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# Survivor recalls bridge disaster

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) - Making his regular drive to work across the Sunshine Skyway Bridge on Friday morning, Wesley McIntire noticed the bridge was swaying in the wind and rain.

Then his pickup truck was hurtling into empty space, 140 feet above Tampa Bay. The truck bounced off a phosphate ship and sank in the choppy water. "I figured it was all over," the 56-year-old meat company dispatcher said from his hospital bed.

But somehow he survived. A 609-foot ship had rammed the twin span bridge during a morning storm, tearing out a 1,364-foot section of the southbound span where it climbs to 140 feet above the shipping channel. The Coast Guard said 32 persons were killed as a Greyhound bus, three cars and the truck plunged into the water.

Eighteen bodies, including that of a baby, were recovered before divers called off their search until today because of foul weather.

All 23 people aboard the Miami-bound bus were killed when it sank in 20 feet of water and tangled in the twisted steel from the mangled bridge, said Coast Guard Capt. Marshall Gilbert.

"The toll could go higher, much higher," said

McIntire, a 56-year-old resident of nearby Gulfport, Fla., said when he started out for work Friday morning, it was raining hard and visibility was

"I almost decided not to go over," he said. As he drove across, the big steel structure began to

'The bridge was swaying," McIntire said."I saw

the ship and I figured it was all over when I couldn't stop. I hit.

"The next thing I remember I was in the water and I managed to get the door open. I started swimming to the surface and I finally made it up.'

He said he wasn't sure exactly how he escaped the sinking truck. "I remember opening the door and I

forced my way out of there," he said. McIntire popped to the surface and looked up to see an eerie sight: beams of auto headlights shining

out through the gap in the bridge. On the deck of the the ship, the "Summit Venture," a crewman heard his frantic shouting and looked down to see McIntire in the water, blood streaming from a cut on his forehead. The seaman tossed down

a rope ladder. McIntire said he was too weak to climb up the ladder, so he just hung on until the crew helped

They helped me up over the side and took me into a cabin," he said. "They were very good to me."

A two-inch-square bandage covered a gash over McIntire's right eye. Dr. Edgar Buren said McIntire was in satisfactory condition.

No injuries were reported aboard the ship, although chunks of the bridge wreckage landed on its

The only known survivor was McIntire.

"I felt it, I saw the superstructure falling," said Jay Hirsh, an ambulance attendant who witnessed the incident. "The first thing I did was look for heads bobbing in the water. There were none."

During a thunderstorm with winds gusting to hurricane force about 7:30 a.m., the 609-foot Summit Venture, a 33,912-ton cargo ship of Liberian registry heading from Houston to Tampa to pick up a load of phosphate for delivery to Korea, rammed into one of the bridge's twin spans across the shipping channel between St. Petersburg and Bradenton.

A faint mayday from the freighter said the crew was abandoning ship. The Coast Guard said further attempts to contact the vessel were unsuc-

A Coast Guard helicopter, a HC-131 search plane and several tugs were dispatched to the area, but the aircraft had not located the freighter late Friday night, the Coast Guard said.

# Iranian voters cast crucial runoff ballots

Iranians voted Friday in the crucial runoff round of elections for a new Parliament that next month may deide the fate of the 53 American hostages in Iran. A leader of the Moslem militants holding the hostages was quoted as saying the Parliament can make only one decision — to put the Americans on trial.

The hostages should be held indefinitely as "instruments" to guarantee continued revolutionary fervor in Iran, the militant leader, Habibollah Peyman, was quoted as saying in an interview with an Italian newspaper. Iran's Pars news agency said Irani-

an Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbza- urged him to resolve the hostage deh and Swiss Foreign Minister Pierre Aubert flew to Zurich on their way home from the Belgrade funeral of Yugoslav President Tito and discussed the U.S.-Iran crisis. The Swiss have been representing the United States diplomatically since President Carter broke relations with Iran last month.

Pars said Ghotbzadeh accused the United States of creating problems for Iranians living in America and asked the Swiss to do something about

The agency also said Ghotbzadeh had met with Yugoslav Foreign Ministry officials in Belgrade and they

Pars said the Yugoslavs told Ghotbzadeh they had met with representatives of third-world countries in Belgrade for the funeral and while they support Iran's Islamic revolution, "they nevertheless stated that so long as Iran does not agree to release the American hostages, third-world countries and the non-aligned countries cannout fully defend Iran's antiimperialist policies and its struggle gainst superpowers."

It reported Ghotbzadeh told the Yugoslavs the "hostage-taking was the will of a nation that was plundered" by America for 25 years and it "should not weaken the attitude of

third-world countries to Iran.' The hostages also were the main topic of a meeting in Belgrade Thursday between Ghotbzadeh and U.N. Tehran Radio said they discussed the U.N. investigative commission on Iran that was formed to try and mediate the U.S. Iranian crisis. The commission has been dormant since early March.

At U.N. headquarters in New York, Waldheim's spokesman said Friday the secretary general was "satisfied" with the meeting.

In another development, the Swiss ambassador in Tehran, Eric Lang, confirmed that an American woman arrested as an alleged CIA agent in the Iranian capital is Cynthia Dwyer, a free-lance writer from the Buffalo, N.Y., suburb of Amherst. Lang said embassy was trying to get a law ver for her.

The specific allegations against the woman have not been reported in

Friday's balloting was the second round of the elections for Iran's 270seat Majlis, or parliament. In the first round March 14, voters elected 98 legislators with clear majorities in their districts. In the runoff round they were voting for 149 seats for which no one received a majority.

# Libyan leader threatens to cut off oil

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy, raising the stakes in a diplomatic feud with the United States and Britain, threatened Friday to cut off oil supplies to the two countries and with draw all Libvan assets from them.

The threat came hours before the State Department announced that a settlement had been reached on its demand that four Libyans, accused of intimidating Libyan dissidents in the United States, leave the country. A deadline of 4:30 p.m. EST had been set for the Libyans to comply with the expulsion order, and police and FBI men were stationed around the Libyan mission when the settlement was

A joint statement released at the State Department said Libya had agreed to recall the four and they would leave Sunday.

The four claimed they were students, not diplomats, and they could be kicked out of the country only through legal deportation proceedings and not by an expulsion order.

Under the settlement, the Libyans also "confirmed their interest in concluding satisfactory arrangments regarding the documentation of their remaining personnel" at the mission. Libya has replaced its traditional embassies with "People's Bureaus," but the State Department insisted the Libyans at the Washington mission register as diplomats.

In London, British government officials were reported preparing to order several members of the Libyan mission there expelled for allegedly improper activities.

In the past two months, five Khadafy opponents have been assassinated in London, Rome and Beirut. Two weeks ago Khadafy declared that Libyan exiles must return to their homeland or otherwise be "doomed wherever they might be.

Italian and British police are investigating whether Khadafy supporters are systematically killing his critics overseas. In the United States, the FBI reportedly discovered a "hit list" of two dozen Libyan students whom the Libyan government was trying to force to return home

The official Libyan news agency JANA quoted Khadafy as saying he was "seriously thinking" of halting oil shipments to the United States, which obtains 3.5 percent of its oil from Libya, and to Britain, which depends on Libya for less than one percent of its oil.

He also was considering withdrawing Libyan assets from the two countries, JANA said. The value of those

assets could not be immediately determined.

Khadafy has threatened to halt oil shipments to the United States in the past. This time, however, his statement coincided with a reported purge of officials at home as well as the warnings to exiled dissidents, steps that one knowledgable oil executive said could indicate the new threat should be taken seriously.

"The crackdown at home is the heaviest ever," said this European oil company official, who was recently in Libya. "On the other hand Khadafy has always bluffed in the past.

Khadafy has rounded up many top officials on charges of corruption, say Arab sources in London.

This north African nation relies heavily on income from its oil sales. The United States is its principal customer, buying 44 percent of Libya's production of 2.1 million barrels.

"Libya is completely dependent on its oil industry," noted the European executive, who asked not to be identified. "It isn't something you can turn on and off overnight."

A British Energy Department spokesman said neither the United States nor Britain, whose North Sea oil fields are bringing it close to selfsufficiency, would "grind to a halt" with a Libyan embargo. Not only do both have relatively low dependence on Libyar oil, but also their oil inventories currently are high.

The JANA dispatch also quoted Khadafy as saying Libya will ask for 'thousands of millions of dollars' from Britain, West Germany and Italy "as compensation for huge" losses and damages incurred on Libya" during World War II.

# Phase I disco seeks private club license; Letter of protest filed

Rejected twice by Midland City Council in an effort to obtain a specific-use permit to sell alcoholic beverages, Phase I disco at 500 E. Nobles Ave. has filed an application with the Alcoholic Beverage Commission to

become a private club. Billy Flynn, district supervisor with the ABC Odessa office, said the application is dated April 10.

He added the Odessa office will send the application to Austin with no objections to it. However, the application is being protested by the same group of residents who opposed the earlier requests for a specific-use

Phase I disco has been in operation for several months, but can't sell alcholic beverages because it has no specific-use permit. Instead, customers bring their own liquor.

Phase I has been a source of controversy in the eastside neighborhood where it is located since the disco's owners applied with the city

last fall to sell alcoholic beverages. In November, and again in March, the city council unanimously denied those applications on the basis that nearby residents opposed the permits.

It is these same people, said Wilburn Buttery, principal at Crockett Elementary School, who have submitted a written protest to the ABC. PRIMARY POINT mentioned in

the previous protests was the immediate proximity of the disco to Crockett Elementary, churches and resi-

However, Flynn said the disco legally is outside the required 300-foot distance from schools and churches.

According to the ABC supervisor, private clubs are allowed in that section of Midland under the city ordinance. "The zoning doesn't prohibit a private club in that neighborhood," said Flynn.

Richard Hennessy, director of planning and community development for the city, agreed, but he clarified what the city means by "private club." "The city zoning ordinance does permit a private club in an area such as that," he said, adding that the area is zoned Planned District."However, you must understand in what sense of the word the zoning ordinance means by private club."

Under the city code, private clubs, lodges, sororities and fraternities are allowed in multiple family areas, such as the neighborhood surrounding Phase I. By private club, the code is interpreted to mean an organization that has a regular membership of at least 50 persons, regular meetings and a set of by-laws.

HENNESSY SAID THE city hasn't been furnished with a description of how the disco proposes to operate. And if alcholic beverages are sold, a specific-use permit still would be required.

"As I understand it, in a private club there is no sale of alcoholic beverages," said Hennessy. "They can provide a service of mixing and serving liquor but not selling it. If Phase I doesn't operate within

### Democrats to choose state delegates

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas Democrats go through the second phase today of selecting 152 delegates to the National Democratic Convention where the party's presidential nominee will be named.

The first phase of delegate selection began on May 3 at precinct conventions held after the primary voting. The precinct convention selected delegates to the county conventions on the basis on presidential preference of those attending the precinct conventions.

Today, the county conventions select delegates to the June 20-21 convention in San Antonio, again on the presidential preference of those The third and final phase comes at the state convention when national

convention delegates will be allocated on the basis of presidential preference shown by delegates as they sign in at the 31 state senatorial district

The presidential popularity poll on the May 3 ballot, which was won by President Jimmy Carter, had no direct affect on selection of national convention delegates. Carter got 56 percent of the popular vote to 22 percent for Sen. Edward Kennedy, 3 percent for Gov. Edmund Brown, and 19 percent uncommitted.


Officials at State Democratic headquarters say they have been unable to get definitive results from the precinct conventions.

State Democratic Chairman Billy Goldberg, also has said he plans to make no effort to gather county convention results on Saturday. He said he might make a comment on Monday or Tuesday.

In the May 3 Republican primary Ronald Reagan won the presidential preference primary, which had a direct effect on selecting national convention delegates, with 51 percent of the vote. George Bush got 47 percent, with 2 percent uncommitted.

State GOP Headquarters said that on the basis of the popular vote, Reagan got 61 of Texas' 80'delegates while Bush got 19 delegates.

loon, the Kitty Hawk, was heading north-northeast at about 26 mph and was located about 52 miles northwest of Casper, Wyo., at about 6 p.m.

That would put them at or near the crest of the Rockies and en route to the Bear Lodge Mountains and Devil's Tower National Monument in northeastern Wyoming before floating over the Dakotas.

Earlier Friday, the balloon it had crossed the Sierra Nevada and northern Utah in the second day of the planned 2,500-mile flight.

The Kitty Hawk had picked up speed during the late afternoon, with the 26 mph reported a good 16 mph faster than at midday.

"They indicated (by radio) they'd been jousting with thunderstorms all day and even a brief snowstorm, but came through in excellent shape and will continue through the night," said flight spokesman Auburn Mitchell.

'We had been concerned about their northerly direction but now it indicates they are on an easterly trend," he added. "We're fairly optimistic (about a successful transcontinental flight) once they get past the Rockies and out on the Plains.

Cold temperatures early Friday forced the Andersons to wear their warmest clothing as they floated over Utah. Doc Wiley, the flight engineer, said they reported by radio that temperatures had fallen close to zero degrees Fahrenheit.

# Carter says he favors detente

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - President Carter, making his first speech outside Washington in more than six months, declared Friday that detente with the Soviet Union remains his goal, but said it must be "built on a firm foundation of deterrence."

"The Soviets must understand that they cannot recklessly threaten world peace - they cannot commit aggression — and still enjoy the benefits of cooperation with the West," the presi-

### Hance announces opposition to Carter's oil import fee

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Rep. Kent Hance today announced his strong opposition to the new oil import fee imposed by President

The new tax on foreign oil would do nothing to help with the present en-

ergy crisis, Hance claimed. "The only thing to be accomplished by these two pieces of legislation will be higher fuel bills," Hance said. "Neither will solve the energy crisis even though they are being promoted as major parts of the energy plan. They are simply revenue producers for an already over-spending federal government.

"In the next few weeks as the windfall profits tax takes effect, oil producers and royalty owners will see their profits being confiscated by this so-called windfall tax ... And this is not just a tax on producers and royal-

ty owners. It will be the consumers who will be heavily taxed because they will bear the brunt in overall higher fuel bills."

The Texas congressman said people will begin to experience the effects soon of both the import fee, which will add 10 cents per gallon to gasoline prices, and the windfall profits tax. "It won't be in the headlines now, it

# Air control panel taking topping unit comments

Midlanders may be getting a little more gray mixed with their blue skies in the future, but the smudging may be too slight to notice.

The Texas Air Control Board is taking written public comment through June 2 on an application from Texas Refining Co. to build a topping unit in Midland County.

The proposed 60-foot cracking tower and four storage tanks at full production would emit about 17 tons of nitrogen oxide and other matter into the air every year.

That may sound like a lot but, according to John Haagensen, environmental quality specialist for the Texas Air Control Board, anything less than 25 tons of emissions a year is "insignificant."

By comparison, most of West Texas' large gas plants turn out "hundreds of tons of emissions per year" into the air, he said. He said emissions from the proposed unit would be similar to those from a medium-sized tank battery in the oil fields.

The unit planned five miles northeast of Midland on land leased to Texas Refining by Basin, Inc., will be the first of its kind in Midland Coun-

According to John Holman, a partner in Texas Refining, the small, skidmounted unit will use fairly new technology and will produce "virtually no

smoke.

The company will truck in sweet crude oil, use natural gas to heat a fluid to about 600 degrees which will in turn heat the crude, condensing out crude oil to one storage tank, naptha to another, diesel to a third and residual oil to the fourth.

The natural gas-fueled heater is the source of most of the expected 10 tons annually of nitrogen oxide emissions,

Haagensen said. "Very basically, the unit applies minimal heat to break out the three easiest things," Holman explained.

The tower will be topped with a pilotless flare that will burn "only in case of upsets" in the process, Haagensen said. While a single one-man topping unit

could hardly be considered "heavy industry," the Midland Chamber of Commerce, which helps recruit new industry to Midland County, has no official position on the kinds of expansion it attempts to attract.

"We strive to make it all the most attractive industry," Grant Billingsley, the chamber's director of economic development, said. "But we don't limit our prospecting to only those industries thought of as 'nonpolluters."

Billingsley pointed to the Michelin Tire and Rubber plant being planned here as an example of an industry which "sounds like a polluter, but certainly will not be."

### Judge says Houston station must air controversial film

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal judge ruled Friday that a Houston public television station cannot cancel a showing of the controversial film "Death of a Princess" and that it must be broadcast Monday night at the same time it is shown by other stations across the nation.

The University of Houston, holder of the license for KUHT-TV, Channel 8, had first scheduled, then junked plans to air the drama that drew strong protests from Saudi Arabia after its viewing in Great Britian.

"This is not a private-owned televi-sion station," U.S. District Judge Gabrielle McDonald ruled after hearing a full day of testimony. "It is public. When the state government becomes involved in television it has to make sure decisions are not based on politics. Decisions on programs to be seen cannot be based on politics."

Greg Wilson, an assistant state attorney general representing the university, said he would appeal the ruling, although time is short. Only six other public television sta-

tions have refused to air the show. Five of them are in South Carolina and one is in Los Angeles. The production resulted from a British journalist's five-month inves-

with the people who own the building unless they are elected as officers,' said Flynn. "The members can take their permit and move out of the building; the permit belongs to the members, not the people who own the building.'

Having a permit for a private club doesn't necessarily eliminate the general public. Flynn said that under state law the club can issue temporary memberships for \$2 a person that are good for 72 hours. There is no limit on renewing these temporary memberships.

"IT IS CONCEIVABLE that some night you may go into a private club that has 500 people. There may be only 100 who are regular members, but the rest have temporary memberships," said the district supervisor.

Granting Phase I the private club permit in actuality won't increase the ABC's control over the club. Flynn said the ABC already has control over public drinking spots whether or not that facility has a specific-use per-

"If they (nightclubs) are open after hours and people are drinking, it is illegal."

He explained Midland's code states it is illegal to drink in any public place past 2:15 a.m. If the facility has a permit, then the owners are charged with the violation. But if there isn't a permit - such as in the case of Phase I's current status — the ABC can only charge the person drinking with being a public nuisance.

In essence, a place may stay open 24 hours a day, but no one can drink past 2: 15 a.m., he added...

The application for the permit is the first step in a lengthy process. The state agency will have to set a date for public hearing, and the ABC's legal division could come to Midland to take depositions.

But in objecting to that application. Flynn said, people "must have grounds for protest."

# Prisoner released from jail after serving 68 years plus

BEACON, N.Y. (AP) — Paul Geidel was just 17 when he was convicted of murder in 1911. Today, he is a free man after spending 68 years and seven months in jail — apparently the longest term ever served in the Unit-

"No publicity, please," the 85-yearold Geidel said with a smile as he left Fishkill Correctional Facility here.

He said he had seen a lot of changes since his imprisonment, but declined further comment and asked that the name of his new home — a nursing home in Dutchess County — not be revealed.

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Geidel, a native of Hartford, Conn., was working as a porter in a hotel in New York City when he was convicted of killing a guest in July 1911. According to authorities, Geidel was robbing the room of Henry Jackson when the man awoke and began struggling with Geidel.

Jackson was knocked unconscious, and police said Geidel stuffed a rag soaked with chloroform in Jackson's mouth before fleeing. Jackson died of asphyxiation.

Geidel was convicted of second-degree murder on Sept. 5, 1911 and sentenced to a term of 20-year to life. A year later, he was transferred on the grounds of insanity to what is now the Clinton Correctional Facility in Dannemora. In 1966, Geidel was still there, considered by authorities criminally insane.

inally insane. "He was sent. He was gone. He was forgotten," said parole officer Robert Foley, who accompanied Geidel to his new home Wednesday. "He got lost there.

"It was an accidental murder really," Foley said. "He was frying to incapacitate the man. But he killed him, and he owed time for that. Ten, 20 years, OK, but 68? It's a crying

shame."
After a 1966 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that mentally disturbed prisoners could not be held indefinitely, Geidel was rediscovered by prison officials.

"When we first started examining people to see if they were really insane, we discovered he really wasn't," said Art Nicholson, another parole officer. "He's a real nice old guy, he's always very polite. We just want to give him a chance to socialize with people his own age."

According to the Guinness Book of World Records, Johnson VanDyke Grigsby took the record for longest prison term served when he was released from the Indiana State Prison in 1976 after a term of 68 years and three months.

According to the Guinness book, Grigsby had complained on his release of the bad language of modernday prisoners. But Fishkill superintendent Theodore Reid said Geidel appeared happy in jail.

"I can think of more appropriate ways to spend my time, but he seemed quite happy," said Reid.

# State of California employes kick in to help finance Brown's campaign

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s \$3.1 million unsuccessful campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination drew contributions from more than 180 California state employees, it was reported Friday.

Federal Election Commission records show that almost all of the money raised by the financially strapped campaign came from California — with a large chunk donated by state employees, the Los Angeles Times said.

California has no law comparable to the federal Hatch Act, which prohibits employees of the federal government from making political contributions.

Top officials of the Department of Rehabilitation, the Employment Development Department, the Education Department and the Business and Transportation Agency were among the contributors, federal records show.

At least 15 state employees gave \$1,000 — the maximum allowed by law for individuals. Among those listed were Virginia May Days, director of the Department of Veteran's Affairs; Richard E. Rominger, director of the Department of Food and Agriculture; Gray Davis, the governor's chief of staff, and Mario Obledo, secretary of health and welfare.

Obledo said his contribution reflected his loyalty to Brown and had not

"I am a complete supporter of the governor and I will do anything I possibly can to assist him in his efforts to implement the ideas he has," he said.

Brown dropped out of the presidential race April 1 after a poor showing in the Wisconsin primary.

At that time, about \$2.8 million had come in to his hard-pressed campaign treasury from political committees, private donations and loans. Of that total, \$1.5 million was in individual contributions, the Times said. The governor also received about \$730,000 in federal matching funds.

The assorted mix of contributors included real estate developers, corporate executives, business executives, bankers, artists, musicians and

When Brown withdrew, the campaign was about \$600,000 in the red.

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

# April prices register smaller rise

level slowed down considerably in April, as prices rose 0.5 percent, the smallest amount in 11 months and far less than March's 1.4 percent surge, the government said Friday.

Until April, wholesale prices were accelerating at an 18 percent annual rate. If last month's pace continued, prices would rise only 6.2 percent a year, although a continuation of this trend was viewed as unlikely.

Referring to the April price report, the president's chief inflation adviser, Alfred Kahn, said, "I find it difficult to say anything very optimistic about

"It's all food," he said, referring to a 2.8 percent decline in food prices. "We can't expect fighting inflation to be handled by ever-declining food

He said food prices undoubtedly will increase again and he fears the nation's underlying inflation

rate, irrespective of food, remains extremely high. Meanwhile, the government also reported that sales at the nation's retail stores continued their slump in April, falling 1.2 percent overall and a huge 9.7 percent in the depressed auto sector. Since January, retail sales, seasonally adjusted,

have sagged 5.2 percent. The last time retail sales fell for three consecutive months was during the last recession in late 1974, said Adren Cooper, a Commerce Department spokesman. April's 1.2 percent drop in sales from \$76.2 billion

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
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### Drought, war drive many to refugee camps

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) - Drought and war have forced millions of starving people into refugee camps in Uganda, Ethiopa and Somalia and hundreds of thousands face famine, relief officials said Friday. Thousands have already died.

Crops maturing in the fields offer hope that the shortages in Uganda will ease by July. But meanwhile food reserves are vanishing. "The situation is growing more critical every day. Only the relief distribution programs have kept it from getting out of hand," John

Woodland of Oxfam, the British aid group, said Friday. The World Food Program, another relief agency, estimates 500,000 face

Corruption, inefficiency, indifference and low morale have embittered many aid experts here, officials said in interviews. Most agencies have sidestepped the government in distributing food, they said.

"I wouldn't dream of using the government to distribute what we bring in. Too much of it would simply disappear," an aid official said.

Black market food prices exacerbate the situation, officials say. Half-

liter containers of milk, officially pegged at about 35 cents, are sold illegally on Uganda street corners for about \$3.50. In war-torn Ethiopia, officials this week turned to the West with a desperate appeal for drought relief. Relief officials estimate 1.5 million peo-

ple are in refugee camps. Ethiopia's rulers, who apparently suppressed news of the disaster earlier, took Western diplomats and relief agency representatives on an offi-

Ethiopian officials said that in the Ogaden region alone more than a

million of the region's 3 million people are starving. Relief officials fear the crisis in Ethiopia might reach the proportions of the Wollo province famine of 1973 which claimed the lives of 200,000

Ethiopia is fighting a hit-and-run war against ethnic Somalis trying to separate the Ogaden from Ethiopia and annex it to Somalia. Ethiopia also is fighting secessionists in its northeastern province of Eritrea, which provides the country's only outlet to the sea.

The Soviet Union sends military support to Ethiopia but apparently has given very little aid for drought victims. Lisbeth Hellberg, a Swedish journalist who visited the stricken area recently, said she only saw one Soviet helicopter delivering food.

Ms. Hellberg said one Ethiopian official told her: "We've got friends who help us with the military hardware but when we need other assistance we have to turn to the West."

Nearly 1,000 people a day are flooding into refugee camps in Somalia from Et hiopia, its hostile Marxist-ruled neighbor, officials for World Vision Internati onal in London said Friday.

World Vision, a California-based agency, announced a 420,000 pound — \$496,00 0 — relief program starting next week. The group estimates there are 1.5 million refugees in Somalia, which has a total population of less than 4 million. The group said Somalia has "the largest refugee problem

Melissa Wells, head of the United Nations Development Program in Uganda, said after a tour of the Karamoja region that five children were being buried each day at one Roman Catholic mission at Namalu. Some 4 million Ugandans, nearly a third of the population, are affected

by drought in the northern half of the country, aid donors say Western aid officials estimate that more than 15,000 tons of food have been delivered or earmarked for Uganda since March 1, when President Godfrey Binaisi appealed for help. Officials say much more food is needed but add that distributing it in Uganda is difficult.

"Up in the drought areas, people cooperate. They have to. Down here is the problem. If it fell to the govenment, it would take years to distribute what we' ve sent," an aid official said.

# Pope, Runcie hold joyful meeting

ACCRA, Ghana (AP) - Pope John Paul II and the new Archbishop of Canterbury, Robert Runcie, held a "joyful and moving" meeting Friday in another step toward closer relations between their churches

after four centuries of division. 'The time is too short and the need too pressing to waste Christian energy pursuing old rivalries," the two religious leaders said in a joint statement after

They described the 50-minute meeting as a "joyful and moving occasion," adding that the "talents and resources of all the churches must be shared if Christ is to be seen and heard effectively.

The pope, in the fourth stop on a tour of six African nations, and the archbishop, in Africa to inaugurate a new diocese in Zaire, arranged the meeting, their first, when they learned their paths would cross

Runcie called on John Paul at the residence of the Roman Catholic archbishop of Accra.

Later, Runcie declined to reveal the content of their private conversation, but called the meeting a chance for the Catholic and Anglican churches to work together to promote the "freedom and fullness of life that is the birthright of every person born into

"It seems providential," he said, "that our first meeting was not in Rome, not in the spotlight with all the protocol but as two people visiting Christian congragations in a pastoral way."

More than 1 million persons lined the motorcade route, and hundreds of police to keep the crowds back from the pontiff.

In a spectacle of pomp and ceremony, the pope and the king of the Ashanti, one of Africa's oldest tribal dynasties, exchanged greetings in a crowded sports stadium in the up-country city of Kumasi.

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# New tongue built for Colombian youth proves world's greatest psychotherapy

By DOLORES BARCLAY

NEW YORK (AP) — Three years ago, Jorge Gonzalez was a bizarre, elfin child. He had floppy, oversized ears, a bird-like, pointed chin and a mouth that was tiny at its opening and huge inside. He was 10 years old and looked 6

Doctors said his strange appearance was due to an unexplained birth defect: Jorge was born without a tongue.

The defect distorted his facial structure. The absence of a tongue made eating a problem and caused malnutrition.

But in 1977, he came from Bogota, Colombia, to New York, where a plastic surgeon created a tongue for Jorge out of tissues and muscles in his neck. Next month, in the latest refinement on the operation, the tongue will be trimmed and sculpted. Doctors say he already looks and feels much better.

"From the first operation to now, he's grown tremendously almost a foot," said Dr. Richard Boies Stark, attending surgeon of the plastic surgical service at St. Luke's Hospital Center.

When he first came up from Colombia, he was stunted in growth because of malnutrition. Everything he ate he had to push with his finger to a little gullet in the back of his throat. "He also wasn't able to handle liquids very well. He'd choke,"

In addition, the boy could hardly talk. Today, with his new tongue, Jorge can eat normally. His speech also has improved, said Stark.

The doctor said there were no clues in the family history or in~ his mother's pregnancy as to why the child was born tongueless. He is an only child, born when his mother was in her 30s.

Jorge was not mentally dull, Stark said, but he was socially

"Other children were very cruel," Stark said.

Before the operation, the inside of Jorge's mouth was larger than normal and seemed even more cavernous because there was no tongue. There was bone where there should have been muscle, trimming the mouth to a smaller-than-usual opening. Jorge's operation was a rare procedure, say medical authorities. There is little in medical literature about tongue recon-

The first operation was in July 1977, when Stark reconstructed the tongue and did a bone graft. A year later, a larger bone graft was made. Last year, the tiny opening to his mouth was enlarged to give him a better bite.

A special fund set up by some of Stark's former patients paid for Jorge's anesthesia and stay at St. Luke's. "We did not charge anything," Stark said.

Jorge's tongue was made from the neck's strap muscles, which run from the collar bone to the chin. They account for certain sounds one hears in the voice.

First, his doctors made a slit on each side of the front of his neck. The flesh and muscles were pushed up and out, forming a ridge in the shape of a suitcase handle under his chin.

This ridge eventually became his tongue. It was skinned, partially detached from the neck, then pushed up into the mouth through the jaw, using a tunnel created by snipping into the jawbone and cutting away some other, useless bone that had grown into Jorge's mouth where a tongue should have been.

The strap muscles are "in front of the voice box and not terribly important," Stark said. "We can do without them, and I think this was probably a better use.'

Skin from Jorge's buttocks was grafted onto his neck to cover the raw space left by the shifted muscles. A small piece of bone from the pelvis replaced the T-shaped bone that had been cut

"Jorge can now feel but he can't taste," Stark said. "The sense of taste is very crude. We taste sweet, sour and salt. Everything else is what you breathe."

Stark also performed cosmetic surgery on Jorge's ears to reduce their size, and when the boy returns to New York forfinal work on the tongue, Stark will also work on Jorge's misshapen nose. The boy's teeth are also badly placed, so he

"When a person who has had an outstanding deformity starts getting improvement, it's the greatest psychotherapy in the world. Most shed phobias," Stark said.

"Fortunately, Jorge is just about the right age. He's going through adolescence now and I want to make him a good-look-

# Black vets battled enemy, racism

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) - During World War II, America's Lonely Eagle air squadrons flew 1,578 missions and destroyed 409 enemy planes. But today, former members of the all-black units are proudest of how they shot down racist Army poli-cies that included segregated bases

and hand-me-down planes.
Four of the veterans recounted their victories at a recent luncheon sponsored by a church in this central California city.

About 100 persons were on hand to honor Joseph Dixon Jr., a Fresno Housing Authority manager; Jesse Henry Simpson Jr., a retired sheriff's sergeant; Rueben Bilbo, a retired San Francisco postal worker; and Herman "Ace" Lawson, a former Sacramento city councilman.

"We went through some really rough and tough ordeals, the kinds I like to forget and put behind me," says Dixon. "At times you often wondered why you had on Uncle Sam's uniform because of the treatment we

"There were these black units fighting for the freedom of our country and here we were being oppressed by our own country. We were fighting to make the country a better place,'

The examples of racism he notes include segregated mess halls, mistreatment by white soldiers and even being jailed in a southern town where police wouldn't believe there were any black pilots.

It took the Army to get the Eagles

out. "We knew the Army was segregated, per se, but we didn't know we'd run into the sort of humiliation we ran into," says Dixon.

"For example, if the base was near a USO station where we could go for a meal, we couldn't go into the restaurant. We'd have to be served through

the back door," he recalls.

Lawson flew 133 missions and won the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal of Honor before retiring as a major. But the color of his skin almost kept him out of the Army Air

When he tried to join, the enlist-ment officer told him: "Uncle Sam's not taking any night fighters."

He appealed to President Franklin D. Roosevelt and finally was allowed to train with the Lonely Eagles.

We wanted to fight because we knew if this experimental business (black pilots) didn't work, there would be no blacks in the Air Force and no mixing of the armed forces,"

Lawson explains.

His recounting of the Lonely-Eagles' accomplishments reflects a sense of pride common to many former members:

"We were the only outfit to sink a German destroyer with fighter planes. We blew that rascal out of the Mediterranean Sea. We were the only pilots to fly four different kinds of planes during the war.

"We were the only outfit in Europe which escorted bombers and never lost one to the Germans. And we shot down the last Germans of World War

Additionally, the Lonely Eagles helped win another battle. It was during World War II that the Army ordered an end to segregation on military installations.





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

BIG SPRING - Municipal demands for water continued to gain through April, but industrial and oil company deliveries dropped, according to the monthly production records of the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

The oil-industrial figure was down by 159 million gallons, but 141 million gallons of the loss came from the cutoff of deliveries to Texas Electric Service Company's electric generating plant in Ward County. This disparity will continue through June, the anniversary of the cutoff order to conserve well supplies for municipal use.

For April, the municipal total was 1,247,718,000 gallons, up 5.63 percent. The oil-industrial total was 150,386,000 gallons, down 51.47 percent from April

Through the first four months of this year, cities used 5,819,226,000 gallons of water, a gain of 4.66 percnet. Oil-industrial deliveries stood at 601,826,000 gallons, 665, 100,000 gallons less than for the first four months of 1979, but 530,000,000 of this were in the TESCO cutoff.

Deliveries to the cities in April included Midland, 367,000,000 gallons, down 3.58 percent; Odessa, 559, 643,000 gallons, up 9.87 percent; Big Spring, 216,072,-000 gallons, up 6.10 percent; Snyder, 93,490,000 gallons, up 9.66 percent; and Stanton, 10,650,000 gallons, up 25.45 percent.

# Sparks fly when HUD boss Landrieu tangles with Virginia congressman

WASHINGTON (AP) - It's not unusual for a congressmen to use a public hearing to question the motives of a Cabinet member or the actions of his department. But it's rare when the secretary

Boland said HUD had gotten a bum rap in Harris' allegations. Added Stolarow: "The money (obligated by HUD for assisting low-income housing projects) is not being improperly used in any way.

The central issue in the dispute is how HUD accounts for money tentatively earmarked for assisting low- and moderate-income housing projects but which end up, for one reason or another, not being built. The gist of Harris' point was that after such a

project is canceled, the money HUD had set aside for it becomes available for whatever use the department wants, and the "slush fund ... (could) be spent at HUD's discretion, without the knowledge or approval of Congress.

Landrieu said if such an obligation is canceled, the accounting procedure that makes it appear the money must be channeled into a similar housing project - not to some other HUD program.

The GAO said HUD should not list such money as obligated until a binding commitment is made for a project. By listing the money as obligated, Stolarow said, if a project is canceled, HUD ends up "with

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

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# Indy 500 rookie steals some thunder from Rutherford

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Indianapolis rookie Tim Richmond stole the show from the big name drivers Friday in the last big push for speed prior to the opening round of qualifying for the 64th running of the Indianapolis 500.

The 24-year-old driver from Ashland, Ohio stunned a big, sunsplashed crowd at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway with the week's fas-

With most of the top cars taking part in the final frantic hour of practice - known around the Indianapolis Motor Speedway as "Happy Hour" - Richmond wheeled his one-year-old Penske PC7 around the 21/2-mile oval at 193.507 mph.

That was better than the 193.009 clocking earlier in the day by twotime Indy winner Johnny Rutherford, who had been the dominant figure at the Speedway all week.

Richmond finished 26th in last year's California 500 and 12th in the Trenton 150, but he made his first appearance at Indianapolis this

His 190-plus clockings Friday made the youngster one of the front-runners for the opening round of time trials for the May 25 race.

The pole position, worth \$10,000 and a big psychological edge, will be up

for grabs Saturday, as will all the top spots on the 33-car grid. Despite Richmond's last big effort, Rutherford has firmly established himself as the man to beat. The 42-year-old Texan had his choice of rides

for the run at the pole.

He clocked his 193-plus lap Friday in one of his team's Chaparral racers, then went out and did 190.355 in the team's other Chaparral entered by Midland's Jim Hall.

Furthermore, the only rookie ever to win the pole was Walt Faulkner, who did it in 1950.

"It's gonna take 192 or 193, maybe even less, to win the pole," Rutherford said. "I don't know what those other guys are doing out there right now, but it's going to be a very interesting day." Other than Rutherford, who has been over 190 five straight days, the

only drivers to surpass that magic figure until Friday had been Bobby Unser, Mario Andretti and Tom Bagley. With time running out, Unser and Andretti did it again Friday, and Penske teammate Rick Mears, the defending champion; four-time Indy

winner A.J. Foyt; Spike Gehlhausen; Danny Ongais, and Richmond Foyt, who had been struggling for speed earlier in the week, was clocked at 192.555, while Ongais hit 190.921 and Gehlhausen 1915e.939. Andretti went 191.652, Mears 191.734 and Unser 190.476 in newly built

"When we were running 189, I was thinking row three or four," Richmond said. "Then, when we hit 191, I was thinking maybe row two. Then

we hit 193. I'm gonna go for the pole." Restrictions on horsepower and certain aerodynamic aids have made

it virtually impossible for the drivers to approach the qualifying record of 202.156 mph set by Tom Sneva in 1978.

Mears won the inside spot on the front row last year with a four-lap average of 193.736.

But the search for speed continues unabated, with plenty of talk about teams cheating to improve their horsepower.

It was also evident this week that the teams were trimming the stabilizing wings on their cars, eliminating downforce in an effort to get more

However, that also meant the speeding cars had less stability than normal in the turns. That, theoretically, was the reason 1973 Indy winner Gordon Johncock crashed during Thursday's practice session.

Johncock suffered a chip fracture to his left ankle but was placed in a

walking cast and was given the official okay Friday to try to qualify his backup car this weekend. Sheldon Kinser drew the first spot in the qualifying line for Saturday,

with Mears in the second spot getting the best position among the

Rutherford's top car drew the No. 8 spot, while his backup car was way down in the 40th position.

Ongais will be 12th in line, but all the other 190-mph-plus cars drew positions ranging from No. 27 to 49 in the 49-car draw.

The top spots in the qualifying line are considered the best because the track is less likely to be slick from oil and other fluids or less likely to be made slower by the afternoon heat.

Simmons won the state AAAA discus championship with a toss of 187-feet, one inch to down four other discus hopefuls who managed to throw in excess of

The victory was Simmons' 11th of the year without a defeat and it completed a storybook season for the senior, who a year ago failed to get out of district. Simmons will now step into the shot put ring today at 11:30 a.m. in his last competition as a Midland High athlete. Midland Lee's Keevin Harper was set to run in the 800 meters this afternoon to complete another big success

Simmons took control of the discus from the very beginning. He never trailed after tossing a 186-8 on his first throw of the day, but just to make sure, he

uncorked his 187-1 on his fifth throw to win going away.

"I'm still numb," was the way MHS coach Johnny Williams put it Friday.

"He did a great job against a tough field. It's hard to believe that he went through a whole season without getting beat."

Much of Simmons' success has to go with assistant track coach Leonard Boyd, who has worked with him all season. Boyd said, "David is a joy to work with. You just tell him what's wrong and he'll work until he gets it right."

Texas City's Kevin Hançock tried to make a race of it with a throw of 185-0, but that was good for only second place and was not better than Simmons' first throw. Humble's Greg Porter recorded a 184-6 for third and Hurst-Bell's Ron Faurot, who some considered the favorite, was fourth with a 184-0.

The closest Simmons came to defeat this season was in the West Texas Relays in Odessa when he had to defeat San Angelo's Doug Dewitt on the last throw of the day, but in the process, he broke a long standing record by former Olympian Randy Matson.

Simmons is not one of the favorites in today's shot put event. He ranks fourth among the competitors and a victory here would be a real shocker. Simmons was the state's discus leader going into Friday's discus event.

Watson, who has won three Nelsons in five years including the last two, birdied two of the first three holes and then sent his large gallery into a roar with his perfect second shot over White Rock Creek on the 350-yard par 4 No. 17.

Playing the back nine first, Watson went out in 4-under-par 31 then turned the front side in 2-under-par 33 on the 6,993 yard course, which is fast be-coming known as "Watson's Alley."

Watson, seeking to capture his third consecutive tournament after backto-back wins in Tournament of Champions and the New Orleans Open, owned a two-shot lead over paunchy George Cadle, who celebrated his 32nd birthday with a 4-under-par 66, and Curtis Strange, who won the Houston open last week.

For Watson, it was his ninth consecutive sub-par round at Preston Trail. He is a dues paying member of the exclusive all-men's club and often visits - as he did on an off day last week - for tips from Byron Nelson. The lesson subject: Poor iron play by

"It got to be a real laugher out there because I turned a 69 into a 64," said Watson. "That eagle just took all the pressure off ... it was a gift and it gave me a lift." Other magic produced by Watson

included birdie putts of 65, 30, 18, 10 and five feet. Watson only had one bogey in a round he described as "one in which I

was swinging very well." Watson said of the eagle, "I had a bare-dirt lie into the wind. I hit a three-quarter eight iron and it covered the flag, hitting 18 inches to the

right of the hole and then spinning

Playing an exhibition schedule requires Belinda to check out the tables before hand. She checks the rails to see how a bankshot will react and to determine if they are long or short. The pocket tendency and speed of the surface are also important factors.

For the beginning pool players, her tips are "make sure of the basics are solid. The bridge and stance should be steady and keep the head still."

And as for losing her shirt, it happens about eight to 10 times out of 100 of these challenge matches, which is a remarkable ratio, considering that most of the challenges come from men and a mere woman isn't supposed to compete in "their" game.

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
