actual 'power' of bomb

LOS ALAMOS, N.M. (AP) - The secret city on top of a remote northern New Mexico plateau was born in World War II out of fear that Nazi Germany might develop a weapon against which there was no

But the deputy director of the secret Manhattan Projects Norris E. Bradbury, says he believes scientists build bombs not to kill people but to bring them to the conference table.

Bradbury, the first director of Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory after the war, was here this weekend to attend the reunion of the pioneers of the Manhattan Project, formed in 1943 to develop and build an atomic bomb in time to affect the outcome of World War II.

The project culminated in the July 1945 detonation of the first atomic device in southern New Mexico and the dropping of the "Little Boy" and "Fat Man" bombs on Japan less than a month later.

Nuclear weapons have not been used in warfare since; and the péople who worked on the first bombs fear the world is forgetting the weapons' awesome capabilities.

Bradbury said he would require every high school senior to look at pictures of Nagasaki and Hiroshima. And Harold Agnew, LASL's second director, would have world leaders watch the detonation of a nuclear weapon — clad only in underwear so they could feel the weapon's intense

Agnew says one of his concerns is that soon "there will not be a single

leader of a major power who has witnessed a nuclear explosion.' "When that happens, then the balance of terror we have now will go away," he said. "And when that happens, we'll be in real trouble." Bradbury considers nuclear weapons a deterrent, but one that cannot be used in the modern world: "We can't use it in Iran. How many people

are you going to kill for 60 hostages?" Those attending the reunion said there was an intense feeling of excite-

ment and dedication behind the secret project. Agnew said the Allies didn't know how far the Germans and Russians had gotten in nuclear development. So Los Alamos was founded on 54,000 acres of federal preserve atop the Parajito Plateau, less than an hour's drive from Santa Fe. For 28 months, military and civilian scientists worked feverishly on the new technology.

The project remained top-secret throughout the war, but people outside saw tantalizing glimpses of the "Hill people."

Santa Fe residents could see lights and smoke and hear explosions. Troops drove hundreds of families to what was officially designated Post

When the atomic bombs were dropped on Japan in 1945, the secrecy ended. The Santa Fe New Mexican of Aug. 6, 1945, noted the capital had learned of a city of 6,000 in its own front yard.

The newspaper said there had been much speculation about what had been going on on the plateau. It said that during the 1944 election, Los Alamos had been discussed as an interment camp for Republicans while the latest rumor, No. 6,892, was that Los Alamos was working to produce windshield wipers for submarines.

The lab had been formed to build a bomb and there was a letdown when the work ended. But the lab remains.

Israeli patrol intercepts boat

naval patrol intercepted and killed three PLO terrorists in a speedboat early today, less than 24 hours after Prime Minister Menachem Begin's government warned the Common Market's call for involvement of the Palestine Liberation Organization in Mideast peace talks was an invitation to Nazi-like liquidation of the Jewish

Yasser Arafat's PLO claimed responsibility for the attempted sea raid on Israel's Mediterranean resort town of Nahariya and said the guerrillas clashed with Israeli forces to the north of the town "in a three-hour confrontation that left many enemy soldiers killed or wounded.

The Tel Aviv command said the The Tel Aviv command said the guerrillas were heading down the coast from Lebaron when their five ongoing Egyptian-Israeli negotiations coast from Lebanon when their fiberglass boat was intercepted by an Israeli patrol boat. The Palestinians fired with a rocket-propelled grenade at the patrol craft and the Israelis returned fire, sinking the boat and killing all aboard in a three-minute clash, a spokesman said.

One Israeli sailor was wounded in the clash in the Mediterranean, about a mile off the northern Israeli coastal town of Achziv, the spokesman said. It was the fourth time this year Israel said it had intercepted seaborne Palestinian raiders.

Begin, reading the unusually harsh Cabinet statement approved during its regular meeting Sunday, said Israel rejected Europe's call for involvement of the PLO, which he termed 'the Arab SS." The Common Market declaration was reminiscent of Europe's appeasement of Nazi Germany before World War 11 and a sellout to "totalitarian blackmail," the state-

ment said. The Cabinet referred to a recent vow to "liquidate" Israel by Al Fatah, the largest terrorist group within the PLO. "Since (Hitler's autobiographical manifesto) Mein Kampf was written, no words were ever more explicit the Jewish state and nation," it said. The statement also criticized the

Common Market offer to guarantee Israel's security, saying the Jewish state "asks for no security guarantees of any European people. Israel does - and shall know (how) to defend itself."

Begin was quoted as saying he would not receive a West German delegation sent by the nine Common Market countries to pursue the declaration, issued by the European summit in Venice Friday

The Europeans called for a Mideast peace based on several different principles: Israel's right to exist; the Palestinians' right to self-determination; security for all states in the

Bank of the Jordan River. The declaration also called on Israel to withdraw from occupied territories seized in the 1967 Mideast war and said the Common Market would not recognize any unilateral decision on the future of Jerusalem, the ancient city holy to Jews, Moslems and

Begin scored the Europeans on both counts, calling the document "interference" and indicating that Israel would ignore it. "Of the Venice document, nothing will remain but bitter memories," he said.

Israeli officials, who declined to be identified by name, also voiced concern over Secretary of State Edmund Muskie's Mideast policy statement last week and his reaction to the European move.

These officials noted that while Muskie ruled out talks with the PLO at this stage, he did not repeat the U.S. position against independence, clearly leaving statehood as an open

Muskie had also sent repeated signals to the PLO that a change in its policy toward Israel would make it acceptable as a negotiating partner,

Few answer boycott call

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - A nationwide job boycott planned by blacks to mark the fourth anniversary of the bloody Soweto riots apparently fizzled today despite early reports of absenteeism of 75-100 percent in Cape Town, the nation's oldest city. Police there said nonwhites were turning up at work in factories and stores by mid-morning.

Blacks in Soweto, the sprawling ghetto outside Johannesburg, virtually ignored the boycott call. They crowded buses and trains as usual to commute to work in Johannesburg. A planned memorial service in a church in Soweto was called off by Anglican Bishop Desmond Tutu, the black churchman who is secretary-general of the South African Council of Churches. He said church leaders did not want to expose worshippers to possible police action

A policeman was fatally stabbed taking part in a baton charge against demonstrating blacks in Cape Town late Sunday, and Police Commissioner, Gen. Mike Geldenhuys, told reporters he would not allow police offi-

cers to be assaulted and murdered. "If they (demonstrators) don't want to listen to reason other methods will be used to maintain law and order," he said.

Police patrolled Soweto's streets maintaining a low profile today following disturbances Sunday when some 100 black youths were locked out of a memorial service at a Roman Catholic church for the hundreds who died in the 1976 riots. Sporadic skirmishing went on for about five hours until dusk and police occasionally fired tear gas to disperse the crowds

The church was locked because of a government order last Friday banning all gatherings of more than 10 persons, an apparent attempt to prevent any violence before and during the Soweto anniversary. The ban lasts until the end of the month.

The Soweto riots broke out in the township of 2 million after black students rebelled against a government order that they learn Afrikaans, the language of the Dutch settlers. Violence spread to other black ghettos in this nation of 26 million, 19 million of whom are black.

By the time the fighting subsided in February 1977, some 575 people died and 3,900 were injured, the govern-

Supreme Court to settle dispute

It's White vs. prosecutors, vs. lots of emotion

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Attorney General Mark White thinks someone in Gov. Bill Clements' office set him up for a fall when Clements gave White \$232,000 last summer to help rural and small-town district attorneys with tough cases.

That is just part of the emotional atmosphere surrounding a a major dispute over prosecutor assistance that the Texas Supreme Court might decide this week.

On one side is White. On the other is the Texas Prosecutors Coordinating Council, the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and, behind the scenes, Clements' Criminal Justice Division.

Comptroller Bob Bullock was the catalyst that brought the dispute before the Supreme Court. Bullock declined to honor a voucher from the council for \$1,400 to pay Houston lawyer Robert Sussman to prosecute a complex white collar fraud case in Belton.

White issued an opinion June 4 saying Bullock was right, that a state budget provision requires White's certification before any state agency including the council — may hire an outside lawyer. The council, turned down by the court last month because Bullock had

not formally rejected the voucher, returned June 9, saying the issue now was "ripe" for a decision. If the court orders Bullock to pay Sussman, as the council requests, it

must also overrule White's opinion.

White is not entirely objective about the matter. He promised in his 1978 campaign to help local prosecutors with cases they lacked the resources to handle. Last summer, he persuaded Clements to grant his office \$232,000 from federal criminal justice funds for a rural prosecutors assistance program. One condition was the program would be evaluated in six months by a team from the council, the district attorneys association and the criminal justice divison. The team reported in February that White's program was ineffective, with lawyers assigned to

it spending 30 percent of their time on unrelated tasks.

Clements announced he was reducing the grant and would not renew it when it expired Aug. 1. He said the council alone would provide prosecutor assistance in the future. White complained publicly about Clements' action and discussed it in

bitter terms with a delegation from the District and County Attorneys Association whom he invited to his office on May 19. According to three persons who were present, White said he believed there was a preconceived plan in Clements' office to give White the

grant, then make White look bad by canceling it. "He was upset," said District Attorney John Green of Odessa. Steve Dial, acting executive director of the District and County Attor-

neys Association, said, "I haven't had many dealings with the attorney general, but this is the most animated I'd seen him.' White later confirmed he had met with the association's board and ex-

pressed his belief someone in Clements' office had set him up. "In a private conversation, I said that, yes. I will say that your sources are accurate. I think it (his belief) was absolutely correct," he said.

White invited the group to his office while they were deciding whether to file a brief with the Supreme Court in support of the prosecutors council's suit to force Bullock to pay Sussman.

Later, the board voted to file the brief, apparently the first time the District and County Attorneys Association has gone to court opposite an

The association and the council are closely entwined, and the association's president serves as council chairman.

Llano County Attorney Chris Mealy, one of those who met with White, said prosecutors feel more comfortable getting help through the council than from the attorney general.

"The attorney general is not as close to the prosecutors' situation as the council and can't be because of other interests," he said.

Clark returns to U.S., challenges prosecution

NEW YORK (AP) - Declaring "I am a free person and I speak my mind freely," Ramsey Clark has returned from Iran, challenging government officials to prosecute him.

At an airport news conference Sunday night, Clark said he was simply exercising his rights as an American when he violated President Carter's ban on travel to Iran and went to Tehran to participate in a 54-nation conference on U.S. "crimes" in Iran.

Clark, who was attorney general under President Lyndon B. Johnson. was to detail today nine steps the United States could take to gain freedom for the 53 American hostages held by Iranian militants since Nov.

The plan was outlined under Clark's which excerpted a copyright article from this week's Nation magazine.

In it, Clark urged that the United States stop harassing Iranian students in this country, end economic sanctions against Iran, give thanks that in 17 months no American has been "killed or injured in Iran by the Iranians," and pray that no harm will befall the hostages and that Iran will 'find a new fulfillment.'

renounce intervention by all nations in the affairs of others, announce support for international justice and the right to seek to extradite wrongdoers, enact a charter to assure control of the CIA, begin a Congressional inquiry into U.S. actions in Iran, and repent for the violent deaths "of 70,-

"But also in the name of the rule of law, President Carter shouldn't be politicizing the issue by casually making statements about his 'inclination' and his desire to punish," he

Carter said last week it was his "inclination" to prosecute Clark for violating the travel ban.

The Justice Department has not made it clear whether Clark will be prosecuted and subject to a possible 10 years in jail and \$50,000 fine. It has said Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti will decide.

Upon his arrival Sunday, Clark was questioned by U.S. Customs officials for about 45 minutes. He voluntarily let the officials take seven pamphlets containing a lecture by a Mideast leader, a 1906 copy of an Iranian

an airport spokesman said.

'It's doubtful the hostage issue would have been mentioned if we weren't there to mention it," Clark said, defending his attendance at the Iranian conference two weeks ago.

.He said several other nations attending the conference supported the U.S. delegation in calling for the release of the American hostages, and also in his criticism of the Soviet

military intervention in Afghanistan. Clark said he had not seen the hostages and had no news on prospects for their release. He warned further that "each aggressive act by the United States prolongs the holding





Jury selection begins for Nazis, Klansmen

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Jury selection began under tight security this morning for the murder trial of six Ku Klux Klansmen and American Nazis charged in the shootings of five communist activists.

The 140-seat courtroom where the trial will be held was less than threequarters full as the proceedings

"Nothing's going to happen," court-appointed defense attorney Robert Cahoon said as he went into the courtroom. "We'll examine jurors, and it will be a very boring day.' Security personnel used metal de-

tectors to screen everyone going into the courtroom and searched purses and other articles carried by those Tearful wives and friends of the six defendants gathered in a hall outside

"I'm going to sit and watch," said Imperial Wizard Joe Grady of the White Knights of Liberty. "I'm not going to bear any arms. I'm going to obey the laws of Greensboro although I think this was a shaft job from the very beginning.

Superior Court Judge James Long, who will preside at the trial, ordered deputies to search everyone who enters the courtroom. He also ordered the room be searched every morning

Economic summit next weekend ference will be attended by France,

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter and leaders of six other nations plan to devise a 1980s treatment for their countries' economic ills at next weekend's summit conference in Venice. It may provide sugar coating for some bitter pills.

There has been speculation for weeks that Carter and the other leaders might postpone the June 22-23 economic summit meeting because of mounting disagreements among them on a variety of issues, including sanctions against Iran and relations with the Soviet Union in the wake of the Afghanistan invasion.

However, U.S. officials say there is more to be gained than lost by holding the summit as scheduled. One official said privately that postponing it could place the future of summitry in jeop-

The main reason for the summit is to help provide international backing to individual leaders seeking support for unpopular policies at home, one official said.

"They provide collective reinforcement for actions which are tough to take domestically." he said. As an example, he cited policies that lead to higher unemployment.



The proposed 1981 social services program for Texas residents has been prepared by the Texas Department of Human Resources.

COMPREHENSIVE ANNUAL SERVICES PROGRAM PLAN FOR TEXAS

October 1, 1980 to September 30, 1981

The Texas social services program helps residents support and take care of themselves, adjust to independent living, and offers

SERVICES OFFERED: Day care and protective services for children; services to aged, blind, and disabled adults; family planning, emergency family services; and employment services. Most services will be available throughout Texas, but some may have limited funding. Some services may be expanded as funds become available.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? Recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), or Supplemental Security Income (SSI).

Some services will be provided to people in need whose incomes are below 52 percent of the state's median income, adjusted for family size. (For example, the income of a family of four must be less than \$886.39 per month.)

Some services for aged, blind, and disabled adults will be provided to persons with incomes up to 67 percent of the state's me-

Eligible income levels are listed in the proposed plan. Protective services and information and referral will be given to persons regardless of their income.

STANDARDS FOR FACILITIES SERVING SSI RECIPIENTS: The plan includes information about standards for residential facilities (not certified for Medicare or Medicaid) which serve SSI recipients, and lists the names and addresses of agencies that will furnish information about standards, their enforcement, waivers, and the identity of deficient facilities.

SOURCES OF FUNDS: Total estimated annual budget is \$223,474,150. The source of funds is federal \$149,148,633; non-federal \$74,325,517. %

So it really came as no surprise last week when Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, Iran's ruler of absurdity, changed his colors again, metamorphosizing for the umpteenth time since the exercise in ' futility began last November.

The ayatollah, warning that Iran's internal strife could cause his regime to self-destruct, called upon Islamic hardliners controlling the embryonic Parliament to end the political war they've been waging against President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr.

"We should all come together and improve the country, which is so chaotic now and which is subjected to an onslaught from all directions," Khomeini urged.

WASHINGTON - The road to Capitor Hill is paved with good intentions. Once a newcomer arrives, though, the good intentions have a way of dissi-

WASHINGTON-MERRY-GO-ROUND

I've caught a freshman senator, Donald Stewart, D-Ala., in a classic case of good intentions gone bad with a lot less publicity than attended the announcements.

When Stewart arrived here in January 1979, to replace the late Sen. James Allen, he told a Washington Post reporter he was forswearing future campaign contributions from special interest groups. He acknowledged that he had accepted \$164,000 olitical action committees," but said that was it. No

"I'm not saying that (kind of) money is bad," he explained. "I know I took it and I don't feel any morecommitment to those that gave it. What bothers me is, that money doesn't reflect individual participation or building a strong base. If you depend solely on special interests,

you're cheating the system." Since this public-spirited pronouncement, however, Stewart has accepted 82 additional PAC contributions of about \$160,000, bringing the total he has accepted to more than \$300,000. Most of the contributions parallel his Senate committee assignments - the traditional route for special-interest largesse.

- Stewart has received \$78,000 in re-election campaign donations from corporate and other special-interest groups affected by actions of the Senate Banking Committe, on which he

- Of this sum, bank and savingsand-loan PACs alone have given Stewart \$33,500. Even Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, who is widely regarded as the bankers' voice in the Senate,



received only \$11,150 during the same period of time.

- Labor groups with direct interest in Banking Committee activities have given Stewart \$85,300

- Stewart has received \$23,500 from insurance industry PACS (including \$11,500 from American Family Life Insurance Co.; a leading purveyor of controversial cancer policies.) Stewart is chairman of the Banking subcommittee on insurance.

- Stewart has accepted \$54,150 from political action committees interested in legislation before the Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee, of which he is also a

When my associate Toni Capac went to Stewart's office to inquire about the strange demise of the senator's good intentions, an aide said Stewart had simply changed his mind a couple of weeks after the Post interview. He said the turnabout had been printed somewhere, but he couldn't remember where.

Stewart later confirmed that "I simply changed my mind," but said he didn't know if the change had been publicly reported. It has been, now.

· The labor tycoons have used their political clout to get special labor laws and safety regulations intended to put them on an equal footing with the big employers. Large corporations can put up with federal nitpicking that can wipe out small, marginal


The politicians, who are not under the thumbs of the corporations or unions, tend to look upon the voters as consumers. Federal laws and regulations, therefore, favor the consumers and discriminate against small entre-

Yet small businesses form the backbone of the free enterprise system; an impressive 97 percent of all companies in America are small businesses. They have introduced most of the major inventions and innovations that affect our daily lives.

Now small businessmen feel that their resourcefulness is being stifled, their productivity suffocated, their willingness to take risks discouraged by an unsympathetic government.

AFGHANISTAN HOSPITALITY: According to an underground report, Afghan guerrillas left a welcome sign in the foothills of their mountain base. The sign, scrawled in Russian, de-clared: "Welcome Russians! If the extreme altitude, severe cold, desolation, snowslides and wolves don't get you, we will."

WATCH ON WASTE: When the Department of Commerce decided to set up a "floating department store" - a ship that would display American goods to potential Japanese customers -- the agency's poohbahs felt that none of their own people could do the job. So they hired an outside consultant for \$25,000. Various problems arose, and the department canceled the consultant's contract early after paying \$8,000. Then it was decided that Commerce employees could indeed handle the job - which they did, admirably.

If there is a need to protect farmlands, then buy the development rights contract with the farmer to keep his land in agricultural use but pay him just compensation. If there is a need for zoning to guide development, then zone, but do not allow zoning to be used as a means to confiscate proper-

BIB's artful finagling helps to achieve its ends

WASHINGTON - The power of the liberal network of congressional and bureaucratic staff aides has been demonstrated again in their apparently successful campaign to bar Leo Cherne, an internationally beloved figure working with refugees, from the Board for International Broadcasting (BIB), which governs vital broadcasts to communist Eastern Eu-Cherne is inclined to reject appoint-

ment to the board despite urgings from the White House. This confirms the staff network's hidden power to override top-level government offi-cials behind their backs. It also reflects the policy split over whether detente still ought to be enshrined. Cherne is among those who believe that era has passed, and that U.S. broadcasts must toughen up. The campaign against Cherne, at 67 a world leader in international rescue

and refugee work, was plotted by the BIB's chief of staff, Walter Roberts, working covertly with staff aides of several liberal senators. Radio Free Europe and Radio Lib-

efty, controlled by the BIB, broadcast to Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union. Both had heavy CIA financing until 1973. The campaign put on by Roberts and the Senate staffers implied, falsely, that if appointed chairman of the five-member board, Cherne would fall under CIA influ-

No member of the board, Cherne writes, "can more than casually assess operations of the magnitude to be performed" by the two radios. Consequently, the BIB staff's authority is "more than normal or desirable." Cherne's prescription: "The next chairman of BIB must, whatever the resistance from his colleagues who

may cherish their distinction and tasks, move to bring the existence of the BIB to an end.

Whether or not Roberts ever read Cherne's memo, he and the rest of the BIB staff surely knew their life-anddeath powers over the radios would end under Chairman Cherne. Roberts was present with staff

aides of Sen. Claiborne Pell, chairman of the foreign relations subcommittee overseeing the radios, at a long, unannounced meeting in Pell's office the last week of April. That week Gronouski's three-year term came to an end (though he continues as chairman in the absence of a replacement.) At the meeting in Pell's office, a

letter was drafted to President Carter that took dead aim at Cherne's appointment: "We believe the work of a decade in assuring the professional integrity of RFE/RL would be undone if any of the present members of the BIB were to be replaced by persons who could even remotely be identified as presently or formerly associated with the CIA or intelligence activities

in any capacity."
The network was energized. Aides secured the signatures of Pell and three other detentist members of the foreign relations committee: Chairman Frank Church, Jacob Javits and

Charles H. Percy.
The letter blackballed Leo Cherne. a longtime member of the president's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board (now abolished.) Roberts had the letter leaked to the New York Times two weeks later. The Times story falsely charged that the International Rescue Committee (then, as now, headed by Cherne) "reportedly received \$15,-000 in CIA money in the mid-1960s."

That raised suspicions that Roberts was the source of the false informa-

The strategy of Roberts and his BIB staff was clear: With the support of four prominent senators and the redherring warning about a return to evil CIA influence, Cherne was a goner. But at least one senator signed the

letter without spotting the booby trap. After the letter leaked last month, a sorrowful Javits said publicly nobody had told him "of any name" being considered for appointment. "I had not the foggiest notion of any indivdual, and certainly not Leo Cherne,"

Such is the artful way of the staff network, overriding policies of the highest officials, slithering through subterranean corridors of power to gain its ends. The result is bad business as usual, no change in the BIB and no needed improvement in carrying America's message into the Soviet empire.

Stock market loses

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market turned lower today as the federal government and the steel industry reported new signs of a deepening recession. Analysts worried the downturn would swell the federal budget deficit and hamper the government's anti-inflation efforts.

Projections of lower short-term interest rates continued, with Continental Illinois National Bank joining several others in reducing its prime lending rate a half-point to 12 percent.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials was off 2.48 at 873.89 at noon, with declines leading advances 6-5 on the New York Stock Exchange. NYSE volume came to 14.2 million shares after two hours of trading, down from 19.18 million at noon Friday

MCI Communications, winner of \$1.8 billion judgment against American Telephone & Telegraph in a federal court antitrust suit, jumped 11/4 to 91% bid in over-the-counter trading. AT&T led the NYSE most-actives, falling 1% at 53%.

New life forms can be patented

WASHINGTON (AP) - New forms of life created through "genetic engineering" can be patented, a deeply divided Supreme Court ruled today. By a 5-4 vote, the justices said the government must approve a patent request made by General Electric employee Ananda Chakrabarty for a laboratory-developed bacterium that eats crude oil more quickly and effi-

ciently than natural bacteria. The Carter administration had opposed the granting of such patents, telling the court about the "very significant" economic implications "given the vast area that it opens to patentability."

The court's majority opinion, writ-ten by Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, said Chakrabarty's micro-organism fits the definition of "manufacture" and "composition of matter" covered by federal patent law.

"Congress is free to amend (the applicable patent law) so as to exclude from patent protection organisms produced by genetic engineering. Or it may choose to craft a statute specifically designed for such living things," Burger said.
"But until Congress takes such ac-

tion, this court must construe the language of (the law) as it is. The language of that section fairly embraces (Chakrabarty's) invention." Dear Dr. Solomon: My sister has undergone surgery for breast cancer. I would like to know in general how common the disease is, and more specifically, whether my sister's illness makes it more likely that I will develop breast cancer at some time in my life. - Tillie.

Dear Tillie: According to the National Cancer Institute, three groups of women are considered to be at greatest risk of developing breast cancer. They include older women, women with a personal history of the disease and women whose mothers or sisters had breast cancer.

In general, the longer a woman lives, the greater her chance of developing the disease. The incidence inceases rapidly as a woman enters her forties, levels off between ages 45 and 55 and then continues to rise at a more gradual rate. Post-menopausal women are thus at higher risk.

In addition, women who have had The NYSE's composite index slid breast cancer are more likely to de-.16 to 65.97; the American Stock Ex. velop another. The disease tends to change's market value index fell 1.61 occur in both breasts, with some studies indicating that from 10 to 25 percent of women with cancer in one breast will at some time develop it in the other.

women who are descendats of European Jews.

Another factor that appears to have some bearing on the risk of breast cancer is a women's pattern of menstrual activity. Women with a long menstrual history — that is, an early onset and late menopause — are at higher than average risk. Those less susceptible to breast cancer include women with a natural early meno-

artificially early menopause. Finally, the age at which a women completes her first full-term pregnancy has a bearing on her rish for developing breast cancer, with pregnancy before age 30 appearing to offer some protection. A woman who has her first child before 18 years of age has about one-third the risk of breast cancer as a woman whose first child is born after age 35.

No clues in Wylie ax murder

WYLIE, Texas (AP).—Shocked by the gruesome bludgeoning death of a 30-year-old mother, residents of the quiet town spent the weekend behind locked doors for fear the ax-wielding killer would strike again.

But Justice of the Peace John "Buddy" Newton said he believed residents had nothing to fear. The murder, he speculated, was purely personal and did not indicate, as some townspeople fear, that a "pyscho" was on the loose.

Former schoolteacher Betty Gore was hacked to death Friday in her \$75,000 home by a killer who apparently struck her repeatedly with the family's three-foot ax, then washed off her blood in one of the home's showers.

"Think of yourself lying on your back and someone smashing an ax through your head three times," he said. "She was damn near dismembered."

Police said Sunday they had neither a suspect or a motive. Sunday, Dallas police picked up a man for questioning, but he

was not arrested or charged in connection with the slaying. "A couple of waitresses overheard him talking about the case and we picked him up," said Dallas homicide investigator J.H. Gholston. "We talked to him and Wylie (police) talked to him, but there isn't anything to link him to it (the Gore slaying).'

The burn center said Saturday that the surgery would remove "as much dead skin as possible." Spokesman Gary Swaye said the procedure, called debridement, is commonly done prior to skin graft-

"If (the operation) does go through Tuesday, then they'll be looking at grafting three to five days later," Swaye said.

Doctors had said Pryor had less than a 50 percent chance of survival, based on severity of the burns for a person his age and his heart attack two years ago. 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Civilietti to make decision on Clark

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department said Saturday that Attorney General Benjamin Civilietti still plans to make the final decision on whether to prosecute Ramsey Clark, despite a published report that President Carter intends to make that call

The Washington Star, in Saturday's editions, said Carter is determined to have the final say on taking action against Clark, a former attorney general who violated the president's ban

The newspaper story was attributed to a senior White House official whose name was not disclosed.

Asked about the Star's report, White House press secretary Jody Powell said he would have no comment.

But other senior administration officials cast doubt on its. accuracy in interviews with The Associated Press, which suggests there may be disagreement on the matter within the White

The AP sources said it would be highly unusual, if not unprecedented, for the president to so usurp the prerogative of his attorney general.

At the Justice Department, spokesman John Russell said, "We know of no change in the plan to have the Clark case reviewed by the heads of the civil and criminal divisions, and a final decision made by the attorney general.

We know of no departure from the previous practice that the White House will not dictate whether we prosecute or not." Russell noted that "constitutionally, the president has that authority, but we're sure he would take the recommendation of his top law enforcement officer."

The AP sources, who asked not to be quoted, said although the president has the constitutional duty to enforce the laws, the attorney general's decision on whether to prosecute normally would be final.

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

That was the exhortation that Jack Nicklaus got all weekend from his familiarly flamboyant caddy,

On a heavy, humid Sunday over the rolling termin. of the Baltusrol golf course, the man they call the Golden Bear finally responded.

With emphasis. The king of golf is not dead!

Stash away those obituaries. Forget the eulogies. Save those testimonials for another day.

In winning his fourth U.S. Open Championship his 17th major professional title, his 19th if you want to include his two National Amateur crowns, not to mention those 67 tour victories - Big Jack not only answered his keenest rival, Tom Watson, but the entire golf world.

Watson, Player of the Year for the last three years and with a big lead toward taking the honor for a fourth time, had raised the question Saturday while pointing to his Sunday showdown against the guy he had beaten in dramatic personal duels for the Masters and British Open crowns in 1977.

"If Jack wins on Sunday, he may retire," Watson told the press gathering. "I have a feeling it is going through his mind."

Nicklaus when he appeared before the press battery about 30 minutes later.

"I will answer that question tomorrow when the tournament is over," Jack replied, with a glint in his

"I will tell you — and I will tell Tom Watson."

One might have observed a menacing warning in Nicklaus' tone, but Watson's observation was mistaken. Nicklaus is sticking around a bit longer.

Except for the significance of it, it wasn't an overwhelming, nerve-stabbing triumph. Nicklaus, who once grabbed a course by the nape of the neck and shook it to death, merely carved his pars'in almost boring succession and dared his rivals to

None of them did. Not the classy Tom Watson, the recognized heir apparent. Not Isao Aoki, the Japanese magician who makes 20-foot putts disappear with an unorthodox stroke of the blade. Not Lee Trevino, the garrulous but gifted Super Mex. Not those three pretenders hardly anybody knew -Keith Fergus, Lon Hinkle and Mark Hayes.

The gods willed that it should be Jack Nicklaus' day, and it was, leading us to wonder how many more such days are left for this remarkable athlete, champion and superstar, one of the giants of the

This victory places him on that rarefied summit of

golf with the only other three players able to win the toughest and most prestigious of tournaments four times: Scottish immigrant Willie Anderson, who did it back at the turn of the century; the immortal amateur, Bobby Jones, and the wee Ice Mon, Ben

Earlier they said that Nicklaus had lost his knockout punch. No longer could he step into the arena and demolish his foes — as a Jack Dempsey or Joe

Jack almost acknowledged as much when he said he had a good chance to virtually run away from the field Saturday yet failed to do so.

He told critics: "You can't go back. You can't be what you were yesterday. You have to work with the best you have today.'

Thus, on Sunday, Jack's sabre was patience ... patience and poise. Determined, his boyish face a mask of concentration, he hammered out those relentless pars, 12 of them through the first 16 holes until he came to those two backbreaking finishing

Bang, bang. Birdie, birdie. A 68. Victory. The champ had done it again - a kayo in the 15th. At age

"I thought a lot this year about not playing anymore," a choked up Nicklaus said afterward. "But the way I played today ... and this crowd ... I have to keep playing."

He'll leave this world dressed in Cub uniform

WASHBURN, III. (AP) - When Maniford "Hack" Harper dies, and his friends and relatives stand before his easket and bow their heads for one last look, they'll see he wasn't kid-

Harper will be wearing a white jersey, a pair of knickerbockers and a bright blue cap with a red "C" on the front. Because when he leaves this earthly veil, Harper plans to do it in a Chicago Cubs uniform.

"They're my whole life," said Harper, still very much alive at 65. 'Without the Cubs, I'd be crazy."

He has made arrangements with a local mortician to be buried in a uniform he bought from the Cubs organization several years ago. It is in mothballs, prepared for the day he will be laid to rest.

Harper says his devotion to the team began in Shriner's Hospital in Oak Park in 1926 when he was 11 years old. Severely striken with polio, he had been paralyzed on the right side of his body since he was 17 months old.

Harper says Cubs immortal Hack Wilson visited the hospital with some fellow players, walked up to him, tapped him on the shoulder and said: 'Stick it out kid. Someday you'll be able to walk.

From that day on, Harper and the Chicago Cubs were inseparable. Folks started calling him Hack, after the Cubs' outfielder.

At 13, Harper went to a traveling tatoo parlor at a medicine show on the outskirts of Washburn and had the word "Cubs" engraved on his left forearm in inch-high letters.

When his parents asked what he'd like for his high school graduation gift, Harper said he wanted \$25 to travel to Chicago and see a week's worth of Cubs games.



Israeli TV to air 'Death of Princess'

TEL AVIV. Israel (AP) - Nearly 8 million Arabs will be able to view "Death of a Princess," the docudrama about the execution of a Saudi princess thathas been denounced by Saudi rulers, when it is broadcast in the Mideast for the first time tonight on Israel television

Broadcast authority spokesman Moshe Amirav estimated 6 million people in Egypt, Lebanon and Jordan would be able to receive Israel's TV signal for the 9:30 p.m. broadcast. Another 1.7 million Arabs live in Israel and the occupied West Bank.of the Jordan River and Gaza Strip.

Saudi rulers have branded the film, which depicts the executions of both the princess and her commoner lover, defamatory and an insult to Islam. The film, broadcast on public television in the United States last month, was banned throughout the Arab world. It has been shown in several European coun-

Spokesmen for Israel television stressed the decision to broadcast the film was based on merit, not

The two-hour film will be broadcast in English with Hebrew and Arabic subtitles. It will be followed by a half-hour panel discussion, the spokesmen

Three killed in Turkey in alleged terrorist attack

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) - Gunmen believed to be leftist terrorists shot and killed an army lieutenant, a soldier and a policeman during the night, authorities reported.

The lieutenant and soldier were on night patrol in

an army jeep in Kartal, about 25 miles east of Istanbul, when the gunmen opened fire with automatic weapons, police sources reported. An army task force had been sent to the low-in-

come area to quell an unauthorized demonstration by leftist groups marking the 10th anniversary of a labor movement in Istanbul.

Police arrested more than 100 persons at the end of a brief clash with the group.

The policeman was killed when fighting broke out between security forces and extremist elements pasting political posters on walls in Aydin, in west-

An estimated 1,700 persons have been killed since the minority government of Premier Suleyman Demirel took over Nov. 25. Martial law has been declared in 20 of the nation's 67 provinces.

New Hebrides officals to attempt negotiation

PORT VILA, New Hebrides (AP) - New Hebrides government representatives will fly to the rebellious islands of Espiritu Santo and Tanna on Tuesday in a final attempt to negotiate a settlement to a revolt now in its third week, a government spokesman said today.

The spokesman said the negotiations would be the government's last effort to end the insurrection before considering the use of military force.

The government's offer, which has an "un-negotiable condition" that government officials must be allowed back onto Santo, came 24 hours after 200 British Royal Marine commandos landed in Port Vila, the capital of the New Hebrides.

Six-foot crack threatens 'The Last Supper' fresco

MILAN, Italy (AP) -A six-foot crack has cials said. These probopened on one side of the wall on which Leonardo da Vinci's famous masterpiece "The Last Supper" is painted, art offi-cials said today.

The fissure, half an inch wide, is on the right side of the painting just inches from the figure of the Apostle John. Officials, who declined to be identified, would not say immediately how much of the crack is in the painting itself.

The crack is only the latest of many problems that have troubled the work of art since it was painted in 1496 in the refectory of the Santa Maria delle Grazie church in this major business center. Several years ago art experts discovered that a kind of mold was eating away at the colors of the fres-

The crack was probably caused by vibrations from heavy downtown traffic in the area where the church is located or by a sinking of the

ground underneath, offilems have also affected other city monuments, such as Milan's famous Gothic cathedral. Leonardo's "Last Sup-

per" - 29 feet long and 15 feet high - is considered one of the greatest frescoes ever painted because of its masterful use of light and perspec-

The fresco shows Jesus surrounded by apostles at the Last Supper. The Tuscan artist painted it for Lodovico il Moro, the duke of Milan and a member of the powerful

Sforza family. The painting has previously survived a Napoleonic invasion, when the chapel was used as a stable, and a 1943 bombing, which badly damaged the church but not the

Hostage crisis 'not isolated issue

The hostage crisis can be solved only as part of a comprehensive settlement of all U.S.-Iranian problems, Iran's foreign minister said today. Meanwhile, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's revolutionary guardsmen were to lead a mass march on the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, where some of the 53 hostages were believed spending their 226th day in captivity.

"The hostage crisis is not an isolated issue." Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh told a news conference at Iran's foreign ministry. "It can be solved only through a comprehensive settlement of all Iran-U.S. problems." He did not elaborate, but up to now Iran's main conditions for release of the hostages have been the return of the ousted shah and

Ghotbzadeh also attacked Iran's dominant Islamic Republican Party and pro-Moscow Communist Party, accusing their newspapers of "collusion to force Iran into international isolation." Again, he did

Thousands of Iranians were expected to turn out for today's march and rally marking the birthday of the Iman Husein, patron of Iran's dominant Shijte Moslem sect, who was born in 626 a.d. Tehran Radio said Khomeini's son, Ahmad, and President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr would address the crowd outside the "American den of espionage."

The rally follows Khomeini's weekend declarations calling for a "Cultural Revolution" in Iran to "finish the enemies of God," and his demand that non-Moslems be purged from the state-run radio and television networks, the primary voices of the Khomeini regime. The statements appeared to signal a new bid by Khomeini to eliminate opponents of his religious-rooted revolution.

There should not be any anti-Islamic idea of element in the mass media," Khomeini was quoted as telling the radio and television directors in a meet nothing between you and .. Sunday, "Radio must be a tool to disseminate Islam ic ideas and teachings.

On Saturday, Khomeini called for the "Cultural Revolution" and said Moslem clergymen should be put in charge of Iran's educational system.

'All schools and universities established under the reign of the (deposed) shah must be placed under a direct control in order to protect their students from the danger of contamination of ideas contrary to the values of Islam," he was quoted as saying.

His latest crackdown on non-Moslem allies in the revolution came less than a month after Khomeini tried to purge leftists from the universities in


blood was spilled last Thursday when Moslem hardliners attacked a rally of 100,000 Iranian leftists at a stadium near the U.S. compound.

When the brawling crowds swept toward the embassy, revolutionary guardsmen in the street and Moslem militants in the U.S. compound opened fire on the rioters with automatic weapons, killing five and injuring about 300, the Iranian media reported. The shooting heightened speculation that a number of American hostages remained in the embassy despite their militant jailers' claims that the captives were dispersed to some 15 Iranian cities to head off any new rescue attempts by the United

The rioting also underlined the rift between Khomeini's Moslem militants and the leftist factions that united with him to topple Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi's government 16-months-ago.

The revolutionary government continued its purge of the shah's supporters with the weekend execution of a retired army colonel, accused of helping place the shah in power in 1953, arresting Khomeini during anti-shah demonstrations 10 years later, and torturing prisoners for SAVAK, the shah's secret police. Firing squads also executed a dozen other "corrupt" persons convicted of drug smuggling, prostitu-

tion or homosexuality. Revolutionary court judge Ayatollah Sadegh Khalkhali, who has condemned dozens of alleged drug peddlers as chief of Iran's war on drugs,



squads that have taken about 1,000 lives since the revolution.

Meanwhile, Syrian U.N. envoy Adib Daoudi left Iran today to report to U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim in New York on his three-week effort to revive the work of the U.N. commission on fran. The five member commission visited Iran in March to hear Iranian grievances against America, but the members suspended their mission when Iran refused to let them see the U.S. hostages.

FCC may reconsider 5-year-old prime-time access limit ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Communications Commission may soon reconsider its controversial 5year-old rule barring major television networks from completely dominating prime-time viewing hours.

The FCC designed its prime-time access rule to limit the amount of nightime network programming and to promote variety for viewers.

But while it has spawned a few critically acclaimed shows such as 'Westinghouse's "PM Magazine," observers note the rule also is responsible for the proliferation of syndicated

And critics point out the rule's application has led to some unexpected results, such as the decision earlier this month in which the commission agreed a complete review might be in

That decision involved the denial of a waiver to an Indianapolis station that wanted to air "The Pink Panther" cartoon series on Saturday nights. The waiver was denied even though one goal of the access rule is to increase the amount of children's programming during early evening

The commission concluded WTHR-TV had not shown any special circumstances that would justify a onetime waiver of the prime-time access rule, but rather was using the waiver process to attack the rule itself. The FCC then surprised the TV industry, however, by announcing it was seriously considering the start of a rule-making proceeding that could lead to repeal or modification of the

prime-time access rule, or PTAR as

it's known to the industry.

So while there might not be too many people who care if "The Pink Panther" makes it on Indianapolis television Saturday nights, the decision could signal the reexamination of a rule that affects millions of

The rule bars TV stations in the top 50 markets, if they're affiliated with a network, from carrying more than three hours of network or former network programming each evening. Network news doesn't count toward

the three-hour maximum if it follows an hour-long local news program. Documentaries, public affairs and children's programs are exempt "on nights other than Saturdays."

WTHR-TV wanted to combine "The Pink Panther" with "The Muppets" to form "an ideal early Saturday evening program block, appealing for family viewing. ...

The station argued "The Pink Panther," a former network program, was clearly a children's show and thus should be exempt from PTAR. Pointing to the rule, the FCC said it was exempt on any night but Satur-

'Saturdays seemed significant to the commission when it adopted PTAR in 1975," explained the FCC's John H. Bass. "With many stations moving to a full hour of local news, followed by a half-hour of network news, only 30 minutes of access time is left on the weekdays. So Saturday becomes the only night available for hour-long programs.

"Also, with the game shows that so many stations are airing, Saturday ends up being the only day for locally produced programs," Bass said.

But the station countered that "it simply defies reason for the FCC to encourage early-evening children's programs via the PTAR exemption, and then bar such wholesome material on Saturday.

When the matter was presented the commission, it became clear th several members were wondering if PTAR was really working. Then game the announcement that the FCC might reexamine the rule "in the fairly near future," possibly this

"If television means anything, it's localism - local operators trying to figure out what local residents would like to watch," says WTHR's Washington attorney, Vic Ferrall. "It's about time they reconsider the whole

Draft plan one vote away from approval

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter's stand-by draft registration program appears only one House vote away from winning final congressional approval this week.

The House will vote on eliminating the only discrepancy between the versions already approved by it and the Senate - a difference of \$10,000 in how much to spend on the plan.

The Senate voted Thursday to appropriate \$13.3 million to begin registering an estimated 4 million men aged 19 and 20. The bill passed earlier by the House provided for \$10,000

Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Byrd called the difference "trifling" and predicted the House would concur with the Senate action.

Registration is expected to begin in mid-July and be spread over two weeks, with men born in 1960 registering at post offices one week and men born in 1961, the next.

The American Civil Liberties Union has threatened, however, to file suit against the plan, the ACLU maintains the program discriminates against men by excluding women.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Hoping to keep the world's largest aircraft from being cut into eight pieces, demonstrators rallied outside the hangar where Howard Hughes' "Spruce

Goose" is kept. The giant piece of aviation history built by the late billionaire recluse has been stored in the T-shaped hang-

ar for most of its life. About 175 people rallied in support of the flying boat Saturday. Summa Corp., Hughes' holding company, has said it will go ahead with plans to dismantle the 320-foot wingspan seaplane in about two weeks, splitting it into eight sections for display at vari-

After waiting for supporters to gather \$750,000 to assure a new home for the "Spruce Goose," Summa an-nounced May 21 that the plane would have to be cut up because it had to honor a contract with the Port Authority of Long Beach to vacate the hangar. Construction of an oil handling terminal is to begin at the site

Dick Gunton, a spokesman for the Committee to Save the Hughes' Flying Boat, said Sunday he has hopes the craft can be saved. But he said the group had not received any replies after asking several large corpora-tions to put up the money needed to keep the plane in one piece.

The museums have indicated a willingness to forgo receiving the parts if the flying boat can be preserved in

books, original artwork and one-of-a-kind props, miniatures and costumes were on display. Other oddities were a seven-foot gorilla suit, a miniature helicopter from the remake of "King Kong," a one-man submarine from the James Bond film "Diamonds are Forever," and what was

described as a gremarkably lifelike mannequin head of a dismembered woman." The auction was the brainchild of Charles Band, a 28-year-old producer and a life-long collector of movie posters and comic books.

"This is a new, hot area of collecting," he said.

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




