That the 10,00,000 cotton acreage reduction is assured is the statement of Secretary Henry Wallace given out Priday of last week, and by the latter part of this contracted land will have witnessed the beginning of the plowing under plan. Farmers, however, are warned not to start plowing up any of their cotton crops until they have received official instructions to do so. All contracts have not yet been received at Washington, but Wednesday of this week was set as a dead line for receiving such and by the latter part of this week full tabulations will have been finally approved, notice of such approval will be given the various committees in charge who, will in turn notify the farmer contractors and which committee will see that said cotton has been destroyed. With dark, gloomy days at hand it is time to provide the laying heas with tood liver oil to take the place of sunshine. The value of this vitamin D is that it stimulates better utilization of the minerals in the feed, enabling the birds to use the surplus materials not needed for body maintenance and for production of eeg shells. The best method is to add two quarts to each 100 pounds of feed, or to use a good commercial feed that already contains the vitamin in proper proportion. If mixed at home, put the oil with a small amount of feed and then mix this in the larger supply.
