TxDOT meeting in Muleshoe Friday

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will have a public meeting Friday, January 30, at 2:30 p.m. at the Earl Ladd Fire Station in Muleshoe, US 84 & East Fifth St. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the Trans-Texas Corridor and to give the public an opportunity to submit comments on potential routes.

The corridor is a new type of transportation network that includes roads, rail, and a utility zone designed to move people and goods faster and safer, keep hazardous material out of populated areas, and improve air quality.

The Trans-Texas Corridor is an all-Texas transportation network of corridors up to 1,200 feet wide. The 4,000-mile corridor will include separate highway lanes for passenger vehicles and trucks, high-speed passenger rail, high-speed freight rail, commuter rail, and a dedicated utility zone.

Local forecasts and alerts come to area, Bailey County

Some Bailey County residents are a little closer to being able to keep abreast of current weather conditions with Tuesday's inauguration of the National Weather Service's newest weather radio transmitter.

Officials were on hand in Dimmitt Tuesday as the new station went on-line. The new transmitter was recently installed on the KNNK radio tower near Summerfield.

It will broadcast on a frequency of 162.500 Mhz directly from the NWS office in Lubbock. The station will reach most of Castro, Deaf Smith and Parmer counties, as well as portions of Bailey, Randall, Oldham, Swisher, Lamb and Curry counties.

Officials maps show mostly the northern portion of Bailey County will be covered, ending just short of Muleshoe. but Gary Skwira of the National Weather Service said areas outside the official map can get the signal.

"I think many Muleshoe residents will be able to get the station, depending on conditions, he said

"The new weather radio will be beneficial to the

communities it reaches," said Ed Calianese, NWS Lubbock Warning Coordination Meteorologist.

"Residents now have an extra resource that can be used to receive advance warning information."

In order to get the forecast, one must have a weather radio, which cost between \$35 and \$50.

Friona Mayor John Taylor was on hand for the news conference. "Having been through a tornado in 1994, we know what advance weather warnings can mean," he said.

The station will broadcast continuously with forecasts updated at least twice daily at 4 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Local forecasts will be included for Dimmitt, Friona and Hereford and an extended forecast for the Southwestern Panhandle.

In addition, weather observations will be updated each hour. And a hazardous weather outlook will be issued at 6 a.m. daily and updated as needed.

There will also be event-driven broadcasts, which means that all watches, warnings and advisories will be aired immediately after they are issued by the NWS. These will be tone-

alerted and the normal broadcast will be interrupted.

Hospital looks at new beds, doctor

Patients and nursing staff may have an easier time getting in and out of bed at the Muleshoe Area Medical Center if that hospitals wishes are granted.

The hospital's board of directors approved submitting a grant to the Texas Department of Health to acquire 31 new electric beds.

Hospital Administrator Jim Bone said that many of the current electric beds need to be replaced.

"It's difficult to keep them up and running," he said.

Some of the old electric beds have been stripped of parts to keep others operational, and some manual beds that were sent to Muleshoe for storage have been pressed into service, Bone said.

"The manual beds can't be lowered enough for some of the patients and its harder on them as well as staff to get them in and out of the beds," Bone said.

He estimated the costs of the beds to be between \$35,000 and \$40,000, well within the \$50,000 limit the state places on each request.

The first round of the grants being awarded comes in March but others will follow later in the year.

Bone also told the board that a new doctor will be setting up a clinic in Muleshoe.

Dr. John Shary will establish an outreach clinic starting Tuesday, Feb. 10.

Shary is an ENT (ears, nose and throat) doctor with a practice in Plainview. He will be at here every other Tuesday after he arrives.

There will also be a change in the emergency room, although patients won't notice a difference, Bone said.

The five local doctors requested they be given a contract to run the emergency room on nights, holidays

and weekends. That contract is currently held by Southwest Medical Associates (SMA) out of Port Levoca.

The reason those visiting the emergency room probably won't notice much difference is that the local physicians have already been covering most of the shifts already, having been hired by SMA.

The only difference would be that under the new contract, the local doctors would be responsible for finding someone to cover, if necessary.

The board gave tentative approval of the arrangement but asked that the hospital's attorney examine the contract, making sure all provisions were legally and precisely covered.

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Sheep and goats



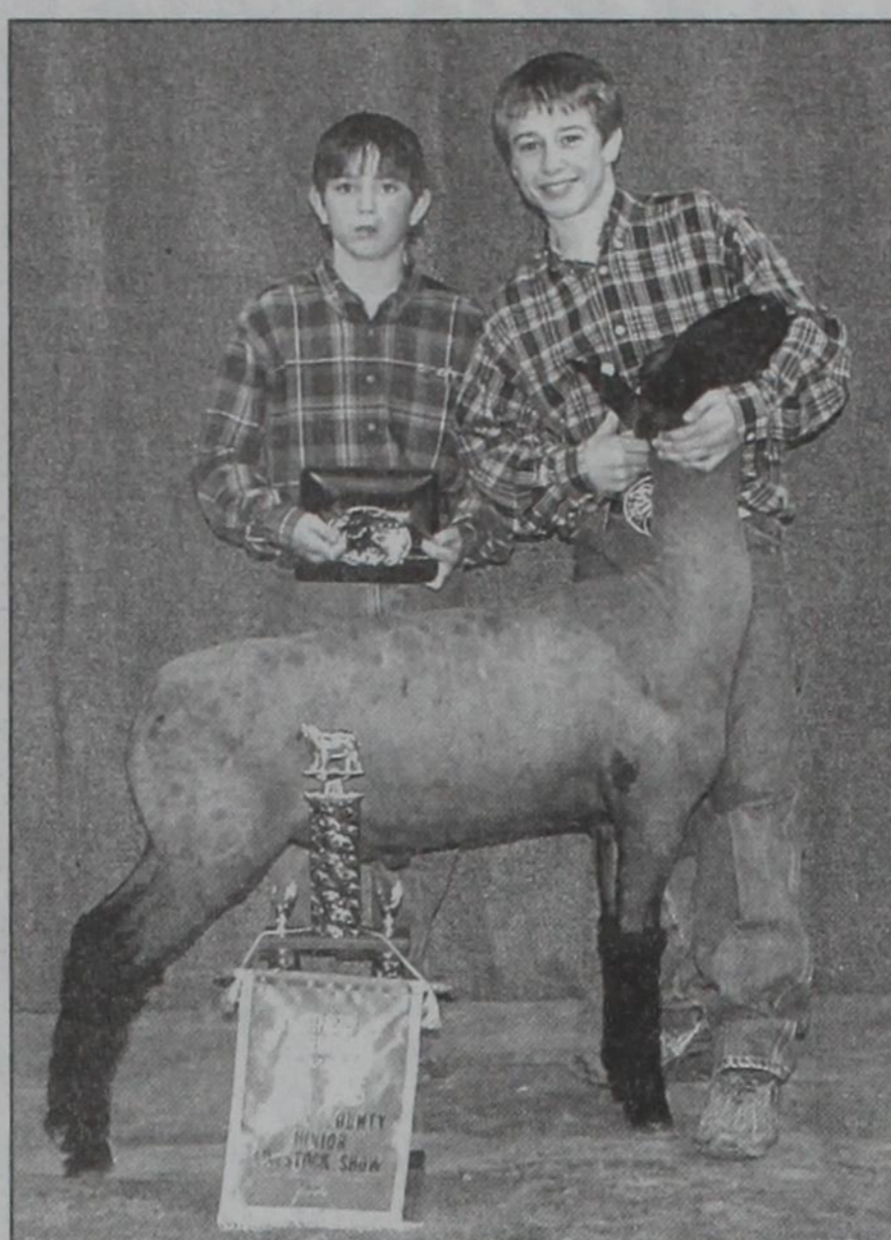
Dusty Clayton, 14, displays his reserve champion goat.

Jimmy Dale Black Award, and was not identified as such.

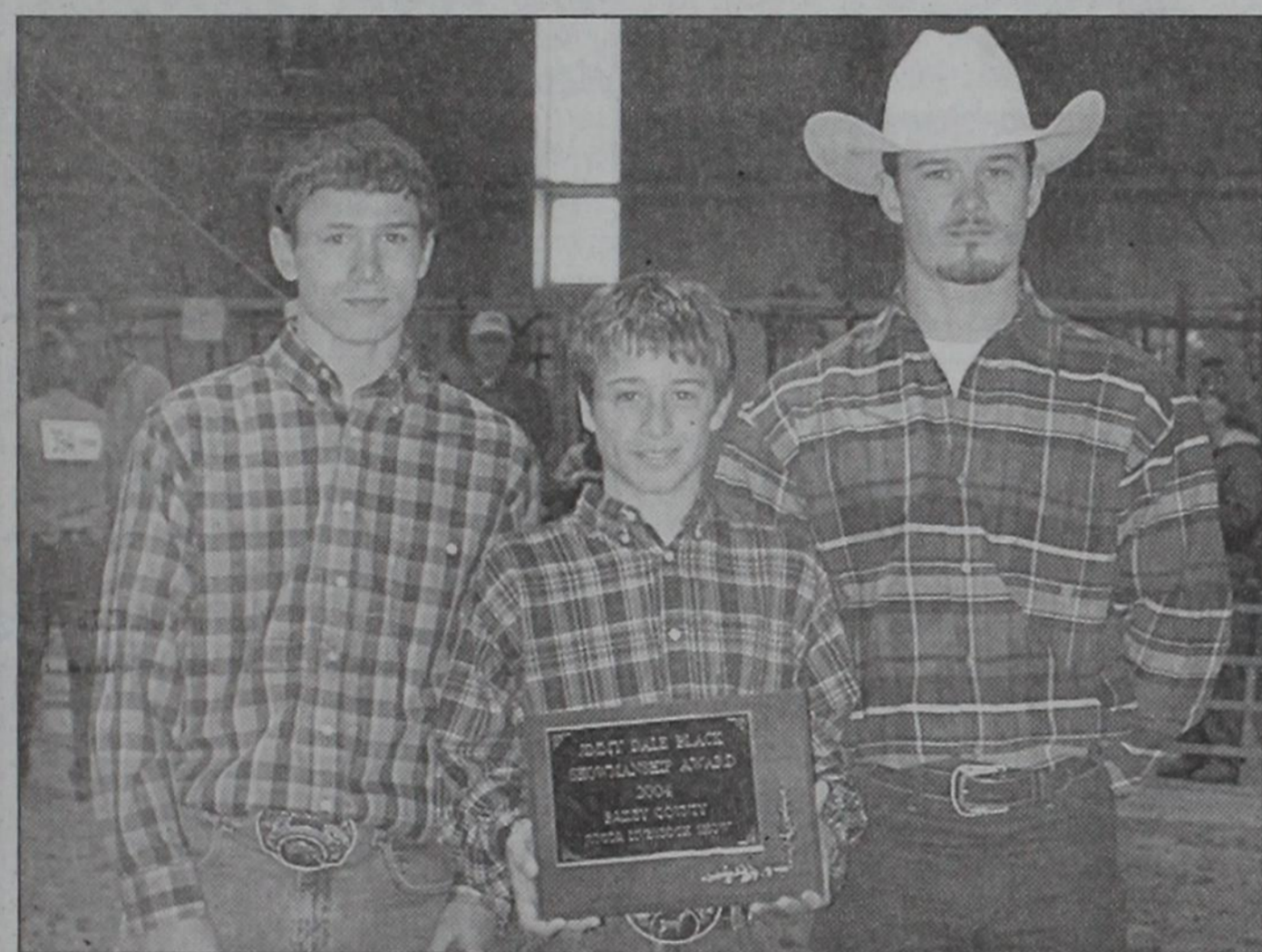

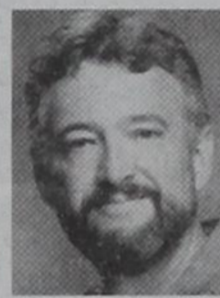

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Mules take victory over Dimmitt Bobcats in overtime

The Muleshoe Mules took their fans on a white-knuckle ride against the Dimmitt Bobcats in the Muleshoe Convocation and Athletic Center. The Mules played their best game of the season to take the Bobcats to overtime.

The Mules lost 71-69 in the extra period.

The Mules maintained their intensity however and moved to 1-2 in district by downing the Cubs in Brownfield 82-72.

The Mules matched the Bobcats eight treys with eight long-range shots of their own. Tyler Sheets hit a 3-pointer from the top of the key in the overtime to keep the Mules close with 16 seconds left.

The Mules fouled Dimmitt in the backcourt and the Bobcats only converted one charity toss. The Mules had 14 seconds to respond and Sterling Via got off a last second shot

that would have retied the game.

Via's shot bounced on the rim but fell outside the rim as the final buzzer sounded. Dimmitt connected on seven-of-nine free throws in the OT.

Trevor Turnbow drained the Mules first trey of the night as time ran out in the opening frame to give the Mules a 15-14 advantage.

Ty. Sheets kept the Mules in the game in the second frame with a trey from the corner and connected on a baby hook in the lane. On defense Ty. Sheets went to the floor for a steal in just prior to the intermission.

Ty. Sheets pushed the ball ahead and Layne Sheets pulled up out side the arc on the break. Black kicked the ball out side to Ly. Sheets and he fired a line drive 3-pointer. Dimmitt answered with a trey to take a 35-30 lead to the dressing room.

The Mules made adjustments on defense at the break and held the Bobcats only

seven points in the third period.

The Mules made 23 points to take a 53-42 advantage into the final frame.

Landon Sheets knocked down two treys and Tatom Heathington dropped in a third. Black was a terror on the inside to added six for the Mules.

The Bobcats came firing back in the final eight minutes and chipped away at the Mule lead. Dimmitt knotted the game at 62 with a minute left in regulation. The Mules showed patients on offense but turned the ball over with 27 seconds showing.

Dimmitt played for a final shot and missed but grabbed the rebound. The officials waved off the put back as time had expired.

Black led the Mules with 22 points, Ty. Sheets added 17 and Ln. Sheets had 12. Heathington and Ly. Sheets made seven points each and Turnbow dropped in four. Nicky Guana of Dimmitt led

all scores with 23.

The Mules came out firing on all cylinders in Brownfield and L. Sheets got the Mules going with a trey. Black twisted inside the lane for a bucket and finished a break as the Mules got off to a running start.

T. Sheets grabbed a defensive rebound and got the ball to Via. T. Sheets ran the floor and pulled up at the top of key. Via kicked the ball back out on the break and Ty. Sheets drained the trey to put the Mules up 10-0.

The Cubs made a run at the end of the period to cut into the Mule's lead but Turnbow hit a bucket from the free throw line as the period ended to give the Mules an 18-10 lead.

The Cubs offense heated up in the second period and cut the Mule lead to 32-30 with six ticks left on the clock. Sheets took the inbound pass and let a half-court one-hand shot fly. The ball hit only nylon to push the Mule lead to 35-30 at the break.

Each time the Cubs made a run at the Mules in the final two periods the Mules answered. Ln. Sheets, Ly. Sheets and Turnbow each pumped in threes in the third quarter to

give the Mules a 56-49 margin to begin the final frame.

"It was good to win one, especially on the road," said Mule coach Ralph Mason. "We needed a win tonight. We came out in second half and focused a lot better than we did in the first. The 10-0 run made us relax mentally."

"It's definitely good to get a win," said Ly. Sheets. "We did a good job of handling the pressure tonight. The game with Dimmitt gave us a lot of confidence coming in here."

The Mules converted 25 of 35 free throws in the contest and Landon Sheets led all scorers with 24 points. Brady Black added 16, Ty. Sheets 15 and Turnbow had 11.

Ly. Sheets dropped in nine points, Daniel Campolla five and Heathington made two.

The Mules traveled to Lubbock Cooper January 27 and return home to meet the Littlefield Wildcats on the 30th. The Mules will defend their home floor against the Tigers of Slaton February 3.

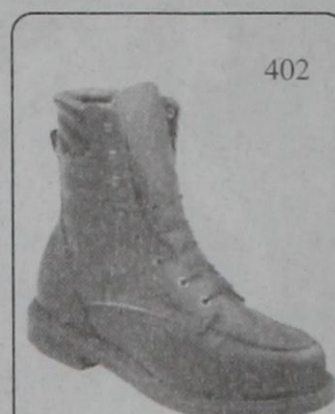
"This was Ashley,s (Gutierrez) kind of game and you could see it in how she
