Bankers Evolve Plan for Stim-ulating Important Aid to Farm Success

THE Cache county, Utah, bankers recently added a stimulus to banker-farmer cooperative work by launching a farm accounting contest. At a meeting of the Clearing House Association the project was put before the bankers, and methods and plans formulated. Each bank in the county agreed to enroll a minimum of five farmers in the farm accounting project.
