Klan leader is arrested

SCOTLAND, Conn. (AP) — Twelve people were arrested, including an imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, in two days of rallies and cross-burnings that marked the Klan's public re-emergence in Connecticut after a 70-year

At least eight people were injured in the weekend Klan activity. Hundreds of troopers formed human circles each night around Klan members and onlookers gathered

for speeches and cross-burnings. At the Saturday rally, 26-year-old Gary Piscottano of New Britain, named Connecticut grand dragon, told the

crowd: "Connecticut has always been a liberal state and we're trying real hard to change that.'

The area was under tight security after scattered violence Saturday. State police searched vehicles and individuals under a Superior Court order banning the carrying of firearms in the town of Scotland on Satur-

day and Sunday. Bill Wilkinson, 37, the imperial wizard of the Louisianabased Invisible Empire, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was appearing in Superior Court today to face a charge of

carrying a dangerous weapon in a motor vehicle.

Hostage debate may begin soon

The speaker of the Iranian Parliament says debate on the U.S. hostages will begin Tuesday, the 318th day in captivity for the 52 Americans. But two influential Iranian religious leaders said today the regime has not dropped its demand for an apology from the U.S. government.

Iran's official Pars news agency said Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani also received a letter from the hostages' families saying they are 'ready to do what you and your col-

leagues order." It said the families said they want-

ed to meet with him "to solve our problem in a human atmosphere. We wish to be a bridge that the hostages cross to reach their homes ... we hope to find a solution to put an end to the current separation of the Iranian and American nations.

Pars said the letter was delivered by the Algerian ambassador in Tehran. It did not further identify the senders, and there was no immediate comment from anyone representing the hostages' relatives in the United States.

Iran threatens **OPEC** joint hike

VIENNA, Austria (AP) - Iran tangled with Saudi Arabia today and threatened to block OPEC's first joint plan for raising oil prices and control-ling production. The 13-nation cartel opened debate on the long-term proposal at its 20th anniversay meeting

OPEC General-Secretary Rene Ortiz confirmed that oil pricing had been discussed in the first session.

Iran's chief delegate, Ali Akbar Moinfar, threatened to block action on the plan unless the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries conference also discussed production.

Iran blocked Iraq from chairing the conference, apparently because of the two countries' recent border fighting, conference sources said. Iran threatened to demand a reversal of the agenda if Iraq took the chair, forcing a discussion of current oil prices and production disputes before taking up term strategy subject of the meeting.

Algeria, which has held the presidency since the June meeting in Algiers, was chosen to serve as chair-

man. Iraq was originally scheduled to preside over the meeting and also hold the rotating presidency until an OPEC summit in Baghdad starting

Algerian Foreign Minister Mohammed S. Benyahia was named chairman and Iraqi Oil Minister Tayah Abdul Karim was named alternate chairman. The OPEC secretary-generakl said Iraq will preside at the Baghdad conference as originally planned.

"If we do not have a short-term decision on production, then it's a joke to have a long-term strategy. said Iran's chief delegate. He called for a Saudi production cut to drain off the current world oil glut and keep

"That's not right," Saudi Oil Minister Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, a reporters when asked about Moinfar's contention. He said Saudi Arabia still had made no decision about its fourth-quarter production.

Presidential hopefuls zero in on Texas voters

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -Courting the pivotal Mexican-American vote in a state considered crucial to both candidates, President Carter opens a swing through Texas today with a town meeting in Corpus Christi, one day before GOP opponent Ronald Reagan kicks off a trip through South Texas.

Both candidates will be joined by political heavyweights as they attempt to beef up support and campaign coffers during their sojourns. Carter plans to zip through Corpus, then fly to Houston for a party fund-

raising luncheon, then travel to Ros-Today's town meeting marks the

first presidential visit to this coastal resort city since 1943.

After the meeting here, Carter will jet to Houston for a \$5,000-a-plate fund-raiser at the Hyatt Regency Hotel downtown, Proceeds from the luncheon will go to the Democratic National Committee.

After the luncheon, Carter plans to meet with Texas Democrats for about 20 minutes in the hotel's Imperial Ballroom, then board Air Force One and head to Georgia for a school dedication and fundraisers.

After a late-night arrival in San Antonio for meetings with local party workers tonight, Reagan will tour Harlingen and Corpus Christi, then attend a fund-raising dinner in Hous-

ton projected to fatten his campaign

by \$2 million.

"A decision was made in the Mailis (Parliament) today regarding a reply to the letter by the U.S. Congress, and substantial discussion on the hostages will begin on Tuesday and the Majlis will make a decision.

'Since the U.S. Congress letter was read out in the Majlis and was also covered by the press, we expect the U.S. government to publish the text of the Majlis letter of reply for the American public. If it fails to do this, it will have shown its lack of good will, and this will have an adverse effect on our talks."

The "U.S. Congress letter" was sent the Majlis in July by 187 congressmen who urged the release of the Americans taken hostage last Nov. 4 when young Islamic militants seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran. The broadcast said the Swiss charge d'affaires delivered a "follow-up letter" from some of the U.S. congress-

men on Sunday.

The Majlis Foreign Affairs Committee submitted a draft of a reply to the U.S. letter for the second time on Sunday. Its language was as vituperative as any used against the United States, saying:


"The world-devouring America, as the great Satan and a symbol of world tyranny, is the biggest enemy of our independence and greatness and a foe to the world's deprived peoples.

"Seizure of the spy-nest (the U.S Embassy), that was in fact the main center for running Iran and a base for U.S. invasion in the region, should be considered in such a context."

Tehran Radio said the Majlis asked the Foreign Affairs Committee to revise the draft to insert some of the opinions voiced by the deputies.

On Friday, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the leader of the Iranian revolution, listed four conditions for the release of the hostages. They did not include the previous demand for an apology from the United States, a condition the Carter administration rejected, and U.S. observers inter-

But Hojatoleslam Mousavi Khoeini, a member of the Majlis and the spiritual leader of the militants holding the hostages, told the English-language newspaper Tehran Times that a U.S. apology is a basic condition for the release of the Americans. He said Khomeini "listed some of the conditions for the release of the hostages but not all of them."

Part two: He never lived down Senate 'landslide'



By Merle Miller

Of all the controversies that swirled around Lyndon Baines Johnson during his long public life, none was asfogged in confusion and suspicion as his successful race for the U.S. Senate

It left him a nickname, "Landslide Lyndon," that he never lived down. The tangled roots of the "landslide" go back to 1947, when Congressman Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) began showing signs that he was ready and eager to move on to higher things.

That readiness was nothing new. He always had seemed to move faster, more visibly, more vocally, since his youngest days at the farmhouse by the Pedernales in the Texas hill country where he was born, as his mother Rebekah recorded later, at the auspicious hour of daybreak on August 27, 1908. There is no doubt that the pivot of Rebekah's life was her eldest

Rebekah (much later, on hearing rumors that her son might become president): "I'm not surprised. 'course it's a mother talking, but from

the first time I looked into his eyes, none of his accomplishments sur-LYNDON'S FIRST RUN FOR public office came in 1937 after Rep. James Buchanan, age 70, died of a

heart attack in Washington. Mary Rather, a longtime friend: "The very moment that Congressman Buchanan died, Senator Alvin Wirtz (an early Johnson mentor) was saying, 'Get Lyndon for me.' And he immediately went into a huddle with him and said, 'You must run for this

The 28-year-old Johnson quit his job as state director of the National

Youth Administration and entered active, competitive politics.

His election victory made the front page of the New York Times, which noted that he had "shouted his advocacy of President Roosevelt's (supreme) Court reorganization all over the Tenth Texas District."

By happy coincidence, Roosevelt was about to begin a fishing trip in the Gulf of Mexico. Johnson was invited to meet him in Galveston, where the president expressed his gratitude and gave his blessing to the young Lochinvar. He also gave him the phone number of Thomas G. (Tommy the Cork!) Corcoran, his friend and advisor and one of the most powerful men in Washington, telling Lyndon that Tommy would take care of him once

he got to Washington. Corcoran: "When Roosevelt got back from that trip to Texas, he told me to take care of this boy and out him on the Naval Affairs Committee. There were others who'd been around for a while and were in line, but naturally Lyndon got the appoint-

LATE IN LIFE LYNDON used to say that he couldn't decide whether he preferred Washington in the days when he was a freshman congressman when anything seemed possible and often was, or those later years when he ws the most powerful man in

town. Both were intoxicating. Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas died on April 4, 1941; he was 65 years


old. On April 19 Gov. Wilbert L. (Pappy) O'Daniel announced that a special election would be held on June 28 to choose a successor. Pappy assured Lyndon that he was not even considering running for the seat; Lyndon believed him. Lyndon went to the White House and showed President Roosevelt the draft of a statement he had written announcing his own candidacy for the Senate. The president suggested that Lyndon read it on the White House steps, and a few minutes later, he did.

Eventually 29 candidates entered the race, including Pappy O'Daniel who won. It ws the first and only election Lyndon B. Johnson ever

Johnson stayed in the House of Representatives, but by 1947 he was ready to try for the Senate again.

LYNDON ANNOUNCED HIS candidacy on May 12 in the penthouse of the Driskill Hotel in Austin. He made his first speech 10 days later before a small crowd that included a young man who was to become attorney gen-

Carter, Reagan head for Texas

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is campaigning in Texas today amid new troubles with his campaign staff, while Ronald Reagan also hunts votes in the Lone Star state.

The president's national campaign manager, Tim Kraft, announced on Sunday he was taking a "leave of absence" following reports he is being investigated for alleged use of cocaine. He denies having used the drug.

Carter's trip to Texas, the South and Midwest — his first overnight journey of the fall campaign — will take him to Corpus Christi and Houston; Roswell and Alpharetta, Ga.; Spartanburg, S.C., and Cleveland.

Reagan is traveling to Corpus Christi and Houston also, as well as to San Antonio and Harlingen, Texas. Texas' 26 electoral votes are believed to be crucial to Carter's re-

election. Current polls show Reagan has an edge in the state, though not so great a one as before the Democratic National Convention. Carter aides have said that Reagan intends to press Carter hard in his native South, which helped him to the presidency in 1976. He carried every

state in the old Confederacy but Virginia. A Washington Post poll published Sunday showed Carter was running even with Reagan nationwide only because the South was giving him a wide margin. The poll showed Carter and Reagan each with 37 percent, and independent John Anderson, who is campaigning today in the Northwest,

The Post said a regional breakdown showed 47 percent in the South supporting the president, compared to 34 percent for Reagan. Reagan was the favorite in the other regions, with margins of 35 percent to 30 percent in the Northeast, 40 percent to 33 percent in the North Central and 44 per-

cent to 30 percent in the West. Senate Repubican Leader Howard Baker said Sunday, meanwhile, that he thought release of the American hostages in Iran would help the president politically but would not "significantly affect the outcome of the

Baker said in an interview on ABC's "Issues and Answers" that he believes 'there is genuine movement" in the hostage situation.

Baker, House Republican Leader John Rhodes and vice-presidential nominee George Bush met with Reagan on SuBT 1/2 1/4, and the three visitors said theythought the Republican presidential effort had put Carter on the defensive

Reagan had urged Saturday that the United States agree to three of the four conditions laid down by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini in return for the hostages' release. The fourth demand, involving return of the late Shah of Iran's wealth, cannot be met "without due process of law," Reagan

Carter has not responded to Reagan's proposal. White House officials said only that the president was studying Khomeini's latest conditions. which call for cancellation of all U.S. claims against Iran, release of frozen Iranian assets and a promise not to interfere in Iran's internal affairs. Khomeini, in his statement Friday, omitted Iran's previous demand for a U.S. apology

The president, leaving the First Baptist Church in Washington on Sunday, was asked whether there was any new hope for resolving the hostage problem. "I don't know," he replied.

Anderson, meanwhile, got the first tangible political benefit Sunday from Carter's refusal to debate the independent and Reagan on Sept. 21. A well-known black leader in California, the Rev. Cecil Williams, endorsed Anderson in San Francisco, expressing outrage at Carter's turning down the invitation to the League of Women Voters debate.

In Washington, Kraft said he is "completely innocent of the charges." But he said he has "concluded that I can best serve the president and avoid political exploitation of the false charges against me by taking a leave of absence from

Kraft said he was told by the Justice Department last week that appointment of a special prosecutor was being considered and had since learned in the press that one had been named.

The New York Times reported Sunday that a panel of federal judges had appointed New Orleans attorney Gerald J. Gallinghouse to investigate an allegation that Kraft had used cocaine within the last few years in the Louisiana city. Neither Gallinghouse nor the Justice Department would confirm the appointment.

Kraft said he was advised that the allegations grew out of an investigation of another Carter aide, Hamilton Jordan, now deputy national chairman of the president's re-election campaign. A special prosecutor found insufficient evidence to bring charges that Jordan had used cocaine in New York City's Studio 54 discotheque.

Sedco set to launch lawsuit counterattack

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) - Sedco Inc. of Dallas is expected to launch/its legal counterattack in U.S. District Court this week in the \$42 million lawsuit brought by Muscatine industrialist Roy Carver.

Carver testified in Judge William C. Hanson's court last week that the fault for his \$17 million loss in a Pesian Gulf oil drilling deal was with Sedco, founded by Texas Gov. Willaim Clements and run by his son.

Carver's reputation is that of a man whose touch was golden, who accumulated what was considered to be Iowa's single largest fortune. Sedco billed itself as the world's biggest oil driller. Its brochures say: "On seven continents, our representatives know the oil business. Carver testified that he blithely accepted a Sedco assertion that a \$2

million investment could return a \$30 million profit without risk. Carver got into the deal at the invitation of Eugene Holley of Augus-

ta, Ga., a polician with experience in the oil business. But Holley's experience was in land drilling in Texas. And in previous ventures, Holley hac partners experienced in drilling.

Testimony showed that the oil deal off the coast of Qatar was red-flagged several times. Carver's bankers in Chicago and an independent oil consulting firm in London both advised that oil drilling was risky and that potential pitfalls should be noted.

Even Sedco mentioned potential "major problems" in its preliminary reports to Carver and Holley. But Sedco didn't mention among those potential problems the presence

of hydrogen sulfide, a potentially fatal gas, in the oil that was to be drilled. Sedco might have known about the gas because the previous holders of the concession Carver and Holley were to drill had leased their equipment from Sedco in the process of a \$34 million bad investment. The cost of cleaning the hydrogen sulfide from the oil caused the cost of

the project to rise twenty fold from the original \$2 million estimate. Robert Smith, a geologist for Sedco, said "the rise in the price of oil has caused a lot of old wells that previously were considered to be unecon-

omical to be reopened and a lot of new wells to be dug." Smith wrote a report to Holley that contained warnings of potential pitfalls, but he added in a cover letter that "I hope this letter is helpful to you in attracting potential ivnestment partners.

Amos Carter of Sedco continued to insist to Carver that the Qatari concession was still a "helluva deal" even as another Sedco consultant subsidiary reported that Carver should prepare to spend \$40 million or more if he ever expected to clean the gas out of the oil and sell it.

"I didn't know which way to turn," Carver testified. "Everybody and his brother was giving me advice and it all cost me money.

Jumper testing new equipment

NEW YORK (AP) - A man who casually parachuted from the 110story World Trade Center to a getaway car below was a trained hangglider pilot and parachutist testing a new piece of jumping gear, the Daily News said today.

The leaper, who escaped Port Authority of New York and New Jersey officials after the 11/2-minute jump Saturday afternoon, was tracked down through witnesses' descriptions of the car, the News said. The newspaper identified the man as Arthur Gingras of Farming-

Port Authority officials, who worried the stunt could attract unskilled publicity seekers, said Sunday they had had no luck identifying the

Gingras said he was testing a new parachute harness designed by his brother-in-law, who accompanied him to the trade center and drove the getaway car. To make the leap, the man climbed an electrified fence at the top of

world's second tallest building, protected by a pair of thick rubber gloves, then stunned witnesses with his unexpected 1,350-foot jump from the observation deck of the trade center's south tower.

"All the people who saw him jump had their stomachs in their mouths," said Leon Maganza of Brooklyn, who watched. Witnesses described the jumper as about 25 years old, 5-feet-10, with reddish-brown hair. Officials said they did not intercept him because

they had no idea the "knapsack" on his back was really a parachute. Gingras said he and his brother-in-law had considered jumping with a hang-glider, but realized they could never have smuggled the apparatus past security guards

Saudi crash kills 89

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) - A Saudi air force C-130 Hercules troop transport crashed in flames at an airport near Medina, killing all 89 persons aboard, the Saudi Defense Ministry said today.

The Sunday evening crash was the second air disaster in Saudi Arabia in 27 days. On Aug. 19, a Saudi Tristar jetliner burned at Riyadh airport, killing 301 passengers and crewmen in the third worst disaster in civil aviation history. Most of the victims were Saudis and Pakistanis.

A Defense Ministry communique issued 14 hours after the crash of the U.S.-built Hercules quoted eyewitnesses as saying the front section of the plane was on fire when the craft fell to earth.

It said the plane was carrying a 'group of servicemen' when it crashed near Islam's second holiest city. It was not immediately known if there were any foreigners aboard.

The communique, broadcast by Riyadh Radio, did not give any indication of the cause of the crash. It said Crown Prince Fahd, the day-today ruler of this oil-rich kingdom, stayed up all night "following up the progress of the investigation." into

This was the second Arab-owned C-130 Hercules to crash within two weeks. A Kuwaiti-owned Hercules crashed in southern France on Sept. 5 while on a flight from London to Athens, killing five Kuwaiti army majors and four crewmen.

Claim recession's over produces no loud cheers

By JOHN CUNNIFF AP Business Analyst

NEW YORK (AP) — The deep but brief recession ended in July, said the Commerce Department's chief economist, but no cheering could be heard from those who have had an involuntary summer-long vacation.

Nor were borrowers or investors or homemakers particularly excited about the news because, as their own economic indicators told them, the cleanup hadn't even begun and here

we are with everything rising again. The things we had hoped would die with the recession, mainly interest rates and high prices, are rising again. What we had wanted to flourish, such as productivity, waned instead. The problems remain.

Evidence of this is the apparent abandonment of congressional and presidential promises of fiscal discipline, indications of continued high unemployment, and the difficulty of companies to raise capital.

The recovery is likely to go unnoticed by millions of Americans for the obvious reason that it won't mean a nickel of improvement in their finances, it won't help them get a job, it won't help buy a house.

won't help buy a house.

And if they dwell on the long-term ramifications of the economic mess it won't improve their confidence either, because very little has been done to avert the next fully predictable inflation-recession cycle.

Even as they pronounce the end of a recession, most economists know they are playing games. They concede it privately, and some do so publicly, that the end of one recession is the base for another.

They know the problems aren't being faced. They recognize that sound economics has been prostituted by politics. They know the futility of grasping after the straws of monthly statistical improvements.

Some speak out about the continued inflation, about the government's deficit spending that crowds the private sector out of the capital markets, about the deteriorated condition of plant and equipment.

They warn about the attitude that people, whether through their local, state or federal governments or by themselves, can continue to consume while failing to replenish the reservoirs that feed consumption.

Those that speak out, however, seem not to have much of an audience, and one of the reasons they don't is that their message seems tired and repititious. The long-term worriers are easily drowned out by the short-term practitioners with their quick forecasts and monthly statistics.

But the worry warts do have some experience in practical economics. One of them stated earlier this year that "what is happening to the United States in 1980 is similar to what happened to New York City in 1975, namely a slide towards bankruptcy."

Felix Rohatyn has a base from which to view the U.S. economy. He is a senior partner in the investment banking firm of Lazard Freres and Co. More important, he has been in charge of the Municipal Assistance Corp., which has the formidable job of trying to restore New York City.

Another worry wart is Rogert Starr, who thinks the federal government and New York's financial woes have similarities. He knows the subject. He headed the N.Y. City Housing and Development Administration during the years when the city began its ascent into financial chaos.

Neither has been heard cheering the announcement that the statistical recession has ended, and they can't be blamed for it. Why cheer when the recession came and went and didn't solve any long-range problems?

Teen-age pregnancy widespread problem

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have read a number of editorials and heard a number of lectures on the dangers of teen-age pregnancy. Is the problem as widespread as the news media would have us believe? — Albert

Dear Albert: The problem is not only widespread; it carries a significant risk for both the teen-age mother and her child. According to the Department of Health and Human Services (formerly Health, Education and Welfare), one-fourth of teen-age girls in the United States have had at least one pregnancy by the time they are 19 years of age. Of the one million girls under 19 who become pregnant each year, about 300,000 are less than 15 years old. Two-thirds of these teenage girls are not married.

Aside from the social consequences of teen-age pregnancies — for example, disruption of their education and the need to depend on public welfare — these young mothers are at greater risk of having low-birth-weight infants. This, in turn, increases the possibility of developmental problems in the children and, in extreme cases, even death.

cases, even death.

It is estimated that birth control methods prevent an estimated 750,000 pregnancies each year. If all sexually active young people who did not want to become pregnant were to use an effective form of contraceptive, premarital pregnancies would drop by over 300,000 a year.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I read with amazement about the different kinds of transplants that are possible these days. It almost seems that a bionic man or woman really is a possibility. But while I've heard of eye banks that provide corneas so that people can see, I don's recall reading about similar operations that will help deaf people hear. Is anything being done in this regard? — Phullis.

Dear Phyllis: An implant consisting of eight electrodes that restored hearing to a previously deaf person has been reported by Dr. Robin P. Michelson, clinical professor of otolaryngology at the University of California, San Francisco. Other implants designed by physicians had been mostly of a single-electrode type.

Although Dr. Michelson's results

look promising, he notes that he has tried the procedure in only one patient, and cautions that it is too soon to draw general conclusions.

Dear Dr. Solomon: I read your response to a reader regarding recovery of speech and language abilities following a stroke. You neglected to mention referral to a speech pathologist for evaluation and possible treat-

A speech pathologist is a person with graduate training in the areas of speech and language. Many patients suffering from speech problems resulting from stroke can be helped by a

speech pathologist.

Coup stems political bloodbath

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — The political bloodbath between left-wing and right-wing extremists that took as many as 25 lives a day has been stemmed, at least temporarily, by the coup led by Turkey's military chief three days ago.

Terrorist bullets reportedly have taken only one life since the armed forces seized power on Friday. Informed sources said an army captain died in a gun battle late Saturday while leading his troops against suspected leftists in the south-central city of Adana. Two leftists were wounded and an unspecified number captured, the sources said.

Troops fanned out Sunday in house-to-house searches for terrorists in Ankara and suburban Istanbul and witnesses reported a number of suspects rounded up. It was not known how many persons were detained, but the military government reported the arrest of 182 terrorists in the eastern province of Elazig. Also on Sunday, Alpaslan Turkes, the fugitive

leader of the ultra-rightist National Action Party, turned himself in to authorities only hours before a deadline set by the ruling National Security Council for his surrender, the state radio said. Turkes, a former colonel, was the only major

political leader to escape arrest and detention in the roundup that followed the coup. Radio Ankara said he was flown to a military post on an island in the Aegean Sea where the chairman of the fundamental-

Turkes' followers, and leftist factions has taken an estimated 5,000 lives in the past five years, including 2,000 so far this year. It was this factional bloodshed and the civilian government's inability to quell it that prompted Gen. Kenan Evren, the 62-year-old chief of staff, to stage Turkey's third military coup in

Evren also disbanded Parliament, abolished the constitution and banned all political parties.

Signup procedures set for free Polish unions

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland's Communist government announced registration procedures for the free trade unions won by the strikers, and Roman Catholic church officials reported that the state radio will begin broadcasting Sunday Masses next week

The official PAP news agency said Sunday that union organizers have to register with city courts. It said they must submit a list of their "activists" and their addresses, the "framework of the union's activities" and other details.

PAP said the courts can reject applications by groups it considers 'hostile to socialist Poland and the constitution," or if the proposed organization appears 'inconsistent with the law.

The agency also said until new labor laws are adopted by Parliament in December, present procedures for the official union organization - the Central Council of Trade Unions — will remain in effect.

Some union organizers had said they were awaiting clarification of registration procedures before completing work on such details as the structure, membership and bylaws of their organizations.

Free trade unions and greater access to the media by the church were among the concessions won by the strikers who paralyzed much of Poland last month with

Lithuanian to go on trial in U.S.

WASHINGTON - Ten years ago, on a chilly November day in the swells off Martha's Vineyard, seaman Simas Kudirka leaped from a Soviet fishing vessel and onto the U.S. Coast Guard cutter Vigilant seeking political asylum.

After the United States rejected his pleas for freedom, Kudirka was returned to the Soviet Union, where he was sentenced to 10 years in desolate Russian prison camps.

Now, a decade later, the 41-year-old Lithuanian whose forcible return to Soviet jurisdiction caused a national furor is about to go on trial again this time in D.C. Superior Courtroom thousands of miles from home, on charges that he violated a federal law prohibiting political demonstrations within 500 feet of a foreign embassy. In this case, it was the Russian Em-

bassy here. Compared to the notorious Vladimir prison near Moscow, the crumbling Vilnius jail or the special "reeducation center" hidden in the Ural Mountains at Perm, the prospect of spending time at the D.C. jail after his arrest in July seemed a cinch. Yet the intrepid, dark-haired Kudirka was left shaken.

"At least in the Soviet Union," he said afterward, "the prisoners were political like myself. Here, there was a woman who actually had stabbed

THE TRIAL THAT led Kudirka from the company of Soviet political prisoners to that of Washington criminals began with his fateful leap into prominence 10 years ago. Kudirka, a radio operator aboard the fishing trawler Sovietskaya Litva, hated the Russians, who had occupied his native Lithania when he was an infant. When the opportunity arose, he threw himself onto the deck of the Vigilant, moored several feet away, begging for asylum.

Fearing that Kudirka's defection would endanger U.S.-Soviet fishing treaty talks, the Vigilant's captain, acting on instructions radioed from his superiors, allowed four Soviet seamen to board and drag the kicking. screaming Kudirka back to their oat. He was eventually tried before a high Soviet Court, and sentenced to a Russian prison camp.

After Kudirka had served nearly half of his sentence, some American sympathizers discovered that Kudirka was in fact entitled to American citizenship because his mother had been born in Brooklyn. He was subsequently released.

American officials called the Ku-

dirka episode - which set off a national furor - a "tragic mistake" caused by a bureaucratic bungle. After a government investigation, three senior Coast Guard officers were suspended, and President Nixon issued new guidelines on treatment of persons seeking asylum.

That did little for Kudirka. Figuring all was lost when he was taken before a Soviet court in 1971, Kudirka made a strong political statement against the Soviet Union. When he was offered the services of a court-appointed attorney, he refused.

"Who needs two prosecutors?" he recalls saying. "One is quite sufficient. The prosecutor, the attorney, the judge - they are all stones on your grave.

KUDIRKA'S FIRST prison cell in Vilnius was a dank, smoke-filled chamber, where KGB officials interrogated him for hours.

'The Americans don't want you, he quoted one official as saying. "You have no secrets. You have no money. You are not an inventor. You are as valuable to theAmericans as last year's snow. You would clean toilets

"I'll clean toilets in America," Kudirka said he responded. "I saw the facilities on the Vigilant and they didn't smell as bad as the office of the

Kudirka's journey through Soviet prison camps form 1970 to 1974 brought him in contact with other political prisoners, some not so politi-

cal as he. While he was imprisoned in Vilnius, for example, the capital of Lithuania, Kudiraka shared a cell with Zubavicius, a fellow Lithuanian who had been jailed for petty offenses virtually his entire life, then finally imprisoned for a crime Zubavicius said he did not commit. Kudirka said he convinced his cellmate that he, too, was a political prisoner.

Zubavicius drew and unflattering cartoon of Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev. He tattoed the words "Death to the Judge" on his own cheeks, and wrote "I am a slave of the Soviet Union" on his forehead, Kudir-

A SOVIET PRISON doctor cut the tattoes from his flesh without using anesthesia, and Zubavicius was put on trial for his insolence. When during that trial Zubavicius railed against the Soviet justice system, a Soviet psychiatrist stood up on the spot an

declared: "This man is insane." Zubavicius was subsequently transported to the Serbsky Psychaitric Institute in Moscow. He sent Kudirka a note: "Thank you for the soap, the little pieces of meat and the orange."

the note read. "Now I've had my feast and I'm going to the hospital.

In another prison camp - a special reeducation" and work camp at Perm for the most reistant political prisoners - Kudirka and many of the other inmates worked in a prison factory producing heating elements for electric irons.

One day, Kudirka said, the gaurds beat a prisoner for a minor infraction, and he led 25 inmates in a protest strike. The Soviets demenaded to know the names of the strike leaders. "Tell us, and we will talk with them,

the prison officials said, according to Kudirka. Realizing that leading a Soviet prison strike was a capital offense, Kurdika and all the others had the same response: "We are all the leaders," they said.

At a prison camp south of Moscow in 1972, Kudirka said, he and his fellow prisoners learned that Nixon was visiting the Soviet Union. He secretly made a cloth replica of the United Nation flag. Before dawn on the day Nixon arrived, Kudirka scaled a flagpole on the prison grounds and attached the flag to a wire at the toop. The flag remained up for two hours before enraged prison authotities tore it down.

Kudirka was eventually released by the Soviets after a baptismal certificate belinging to his mother was discovered in a Brooklyn church.

HE WENT TO LIVE in New York City, where he now works for a pro-Lithuania rights organization. Last July he participated in an anti-Soviet demonstration in Washington protesting the opening of the Moscow Olym-

Kudirka and 17 fellow Lithuanian-Americans swooped down on the Soviet Embassy, stopped traffic and attempted to handcuff themselves to the embassy gates.

Washington police reacted quickly. They approached the crowdm, asking the demonstrators innocently: "Who are your leaders? Tell us who your leadfers are so we can talk to them,' Kudirka recalled. Like his colleaguse sin the Russian prison camp, the demonstrators replied, "We ar all the

All 18 were arrested. Kudirka waited anxiously for the police paddywagon recalling distinctly that in the soviet Union, the paddywagons were black and known as "joudoji varna" for the black cows that haunt Soviet cemeteries and carry premonitions of bad events. Instead, a white police paddywagon arrives, and the releived demonstrators sang Lithuanian folk hymns on their way to the police

Carter campaigners hoping to get Reagan explanations

WASHINGTON - Although President Carter may spend a good deal of his campaign defending his four years in office, Carter's campaign lieutenants hope to force Ronald Reagan to start explaining more than 15 years of aphorisms, bloopers and one-

'Some of the things this man has said over the years are unbelievable," said one Carter adviser who helped compile a book of Reagan quotes that is known unofficially as the "oops report."

"No matter how carefully his campaign staff keeps him under wraps these days, we've got plenty of ammunition from when he said what he wanted to say," the adviser said.

The "Reaganisms," as they are being called in Washington, are included in 262 pages of a document that went to the president's office last week. Some examples:

-When California environmentalists wanted to expand Redwood National Park, Reagan opposed the expansion and reportedly told the Western Wood products Assn. in 1966: "A tree is a tree - how many more do you need to look at?" (Reagan denies he ever said exactly that.)

-During a radio broadcast in May, 1978, Reagan said of public schools: "Promotion today in most schools means that the child has completed another year of attendance without being conspicuously retarded compared to the rest of the class.'

-Reagan, who is trying to woo

blue-collar workers in 1980 said in 1966 that persons who receive unemployment compensation are "freeloaders wanting a pre-paid vacation plan."

Carter aides said that the quote book was originally offered to the president for use in the televised debates but that he may never use it himself for fear of looking negative and unpresidential.

Instead, Carter's campaign surrogates - Cabinet members, Democratic Party leaders and family members - are expected to choose a quote now and then for audiences "where they might seem particularly appropriate," as one Carter aide put it.

Thus, Carter's advisers hope to make certain that elderly voters particularly those who are about to hear Reagan speak - also know that Reagan once said, "Medical care for the aged is a foot in the door of a government takeover of all medi-

The immediate purpose in parceling out the quotes is to bait or irritate Reagan into saying something foolish. "We keep hoping that when we throw some of this stuff out there, he will bite," said one Carter staffer.

"But if he doesn't, that's okay, too," the aide said. The avalanche of maxims, many of which become embarrassing out of their historical context, are designed "to remind people that what sounds good on the dinner circuit would be disastrous from the Oval Office," the aide continued.

To offset this onslaught of quotes, members of Reagan's staff say they are reminding voters of Carter's broken promises and of his record in

What the Carter people are doing is ridiculous," said one top Reagan adviser. "They're going around looking for needles in a haystack, going back to the Middle Ages to get quotes from the governor that by almost any standard would not be and ought not be applied to the 1980 campaign.

With Carter, we don't have to go back two decades to show his faults. We're going back only four years, and with those four years we've got so much stuff we don't know what to do with it all."

The Reagan campaign has compiled a comparison of Carter's four years as governor of Georgia from 1971 with Reagan's terms as governor of California from 1967 to 1975.

The comparison shows, for example, that Carter's state government expenditures grew by 14 percent while Reagan's grew by 3 percent. The report also says that welfare spending under Carter went up 7 percent from 1971 t 1975 while it went down 6 percent under Reagan in Cali-

Nevertheless, most of the information being passed out by Reagan's research staff, led by Ed Gray of San Diego, is well known. Voters are familiar - if only vaguely - with Carter's unkept promises not to use unemployment to whip inflation and to balance the federal budget.

If it seems like a war of Reagan's words vs. Carter's deeds, however, Carter's research director, Martin Franks, and his staff believe that what a man says in the past can and should follow him into the present.

1) John Anderson will have only one

bite at the apple. Ronald Reagan has already had one bad week. Jimmy Carter is now having what looks like a bad week. Neither one of them planned it that way, and both of them will, most certainly, survive these setbacks. You are different. You cannot. The Baltimore debate is the whole ball game for

Forget immediately that colleagues in the House called you that body's 'best debater." That, right now, is no help and may well be a hindrance. You cannot come off as the smartest guy in the class. You cannot be a scold or selfrighteous. You said it well. earlier this week in New Jersey, when you spoke of making an effort to overcome the "tendency on my part to preach and sermonize.

For at least 72 hours prior to the Baltimore debate, clear your entire campaign schedule of all appearances and appointments. This will give you the time you will need to rest and to prepare yourself - and at the same time is guaranteed to arouse the total curiosity of the press corps: What is going on in that room? What is he doing?

The following specific suggestions are intended for the debate, but also for the larger campaign, which, if you do well enough in the debate, you can

2) Forget youropponents.

Voters do not have to be told why they should not be for Carter or Reagan. But they must be told why they should be for Anderson. Spend those precious moments you have in front of microphones and cameras providing the voters with sensible and salient reasons why they would want you as their president for the next four years. In short declarative sen-

3) Take some chances. Be daring. Remember how you won your first attention and your first voter enthusiasm this year? You took on some sacred political cows while your Republican opponents told them how wonderful they allw ere. You were terrific in Concord, N.H., before the gun owners, who looked by comparison, like the boys from "Deliverance.'

In my judgment, last spring when your polls started to look good, you started to slip. You were no longer different. Remember, if you receive 40 percent of the vote in November, you will win in a landslide.

4) Publicly write off some important constituency.

You decide whether the group should be the truckers, the Teamsters, relief pitchers, mortgage bankers or all plaintiffs in non-smoking cases. But do what Carter and Reagan, because they are the nominees of parties with histories and obligations. cannot do.
