Record low temperature follows snowfall

Temperatures that nipped the nose and froze the toes awaited Midlanders when they stepped outside this morning. And the 19 degree reading that occurred between 6 and 7 a.m. today was a

new record. The old record had been 24 degrees set on this date in 1959, according to the National Weather

Service at Midland Regional Airport. After the air warmed up to a "balmy" 35 degrees Monday, snow began to melt off cars and highways. Even though the 19 degrees this morning caused standing water to freeze, highways were no problem for travelers.

The weatherman is predicting it will continue to get warmer this week. The thermometer should dip into the middle 20s tonight, but the middle 50s

The record high of 84 degrees for Nov. 1'

recorded in 1953, still stands.

There was no precipitation Monday, nor is any expected for the rest of the week, said the weatherman.

After the 6 inches of snow melted down to .40 inch of precipitation, the year's total stands at 16.23 inches. The weatherman said this was the second largest amount of snow to fall in a 24-hour period since records were started in 1930. The largest amount is 6.8 inches which fell in 24 hours on Jan. 23-24.

However, the weatherman noted the Sunday snowfall was the largest amount for so early in

Storm will cost cotton farmers \$15 per bale

PLAINVIEW (AP) - High Plains cotton farmers say they expect to lose about \$15 a bale on unharvested cotton chilled by nine to 12 inches of snow early this week.

Farmer Gayle Thompson said Monday the area harvest was 50 to 60 percent complete when the winter storm blew in Saturday night.

Most cotton will drop one grade in quality because of the loss, he said, adding some of the best yields of two to three bales an acre remain in the fields. Cotton, which also loses weight as it dries, can bring \$300 to \$400 a bale, depending on

KKKers, Nazis are acquitted

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - A Nazi leader hailed the acquittal of six Ku Klux Klansmen and Nazis as a "great victory for white America," but the Communist Workers Party charged that the verdict in the slaying of five comrades "gives the green light to Hitler-like attacks on the people of America.

The defendants' relatives burst into tears of relief as the verdicts were read Monday, ending the longest trial in North Carolina history.

The charges stemmed from a bloody shootout between white supremacists and demonstrators at a CWP "Death to the Klan" rally Nov.

Not long after the jurors announced their decision, the civil rights division of the U.S. Justice Department said it was studying the verdict. Drew S. Days aid the branch was checking "to see if there is anything we can

The Rev. Hosea Williams, a black civil rights activist, called the verdict the greatest perpetration of injustice on our country since the death of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr."

Whether 16 other people charged after the demonstration will be brought to trial now has not yet been announced. The decision by the all-white jury

came after seven days of deliberation and a 23-week trial. Prosecutors had argued the defen-

dants were aggressors in the bloody battle. But defense lawyers said the six men, who had arrived at the rally site in a Klan-Nazi motorcade, came only to heckle demonstrators.

The defendants fired only when they were attacked by people in the crowd, their attorneys said. The bullets killed one black woman and four white men.

"From the very beginning, it was the communists who did the attacking," said juror Robert A. Williams. "It was the communists who started beating the cars with sticks. From then on, it was a case of self-de-

"Oh, gosh, I feel like I have been set free," said a tearful Paula Wood, whose husband, Nazi Roland Wayne Wood, was acquitted. "I'm not sure how I feel. It's just a relief."

After rushing up to hug her hus-band, Mrs. Wood said, "It's been a long year. We're going to try and start new. Try and put all this behind."

Regina Collett said she "never thought for a second that they (jurors) would come back with any other verdict" for her fiancee, Lawrence Gene Morgan. "I never believed he was guilty, and he's been set free by God's will," she said.

Lisa Pridmore, 14, said she had believed it was "God's will" that her father Coleman Blair Pridmore would be acquitted.

Congress eyeing ceiling on federal spending

WASHINGTON (AP) - The lameduck Congress is beginning debate on a binding spending ceiling that Republicans say would unfairly hinder President-elect Ronald Reagan's at-

tempts to rein in the federal budget. visiting Capitol Hill to meet with congressional leaders, the House and Senate were set today to consider separate versions of a budget resolu-

After House Democrats blocked a GOP attempt Monday to give R. 'gan authority to impound appropried money in an effort to force federal spending cuts, Republicans said they will oppose enactment of a resolution

At issue is a binding resolution draft that the House Budget Committee approved last week. It calls for \$631.7

which began Oct. 1 - and a \$25 billion deficit. Committee Republicans, accusing Democrats of playing politics with the budget by mandating cuts before Reagan even takes office, unamimously voted against it.

"Bedtime for Bonzo' has always been popular on college campuses," he

calls on Democrats and "some fairly heavy work sessions" with Republican leaders, said Edwin Meese, Reagan's transition chief of staff who will be a Cabinet-ranking counselor to the president in the new administration.

Reagan has said he hopes to have a closer relationship with Congress than Carter had. Meese said the day after the election the president-elect will try to coordinate with congressional leaders a "carefully planned calendar of legislative activity.

Before leaving Los Angeles on Monday. Reagan cautioned against expecting overnight changes when he takes office. Noting that spending cuts and reorganizations will require legislation, he said, "It's going to take time getting that implemented."

Reagan brought with him to Washington two large binders, which he said contained plans to implement his campaign promises of reducing income taxes 30 percent over three years and cutting government spending 2 percent a year.

After his arrival Monday night at a government-owned guest residence half a block from the White House, Reagan spoke by telephone with the nation's Republican governors, who are meeting in Philadelphia.

Telling them that he wanted to "reinstitute this nation as a federation of sovereign states," he said:

"I look forward to consulting with you and with us mutually helping each other to bring this about, to see that finally responsibilities are properly apportioned, those that belong at the national level and those that belong at the state level.

During a rambling briefing on Monday's flight east, Meese said changing the way Social Security benefits are adjusted to keep pace with inflation is "the least likely" option in Reagan's efforts to cut the

Meese also said the staff overseeing the Reagan transition will study "the original legitimate function" of federal regulatory agencies, review the modifications that have been made 'and then see to what extent the agencies are really carrying out a function that is necessary to protect the public. "I think we're going to monitor

those things to see to what extent their enforcement programs are unrealistic or unnecessary in terms of the original legislation," Meese said. He also said Reagan is on schedule

in his search for a Cabinet and will review specific names within the next 10 days.

A group of top Reagan advisers who will recommend three to five finalists for each post began whittling the list of names in Los Angeles on Monday, and Cabinet nominees are expected to be announced by early December.

Meese said that Reagan had received "a private communication" from former President Richard M. Nixon, and that several Reagan staff members had received congratulatory and advisory telephone calls from



Columnists say Tower will be defense secretary

WASHINGTON-Bonald Reagan has tapped Sen. John Tower of Texas to be secretary of defense in a decision that Reagan insiders believe as of today will not be changed.

Less certain, but regarded by Texas Republican politicians as highly probable, is the prospect that John B. Connally, an early 1980 presidential dropout, will be named by Gov. Bill Clements to fill Tower's Senate seat.

Tower's office refused comment as to whether Reagan had invited him to take the Pentagon portfolio. But it is well known that Tower wants the job, despite having to give up the chairmanship of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Although Republican control of the Senate would give Tower the most powerful defense spot in Congress, he prefers the Pentagon itself.

Reagan insiders said the president-elect formally offered Tower the job in a telephone conversation. Tower has been sounding out possible deputies and other aides to take with him, including former Secretary of the Navy William Middendorf. Middendorf is believed in line for a very high Pentagon job, possibly deputy secretary of defense. Middendorf is president of Financial General, a Washington-based

bank holding company.

Connally, former governor of Texas and secretary of the treasury, was considered a possibility for either defense or state in the Reagan Administration. Others considered as possible appointments to replace Tower in the Senate are Anne Armstrong,

Tower, 55, was a professor of government at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, Texas, when he scored a stunning upset in the 1961 special election to fill the seat left vacant by the resignation of Lyndon B. Johnson to be vice president. Tower was re-elected in 1966, 1972 and 1978. The selection of Tower is Reagan's first Cabinet

choice and shows the importance the president-elect places on rebuilding the nation's defenses. Tower has long been his party's foremost spokesman on defense and has long advocated major increases in defense spending to catch up with Soviet defense



With Tower leaving the armed services committee, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona is next in line to be chairman. But Goldwater, whose health at age 71 is frail, might be persuaded to take the Senate select intelligence committee, of which he is also senior Republican. That would let the 53-year-old Sen. John Warner of Virginia, just elected to the Senate in 1978, take over armed services.

The only serious obstacle confronting Tower's nomination was the Texas law requiring a special election within 90 days (the mechanism under which Tower was first elected 19 years ago). With Republicans holding the Senate by only 53-47, some senators urged the Reagan team to consider carefully the danger of reducing that margin.




Cold weather is expected in the forecast until Wednesday morning for most of the nation. Snow flurries are forecast for the western states. (AP Laserphoto Map)

American, Briton drown after two U.S. jets collide

SAXTHORPE England (AP) - A British rescue crewman's heroic bid to save a U.S. Air Force pilot ended in tragedy today, with both drowning in the North Sea after two U.S. jets collided and fell, officials said.

The other U.S. pilot ejected on land and was slightly injured, authorities

As the British airman tried in strong winds to pluck the American from the sea, the Briton apparently became entangled in the American's parachute cords. The winchline to the British rescue helicopter then was cut and both were swept away and drowned, said an RAF spokesman in

The bodies were later recovered. The British airman had been wered down into the water from the Royal Air Force helicopter which answered a distress call from the American pilot following the collision near this Norfolk County village be-

tween two U.S. A-10 jet fighters. The U.S. pilot had ejected safely and was floating in the sea caught among the lines of his open para-

"They both drowned," the RAF spokesman in London said. "It was a most unfortunate accident. I cannot recall a crewman losing his life in

these circumstances previously."
Squadron Leader Sid Woskett from the nearby RAF Coltishall base said officers were still investigating pre-cisely what went wrong with the res-

cue operation.

But he said an "instant decision" had to be made after the entanglement with the parachute lines as the two men were being hauled out of the

"The cable was cut. They both fell down and were taken by a strong sea," said Woskett. be picked up immediately, and our helicopter now had no winch line. An American helicopter came to pick

them up. The U.S. Air Force and the RAF were withholding the airmen's identities until their families were told. British authorities said the British

airman had been involved in many previous rescues. The pilot of the other U.S. let ejected near this village, an Air Force

spokesman said. He was only slightly

Wreckage was scattered over a wide area and one villager hit by flying debris was hospitalized, police

Witness Nellie Stolworthy said she heard two loud bangs. "I saw a plane with smoke coming out of it... Then I saw a pilot coming down on a parachute. The plane just disintegrated. You could see bits of it floating in the river. We were lucky it didn't land on the village," she said.

The twin-engined, single-seat fighters collided at about 9:25 a.m., some 50 miles after takeoff, the spokesman

The U.S. planes were on a training mission from their base, a Royal Air Force base at Bentwaters, Suffolk County, to a firing range at Wainfleet on the east coast, some 80 miles away, the spokesman said.

The crash was the second involving one of the approximately 70 American A-10s based in Britain.

In July 1979, an A-10 crashed in Bedfordshire County north of London, killing the pilot, during a U.S. Air Force display.

point since May, 16.25 percent, and analysts said the charge on loans to top-ranked businesses could reach 17 percent within a week.

The prime rate was boosted threequarters of a percentage point at most American banks Monday as the cost of money bankers get from small depositors and large investors continued to climb.

"The prime rate's going to have to go higher," perhaps as high as 17 percent, by "late in the week or early next week," said economist Bob Sinche at the brokerage house of Bear, Stearns & Co. after Chase Manhattan Bank started the latest round of rate increases.

Demand for money by industries recovering from the recession "has outstripped the Federal Reserve's monetary guidelines and pushed rates back to their pre-peak highs of February and March," Moody's Bond Survey said.

"Credit demand continues to resist traditional economic curbs, indicating the extent of business's saturation with inflationary expectations," said the trade publication, which predicted "interest rates will rise further."

Rates on consumer loans and home mortgages are not tied to the prime. But the business loan rate's movements reflect money-market conditions that eventually can affect the cost or availability of loans to con-

The prime peaked at 20 percent last April, and then slid to a low of 10.75 in late July before beginning its latest advance Aug. 4. The rate last was above 16 percent in mid-May, when major banks were charging 16.5 per-

The cost to banks of borrowed money took a sharp upward jump on two fronts Monday. Federal funds, overnight loans of excess cash between banks, traded as high as 17 percent, up from 14 percent a week ago and 8.7 percent last July.

In Washington, the government said rates on Treasury bills rose to a five-month high at the regular weekly auction, an increase that will raise rates on the popular \$10,000, sixmonth savings certificates sold by banks and thrift institutions.

Bankers may pay up to 14.167 percent interest on the certificates beginning Thursday, up from 13.481 percent today.

The prime rate moves followed last week's announcement by the Federal Reserve of a full-point increase to 12 percent in its discount rate, the rate it sets on direct loans to banks, and a 2 percent surcharge on the discount rate for some large borrowers.

The Fed acted to slow a rapid money-growth rate that could fuel a new wave of inflation in coming

According to a report by Citibank on Monday, "it's only a matter of time before we see the beginnings of a sizeable rate decline" as economic activity and loan demand taper off.

Firefighters take the upper hand as winds die down in California

LOS ANGELES (AP) - While howling winds died down and firefighters got the upper hand on blazes that scorched more than 50,000 acres of brushland and suburban lawn, flood control officials began worrying about what winter rains would do to

charred California hillsides. Thousands of firefighters turned out Monday to battle the half-dozen fires which consumed or damaged some 100 homes Sunday and caused property damage in the tens of millions of dollars.

One person was arrested as police investigated the cause of a suburban Los Angeles blaze that caused some \$25 million in damage

Several new, smaller fires broke out Monday, including a 150-acre blaze in Mint Canyon, 25 miles north of Los Angeles Los Angeles County Fire Department spokesman Joe Romero said firefighters expected easily to throw a line around that blaze, which caused no injuries or damage Its cause was unknown.

Meanwhile, firefighters achieved

partial or total containment of the major blazes.

'The wind isn't too much of a problem. It's really slowed down on us a lot, which is why we're beginning to catch up," said state Forestry Department spokeswoman Coleen Ervin about the largest of the fires, the Turn fire south of Lake Elsinore.

That fire, which was deliberately set, grew to just over 25,000 acres by Monday night, she said, but was 35 percent contained and 25 percent con-

It burned southwest along a sevenmile-wide front, taking with it one home under construction. Ms. Ervin said some structures, orchards and livestock were theatened.

About 1,300 firefighters were battling that blaze, and no containment time was predicted. Flood control officials on Monday

were assessing drainage areas around the brushfires and speculating on potential danger when winter rains wash down the now-barren hillsides into nearby homes.

The Carbon Canyon blaze in south eastern Los Angeles County and northwestern Orange County had burned 8,260 acres by late Monday and was 95 percent contained and 75 percent controlled

The cause of that fire, which destroyed two houses and one mobile home, had not been determined.

John M. Budish, 23, was arrested Monday and held for investigation of setting an illegal campfire in San Gabriel Canyon that led to a destructive fire near the Bradbury Duarte area, 20 miles northeast of downtown Los Angeles.

He was being held by the Los Angeles County sheriff's department in lieu of \$5,000 bail. The fire destroyed 49 expensive homes and damaged 27 others at an estimated cost of \$25

The 6,168-acre blaze was 60 percent contained late Monday, with full con-

tainment expected tonight. One person died of a heart attack during the blaze, but no injuries had been reported to firefighters.

Texans claim Arizona firm has rustled mechanical-bull design

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — The country-western singer whose Pasadena, Texas bar set the scene for the movie "Urban Cowboy," says a mechannical bucking machine sold in this Phoenix suburb is costing him big bucks of another sort.

A Pasadena, Texas, company, partly owned by singer Mickey Gilley, has filed a lawsuit accusing F.W. and Associates, of Tempe, and rodeo champion Larry Mahan of copying its patented mechanical bull, which actor John Travolta rode in the

That's bull, says defendant Fred Wagenhals, the Tempe company's president.

The bull he and partner Ed Fochtman recently started manufacturing is an amusement ride with safety features, while the original bull featured in the movie was designed to train rodeo novices, Wagenhals said.

The original device looks like a saddle, while the Tempe creation looks like the torso of a bull. Neither device has any legs or head, but both give powerful bucks.

The suit was filed Friday in U.S. District Court by Gilley's Enterprises, and Joe D. Turner, a Corrales. N.M., resident who said he invented the mechanical bull in 1974 and received the only federal patent for the 'rodeo-training device" in December

Gilley's Enterprises owns Gilley's Club, a Pasadena nightclub that was the location for the shooting of Urban Cowboy, the pop-culture love story that featured a bucking contest.

The only company authorized to sell the patented bull is Gilley's Enterprises, said the suit. The plaintiffs ask for a court order

stopping any further manufacture of the Tempe bull and for monetary Wagenhals said he does not believe

there is an infringement on any pa-"We took a long look at that patent," he said. "We're not going to do anything to jeopardize our company.

We had our attorneys look at it and we felt we could overlook it (the pa-F.W. and Associates manufactures novelties including motorized, airconditioned stagecoaches with

sets, phones and bars. One of the \$35,000 coaches recently was purchased by actor Burt Reynolds.

The 10-year-old-company was sued in Maricopa County Superior Court in January 1979 by sports-car magnate Malcolm Bricklin, creator of the gullwinged Bricklin SV1. Bricklin claimed that the company

had violated an exclusive promotions contract with him by using his nationwide contacts to expand its business. Wagenhals said Monday that the claim has not been resolved. The idea for creating a bull specifi-

cally as an amusement ride came from Mahan, a six-time rodeo world champion All-Around Cowboy, Wagenhals said. The machine they created has 350 modes and is programmed to gently rock a child or to test the most skilled rodeo champion.



Bugs put bite on Independence Hall

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Termites ave put the bite on Independence all, and the National Park Service is Hall, and the National Park Service is taking steps to prevent the birthplace of the Bill of Rights and the Constitution from becoming a historic feast.

Park Service workers recently noticed "mud tubes" in the basement of the hall's east wing. Termites make the tubes out of regurgitated wood and then burrow under them to protect themselves from light and air.

The Park Service has had exterminators spray for termites for years and, although some of the hungry

little wood-chompers have been seen from time to time, no damage to the

hall has occurred. But the latest evidence has given the Park Service reason to upgrade their preventive measures.

The workers will drill holes into the soil, where termites nest every 24 to 36 hours to get moisture, and then inject a pressurized termite poison to create a barrior between the nests

Part three: A sports announcer is born in lowa

'I was a sports announcer....I was out in the world at last'

The Eureka College campus was so beautiful it hurt that June afternoon in 1932 when we graduated. A way of life was ending; and it was hard for me to see it as also a beginning

me to see it as also a beginning.

I was broke and in debt and I still didn't know what I wanted to do, so there would be one last summer of lifeguarding at Lowell Park, where I knew I could save the usual \$200. For many sleepless nights I truly faced my future with the realization that no good fairy would whisper in my ear and tell me what I did want to do. I really wrestled with the problem of what I would be happy doing for the next few decades.

Finally, the answer came: I wanted some form of show business. But the problem was, how to go about it? There was show business closer to home than Broadway and Hollywood—radio—and its big-time center was then Chicago.

I hitchhiked the 100 miles to Chicago and started knocking on doors. I was willing to sweep floors, but I hadn't been in any station long enough to make the offer. Then, after four discouraging days, I got a brief interview at NBC. The savvy assistant counseled me to get some experience "in the sticks" before trying to crack big-time radio in Chicago. So I hitchhiked back home, then headed for Davenport, Iowa, 75 miles away.

There was a radio station in Davenport called WOC, which stood for World of Chiropractic. WOC was located on the top floors of the Palmer School of Chiropractic and shared time with WHO in Des Moines.

At WOC I came face to face with one of the most unforgettable characters I would ever know — Peter MacArthur.

the Scottish program director. Crippled by arthritis, Peter could only get around using two canes and strong

FOR ONE MONTH WOC had been advertising for an announcer, and just the week before one had been hired out of 94 applicants. To come so close was infuriating to me, and as I took my leave I asked, as sort of a get-off line, "How in hell does a guy ever get to be a sports announcer if he can't get inside a station?" This was the first time in all my door-thumping that I'd mentioned sports or my hidden desire out loud.

Waiting for the elevator, I was quite oblivious to the thumping and cursing in the hallway I'd just left. The door to the elevator opened and, as I started for it, the thumping and cursing caught up with me. Peter MacArthur's cane rapped me in the shin. "Not so fast, ye big bastard, didn't ye hear me callin' ye? Now what was it ye said about sports?"

I told him my idea of someday progressing to the lofty status of sports announcer. "Do ye perhaps know football?" he

asked.
"I played for eight years," I answered, not feeling it was essential to

wered, not feeling it was essential to break that down into scrubs, second string, and regular. "Hmmm! Do ye think ye could tell

"Hmmm! Do ye think ye could tell me about a game and make me see it?" he asked speculatively. "I mean, really see it, so as I'd know what was goin' on?"

I COULDN'T STOP the excitement that was growing in me. "I think I could," I said.

"Come with me!" he barked. We went into a studio all draped in heavy blue velvet (the custom of that pre-soundproof day). He pointed to a red light. "When that goes on, ye start talkin'. Tell us about a game and make me see it." He paused on his way out and said, "That's the mike in front of ye — ye won't be able to see me but I'll be listenin'. Good luck."

I mentally selected the fourth quarter of an actual game Eureka had played in my senior year, so I could spout familiar players and plays, I talked for 20 minutes and wound it

When Pete came back in, I was wringing wet and hanging on the mike for support. He was chuckling and growling at the same time. "Ye did great, ye big S.O.B.! Now look," he always made it sound like "luke"), "we have a sponsor for four University of Iowa games. Ye be here a week from Saturday and I'll give ye five dollars and bus fare. If ye do all right on that one, ye'll do the other three."

The great day dawned. Evidently Pete had done a little worrying, because a staff announcer was going along to share the broadcast. I was more than a little alarmed, because everyone in Dixon was waiting to hear "little old hometown me."

Demo survivors are now heros of losing party

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a decimated Democratic Party, the survivors are heroes, for now.

So when Sen. Gary Hart narrowly withstood the conservative undertow and barely won a second term in Colorado, his supporters celebrated with chants suggesting he run for president.

"Eighty-four, eighty-four," they chorused.

There will be a lot of that going around as Democrats look for leadership, and would-be leaders define their roles in the months ahead.

One of them already is defined: Sen. Edward M.

Kennedy stands as the clear leader of liberal Democrats. Theirs was the cause in which he challenged President Carter's renomination, the cause for which he spoke in defeat at the Democratic National Convention.

Even as he campaigned for Carter this fall, Kennedy teased Democrats about the prospect that he would be back in three or four years, campaigning for himself again

for himself again.

But the myth of invincibility is gone. A Kennedy has been defeated, and badly, by a president who proved so unpopular that he could carry only

six states and the District of Columbia.

It is more than likely that Kennedy will try again for the Democratic nomination in 1984. But it also is likely that he will have a contest on his hands.

He has the Senate as a forum, but the Republican takeover cost him the power, and the staff assistance, that went with chairmanship of the Judiciary Committee. Kennedy will be up for Senate re-election in Massachusetts in 1982.

That also is the first opening for a comeback by Vice President Walter F. Mondale, a liberal Minnesota Democrat without portfolio after Jan. 20. He's already hinted that he won't stay out of elective politics for long. Conceding on election night, Mondale recalled the concession of his mentor, the late Hubert H. Humphrey, defeated in the presidential election of 1968

election of 1968.

"He told me when he wrote that speech, 'It's got to be done right because it's really the opening speech of my next campaign.' "Humphrey's next campaign was for the Senate; he served there until he died.

Republican Sen. David Durenberger will be up for re-election in 1982. So will Republican Gov. Al Quie. Mondale could challenge for either office and position himself for a presidential bid next time, assuming he is prepared to put up in a succession of Holiday Inns. Five years ago he said he was not, and therefore wouldn't run.

By last Wednesday, some of his aides and partisans were sporting "Mondale in '84" buttons.

Theoretically, of course, Carter will remain the titular leader of the Democrats. That and 55 cents will get him into the Washington subway. Defeated presidential candidates do not have a lot of political clout, particularly if they lose big and have no political prospects.

Sen. Barry Goldwater's Republican allies were out of their party offices within weeks of his landslide defeat in 1964. Sen. George McGovern had the same experience in 1972. Goldwater barely won re-election Tuesday; McGovern lost.

re-election Tuesday; McGovern lost.

The same pattern is likely to hold for Carter and the people he installed at the Democratic National Committee, an outpost when the party holds the White House, a more important operation when the party is out of power.

While Kennedy and Mondale are the two of the most obvious Democratic names for 1984, there are many more. California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. as much as said he'd run next time when he conceded that his 1980 nomination bid was going nowhere. Gov. Hugh Carey of New York has hinted he might.


Hart is not the only re-elected Democratic senator

The paperwork burden

Sometimes it seems as though there is no way to get relief from the costly, burdensome excess of paperwork necessitated by actions of the federal government.

The good intentions of our congressmen seem to run aground in the bureaucratic maze that is known as Washington, D.C.

The result? The required governmental paperwork burden increases and, correspondingly, the cost to the taxpayer escalates.

Take, for instance, the annual reports that executive agencies are required by law to submit to Capitol Hill.

During the past year, Congress looked at the 2,300 reports and, at first, earmarked 235 of them for extinction. That would have saved approximately \$9 million a year.

But when the curtain fell on the proceedings in the House and Senate chambers, only 95 of the reports actually were given the death sentence.

Experts say the government's penchant for paperwork is exceedingly costly. If one looks beyond the halls of Congress, he will find that the citizenry, businesses and institutions are burdened mercilessly by the enormous vol-

Through the years Congress has enacted some 9,000 laws that require some type of paperwork. Each year the government spends more than \$40 billion just to print and process all that paperwork.

Then comes the rest of the story. Some experts estimate that the total costs of that paperwork burden actually soar well above \$100 billion.

Sadly, a vast percentage of that money is simply going down the drain as unproductive waste.

Furthermore, statistics would indicate that those interested in fighting the paperwork burden are waging a losing battle. Although 95 annual reports from executive agencies were dropped this year, Capitol Hill requires new reports at the rate of 100 per year.

If you're becoming somewhat disillusioned by this paperwork picture, take note of this observation: The federal bureaucrats who require these reports also justify their very existence by means of having to have the personnel to read, compile and scrutinize the reports. They likely will not encourage those attempting to curtail the paperwork burden.

Will Reagan landslide satisfy desire for change?

I am not one of those clever pundits who hedges his bets and like a psychic claims in retrospect to have predicted the future. Ronald Reagan's landslide surprised the heck out of me. The Republican takeover of the Senate surprised me even more.

I thought Reagan would win, but I thought it would be close. I thought some of the liberal senators would get knocked off, but not that many. Still, I have been grinning like the Cheshire cat since Nov. 4. I may never be able to frown again.

What has happened is something as significant, in terms of long-range effects, as the election of Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1932. There has been a sea-shift in American government. It came not a moment too soon, for we were headed toward national sui-

Generalizations about elections are always dangerous because any election victory is the result of a complex combination of factors, some as nonphilosophical as the effectiveness or lack of effectiveness of the campaign organization.

Two things, however, can be deduced from the results. The American people are not bellicose; they are willing to act with restraint, but they are not willing for this nation to remain in a position of weakness. They perceived that the defenses of the nation were weak and they voted to correct the problem.

The second point is that they perceive that the economics of liberalism

have failed. People may not be sophisticated, but they have at least realized that the bromides and speeches and exhortations they have been hearing from politicians have not cured inflation, have not created a healthy economy, and have in fact made them worse off than they were before.

Ironically, the American people may have re-discovered the wheel the very free market philosophy on which this country was founded. They at least seem willing to give it a

The results of an election, however, are more important than the motives of the voters. Franklin Roosevelt won his first election on a platform not unlike Barry Goldwater's or Ronald Reagan's and immediately repudiated it by launching the collectivist New Deal. In other words, voters in 1932 did not get what they expected, but the impact of FDR's election changed the fundamental nature of the U.S. government for decades.

So, I believe, will this election. The lasting impact will come from the changes in the federal bureaucracy. Reagan has already let it be known he intends to clean house and replace some 3,000 bureaucrats. When the Republicans assume chairmanships of the Senate committees that will mean hundreds of staff positions will also be turned over. Thus the tenor of a significant portion of the federal government will change.

Reagan, of course, will soon alienate the doctrinaire far right, not because he will change stripes, but because he has never been an idealogue. He will stick to his principles, but he is a realist and knows that the art of politics is the art of compromise. He will get along with the responsible Democrats in Congress much better

he actually is what many people erroneously thought in 1976 Jimmy Carter was - a decent, honorable man. He will act on the basis of what is best for the country, not on the basis of what is best for his re-election, and this one point will make an enormous difference in the quality of our government.

Instead, wanting only to shorten his own personal anguish, he conceded influencing thousands of voters who knew the final verdict before they could cast their ballots, and dooming a number of congressional and local party candidates.

Leading the purge of Carter and his henchmen is Robert Strauss, who headed the Carter-Mondale campaign. My sources say he was on the phone to party leaders across the country before the shock of the Reagan landslide was over. He reportedly has lined up enough support to kick Carter's man, John White, out of the party chairmanship

POLARIS PROBE: A decision by the admirals to take all 10 Polaris submarines out of the Navy's nuclear strike force has moved critics of the plan to seek action from Congress. They want the watchdogs on Capitol Hill to hold hearings on the controver-

sial plan. The Polaris subs, which carry 16 nuclear missiles apiece, are to be replaced by Tridents, which carry 24. But Trident production is far behind schedule, and some experts say that removing the Polaris' nuclear clout could make the United States vulnerable while the Trident fleet is being

The Navy based its decision partly on a classified study prepared for Senate investigators. It shows that converting the Polarises to conventionally armed subs would save money and crew. But some sources charge the study was written to suit the perceived notion of what the legislators wanted to hear.

A Navy spokesman said the Polaris subs, over the next 15 months, would have their missiles replaced with removable concrete ballast.

Chilean Marxists blame press for regime's decline

Marxists consider the newspaper El Mercurio one of their principal emies in Chile. In fact, they are still bewailing their failure to silence it in the early

1970s when they were running Chile. Former Sen. Luis Corvalan has written that one of the errors the Marxist "Popular Unity" government made was "to put the political liberty of expression that the people had conquered on the same footing with the rights that the reactionaries

According to Corvalan, exiled secretary general of the Communist Party of Chile, the military coup of Sept. 11, 1973, that toppled President Salvador Allende and the Marxist regime, "was programmed in Washing-on" years earlier.

Corvalan said that Agustin Ed-ards, publisher of El Mercurio, met ith Secretary of State Henry Kisinger and Attorney General John fitchell the morning of Sept. 15, 1970, ust 11 days after Allende won a slim (36.3 percent) plurality of the presi-

Later that day, CIA director Richard Helms joined them and that was when the "go-ahead" was given for a military coup to prevent Allende from taking office. It failed. But, in the next three years, according to Corvalan, the CIA alone distributed \$8 million to finance the destabilization the Popular Unity government.
That story, with a number of varians, has been told before.

But what is new in Corvalan's latest version of history, dated July 5, 1979, but only recently circulated in Latin America, is the Communist effort to shift at least some of the blame for the successful 1973 coup away

from the Chilean armed forces. Corvalan says Gen. Augusto Pinochet, who led the coup, the newspaper El Mercurio, "and some more" were making the Marxists appear to be partisans of vengeance and of slitting the throats of the armed

Corvalan writes that "without excusing their responsibility, it is even more true that the coup d'etat ... was organized by the CIA and domestic reactionaries. ...

"We must guard against the dan-ger of confusing the men in uniform, with exception of the Pinochets and the Contreras, with the real enemies of the people and of national

Quite obviously, Corvalan, who has

been living in Moscow since the Pinochet government freed him several years ago, and other opponents of the military regime are trying to stir up dissension within the armed forces.

It amounts to tacit admission that no opposition group — neither the Marxists, who also include the Socialists and the Radicals, nor the Christian Democrats — is big enough, or has sufficient popular support to govern Chile alone.

Corvalan has been calling for the Marxist coalition and the Christian Democrats to join forces against the military junta.

More recently, the Christian Democrats, have been talking about a civilian-military interim government, the possibility of a great accord in which the Chilean people and also the armed forces participate," as former President Eduardo Frei put it.

Although Frei is known to be wary of the Marxists, he disappointed many Chileans by failing to speak out against the Popular Unity coalition during the flurry of political activity in Chile in recent months.

Andres Zaldivar, secretary general of the Christian Democrat party, did insist that "we are not partisans, neither now nor tomorrow of political alliances with the Communist Party but, with the same clarity, we believe that ideas cannot be prohibited by

Stock market mixed

stock market, absorbing news of higher interest rates and credit tightening moves by the Federal Reserve, closed mixed Monday in volatile trading.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks dropped more than 11 points soon after the market opened but managed to recover almost all of that by the close.

The blue chip average finished with a loss of just 0.09 at 986.26. It had been down more than 5 points just a half hour before the 4 p.m. close of the New York Stock Exchange.

The NYSE composite index rose 0.36 to 79.32. But in the broad tally of trading, losing issues outnumbered gainers about 3-2.

The Federal Reserve Board, after the close of NYSE trading Friday, raised its discount rate the rate it charges on loans to banks - by one percentage point to 12 percent. It also announced a 3 percent surcharge for some big bor-

Several banks raised their prime lending rates by three-quarters of a percent-age point to 16.25 percent shortly before trading opened Monday. That move quickly spread throughout the banking industry.

Many analysts also have been expecting a market re-treat following last week's powerful rally when the Dow Jones industrial average gained nearly 54 points on the largest weekly trading volume ever.

Home building rate heading downward again

NEW YORK (AP) — The rate of home building is heading down again, according to Kenneth Thygerson, chief economist of the U.S. League of Savings Associations. "Next year will not be a good year," he

Thygerson believes the first half of 1981 will be very weak, and the improvement he foresees later in the year is likely to bring starts back only to an annual rate of 1.4 million or 1.5 million.

That first-half weakness, as he sees it, will be a continuation of a decline that has already set in, and which could drop starts during the winter to an annual rate just above 1 million - 1.2 million at

"We see a fairly substantial dip that should show up in the October starts (when figures are reported) and which should persist into next February or March," he said. "There'll be no reprieve this winter.'

Dismal news of this sort is so common now that, like background noise, it is often ignored. But for those who have waited years for a home of their own

it is more like the rattle of throttled hopes and Such extreme pessimism may not be as widespread by the mid-1980s, when it is hoped new building and financing techniques might bring some relief. But for a year or so, the scene is not a happy

The reason, lenders will tell you, is high interest rates, about 14.5 percent at most savings and loan associations but with some already exceeding 15

percent. Atop those rates might be up-front A Connecticut savings bank, for example, now charges \$150 merely to consider a mortgage application. If it is granted, the borrower is confronted with

two or three points — percents of the total mortgage — that must be paid before the borrower ever lives in When very stiff terms are "offered," said Thygerson, no terms really are being offered. "The lenders are telling people 'we don't have money — look elsewhere." But where?

Some realtors report that in recent months more than half their deals have been consummated with the help of seller financing, and now it appears that some of these mortgages might be acceptable for

Private financing has been "cumbersome and dangerous from the buyer and seller viewpoint," said Thygerson, mainly because the mortgages follow no standard form and generally are nonmarket-

Now, however, the Federal National Mortgage Association has indicated it will buy some seller-financed paper that meets its specifications and is serviced by a third party, such as a savings and

While seller-financing is likely to remain a market force, much help will be needed from the conventional sources, including savings and loan associa-tions, savings banks and some commercial banks. Thygerson expressed hope "for some moderation


in interest rates by late spring," a hope upon which his second-half recovery forecast is based. Over the longer term, he said, "we're convinced that the single biggest problem in the 1980s will be affordability." As things stand, he said, the first-

time buyer now cannot afford a house. "Downsizing," is viewed by Thygerson and others in the housing and finance industries as an emerging solution. In fact, builders already are building down

for perhaps the first time since the 1950s. "It's similar to cars," said Thygerson, who foresees footage shrinking and houses being more dense-

The most potent new financing istrument, he predicts, will be the shared equity mortgage, in which the lender lowers the borrowing charge in exchange for a portion of the appreciation.

"So long as we have 8-10-12-15 percent inflation, and volatility too, we'll have innovation of one sort or another in building and financing," he said.

U.S. delegate promises American military buildup

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A Soviet inilitary buildup "unparalleled in world history" is forcing the United states into a corresponsing arms program, and American leaders "will ot concede military superiority," ccording to a U.S. delegate to the pean Conference on Security.

"There should be no misundertanding," U.S. delegate Max Kam-elman told representatives to the neeting. "The United States ... has mbarked and will intensify its eforts in the days ahead toward trengthening our military capac-

Kampelman's remarks were made uring a closed-door session at the 5-nation conference, which is re-viewing the 1975 Helsinki accords on uropean security and detente. His summents were made available by

he American delegation.

Kampelman called for an easing of ensions between East and West, ading the United States committment

o arms reduction would be continued by president-elect Ronald Reagan.
"We are moving precipitously toward confrontation, and it is to all our interests that this movement cease nd be redirected toward the spirit of stente," Kampelman said.

"My government under President larter and president-elect Reagan tands ready to negotiate significant, erifiable and balanced arms control

agreements once a mutual determination to do so becomes evident," he

Kampelman claimed the United States had no choice but to increase its military budget because the Russians had outspent the United States on defense by \$150 billion in the last

"We are embarked on our program of renewed military strength because we have been forced to do so in the light of a massive military buildup unparalleled in world history and regrettably one prepared for use, it would appear," he said.

"The Afghanistan invasion was a symbol of of that preparation and its seriousness to us, therefore, cannot be underestimated," Kampelman said.

Last December, the Soviet Union sent about 85,000 troops into Afghanistan, installed a new pro-Soviet regime and began helping Afghan troops fighting Moslem guerrillas.

Kampelman said the Kremlin "devotes an astonishing 14 to 15 percent of its gross national product on its military machine" and "has a new catalog of major weapons systems, including four intercontinental ballistic missiles, three submarinelaunched missiles, four new classes of submarines and four new fighter

Polish labor movement makes another score

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Poland's independent labor movement scored again as a district governor opposed to it submitted his resigna-

Gov. Miroslaw Wierzbicki of Czestochowa offered to quit Monday during talks between a government commission and workers from Solidarity, the biggest independent union, in the southwestern industrial city, labor and government sources said.

The sources said Premier Josef Pinkowski apparently did not accept the resignation immediately, and the government delegation was to resume talks with the workers today.

The dispute began Nov. 10 when Wierzbicki declared a regional state of emergency after Solidarity threatened to call nationwide strikes unless the Supreme Court threw out a lower court ruling inserting a clause in the union's constitution affirming the supremacy of the Communist Party. The governor also banned the union's activities in his district. Plant

managers had Solidarity posters torn down, took the telephones out of the union's offices and barred union leaders from publicizing grievances in factory newsletters. Residents of the area said revolvers also were distributed to militiamen, who normally do not carry arms.

Even though the Supreme Court overruled the lower court and Solidarity canceled its strike threat, Wierzbicki did not rescind his order. Workers at some 200 plants in the region then threatened to strike



Gang of Four' followers planned armed rebellion

PEKING (AP) — Followers of China's radical "Gang of Four" deed 33,500 militiamen in Shanghai and planned an armed rebellion after earning of the gang's arrest in Octo-cer 1976, foreign ministry officials

In the last of four briefings on indembers of the "Lin Piao Clique," he officials said the gang's followers danned to control key facilities in China's biggest city and instigate strikes and demonstrations across the

There was no indication why the alleged rebellion failed to start.

The officials again declined to say when the trial of the 10 would start.

ut the Communist Party newspaper People's Daily said today it was im-minent and hundreds of representa-tives of various organizations had arved in Peking to attend the trial. The newspaper said parts of the rial would be telecast to the world by atellite. All 10 defendants face the

death penalty.

The indictment says the gang handed out 74,000 rifles to the militia in Shanghai in August 1976, along with 00 artillery pieces and 10 million nunds of ammunition in preparation ir an armed rebellion.

Chairman Mao Tse-tung, who led ne People's Republic from its foundine People's Republic from its found-ing in 1949, died on Sept. 9, 1976. Senior leader Deng Xiaoping has said the gang did not accept his choice of a successor, a reference to current Party Chairman Hua Guofeng, and nted to seize power.

The gang's alleged leader was Mao's wife, Jiang Qing. She was not among those charged with plotting the October 1976 rebellion, but the other three members - Zhang Chungiao, Wang Hongwen and Yao Wenyuan - were.

On Oct. 8, 1976, according to the indictment, the gang's Shanghai fol-lowers learned by secret code of the gang's arrest in Peking, called an emergency meeting and decided to use the militia for an armed rebel-They set up a command team and

two secret command posts, deployed 33,500 militiamen, assigned 27,000 rifles and artillery pieces and 225 motor vehicles and made available a large quantity of food and other materials, the indictment said.

It said they planned to cordon off the center of the city of 11 million people and control its administration center, railroad stations, wharves, airports, harbors, the Pujiang River tunnel, bridges and other main transport routes.

They planned to issue a "message to the people of Shanghai and the whole country," instigate production stoppages, strikes, parades, and demonstrations and control the press and radio stations to block news released by the central media, it charged.

They also planned to cut off electricity supplies, barricade airport runways and scuttle ships to block river mouths in hopes of holding out three days to a week and letting "the whole world know what is happening," the indictment said.

A Whopper with cheese has 589 calories, compared with 470 in Burger Chef's Big Shef and 425 in a Big Mac, the study said.

ERA supporters won't fight

for vote in lame duck session

By JAMES H. RUBIN **Associated Press Writer**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Although they need the money to operate, the Justice and State departments say President Carter should veto a \$9 billion appropriations bill if it con-tains provisions to block school busng for racial balance and the Soviet grain embargo. The Justice Department objects to

in amendment to the bill, as passed oth the Senate and the House, that would prohibit it from spending money to seek court-ordered busing to achieve school integration.

The State Department opposes a Senate provision that would forbid any federal expenditure to enforce Carter's partial embargo on grain sales to the Soviet Union. Carter has not said what he will do

if the bill arrives on his desk bearing either provision. The bill would appropriate \$9 billion to keep the Justice, State and Commerce departments operating through the end of the fiscal year next Oct. 30.

The bill won final Senate approval fonday on a 51-35 vote. Next, Senate and House conferees must try to set. ouse conferees must try to set-parities in the grain embargo

In September, the Senate voted to amend the bill to forbid any expenditure to enforce Carter's embargo of sales of 17 million tons of grain, imposed in January following the Russian military intervention in Afghanistan. The House, however, defeated a similar move in July.

If the House acquiesces to the Senate, the State Department said Monday, Carter should veto the bill.

Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti has taken a similar position if the final bill, which would still be subject to approval by both houses, contains

the anti-busing provision.

That provision, he has said, could cripple federal efforts to end public school segregation by removing the department's last resort in such cases: seeking court-ordered busing. Civiletti has also said the amend-

ment "raises serious constitutional Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., who led the losing fight to defeat the

Ten Commandments can't be displayed, court says

WASHINGTON (AP) - Those copies of the Ten Commandments affixed to classroom walls in Kentucky's public schools will have to come down, the Supreme Court says.

By a 5-4 vote Monday, the court ruled that such postings violate the Constitution's guarantee of religious The court's slender majority said the 1978 Kentucky law requiring the

postings in every public classroom 'has no secular legislative purpose and is therefore unconstitutional. "I think the court has given a signal. These kinds of statutes should not be passed and will not be condoned."

a happy William Stone, the lawyer who challenged the law on behalf of four Louisville residents, said from his Louisville office after learning of The court did not even waste the

time to hear arguments in the case because the law was so blatantly unconstitutional," Stone said.

Robert Wyncoop, assistant to the superintendent of Jefferson County schools, said officials in the state's largest school district already have begun compiling a list of the schools displaying the Ten Commandments.

We'll wait until we get official notification from our attorney," Wyncoop said, "and then take the appropriate action. I guess that means we would remove them.

It was estimated that the Ten Commandments copies would have to be removed from some 20,000 of the state's 30,000 classrooms. The rest had yet to receive their copies from private groups that were raising money for the project.

In the Kentucky case, the court did not totally ban the Ten Commandments from public schools, just as the court's controversial ruling in 1963 did not ban all Bible reading from the

"This is not a case in which the Ten Commandments are integrated into the school curriculum, where the Bible may constitutionally be used in an appropriate study of history, civilization, etnics, comparative religion or the like," the court's majority said in an unsigned opinion.

The opinion relied heavily on a 1971 ruling in which the high court established a three-pronged test for determining whether a state law can clear the First Amendment's "establishment of religion" prohibition:

"First, the statute must have a secular legislative purpose; second. its principal or primary effect must be one that neither advances nor inhibits religion; and finally the statute must not foster excessive government entanglement with religion."

Kentucky's was speared on the test's first prong.

Voting to strike down the law were Justices William J. Brennan Jr., Byron R. White, Thurgood Marshall, Lewis F. Powell Jr. and John Paul Stevens.

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justice Harry A. Blackmun dissented, voting instead to study the case more closely. Justices Potter Stewart and William H. Rehnquist agreed with the Kentucky Supreme Court that the law was valid.

Court bars students from praying at school

NEW YORK (AP) — The "mere appearance of secular involvement in religious activities" may indicate state approval of a specific religious creed, a federal appeals court has ruled in barring a student group from holding prayer meetings in a public

We must be careful that our public schools, where fundamental values are imparted to our children, are not perceived as institutions that encourage the adoption of any sect or religious ideology," wrote Judge Irving R. Kaufman in the three-judge panel's 23-page unanimous decision, released Monday

A group of students called "Students for Voluntary Prayer," from Guilderland High School near Albany, had asked school officials for permission to hold voluntary prayer meetings in a classroom before the start of each school day

When the board denied the request. the students sued, contending their constitutional rights to practice freedom of religion were abridged. District Judge Neal G. McCurn dis-

missed the students' suit last April. The 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld that decision in the ruling Monday.

The judges wrote: "To an impressionable student, even the mere appearance of secular involvement in religious activities might indicate that the state has placed its imprimature on a particular religious creed
















Gunshot derails his hopes for college grid career

FORT WORTH (AP) — Leonard Hunter lay critically wounded in a Fort Worth hospital today, his hopes for a college football career derailed by a bullet.

The 17-year-old starting tailback and co-captain of a Fort Worth high chool was felled in the parking lot of his school during the noon hour fonday after a scuffle with another student.

Police said Hunter was shot once in the upper left chest by a 16-year-old

boy with whom he had quarreled several times during the day.

The shooting occurred about 12:40 p.m. in a parking lot south of Eastern Hills High School in far east Fort Worth. A group of students witnessed the shooting, police said.

After surgery, Hunter was listed in fair condition Monday evening at John Peter Smith Hospital, but officials later changed his condition to

Police Lt. S.D. Pruitt said that after the shooting, a 16-year-old student was grabbed and held by other students until police arrived. During his entanglement with other students, the boy suffered several bruises and

cuts, police said.

He was taken to John Peter Smith Hospital, where he was treated and

released to the custody of his mother, police said
"I have never been really able to find out what the fight was about,"
Pruitt said. "But it does look like they had been arguing all morning,

since they first got to school.

Police said witnesses told them that during an earlier confrontation Monday morning, words were exchanged inside the school among Hunter, the suspect, and two other students. At that time, police were told, the suspect showed the other students a hand gun, which he then put inside an athletic bag.

During the confrontation in the parking lot, Pruitt said, Hunter apparently believed the gun was still in the bag, hit the suspect and grabbed the bag from him.
"It looks like one boy struck the other in the parking lot, and the boy

went to his car, got the gun and fired it twice," Pruitt said. One of the shots hit Hunter in the chest and the other went astray. About four or five students then jumped the boy with the gun, took the

weapon and held him, police said. Eastern Hills principal Marvin Harris said that after the shooting, the suspect was taken to his office and held there until police arrived. Harris said it was the first shooting in the school's history to his knowl-

Eastern Hills head football coach Roland Maclin said he was told the dispute initially was between the 16-year-old boy and a friend of Hunter,

rather than with Hunter himself. School officials said they were told during their investigation into the shooting that the suspect pulled a gun on Hunter's friend several days

Their dispute supposedly involved a girl, officials added. "He (Hunter) is a fine young man and outstanding player," Maclin

"He is a leader, well thought of and well liked by everyone. Hunter was trying to find out where the gun was," Maclin said. "He was trying to prevent something from happening. That's the type of guy he is. He's not a



Titan dethroned as largest moon

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Saturn's moon Titan has lost the title of largest natural satellite in the solar system to Jupiter's moon Ganymede, but not by much, according to the latest analysis of Voyager 1 data

Scientists at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory here calculate that Titan's size indicates a diameter of 3,070 miles, compared with Ganymede's 3,160

Meanwhile, scientist Rich Terrile said the mysterious dark spokes on one of Saturn's rings apparently result from interaction between the rings and the planet's magnetic fields.

The fields rotate faster than the rings, and the particles in the spokes carry an electrostatic charge. Terrile said.

Until Voyager approached Saturn last week, Titan's diameter could not be accurately estimated because its surface, shrouded by dense clouds, was

Traditionalists angry at pope's method of giving Communion

FULDA, West Germany (AP) - A group of West German Roman Catholic traditionalists has sent a telegram complaining about the way Pope John Paul II distributed Communion wafers, the chief Vatican spokesman said today.

The Rev. Romeo Panciroli said the pope distributed the wafers into the hands rather than the mouths of those attending a Mass in Cologne on Saturday and at a U.S. Army base in Mainz on Sunday. The spokesman explained the pontiff was acting

according to the customs of his host country. The Vatican has granted permission for this practice upon individual requests from bishops in the

United States and other countries. Churches in many countries have kept the traditional practice of receiving Communion directly from the priest and only on the tongue. The wafer is regarded as the body of Christ.

The pope met today with the central committee of West German Roman Catholics, a lay organization of leading West German businessmen and politicians. He called on them to involve themselves actively in the modern problems of politics and society. He also again underlined his concern for foreign workers in industrialized states.

"Does there exist a convincing Christian sharing in the rather unusual living arrangement of both foreigners and Germans in your big cities and in your factories?" The pope asked the group. "Is there an understanding concerning fellowship among the various peoples and cultures in the one world.

On the next-to-last day of his five-day tour of West Germany, the pope repeated his reminders to the citizens of this affluent country that their wealth and independence requires them to care for the immigrants in their society. There are 2.5 million foreign workers in West Germany concentrated with their families in certain sectors of many large West

The presence of foreign workers is a potentially explosive social problem because many of the children are born and raised in West Germany but not granted citizenship automatically. With the declining economy, the young have virtually no chance of finding a job

In Manila, meanwhile, the Vatican formally informed President Ferdinand E. Marcos today the pope would come to the Philippines in February for a six-day pastoral visit.

Government and church officials there said Papal Nuncio Bruno Torpigliani, who met with Marcos for 40 minutes today, handed the president a letter from the Vatican State Minister Cardinal Agostino Casaroli saying the visit was set but the pope reserved the right to announce the official dates later.

A Filipino bishop who asked not to be identified said he expects the pope to make the formal announcement when he returns to the Vatican after his current visit to West Germany ends Wednesday.

A vast storm swirled into the Northeast today with heavy, wet snow and icy rain after blitzing Texas and Oklahoma, dousing smoldering Appalachian

The Fighting Irish thus moved up right behind top-ranked Georgia, a team that Notre Dame is scheduled to meet on New Years' Day in the Sugar

A 7-0 victory this past weekend over defending national champion Alabama was the impetus that helped push Notre Dame four places to the runnerup spot. Dan Devine's team. 8-0-1 so far this year, picked up four first-place votes Monday from the nation's sports writers and broadcasters for a point total of 1,188.

THE FIGHTING Irish took over No. 2 from Southern California, 7-1-1, which dropped all the way to No. 12 after a 20-10 loss to Washington's Rose Bowl-bound Huskies.

Georgia, meanwhile, the nation's only undefeated and untied team with a 10-0 record, defeated Auburn 31-21 last Saturday and held a firm grip onto the No. 1 spot with 55 firsts and a total of 1,306.

After an idle weekend, Florida State held onto third place with three No. 1 votes and 1,175 points, just two more than No. 4 Nebraska. The Cornhuskers defeated Iowa State 35-0 to garner the four remaining first-place votes and 1,173 points.

With Alabama and Southern Cal both losing, Ohio State, Pitt and Penn State all moved up in the polls.

THE BUCKEYES moved up to No. 5 with 1.012 points after a 41-7 trouncing of Iowa; Pitt climbed to No. 6 with 973 points after beating Army 45-7 and Penn State moved to No. 7 with 896 after routing Temple 50-7.

Alabama's loss to Notre Dame cost the Crimson Tide three places, to No. 8 with 735 points. Oklahoma, a 17-7 winner over Missouri, went one place to ninth with 719 and Michigan climbed from 11th to 10th with 695 points after a 26-0 beating of Purdue.

Baylor held down the No. 11 spot, followed by Southern Cal, Brigham Young, South Carolina, North Carolina, Washington, Mississippi State, UCLA, Florida and Texas.

Washington returned to the Top Twenty after a three-week absence while Texas reappeared after a twohiatus with a 56-26 beating of Texas Christian.

"I don't think the possibility of me leaving SMU exists at this time," Meyer told WFAA-TV.


The station sought Meyer's comment on reports from Memphis that he had been offered more than \$100.-000 to become head coach and athletic director at Memphis State.

MENTAL HEALTH UPDATE

Stimulants among the commonly abused drugs

Stimulants are another of the commonly abused classes of drugs. Their effect on the body is to increase the level of activity. They have very limited medical uses such as in appetite reduction or in treating hyperactive

Drugs such as amphetamines, methamphetamines, cocaine and caffeine are all stimulants. They may also be referred to in the drug culture as "uppers" or "pep pills." "Speed" or "crystal" are common names for amphetamines or methampheta-

Amphetamines have a pronouned effect on the body. In small amounts, they may increase the feeling of alertness, diminish fatigue, suppress appetite and create a feeling of well-

In larger amounts and particularly when injected into a vein, a feeling of euphoria and well-being may last several hours. Tolerance to the effect of the drug builds up, requiring larger amounts to achieve a given effect.

Physical exhaustion may occur as the person goes from one "high" to the next. A person's thinking and speech may approach incoherence, although the person himself may think he is making good sense. He may become irritable, aggressive, suspicious and very active.

In certain individuals, auditory hal-

lucinations of a threatening or persecuting nature may occur. These are often accompanied by delusional beliefs, again of a threatening or persecuting nature. Such an ampheatmine psychosis may be indistinguishable from paranoid schizophrenia. In predisposed persons, the use of amphetamines may precipitate a schizophrenic break from reality and chronic

psychiatric problems. Other physical effects of amphetamines may include shakiness, tension, muscle aches, increased heart rate and elevated blood pressure. In withdrawal states from amphetamines, the individual may feel depressed and lethargic. Because of the psychological dependence, development of tolerance to the drugs, the physical dependence, and the withdrawal symptoms, amphetamines are considered to be addictive.

Cocaine is also a stimulant. Its effects on the person are of much shorter duration than the amphetamine. Its only medical use is as a local anesthetic. Tolerance to the drug does not seem to occur, nor is it physically addictive. Psychological dependence, however, does occur. Small amounts produce feelings of well-being and euphoria. Large amounts may cause violent stimulation, hallucinations, cardiac arrest or respiratory col-

Chronic users may experience weight loss, inability to sleep, nausea,

digestive problems and, occasionally, convulsions. Since the drug is usually "snorted" or inhaled through the nose, chronic use causes a perforation of the septum of the nose.

Early recognition of the signs of stimulant abuse will allow parents and interested family members to take early action before addiction occurs and before the abuse habit becomes thoroughly established. Successful treatment requires detoxification (when indicated), psychotherapy, family counseling, healthy peer group relationships and the de-

sire to remain drug-free. Treatment is available locally through the MHMR Center as well as through the other local programs which provide drug abuse treatment.

U.S. automakers report hike in sales this month

DETROIT (AP) - Sales of U.S.built cars increased in early November compared to the same period last year, but industry analysts warn the spurt in sales may level off again.

The five major U.S. automakers reported Thursday that sales were up 3.5 percent compared with the first 10 days of November 1979. The increase over last year's reporting period was only the second since January.

Despite the upturn, the annual selling rate — what a year's sales would be based on one period's rate - declined to 6.6 million cars from 6.7 million in October as a whole, putting the industry back at September's

"It's just like winter and summer, you don't go from freezing to sunbathing in a day," said one company analyst who requested anonymity. "We're going to be on a plateau for a month while we see what interest rates do."

Positive comparisons with fairly strong year-ago sales will be "increasingly difficult through February," he warned.

The five major producers delivered 163,802 cars in the Nov. 1-10 period against 178,085 in the same period last year, when there was one extra day in the reporting period.

Chrysler Corp. sold 14,843 cars against 14,080 in early November 1979, including 3,877 "K-car" frontwheel drive compacts. That's a 19

General Motors Corp. sales of 105,-123 represented a 9.6 percent increase, on a daily basis, from 107,900; Ford Motor Co.'s 38,451 was 8.5 percent below 47,250; American Motors Corp.'s estimated 3,100 was down 36 percent from 5,475 and Volkswagen of America was down 24 percent, 2,285 # against 3,380.


