herself with her usual air of self-assurance when she entered the courtroom in Peking Thursday before a picked audience of 880 .

electrifyng presence. The men shambled in, subdued and dazed-looking,

Her accusers reported a week ago she refused to confess to the crimes
charged to her. She did not appear Thursday to have altered her stubborn

Born in abject poverty, she was kidnapped as a child and forced into a
