# U.S. concedes Hussein won't play accord role

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter greeted Jordan's King Hussein today, stressing that there is "a great deal in common" between the United States and Jordan but acknowledging differences about the best route to peace in the Middle East.

Chief among those differences is Hussein's refusal to play the role Carter envisioned for Jordan in the Camp David accords between Israel

and Egypt. The disagreement about Camp David is so deep that State Depart-ment officials told reporters before Hussein's arrival that they were under no illusions that the king would

# Anderson rejects GM heir; Reagan cuts European trip By the Associated Press son a part in presidential debates this "We're not interested in having John B. Anderson says he'can do

without the ideas of a General Motors millionaire as to what's good for John B. Anderson.

Anderson disowned on Monday the repeated efforts by GM heir Stewart Mott to inject himself into the Illinois congressman's independent campaign for president.

Anderson, who most recently was irritated by Mott's declaration to a Massachusetts newspaper that campaign manager Michael MacLeod should be fired, wrote a letter to the Federal Election Commission saying the maverick magnate's efforts in his behalf were not an "authorized activi-

Mott, according to sources who requested anonymity, wanted the manager's job for himself.

'However well-intentioned, Mr. Mott 's activities have proven disruptive," Anderson wrote. The letter was an attempt by Anderson to dissuade the FEC from counting Mott's expenditures, including newspaper advertisements, against his campaign.

The Republican nominee-in-waiting, Ronald Reagan, meanwhile courted the editorial boardrooms of the eastern media on Monday and breezed through another "unity dinner" aimed at paying off the debts of

his former GOP opponents. Reagan lunched at Time Magazine and dined at the New York Times before supping yet again at a \$500per-plate fundraiser at New York's Pierre Hotel, where former Texas Gov. John B. Connally extolled him as the best of all campaigners.

The former California governor planned sessions with the Hearst editorial board and with Newsweek Magazine today. Meanwhile, aides disclosed that he had rejected a recommendation by foreign policy adviser Richard V. Allen that he vist Europe after collecting the Republican nomination next month.

Reagan decided he would rather spend that time developing his positions on domestic issues, they said. In other developments:

-A bipartisan group of 10 members of Congress tentatively agreed to help in any way they can to insure Ander-

-In Washington, the rival camps of President Carter and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy took their battle over the 1980 Democratic platform behind closed doors, with Kennedy forces expecting a drubbing on the first go-

A 15-member drafting subcommittee, of which nine members are solid Carter supporters, began work on its first draft of the party platform in executive session. The drafting session follows a round of public hearings that wound up Saturday.

"Obviously, we're going to be outvoted," said Kennedy spokesman Jim Flug.

But one member of the drafting panel, Carter supporter Rep. Lindy Boggs, D-La., said she thinks the drafting panel can arrive at a consensus document acceptable to both Carter and Kennedy people.

"I'm not approaching it from a biased point of view," she said in an interview. "I'm sure there will be some clearcut differences. There are always controversies. But I think we'll be able to arrive a consensus that all Democrats running for office can live with and be proud of."

Kennedy aide Steve Schlesinger said the senator's representatives were submitting a detailed platform statement today, but did not believe a consensus was possible. Schlesinger predicted a floor fight at the Democratic National Convention would be necessary to resolve differences.

Carter was represented by Stuart Eizenstat, his domestic affairs ad-

Flug said that on losing votes, Kennedy forces would seek to amend the document that emerges from the drafting panel when the full 158-member Platform Committee meets publicly this weekend to work on it.

'Thus I don't think there'll be much excitement in the drafting committee, since everything will be fought all over again before the full committee," the Kennedy spokesman said.

In any case, some of the fights will likely end up on the floor of the Aug. 11-14 Democratic Convention in New

The Democratic rivals differ the most on energy and economic issues, with Kennedy favoring wage and price controls, reimposition of price lids on oil and natural gas and a \$12 billion anti-recession program to create jobs - positions all strongly opposed by the president.

Democratic presidential nomination in the bag, Kennedy has vowed to fight on all the way to the convention - both on his own behalf and in hopes of shaping the platform.

Carter submitted a proposed 75page platform to the Democratic National Committee last week that offered a continuation of the policies his administration has backed and ad-

vanced over the past four years. The DNC staff prepared a skeleton platform, consisting in part of planks left over from the 1976 Democratic platform and issues on which Carter and Kennedy agree as a starting point for today's meeting.

# Midland residents asked to reduce use of water

Midlanders who prefer to drink water or bathe instead of watching the H20 run out onto the lawn should cut back on using water for lawns and other excess uses starting Wednesday, according to Fred Baker, director of public works.

Two water lines along North Midland Drive are being lowered as part of a new drainage facility. This work, however, will cut off use of one line and will reduce water service through Sunday, Baker said.

"We would like to emphasize there is no shortage of water. It's merely a short interruption to a transmission line that makes this request necessary," stated a release from the City Manager's office. With a 33-inch water line out of service during the installation, there

will be a reduction in the amount of water that can be pumped into the city's distribution system. Residents have been consuming 24 to 25 million gallons of water per day recently, and the city can only pump a maximum of 20 to 23 million gallons of water.

Baker said original plans called for the line to be installed in the winter when water consumption is down. But "the best laid plans" often go

The drainage facility that is being installed to accommodate storm water in the northwest drainage channel is part of an upgrading of Midland Drive between Wadley Avenue and Loop 250 being funded by the Public Transportation. The drainway crosses Midland Drive about halfway between Midkiff

and FM 868. Drainage structures at this point will be 41/2 feet by 7 feet, 9 Two large water transmission lines — one 30 inches and the other 33 are being lowered to construct the drainage facility at the proper level,

These lines transport the city's distribution system water from the

water treatment plant and the Paul Davis well field. A contract to lower these lines went to Panhandle Construction Company in January. But to lower these lines, concrete steel cylinder fittings had to be made specifically for this job, said Baker. These fittings

Marc was reunited Monday with a beaming Elizabeth Miller in the lobby of the Florida Correctional Institution for Women.

"It feels wonderful," Miss Miller said as she cuddled the baby. A prison guard immediately escorted mother and son to a makeshift nursery and cell at the prison

Prison Superintendent Bill Booth said five other

pregnant women are serving time at the facility. If think we can handle one mother and one baby at a time," he said. "But if we have more than that we

are going to have to make other arrangements." Miss Miller, 31, who has refused to identify the child's father, was pregnant when she was sentenced in December to five years in prison for grand

She will be eligible for parole in January 1982. Marc was placed in temporary foster care after he was born May 22 at a hospital in the neighboring central Florida town of Ocala.

The reunion was made possible June 6 when Marion County Circuit Judge Wallace Sturgis granted Miss Miller's petition to keep the child. Welfare baby, Sturgis said. After one year, the judge will officials had argued a prison was a poor environment

until her parole.

"I can find no compelling reason to take the child from his mother," Sturgis ruled. "An Infant should remain with his mother if possible.

The ruling was the first under a 1979 state law that allows judges to determine custody in such cases based on the best interests of the child. "I wanted him to know that I loved him and that I

Mrs. Sims said the reunion was "kind of sad because I just think that a baby needs to be brought up in a home and not a prison.

Other inmates will not be allowed to visit Miss Miller and her baby, Booth said. But the door to their pale green cell will not be locked because of fire regulations, he said.

Under Sturgis' order, Marc will stay with his mother during the "primary care" period of six months. Then Miss Miller will "return to the prison rehabilitation programs while the hospital staff cares for the child.

# Census Bureau needs help

A Lubbock-based Census Bureau official was in Midland Monday and issued yet another plea for workers to help with the census follow-up being conducted here.

Mitzi Jordan, district office manager of the Lubbock regional office, said the follow-up procedure to the census is taking so long in Midland and Odessa due to a lack of census workers that preliminary results of the census are being held up from being released to other area cities.

The Lubbock regional office hanlles census statistics for 30 counties, including Midland County, she said.
Preliminary census figures were to be released to the cities in those counties for local review June 27, but due to the holdup in Midland, Odessa and rural Ector County the figures are being

She said it is policy of the Census Bureau to release figures to all cities at the same time.

Young people — those 18 and older — who have at least a high school diploma are urged to seek the positions, she said.

"Surely in a city this large if you make the right contact you could hire that many (100) people," she added. Meanwhile, the Lubbock regional census office is supposed to be closed Aug. 8. Now, however, Ms. Jordan says she doesn't know when the office will be closed.



# Witness says doctor was worried about tax misuse

A prosecution witness in the taxevasion trial of Dr. Austin B. Tibbetts, a physician-surgeon who managed Lee Optical in Midland, testified Monday in federal court that Tibbetts told him he was not paying income taxes for he was concerned about the alleged misuse of tax dollars by the federal government.

The jury trial is being tried before federal Judge Lucius Bunton.

'He volunteered...that he had some concern about how our tax dollars are being spent and had come upon a way of not paying some of those tax dollars," testified Don Luttrell of Fort Smith, Ark.

Luttrell, who operated Break One-Nine radio shop near Dr. Tibbetts' optical office at 2211 W. ### Banks urged to join Chrysler loan program

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DETROIT (AP) - A handful of banks are being pressured to join Chrysler Corp.'s bailout plan for fear that any holdout could threaten to sink the company, officials say.

"Everybody is talking to them other banks, the Loan Guarantee Board staff, we at Chrysler," said a Chrysler executive, who asked not to be identified, on Monday.

Under the agreement by which Chrysler hopes to continue its operation, all of its 400 lenders must agree to participate in the congressionallyapproved loan guarantee plan. The plan, calling for the issuance of up to \$1.5 billion in federally backed debentures, is primarily a package of interest rate concessions and payment de-

ferrals on the part of the lenders. However, some banks reportedly believe the plan only delays the inevitable Chrysler bankruptcy.

"We're just not interested in it and haven't been from the start," said David W. Knapp, president of the American National Bank and Trust Co. of Rockford, Ill. "Their (the other lenders') crystal ball tells them this (the loan guarantee) solves Chrysler's problems. Mine doesn't."

Knapp said his bank is just as likely to collect the \$525,000 Chrysler owes it by suing as by going along with the loan package. American National seized \$125,000 from a Chrysler account in April to reduce its debt.

Chrysler is counting heavily on the loan program. Last week it stopped paying most of its suppliers until it receives the \$500 million that the Chrysler Loan Guarantee Board conditionally approved on May 10.



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# Transmitting signals

A Congress awakening from the dreamworld of detente now has begun to take some positive steps in terms of military preparedness.

Those steps will take the United States closer to security in a world threatened by hostilities and unrest.

For too many years now the Congress has been sinking in a pool of false beliefs about Soviet intentions, cutting back military spending, allowing the draft machinery to be dissolved. We have suffered the consequences of our own distaste for war and the instruments of war.

Perhaps the Congress is turning slightly hawkish once again. Only last week it approved the 1981 federal budget, a budget that calls for \$153.7 billion in defense spend-

That is a record peacetime defense increase and is \$3.2 billion more than President Jimmy Carter had requested.

And the Congress is moving toward renewing peacetime draft registration. Under the funding measure now in the Congress, an estimated four million young men between the ages of 19 and 20 would be required to register for the draft although they would not be required immediately to submit to physical examinations or be issued draft cards.

What the Congress has done by taking these steps is to assure the Soviet Union - and the United States' other potential adversaries — that this nation will not lie back idly while aggressions are mounted against other free nations in the world.

We are transmitting signals to the Soviet Union - subtle though they be - that we do not condone their activities and that we are not afraid of confrontation, even though we do not want it.

We believe these are positive signals; these are the signals that should have been sent long ago before the credibility of the Carter administration was eroded and the respect for the United States' leadership role in the world un-

The people of the United States are not "war mongers." We do not pick fights. But neither do we allow ourselves to be pushed into a corner just for the sake of avoiding conflict.

Under the current leadership we have transmitted negative signals far too long. A mistaken impression has been given the Russians of the intestinal fortitude of Ameri-

Now, perhaps, that trend is being reversed and the true signal is coming through loud and

# It's important to avoid 'information overload'

A person who wishes to survive the coming days of crisis with a reasonable amount of sanity will have to learn how to avoid information over-

Information overload occurs when you are so bombarded with information, some of it conflicting and contradictory, that your poor old brain just develops static. Clear thought becomes impossible. Confusion and apathy set in, and you begin to function less effectively.

It is a side-effect of the communications revolution which is yet to be fully understood, let alone analyzed, because it is still in progress. But follow yourself through a normal day and think how much information is poured into your brain. Television and radio talk to you at an average rate of 120 words a minute. Your newspaper contains anywhere from the equivalent of one to four novels in terms of numbers of words. You can neither walk nor drive without seeing signs. The plain brown wrapper has become extinct; zillions of containers are plastered with information.

But not only has the volume of information increased, it has been accelerated. You can learn of a rescue attempt in Iran before the helicopters' engines have cooled. Long before the participants had returned to the U.S. and had time to reflect, you were bombarded with special reports, bulletins, TV specials, special

This is a key concept in learning to avoid information overload: There is more "news" than there are newsworthy events. You see, we get locked in by tradition and economics. A daily newspaper must publish every day whether anything really significant has occurred or not. Broadcast news is in the same predicament.

You would be amazed and probably angry if you picked up your newspaper and there on the front page was a single headline: "Nothing really important happened yesterday." Yet, in reality, there are a lot of days when nothing really important happens. Consequently, we have devised strategies for dealing with such days.

One strategy is to stretch out the few stories we do have. We report an event. Then we report reaction to the event. Then we sometimes report reaction to the reaction. Then we analyze the event. And, finally, wereview the event.

Another strategy we employ is to make use of the relativity of news. If, on the same day, there is a crisis close at hand and a crisis in a distant place, we would tell you about the close crisis and very little about the distant crisis. But, if things are quiet in our immediate area, we will tell you a lot about the distant crisis. If you don't understand what we are doing, you might get the impression that the world is in a state of continuing cri-

So one way to guard against information overload is to learn about the mechanics and customs of the news business so that you will understand that news is, by definition, a reflection of only a narrow band on the broad spectrum of reaity.

Another way is to become more selective in admitting information. One man said it is more important to learn what not to read than it is to learn speed reading. The beauty of a newspaper is that it's a smorgasbord - you don't have to eat it all. You don't have to watch quickie-TV specials which are usually just a rehash of the breaking news with a few banal comments tossed in. You don't have to listen to the idle chatter of disc jockeys. You don't have to read junk mail.

Become more selective in what you read and listen to and you'll find yourself calming down and your own thinking becoming more clear. You can't control the generation of information, but you still control the switch on the receiving end.

"The Soviets and the Cubans have consummated what you might call an effective marriage," states a Pentagon report obtained by my reporter Lucette Lagnado, "where the Cubans are providing the troops and the Soviets virtually all the equipment."

As a result, the intelligence analysts have concluded, "the Cubans are now able to serve as an important regional military actor in the Caribbean area."

# Publication of 'top secret' documents angered Stennis

WASHINGTON - The "top secret" Senate Republican staff study of the failed hostage rescue effort, whose leak to the media threatens a fullscale investigation, contains information publicized by the Iranian government after it found the secret documents and plans in an abandoned U.S. helicopter in the Iranian desert. The report for the Senate Armed

Services Committee was stamped "top secret" even though it mainly rehashed plans captured in the helicopter. This included spy satellite pictures of designated landing places for the rescue teams plus operational



Suit to halt film showing dismissed HOUSTON (AP) - "Choosing Suicide," the documentary of a woman's decision to kill herself, was broadcast on public television despite a last-minute lawsuit contending the broadcast could

'ead to more suicides. The program was shown on Public Broadcasting Service affiliate KUHT-TV Monday after a federal judge threw out the lawsuit and refused to halt the broadcast.

Dr. Thomas Welu, a Harris County assistant medical examiner, filed for a temporary restraining order to stop the nationwide broadcast less than five hours before the program was to air. But U.S. District Judge John V. Singleton said he failed to find federal jurisdiction in the case.

"I'm not in the business of imposing prior restraint on first amendment rights," Singleton said.

Welu, who later appeared in a local panel broadcast immediately following the program, said he feared possible ramifications of the documentary, which he called "propaganda for

The hour-long film depicted discussions between New York artist Jo Roman, who had discovered she had cancer, and friends who were told of her plans to commit suicide.

The 62-year-old artist died June 10, 1979 after washing down 35 Seconals with champagne. Her death was not shown on the program, but her husband described her last hours of life. Some stations in Connecticut, Maine, Mississippi, Ohio, Georgia. Tennessee, Florida and Utah did not broadcast the pro-

"People are pretty upset. It's clear they want to see it," said a woman who answered the phone at KUED in Salt Lake City. Station WCVE in Richmond, Va., which broadcast the program, reported receiving 20-30 calls, many of them from people asking whether the program was being shown. Station employee John Stewart said more calls were in opposition to the program than in support if it.

The complaint filed against PBS, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, affiliate station KUHT-TV and station owner University of Houston sought to halt broadcast of the program

"I know what I will say to the Houston audience," said Welu, but I can't control what will be said nationwide.

PBS attorney Eric Bernthal said the decision to dismiss the case upheld several Supreme Court decisions against prior restraint, the censorship of material before its release. What it boils down to is the plaintiff's personal criticism of the

program," he said of the complaint. "Choosing Suicide" is the second PBS program to raise controversy in two months. And KUHT-TV has been involved in court action over both programs.

In early May the station chose not to air "Death of a Princess, the story of a Saudi Arabian princess who was executed, and a federal suit was filed seeking to force KUHT-TV to show the

# Judge extends order on Gacy book or movie

CHICAGO (AP) - A temporary restraining order has been extended for the second time to prohibit convicted mass killer John W. Gacy from profiting from book or movie rights to his life story until arrangements are made to compensate the families of

The extension was granted Monday by Judge George A. Higgins of Cook County Circuit Court. He issued the first order

The order prohibits Gacy from negotiating with author Clyde Burleson of Houston and Burleson's agent, the Goldfarb-Lewis agency of California. An attorney for Gacy said no literary contracts have been signed and "none are imminent."

Higgins issued the order in connection with a suit filed by the family of Robert Piest, one of Gacy's victims. The suit contends it would be "legally and morally unconscionable" for Gacy to profit from stories about his actions.

Gacy's lawyers, Samuel Amirante and Robert Motta, were dropped from the suit when they agreed to inform the judge if they made any money from the story of their involvement in the

Gacy, 38, was convicted and sentenced to death earlier this year for the murders of 33 young men and boys.

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
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Suit to halt film showing dismissed HOUSTON (AP) — "Choosing Suicide," the documentary of a woman's decision to kill herself, was broadcast on public television despite a last-minute lawsuit contending the broadcast could

lead to more suicides. The program was shown on Public Broadcasting Service affiliate KUHT-TV Monday after a federal judge threw out the lawsuit and refused to halt the broadcast.

Dr. Thomas Welu, a Harris County assistant medical examiner, filed for a temporary restraining order to stop the nationwide broadcast less than five hours before the program was to air.

But U.S. District Judge John V. Singleton said he failed to find federal jurisdiction in the case. "I'm not in the business of imposing prior restraint on first

amendment rights," Singleton said. Welu, who later appeared in a local panel broadcast immediately following the program, said he feared possible ramifications of the documentary, which he called "propaganda for suicide

The hour-long film depicted discussions between New York artist Jo Roman, who had discovered she had cancer, and friends who were told of her plans to commit suicide.

The 62-year-old artist died June 10, 1979 after washing down 35 Seconals with champagne. Her death was not shown on the program, but her husband described her last hours of life. Some stations in Connecticut, Maine, Mississippi, Ohio, Georgia, Tennessee, Florida and Utah did not broadcast the pro-

"People are pretty upset. It's clear they want to see it," said a woman who answered the phone at KUED in Salt Lake City. Station WCVE in Richmond, Va., which broadcast the program, reported receiving 20-30 calls, many of them from people asking whether the program was being shown. Station employee John Stewart said more calls were in opposition to the program than in support if it.

The complaint filed against PBS, the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, affiliate station KUHT-TV and station owner University of Houston sought to halt broadcast of the program nationwide

"I know what I will say to the Houston audience," said Welu, "but I can't control what will be said nationwide."

PBS attorney Eric Bernthal said the decision to dismiss the case upheld several Supreme Court decisions against prior restraint, the censorship of material before its release.

"What it boils down to is the plaintiff's personal criticism of the program," he said of the complaint.

"Choosing Suicide" is the second PBS program to raise controversy in two months. And KUHT-TV has been involved in court action over both programs.

In early May the station chose not to air "Death of a Princess," the story of a Saudi Arabian princess who was executed, and a federal suit was filed seeking to force KUHT-TV to show the

# Judge extends order on Gacy book or movie

CHICAGO (AP) - A temporary restraining order has been extended for the second time to prohibit convicted mass killer John W. Gacy from profiting from book or movie rights to his life story until arrangements are made to compensate the families of

The extension was granted Monday by Judge George A. Higgins of Cook County Circuit Court. He issued the first order May 27.

The order prohibits Gacy from negotiating with author Clyde Burleson of Houston and Burleson's agent, the Goldfarb-Lewis agency of California. An attorney for Gacy said no literary contracts have been signed and "none are imminent."

Higgins issued the order in connection with a suit filed by the family of Robert Piest, one of Gacy's victims. The suit contends it would be "legally and morally unconscionable" for Gacy to profit from stories about his actions,

Gacy's lawyers, Samuel Amirante and Robert Motta, were dropped from the suit when they agreed to inform the judge if they made any money from the story of their involvement in the

Gacy, 38, was convicted and sentenced to death earlier this year for the murders of 33 young men and boys.

# New Hebrides natives block airfields, stall negotiators

PORT VILA, New Hebrides (AP) -Rebellious natives on the island of Espiritu Santo blocked airfield runways with oil drums and trucks today to keep government negotiations away. The government warned its effort at bargaining was the last before military intervention.

Three high-level government negotiators, accompanied by three planeloads of reporters, were forced to turn back from the island after the control tower radioed that the runway had been blocked.

The tower said the negotiators could not land because they did not have the permission of the Vemerana Republic, as rebel leader Jimmy Stevens has named his seccessionist island.

Stevens, leader of the bow-andarrow rebellion by natives and French planters who are backed by wealthy American businessmen seeking a tax haven, indicated in a radio message to Port Vila Monday night he would allow the negotiatiors to land. No reason was given for his change of mind

The New Hebrides government reversed an earlier decision Monday and offered to negotiate with both the rebels on Espiritu Santo, the largest and richest island in the archipelago, and those on the southern island of Tanna. Espiritu Santo is about 180 miles north of Port Vila, capital of the New Hebrides; Tanna is some 110

miles to the south of here. Rebels on Tanna include members of a cargo cult who believe an American GI named John Frum is the Messiah and will someday emerge from a volcano bringing them refrigerators,

# Police fire on colored, black mobs

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - At least 35 black and colored South Africans including children as young as 7 - were wounded when police opened fire with shotguns on mobs of looters and demonstrators hurling stones and firebombs on the fourth anniversary of the bloody Soweto

Scores of buses and police vehicles were also set afire or stoned as violence erupted Monday in black and colored, or mixed race, areas throughout white-ruled South Africa.

The country was reported quiet today.

Police reported 20 persons wounded Monday near Johannesburg, most of them in the mixed race township of Noordgezicht where mobs looted a grocery store and a meat mar-

A spokeswoman at Johannesburg's Coronationville Hospital, where some of the injured were treated, said ehildren as young as 7 and 10 were among the injured. She said others were in their

Authorities said the other 15 wounded were hit during fighting in black townships near Bloemfontein, the capital of the Orange Free State 230 miles southwest of Johannesburg, when mobs threw gasoline bombs and stones at po-

In contrast to the automatic rifles police used to kill hundreds of dem onstrators four years ago, police fired birdshot from shotguns Monday and aimed low to minimize the chance of fatalities when the mobs refused to disperse. The shotgun fire was preceded by tear gas barrages

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

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

Bock says in order to cause the heart to stop, a pitch "would have to have a certain amount of velocity or force involved."

"I would say that it is fairly rare," Bock said. He said the pitch "has to hit almost directly over the heart area and hit solid. It also has to go ahead and do what it does, mechanically and electrically, to cause a disr-hythmia that would essentially stop

But Bock added that "anybody could do the same thing to some else by hitting their fist on their chest. It doesn't really have to be that hard.

# It was enough to make Famer change his name

What happened to Dicky Moegle in the 1954 Cotton Bowl game was enough to make a guy change his name, so when he was elected to the Texas Sportswriters Hall of Fame over the weekend, it was as Dicky Maegle.

Moegle's name, spelled the same way as longtime Lubbock Monterey baseball coach Bobby Moegle, his brother, became a source irritation as a result of the notoriety stemming from the most bizarre bowl incident since 1928 when California's Roy Riegels ran the wrong way against Georgia Tech in the Rose Bowl.

One who was witnessing his first bowl game remembers the episode vividly as Moegle, a swift, elusive Rice University halfback, turned the Alabama flank and headed north along the east side line of the sunsplattered Cotton Bowl. Through the binoculars, a quick scan behind Moegle revealed no hostiles in position to head Dicky off at the pass.

Still, the viewer upon resuming Moegle's flight into the afternoon, saw an Alabama player with the speed of a Jesse Owens apparently do the impossible and catch the flying Owl with a sudden, sure tackle.

If ever a play stunned an audience into silence, this was it, brief as it may have been. Of course, Crimson Tide fullback

Tommy Lewis had come off the bench to interrupt Moegle's 95-yard touchdown journey, explaining later balefully, "I was just too full of Ala-Moegle recalled, "I saw Lewis start

off the bench and thought his helmet must have rolled on field." Officials immediately signaled a

Both players were the focus of public attention long after the play. In fact, they were invited to appear on the Ed Sullivan TV show. Strangely enough, it was Moegle who changed his name, not the culprit in the piece, Lewis. It wasn't a case of Moegle seeking anonymity. He just wanted his named pronounced correctly and he had a better chance with Maegle,



rather than Moegle, which was usually pronounced like a bump on a ski

The impromptu sidelines drama tends to obscure the fact that Maegle was a better than "pretty good" football player and may leave the impression that Dicky was voted into the Texas Hall as a result of a freakish incident over which he exercised no control.

For the records, Maegle was an All-America football player on a Rice team that not only was good enough to win the SWC title, but beat an Alabama team that had a quarterback named Bart Starr. And on game day, there was some doubt as to whether the Owls could do it without their great fullback Kosse Johnson, another All-America and the team's leading rusher.

The Lewis tackle unfortunately also relegates one of the most spectacular individual performances ever recorded in a bowl game into shadowy recesses. It's as though someone said, "Sure, I know Dale Mitchell struck out for the final out in the only perfect game ever pitched in a World Series, but for the life of me I can't remember they guy who threw it. Let's see, it wasn't Denny Galehouse, was it?"

# Prime rate lowered to August's level.

NEW YORK (AP) - A small New York bank on Tuesday reduced its prime lending rate to 11.5 percent, becoming the first bank to reach that level since last August.

UMB Bank & Trust Co., a subsidiary of Israel's United Mizrahi Bank, cut the rate from 12.5 per-

Most banks are charging either 12 percent or 12.5 percent on loans to their best corporate customers, but analysts expect the rate to continue to drop over the next several weeks.

The prime rate peaked at 20 percent in early April and has fallen along with other interest rates as the nation entered a recession.

Banks use the prime as the base from which interest rates on almost all commercial-industrial loans are set. While changes in the prime are soon reflected in the rates charged on short-term business loans, rates on consumer loans are not directly affected.

The prime is widely considered to be an indicator of interest rate trends generally.

# Judges sign orders for Potts execution

ATLANTA (AP) - Two Superior Court judges today signed an order setting a July 1 execution date for Jack Howard Potts, the convicted murderer who won a last minute reprieve earlier by deciding to renew his appeal.

Superior Court Judge Marion Pope of Forsyth County said that he and Superior Court Judge James Bullard of Cobb County signed the execution order. Potts will die in the electric chair at the Georgia Diagnostic and Classification Center in Jackson,

where a new death chamber has been under construction for several months. Potts, 35, convicted of the 1975 murder and kidnapping of 24-year-old Roswell, Ga. mechanic Michael

Priest, is being held at the Georgia State Prison.

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# High court limits use of informants

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WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court says law enforcement officials cannot hire jailhouse informants to induce criminal defendants in custody to make incriminating statements.

But the nation's highest court has stopped short of outlawing the use of jailhouse spies who are told to overhear cellblock conversations and to try to win a defendant's confidence.

By a 6-3 vote Monday, the justices struck down Billy Gale Henry's conviction and 25-year prison sentence for a 1972 bank robbery in Virginia because the FBI paid Henry's cellmate to spy on him

If federal prosecutors retry Henry, they will not be allowed to use testimony from the FBI informant, a star witness at Henry's first trial.

According to court records, another of Henry's cellmates - one not on the FBI payroll - also overheard him talking about the robbery of the Janas

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Relying heavily on a 1964 decision barring government agents from deliberately eliciting incriminating information from defendants entitled to a lawyer's help during any interrogation, Chief Justice Warren E. Burger said Henry's conviction must fall.

"By intentionally creating a situation likely to induce Henry to make incriminating statements without the assistance of counsel, the government violated Henry Sixth Amendment right to counsel," Burger's majority

But a Burger footnote said the court was not deciding the constitutionality of "the situation where an informant is placed in close proximity but makes no effort to stimulate conversation about the crime charged.

# Negotiators OK funds for synthetic fuel industry

WASHINGTON (AP) - Almost a year after Congress and President Carter decided the nation needed a crash program to develop synthetic fuels, House and Senate negotiators have approved a multibillion-dollar bill to launch the industry.

Sen. Bennett J. Johnston, D-La., chairman of a Senate Energy and Natural Resources subcommittee on energy regulation, said the bill will accomplish more to ease U.S. dependence on foreign oil than has been done in the seven years since the Arab oil embargo

In finishing months of work on the measure Monday, the conferees also directed President Carter to resume filling the strategic petroleum reserve, the U.S. stockpile of oil, at the rate of at least 100,000 barrels a day.

The reserve has a capacity of 156 million barrels of oil but now contains only 91.7 million barrels. The Saudi Arabian oil minister, Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, warned last week that filling the reserve further could lead to cuts in his country's current production of 9.5 million barrels.

Purchases for the reserve were halted in 1978 due to tight supplies and

The conferees adopted an amendment that would, in effect, fill the reserve with oil that remains under government price controls and thus is less expensive than current world market costs of up to \$32 a barrel. The price controls end Sept. 30, 1981.

Last month, the negotiators approved the centerpiece of the legislation, a \$20 billion, five-year program of loan and price guarantees aimed at building plants that could produce synthetic fuels

Johnston called the final product a cookie jar" that contains something for almost everyone, with provisions ranging from incentives for solar power to fossil fuel studies.

Johnston predicted the measure will get easy House and Senate approval next week.

House Majority Leader Jim Wright. D-Texas, called the bill the most significant piece of legislation to be considered by the current Congress.

It was last summer, as lines of angry motorists formed at gasoline pumps, that the House voted to establish a \$3 billion synthetic fuels industry that could manufacture fuels from non-petroleum materials such as oil or gas made from coal, or already-existing oil extracted from materials such as shale or tar sands.

In an address to the nation last July 15, Carter went further, proposing an \$88 billion crash program including creation of a government corporation to oversee the effort.

The Senate trimmed Carter's plan last November and the House and Senate conferees have been at work on a compromise since Dec. 7.

Under the bill approved Monday, the program would be administered by a federally owned synthetic fuels corporation governed by a sevenmember board of directors appointed by the president and confirmed by the

The legislation sets a goal of producing the equivalent of 500,000 barrels of oil a day by 1987 - about 4 percent of total daily U.S. oil consumption now - and 2 million barrels a day by 1991, with up to \$68 billion in additional federal assistance. The bill also includes:

-\$1.45 billion to encourage the production of gasohol and the conversion of urban wastes into energy

-Establishment of a \$3 billion solar energy and energy conservation bank to subsidize loans for solar and conservation improvements from 1981 to

-A program to develop geothermal resources - underground heat generated at the center of the earth.

## Midlander pleads 'nolo contendere

Midlander Richard Buckley Beals who was countering police charges of resisting arrest with police brutality pleaded "nolo contendere" to public drunkeness and disorderly conduct Monday before Midland Municipal Court Judge James Fitz-Gerald and was fined \$200 for disorderly conduct. and \$28.50 for public drunkenness.

Beals, a 47-year-old geologist, was arrested by two Midland police women May 17 at Midland Regional Airport after he had deplaned and, witnesses said, was staggering and uttering foul language.

Resisting-arrest charges, which grew out of the incident, are to be dismissed by Midland County Judge

Resisting arrest, a more serious offense than drunkenness, is a Class A misdemeanor which is punishable by a fine of up to \$2,000 and a maximum sentence of one year in jail. Public drunkenness and disorderly conduct are Class C misdemeanors on the same order as a moving traffic violation and each is punishable by a fine not exceeding \$200.

In a court hearing before Ahders on June 10, Beals' attorney, Bill Smith, maintained that Beals could not have resisted arrest, for the women officers did not identify themselves as police women. The women could have been mistaken for stewardesses or court jesters or as women dressed up for a masquerade party, he contend-

Robert Rendall, assistant county attorney, represented the state in the court hearing before Ahders.

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# Complex issues face leaders of summit

WASHINGTON (AP) - Some of the most "profoundly complex strategic and political issues" of the post-war period will confront President Carter and leaders of six other nations at their upcoming meeting in Venice, says a senior White House offi-

Carter will sit down with the leaders of France, Germany, Great Britain, Japan, Canada and Italy at an economic summit conference next Sunday and Monday. The president will leave Thursday and also go to Yugoslavia, Spain and Portugal before returning a week later

The economic summit will be the sixth in as many years, but for the first time, a major portion of the two-day meeting will be devoted to political issues.

"It will be an opportunity for Western leaders to consult on broad political and strategic issues at the outset of the decade of the 1980s," the senior official, who asked not to be identified, told reporters

"It is no exaggeration to say that this decade confronts us with the most pressing security agenda we have had facing us probably since some time back in the mid-1950s," he said.

The official listed the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan, the Iran hostage crisis, the Middle East conflict and East-West relations as being uppermost on the political agenda. The Carter administration has been disppointed that some of the other summit nations have adopted different approaches on many of these key issues.

The European Common Market countries, including France, Great Britain, Italy and Germany, issued a declaration Sunday in Venice calling for "the recognition of the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people" and a role for the PLO in the Mideast peace negotiations. The United States opposes PLO participation until it recognizes Israel's

While the official acknowledged there was some 'divergence of views' among the summit nations on the key issues, he insisted "the state of the alliance is

Another official, who also asked not to be identified, said energy issues top the economic agenda. In particular, he said there will be continued stress on the need to reduce dependence on oil and develop other energy alternatives, notably coal.

He said there will be emphasis on the need for countries to meet annual ceilings for oil imports, although specific targets won't be set at Venice. The same nations did agree to targets at their summit in Tokyo last year, but U.S. officials say only the United States was successful in meeting them. The official said all seven leaders are likely to

agree that they must continue to focus their economic policies on reducing inflation, even though it means slower economic growth and higher unem-The major reason for Carter's visits to Spain and

Portugal is to demonstrate support for these new democracies, the official said. The visit to Yugosla-via is to establish close ties between the United States and the new leaders who have taken charge following the death of Marshal Tito, he said.

Carter also will confer with Italian leaders and in Rome with Pope John Paul II at the Vatican.
