Pentagon denies airplanes exchanged fire

Iran claimed two carrier-based U.S. fighter jets "started to shoot" at an Iranian patrol plane over the Gulf of Oman today in the first U.S. Iranian military confrontation since the American hostages were seized nearly six months ago. The Pentagon denied there was any shooting.

In Washington, the Defense Department said "Two F-14 aircraft from the aircraft carrier Nimitz made a routine intercept of an Iranian C-130 aircraft near the Strait of Hormuz. The U.S. aircraft escorted the Iranian plane back to Iranian air space. It was a routine intercept. There was no firing of weapons."

Washington officials said the Iranian aircraft was within approximately 30 miles of the Nimitz and the two F-14s were launched to look it over. The Nimitz is one of about 30 U.S. warships stationed in the Indian

Ocean following the takeover of the U.S. Embassy in Tehran last Nov. 4 by Iranian militants and the December Soviet thrust into Afghanistan.

The official Iranian news agency Pars quoted the Iranian army joint staff as saying the two American planes started to shoot at the Iranian plane but four Iranian jets were sent up and they "warded off the attack."

Pars quoted the army as saying the U.S. planes "changed their direction as the four Iranian jetfighters escorted the patrol plane" back to Iran.

Tehran Radio reported the Iranian army joint staff has warned the armed forces to "expect extensive action by the U.S. Army in the wake of last week's abortive attempt to rescue the American hostages in Iran."

The Gulf of Oman, 400 miles long and 200 miles wide, lies on the southern shore of Iran and separates the Arabian Sea from Persian Gulf. Iran

has two major ports on the Gulf of Oman, Jask and Chah Bahar, and must use this body of water in exporting its oil.

Meanwhile, Iranian Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh escaped un-

Houston speech opens Bush's Texas campaign

HOUSTON (AP) — George Bush opened his Texas campaign with a get-together speech in his hometown, saying it is time for President Carter to be out of the White House and for Ronald Reagan with the Republican nomination, the Gulf has the chance of winning in November.

He was scheduled to fly to Dallas later today for a string of speeches and a private fund-raiser.

Bush opened his four-day Texas tour by calling Carter "the weak and two-faced" president.

During a half-hour and a half speech, he said he repeated that the United States should stop apologizing to anyone, especially the Soviet Union and Iran, and act like the nation we once were.

Bush told about 700 people at the half-rally. It is important that things around in Texas. The country is looking for an alternative to Ronald Reagan and Jimmy Carter, and I am that alternative.

Bush is hoping for another win against Reagan in Texas Saturday primary.

I know I am locked in a tough political battle here. I have a long long way to go. But I think that with the help of all Republicans and independents, and even hanted Dem-

Vance's resignation draws questions on foreign policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some congressional leaders say the resignation of Secretary of State Cyrus Vance means President Carter's foreign policy will now have a more general and student-like, but others say it is too early to make that judgment.

Some administration critics said Monday that Vance's abrupt resignation after his disagreement with Carter's decision to use military force to try to rescue the American hostages in Iran, confirms their feeling that U.S. foreign policy is in disarray and has no coherent direction.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee threw off course by the failure of the rescue effort and Vance's resignation, met in closed session today to discuss the situation and chart a plan of action.

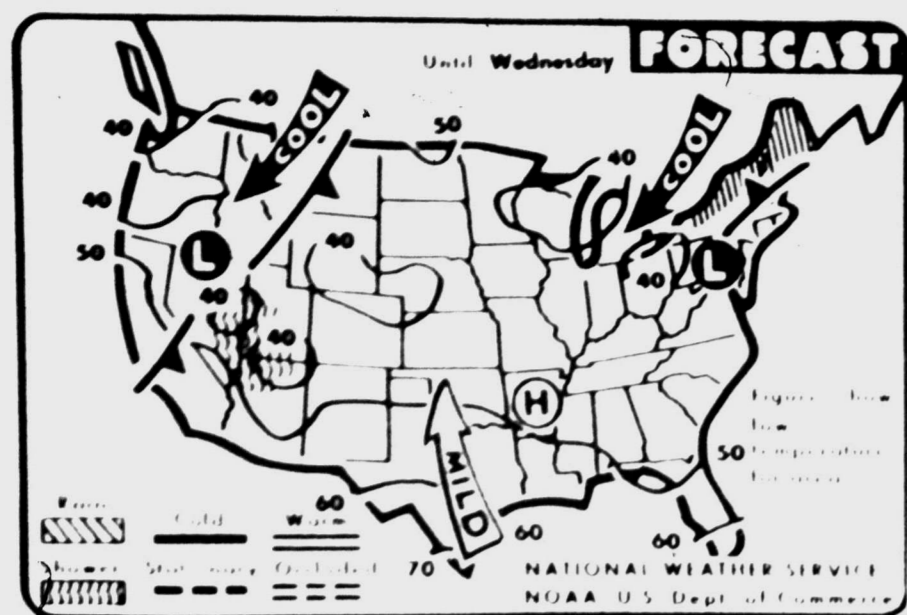

Meanwhile, House and Senate panels headed investigations into the helicopter rescue that caused President Carter to order the rescue mission.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., said the Senate Armed Services Committee will look into workmanship of the helicopters as well as maintenance, training, equipment performance, supplies and the conditions under which the mission was performed.

Rep. Samuel Stratton, D-N.Y., said his House Armed Services subcommittee will conduct a similar investigation.

Pat's clocks are her worldly treasures

ANDREWS — "I'm a clock collector," Patsy Pearl Miller said in an understatingly sort of way. "I've got about as good a collection of clocks as anybody in the country."

Clocks are her forte. But just about everybody else's discards are her treasures — from five-and-dime Depression glass to kerosene lamps to a brass Russian samovar that's as "heavy as a hound's tooth" to solid oak furniture to an old family whiskey still and more than 100 German and American wind-up clocks.

"They all run," even the stately old grandfather clocks. Mrs. Miller's antiques are stowed away in an out-of-the-way place in a country setting just west of here.

For her, collecting is more of a consuming hobby than a worrisome business concerned with profits and losses.

"I keep swearing I won't buy another clock, but I end up buying it," said Mrs. Miller, who runs her shop simply by the logo Pat's Antiques.

She finds her clocks affordable through her husband, George, a workaday pusher for Gold Trucking Co.

"I guess he likes clocks," said the collector. "He's had lots of practice" getting used to them. "He lives in a house full of them."

And that is no overstatement. Much of her collectibles are kept in a 16-by-32-foot shed, which, unfortunately, doesn't have a built-in shelf stretcher. The overflow is stashed in a couple of much smaller sheds or in the couple's 21-year-old mobile home.

"My closets are full of clocks, and under the beds are full of clocks." In fact, there's hardly enough room inside the trailer for the Chihuahua dogs and a couple of parrots, including a cockatiel which boasts a "big vocabulary. All he can say is, 'Pretty boy, what are you doing?'"

Mrs. Miller has been collecting "stuff," as she calls it, "about all of my life, but I couldn't do anything about it" when money was scarce. Later, "I bought everyone (a clock) I could afford."

She has more clocks than anything else. "My husband told me I have one of everything," and she almost does. One of her prizes is the H.B. Horton's Ithaca calendar clock, which afforded her occasion to display her sense of humor.

"It's like me," she said of the clock. "It's two-faced."

She's reluctant, though not totally averse, to part with her treasures. When people take a drive out in the country and drop by her place — often after spotting the one-plank "Pat's Antiques" sign off the main road —

they turn around and leave without making an inquiry; there's virtually no tell-tale signs of antiques around the place. "I just laugh, because I don't want to sell it (clocks and what-nots) to anybody." Her passion is going here and yonder to collect things of value and other things. "When you go buy lots of stuff, you get some junk in it." She and her spouse often buy "stuff" more out of mercy than for want or need. "I'd rather rescue it than see it go to the junk yard," said the clock collector.

Senate may challenge draft registration plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter's draft registration plan for young men, approved last week by the House, now faces a challenge in the Senate in the first congressional vote on a military issue since the failed rescue mission in Iran.

A Senate Appropriations subcommittee scheduled a vote today on whether to go along with a House bill providing \$13.3 million to start registration this summer of men age 19 and 20.

Opponents planned to try to cut the bill to \$4.7 million — an amount sufficient only to upgrade Selective Service's computers and to develop a standby registration plan that would not be used until an emergency.

Registration critics predicted in advance they would win this round of the battle. But they said they would face a tougher time in the days ahead trying to convince the full Appropriations Committee to go against the president.

"We believe that the subcommittee is likely to reject the president's proposal," said David Landau, staff counsel of the American Civil Liberties Union. "This is just a first step ... The full committee is much more conservative than the subcommittee."

Regardless of what the subcommittee does, the full committee will have an opportunity to consider Carter's proposal.

A congressional source familiar with a White House vote count in the full committee said it was "perhaps as close as 15-13" in Carter's favor.

Asked how the aborted Iranian rescue mission would affect the vote, Landau said, "It may make it more partisan. It's cutting both ways." The House voted 219-180 in favor of spending \$13.3 million to register young men. An earlier test vote — to boost the amount to \$13.3 million from \$4.7 million — gave the administration a 218-188 margin of victory.

Texas proving ground

There's little doubt that either former Midlander George Bush or former California Governor Ronald Reagan is discounting the importance of this year's Republican primary in the Lone Star State.

Both men, vying for the Republican nomination for president, have ties to Texas. Both men recognize the impact of a win — or a loss — here Saturday.

Bush, who lived in Midland some years back and who is widely known throughout the state, certainly will bring some momentum with him that he gained last week in Pennsylvania's Republican primary.

Reagan, on the other hand, has wide support among Texas Republicans, evidenced by the strong support he's received in the state during past elections.

Reagan is far ahead of Bush in the number of delegates he claims he has committed to him. In fact, following the Pennsylvania loss to Bush, Reagan said he still does not believe Bush can overtake him in the race for the nomination.

But Bush claimed his catch-up campaign is jelling and that he

still can overtake and surpass Reagan.

That's where the importance of the Texas Republican primary begins to become apparent.

Bush needs a win in Texas to continue the momentum his candidacy gained in Pennsylvania. A win in Texas would mean more for Bush than additional delegates; it would indicate to him the support he apparently has here.

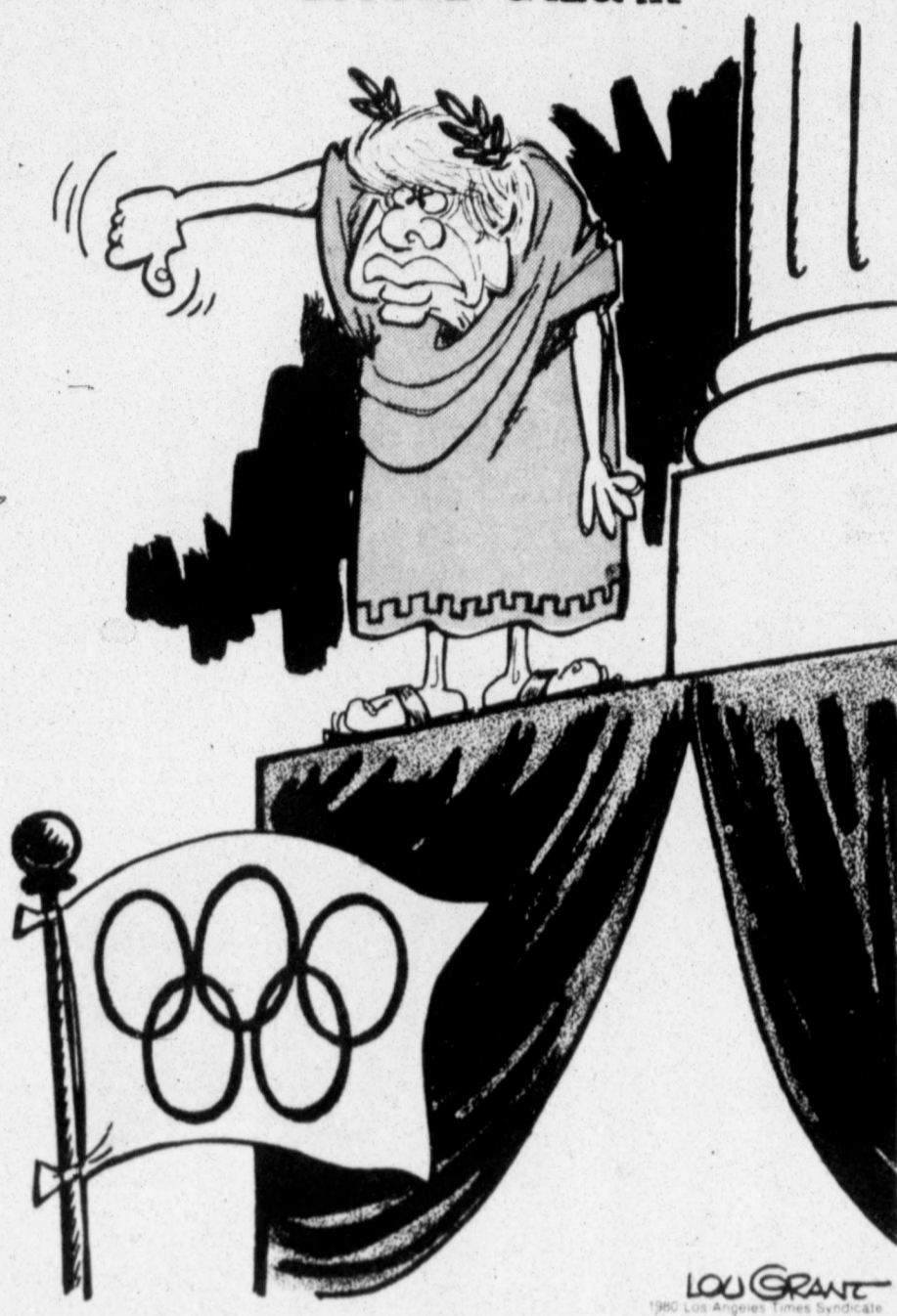
A win also would give Bush additional momentum to carry him into the remaining primaries so important to his campaign.

For Reagan, Texas also is a political proving ground. If he wins here Saturday he undoubtedly will feel that he is assured of the Republican nomination.

But a loss to Bush in the former Midlander's old stomping grounds, while not signalling a decline of Reagan's widespread conservative support, would indicate that the race for the Republican nomination is by no means over and would necessitate Reagan remaining on the campaign trail.

That would mean more head-to-head contests between the two men and a possible toss-up for the GOP nomination.

Nation of immigrants can't shun newcomers

I was invited recently to participate in a Cuban-American rally against the Soviet lickboot, Fidel Castro. We had a great time, singing, making speeches, hanging an effigy of Castro, and burning not only the Cuban communist flag but the Iranian flag as well.

In my home newspaper, I wrote what I believe that the United States is a stronger, better country because of its Cuban exile community. They have brought with them not only the work ethic, strong family ties and anti-communism, but also a keen appreciation for the U.S.

Naturally, I got letters and phone calls from people who don't like Cubans. There are people who don't like anybody, but especially don't like people who speak with a different accent.

This has always struck me as hilarious. People who long for a purist United States are nutty. We are all immigrants or descendants of immigrants. Unless you happen to be an American Indian, somewhere among the branches of your family tree is an immigrant.

For descendants of immigrants to look down their noses at new immigrants is absurd. The immigrants who arrived on the Mayflower were not the cream of society; they were a poor, stubborn bunch of misfits.

As a matter of information, our greatness as a nation is directly attributable to the fact that we are a nation of immigrants. Immigrants then or now are a gutsy type of people. In any country at any time, a majority of citizens, both those well off and those bad off, will elect to stay put. Only the boldest, most ambitious,

most self-confident will elect to leave.

If you doubt this, imagine that you are going to emigrate to Brazil, a nation which in terms of development opportunity is comparable to the United States of 100 years ago. Think about what you have to give up: a familiar landscape, a sense of belonging, your native language, your friends, your relatives, the protection of your government, your citizenship.

Think about what you face: a strange land, a strange language, strange customs, the absence of friends and contacts, the disadvantage of being an outsider and a "foreigner," an unfamiliar government with different laws and customs, and the immediate necessity to find a job in this strange environment. A decision like that will separate the bold and the timid in a hurry. Well, throughout our history we have literally skimmed the cream off dozens of nations in terms of attracting bold, determined people with vision and self-confidence.

Another irony is that if I asked you to name the "traditional American virtues," chances are you would name hard work, thrift, ambition, and strong family loyalties. Believe me, the easiest place to find these are in a group of immigrants whether they be oriental, hispanic or european.

My son's taekwondo instructor is a good example. He acquired a small school from a Korean friend. It consisted of one rented room, one heavy bag, a few signs and 10 students. Master Y.A. Kim could speak only a word or two of English; he had no money.

Not once did he complain, ask for help or apply for welfare. He slept on the floor of his school. He taught his students — for free if they couldn't afford to pay. He studied English. He had small handbills printed and walked miles personally distributing them. Slowly his business grew until now he has one of the largest schools in the state.

If that is not a "typical American success story," then Koreans don't love to fight.

We have always been a nation of many accents, colors and origins and we have always been the better for it.

CIA chipping away at media independence

By MICHAEL GETLER (c) 1980, The Washington Post WASHINGTON — A CIA official in Europe, one whom I had known for a long time and who was fascinated by issues of press and patriotism, once asked me the following question:

"If you were on a reporting trip in East Germany, and you happened to see large numbers of Soviet tanks moving westward, what would you do? Whom would you call first?"

I told him I would call my newspaper and try to file a story over the phone.

The question was clever, a probe of allegiances and inclinations. But it was not surprising because American foreign correspondents, if they were so inclined, would make marvelous spies. They can travel to distant places, talk to lots of people in and out of government, sometimes even take pictures, without arousing too much suspicion. The reason they can do this, of course, is precisely that they are not spies.

CIA director Stansfield Turner and President Carter, however, either don't seem to understand this or are being rather casual about the safety of American correspondents abroad and the principle that the press must be scrupulously independent of government to carry out its proper role in American democracy.

In Washington earlier this month, Turner told a convention of newspaper editors that he would not hesitate to recruit a journalist for an undercover operation abroad when it was vitally important to the nation. Later, President Carter endorsed this policy as proper under "extreme circum-

stances" involving U.S. security. Apparently, such extreme circumstances happen rather frequently, since Turner has also said that on three occasions in the last three years he authorized recruitment of journalists for covert operations that, for unexplained reasons, he says, were never carried out.

For American correspondents overseas, there could hardly be worse news than the top officials of the U.S. government putting on the record the best piece of ammunition that the

secret police of dictatorships and totalitarian governments have had in a long time.

There is scarcely a U.S. reporter trying to cover Eastern Europe, Asia or South America who, assuming he or she is doing the job, has not been hassled by those police. After it happens the first time, a reporter never again is totally calm approaching a boarder or airport security check, pockets stuffed with notebooks filled with interviews of people whom foreign governments prefer the reporter hadn't met.

In these situations, which are growing more frequent and tense, the reporter's only defense is his or her wits and ability to defend his or her work as legitimate journalistic enterprise. My education began in Prague in January 1977, when Czech gumshoes raged into an apartment building ahead of me, turned out the lights in the stairwell and then came storming down the steps at me, apparently to frighten me away from the people I was trying to visit.

That is tame stuff compared to what many U.S. reporters experience elsewhere. Indeed, the president appears to have forgotten 1977, when his human rights campaign stirred up all of communist Eastern Europe.

In June of that year, the Moscow correspondent for The Los Angeles Times, Robert C. Toth, was seized by the Kremlin's KGB security police, hauled into custody for two days of questioning and eventually accused, among other things, of being a CIA agent. President Carter said then that the United States had expressed its "strongest objections about what has been done about Mr. Toth" and that the Soviets "know about our deep concern about their...actions."

Almost a year earlier, in May 1976, the Soviets had charged three other American correspondents in Moscow with secretly working for the CIA.

One of them was Alfred Friendly Jr. of Newsweek, who now is the press spokesman for White House national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski.

"We deplore such irresponsible charges," the State Department said at the time. The three are "highly respected professional journalists, and in our view the charges slander their reputations and the organizations they represent."

The State Dept. got it right in 1976. But it is now going to be increasingly hard for journalists to fight the battles for their integrity — after the president and Admiral Turner have needlessly allowed an official cloud of suspicion to settle over the correspondents.

Ironically, it could also harm U.S. attempts to badger communist Eastern Europe into paying greater heed to the provisions of the 35-nation 1975 Helsinki agreement dealing with greater freedom of movement for journalists, a provision that was supposed to have been a victory for the West.

Ronald Reagan courted Pennsylvania blue-collar vote

CORAOPOLIS, PA. — A well-dressed woman, crowded to the wall at the Coraopolis Elks hall by voters trying for a better look at Ronald Reagan election eve, was the key to his defeat in the Pennsylvania primary the next day — and to his chances to become president.

The woman identified herself as a local Republican leader in this lower-middle-income Pittsburgh suburb and said she supports George Bush for president. She had come to the Reagan rally to "pay my respects." But wasn't she worried by the big turnout? "Oh, no. Almost everybody here is a Democrat," she replied, pointing to the unruly throng with seeming distaste. "These people can't vote in our primary tomorrow. Our people are for Bush."

It was "our people" who kept Bush afloat as a presidential candidate by winning Pennsylvania, where cross-over voting is not permitted. The defeat thereby pointed up how much Reagan depends on that Elks hall blue-collar vote in primary states that do permit cross-over voting and in November — more than his right-wing supporters dream and perhaps than Reagan himself appreciates.

Reagan certainly understands that his advocacy of Kemp-Roth tax reduction (30 percent cut over three years), though it bothers some of his own advisers, goes over big with working men and women. But he seems to forget how important they are to him when he lapses into reflexive labor-baiting, as he did the day of the Pennsylvania primary.

Bush's Pennsylvania win was based

on a 3-to-2 margin in Philadelphia's well-heeled, traditionally Republican suburbs, where blue collars are seldom worn. Outspending the nearly bankrupt Reagan campaign better than 12 to 1, Bush successfully appealed to Republicans with a relentless attack on Reagan's Kemp-Roth support as a violation of the classical economics he learned at Yale. The first innovative Republican economic strategy since the New Deal was thereby rejected by Pennsylvania Republicans Tuesday.

That is why key Reagan backers in this state privately complain about his plugs for Kemp-Roth. But not Rep. Robert Walker, a populist conservative who backed Reagan in 1976 when Reagan's present state leadership was saving the state for Gerald Ford. "The blue-collar workers want a tax cut," Walker told us as Reagan visited his district. "It's the economists who have trouble with it."

Reagan has been 1980's only Republican presidential hopeful who consistently attacks the Carter administration's high taxes and calls for lower taxes across the board. On his last

pre-election Pennsylvania tour, he triggered stormy applause from Republican audiences at Springfield in the Philadelphia suburbs and at Scranton airport. But his tax-cut pitch seemed to confuse them; it brought only silence.

Not at the Elks hall here. The Democratic-infested audience (many without Republican ties and jackets) cheered Reagan's tax-cut promises before rushing to the fried fish and keg beer. After that rally, Reagan commented to us that one-third of all "working Americans" have entered the 30 percent tax bracket and predicted the number soon "will probably be up to half."

Yet, the next morning at St. Mary's College in South Bend, Ind., Reagan seemed to ignore his need to woo those overtaxed "working Americans" when a young questioner asked whether antitrust laws should be applied to organized labor. That was an echo of 20 years ago when right-wing businessmen sought to checkmate labor by outlawing national bargaining.

While tax reduction would surely be high on President Reagan's agenda, antitrust restrictions on labor would not even be discussed. Yet, Reagan could not say "no" to this old bromide. He started cautiously, saying "we should look very closely" at the idea but later in a press conference endorsed it outright.

"This hurts," one aide confided to us. Reagan had handed labor leaders a weapon to convince union members that Reagan threatens their paycheck. "I'm sure all the reporters will lead their stories with this," the aide mused. He was wrong; Reagan's defeat in Pennsylvania smoothed out

the blunder.

That defeat compels Reagan to stay on the campaign trail against Bush, whose one hope for the nomination is that Reagan will make a colossal blunder under merciless questioning. Yet, with only half a million dollars (to Bush's \$3.5 million) left for primary campaigns, he needs to meet the press for all the free television he can get. Those chance encounters invite disasters.

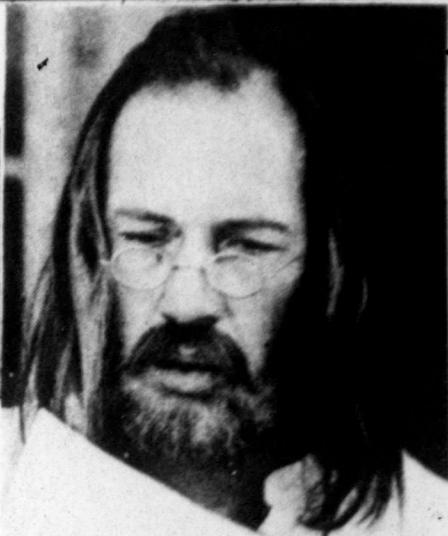
Reagan's advisers want to whisk him off the campaign trail, away from dangerous questions from newsmen bored with his basic speech, and out to his Santa Barbara ranch for private discussions about general election strategy. That strategy will refine his pitch for blue-collar voters. Ironically, inability of those voters to cross over for him in Pennsylvania prolongs his liability to self-inflicted wounds that could be much more severe than the damage at St. Mary's College.

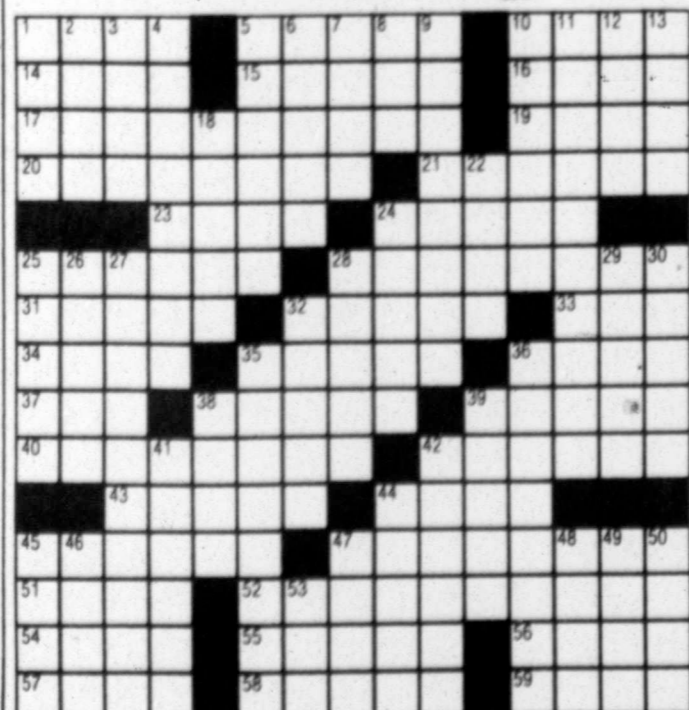

Up to a point, it is a model of accuracy. Modern bidders would have opened the South with one no trump, but barring that, there can be no quibble to the point where North bid three diamonds. South's bid of three hearts would be the choice of every expert because it left open the possibility of playing three no trump if North held a spade stopper. It could hardly denote a suit—South would have introduced a real suit earlier.

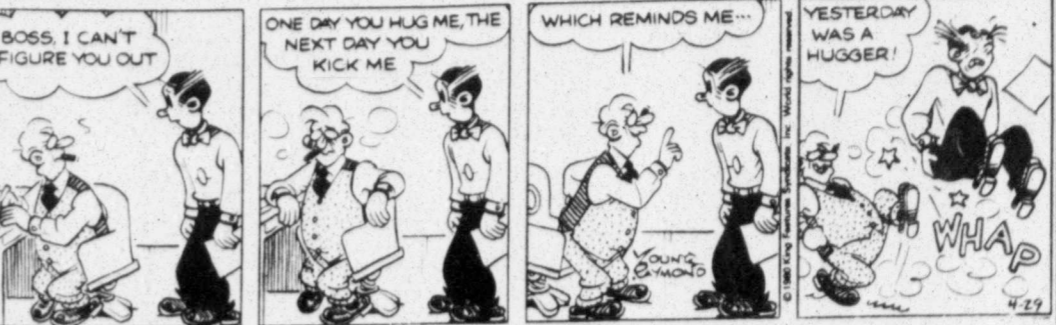

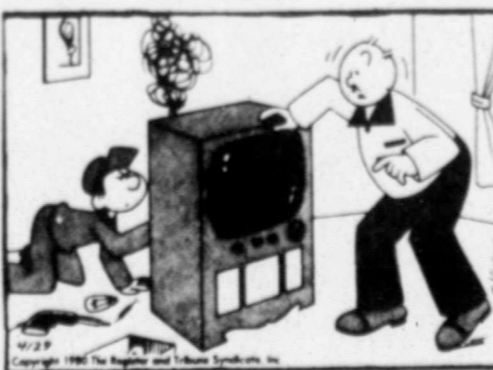

DR. NEIL SOLOMON

Obesity most common diabetes characteristic

Dear Dr. Solomon: My mother developed diabetes when she was in her 60s, and I understand my grandmother also had diabetes. Are there any precautions I should be taking to avoid developing the disease? I am 53 years old. — Don

Dear Don: The most common characteristic of persons who get diabetes after age 40 is obesity. While not all overweight individuals develop the disease, obesity is often associated with it. Since there is a history of diabetes in your family, the best preventive measure you can take is to keep your weight at a desirable level.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My son has muscular dystrophy and my wife and I are debating how best to help him. Since I have been told that he will eventually require a wheelchair, I lean towards making life as simple and as comfortable as possible for him, without requiring very much. On the other hand, my wife favors doing everything possible even though she realizes as well as I the eventual outcome of the disease. We would appreciate your views on this subject. We both love our son and would welcome any advice you may offer. — Mr. and Mrs. S.D.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. D.: Although there is no clear-cut answer to the question you pose, you may be interested in some of the arguments made on either side of the issue. Those, like Mr. D., who favor a more passive approach, argue in effect that the disease is incurable and that sooner or later a child will have to be confined to a wheelchair, regardless of any efforts made on his behalf. In view of this, they conclude, it is inadvisable to subject these children to the kinds of stresses an active therapeutic program would place on them.

On the other hand, it can be argued that an aggressive treatment approach, including corrective surgery, physical therapy, and the use of new kinds of braces, may help keep a child out of a wheelchair for two or three years longer than if such treatment were not made available. To a youngster, two or three years is a significant period of time. Moreover, many of the children involved in an active treatment program experience a sense of achievement in striving to remain as independent as possible, thus profiting emotionally as well as physically from the aggressive approach.

One physician who advocates active treatment is Dr. Colin Hall, an associate professor of neurology and director of the muscular dystrophy clinic at the North Carolina Memorial Hospital. While acknowledging that little can be done for the basic muscle defect, Dr. Hall maintains that efforts to prevent and reverse some of the crippling deformities caused by weak muscles should be made. Although this does impose some strain on the child, aggressive treatment is enabling children with muscular dystrophy to walk longer and live longer.

Postique to open May 20

The Midland Post Office in the George Mahon Federal Building will open its Postique, postal store and philatelic center, at 11 a.m. May 20, according to a spokesman with the U.S. Postal Service.

The facility, to be located in the main post office lobby, will specialize in postal service-issued philatelic items. It will offer collectors a specially-postmarked and cacheted envelope to commemorate the occasion.

The envelope will be printed in blue and gold with a windmill stamp and canceled on May 20 with the special Postique cancellation device, said the spokesman.

The cachet features a stylized vignette of the Midland skyline with oil derricks. The derricks will form a capital "M" and building silhouettes will spell out the rest of the name of Midland. The dates 1884 and 1980 are featured on the cachet representing 96 years of postal service provided Midland. The Postique service mark also is included.

Requests for cachets should be mailed to Postmaster, Postique, United States Post Office, Midland, Texas, 79702.

The cacheted envelopes franked with a windmill stamp and cancelled May 20, 1980, are 50 cents each.

Collectors may order a set of five envelopes which will assure his receiving all five different windmill stamps. Sets are \$2.50.

A self-addressed stamped envelope should be included with the order for return of the cacheted envelopes. Orders will be filled as long as the supply of cancelled envelopes permits, said the spokesman.

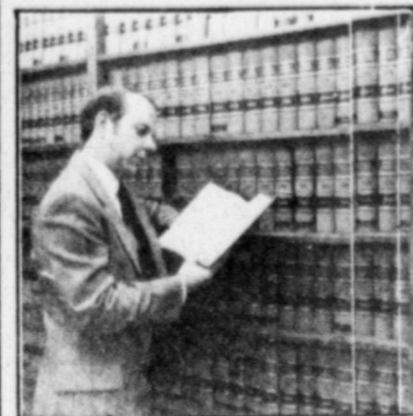

WASHINGTON (AP) — Insecticides and pesticides are coming out of storage again as Americans begin their gardens and face the springtime influx of insects and other pests. And that means it's time to remind ourselves that these chemicals can be very dangerous and must be handled with care. Careful use and storage of insecticides and pesticides is particularly important if there are children in the house. The Consumer Product Safety Commission says thousands of children are poisoned by these products every year and many of these accidents could have been prevented by a few simple precautions. For example, many people like to store insecticides where they can reach them quickly. A favorite spot is the area beneath the kitchen sink. But that is in easy reach of small children,

News media firms back FCC regulations bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three companies that operate newspapers and broadcast stations are asking Congress to set into law Federal Com-

munications Commission regulations protecting their right to own both media. But company representatives, who testified on the proposal at a House communications subcommittee hearing were opposed by officials of public interest and minority groups and the Federal Communications Commission.

"There is great need for clarification of the law, to establish the principle that a broadcast license will be renewed based on the licensee's performance record and not on unrelated factors," said Francis A. Martin III, vice president of the Chronicle Publishing Co., which owns the San Francisco Chronicle, KRON-TV in San Francisco and WQWT-TV in Omaha, Neb. Martin, along with Donald L. Perris, president of Scripps-Howard Broadcasting Co., and Lee Loevinger, an attorney for The Journal Co. of Milwaukee, Wis., testified in support of a bill introduced by Rep. Al

Swift, D-Wash. Swift's measure would place into law FCC rules that protect from divestiture those companies that already own a radio or TV station and newspaper serving the same city, while prohibiting such "cross-ownership" in the future. The bill also would specify the FCC cannot consider the degree of media ownership in resolving challenges by other companies to the license renewal application of an existing station owner.

The industry witnesses said there is a constant fear that the FCC will change its ownership rules. When a broadcaster finds himself facing a challenging company at license renewal time, they added, the FCC should not be reviewing what other media outlets the broadcaster owns in deciding who gets the license.

Feed grain at record level now. WASHINGTON (AP) — Reflecting last year's huge harvests, U.S. stockpiles of corn and soybeans — key ingredients as livestock feeders — are at record levels for this time of year, the Agriculture Department said Thursday. Corn stored on farms, in elevators and in the marketing pipeline totaled 4.78 billion bushels on April 1, up 8 percent from a year ago. Soybean stocks, at 1.18 billion bushels, were up 34 percent, the department's Crop Reporting Board said in a quarterly report.

The nation's wheat inventory was shown at 1.23 billion bushels, slightly less than a year ago, the report said.

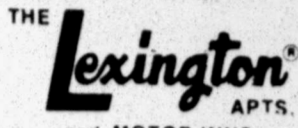

Ali to battle Holmes

BOXING — Muhammad Ali, seeking to win the heavyweight crown for a record fourth time, formalized a July 11 title fight against World Boxing Council champion Larry Holmes in Rio de Janeiro.

The bout, co-promoted by Don King Productions and Prime Sports, will carry a record \$12 million purse with Ali receiving \$8 million and Holmes getting \$4 million. Contracts have been signed and up front money of \$250,000 for Ali and \$100,000 for Holmes has been paid.

BASEBALL — Dave Stieb of the Toronto Blue Jays, who pitched two complete game victories, was named the American League Player of the Week. Stieb, 3-0, who beat Kansas City 7-1 and Milwaukee 4-0, led the Blue Jays into first place in the American League East and lowered his earned run average to 1.09.

Don Sutton, who posted two victories as the Los Angeles Dodgers' winning streak stretched to eight games, was named the National League's Player of the Week. Sutton pitched a four-hitter in blanking the San Francisco Giants 6-0 last Tuesday. It was the 35-year-old veteran's 51st career shutout, placing him 12th on the all-time list and second among active National League pitchers. He also pitched seven innings of four-hit ball Sunday as the Dodgers edged the San Diego Padres 3-1.

The Atlanta Braves asked Commissioner Bowie Kuhn to put third baseman Bob Horner on the league's disqualified list.

The Braves asked for the disqualification because Horner refused to report to their minor league club at Richmond, Va. It means Horner will not be paid his estimated \$2,000-per-day salary. It also means Horner cannot be offered a contract by another club or given his outright release by the Braves.

HOCKEY — Scotty Bowman, who guided the Buffalo Sabres to a 47-17 record, was named the National Hockey League's executive of the year by The Sporting News.

Bowman, the Sabres' coach and general manager, edged Philadelphia General Manager Keith Allen 13-1 in the vote of 36 NHL executives.

WEIGHTLIFTING — Janko Rusev of Bulgaria bettered his previous world weightlifting records in the lightweight category at the European weightlifting championship.

The 21-year-old student from Sofia snatched 326 pounds and then jerked 419 pounds for a total of 745 pounds in the biathlon — all world records. His previous record was 738½ pounds in the category of up to 148 pounds.

Gibson 'Waves' bye to Louisville

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — And suddenly, Vince Gibson was the new head football coach at Tulane University.

Gibson, mentioned for the first time Saturday as a possible replacement for Larry Smith, abandoned the University of Louisville on Monday and accepted a four-year contract with Tulane.

He'll inherit all but two of the coaches Smith left behind two weeks ago when he just as quickly accepted the head coaching job at the University of Arizona after Tulane's 9-3 record last year.

"I'm excited about coming into a program where we've already got a winning tradition," said Gibson, 44, who will receive an undisclosed salary at the private and athletically independent New Orleans university.

It will be a new experience for Gibson, a close friend of Athletic Director Hindman Wall. He previously was hired as a head coach to turn around losing programs at Kansas State and Louisville.

Gibson went 33-52 in eight years at Kansas State and 23-31-2 in three years at Louisville. He has had just three winning seasons since he became a head coach in 1967.

In 1978, when the Cardinals went 7-4-1, Gibson said Louisville would be his last coaching job.

But Tulane sources said Wall, who was with Kansas State's athletic program when Gibson coached there, wanted someone with head coaching experience. Pat Dye, who just moved from East Carolina to Wyoming, reportedly was one of the 16 candidates Wall talked with.

Gibson said he would let his coaches coach and players play, then proceeded to promote defensive end coach Jim Vecchiarella to defensive coordinator. Vecchiarella succeeds Moe Ackney, who left over the weekend when he failed to get the Tulane job.

In addition to Ackney, only strength coach Darwin Wallace left when Smith did. Tulane said it would honor through Dec. 31 the contracts of any coaches who remained.

Former cage standouts blast Olympics boycott

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — At their induction into the Hall of Fame, basketball greats Oscar Robertson, Jerry West and Jerry Lucas had harsh words for the "politics" that caused the United States to withdraw from the Summer Games, and for the play of today's professionals.

"I never felt politics and sports should be mentioned in the same breath," said West, former star guard and coach of the National Basketball Association Los Angeles Lakers, before the Monday afternoon ceremonies. "A lot of people, particularly the athletes, were hurt by the decision" of the United States not to send a team to Moscow, he said.

As for the men now playing the pro game, Robertson — the other half of everybody's "dream backcourt" of the 1960s — said, "I'd like to see summer camps for the pros to teach them the fundamentals."

"Some of them have no idea what they're doing on the court," Robertson said. "The worst thing you can have on a team is a man you can't put in a game, especially at the salaries you are talking about."

"It all starts with the high school coach and there aren't that many good high school coaches anymore," he said.

"I never took a shot in my entire life before I analyzed it," said Lucas, who scored 14,053 points in his pro career with the Cincinnati Royals and New York Knicks. "Now some do, but most don't."

Lucas, West and Robinson first played together on the 1960 Olympic Team that romped to the gold medal in Rome, winning half of its games by margins of more than 40 points.

"There's no question that as a team we were probably the best the U.S. ever sent to the Olympics," Robertson said.

Lakers not counting Sonics out — yet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Los Angeles Lakers aren't counting defending NBA champion Seattle out of the Western Conference title series yet, but it will be a long road back for the SuperSonics.

The Sonics are down 3-1 in the best-of-seven series, with Game 5 scheduled at the Forum in suburban Inglewood Wednesday night. A sellout crowd of 17,505 is assured for the nationally televised game, which begins at 11:30 p.m. EDT.

The Lakers are 4-1 against the Sonics at the Forum this season — the only loss being a 108-107 setback in Game 1 of this series last week. Los Angeles has a 41-5 record on its home court and has won 29 of its last 31 games here.

Even if the Sonics win Wednesday

night, they would have to win at home Friday night and win at the Forum again Sunday afternoon to earn the right to defend their National Basketball Association title.

"You can never count Seattle out," said Los Angeles forward Jamaal Wilkes, who scored 24 points and pulled down 13 rebounds in the Lakers' come-from-behind 98-93 victory in Game 4 Sunday. "But right now, I feel great. They're the defending champions, and I want very badly to beat them in Los Angeles before our fans."

The Lakers overcame a 21-point deficit midway in the third quarter Sunday for a sweep of the two games in Seattle, which were played at the Edmondson Pavilion at the University of Washington because the Kingdome and the Seattle Coliseum were

booked.

"Yeah, I'm joyed," said Los Angeles rookie Earvin "Magic" Johnson, "but not overjoyed. This doesn't crush 'em. We still have one more to go. They're the champs, and they're capable of coming back."

That's exactly what the Sonics did against Milwaukee in the Western Conference semifinals. Seattle was down 3-2 to the Bucks but won in Milwaukee and again at home to earn a berth in the conference final.

"I won't feel good until we win the fourth," said sixth man Mike Cooper, who has been a key in the Lakers' success story this season. "That's the world champs we're messin' around with. They can win three straight."

Cooper is a rookie in every way but a literal sense. He is actually in his second NBA season but played only

seven minutes last year because of a knee injury.

Los Angeles Coach Paul Westhead agrees with his players.

"I fully expect Wednesday's game to be the toughest one in the series for us," Westhead said. "They'll play their best game. They might even relish the challenge."

One Sonic who played anything but his best game Sunday was guard Fred Brown, who missed all 11 of his field goal attempts. It was the same Fred Brown who connected on 15 of 21 floor shots last Tuesday night in scoring 34 points in Game 1.

The series winner faces Philadelphia for the NBA championship. If the Lakers win Wednesday night, they would face the 76ers in Game 1 of the best-of-seven championship series Sunday afternoon at the Forum.

Islanders, Buffalo brace for playoff

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — With the number of teams involved in the National Hockey League's "second season" cut from 16 to four, the celebrated home-ice advantage hasn't seemed to matter much.

The Buffalo Sabres, second in the NHL overall, won the edge of an extra home game during the regular season, and they list four Stanley Cup playoff games among a 22-game Memorial Auditorium unbeaten streak going back to January.

But home ice turned to slush in the quarterfinals for Boston and Montreal as the New York Islanders and Minnesota each won three games in the arena of a team with a better record. The North Stars' surprise 3-2 victory over Montreal Sunday sent the Canadiens into oblivion for this season and forced the Islanders onto a plane for Buffalo after they had spent six days getting ready for the Philadelphia Flyers.

It also left New York and Buffalo miles apart on what they were expecting from each other in their first

semifinal game tonight.

"Maybe it won't be as physical, but we can adapt to anybody's game," said Islanders goaltender Billy Smith. "We might have been forced to play a different style against Philadelphia, but it's all the same to me."

Sabres defenseman Jim Schoenfeld said he and his teammates may have been looking forward to playing the Canadiens — mentioned with the Sabres as one of the best-skating teams in the NHL.

However, he said the expert preparations of coaches Scotty Bowman, Roger Neilson and Jim Roberts and a dose of playoff excitement should get the team back on track.

"The emotion of being in the playoffs is stronger than the emotion of any rivalry," he said. "When we get on the ice, there will be butterflies in our stomachs and beating the Islanders will be foremost in our minds. They've had people scouting Long Island; they have everything covered. There won't be any lack of preparation at all."

Neilson was busy Monday putting folders marked "Montreal" into a filing cabinet.

"There's no problem," said the associate coach known as Captain Video because of his love of electronic equipment. "We had the (New York-Minnesota) series well-scouted, with all our tapes and everything. We just have to switch the files."

Bowman, who coached the Canadiens to five Stanley Cup titles before moving to Buffalo last year, said the Al Arbour-coached Islanders will be a

strong opponent: "They have more balance since they got (center) Butch Goring. They no longer have all their scoring on one line. But we won't have a different plan for this series because we can't change our style."

Buffalo won two games and tied one in four meetings with the Islanders this year, but the visitors already have turned the tables on one regular-season tormentor.

The Islanders stopped Boston in five games after losing to the Bruins three of four times during the winter.

Quinn wants stiff defense vs. North Stars

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Coach Pat Quinn of the Philadelphia Flyers wants a low scoring series with the Minnesota North Stars in their National Hockey League Stanley Cup semifinal playoffs.

"I don't like wide open hockey," said Quinn, who described the North Stars as very aggressive offensively.

"The first game of the best-of-seven series is here tonight with game two on Flyers' ice Thursday night. The scene shifts to Minnesota for the next two games.

The Flyers skated into the semifinal round with a sweep of their best-of-five series with Edmonton and followed by eliminating the New York Rangers 4-1 in a best-of-seven set. Minnesota swept Toronto and scored a startling 4-3 triumph over defending champion Montreal, taking the final game Sunday night at Montreal.

Quinn admitted he was surprised to see Minnesota beat the Canadiens.

"Based on the fact Montreal finished (the regular season) so well ... you would think Montreal would have won," said Quinn, who scouted the North Stars in their Sunday series clincher over the Canadiens.

Minnesota has a comparatively young team, but Quinn said the North Stars showed great poise against Montreal.

"One of their assets is that the supposed better team didn't bother them," Quinn said. "Their kids worked hard, showed determination and withstood the pressure."

"They never quit, just kept plugging away, plugging away," Quinn said.

While Quinn believes his team can hold its own in a wide open skating war, he would rather play a dig-it-out corner game. He'd like to take advantage of the Flyers' physical ability.

Quinn said the North Stars, sixth best team in the league overall during the season, are in an enviable position.

"They're apparently handling the supposed stress of the playoffs with an attitude of 'Who expects us to win, so what do we have to lose?' They've got to be saying: 'Now this thing is up for grabs. We knocked off the defending champions. We can win this thing,'" Quinn said.

Minnesota Coach Glen Sonmor doesn't buy Quinn's philosophy. He objects to everyone saying that even if the North Stars lose it will have been a great season.

"We think we have a chance to win this series," Sonmor said. "Maybe most people think this has been a great season, but it's not over yet."
