war. Actually, only about 6 per cent of all men examined for the draft were rejected for health defects that could have been remedied.

Our nation is the healthiest nation on earth. It is far and away ahead of any country that has ever tried socialized medicine. There are communities that could use more doctors, to be sure. More hospitals are needed. But the

**FSA contention** that half the population cannot afford medical care is pure bosh.

**Who Pays For It?** IT IS SAID that 50 million persons are insured against hospitalizations and accidents. This means that more than one-third of our people have voluntarily provided themselves with medical care plans, without benefit of bureaucracy.

It is a major tragedy of this century that so many people have been taught to believe that they can get something for nothing! Where will the money for all this "security" come from? You and I, if we're such boneheads, will pay the costs!

It is estimated that you would be asked to chip in to the extent of \$192 in taxes for national health insurance. A payroll tax on workers and employers would have to bring \$4 billion in to Washington a year—at first. Later, the overall cost of "security" is estimated to run about \$12 billion yearly—only six years from now. By 1990 payroll taxes would run about 18 per cent!

That is only the beginning. Some wise economists estimate the eventual cost at 25 per cent of the national payroll! The bill will make necessary in the future very heavy charges against the general revenues of the Treasury. Vast sums of money will be taken from you and you, to support the league of officeholders that a compulsory health insurance plan will require. As for me, I don't want my medicine from the bottle marked "political."

## 4-H Youth Build Nation's Future Dairy Herds

Production of milk for human consumption is one of the oldest farm enterprises. Yet today—because of modern scientific research and invention—it is one of the newest and biggest of all agricultural activities. There are some 27 million dairy cows in the nation. One of the objectives of the National 4-H Dairy Production program is the building of a successful dairy herd from an original investment in a 4-H Club calf.

Guided by county agents and local 4-H Club leaders, more than 1,899 boys and girls are participating in this "learn by doing" 1949 project. They acquire know-how to grow fine pastures, build healthy herds and produce good, clean, wholesome milk. Not content to stop there, these future dairymen pass along their knowledge to the community by demonstrating at clubs and meetings procedures such as "Dairy Problems on the Farm," "Dairy Cattle Management," and "Care and Handling of Milk."

To further encourage 4-H'ers in this endeavor, the Kraft Foods company for well over a decade has donated awards for outstanding records. This year there will be a gold-filled medal for first place county winner, and a sterling silver medal for second place. Eight \$25 U. S. Savings Bonds will be presented to state winners, while all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago will be arranged for 10 sectional champions. From this sectional group, six will be chosen to

receive a \$300 national agricultural college scholarship.

State winners in 1948 were: Doyle Davis, Hart; Billy Popham, More; Billy Fowler, Lakeview.

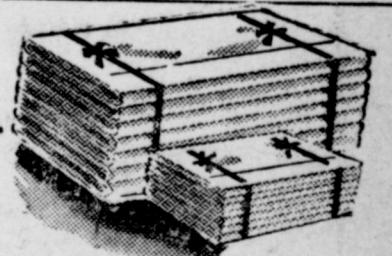

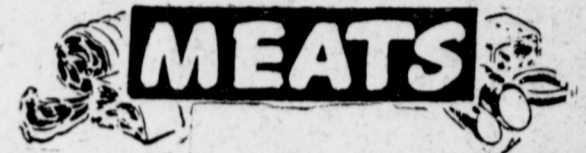

## Lubbock Leading Cotton County in Texas For 1948

Lubbock led all other Texas counties in the production of cotton last year, and indications are that the county will successfully defend its crown of cotton champion come next fall. As a matter of fact, the entire South Plains is expected to produce a record "bustin'" cotton crop this year.

The U. S. Census Bureau reported in March that Lubbock County led the state with 125,878 bales ginned as of January 15. Three other South Plains counties were among the top ten in the state—Lamb, Hockley and Hale.

K. N. Clapp, area representative of Anderson-Clayton and Company and veteran observer of cotton production in the South Plains, predicts a South Plains 1949 crop of 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 bales from 3,000,000 acres.

The largest previous crop was 959,000 bales in 1937, and the largest previous acreage was approximately 2,100,000 in 1948.

Clapp is not alone in his optimism. He is joined by such recognized experts as Don L. Jones, superintendent of the Lubbock State Experiment Sub-station; David Sherrill, Lubbock county agent; other agents over the South Plains and, of course, individual farmers.

Their optimism is based mainly on plentiful underground moisture, common throughout this cotton growing section. More than four inches of moisture was received in January in the form of slow rain, sleet, and snow, and several light rains have fallen since then.

All predictions are made, however, with two qualifications—moisture conditions during the summer and what the government will do about parity prices for grain. But, it is generally agreed, whatever develops must be severe in extent before it stymies a record cotton crop.

According to Census Bureau figures, the South Plains produced more than one-fifth of the Texas cotton crop, the largest output for any section of equal area in the state, also that the 19th congressional district produced more cotton than any other congressional district in the nation.

Ginnings for ranking South Plains counties were 84,401 for Lamb, which took fifth place in the state; 70,789 for Hockley, in eighth place, and 67,436 for Hale, in ninth position. Dawson County with 52,150 almost broke into the top ten.

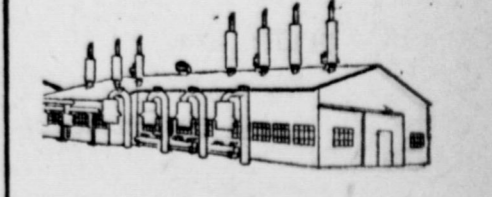

**Pig Brooders Used To Protect Litter**  
Are Found Valuable At Farrowing Time  
"This little pig went to market" is a great first line for a nursery rhyme. But it doesn't go far enough as far as farmers are concerned. They'd rather wait until the pig grows up before sending it to market. And the growing-up process is no snap, especially during the first few weeks when the old sow may crush her precious offspring as they crowd around her in an effort to keep warm.

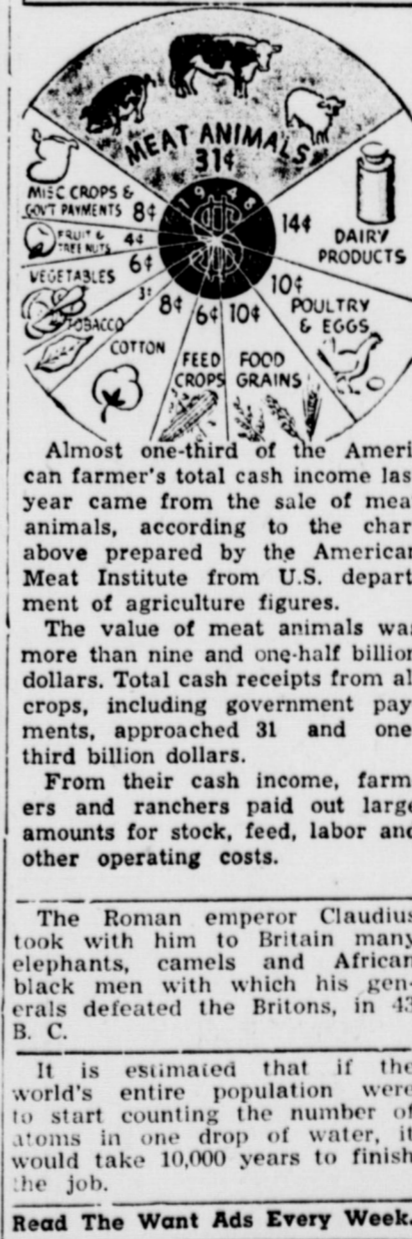
The problem of getting hogs to market starts at farrowing time. In the spring some form of supplementary heat is necessary to prevent a high mortality rate among pigs. Pig brooders such as this have been developed for this purpose.



Here is shown a pig brooder in operation. Ofttimes some form of supplementary heat is necessary to prevent a high mortality rate among pigs. Pig brooders such as this have been developed for this purpose.

Brooders are easy to build and economical to operate. Generally, they are constructed by boarding off a corner of the farrowing pen to a height of about 16 inches. A roof is placed over this rectangular enclosure and a board nailed across the front opening about 8 inches above the floor. Heat is provided by a 150 to 300-watt lamp, the size depending on weather conditions. A hole is cut in the top, and the lamp placed in a suitable reflector which is bolted securely over the opening. Pig brooders consume an average of 36 kilowatt hours of power per litter.

**Taste-Teasers "The way to a man's heart"**

Let's talk about a casserole main-dish as the perfect answer for a busy menu planner. And just such a busy lady is lovely Lucille Wall, who stars in NBC's "Portia Faces Life" Monday through Friday.

One of Lucille's specialties is "Beef-steak and Kidney Pie"—as delicious a casserole as I ever tasted. "It's really my Mother's recipe," she confided. "We were a large family. My brothers, sisters and I used to beg Mother to make it, and now my friends are after me for it." Here's her recipe—truly a dish to impress your family and friends.

**BEEFSTEAK AND KIDNEY PIE**

In an iron skillet, sauté a large onion in butter until transparent and golden color. Add 1 1/2 pounds of sirloin steak, cut in 1-inch cubes; and 6 lamb kidneys, split in half. As meat browns, remove from skillet and put in casserole dish with cover.

Thicken remaining juice in skillet with heaping tablespoon of flour; add enough hot water to make gravy consistency. Add to meat in casserole, along with 6 white onions, a can of button mushrooms, salt and pepper. Bake in hot oven 1 hour. (Before serving, green peas may be added, if you wish.)

The conspiracy between a woman and her refrigerator or stove has long baffled many men, and this magic recipe for vanilla ice cream is no exception.

By using sweetened condensed milk you cut down the preparation time, because there is nothing to cook first. In fact you can mix the ingredients together almost as fast as you can say, "Failure-Proof Recipe."

But be sure you use sweetened condensed, not evaporated milk. There's a difference, you know—evaporated milk is made from fresh milk with much of the water removed, while sweetened condensed milk is a creamy blend of sweet, whole milk and sugar.

**MAGIC VANILLA ICE CREAM**

1. Set refrigerator control at coldest point. 2. Combine 2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk, 1/2 cup water, and 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla. Chill. 3. Whip 1 cup whipping cream to stiff-peak consistency. Fold into mixture.

Place in freezing tray and cover with waxed paper. 4. Freeze in freezing unit of refrigerator until half frozen. 5. Scrape from tray. Beat until smooth, but not melted. 6. Cover with waxed paper, and replace in freezing unit until frozen. Serve plain, or top with chocolate sauce or fruit.

Sometimes we forget that plain old-fashioned ice cream is one of the most universally liked dishes by young and old, and homemade ice cream is a real triumph. Remember this when you plan desserts for the week.

Cooking Tip . . . a cream sauce with a chicken flavor is delicious over eggs, mushrooms, or small white boiled onions. In fact it adds zest to many dishes. As a short cut, try condensed cream-of-chicken soup and use it heated, just as it comes from the can.

Another Tip . . . to cut string beans in those fancy, thin, diagonal strips, use scissors instead of a knife. You'll find it a quick and easy method of preparing them, and when cooked, they look most attractive on the plate.

## Grass, Legume Seed Are Scarce

COLLEGE STATION, May 31.—If the trend on your farm is toward more pasture and forage production, you'll need seed for new plantings or reseeding. Grass and legume seed are not too plentiful, and they are expensive, says R. R. Lancaster, extension pasture specialist of Texas A. & M. College. Growing and saving your own is mighty good insurance and considerably less expensive.

There is plenty of some pasture grass seed ready-grown and waiting for someone to harvest them, adds Lancaster. One of these is rescue grass. It grows in abundance along roads, ditches, fence rows and in other protected places, and is well known to most Texans. Its seed branches droop with the heavy ripening crop of seed while merchants import seed from

Australia.

Rescue can be harvested with a combine. When the seed are ripe enough to shatter, it's ready for combining. Before shattering begins, it can be mowed with a windrower or windrowed with a rake or cut with a broadcast binder but not tied. These seed-hay should be allowed to dry for about four days, depending upon the weather. Threshed seed must be spread under a shelter until it is dry enough for storage, cautions Lancaster. But if you plan to plant immediately by spreading the seed-hay, most any method of harvesting can be used.

Dallisgrass seed likewise is going to waste in the Gulf Coast area and in many sections of east Texas. It can be mowed, raked and the seed-hay spread or scattered where you want it. Dick it in, says Lancaster, for dallisgrass grows better from that method of seeding than any other.

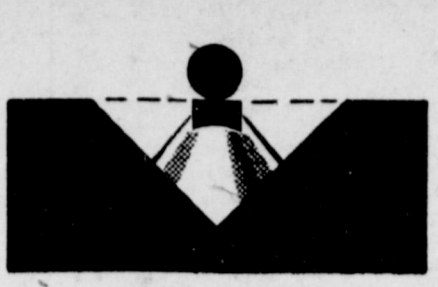

## HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE

By ARTHUR E. COOK

National and Olympic Rifle Champion

Sighting



Gun sights are used to point the rifle at the target and it is important to learn to sight perfectly. An error of 1/10 inch in sight alignment will place the bullet two inches from the center of a target only 50 feet away—a bad miss. If you have the rear peep and front post sight combination on your rifle, aim as shown at top left, centering the top of the post in the peep hole. With an open rear sight (right above) center the top of the post on a level with the top of the rear sight before directing the aim on the target. Notice that when shooting at bullseye tar-

gets you aim at the bottom of the bull rather than at the center. That is because you are likely to lose sight of the black post within the black bullseye.

Aiming and shooting at bullseye targets is not only a great sport with many thousands of adherents throughout the world, but it is also the finest training for any kind of shooting. If you can't hit a bullseye that is standing still how can you expect to hit a live target that is moving?

## Farm Building Is On Increase

COLLEGE STATION, May 31.—The old story of "six of one and a half dozen of the other" works pretty well in the outlook for agricultural buildings.

The price index on lumber has dropped about six percent since last August, but the price jumps in other building products have cancelled this advantage for the prospective builder.

Right now there are more than twice the number of farm implements—not including tractors—on rubber tires than there were in 1932, so the rubber industry is pretty important to the mechanized farmer. One of the national rubber companies figure they'll

produce two million more tires this year than they did last. Farm tires are in on this increase, too.

Statistics show that 55 percent more rubber has been used in the farm industry since V-J Day than in any peak years up to that time.

From the production angle, this year's picture is an encouraging one, say the agricultural engineers. From all indications there will be plenty of farm tires to replace the used ones and ones for new equipment.

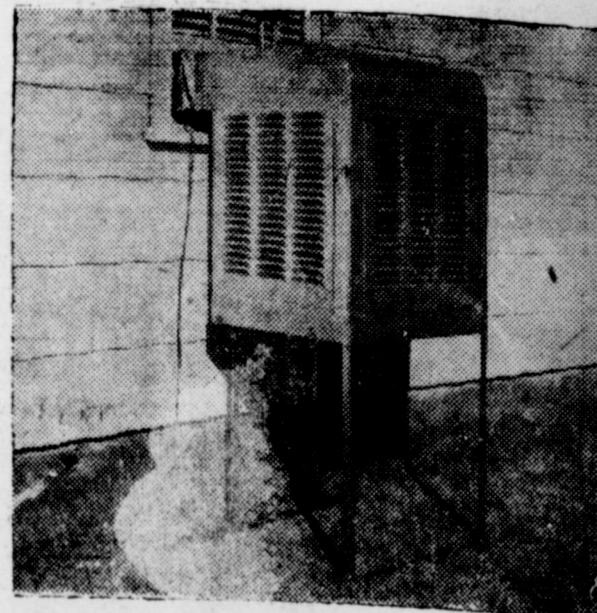

**"Be Your Age", Is Health Suggestion**

AUSTIN, June 1.—There is an old slang expression that would make a good slogan for living a

longer and more comfortable life, and that is "Be your age." According to the State Health Officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, many persons injure their health and endanger their life through indulgence in exercises and vigorous sports unsuited for their age and physical condition.

"While a young man in prime condition may benefit from a fast game of tennis, older men and women have been known to collapse and suffer serious heart attacks following such a game. The same thing applies to golfing, swimming and other vigorous sports," Dr. Cox said.

During the hot summer months, it is of especial importance that you know your physical limitations, and not harm your physical condition.

"Persons of middle age should never participate in activities requiring violent physical exertion, and should confine their physical exercise to such bounds as their doctor prescribes", Cox asserted.

The State Health Officer suggested that all persons of middle age be examined by their physician, before planning their summer vacation activities. A vacation can easily be more exhausting than refreshing, and in such event, more harm than benefit results from the time thus spent. Fishing, boating, hiking in moderation, and many other light recreations can be engaged in by the older people who must avoid heart strain, and it is a wise precaution to have your doctor advise as to what sort of vacation you should plan.
